



# GREATER GREENSBURG



## *and* WORLD WAR II

WHEN A WORN and harrassed and distinguished English gentleman, carrying his inevitable umbrella, returned from Germany in September, 1938 bearing what many prayed and hoped was a pact which would muzzle the guns of war, little impression did this now historic event make upon the good living of Greensburg.

That was the Munich pact . . . but scarcely a year later it was thrown overboard by the Axis war mongers with the infamous invasion of Poland. . . . The die was cast . . . Events followed in swift succession through that winter and the spring and the next summer and then the maelstrom burst into a general European flame . . . Later to engulf even Greensburg.

The war crept slowly into our community consciousness . . . We shied from it as a nervous horse from an unfamiliar object . . . But it was to come . . . It began innocuously enough with the order on October 16, 1940 for all Greater Greensburg young men between the ages of 21 and 35 to register for the nation's first peace time military training program. . . . It was to be but for a year of preparedness but the program and the nation were led into the inevitable conclusion. . . . Once more we were to be cast in the great boiling cauldron of international conflict. . . . In this first registration 2,282 men were enrolled. . . . Others were to come later . . . first the older men to the ages of 45 and then the beardless youth of the 18 to 21 classes . . . all to be eventually whirled into the maze of military training.

October 29, 1940, the famous "gold fish bowl" of World War I was for the second time in this generation, brought from its museum resting place. . . . It was filled with thousands of capsules containing those fateful draft numbers. . . . Amid great ceremony in Washington, Henry L. Stimson, secretary of war, reached in. . . . And as the nation figuratively held its collective breath, No. 158 became history.

Popular Randall M. McGrane, golf professional at Hannastown Country Club, held that one. . . . He is now First Lieutenant R. M. McGrane. . . . Draftee McGrane through a technicality did not leave with the first group and this honor fell to Alphonse Vitello and Nicholas Phil Mattia, both of South Greensburg, who on November 29, just one month after the drawing, entrained for Pittsburgh for further physical examination and induction into this nation's first "peace time" army.

The war came closer with each succeeding group of draftees wafted swiftly to mobilization centers. . . . Prior to this we had seen the panoply of war when Greensburg's two units of the Pennsylvania National Guard suddenly were mobilized and detained to quarters. . . . This came early in February of 1941. . . . Companies I and the Headquarters Company of the Third Battalion, 110th Infantry, doffed civilian clothes for the last time in many and weary long months. . . . Another phase in Greensburg's long and excellent record of military service . . . carrying on in the finest tradition of American citizenship. . . . was in the lap of the gods.

And thus the first year of what later was to be termed WAR came with considerable suddenness and shock. While most everyone in this community, as elsewhere, felt in their hearts that national policies were leading us closer and closer to the inevitable, prayers were offered that perhaps some Almighty Power would steer us clear from the conflagration.

This was not to be.

### War Comes To Nation

War came on a peaceful Sunday afternoon. It was December 7, 1941, a day that "will live in infamy". The brightness of a crisp winter day became quickly overcast.

A symphonic radio program was interrupted. Newspaper editors and men rushed to their offices; on the streets, among neighbors, groups gathered to discuss and to wonder what might be next.

But as if by reflex action the American people responded.

The ultimate was accepted. More of our young men, those who held those unfortunate low numbers in the great draft lottery, soon would be on the march.

Civilians began to tighten their belts.

An older generation remembered a similar period more than twenty-five years ago when they, too, went forward to "make the world safe for democracy"

Youth craved the excitement and jammed recruiting offices in Greensburg and soon were off to camp as volunteers.

A little later the incidence of draft deferment became an increasing larger problem, as will be shown later. After a several months' period there was issued a group of about 900 essential deferred occupations. American youth found ways to dodge that.

And once more Greensburg had scarcely a taunt of the word "slacker".

State statistics bear that out. Furthermore these figures show that 46 per cent of the state's selectees were rated as having superior intelligence. Greensburg held its own in this analysis.

During the five years of the Selective Service system Mars, the God of War, monthly cut deeply into our young manhood in Greater Greensburg. It did not stop there.

Legion were the number of their elders, who, well knowing the hazards of an earlier combat in their lifetime, quickly volunteered for additional service to preserve our heritage.

Their number is legion. Space does not permit their enumeration but they came from all walks of life. Many of our clergy also volunteered as did business and pro-

fessional men whose talents were especially sought. One of the clergy, Rabbi Henry Goode, was killed in a motor accident while on duty in Washington. His loss was mourned in Greensburg by members of all faiths.

#### World War I Vets Enlist

Veterans of the last war, regardless of previous rank, were for the most part granted rank and their talents and experiences, were mustered by the government for the epoch ahead.

These men left their homes; their businesses, their close family and civic ties with Greensburg and adjacent localities, to wage the conflict against the common enemy so that their homes, their businesses, their way of life might not only be preserved for them but for all.

Many are now home. Much of their vitality has been sapped. They were proud to give; they are happy to be home.

They, as have all our kin, "fought the good fight".

This history is replete with brief biographies and pictures of the majority of those who have responded to their country's call. Perhaps some did not know their objective; perhaps many did not care.

Now they do care; they know what was their objective.

Time and experience will march on. They are as the Pilgrim fathers, who, escaping from the hidebound trends of Europe many years ago, have found that this escape, must, will and still is being preserved, even though through the past three hundred years this has cost heavily in blood and money.

Again foreign ideology has been kept from our American shores. The melting pot which is America has again arisen as a brotherhood against encroachment of foreign, egotistical tyranny.

But to retrogress a minute.

We return to the first year of the war.

Greensburg, the county seat of Westmoreland, third largest county in the state, has proved itself under the stress and strain of the most serious struggle in our history.

Its men and women in the armed forces and their leaders, many of whom are Pennsylvanians, all have won distinction all over the world where free men have been fighting.

#### Thousands Labor on Home Front

At home our businessmen, farmers and workers united to produce unprecedented quantities of war materials, food and other essentials to victory under war conditions.

On the home front there also has labored, silently sometimes, but effectively, thousands of men and women in essential activities, of many and multitudinous variations of war-time tasks, which will be reviewed in more detail as you read on.


The home front mobilization included all organizations, patriotic, business, civic, religious, or what have you. It included the boys and girls in their schools, in their churches, in the Scout programs; it included the clubs, social organizations, in the rural areas as well as in the urban, all united in one common cause for victory as perhaps this nation was never welded before.

A grateful nation, a grateful government and we ourselves in our own community are grateful that the will to win was ever present.

Arthur H. James was governor of Pennsylvania when war finally came and he, together with members of his cabinet which included Greensburg's E. Arthur Sweeny, as secretary of Welfare, immediately went into action in a plan which had long before been summarized.

### New State Guard Forms

In this state-wide preparedness program Greensburg figured in other ways. By this time the State Guard had been organized and was imbued with its protective nature. Greensburg placed its confidence in its Co. 1 of experienced officers and men. Many of these were veterans of World War I. Others were at the moment passed over by such draft calls as had taken place. Still others were almost beyond the draft age. This city also has enjoyed the protective benefit of Troop A, Pennsylvania State Police which for some years past has been the headquarters for most of the troops stationed in Southwestern Pennsylvania. This city likewise had representation on the State Council of Defense.

All these agencies went into immediate action when Pearl Harbor Day stunned the nation. State Police immediately began bridge patrols. The State Guard was deployed at dozens of strategic points and suffered because heavy duty garments were still unavailable, so recent had the organization become an entity.

The State Defense Council also began to function just as swiftly. Greensburg and Westmoreland county were organized under direction of Leonard S. Keck, of Greensburg. He swiftly named aides for all sections of the county, several in Greensburg and the territory adjacent to it. Hundreds responded, were organized and spent many weary hours training for their various duties.

Thus the careful planning of the State Government

immediately fanned out into its component parts. The home front mobilized almost as rapidly as did the military. There was a place for everyone from school age to the eldest.

Meanwhile this nation's eyes watched furtively the progress of the actual warfare on the two major fronts—that in Europe and that in the Pacific.

### First Troops Go Overseas

Thus early in 1942, a scant few weeks after our nation was plunged into war the first American Expeditionary forces including some from Greensburg and many more from this area, landed in Ireland. This was late January of the new year. It was several months later, however, before our strength had been built sufficiently before our troops were to receive the baptism of fire with the landing in and about Casablanca on the northwest African coast in French territory. Some of our young men fell in these preliminary invasion engagements. More were to fall or become wounded as the campaign pressed ever onward to chase the famed German General Rommel and the Italians and Germans out of the entire North African territory. It was a campaign which lasted nearly eight months. Then onto Sicily; again into Italy and one half of the famed Axis caved to the Allies six months later. This is in May 1943.

From there on in the European events have become more familiar in everyone's mind.

The great American arsenal of democracy, with

Pennsylvania and Western Pennsylvania in the keystone position was enlarging and speeding its factory output of all types of the munitions and supplies which were needed for our enlarging army in the European area.

In these several intervening months from the time the Japanese government declared war on the United States, our meagre forces were faring badly in the Pacific as were the similar forces of our Allies. It was a repetition of the Nazi juggernaut of a couple of years previously. The enemy slashed away with what seemed comparative ease at United States, British and Dutch territories and possessions in that vast theater of war. Shortly after Pearl Harbor, Guam, Wake, Hong Kong and Singapore fell, bringing especial tragedy to several Greensburg homes when it became known that young members of these families had been among the victims of the Japanese war machine. It was years before hopes of these families were dashed with definite news their kin were among those who had fallen.

Likewise during this period the Japanese moved closer to the United States mainland. The California coast was terrified by a submarine attack; the enemy landed in the Aleutians off the coast of Alaska.

#### Plants Speed Production

In all this period Greensburg plants, those in nearby communities like Jeannette, Youngwood, Latrobe and even the great Pittsburgh industrial area were combing every available worker, women as well as men; even high school lads.

As the war progressed; as the drain on manhood and even womanhood became greater, more and more housewives left their kitchens and laundries to engage in some factory activity; more enlisted in the work of the Red Cross, the various civilian defense activities and in the many scrap drives which came with increasing frequency.

All during this period the Greater Greensburg Draft Board, which had been named by Gov. James on October 15, 1940, continued to register and classify and then send off to training several hundred men each month, fulfilling its patriotic duty. As a matter of record the first World War II draft board was composed of John Black, Daniel Dunmire, now deceased, Bert Faust, Robert M. Carson and Dr. Iden M. Portzer. This board continues to function even though the war ended late in 1945. From time to time there have been replacements. Others who have served various periods include Lee Murphy and Daniel A. Long. Mr. Carson has acted as attorney for the board while Dr. Portzer has been the examining physician. Incidentally Dr. Portzer served in a similar post in World War I.

#### Vast Changes At Home

In general the first year or two of the War brought vast changes in the average Greensburg family. The first actual shock to those keeping the home fires burning did not come until almost the beginning of 1943. There had been some slight rationing of gasoline during the fall months of the previous year; experiments were conducted along other lines but in the main it was not until this period materialized that a summarization would show—do you remember?

One or more members of the family were in the armed services, some already on distant battlefronts; some of those already listed among the casualties.

Longer, harder working hours, higher wages but partially absorbed by steadily mounting costs of living; higher taxes and first investments in United States War Bonds.

Virtual abandonment of the family automobile except for restricted essential purposes.

Discouraging public transportation problems, especially for suburbanite communities, such as the many

outlying residential areas we have around Greensburg.

Curtailement or total lack of normal consumer services, such as laundry, merchandise delivery, plumbing, house repairing, taxi cabs, messengers, moving and storage.

Increased house rentals—this is before ceilings were established; the congestion which accrued in the larger work centers and the beginning of the "doubling up" of families, which now the war has ended is even worse than ever.

The great burden placed upon the remaining and generally older physicians, dentists and overtaxed Westmoreland Hospital facilities.

At least one new baby and one or more war brides in the immediate or relative family circle.

Periodic participation in blackouts and the more interest shown in civilian defense activities.

An increasing appreciation in world geography, as members of families anxiously follow the shifting battle lines or pray against the day when one of those telegrams from either the Army or the Navy might be delivered to their door.

A determination to "make it do, wear it out and eat it up", as shortages of nearly everything—ranging from gasoline through meat, canned goods and butter to ice cream and clothing—at last brought general rationing.

In many of these latter cases the scarcity is more

acute with us at this period in early 1946 although rationing and the war long since have passed.

Looking back over these numerous inconveniences now and the innumerable brushes many citizens had with the ration boards, most of it seems almost like a dream, or an experience akin to that of a lot of returned veterans. "I wouldn't want to go through it again, but I'm glad of the experience".


And in early 1943 there also came two domestic crises, felt in Greensburg and everywhere else. One was the demand from Selective Service headquarters in Washington and passed through State and to local boards that the needs of the nation in terms of manpower were to be even greater.

The die had been cast. We were growing much more successful in Europe; the tide had begun to turn in the Pacific, the Japs having been driven out of the Aleutians while several minor southwest Pacific Islands had been retaken by our troops and those of our Allies. On July 25 of that year the European Axis definitely was split when Mussolini abdicated in Italy.

### Our Fathers Drafted

In the United States fathers were ordered drafted! Also despite the fact that by this time youths of 18 and 19 years were being inducted, the need for

tremendous forces to wage the war as swiftly as possible to a victorious finish, led to no other alternative.

The year was scarcely old before young married men with children who could not be deferred because of essential activity were on the march, leaving a new flood of tears in their wake. More hundreds of Greensburg area homes were broken; more young wives with their children were forced to return to parental homes, there to keep the lonely vigil.

Eventually for many it meant widowhood; for others the return of husbands maimed or incapacitated. Far overshadowing these poignant tragedies, is the joyous reunions of families which have taken place.

It might not be amiss at this point to take time out to glance over some of the losses which we in our community have been called upon to suffer in this World War II. The figures so far available are far from correct. Daily word of some son, father, brother or sweetheart, long listed as "missing" too often have had to be declared by either the Army or Navy as "dead".

#### Losses Mount Steadily

As early as July of 1944 the number of those killed from all sections of Westmoreland County had surpassed the number killed from this area in World War I. Of this number of casualties 285 were definitely listed while another 165 were reported missing and presumably lost. The county total of deaths in World War I was 328. By far the Greater Greensburg area had contributed the

largest number of war's victims with more than 40 on the gold star rolls in this second World War.

By May of 1945 the county total had risen, as nearly as could be compiled, to 775—and some of these were women who had entered one of the services. The Greensburg total again was highest in the county breakdown with about 90 or more homes saddened. The number of missing or wounded was also vast and it will take perhaps months, or years before all these figures have been finally determined.

Shortly after the final victory a summary, which all during the war years was compiled as accurately as possible by the Greensburg newspapers from their records, showed that more than one thousand Westmoreland countians died on the battlefield, and, this number is rising daily as final reports keep coming from the war theaters.

In this unofficial list are included two women, one a WAC, the other an Army nurse, formerly of the Westmoreland Hospital staff. There were 852 army casualties in the county, including the Air Corps; 158 were members of the Navy, Marines or Coast Guard, while four county members of the Merchant Marine also are there.

The New Kensington - Arnold area, with the largest total population of any Westmoreland county district, now jumps into first place in total casualties in this unofficial total, the number being 114. Greensburg's total was placed at 100, though by now it is much higher and may reach 150 when all tabulations from the various

services become official. This newspaper summarization also gave the opinion that the wounded total, in normal war averages, would approximate four times the number of those who died while in service.

#### First Victims of War

Insofar as was known for a long time, Val J. Foltz, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Val J. Foltz, Sr., of Greensburg, R.D. 5, was the first to lose his life from the Greensburg area during World War II. He was stationed in the Philippines when war broke out at Pearl Harbor. He had awaited but a few days after his graduation from the University of Pittsburgh in June of 1941 before enlisting in the Army. The first word received by his parents came on February 17, 1942 saying their son had been wounded in action on February 8. On February 20, the second of these official telegrams came

to his harrassed parents that Val had succumbed of his wounds on February 13. He had been a member of the United States Army only about eight months when he gave his life in defense of those Philippines which the Japs later captured and in which, months and months later, other American blood was spilled in their recapture.

#### Pearl Harbor Casualty

Careful searching of families for this historical account, however, forces a correction regarding our first war victim.

One Greensburg life was lost when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. He was Pvt. Martin Vanderelli, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Vanderelli, a member of the United States Army Air Corps, who enlisted in 1939. He was killed at Hickman Field, Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941.

Born in Greensburg in 1919, Pvt. Vanderelli attended Greensburg High School where he played on the football team. Posthumously he has been awarded a Citation of Honor and the Purple Heart Medal, which his parents now treasure. He trained at Fort Slocum, N. Y. prior to duty in Hawaii with the regular army.

Early in 1943 Pennsylvania's government head at Harrisburg changed with accession of Brig. Gen. Edward Martin, retired commander of the famed 28th Division, but there was no appreciable diversion in the war effort. Local and county governments insofar as Greensburg and Westmoreland county are concerned remained fairly stable during the entire war period. Another Westmorelander joined Gov. Martin's cabinet, James A. Kell, of New Alexandria, for many years a county commissioner.

It was in this year also which saw definite indications that no longer was war entirely a masculine trade.

Our young women who were of sufficient age and who could pass necessary qualifications thrilled at the thought of entering one of the auxiliary services. Greensburg and vicinity contributed its full quota of members of the WAC, WAVES, SPARS and the Women Marines, several of them rising to officer grade. In addition trained nurse personnel quickly sought action in the uniform of their grade.

#### Our Nurses in the News

One veteran army nurse of Greensburg, Lieut. Mary Lohr, was among a group of Pennsylvania nurses who were trapped in the battle of Bataan and Corregidor, and fortunately was one of those successfully evacuated.

#### BLOOD DONORS

To the far-flung battle fronts the citizens of greater Greensburg gladly sent their blood . . . hoping that it would save the lives of our fighting men!

In all a total of 14,806 pints of blood were collected here, when mobile units of the Pittsburgh Blood Donor Center called.

This service was under the direction of the Red Cross, and Fred B. Trescher served as chairman of this particular branch.

Her experiences after her eventual return to Greensburg on leave, took up many columns in the local press. Lieut. Gertrude Irwin, of Ligonier, trained at Westmoreland Hospital, Greensburg, as was noted previously, is credited with being the first American Army nurse to die in Africa during this World War II.

Thus late in this eventful year many of those in the various branches of the Women's Services were already being deployed along with their brethren in arms to fight the enemy on foreign soil. Many were their adventures and near escapes in those hectic days. Later others were sent to the Pacific outposts as these were recaptured and the need for the specialized training of these young women was sought. Others from Greensburg went into the battle zones as volunteer Red Cross workers. Still, at least one other veteran young Greensburg woman aeronaut joined the WAAFS, that distinctive branch of home front service who gave their flying talents in ferrying all types of army planes from one point to another throughout the United States. Many also were enrolled in the Civil Air Patrol, of which Greensburg had a splendid unit. Still others aided in the aircraft warning service which had been set up early in the war through various American Legion Posts, two of such stations being maintained outside of Greensburg.

By this time also the Cadet Nurse Corps had been established to make sure that a satisfactory flow of trained nurses would be available as the war years progressed, and many entered this type of service. Others, both old and young, took special courses as Nurses Aides and aided immeasurably in the now sorely understaffed local hospital. Dozens of others volunteered

in any way that was possible, most of this energy being directed from the Greensburg Red Cross headquarters. There was a type of service and a need for all who could assist and many a tired factory worker gave unstintingly of her free time in many volunteer capacities.

Women Mann Many Posts

In the ever increasing number of duties in which volunteers were needed on the home front many women affiliated with church, social or civic organizations gave unhesitatingly of their free time to assist in many loan drives; to man war stamp booths and to knit or sew or do whatever else might be required to lend their assistance to those either at the fighting fronts or in the training camps. Oftimes there was an ache in the heart or a tear in the eye; maybe at times a voice quivered, but our women folks bravely kept on in whatever task was offered them.

All our reserves were marshalled and well against the common enemy.

Too, those on the fighting fronts had not been idle as the war moved more swiftly into 1944.

The American arsenal now had begun to spew forth its superhuman talents of production and of its manpower. Millions of troops were being transported overseas, mainly to Europe. Millions of millions of tons of supplies were accompanying them and Greensburg factories and others elsewhere in which local people were employed, were operating around the clock seven days a week to make this possible. Nothing which would not contribute to war progress came from these plants. Wages were rising rapidly; also the cost of living but each War Bond endeavor was being more and more oversubscribed. Greensburgers were investing their money as well as their manpower and their talents.

From the European front rumors upon rumors came about the direct invasion of the continent to carry the war forcibly into the heart of the German Reich. There was considerable speculation in Greensburg as to the date of that possible invasion.

The First Continent Invasion

Faces grew grimmer; families with sons now massed on those distant English Isles began to realize that the

supreme test was near. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, now in supreme command of all Allied troops, had been planning all this time. When his army was ready; his supplies massed; his supremely efficient air arm poised and the combined navies ready, the order came "to go".

By invasion day, which was June 6, 1944, the American public indeed had the well known "jitters" because of the innumerable false reports which seeped into radio and press channels.

Details of that invasion of the Normandy beaches of France are now well known. It was the beginning of the end of the Nazi Reich and the vaunted German armies. Success came quickly during the year and it became apparent to most of those at home that the end of German tyranny once more was merely a matter of time.

In the Pacific, now bolstered with an ever enlarging navy and army and the ever-efficient United States Marines, it likewise became apparent that the tide also was beginning to turn but for the moment most thoughts were focused on Europe.

However, war news from the two fronts now began to become of equal importance. The forces in the Pacific were beginning to roll rapidly. More islands were being retaken; our troops were moving back into strategic areas in which the Jap had burrowed. The first major objective, the campaign to retake the Philippines came late in the year and for a time diverted attention to the roaring movements of Allied armies in Europe. From bases also now acquired nearer to the Island of Japan our great superforts were beginning their bombardment of the cities of the Nippon Empire. It also became known that the famous B-29's were in action.

A day of reckoning for both Germany and Japan had arrived at last.

### No Surcease on Home Front

But on the home front there was no surcease.

Factories continued to hum; coordination of all activities seemed to multiply. Merchants devoted even more space in their store windows and in their advertising to institutional and inspirational appeals aiding, no one will ever know how much, in keeping our morale high and our efforts at top speed. Theater managements, industries of every type, patriotic or other organizations gave of their facilities in promotion of all war endeavors.

How many thousands of lines of this type of advertising or how many extra hours managements of all these facilities which go to make up a city spent in keeping our war consciousness at a high pitch will never be known.

Ministers in their pulpits; teachers in their school rooms all contributed in every way possible to hasten the day when it would be "over, over there".

All the time more families grieved. More and more of those sad telegrams were arriving. And all the time larger and larger numbers of men and women were going into uniform.

### Troops Invade City

Greensburg, during this period, and for months previously and for months to come, also assumed the atmosphere of actually being a participant in the war. For a long period the Armed Services maintained an examination and induction station in the National Guard armory while at St. Vincent College swarms of young men overran that ordinarily peaceful campus when the school was turned into a basic aviation training center.

These two activities brought literally thousands of those in uniform and those soon to be in uniform into the city.



### VICTORY GARDENS . . .

A nation-wide program to raise more food and of course to make your own ration stamps go a little further was a civic endeavor.

Residents of greater Greensburg spent many hours tilling every bit of available soil . . . and it did pay off . . . as witness the display of garden products raised by members of the Greensburg Lions Club.

Something new had been added and it soon became apparent that additional recreational facilities would have to be found to take care of these men. Again the home front mobilized for this "duty". The city soon learned what fraternization meant and the men themselves, as so many later expressed it, have looked upon their sojourn, whether long or short in our midst, as one of their happiest experiences.

As it so often happens when boy meets girl, many a soldier in our city lost his heart to one of our fair ones. Many happy war and post-war marriages have been the natural result.

A pertinent sign that the end could not be too far away, therefore, was given Greensburg when the training camp at St. Vincent no longer was deemed necessary and the induction station prepared to consolidate once more with that in Pittsburgh as it had been in the beginning when the tides of war first lapped at our shores.

So as the Yanks and British and other Allies began pressing the German Wehrmacht from the West, the great Russian armies began to roll in from the East. Russia liberated Warsaw; the Yanks crossed the Rhine.

In panic and consternation now what was left of the Germans began caving from all sides. In the meantime

America's war leader, President Franklin D. Roosevelt died and was succeeded by Vice President Harry S. Truman. The change made little difference in the international picture.

The Russians entered Berlin. Adolf Hitler, who had started out in a mad orgy to whip the world, died by his own hand as did several of his satellites. France long had been restored to a Free Nation. The Russian and American soldiers met at the Elbe. Mussolini was shot, and his body desecrated by Italian Partisans.

### Victory Comes in Europe

On May 8, 1945, Victory in Europe was complete by formal proclamation.

Pandemonium raged in Greensburg, as everywhere else.

"Let's finish off the Japs", was the sober thought of the next day.

Plans for demobilizing troops in Europe with long service records got underway and redeployment of others began.

In the Pacific during these past few tempestuous days following the victory in Europe, British and American and Australian and Dutch forces had not been idle. A couple of months before the Victory in Europe. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, had triumphantly reentered war torn Manila and the liberation of the Islands was not far off.

Bolstered tremendously by the all-conquering American fleet with its great force of airplane carriers which had by this time virtually wiped the Japanese navy from the sea in a saga of battles of which there is little precedent in naval history anywhere, the dual forces of sea and land were moving nearer and nearer the Japanese mainland.

Two major conquests were next, that of Iwo Jima and a little later Okinawa. Meanwhile on July 7, Gen. MacArthur formally announced the liberation of the Philippines. Almost at once huge American forces and supplies began to move into these islands which were to be the main staging area for the all out attack on Japan itself.

### Big Bombers Cause Havoc

Meanwhile tremendous flights of American big bombers had been consistently, and without too much opposition, blasted one Jap industrial area after another virtually off the map.


But the Japs were a tenacious lot. They blithely ignored the Potsdam declaration to surrender at once or suffer terrible consequences.

At this time these consequences were unknown either to the Japs or to the American people.

On August 3, 1945, devastation began. Japan was completely blockaded by the huge American B-29 bombers.

Headlines in Greensburg and other papers began to shout.

### CIVILIAN DEFENSE

Many Greater Greensburg residents voluntarily spent lonely, cold hours at this and similar posts throughout this section.

Wm. Jennings was general chairman of this branch of Civilian Defense and Guy Andrews served as chief instructor.

Three days later the first atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshimo, the worst affliction ever hurled upon an enemy city anywhere.

Three days later Russia declared war on Japan and two days after that, as Japan seemingly made no attempt to end hostilities, another atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki, again creating a virtual hell on earth.

"More are coming", the Jap high command was warned bluntly.

The Japs took the hint and agreed to come to terms.

### Complete World Victory

Incidental events leading to final ceremonies of surrender aboard the USS Missouri occupied our conquering heroes, although the shooting had ceased, until September 1.

September 2 was officially proclaimed Victory over Japan Day by President Truman.

Greensburg shut up shop, celebrated and celebrated, and then took the next day off to recuperate; in fact many folks were so joyous they took several days off.

Meanwhile veterans of the European and Pacific

campaigns had begun the return to civilian life by the hundreds and while many local homes had but a memory of a loved one, many, many more were in ecstasy.

Prayers of thankfulness were offered in all the churches of the city and these services were largely attended.

Immediately upon the heels of the excitement of the closing days of the global war, Greensburg's veterans' organizations, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Disabled American Veterans and the American Legion joined talents to promote an event of significance for the rapidly approaching Armistice Day, official last day of World War I.

### Final Victory Spectacle Here

This day-long series of events was climaxed on the afternoon of November 11, 1945, by what even old-timers declare to be the most lavish, colorful, and spectacular parade of civic, industrial, veterans and other groups ever attracted to the Westmoreland County Seat.

There were thousands in the line of march while actually the city bulged under the throngs of people who came to enjoy the spectacle.

### PRESENTATION OF FLAGS TO MARINE CORPS FAMILY ASSOCIATION



Marine Corps Family Association—"A home front morale builder," formed November 22, 1942 by parents who had sons and daughters serving in the U. S. Marine Corps.

Responsible for starting this group were Gil Vierling, Robert Elder, Ray Hallam and Jim McGrane whose sons were at that time serving in the Solomon Islands.

A consensus of opinion indicated it was the largest crowd ever within the city limits since its founding almost 150 years ago.

It was a fitting exposition to the four long years in which Greensburg had given its all, with the rest of the nation, to keep the enemy from our shores and for the preservation of our American way of life.

From Brig. Gen. Edwin M. Zundel, U.S.A., who is this city's highest ranking officer during this conflict in any branch of the service, to the youths of 18 who left just the other day to begin their training for replacement in our far-flung occupational forces, or our naval watchmen of the seas, the Greater Greensburg area can look backward with pride on the symbol of our pioneering forefathers, that now famous Rattlesnake Flag, which said:

"Don't tread on me."


