

The meeting was called to order by President Gene Rombach and the following were in attendance:

Directors - M. Froberg, C. Stewart, J. Santangelo, G. Ludy, P. Romano, R. E. Tucker, C. Davidson

Minutes of previous meeting read by Ed Witt and accepted.

Treasurer's Report and Related Sheets read by Ed Witt and Accepted. Board discussed and agreed on (1) Add'l Mailing, then if no reply after 30 days after mailing — to drop. Also Witt to present this Saturday A.M. to membership for concurrence.

Discussed status of books, caps and Indexes - Mike Baymor stated it would cost \$9.00 a book in a 100 lot purchase and \$4.70 a book in a 500 lot purchase. We will recommend to Membership to drop the Hatcher Book.

The Secretary to reorder caps as required and the Indexes will not be needed.

The I.O.K. Chapter requested authorization to purchase and sell jewelry at Reunions and to have information put in the B. & F. They will put up all funds needed to purchase and then split profits 50/50 with the National. Ed Witt Motioned and Pete Romano seconded we concur with their proposal – Motion Carried. Bill Smith did not show at Meeting and there is no status on his jewelry sales. Suggest our Secretary follow-up on this later on and I presume he will not sell or reorder any more.

Discussed the assignment of Chapters as back-up for Site Presentations and the following was firmed: 1990 - Florida, 1991 - T.O.K., 1992 - Philadelphia. Presentations from Other Locations will be honored from the floor at the Business Meeting after prior approval the day before by the Board to ascertain adequate personnel to handle a Reunion. The above to be presented at tomorrow's meeting.

The Editor gave his report which gave a due date of Oct. 5th for the November Issue and all Returns will be going to Nate who will correct his listing and then advise the Secretary/Treasurer of returns.

The Historian gave his report and it covered the status of the Hatcher Book which is sold out and the possibility of a new history written by Mike, Mng and Bill SCott. Mike will cover this at tomorrow's Annual Meeting.

President Rombach then discussed the Sales Tax Exempt potential savings to the organization. After a brief discussion it was decided to have the President appoint a Committee of three lawyers to explore this area.

John Santangelo then advised the Officers of next year's Reunion in California. He was contacted Friday A.M. by Marriott people in St. Louis for the possibility of bidding on the site. He talked long distance with the Marriott in Burlingame, Ca. (about 15 miles from San Francisco) and will have teletyped firm figures Saturday A.M. for presentation to the Membership – estimated to be \$55. a room and the 3rd week of August with many complimentary features such as free bus transportation to and from S.F.

The subject of a check list for the new President was discussed and Mag stated that he gave one to Gene and Gene was in turn to do the same for Santangelo.

John Santangelo and one of his officer-candidates stated they have 6 working couples and 18 volunteers available as a work force for their Reunion. He also has been in contact with the 6th Army and the $63 \mathrm{rd}$ Arcom for assistance in their Memorial service.

The Meeting was adjourned at 5:15 P.M.









My father was Wilfred (Bill) J. Lillibridge, PFC. He died when I was only two years old. I have tried on two occasions to get a copy of my father's service record. Each time I was informed that his records were destroyed by fire. He was with the 3266th Ordinance BaseDepot Co.from 9/43 untill 12/44.

I have photographs of my father with a 63rd Inf. Div. patch on his uniform. He probably was assigned to the 63rd, after March 24th, & before April 5, 1945. He was photographed by the Danube near Dillingen on 4/26/45. He was also at Dachau, shortly after it was liberated, as he had lots of photos of this area. He was later assigned to Hqs. Co. of the 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion on 5/25/45, until 9/45 then returned to the states on

1/11/45, (New York City), assigned to C Battery, 398th F.A. If you have any information, please contact me.

One last note of information, my father was 34 yrs. old, 5'7", 130 lbs. Thank you in advance for your help. Fred Lillibridge 920 South-land Lane #213, Brookings, SD 57006.





Wartime memories resurrected

by Georgia Maxwell

Thanksgiving, 1944. Lloyd Mills, a 23-year-old platoon sergeant from Daviess County, landed at Marsailles, France. It was three months after D-Day, 125 days before Germany's surrender.

Mills was attached to the 63rd Infantry Division. Nicknamed the Blood and Fire, they would, according to the Division Commander's journal, be in almost daily contact with the enemy as they crossed France and Germany.

Major General Louis E. Hibbs's account (parts are included here in italics) reads like a wartime newsreel. Added to a Missouri man's personal memoirs, it's more like a novel.

'We were in France about two months before entering German soil," the retired Jamesport farmer said. Reclining in an easy chair, in bib overalls, the memories unfurl. Not of heroic battles or war epics. Just humorous antics of two young Americans nicknamed Zeke and Zeke . . . of writing home to his New England girlfriend of the camaraderie between servicemen.

March 14, 1945-Last month this Division brilliantly forced the crossing of the Saar River and led the Seventh Army onto German soil. Before tomorrow the Seventh Army attacks along the entire front. In the coming

After Heidelberg the German people realized it was all over. Some began to help the Americans by removing the wires of German booby-trapped bridges. One civilian told Mills, "Hitler did more for Germany than anyone we'd ever had. We didn't know he was destroying people to do it."

continued:

prisoners (the ones who were well enough) started streaming out to meet us. There were citizens of every country, even Russians and Mongolians . . . but mostly Jews. I didn't know until then that Hitler had singled them out for extermina-

"It was cold. They had taken burlap sacks and wrapped them around their feet. The stench was horrible."

Mills compares the prisoners looks with the emaciated Third World pictures shown on television. They were skinny, bones protruded, eyes were sunken.

of 'They streamed out Dachau—almost animal-like with relief and emotion. Even affectionate. They would grab us and hug us." The first prisoner he en-countered asked for a cigarette. It was the one English word known all over Europe.

"The front line wasn't there over 30 minutes," he continued. "We didn't even go inside." When they moved on, rear echelon troops guard-

ed the camp. Medics provided food and medicine.

The Red Cross also helped, but were displaced persons there everywhere. Those who were able set out on foot or bicycle, their destinations often countries away.

Nine days before Germany's sur-render, just 15 miles outside Munich, the 63rd was relieved.

Penetration of this Siegfried Line presented the 63rds' heaviest combat. A protective barrier built by Germany on the French border, the line consisted of low, enclosed German gun emplacements of cement and steel. They were surrounded by trenches. Underground kitchens and supply rooms (often running two or three stories deep) provided unlimited supplies. The entire fortress was surrounded by tiger's teeth. These cement facades resembled tombstones and were placed at random to prevent tank penetration.

But penetrate it they did. In a nutshell, Mills said the engineers bombed

The Fuhrer's destruction was everywhere. In addition to the towns. Americans liberated work and concentration camps. They are remembered most for their liberation of the Dachau concentration camp. However, Mills says that's only because it has since been made into a memorial. At the time it was no dif-

May 1, 1945-Blood and Fire, you're getting a break, and a wellearned one, from combat. You've fought across the Saar, through the Siegfried Line and across Germany from the Rhine, through the Odenwald, across the Danube to within sight of the snow-covered Bavarian

Alps. Victory's on the horizon. The 63rd retreated to Mannheim where they received word of Germany's surrender. Mills started

making plans for the future. He wrote his brother back in Missouri to buy an engagement ring and mail it to a little gal in New England.

He would remain billeted in German civilian homes for close to a year. But, with true American ingenuity, he and his best friend, Richard Mercer, alias Zeke and Zeke, made the best of it. Their zany escapades, kept at bay while on the battlefield, now flourished.

"First, we needed some real food," the Missouri Zeke said. "We were tired of rations. We wanted fried chicken." Perched atop an upstairs windowsill, they learned to snare a running rooster on the ground with a hook and wire. When their commanding officer found chicken feathers, the men didn't stop . . . they learned to be more careful.

Eggs presented a greater challenge. You couldn't grab an egg and carry it precariously 30 feet through the air.

But, the German civilians were willing to trade eggs for coffee. "Only trouble was we were greedy. We liked coffee with our eggs. So we'd take used coffee grounds and spread

the surrounding concrete walls. Troops used the German's own tiger's teeth for protection while shelling the German pillboxes.

March 21, 1945-My congratulations, Hot Shots! You broke into and through the Siegfried Line. The Blood and Fire hurtled through the pillboxes and dragon's teeth of the vaunted German defenses, paving the way for the armor to roll north and make the Seventh Army's historic link-up with the Third Ar-

The trek across Germany differed from France. Every few miles Americans encountered a town. German farmers lived together in small villages (about the size of Jamesport) going each morning to their land.

As part of the front line, Mills and his platoon of 40 men were the first into a village. This had advantages. Like homemade bread. He remembers German women made a black bread. It was good. The first soldiers through took loaves right out of the oven

"We were an ornery bunch," he laughs. "We'd take it even if it wasn't done, just to get it first. We'd eat around the edge and throw the doughy center away."

Sometimes it took 30 minutes to secure a town. Sometimes longer, Heidelberg took four days.

"We had a meeting the night before the liberation of Dachau, so they could tell us what to expect,' Mills said. "We learned the Germans knew we were coming. Anyone with any rank had already run.

"When we got within sight, the (Continued on Page 3)

them on paper to dry. Then we'd fluff them up and go door to door to trade for eggs. It worked. Except when we'd forget where we'd been and try a repeat performance.'

The Zekes found three German motorcycles buried under hay in an old barn. They figured they'd been left there when the German Army ran out of gasoline. The cycles were promptly "commandeered in the name of the U.S. government" and the group enjoyed some weekend


They also enjoyed horseback riding. "Horses were tree for the Gering." Mills explained. The Gering." mans had used them to pull artillery pieces after they ran out of gasoline. After the war they were turned

He was still in Germany when the A-bomb (another secret he had no inkling of) was dropped on Japan. World War II was over.

"I was mustered out in March, just in time to plant oats." he said. The first time it rained him out of the field, he headed east to retrieve his New England gal.

They were married and returned to Jamesport in May. By Nov. 12, his first Veterans Day back in the States, he was too busy getting crops out to worry about any special observance.

"Really I just dismissed the war. I didn't want to join VFWs or anything like that I just wanted to farm."

He dwells neither on the hardships nor the heroics. Instead, he chooses to remember the war for the beautiful country, the warm and jolly German people, the humorous camaraderie. A few years ago, he took his New England gal back to see an improved Germany. He was pleased.

Beautiful hillsides were scaped right over the top of buried rubble from World War II. That sight alone was worth his trip. He chose to wait outside as his wife toured the Dachau memorial.

Approaching the 40th Veterans Day since the war to end all wars, Mills figures he'll still be thinking more of his crops than he will of the holiday. He is, however, immensely thankful he's free to do so. We all



REMINISCING

BATTLE FOR JEBSHEIM

by A. A. Brill

[NOTE: A longtime friend of mine recently surprised me by coming up with letters which I had written to him during the latter part of 1944 and early 1945. There follows verbatim excerpts from one dated 8 February 1945.]

In closing up the German pocket in the Colmar sector, my battalion was given the mission of seizing and holding one of the towns in that area. My platoon was to start off the attack. Everything went along smoothly until we came to within one mile of the objective. Then the Germans let loose with everything they had—88's, mortars and artillery. In spite of the pounding, we managed to edge our way forward along ditches and draws.

A little while later, my company commander sent word up to me to hold up my advance because the unit on our right was meeting stiff resistance and could not keep up. I set my men up in abandoned German positions and awaited word to continue the attack. After some time, it appeared that we might be stuck there for the night so I took my platoon sergeant with me to reconnoiter for other positions. By this time, it was dark.

We had not gone more than 35 yards when we came upon six men huddled together behind a snow bank. It was snowing fairly hard so I could not make out who they were. At that time we were not more than 15 yards from the group. I knew that my men had to remove their white camouflage prior to the attack, but I was not certain about the adjacent unit. We saw some other men (also in white) making their way out of the nearby woods. Suddenly, one of them yelled to another in German!

Well, I hit the ground and so did my sergeant--just as the Germans opened up with their burp guns. I managed to toss a hand grenade and cover my platoon sergeant as he scooted on back to warn the rest of the platoon. They continued firing at him but failed to hit him. I took off my gloves and took out another grenade. As I lay there in the snow, I heard a lot of movement in the vicinity. The Germans were all around me.

I just lay there half covered with snow, still gripping the grenade. I had absolutely no idea what to do, knowing damn well that they had to find me there. Well, one German did finally approach. He did not bother with me at all--just called out in German that I was dead. I must have aged twenty years in that moment.

By this time, my platoon opened fire and the heavy machine guns that we had attached did likewise. Soon the tanks that we had in support opened up with their guns. Together, they really fired up a storm. My own fire was ricocheting all around me, but I never felt more relieved in all my life.

Soon the Germans were yelling in confusion and scampering around like mad. The last thing I was able to understand was the German officer yelling in German, "Grab the wounded ones and head back through the woods." I raised up long enough to see one German get hit by our guns. After they were well into the woods, I yelled back to my platoon and they came out to get me. They had practically given me up for lost. I was still shaking when they showed up-partly from the cold and partly from what had just occurred.

We took the town the next day. We had mopped up most of the place except for one part of town where resistance was heavier than anticipated. We did not know it at the time but there was an enormous number of Germans holed up in some solid brick buildings and bunkers out in the field. They had plenty of automatic weapons and ammunition. For one whole day and night we pounded them with small arms and mortar fire. Prisoners started trickling in. Hearing some Germans yelling near a barn close by, I went out to investigate.

A German officer was there asking our men not to shoot. Figuring that the German wanted to surrender with his men, I had my men hold their fire while I spoke to him. As he saw me approach with my carbine in hand, the German got chicken and took off just as one of my men took a shot at him.

He came back again aound the other side of the barn and I again tried to speak to him. He seemed to be afraid that I was going to shoot him so I handed my carbine to one of my men. Going outside the barn, I noticed about twenty Germans nearby. I told them, in my best German, to drop their weapons and put their hands on their heads.

The German officer laughed in my face. It seemed that he wanted to speak to me to ask us to surrender. I turned five shades whiter. As I boited back through the barn door, they started firing at me. I cleared the barn in time because they soon lobbed a bazooka shell in. Their counterattack had begun.

It took all of that day to clean out the town, but when we finally did we accounted for a terrific toll of the enemy-killed, wounded and captured. According to the veteran outfit here, we had really come through our first engagement with flying colors. A week later, we received word that all who participated were awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge.


