FACTUAL HISTORY

Headquarters Detachment, Second Battalion, Fifth Infantry, came into existence as Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, as a result of the reorganization of the National Guard following World War I. It received its present designation May 1, 1940.

As a company, it was organized under the leadership of First Lieutenant John H. E. Legg and Federally recognized

FACTUAL HISTORY

The history of Company E, Fifth Infantry, goes back to the date of the first organization of the regiment in pre-Revolutionary War days. The individual history of the company, however, has been lost in the lapse of time, and the first concrete record available begins in the summer of 1916 when the company was called into Federal service at Eagle Pass, Texas. When the National Guard was mobilized for Federal service in the World War, Company E was consolidated with Company E of the First Infantry.

The company was reorganized and Federally recognized April 11, 1921. From then until the spring of 1927, various officers commanded the unit. Second Lieutenant Daniel M. Muth, now Captain and the present commander, took command in 1927.

Since its organization, the company has enjoyed a reputation for its efficiency in standing in the regiment. It boasts that it has produced more officers from the ranks than any other organization in the regiment. Present officers of the company were all at one time serving as enlisted personnel of the company in various grades.

In addition to being efficient in military line, it has supported some extremely capable athletic teams, winning many of the battalion and regimental track meets, volley ball and baseball championships.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Company F, Fifth Infantry, was organized as an integral part of Smallwood's Regiment of the Maryland Line in 1774-75. It served with distinction in such engagements of the Revolutionary War as Long Island (August 27, 1776), at which time the first bayonet charge of any American army was made by this regiment against Lord Howe's entire army, which was trying to surround and cut off the retreat of the Continental Army of Washington. It participated in 24 major engagements, including Trenton (Christmas, 1776), after crossing the Delaware River the previous night, Princeton, Monmouth, Camden, S. C., Cowpens, Eutaw Springs, and Yorktown. It was discharged November 3, 1783.

Reorganized as part of the regiment in 1787, this company participated in the following engagements in the War of 1812: Blandensburg and North Point, the latter battle proving to be the turning point of the war. This company then returned to peace-time pursuits until the Civil War, when nearly all members of the regiment joined the Confederate Army and organized as part of the First Maryland, C. S. A., participating in 17 engagements, including the battle of Manassas, July 21, 1861.

On May 10, 1867, the company was reorganized as part of the Fifth Infantry, and for the Spanish-American War, 1898, it was stationed at Chickamauga Park, Tampa, Florida, April 25 to October 24, serving the latter half of this tour as headquarters guard to General Simon Snyder, commanding Third Division, Fifth Corps. During the Mexican Border disturbance, it was stationed at Eagle Pass, Texas, from June 16, 1916, until February 24, 1917.

On April 12, 1917, the regiment was called into Federal service to guard the railroad bridges and tunnels in Western Maryland, and in August, it was sent to Anniston, Alabama, where it became Company F, 115th Infantry, 29th Division, and sailed for France in June, 1918. Its major engagements in France included Haute Alsace and the Meuse-Argonne. In the latter battle, it participated in such local engagements as Malbrouch Farm, Bois de Consonvoye, Richine Hill, Bois de la Grande Montagne, Bois d'Ormont, Malleville Farm and Bois d'Etray, covering itself with glory.

Reorganized following the World War, the unit received its present designation: Company F, Fifth Infantry. Upholding the best traditions of the regiment and showing preeminence in several fields, this company has recently won the regimental championship in softball and the battalion trophy for the greatest number of rifle qualifications.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Claiming with just pride a share in the rich military heritage of the Fifth Regiment, Company G exemplifies today the true spirit of the National Guard. It is a company of ambitious and intelligent young Americans willing to obey and anxious to serve. For lack of space, its historical background will not be recorded here. It will suffice to recall that it is an important part of an entity, the Fifth Regiment, whose glorious past is retold elsewhere in this volume, a past in which this unit has always played a leading role.

Company G acknowledges no superior. Its morale is of the highest order. It has led all units of the regiment in attendance for the past two years. For the month of

March, 1940, it had an average drill attendance of 94.24 per cent, an excellent record for a company of almost 100 men scattered over a vast metropolitan area. At its recent Federal inspection it had a perfect attendance with 98 men answering roll call. At the last regimental parade, it was awarded the coveted Howell Thomas Efficiency Trophy for the past year. This trophy is presented annually to the company of the regiment showing the greatest effectiveness in training and drilling throughout the year. In February, 1940, its team won the right to represent the regiment in the finals of the William Randolph Hearst Musketry Competition, which is held annually under the regulations of the National Guard Bureau. In athletics, its teams compare with the best.

When in September, 1939, President Roosevelt declared a state of "Limited Emergency," the National Guard was authorized to increase its strength. Company G has been the only combat company in the regiment to meet this emergency, and regulations limiting a greater increase is the only bar to its further growth.

FACTUAL HISTORY

The history of Company H dates back to 1774 when it was one of the companies of the Fifth Infantry. From then on to World War I, the history is that of the regiment. With the outbreak of war in 1917, it was merged with Company L and mustered into the 115th Infantry. Two members of the company, Second Lieutenant Patrick Regan and Corporal Henry G. Costin, were awarded the Congressional Medal for meritorious conduct during the war. In addition to this, nine Distinguished Service Crosses and nine Croix de Guerre were awarded other members of the company.

The regiment is now in possession of the Congress-

sional Medal given to the widow of Private Costin, and a memorial has been erected in his honor at the Regimental Armory, Baltimore.

During the World War, Company H was commanded by Captains Walter E. Black, Thomas G. McNicholas and Frank C. Mellon. Among the commanders, prior to the war, were Captain Abbott Holmes and Captain Brandt.

For the past 13 years, the company has been commanded by William L. Kopp, its present commander. Prior to and subsequent to the World War, it was commanded by the following officers, in the order named: Captains Trout, Lutz, McAdams, Terry and Leitch.

Up to and during the World War, Company H was a rifle unit. After the war, it was reorganized as a machine gun company of the Second Battalion and Federally recognized January 22, 1922.

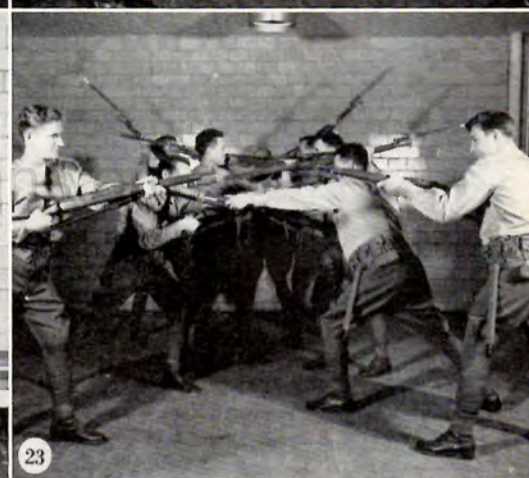

FACTUAL HISTORY

Members of the organization from which Company I, Fifth Infantry, is descended were equally divided between the forces of the North and South during the Civil War. Reorganized after the war and placed in the Second Battalion in 1867, the company saw its next active engagement during the Frostburg strike in 1894, followed by service, under Captain Goldsborough, in the Spanish-American War and during the Baltimore fire in 1904.

Captain B. Carter commanded the unit during its active service on the Mexican Border. As part of the 115th Infantry during the World War, the company was commanded by Captain Amos W. Woodcock, now Brigadier General, commanding the 58th Brigade.

One of the first to reorganize following the war, the company was Federally recognized in June, 1920, under Captain E. McK. Johnson, now Lieutenant Colonel on the State staff.

In November, 1934, the company saw more service in the field during the Salisbury riot under Captain C. L. Claypoole, now commanding the Third Battalion, Fifth Infantry, as a Major. He commanded the company from January, 1923, to July 31, 1939.

For 12 out of 15 years, the company has had the largest number of riflemen to qualify in the regiment. It has won the battalion baseball championship six times since 1925, and it has also been acclaimed regimental volley ball champions three times.

The company has always been noted for its family enlistments. At one time, there were three fathers and six sons. There were also 12 sets of brothers.

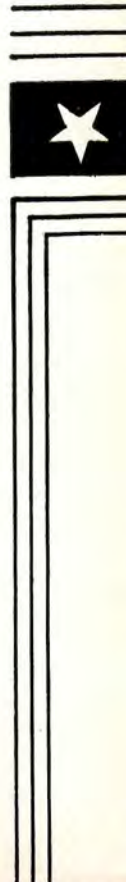
An interesting situation came to light when Captain Claypoole and First Lieutenant Allan L. Feldman (now Captain and Company Commander) were Company Commander and Second in Command, respectively. An old company record was discovered showing that Lieutenant Feldman's father was First Sergeant and that Captain Claypoole's uncle was company bugler in 1898. The company has turned out a Lieutenant Colonel, two Majors and two Captains.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Tradition to a military organization is an important factor in the creation of that intangible element termed "esprit de corps," which gives character to the unit through the example of military courage and devotion set by those who have gone before in the service. The Fifth Infantry, representing an organization with a history of loyal and valiant service dating back to Revolutionary times, has in full measure its glorious traditions. Under its present designation, the regiment dates back to 1867, but through its kinship with military organizations with histories extending back to the service with the Continental Army, the Fifth Infantry claims its origin in "The Maryland Line," which so distinguished itself under Washington.

During the Civil War, sympathies of Maryland citizens were greatly divided and the militia units were to all intents disbanded. After the war, several prominent Baltimore citizens issued a call to organize a regiment of infantry. At a meeting, May 10, 1867, it was decided to organize a regiment with 10 companies, lettered from A to K, inclusive, but excluding J. Thus, it is seen that Company K is one of the original companies of the regiment as now constituted. From 1867 to 1898, Company K participated in many and varied activities in Baltimore and Maryland.

Inducted into Federal service for the Spanish-American War, the Fifth Infantry did not see active service but trained at Tampa, Florida. Upon their return to Baltimore, the men returned to the normal life of the community but continued their training as citizen soldiers. On

June 18, 1916, the Fifth Regiment was mobilized for Mexican Border service at Laurel, Maryland, from where it entrained for the border on July 5, 1916, for patrol activities, serving until February 24, 1917.

Recalled to Federal service on April 13, 1917, for the World War, Company K guarded important public utilities, such as railroads, waterworks, etc., until August 15, 1917, when it was mobilized at Cockeysville, Maryland, from where it entrained on September 16, 1917, for Camp McClellan, Alabama. On September 15, 1917, the Fifth Infantry, with major portions of the First and Fourth Maryland Infantry, formed the 115th Infantry. Officers and men of Company K, Fifth Infantry, with officers and men of other units, formed Company K, 115th Infantry.

Engaged in training at McClellan until June 9, 1918, the 115th Infantry then left for France, sailing from New York June 15 and landing at Brest, France, June 27. The Third Battalion (including Company K) was the first unit of the regiment to enter the front line, doing so the night of July 27-28, 1918. On July 31, 1918, a raiding party of Germans attacked Company K, the first unit of the 29th Division so engaged. This raid was gallantly repulsed, and for their heroism, two of the old members of Company K, Sergeant John H. E. Hoppe and Private Andy Youngbar, were decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross, the first soldiers of the Division so honored. The Third

FACTUAL HISTORY

Company L, Fifth Infantry, was first organized in 1892, with Captain Benjamin Frank Boyden in command. The unit served during the mine strikes at Frostburg, Maryland, June 5-23, 1894, under the command of Captain Boyden, who resigned on July 8, 1898. Mustered into Federal service on May 14, 1898, for duty in the Spanish-American War, the company served until its muster out on October 11, 1898. During this period, on July 8, 1898, command was received by Captain Washington Bowie, Jr., who later became Regimental Commander, then commander of the 58th Brigade.

In 1899, the command of the unit passed to Captain Jesse Slingluff, who was succeeded in 1908 by Captain William Spear Brownlie. In February, 1904, the company was on guard duty following the Baltimore fire. Succeeding Captain Brownlie was Captain Howell B. Thomas, who commanded the company on the Mexican Border from June 18, 1916, to February 24, 1917, the company being stationed at Eagle Pass, Texas.

On April 13, 1917, the company was mustered into Fed-

eral service for the World War. On September 30, 1917, while in training at Camp McClellan, it was combined with Company H of this regiment to form Company H, 115th Infantry, serving throughout the war as such, under the command of Captains Walter E. Black, Thomas G. McNicholas, and Frank C. Mellon. Four members of the original Company L, Fifth Regiment, were decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross and two received Divisional Citations. The company was mustered out in June, 1919.

Reorganized through the efforts of Captain Walter Singer, the company was Federally recognized on July 28, 1924. In 1926, command of the unit passed to Captain William T. Terry, who was succeeded in 1927 by Captain John F. Houck. From 1929 to 1938, the company was commanded by Captain William C. Baxter, under whose leadership the unit performed in a most efficient manner at Salisbury, Maryland, during the civil disturbance encountered during the tour of duty assigned the Third Battalion on order of the late Governor Albert C. Ritchie.

The present company commander, Captain Hiram D. Ives, succeeded Captain Baxter on March 2, 1938.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Company M, Fifth Infantry, was organized May 10, 1892, under the command of First Lieutenant Thomas Whitridge.

Under Captain George L. Deichman, the company was on duty at the Frostburg coal miners' strike June 5-23, 1894. During the Spanish-American War, Company M was at Camp Wilmer, Maryland; Camp Thomas at Chickamauga, Georgia; Camp Old Garrison, Tampa, Florida, and Camp Wheeler, Huntsville, Alabama. It returned to Baltimore September 5, 1898.

To prevent the lynching of three negroes in 1913,

Company M was sent as a part of the Third Battalion to Chestertown, Maryland. The unit was mobilized for Mexican Border service June 19, 1916, returning to Baltimore February 20, 1917. It was called into Federal service for World War I April 13, 1917, under Captain James G. Knight. In October, 1917, it was made a part of Company M, 115th Infantry, and went overseas six months later. It was mustered out of service in April, 1919.

In March, 1921, Lieutenant Christian L. Claypoole was ordered to reorganize Company M as a machine gun unit, and he secured 11 recruits by June. Captain M. A. Pallette was placed in command, and by August the company had obtained 52 recruits. It was Federally recognized September 21, 1921.

On May 1, 1940, complying with new tables of organization, Company M was made a heavy weapons company. Its members must now not only know the .30 calibre machine gun, but also the .50 calibre machine gun and the 81-mm mortar.

54TH FIELD ARTILLERY BRIGADE

Early in 1931, a portion of the Headquarters of the 54th Field Artillery Brigade was allocated to Maryland, and on July 10, Federal recognition was given to J. Craig McLanahan of Baltimore, then Colonel of the 110th Field Artillery, as Brigadier General in command of that brigade.

The units of the 54th Field Artillery Brigade are the 110th Field Artillery (75's) of Pikesville, Maryland; the 111th Field Artillery (75's) of Virginia, and the 176th Field Artillery (155's) of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

General McLanahan commanded the brigade until his retirement in December, 1938, which was occasioned by his election to the Supreme Bench of Baltimore. Throughout

this period, Major Henry F. Duer of Baltimore served as Executive Officer of the brigade.

After General McLanahan's retirement, the command of the brigade was allocated to Virginia; and William H. Sands of Norfolk, then Colonel of the 111th Field Artillery, was elevated to the rank of Brigadier General and given command of the brigade.

Lieutenant Colonel Thomas J. Shryock, who is now the Executive Officer of the brigade, together with First Lieutenant Richard C. Hoffman, III, S-4, and First Lieutenant Thomas G. Young, Jr., S-2, all of Baltimore, now make up the Maryland section of the 54th Field Artillery Headquarters.

110TH FIELD ARTILLERY



The 110th Field Artillery, the only artillery unit in the Maryland National Guard, dates indirectly from the organization of Battery A, Maryland Field Artillery, in December, 1915. More directly, it dates to the beginning of the World War, when its designation was changed from the 112th Field Artillery.

Prior to this change, however, the unit was called into Federal service in June, 1916, training at Laurel, Maryland, and Tobyhanna, Pennsylvania, under Captain William Fell Johnson. Mustered out in October, Battery A continued to drill at Pikesville, Maryland, until May, 1917, when it was expanded into a battalion composed of Batteries A, B and C. This new battalion was then ordered to Camp McClellan, Anniston, Alabama, where it was combined with other units to form the 112th Field Artillery, 54th Field Artillery Brigade, 29th Division. In November of that year, the designation was changed to the present 110th Field Artillery Regiment, recognized after the World War.

As originally organized at Camp McClellan, the regiment was formed from various units: Battery A, from Batteries A and B, District of Columbia Field Artillery; Battery B, from Troops A and B, District of Columbia Cavalry; Battery C, from Troops C and D, District of Columbia Cavalry, and Batteries D, E and F from Batteries A, B and C, Maryland Field Artillery. The Headquarters and Supply Companies were formed from headquarters and supply units of the Fifth Maryland Infantry, and a large number of men were transferred from the Fourth Maryland Infantry to different units of the new regiment.

Colonel Washington Bowie, Jr., an infantry officer of long service and experience and just graduated with distinction from the School of Fire, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, was the first of the regiment's three commanders to date. Second in command of the regiment from its training period at Camp McClellan to the end of the war were Lieutenant Colonels James A. Ellison, Ned B. Rehkopf, Claude E. Lanterman, and Charles B. Blunt. The First Battalion was commanded throughout the war by Major Leroy W.

Herron. The Second Battalion had three commanders: Majors J. Newman Numsen, Louis C. Vogt, and Andrew Hunter Boyd.

On June 18, 1918, after a little more than eight months of training at Camp McClellan, the regiment was ordered to Camp Mills, New York, then to Baltimore and Halifax for embarkation for overseas. At the time of departure, 601 Maryland officers and men were numbered among the 1,499 in the regiment.

Once overseas, the regiment was sent to a preliminary training area near Poitiers, France, where the French 75 mm., still standard with the regiment, was first presented. Intensive training lasted about a month at Camp de Meucon and, in the second week of October, the regiment prepared to move into combat positions. Lack of transportation, however, prevented departure for the front, and the Armistice had already been signed when it finally arrived at Liffol-le-Grand in the battle area.

Remaining in various billeting areas until April, 1919, the regiment returned home, reaching Newport News May 20, 1919. It proceeded to Camp Meade, Maryland, where it was demobilized on June 2, 1919.

Preparations for reorganization were begun in 1920, with Major Leroy Herron assigned to command. Original plans allotted the First Battalion to Maryland and the Second Battalion to the District of Columbia. By 1923, both battalions were allocated to Maryland and the present regiment, short of its special units, came into being. Colonel J. Craig McLanahan, who had served as Lieutenant in Captain Johnson's original Battery A, became Regimental Commander. The First Battalion has been commanded by Majors Beverly Ober, Herbert F. Traut, John McC. Mowbray, and Carl W. Schmidt, from 1923 to 1939. The present commander, Major Samuel S. Murray, succeeded to the command on the death of Major Schmidt. The Second Battalion was first commanded by Major Thomas J. Shryock, who was subsequently promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and Regimental Executive. On Major Shryock's promotion, Major Matthew C. Fenton was assigned to the Second Battalion, which he still commands.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Headquarters Battery, 110th Field Artillery, was Federally recognized June 28, 1929. Wm. J. McWilliams, who had served in the First Infantry and Headquarters Company, 58th Brigade, recruited the original personnel mainly from Loyola High School alumni and became the first Captain. From the first, the battery has been noted for the quality of its personnel and training, as evidenced by the regimental officers and efficient non-com's it has produced.

In 1930, the battery was sent to Camp Meade for the Third Corps CPX, while the remainder of the regiment went to Tobyhanna for firing. It did itself proud and learned many valuable lessons. In those days, percentage ratings were made on Federal inspections and the highest rating in the regiment was won by this unit in 1932. A competition for the best interior guard tour was won at Indiantown in 1934.

Following Captain McWilliams' moving to Annapolis in 1934, H. H. Walker Lewis, battery Lieutenant since its organization, became Captain. The battery was building up its knowledge and efficiency, and during this period when mass maneuvers were coming to the fore, this background was invaluable. When Captain Lewis' business duties became too pressing in 1937, he was succeeded by Captain John P. Cooper, Jr., present commander, who had joined the battery as a private in 1929.

With a fine attendance record, the battery has been noted for the long and faithful service of its members. One original member, Master Sergeant Edwin E. Winterling, remains in the unit. Another, Captain John F. deV. Patrick, commands Headquarters Battery, Second Battalion, and another, Master Sergeant Stephen V. L. Ragno, left only recently because of removal from Maryland.

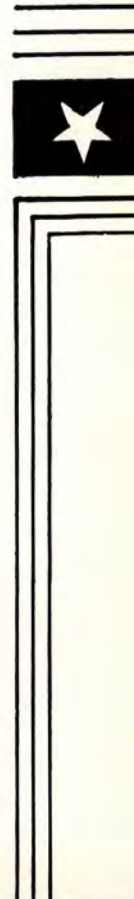
As the "tie that binds" the regiment together, Headquarters Battery will ever uphold the regimental motto, "Sicut Quercus"—"As the Oaks."

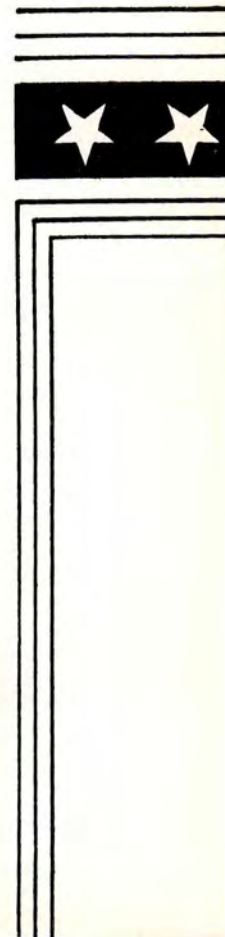

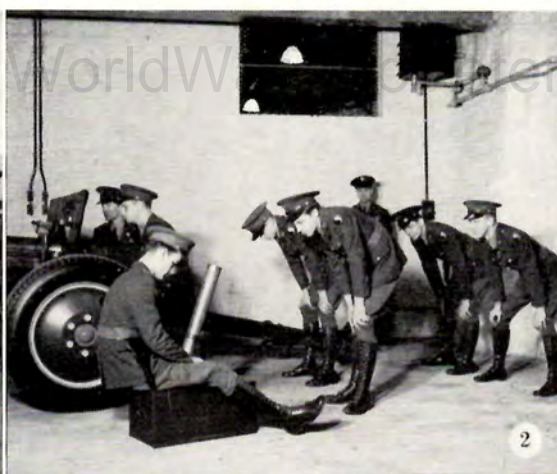

FACTUAL HISTORY

The original Battery A, from which the present 110th Field Artillery developed, came into existence December 29, 1915. The war in Europe had then been going on for more than a year and the United States was gradually waking up to its utter lack of preparedness. Some of the younger professional and business men of Maryland, with a desire to fit themselves to serve their country in time of need, if the occasion should arise, proceeded to form Battery A on December 29, 1915. From the original Battery A personnel of 126 men, 123 were commissioned and three made non-commissioned officers after the United States entered the World War.

When it was decided to establish the 110th Field Artillery at Pikesville, Battery A was reorganized in May, 1923, and Federally recognized July 18, 1923, at

which time it had four officers and 63 enlisted men, commanded by Captain Everett L. Warner. Transferred to the regimental staff on June 1, 1928, Captain Warner was succeeded by Captain William A. Brown, who has been in command since that time.

Always noted for the high type of its enlisted personnel, Battery A, since its reorganization in 1923, has had 29 of its members commissioned in the Regular Army, Marine Corps, National Guard and the United States Coast Guard. Several of its present members are taking R. O. T. C. courses at various colleges, and one member entered West Point last year.

As can be attested by the number of cups and honors bestowed on it, Battery A has always been out in front in all regimental activities because of the high degree of morale and the esprit de corps of its members.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery B, 110th Field Artillery, was first organized August 8, 1923, as the Service Battery. Its present designation came January 31, 1924, under the command of Captain Malcolm Keech.

Several years later the command passed to Captain John W. O'Brien who remained in command until February, 1932, when Captain George Gillett, who had served with the First Division in France, assumed command of the battery. Upon Captain Gillett's resignation in February, 1940, Captain David G. McIntosh, III, became commander.

During the 16 years of the unit's existence as a firing battery, a high degree of efficiency has been maintained. The battery has always been a close contender in regimental competitions.

From the time of its formation, the battery has always had personnel of the highest calibre, as evidenced by the number of officers commissioned from its ranks. Among the more recent of these are First Lieutenant Roy H. Ritter, now serving with the battery; First Lieutenant Dallas H. Smith, now on the Regimental Staff; Second Lieutenant William E. Gunther, now in First Battalion Headquarters Battery; Second Lieutenant Thomas Cadwalader, now Motor Officer in Battery C; Second Lieutenant G. Warfield Evans, now in Battery A; Second Lieutenant Kremel, now attached to the Sixth Field Artillery Reserve, and Second Lieutenant Robert Snibbe.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Originally recognized as Battery C, Field Artillery, July 24, 1917, this unit was drafted into Federal service for the World War on August 5, 1917, and reorganized as Battery C, 110th Field Artillery. Demobilized after the World War, it was recognized as Headquarters Detachment and Combat Train, Second Battalion, 110th Field Artillery, July 18, 1923, then redesignated Battery C, 110th Field Artillery, January 29, 1925.

Initially organized by the present regimental executive, then Captain Henry C. Evans, Battery C was commanded by Captain Edward L. Kinder, who has been succeeded in order by the following commanders: Captain Herbert F. Traut, First Lieutenant Alonzo M. Horn, Captain Paul H. England, Captain Edward L. Rich, Captain H. Ridgley Warfield and the present commander, Captain John

G. Eggen, who took command in 1939. The unit is now officered entirely by men who enlisted in the ranks of the regiment and won their commissions from the ranks.

In the short period of its history, the battery has made a creditable record and has won many trophies for gun-section drill. In the period of horse transport, the battery was especially proficient in team drill and mounted wrestling and won many trophies in regimental competitions. It has regularly won regimental recognition for proficiency in training and has never failed of satisfactory rating in the annual Federal inspections. More than 60 per cent of its personnel have qualification ratings, and a goodly number of the officers and men have earned 10- and 15-year State Service Medals.

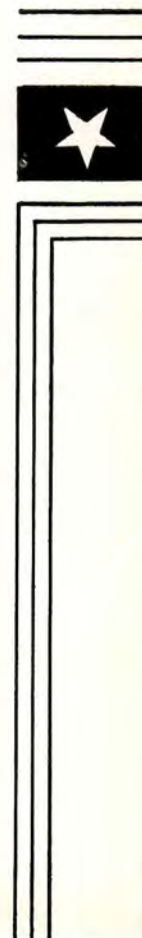

FACTUAL HISTORY

On December 29, 1915, with the World War raging in Europe, Battery A, Maryland Field Artillery, was organized by several men who had attended an artillery course at Plattsburg. Commanded by Captain William Fell Johnson, it held weekly drills at the Howard Street Armory in Baltimore.

Called into Federal service for possible Mexican Border duty, it trained at Laurel, Maryland, and Tobyhanna, Pennsylvania, until October 7, 1916, when it was mustered out and returned to Baltimore. Drills were soon resumed at Pikesville in the State Armory, formerly used by Troop A, Maryland National Guard.

As a horse-drawn unit commanded by Captain J. Craig McLanahan, Battery A was again mustered into Federal service on July 25, 1917. Ordered to Camp McClellan,

Anniston, Alabama, it was redesignated Battery A, 112th Light Field Artillery, and shortly after changed to Battery D, 110th Field Artillery, 54th Field Artillery Brigade. Sailing for France as part of the 29th Division on June 27, 1917, it served until May, 1919, when it returned to the United States and was mustered out in June, 1919.

Reorganized and commanded by Captain Blanchard Randall, Jr., Battery A, Maryland Field Artillery, was Federally recognized April 4, 1921, with weekly drills at the Pikesville Armory. Many officers and men of the old battery rejoined the unit. Since then, field training has been held at Saunders Range, Maryland, 1921; Tobyhanna, Pennsylvania, 1922 through 1932; Camp Ritchie, Maryland, 1933, and since then, with a few exceptions for division concentrations, at Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania.

Battery A was redesignated Battery D, 110th Field Artillery, 54th Field Artillery Brigade, January 10, 1922. It was changed from horse-drawn to truck-drawn in 1935.

Besides Captain Johnson and Captain McLanahan, the unit has been commanded by Captains J. Morrison Harris (during part of its World War service), Blanchard Randall, Jr., Matthew C. Fenton, Jr., Harry Wehr, Robertson B. McGruder and C. Ridgely Howard, present commander.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Upon the entrance of the United States into the World War, authorization was granted to expand Battery A, Field Artillery, Maryland National Guard, into a battalion. After a period of recruiting, this unit was first formed as Battery B, commanded by Captain Gustavus Ober, Jr., on July 25, 1917. It was shortly afterwards changed to Battery E, 112th Field Artillery, as soon as the regiment was organized, and then to Battery E, 110th Field Artillery.

During the World War, Battery E spent two consecutive months at Pikesville, Maryland; nine months at Camp McClellan, Anniston, Alabama, and three months at Meucun, France. The Armistice caught the battery en route to the front lines, and had the war

lasted a few days longer, it would undoubtedly have seen actual service.

Proudest honor of Battery E during this period was the order that directed it to be the first in the front line of the 54th Field Artillery Brigade and the first to fire at the enemy. Battery E received this honor because it had had the highest average in brigade gun tests. After the Armistice, six months were spent at Ormoy, France. After returning to Pikesville, the battery was mustered out of service on June 2, 1919.

Since June 30, 1921, Battery E has been taking its part in the National Guard activities of the regiment. Nearly all former battery commanders and officers are active in the National Guard, including Colonel Ober, Lieutenant Colonel Shryock, Captains Keech and Foley and Lieutenant Uhler.

FACTUAL HISTORY

The history of Battery F begins with the entrance of the United States into the World War. When old Troop A, Maryland Guard, was reorganized and expanded into a Field Artillery battalion, the Third Battery, commanded by Captain Boyd, was designated Battery C and mustered into Federal service August 5, 1917. When the battalion became part of the 54th Field Artillery Brigade, 29th Division, it became the Second Battalion, 112th Field Artillery, later designated the 110th Field Artillery. This unit became Battery F.

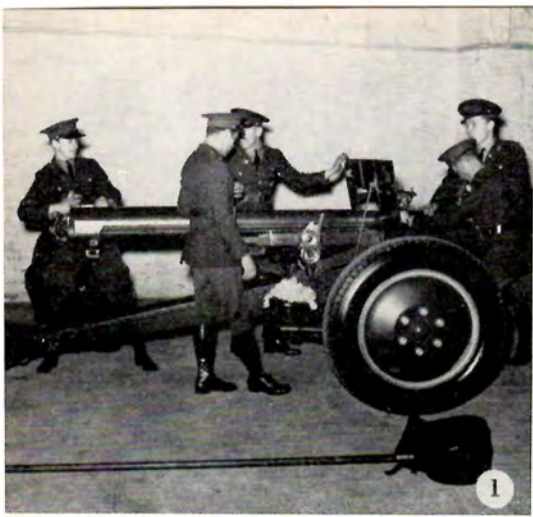
It trained at Camp McClellan, Anniston, Alabama, from September 18, 1917, to June 18, 1918. A series of moves sent the battery to Camp Mills, Long Island, then back to Baltimore, from where it sailed, June 28, for France via Liverpool on the transport, "The Keemun." After touching at Halifax, the boat proceeded to Liverpool in convoy, encountering one submarine attack on the way. Disembarking at Liverpool July 15, it moved across England and crossed the channel on the night of July 16.

Cherbourg and Poitiers were stops on the road to Vouille,

where the battery remained until August 25. During this period an interesting battery newspaper, known as "The Mustard Roll," began publication. The French Artillery camp of Meucon kept the battery in training and outfitting for the front until November 9, when it was ordered forward, spurred on by a brigade citation from the camp commander. While the outfit was on its way to the front, the war ended.

During the six-month period before its return to the United States, the battery participated in several maneuvers and competitions, a section from Battery F winning its way to the final competition of the entire First Army. Returning on the transport "Orziba," it was mustered out at Camp Meade, June 2, 1919. A very fine history of the battery during its war service has been published in book form by Russell Lord, a member of the battery.

When the regiment was reformed in 1921-22 as a National Guard unit, Battery F was the third battery to be formed. Since then, it has been a training ground for many of the officers of the regiment.



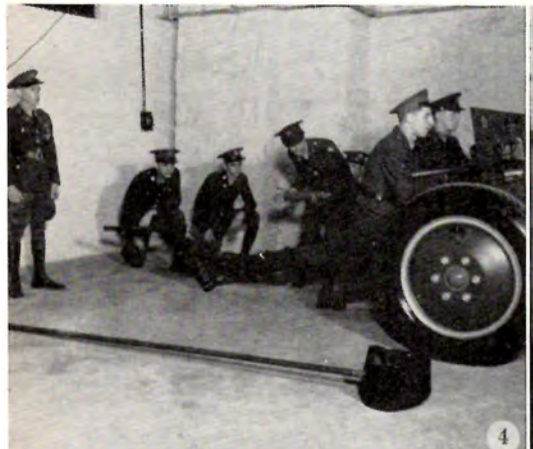

Early in 1921, a group of fliers who had seen active service overseas, as well as those who flew within the limits of the United States, gathered together to form a reserve unit. What they started was the forerunner of the 104th Observation Squadron.

Being close to Washington, D. C., geographically, the group was able to obtain the use of several J-N 4 H's, and each Saturday it met at Dundalk, Maryland, for flight training. When the National Defense Act was passed, authorizing the formation of air squadrons, Maryland was one of the first states to request the allocation of an air unit.

Six men—Major George L. Jones, Captains John A. Hamilton, Paul V. Burwell and William D. Tipton, and First Lieutenants Harold W. Hinds and Charles A. Masson—met with state authorities during April, 1921, and were authorized to form a squadron. Within two months, officers had been selected and recruits enlisted. And at 8 p. m., June 29, 1921, a rather heterogeneous group of men—equipped and otherwise—raised their hands to take the oath of office. The squadron received Federal recognition the same day.

With several war-time Besseneau hangars and a flight of Curtiss Jennies obtained from the Air Corps at Bolling Field, the squadron drilled at Logan Field each Saturday during the summer following the recognition. During the winter months, the unit

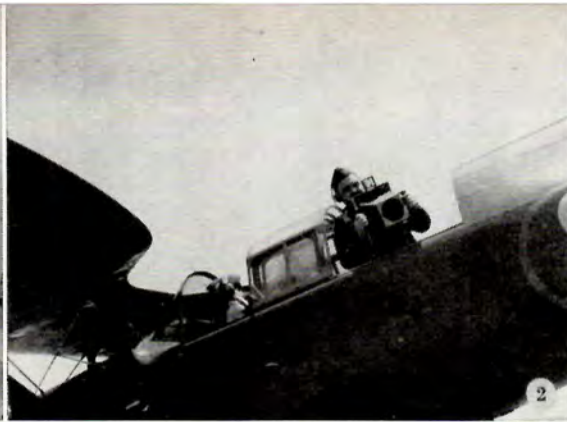

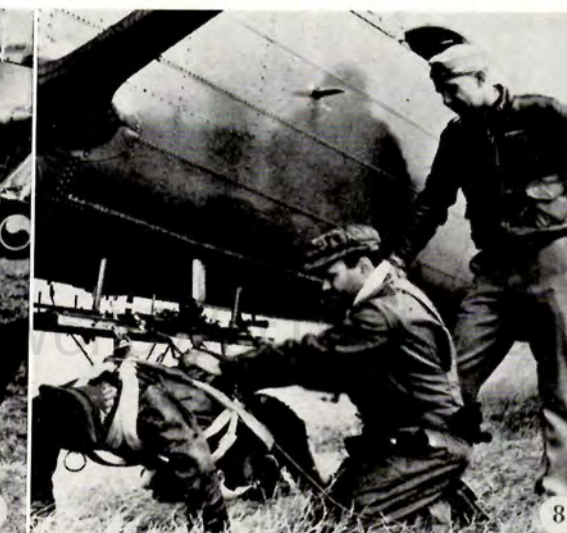

104TH MEDICAL REGIMENT



The need of a fully developed Medical Corps as a recognized unit of the Maryland National Guard had its first realization in November, 1909, when Company A, Hospital Corps, was formed by the transfer of enlisted men of the Hospital Corps Detachments of the First, Fourth, and Fifth Infantries. The Chief Surgeon was to assign the necessary medical officers. On April 6, 1913, Field Hospital Company No. 1, commanded by Captain Howard Ashbury, was organized at Baltimore by the transfer of officers and enlisted men of Company A, Hospital Corps, Maryland National Guard. Ambulance Company No. 1 was organized April 6, 1915, commanded by Captain John C. Stansbury.

These companies served on the Mexican Border from June 29, 1916, to January 1, 1917, being mustered out on January 6, 1917. Both companies, on July 25, 1917, were mobilized at their home stations, then mustered into Federal service August 5, 1917. They were sent to Camp McClellan, Anniston, Alabama, for training, and there, they became the 113th Hospital Company and 113th Ambulance Company of the newly organized 104th Sanitary Train, 29th Division.

On June 21, 1918, they left Camp McClellan on the first stage of the trip to the front. Leaving New York on the Aquitania, July 4, 1918, the Train landed in Liverpool July 12 and was marched from the boat to trains, which carried them to Camp Morn Hill, Winchester, for a short period of time before entraining for Southampton. After going by ship to Cherbourg, France, and spending a few days of rest in an English camp, they left for Alsace by way of Belfort. In Alsace, they evacuated the wounded of the 29th Division from the center sector, Haute-Alsace. On September 23, 1918, they left Alsace for Conde-Vernois. Six days later, they were ordered to Verdun, and by successive marches arrived in Gloriux, just outside Verdun, October 4, 1918. Here, the entire Division was transferred from the Fifth American Corps to the 17th French Corps, with whom the 104th Sanitary Train operated throughout the Meuse-Argonne offensive. They entered this offensive on October 8, 1918, and were relieved

on October 30, 1918. While in action, the 104th Sanitary Train participated in the following battles: Bois de Chaume, Bois Plat Chene, Molleville Farm, Bois de la Reine, Bois d'Ormont, Grande Montagne, Ridge e'Etraye.

After the Armistice, the Train was billeted in different parts of France, was ordered home in April, 1919, landed in New York, May 29, 1919, and was mustered out at Camp Meade, Maryland, in June, 1919.

The Adjutant General of Maryland felt that the name and legends of a unit which had made so worthy a contribution to the winning of the war by its distinguished service should be perpetuated, so, on November 26, 1920, the following officers were commissioned to reorganize the medical units allotted to the National Guard of Maryland, to be designated as the Medical Regiment, Maryland National Guard: Lieutenant Colonel Frederick H. Vinup, M. C., commanding; Major Franklin B. Anderson, M. C.; Major Erasmus Kloman, M. C.; Captain William Daniels, M. C.; Captain Herbert M. Foster, M. C.; Captain John C. Stansbury, M. C.; Captain John Vinton Clift, M. C.; Captain H. W. Wheaton, M. C.; Captain William H. Triplett, M. C.; and First Lieutenant John A. Buchness, M. C.

Authority was granted for the following units in the order in which they are named: Hospital Company No. 1, April 12, 1921, Major Erasmus Kloman, M. C., commanding; Ambulance Company No. 1, June 6, 1921, Captain Herbert M. Foster, M. C., commanding; Sanitary Company No. 1, September 20, 1921, Captain John C. Stansbury, M. C., commanding, and Medical Laboratory Section, organized November 17, 1921, Captain Franklin C. Eleder, M. C., commanding.

These units duly received Federal recognition, and on January 10, 1922, the numerical designation of the regiment was changed to the 104th Medical Regiment, Maryland National Guard. At the same time, the numerical designation of the companies were changed from No. 1 to No. 113, thus memorializing the 104th Sanitary Train and the units of which it was composed, this being the only organ-

FACTUAL HISTORY

FACTUAL HISTORY

Company A, 104th Medical Regiment, was Federally recognized in Baltimore on September 30, 1921, as the 113th Sanitary Company, commanded by Captain John C. Stansbury, M. C., who was succeeded by Captain John Vinton Clift, M. C. Captain Roscoe Z. G. Cross, M. C., took command in 1923. Captain George G. E. Cross, M. C., was assigned as junior officer in 1923. Shortly thereafter, the unit was designated 113th Collecting Company. In 1926, Captain Cross, transferred to the 113th Hospital Company, was succeeded by Captain George G. E. Cross. Captain Elmer E. Phipps, M. A. C., then Second Lieutenant, Ordnance Department, was attached.

In 1929, it was decided to place a National Guard company in Towson, Maryland, and the above officers were designated to recruit it. Sixty men were soon recruited, and the men of the old company were transferred to the other units of the 104th Medical Regiment and intensive training was given the new men.

Redesignated Company C, the unit has made an enviable athletic record, winning numerous trophies. The unit re-

ceived a "Superior" rating on Federal inspection in 1935, 1936, 1937, and 1938, and has received satisfactory rating in all annual armory inspections. As recognition of this feat, the Governor of the State and the Adjutant General, Maryland National Guard, awarded the unit a special trophy.

On January 1, 1935, Captain John F. Aubrey, M. C., was assigned as junior officer. On December 1, 1939, the unit was redesignated Company A. On February 1, 1940, Captain George G. E. Cross was promoted to Major, M. C., Captain Elmer E. Phipps was relieved and transferred to Headquarters and Service Company, and Captain John F. Aubrey assumed command of the unit. First Lieutenant Donald D. Cooper, M. C., is junior officer.

The non-commissioned officers average more than eight years of service, and the unit takes pride in the number of men who hold ratings. The company has participated in all annual periods of field training, including the First Army Maneuvers, Manassas, Virginia, 1939. Since 1933, this company has occupied a specially designed and constructed armory at Towson, being the latest building erected in Maryland for the National Guard.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Company E, 104th Medical Regiment, was first organized as Ambulance Company No. 1 at Baltimore on April 23, 1915, Captain John C. Stansbury commanding. It was mobilized at Baltimore on June 21, 1916, and served on the Mexican Border at Eagle Pass, Texas, from June 29 to December 24, 1916, being mustered out of Federal service on January 6, 1917.

Mobilized for World War service as Ambulance Company No. 1 on July 25, 1917, it proceeded to Camp McClellan, Alabama, where it was redesignated 113th Ambulance Company and incorporated in the Ambulance section of the 104th Sanitary Train, 29th Division, on October 10, 1917. After a period training with

the Division, it proceeded to France with the 104th Sanitary Train. This unit served with distinction in the combat zones of the 29th Division. It had the reputation of establishing and operating an ambulance dressing station in the Bois de Consevoye closer to the source of casualties than any other ambulance unit in the A. E. F. It participated in two major engagements with the Division in France, the Defensive Sector and the Meuse-Argonne offensive.

After the World War, this unit was reorganized as Ambulance Company No. 1, 104th Medical Regiment, and was Federally recognized on May 31, 1921. It was redesignated Ambulance Company No. 113, 104th Medical Regiment, on January 10, 1922. It was designated Company F, 104th Medical Regiment, January 1, 1937, and redesignated Company E, 104th Medical Regiment, its present designation, on December 1, 1939.

FACTUAL HISTORY

Company H, 104th Medical Regiment, dates back to the organization of Company A, Hospital Corps, November 22, 1909. On February 19, 1913, the unit was redesignated Field Hospital No. 1.

It was mustered into Federal service on June 29, 1916, on the Mexican Border, stationed at Eagle Pass, Texas, and was mustered out January 6, 1917.

The unit was again mustered into Federal service July 25, 1917, for the World War. On October 10, 1917, it was redesignated Field Hospital Company No. 113. This unit saw service with the 29th Division overseas, as part of the 104th Sanitary Train. At the end of the war, it was mustered out at Camp Meade.

The company was reorganized and rerecognized as Hospital Company No. 1, April 12, 1921, and redesignated 113th Hospital Company, 104th Medical Regiment, January 10, 1922.

The Maryland allotment of Headquarters, 104th Quartermaster Regiment, is but an infant, having been Federally recognized April 5, 1939. Through the efforts and interest of Major General Milton A. Reckord, Maryland has been building and training units for the 104th Quartermaster Regiment for several years past, and as soon as Federal authority was obtained, the Maryland allotments were organized and Federally recognized.

General Reckord authorized the organization of a Provisional Quartermaster Regiment in 1936, which served efficiently at the 1936 field training camp at Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania, for the 29th Division. This Provisional Regiment made up of the Maryland State Staff and Infantry details served the 29th Division with distinction in quartermaster functions and divisional transportation requirements and received a highly commendatory report from the Regular Army Field Inspector, Major Baldwin, Q. M. C.

Maryland, as a part of the Fifth Infantry, Maryland National Guard. It was composed of enlisted men of Headquarters Company, Company C and Company G of the Fifth Infantry, operating on a split drill basis. On April 3, 1939, the personnel was transferred and the unit was recognized and designated as Company D, 104th Quartermaster Regiment, a truck company commanded by First Lieutenant James A. Wise and Second Lieutenant Charles Moore, located at and composed of men from the community of Denton, Caroline County, Maryland.

C., who held the post until his transfer, February 1, 1940, to the Division Surgeon's Office as Office Executive. Upon the formation of the Service Company, Master Sergeant Charles S. Phipps was commissioned Second Lieutenant, M. A. C., Medical Supply Section. All officers mentioned above served in the World War.

Captain Eleder is now Major, M. C., Regimental Plans and Training Officer. Captain Buettner is Major, M. C., Medical Inspector, and Captain Reynolds commands the State Detachment. Upon Captain O'Connell's transfer to the Division Surgeon's Office, he was succeeded by Captain Charles S. Phipps. Captain Elmer E. Phipps, M. A. C., former Master Sergeant, is the unit's junior officer. The Band Section has been directed by Warrant Officers Raymond B. Lupton, Robert V. Lansinger and Warren Schafer. Benjamin Cassell, present Regimental Sergeant Major, has

come up through the ranks, and the average service of non-commissioned officers is more than 10 years.

ization in the State of Maryland with a war designation that participated in combat.

At this time, Edgar Cordell Powers, then pastor of Harlem Park Methodist Episcopal Church, became the regiment's first Chaplain, receiving his commission as First Lieutenant on the very day the regiment received its present official designation. Chaplain Powers, after 18 years of service, is still Chaplain with the grade of Major.

On July 1, 1924, the Service Company, composed of Headquarters Detachment, Medical Supply Section and Band, was organized and Federally recognized. The Band was under the leadership of Professor Daniel Feldman. Captain Richard C. O'Connell, M. A. C., commanded the Service Company from July 1, 1924, to January 31, 1940.

On January 1, 1937, the regimental units were redesignated as follows: 113th Collecting Company to Company C, 113th Ambulance Company to Company F, and 113th Hospital Company to Company I. On December 1, 1939, the units were given their present designations as follows: Company A (Collecting), Company E (Ambulance), Company H (Hospital), and Headquarters and Service Company, including Band.

On February 1, 1940, Colonel Frederick H. Vinup, commander of the regiment from the date of its organization, a period of 20 years, was transferred to the Maryland State Staff and Colonel Dwight H. Mohr assumed command. At the same time, Colonel Franklin B. Anderson, Executive Officer for 20 years, was retired and Lieutenant Colonel William H. Triplett, who has been with the regiment since its organization, was appointed Executive Officer.

The regimental staff is now as follows: Colonel Dwight H. Mohr, commanding; Lieutenant Colonel William H. Triplett, Executive Officer; Major Franklin C. Eleder, Plans and Training Officer, and Major Edgar C. Powers, Regimental Chaplain.

The Division Surgeon's office is as follows: Major Henry F. Buettner, Division Medical Inspector; Major John H. Fredericks, Division Dental Officer, and Captain Richard C. O'Connell, Office Executive.

The four companies are under the command of: Headquarters and Service Company, Captain Charles S. Phipps; Company A, Captain John F. Aubrey; Company E, Captain John S. Martin, and Company H, Captain Fred H. Clark. Major George G. E. Cross commands the Third (Hospital) Battalion.

FACTUAL HISTORY

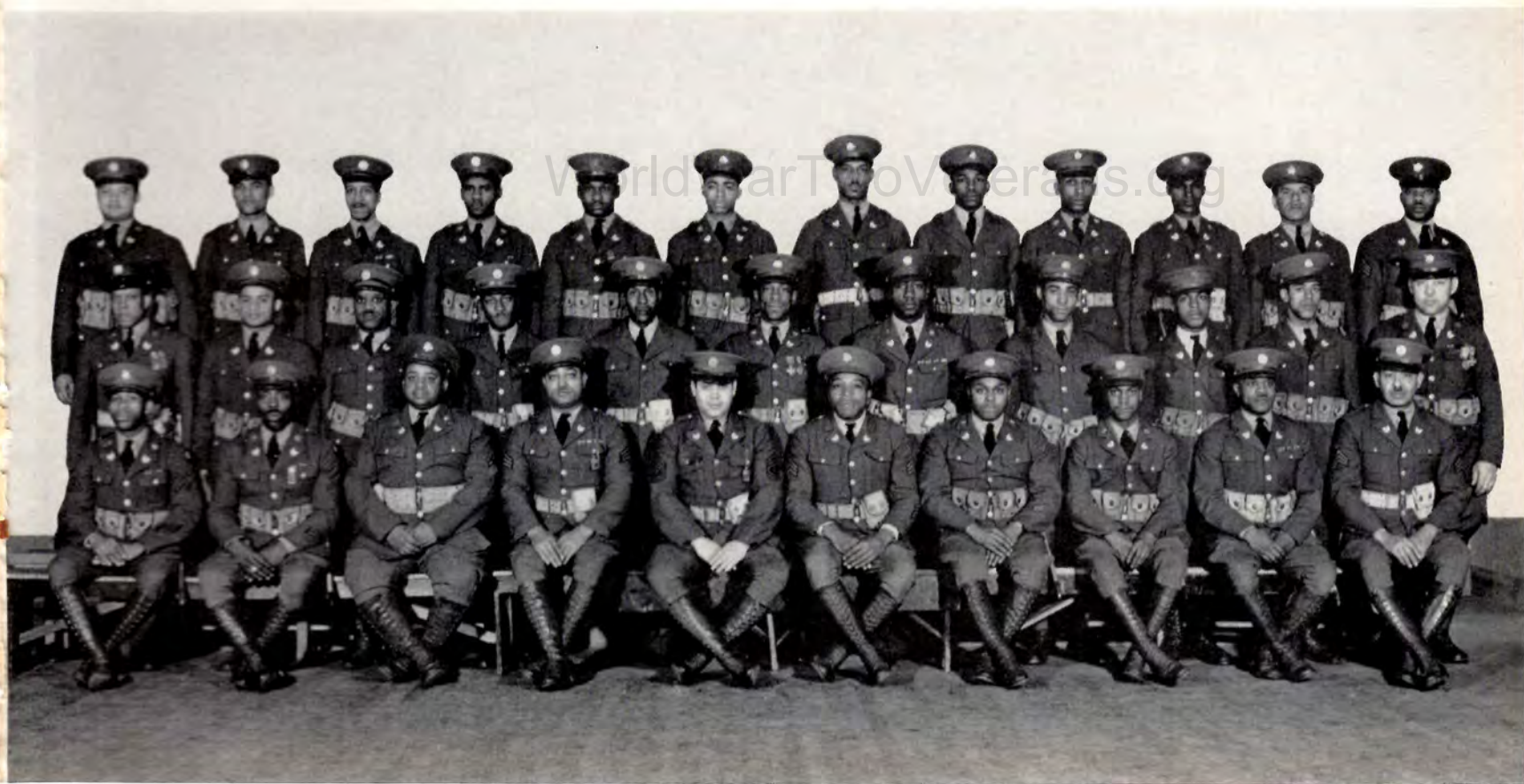
On February 20, 1879, the Monumental City Guards (forerunner of the present First Separate Company, Infantry) was organized as an independent military organization under Thomas H. Lewis. After two years of independent service, the unit was inspected by General Hubbard and staff, followed by a recommendation that the unit become a part of the State militia. In 1883, the company participated in the famous Oriole observation of the landing of "Lord Baltimore" and his suite at Brown's wharf,

foot of Broadway. It was the only colored outfit in the parade.

On February 20, 1882, the company was recognized as a unit of the Maryland National Guard and designated First Separate Company. In the Spanish-American War, the company was the first to pitch tents at Pimlico, remaining 31 days before entering duty. In 1903, a definite organization was made of the unit placing it on the recognized list of the guard.

First to leave the State at the outbreak of the World War, the company was mobilized July 25, 1917, and mustered into Federal service July 30. On August 3, the unit was stationed as a guard at the Alleghany Arsenal, Pitts-

talion, and the Fifth Regiment of Cavalry. By 1807, most of these regiments were practically dead or skeletonized; but when it seemed that war with England was likely to occur, these outfits were again recruited to full strength, and most of them participated in the Battle of North Point in 1814. After this war the militia kept on increasing for a while, but 10 or 15 years later many of these units were again skeletonized. In the forties, the militia was again reorganized and the Fifth and 53rd and perhaps a few independent companies seemed to be the only active commands then in existence. These two regiments were active until the outbreak of the Civil War when they split up, some members going into the Confederate Army and some entering the Union Army.

In 1867, another reorganization took place. Some officers and men who had been in companies that were a part of the Fifth or 53rd Regiments reorganized the Fifth Regiment. Some companies that were organized in the several counties in the state later became the First Regiment. Others were organized and in a short time there were nine units.

The Sixth Regiment—one of those formed in this period—existed until 1877. The others, except the First and Fifth, lasted only a short time. In 1885, a company called the Baltimore Light Infantry came into existence. This grew into the Fourth Battalion and became part of the Maryland National Guard and then was increased in membership and became the Fourth Regiment, which formed part of the 115th Infantry during the World War.

A colored company named the Monumental City Guards was formed in 1882, and later it was made part of the Guard under the designation First Separate Company. It is still in the National Guard of Maryland—under the designation Service Company, 372nd Infantry.

On December 15, 1897, a cavalry troop known as Troop A, First Brigade, was added to the Guard.

In 1903, a company known as Signal Company, First Brigade, was added, and in 1907, this was changed to the First Company Coast Artillery, which at the outbreak of the World War was increased in size and split into four companies.

By the beginning of the 1800's most of Maryland's military outfits were merely skeletonized units. The War of 1812, however, brought them again to their full strength and to participation in the Battle of North Point in 1814.



SERVICE PERIODS

In September, 1915, an ambulance company designated the First Maryland Ambulance Company, was mustered in, and a little later a Field Hospital Company was formed. Battery A, Maryland Field Artillery, was organized on December 29, 1915. Later, in June, 1917, two other Batteries, B and C, were mustered in; and thus a Battalion of Field Artillery was formed.

Since the Civil War the Guard has been called on for service a number of times. In 1877, it was on duty during the riots around Camden Station and in 1894 at the coal strike at Frostburg. It went into the volunteer forces during the Spanish-American War in 1898. During the Baltimore Fire of 1904 it was again called out. When troops were stationed on the Mexican Border from June, 1916, to February, 1917, the Maryland Guard was among those on duty there.

WORLD WAR I

In the World War the Maryland National Guard was, to a great extent, a part of the 29th Division, which was overseas for a year and participated in the

great Meuse-Argonne Offensive. After the World War was over, the Maryland troops went back to a peacetime basis and today the Maryland National Guard consists of the 58th Infantry Brigade, made up of the First Infantry, which is distributed throughout the rural sections of the state, the Fifth Infantry, and the 58th Brigade Headquarters Company of Baltimore; the 110th Field Artillery of Pikesville; the 104th Medical Regiment of Baltimore and Towson—all of which are successor organizations to those units which participated as part of the 29th Division in the World War; and, in addition, the 104th Observation Squadron, which was organized in 1921 as the first National Guard observation squadron in the United States; the Third Battalion and Regimental Headquarters of the 104th Quartermaster Regiment, and the Service Company, 372nd Infantry, which was formerly known as the First Separate Company.

As during the World War days, the units of the Maryland National Guard, except the First Separate Company, are part of the 29th National Guard Division.

During World War I, Maryland National Guardsmen, as a part of the 29th Division, were in the great Meuse-Argonne Offensive.





LIEUTENANT COMMANDER GEORGE H. BURNHAM
Commanding Maryland Naval Militia

Born September 25, 1897, in Malden, Massachusetts, son of Arthur G. and Alice I. Burnham. Attended public schools in Malden. Entered the U. S. Naval Academy as Midshipman, June, 1916, having passed the entrance examinations in February, 1915. Cruised on U. S. S. RHODE ISLAND and U. S. S. PENNSYLVANIA with Atlantic Fleet in 1917 and 1918. Graduated from U. S. Naval Academy and commissioned Ensign, June, 1919. Ordered to duty on the U. S. S. NEW YORK, which was assigned to the West Coast upon formation of Pacific Fleet.

Married Virginia Lee Morrow, of Baltimore, Maryland, July, 1919. Attended first class of Torpedo School at Keyport, Washington, 1921, and Destroyer Engineering School, Charleston, South Carolina, 1922. Served in destroyers for nearly four years, U. S. S. HERNDON and U. S. S. HOPKINS on East Coast and in Mediterranean at time of Smyrna trouble. Resigned from U. S. Navy, January, 1925, as Lieutenant (jg) while on the U. S. S. SHAWMUT in Annapolis, Maryland. Located in business in New York. Commissioned Lieutenant (jg) in U. S. Naval Reserve, March, 1925, and served with the unit at Whitestone Landing, Long Island, New York, both in the Naval Reserve and New York Naval Militia. Commissioned Lieutenant, 1926.

Moved to Baltimore, Maryland, 1927, and became affiliated with First Battalion, U. S. Naval Reserve. Served as Battalion Adjutant, Engineering Officer and Commanding Officer of Second Division. Assumed command of Baltimore Battalion, U. S. Naval Reserve, February 4, 1936. Cruised each summer on various destroyers and battleships. Commissioned Lieutenant Commander, October 20, 1937. On October 27, 1937, upon its re-establishment, became Commanding Officer of the Maryland Naval Militia.

Has two children: Joan A. Burnham and George H. Burnham, Jr. Since 1929, has been in the investment business in Baltimore. Past President, Fifth District Chapter, U. S. Naval Reserve Officers' Association, and member National Executive Council of that Association.

MARYLAND NAVAL MILITIA

Naval forces had been mustered in Maryland for the purpose of manning ships to participate in wars as far back as 1776, but it was not until 1891 on August 24 that a Maryland Naval Battalion was formed at Annapolis by Lieutenant Commander Joseph B. Seth. This was really the start of what is now known as the Maryland Naval Militia. At this time, it was entirely a voluntary organization and without legal status.

The initial organization, composed largely of the State fishery force, was disbanded in 1893. About this time, a group known as Company A, Maryland Naval Reserve (Independent), met in Baltimore in accordance with the laws of Maryland of 1892. This was followed by the organization of the First and Second Divisions, Maryland Naval Militia, with Charles A. Duren, Lieutenant Commander, commanding.

The outgrowth of these early volunteer organizations was the formation of the Maryland Naval Militia into the First Naval Battalion, with Isaac E. Emerson commissioned Commander, September 18, 1894, commanding. By an act of the Legislature in April, 1896, this unit was incorporated in the National Guard of the State. The Navy Department at Washington gave this organization aid and encouragement and loaned it a ship, the sloop of war—U. S. S. Dale.

On declaration of war with Spain on April 21, 1898, the Maryland Naval Militia volunteered for service in the U. S. Navy and on April 23 a contingent of the Battalion went to Norfolk to complete the complement of the U. S. S. Dixie. The remainder of the Battalion was ordered on board the U. S. S. Dale for instruction and drills

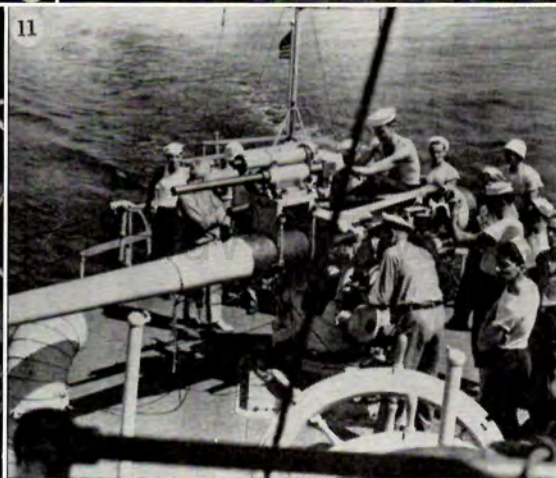

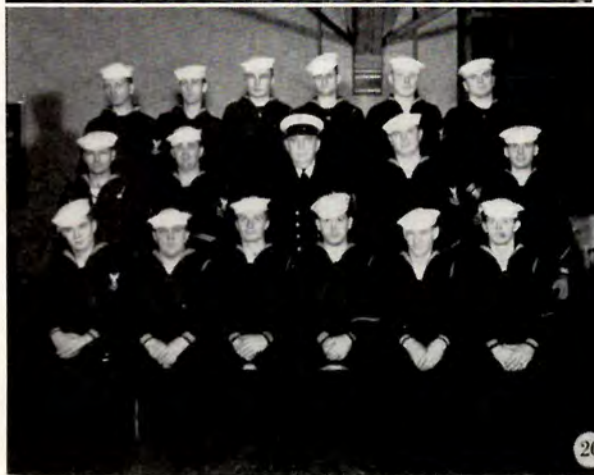

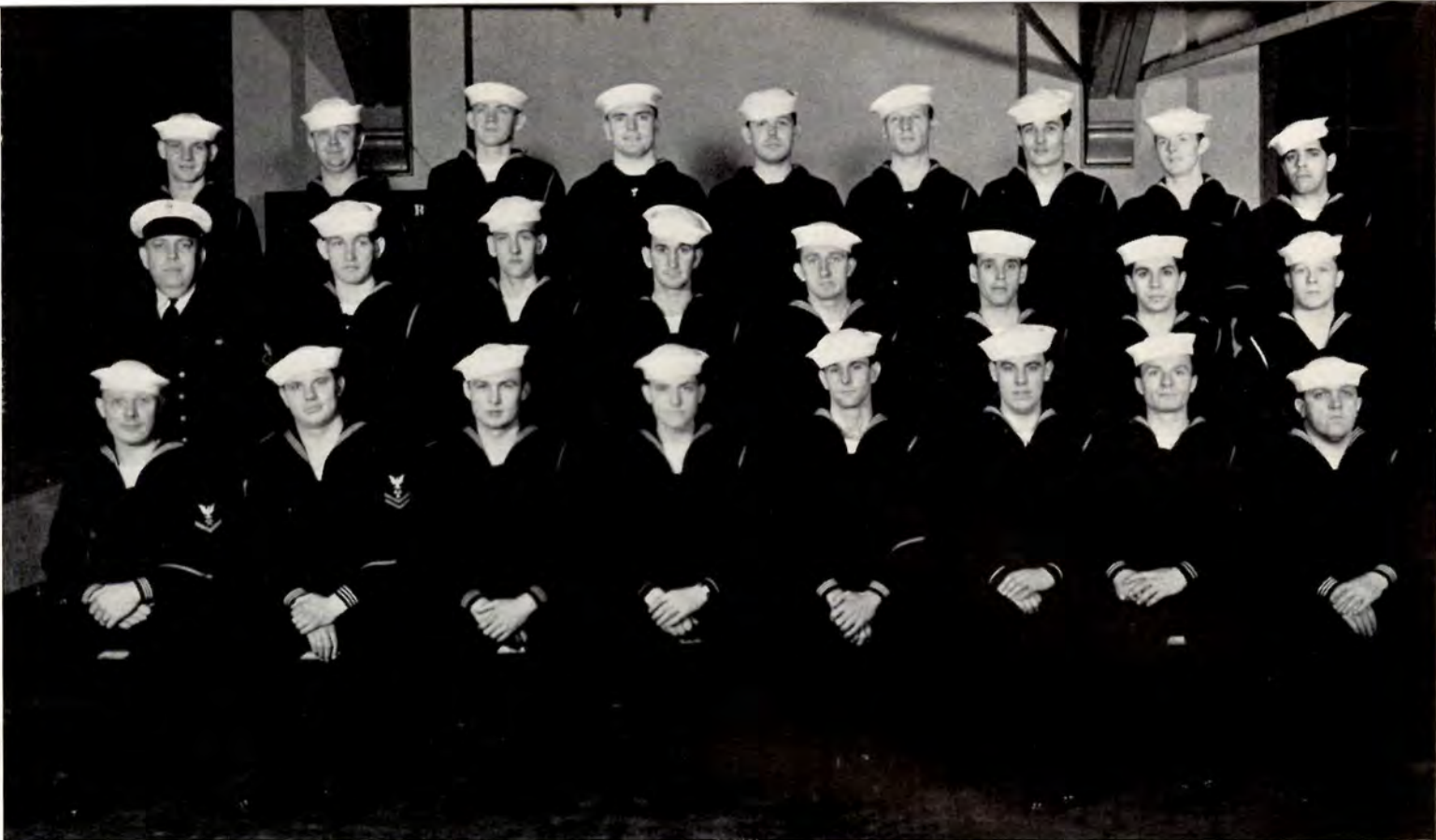

FACTUAL HISTORY

The First Division, Maryland Naval Militia, commanded by Lieutenant Commander Cecil G. McKinney, has, through the years since the reorganization of the United States Naval Reserve in 1925, maintained a high standing in Federal, district and battalion competition. Until about 1935, the First Division led the battalion in yearly attendance almost continually. In 1939, it was again on top, with an attendance percentage of 95.5 for the year, including the annual two-weeks' summer cruise.

It ranked first (gunnery only) in the 1937 Fifth Naval District (six divisions) cruises; second in 1938, and first in 1939. It also stood first in the battalion for the annual inspection at the armory for 1939 and 1940.

Some years ago, the First Division supplied the first enlisted man in the battalion to achieve a commissioned rank, and since then has produced two more.

In 1940, the first year the First Division entered competitive state rifle shooting, at Camp Ritchie, one of its men, Leo J. Guyette, SC2c, came off with the 1,000-yard Gould match. While not winning any other matches, the division led the other battalion entries in the Governor's match and the American Legion-Walter Team match.

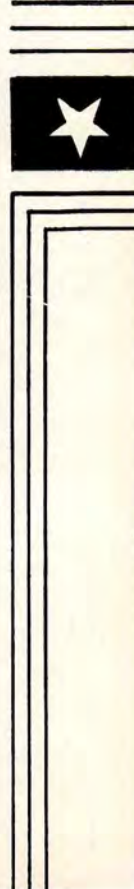

FACTUAL HISTORY

The Second Division, Maryland Naval Militia, has been highly successful in winning competitive trophies and awards. In 1915, it won permanent possession of the trophy presented by the Old Maryland Naval Militia for excellence in gunnery practice. In 1938, it was the first winner of the Captain Charles F. Macklin Trophy for attaining the highest efficiency in Federal standing within the battalion. Also in 1938, the division won the annual competitive attendance award, with an average of 96.71 per cent.

It won the award given in honor of Lieutenant Burt J. Asper for proficiency in first aid, in 1940. Also in 1940, a battalion relay team, composed entirely of members of the Second Division, won the National Guard Relay Race in the University of Maryland Fifth Regiment Games, receiving the W. F. B. R. Trophy.

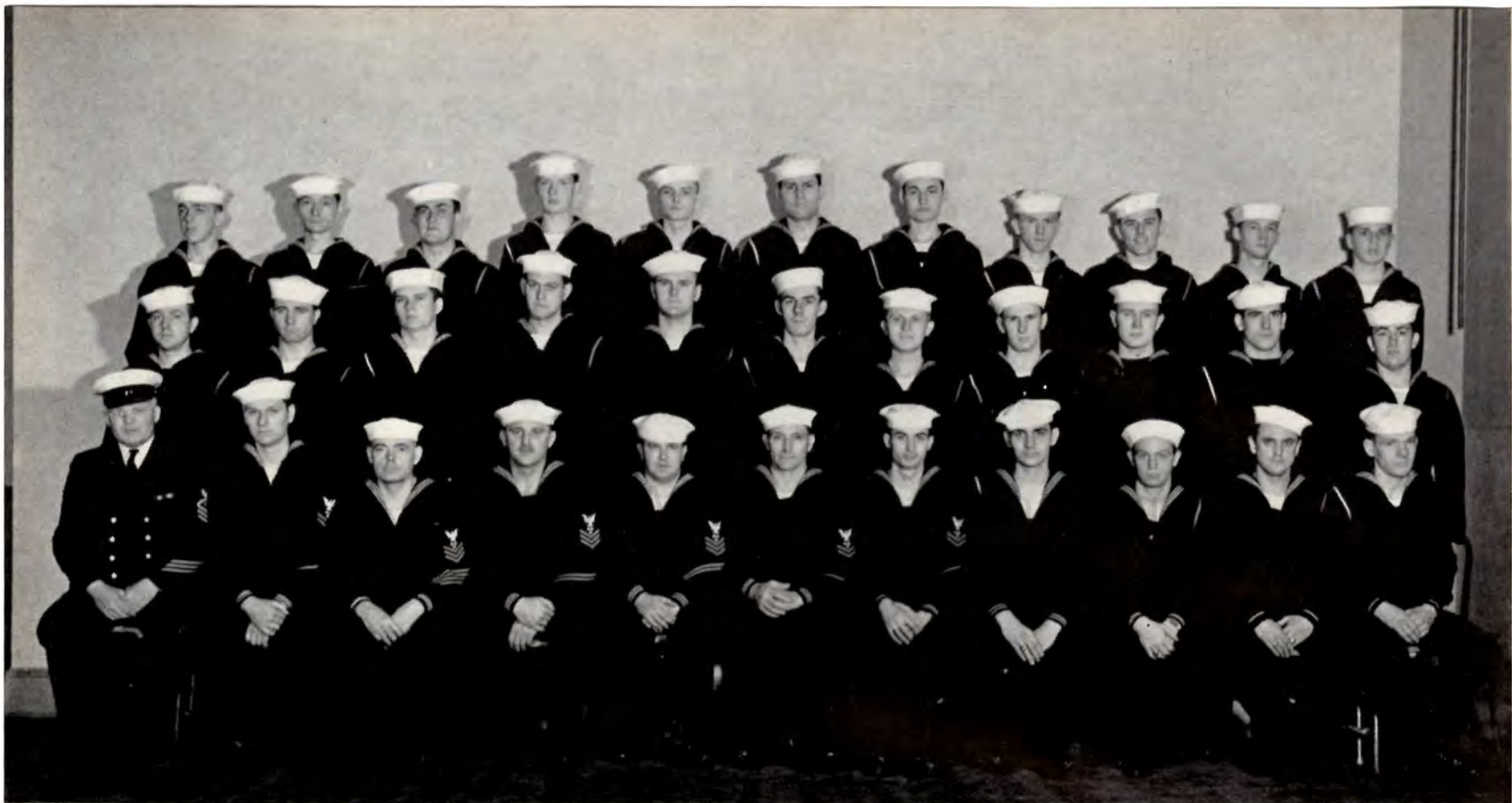

FACTUAL HISTORY

The Third Division, Maryland Naval Militia, on its reorganization after the World War was commanded by Lieutenant John J. Orr. He was succeeded in 1925 by the present commanding officer, Lieutenant Commander Edwin H. Cole.

The division has cruised on the following ships: U. S. S. Allen, U. S. S. Hamilton, U. S. S. Abel P. Upshur, U. S. S. Tilman, U. S. S. Bernadou, U. S. S. Schenck, U. S. S. Wyoming, U. S. S. Texas and U. S. S. Arkansas.

It has won the following trophies: the Charles F. Macklin Trophy, for standing first among the divisions of the battalion in Federal rating, 1939; the Naval Militia Gunnery Cup, for standing first among the divisions of the battalion in gunnery score, 1938; the Burt J. Asper Memorial Trophy, for proficiency in first aid, 1939; the Battalion Attendance Plaque, for standing first in attendance for the year among the divisions of the battalion, 1937.

The Third Division figured in two rescues on the Chesapeake Bay while on week-end cruises on board the U. S. S.

awaiting orders and was later mustered into Federal service and assigned to coast defense duty.

The Dixie's complement rendered efficient and valuable service in capturing Spanish prizes, and on July 27, 1898, the City of Ponce, Porto Rico, surrendered to them.

The U. S. S. Sylvia was assigned to the Maryland Naval Militia shortly after the end of the war with Spain.

Under the amended Militia Law of 1900, the Naval Brigade was organized with Isaac E. Emerson, promoted to Captain, commanding.

In 1902 and 1903, Divisions at Sparrows Point and Cambridge, Maryland, were formed.

In December, 1903, the headquarters of the Maryland Naval Brigade was in the Broadway Market Hall, Baltimore, and, at that time, Commander Edwin Geer was the commanding officer.

The Naval Brigade rendered valuable service during and after the Baltimore fire of 1904.

In 1906, Lieutenant Commander F. H. Wagner became the commanding officer, and about the same time, the Brigade shifted its headquarters to the Howard Street Armory, where it has been located ever since. Also in 1906, the U. S. S. Miantonomoh was loaned the State by the Navy Department to replace the U. S. S. Sylvia, and in the spring of 1907, this former ship was replaced by the Isla De Cuba, which, while at Baltimore, was stationed at Fort McHenry.

In 1909, the U. S. S. Somers (torpedo boat) was assigned as training ship for the Maryland unit.

In 1910, Lieutenant Commander C. J. Fallon assumed command of the Maryland Naval Militia, and he was succeeded in 1912 by Commander Ralph Robinson.

In 1913, the U. S. S. Montgomery came to Baltimore as training ship.

On April 12, 1916, Charles F. Macklin became commanding officer of the Maryland Naval Militia with the rank of Commander. He had previously been Adjutant General of the State and had retired from the Maryland National Guard as Brigadier General.

On declaration of war with Germany, Friday, April 6, 1917, about 6 p.m., telegraphic orders were received from the Secretary of the Navy to mobilize the Maryland Naval Militia, and by midnight of that date, Commander Macklin reported his command mobilized. On Monday, April 9, the Battalion entrained for Philadelphia to report for duty on the Battleship Missouri, then at the Philadelphia Navy Yard. At this time, the Maryland Naval Militia lost its State identity and became part of the Federal naval

forces. Members of the Maryland Naval Militia served throughout the war with credit and distinction as part of the U. S. naval forces.

After the World War, members of the U. S. Naval Reserve Force in Maryland were organized into a unit and commanded by Captain Charles F. Macklin. In October, 1920, the U. S. S. Cheyenne was assigned to Baltimore for training this group.

In 1925, a bill was passed by Congress establishing the U. S. Naval Reserve. Captain Macklin became Battalion Commander with three Divisions under his command.

In 1926, the U. S. S. Eagle No. 56 relieved the U. S. S. Cheyenne as training ship for the Baltimore unit and has continued in that capacity until the present time.

On March 1, 1932, Lieutenant Commander A. M. Norris, U. S. N. R., became Battalion Commander, and on January 1, 1936, he was relieved by Lieutenant Commander John S. Fulton, Jr., U. S. N. R.

On February 4, 1936, upon the sudden death of Lieutenant Commander Fulton, Lieutenant George H. Burnham, U. S. N. R., was ordered to command the Battalion.

On October 27, 1937, the Maryland Naval Militia was re-established by executive order of Governor Harry W. Nice. Appropriate ceremonies were held at the Howard Street Armory, and, under the direction of Governor Nice, the entire battalion was sworn into the Maryland Naval Militia. Colonel H. L. Grymes was designated as mustering officer by Major General Milton A. Reckord, Commanding General, Maryland National Guard. At this time, the Maryland unit became a dual organization, being both U. S. Naval Reserve and Maryland Naval Militia, with Lieutenant Commander George H. Burnham, commanding both units.

Since the re-establishment of the Maryland Naval Militia, the city of Baltimore has made available an excellent piece of water front property on the Key Highway below Federal Hill, and the State Legislature has appropriated a sum of money for the construction of a much needed Naval armory.

Throughout the entire existence of the Maryland Naval unit the officers and men have participated actively in drills and in training cruises on numerous types of ships. The organization has also participated in many official ceremonies, among which were the following: the inauguration of several Presidents and Governors, attendance at the Jamestown Exposition, as part of the welcoming squadron to receive the U. S. fleet upon its return from the trip around the world, the reception to Colonel Lindbergh, anniversary ceremonies at Yorktown, Virginia, and the Maryland Tercentenary.

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
