
Enlisted in Company "F," Second North Carolina Infantry, June 21, 1912, and served until November 30, 1914, when he was promoted to Second Lieutenant and assigned to Company "F," Second North Carolina Infantry, serving until December 7, 1915, when he was promoted to First Lieutenant and assigned to Company "F," Second North Carolina Infantry. He served in this capacity until July 5, 1916, when he was mustered into Federal Service and served until April 17, 1919, on the Mexican Border in the U. S. A., and A. E. F. April 17, 1919, he was promoted to Captain and served as company and battalion commander with the 38th Infantry, Third Division, U. S. A. During his Federal Service he was Instructor in the Automatic Rifle School, attended British Army Musketry School, Officers School, Clamecy, France, and Service School at Cattellon Sur-Sein, France. He participated in campaigns and battes as follows: Mexican Border, Ypres, Picardy and The Somme, in which battels he was wounded twice. Was decorated with the Dis-tinguished Service Cross, British Military Cross and the Purple Heart medal. While with the British Army he served with the Ninth Black Watch, Gordon Highlanders and West York Riding Battalions. After being mustered out of Federal Service General Byrd accepted a commission as Captain, Infantry, O. R. C., and was assigned to the 405th Infantry, October 30, 1923, and assigned to command Headquarters Company, 153rd Infantry, Arkansas National Guard, serving in this capacity until January 1, 1929, when he was transferred to Regimental Headquarters, 153rd Infantry, Arkansas National Guard, and assigned as Adjutant. January 18, 1937, he was promoted to Brigadier General, Adjutant General's Department, Arkansas National Guard, and assigned as Adjutant General of Arkansas which office he now holds.

The State Staff was organized in June, 1916, with General Lloyd England, as Adjutant General; Major W. C. Bradford, Assistant Adjutant General, Major Eugene B. Jett, United States Property and Disbursing Officer. When the Arkansas National Guard was called into Federal Service for Mexican Border Service, Capt. Henry F. Fredeman was promoted to Major and assigned as

Assistant Adjutant General, Vice Major Bradford transferred to the Second Infantry. During the time that the Arkansas National Guard was in Federal Service on the Mexican Border and in the World War, the officers of the State Staff were assigned to the different regiments.



Henry F. Fredeman, Assistant Adjutant General; Major Eugene B. Jett, U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer; Major A. W. Dobyns, Judge Advocate General; Major Fred W. Greene, Inspector General. Major Greene served until November 18, 1919, when he was succeeded by Major Heber L. McAlister, who served as Inspector General until January 3, 1920, at which time he was appointed Lieut. Colonel of Infantry and transferred to the Fifth Arkansas Infantry. Under date of December 4, 1919, General England resigned as Adjutant General and Joe S. Harris was appointed Brigadier General and assigned as Adjutant General. General Harris served until February 1, 1921, when he resigned. July 1, 1927, General Harris was again appointed Adjutant General and served until his death April 22, 1929. February 1, 1921, Virgil A. Beeson was appointed Adjutant General and served until November 30, 1922, when he resigned. On December 1, 1922, Colonel Heber L. McAlister was appointed Adjutant General and served until June 30, 1925, when he resigned. On July 1, 1925, James R. Wayne was appointed Brigadier General and assigned as Adjutant General and served until June 30, 1927. After the death of General Harris April 22, 1929, E. L. Brigadier General April 29, 1929, and served until January 15, 1937, when he resigned. Daniel B. Byrd was appointed Brigadier General January 18, 1937, and is now the present Adjutant General.

The following officers have served as Assistant Adjutant's General: Lieut. Col. Samuel B. Scott, Lieut. Col. Edward Woodford, Lieut. Colonel Charles S. Garrett, and the following served as U. S. Property and Disbursing Officers: Major Henry F. Fredeman, Lieut. Col. Edward Woodford and Major Raiford Payne.

The State Detachment was organized in 1923, by Major Leland S. Lamm, with a personnel of forty-five enlisted men. In order to organize the 154th Observation Squadron, Air Corps and for the Guard to stay within the State allotment of troops, the entire enlisted personnel of the State Detachment was transferred to the Squadron on October 24, 1925. In 1926 the allotment of troops was increased and the State Detachment was organized again by Major Lamm with an enlisted personnel of thirty-six men and was commanded by Major Lamm until he resigned in 1927, at which time Major Curtis R. Barham was placed in command and served until his death July 28, 1929. Major Lee V. Casey was placed in command and has served as such until September 1, 1938, when Capt. Elliotte A. Stoddard was assigned to command the Detachment. The strength of the detachment has been reduced from time to time in order to strengthen different units of the Arkansas National Guard until its present strength is now only six enlisted men.

The officers and enlisted men of the State Staff and State Detachment have served as Advance Detachments, Rear Detachments, Camp Supply for all of the Field Training Camps of the Arkansas National Guard, and have served in all the major emergencies where the Guard has been called into active service.

Woven into the history of Arkansas is an interesting story of the 153rd Infantry, Arkansas National Guard. Among its officers have been State heroes such as Archibald Yell and the nationally-known poet, philosopher, and expert Mason, Albert Pike. Its history contains duels and heroic acts of personal bravery. Its story is one of protecting a peace loving citizenry from savage Indians and border outlawry, of fighting for the cause of a section and a democracy of the world.

Officially the 153rd Infantry was organized on May 16, 1898, when the mobilization of Arkansas troops for Spanish-American War service took place. However, it really dates back to 1820, when a militia was organized under William C. Allen as Brigadier General to insure the safety of the newly-organized territory against any Indians that might become unfriendly.

The service of General Allen as commanding officer was short, for in March, 1821, he was killed in a duel with Robert C. Oden, and the leadership passed to Edmund Hogan, appointed by President Monroe. His, too, was an ill-starred fate, for in May, 1828, he was killed by Andrew Scott. William Montgomery was appointed as his successor.

Until near the close of the territorial rule there was little active need for the militia, and the organization, although maintained, aroused little interest. In 1836, however, it was stirred into activity by rumors of Indian hostility incited by Mexican emissaries. General Edmund P. Gaines called upon Governor Fulton for a regiment, one-half to be mounted, for the defense of the western frontier. Saline, Pulaski, Hempstead, Conway, Pope, and Sevier Counties responded, and the men, too few to warrant a Colonel, were mustered in as a battalion under Absolem Fowler as Lieutenant Colonel. It was sent to Fort Towson on the Red River, the boundary between Indian territory and Texas. Later in the year Carroll, Crawford, Independence, Izard, Jackson, Johnson, Lawrence, Scott, Searcy, and Washington Counties furnished more men, who were sent to Benton and Washington Counties to protect settlers against attacks of hostile Cherokees. Regular army troops later replaced these men.

Under the State government the militia was reorganized, but saw no service until the Mexican War. Then Arkansas was called upon to furnish one regiment of mounted men in Mexico and one battalion to guard the western frontier of the State.

Commanding One Hundred and Fifty-Third Infantry

Appointed Second Lieutenant, Infantry, June 1, 1911, and assigned to Regimental Staff, First Arkansas Regiment, Nov. 17, 1911. Appointed Captain and assigned to command Company "C," First Arkansas Infantry, serving in this capacity until June, 1915, when he was transferred to the Regimental Staff and assigned as Inspector Small Arms Practice, where he served until July 6, 1916. July 7, 1916, Captain, Infantry, National Guard Reserve, until July 20, 1916. On July 20, 1916, he was transferred from the Reserve and assigned to State Staff, serving until July 25, 1917, when he was promoted to Major, Infantry, and assigned to command First Battalion, Third Arkansas Infantry, serving until August 5, 1917, when he was drafted into Federal service with the Third Arkansas Infantry, which was redesignated 154th Infantry, and assigned to the Thirty-ninth Division. He commanded the First Battalion of the 154th Infantry, 162nd Infantry, and 164th Infantry, until September 26, 1919, when he was mustered out of Federal service. He served overseas June 12, 1918, to February 26, 1919. He is a graduate of the Field Officers School August, 1918, course

at Langres, France. November 3, 1919, appointed Major, Infantry, National Guard Reserve. On November 18, 1919, was transferred to Inspector General's Department and assigned to active list State Staff, Arkansas National Guard., as Inspector General, serving in this capacity until May 3, 1921, when he was appointed Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, and assigned as Executive Officer, Fifth Arkansas Infantry. June 23, 1922, he was appointed Colonel, Infantry, and assigned to command the 153rd Infantry which was the Fifth Arkansas until it was redesignated October 25, 1921. Under date of December 1, 1922, Colonel McAlister, in addition to his other duties, was assigned as Adjutant General, serving in the capacity of Commanding Officer, 153rd Infantry, and Adjutant General until February 16, 1924, when he was promoted to Brigadier General, Adjutant General's Department, and assigned as Adjutant General of Arkansas and served until June 29, 1925, when he transferred as Brigadier General to the National Guard Reserve. May 11, 1928, he was appointed Colonel, Infantry, and assigned to command the 153rd Infantry, Arkansas National Guard, in which capacity he is now serving.

To the call Albert Pike responsed and was made Captain of Company F of the First Arkansas Infantry. Archibald Yell, too, felt the call and resigning his seat in Congress, enlisted as a private in Company B. When the Regiment was organized, he was commissioned Colonel. Companies E and K, organized into a Battalion, commanded by Capt. Albert Pike, were sent into the Battle of Buena Vista, where Archibald Yell lost his life. Some of the Arkansas troops were undisciplined. Colonel Yell, seeing their general disorder, called to a few of the bravest of his men to follow, and dashed into the thickest of the fight in a brave but vain attempt to rally his forces. The blood-stained belt removed from his body after the battle and now in the Museum of the Arkansas History Commission is a mute reminder of his courage.

Little data is available from the Mexican War to the Civil War. But on April 22, 1861, Governor Rector replied to Lincoln's call for troops with this message:

"In answer to your requisition for troops from Arkansas to subjugate the Southern States, I have to say that none will be furnished. The demand is only adding insult to injury. The people of this commonwealth are free men, not slaves, and will defend to the last extremity their honor, lives and property against Northern mendacity and usurpation."

After the State's secession, the military board, hastily organized, called for 10,000 troops. Since the Confederate government later asked for the transfer of State to Confederate troops but did not force such action, there has been much duplication in numbers and confusion in rolls. There were three Arkansas Infantry Regiments named the First; there was a First Regiment of State Troops; a First Arkansas Infantry; a First Arkansas Mounted Riflemen. Arkansas men saw service at Farmington, Miss., at Shiloh, Tenn., at Perryville, Ky., at Murfreesboro, Tenn., and they were engaged in all the principal sections of action of the Chickamauga and Atlanta campaigns.

After the Civil War came another period of inactivity, resulting, at the outbreak of the Spanish-American War, in poor and antiquated equipment. In answer to the President's call for men in 1898, two regiments were made up from selected companies from the State Guard and mustered in as United States Volunteers. The First Arkansas Infantry, State Guard, was mobilized May 16, 1898, and assigned to the First Brigade, Second Division, Third Army Corps. It was ordered at first to Porto Rico from Chickamauga Park, where it was stationed. The men were sent, when that order was countermanded, to Fort Logan H. Roots, Little Rock, where they were mustered out October 25, 1898, without having seen active service.





#### FACTUAL HISTORY

The Service Company, 153rd Infantry, has maintained a very high rating in its regiment since July 1, 1924, both in the annual Armory inspections and at the field training encampments. The Company is charged with serving the Regiment in the capacity of supply, transportation and administrative duties of the Regimental Headquarters and staff. Its training as a rifle unit enables it to serve the National Guard of Arkansas in yet another role.

The Service Company has attended fourteen annual field training encampments since its organization. On March 6, 1926, the Company was called out for duty in connection with the destruction by fire of the greater portion of Newport, Arkansas. The Company was on duty at the Confederate Veterans' reunion at Fair Park in Little Rock during a part of May and June, 1928. This tour of duty consisted of establishing a camp for the Veterans, patroling



the camp during the meeting and breaking camp after the reunion was over.

On two occasions the Company has been called out for flood duty. In July, 1928, it was detailed to Big Lake, Arkansas, where it performed patrol duty along the levees, and in January, 1937, the Service Company was mobilized for duty in the flooded areas in eastern Arkansas and was sent to Forrest City as supply unit for a refugee camp. This tour of duty lasted twelve days.

The Service Company has also actively participated in parades and memorial occasions in Little Rock and other cities. During the visit of President Roosevelt to Arkansas in 1936 this organization was detailed for patrol duty. The Company performed a similar service during the pageant celebrating the Centennial of the State of Arkansas.

The Service Company as now organized is commanded by Capt. Charles H. Andrews, and is composed of the company commander, three junior officers and sixty-nine enlisted men. The Company personnel is stationed at Searcy, except for a Staff Section detail of five men stationed at Regimental Headquarters in Conway.


The Howitzer Company has been called upon to serve the community in many instances, but has not mobilized for state duty in the two and a half years since its organization.

Company "E," 153rd Infantry, served on the Mexican Border in June, 1916, as Company "E," First Arkansas Infantry. The Company was stationed at Deming, New Mexico, until February, 1917, when it was mustered out of Federal service and sent back to its home station in Little Rock.

On April 5, 1917, Company "E" was called back into Federal service and redesignated Company "E," 153rd Infantry. It was assigned to duty at Camp Beauregard, La., as a part of the Thirty-ninth Division. The Thirty-ninth was made a replacement division and sent to France in August, 1918.

The records and skeleton organization were returned to Camp Pike in January, 1919, and mustered out of Federal



service. When the 153rd Infantry was reorganized, Company "E" was organized February 23, 1921, at Camden, Arkansas. On June 5, 1925, Company "E" was moved to Clarksville, at which place it has remained.

On July 24, 1932, Company "E" was mobilized upon orders of the Adjutant General and detailed to Johnson County for riot duty. The unit assisted the sheriff in making arrests of the leaders of the disorders and by maintaining a guard over the county jail to prevent a jail break. The outfit remained on duty through July 27, 1932.

On December 25, 1933, two officers and fifteen enlisted men were ordered out and instructed to aid the sheriff of Searcy County in maintaining peace and order in Marshall and vicinity. This detachment remained on duty at Marshall through December 26, 1933. On January 28, 1937, the unit was ordered to active flood duty at Forrest City, where it was given the task of feeding 11,000 refugees two meals a day. This duty was completed February 8, 1937.






from this Company. In the Coast Guard Trophy Match fired at 200 and 300 yards rapid fire at Target "A," with 1,555 of the world's best shots entered, Sgt. Edgar A. Stevens of Company "G" shot a score of 99 of a possible 100 to tie Pvt. Remes De La Hunt of the U. S. Marines for first place. 

## FACTUAL HISTORY AT TW

Company "K," 153rd Infantry, was organized in Walnut Ridge, Arkansas, on April 29, 1929, under Capt. Boas E. Gibson and Second Lieut. Alfred L. King, and was Federally recognized May 8, 1929, with two officers and sixty-seven enlisted men.

In the summer of 1931 the Company was called out for two days by Maj. J. F. Mederas to assist in distributing Red Cross food and supplies. On September 11, 1931, the unit was ordered out by the Adjutant

General and detailed to Jonesboro to handle crowds of people during a religious revival in that city. The tour of duty lasted three days. On January 24, 1937, the Company was called out under command of Lieutenant Beakley to assist in handling flood refugees in Jonesboro. The unit served thirteen days. The organization moved from Walnut Ridge to Hoxie, Arkansas, in the fall of 1933, by order of the Adjutant General. To date the organization has trained approximately 481 men since its Federal recognition on May 8, 1929.

Capt. Boas E. Gibson performed a special tour of duty in February, 1937, when he was ordered to Jonesboro by the Adjutant General as State Coordinator in charge of refugee work in Creighead, Green and Poinsett counties.

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Company "L," 153rd Infantry, was organized in Batesville on October 2, 1924, having been transferred from Walnut Ridge. The Company was organized by Capt. William J. DeCamp, with the assistance of First Lieut. Guy M. Ward and Second Lieut. Jim Carpenter. Under command of these three officers the new Company made its first field camp the following summer.

On April 26, 1926, the three original officers resigned, and Kent V. Morrison and Lucien Abraham were appointed Captain and First Lieutenant respectively. On August 16, 1926, Sgt. Edward C. Linebarger was appointed First Lieutenant. Captain Morrison resigned in September, 1927, and First Lieutenant Abraham became the active head of the organization. He was appointed Captain January, 1928. On January 13, 1929, Second Lieutenant Linebarger was made First Lieutenant and Sgt. George M. Evans was

made Second Lieutenant. These officers now make up the commissioned personnel of this unit.

On June 30, 1928, Company "L" was ordered out for flood relief work and guard duty on the Mississippi River. Company "L" patrolled six miles of levee just north of Blytheville from June 30 to July 13, 1928. This tour of duty was performed by two officers and forty-four enlisted men.

Lieutenant Linebarger was a member of the Arkansas National Guard Rifle Team which represented the state at the National Matches at Camp Perry, Ohio, in 1928. Captain Abraham was graduated from the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Georgia, on May 23, 1929. During his absence the town of Guion was destroyed by a tornado and a detachment of men from Company "L," commanded by First Sgt. Joe E. Gould, was detailed there for relief duty. Twenty-three men served on the detail.

On January 2 and 3, 1935, Company "L" performed its last tour of state service. The unit was called out to help in running down the killer of Chief Deputy Sheriff Everett Wheeler, who was killed in trying to arrest one Robert Rose. Rose was subsequently captured by the soldiers.

The 1937 field camp was held at Fort Riley, Kansas, and last year at Camp Joseph T. Robinson.







#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Company "M," 153rd Infantry, is an outgrowth of the original company formed at Osceola in 1902, under command of Capt. John P. Keiser, with Clarence Moore as First Lieutenant and Charles Gaylord as Second Lieutenant. Its first duty performed as a military unit was in 1904 at the World's Fair in St. Louis.

The unit moved from Osceola to Blytheville in 1907 under command of Capt. Curtis J. Little, who remained in command until his promotion to Major in 1914. For two consecutive years during this period this was the only unit in the state to hold recognition from the War Department.

The Company was mustered into service in 1916 for the Mexican Border campaign. Ten days after its demobilization it was recalled into service for the war with Germany,

and trained at Fort Logan H. Roots, Camp Pike and Camp Beauregard, until, as a part of the Thirty-ninth Division, it was sent to France. The unit landed at Brest August 12, 1918. The Regiment was broken up and used as replacements during the World War.

After the demobilization of all troops outside of the Regular Army, this organization, as part of the Arkansas National Guard, was reorganized at Blytheville as a rifle unit and given the designation of Company "M," Fifth Infantry. Federal recognition as such was accorded May 8, 1921. On October 25, 1921, it was redesignated Company "M," 153rd Infantry, and was made a machine gun unit. Capt. Richard Russell Phillips was assigned to command the unit on its reorganization.

More recent duties performed by the Company include flood duty on Big Lake in 1927, at Marked Tree in 1928 and at Blytheville, Manila, Leachville and Osceola during the 1937 flood. The unit is housed in a state-owned Armory of modern design, built in 1930.

## TWO HUNDRED AND SIXTH Coast Artillery



The 206th CoastArtillery, Anti-Aircraft Regiment was organized in 1923, Federal recognition having been extended by the War Department on November 24, 1923. Colonel Elgan C. Robertson, the Commanding Officer of the Regiment was promoted from a Lieutenant-Colonel of the 153rd Infantry on November 24, 1923, and assigned to command the Regiment. He has been in command of the Regiment since that date.

The Machine Gun Battalion of the Regiment was composed of officers and men of the 141st Machine Gun Battalion commanded by Major Charles S. Garrett. This Battalion was transferred to the Regiment at the time of its organization, Garrett becoming the Lieutenant-Colonel and executive officer of the Regiment.

The Regiment did not see service during the World War, but the 141st Machine Gun Battalion under command of Major Charles S. Garrett did see service during the war and was in France. Many officers and men of the Regiment saw service on the Mexican Border in 1916 and 1917. Colonel Robertson was in command of an Infantry Company as was Colonel Garrett. Other officers and men in the Regiment saw service in an Infantry Regiment on the Mexican Border. Colonel Robertson commanded the First Battalion of the 142nd Field Artillery during the World War and saw service in France for approximately eleven months. The two Battalion Commanders and practically all of the Battery Commanders are war-time officers.

Three Gun Batteries and one Machine Gun Battery are made up of personnel from the Agricultural Colleges of this State. The officers are either members of the faculty at this time or have been members of the college faculties in the past. The enlisted men are students in the colleges. Most of the organizations of the Regiment have had extensive service during emergencies in the State. Many of the organizations participated in flood relief work in 1927 and 1937, and other disasters since the Regiment was organized.

The Regiment conducted its field training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, for five years and at Fort Barrancas, Florida, Fort Sheridan, Illinois, Camp Palacios, Texas, and Camp Pike, Arkansas. Due to the fact that there is no artillery range large enough in Arkansas for the Regiment to conduct its target practice, it is necessary that it leave the State for this purpose. The Regiment is now equipped with a new-type gun and fire control equipment and has received a very high rating on all inspections by representatives of the War Department. The Regiment is fully motorized and has traveled approximately ten thousand miles to and from field training places, moving the entire Regiment and equipment, including personal baggage of personnel without the slightest accident to personnel and/or motor equipment, with the exception of two punctures and a slight fender damage to one truck.

The Regimental Commander requires all officers and noncommissioned officers to pursue the Regular Army Correspondent Courses prescribed by the War Department in addition to the regular duties in connection with troops. Last year the officer and non-commissioned officer personnel did 14,463 hours of correspondence work for which official credit was received in the War Department. All non-commissioned officers of the Regiment were required to take the Ten Series Army Correspondence Course as a minimum requirement of military experience before they could be promoted to the next higher grade. Officers are required to pursue work up to and including the next higher grade.


#### Commanding Two Hundred and Sixth Coast Artillery

Was drafted into Federal Service and redesignated the 142nd Field Artillery and assigned to the 39th Division, where he served as Regimental Adjutant until May 3, 1919, when he was promoted to Major, Field Artillery, and assigned to command First Battalion, 142nd Field Artillery, serving in this capacity until August 23, 1919, when he was mustered out of Federal Service.

Serving overseas from August 8, 1918, to June 16, 1919. During his Federal Service he attended the following service schools: Artillery Service School, Camp Beauregard, La., from January 1, 1918, to July 28, 1918; Clermont-Ferrand, France, School of Fire for Field Artillery from August 20, 1918, to October 10, 1918, where he ranked second of a class of forty; Artillery Officers School at Coetquidan, France, from October 12, 1918, to November 8, 1918, graduating from all schools with a satisfactory rating. August 25, 1919, to May 3, 1921, Major, Infantry, Arkansas National Guard Reserve. May 5, 1921, to July 1, 1922, Major, commanding First Battalion, 153rd Infantry, Arkansas National Guard. July 1, 1922, promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, and assigned as Executive Officer, 153rd Infantry, Arkansas National Guard. November 24, 1923, he was appointed Colonel, C. A. C., and assigned to command the 206th Coast Artillery (Anti-Aircraft) regiment, in which capacity he is now serving.



Several privates in the organization have had ten years' experience. Over 500 men have received training in this organization and are ready for service when needed.



### FACTUAL HISTORY

When the Arkansas National Guard was reorganized in 1921 the present Battery "A," 206th Coast Artillery was organized as Company "H", 141st Machine Gun Battalion (AA) and received Federal recognition June 24, 1921. The Battery was organized by Capt. Harry W. Smith, now Lieut.-Col. of the 206th Coast Artillery Regiment. The 141st Machine Gun Battalion was expanded into the 206th Coast Artillery in 1923, and Company "H" became Battery "H". The present commander, Capt. Carl F. Scheibner was placed in command on July 1, 1930, following the promotion of Capt. Smith to Major.

On September 1, 1931 the Battery was made the Searchlight Battery of the Regiment and its designation changed from Battery "H" to Battery "A".



At present it has a strength of three officers and sixtyeight enlisted men. For training purposes the Battery has one Sperry Searchlight complete, but under wartime conditions would have fifteen searchlights, manned by six officers and 250 enlisted men.

In addition to attending field training under Federal pay for a period of at least fifteen days each year since its organization, the Battery has been on active duty under the call of the state on numerous occasions. The Battery served at Little Rock during the Arkansas river flood of 1927; served at Big Lake during the flood of 1928; was on duty at Osceola during the Mississippi river flood of 1937; was on riot duty at the Arkansas Penitentiary in 1923; riot duty at Dewitt in 1924; riot duty in Little Rock in 1927; riot duty again at the Arkansas Penitentiary in 1927; and at Jonesboro in 1931. The Battery has acted as guard of honor at many funerals of state and public officials.

Battery "A", by virtue of its unbroken line of service from 1921 to the present, takes rank as the senior Battery of the Regiment.

Battery "B" has never failed to make a good showing on ordnance inspections and has always received a rating of "Excellent" on these inspections, with the exception of the two or three times its rating has been "Very Satisfactory." There have been but very few deficiencies, and all these of a minor nature, checked against the Battery on annual Federal inspections.

During the 1927 flood the Battery served for one month. Its first duty was rescuing persons from the inundated area. Later, after the immediate peril was over, the unit established two refugee camps, one for negroes and one for whites. The Battery on numerous occasions has served as guards, policemen, escorts, firing squad and in other capacities.

In 1933 the Regimental Efficiency Cup was won by Battery "B."

### FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery "C," 206th Coast Artillery (Anti-aircraft), was reorganized and relocated in Jonesboro on December 2, 1938. Capt. Hansel T. Winters was placed in command on December 10, 1938. The Armory of the organization at the present time is the new \$150,000 Community Center building located on Church Street in Jonesboro.



The Battery was placed in charge of a concentration camp in Jonesboro for six weeks. In 1931, from September 10 to 13, the Company was called out to cope with a local disturbance.

In 1937 the Battery was placed on flood duty from January 22 to February 8, and once more took charge of a concentration camp in Jonesboro. Battery "C" has won a number of championships in baseball, boxing and softball and were given permanent possession of the baseball trophy by reason of winning the championship of the Regiment for three conscutive years.



#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery "D," 206th Coast Artillery (AA), was organized on the campus of the Second District Agricultural School, Russellville, Arkansas, on October 24, 1923, with Capt. John B. Buerkle, the commanding officer; Davis L. Weldon, First Lieutenant; and William W. Smith, Second Lieutenant, and an enlisted personnel of seventy-nine members chosen from the student body of the school. The organization has remained on the campus of the Agricultural School, which became the Arkansas Polytechnic College in 1925, and, along with Battery "F," 206th Coast Artillery, was in 1926 the first organization in the state to occupy a state-owned Armory.

First Lieutenant Weldon was promoted to Captain and assigned to command Battery "F," 206th Coast Artillery, January 26, 1925. Second Lieutenant Smith was promoted





Personnel of the Battery was made up of instructors of the college and their students.

The Battery had as its commander Capt. Davis L. Weldon, who, at the time the organization was transferred, was a First Lieutenant of Battery "D" of the same Regiment. Captain Weldon was Federally recognized and assigned to Battery "F" on January 26, 1925. Hailey B. White was made First Lieutenant and assigned to Battery "F" on the



same date. The Battery's strength at this time was two officers and seventy-six enlisted men.

In 1929 Captain Weldon resigned and was transferred to the inactive list. Lee B. Marble was made a Captain and assigned to Battery "F" on August 1, 1929. Lieutenant White resigned the same year, and was succeeded by Second Lieut. Reuben D. Caudle, who was promoted to First Lieutenant. In 1931 Captain Marble died and the vacancy in the Battery's officer personnel was filled by First Lieut. William W. Smith of Battery "D." Lieutenant Smith was made a Captain July 7, 1931, and assigned to Battery "F" the same date. The unit's present strength is three officers and sixty-eight enlisted men.

During the time of the Battery's organization it has attended encampments at Fort Sill, Oklahoma; Fort Barrancas, Florida; Fort Sheridan, Illinois; Camp Hulen, Texas; and Camp Pike, Arkansas. The Battery also attended the oil exposition at Tulsa, was guard of honor to Lindbergh upon his visit to Little Rock, and did flood duty at Wynne, Arkansas, from January 27 to February 4, 1937.



Battery "G" was mustered in and Federally recognized April 25, 1936. A. M. Coates, a veteran of the World War, became commander of the Battery. The First Lieutenant was Robert T. Austin, who at the time held a First Lieutenant's commission in the Reserve Corps, and the Second Lieutenant was Z. D. Jennings, who had finished four years at the Naval Academy at Annapolis. The enlisted personnel was made up of young men in Helena of eligible age, education and other qualifications, many of whom had had previous experience in the National Guard or the Regular Army.

Shortly after the unit's organization in Helena a new Armory was begun, and is now completed. It was formally dedicated and accepted by the Military Department on June 30, 1938.

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery "H," 206th Coast Artillery (AA), Hot Springs, had its origin through redesignation and conversion from Battery "A," 142nd Field Artillery (155 mm Howitzer), also of Hot Springs. The Battery received Federal recognition June 26, 1931.

Officers of the unit at the time of redesignation were Capt. Thomas M. Brown, Second Lieut. Harry O. Lynch and Second Lieut. Richard L. Craigo. Battery "H" functions as a machine gun battery, anti-aircraft, its weapon being the Browning Automatic .30 calibre machine gun. At the time of the Battery's reorganization, the transportation was furnished by old war issue FWD trucks.



The 1936 camp was made at Camp Hulen, Texas, and the 1937 camp at Pensacola.

In 1938 the Regiment got no farther from home than Camp Joseph T. Robinson. At the present time Capt. Thomas M. Brown is commanding, with First Lieut. Richard L. Craigo, Executive Officer, and Second Lieut. William M. Anderson, Jr.

## ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FOURTH

Observation Squadron



The 154th Observation Squadron was officially organized December 8, 1917, and began its existence at Kelly Field, Texas, where it was known as the 154th Aero Squadron, "Service." This squadron was a unit of the American Expeditionary Forces, served overseas from February 25 to November 11, 1918, and was demobilized on February 1, 1919. The 154th Observation Squadron, Arkansas National Guard, a worthy son of its father, received Federal recognition on October 24, 1925, as a result of the untiring efforts of Gen. James R. Wayne, Adjutant General of the State of Arkansas, Maj. Henry Fredeman, Assistant Adjutant General, Carroll Cone, and Adrian Williamson.

The squadron insignia, consisting of an Arkansas flag with a Cherokee Indian head in the center, has been used by the squadron practically since it was organized. Its use as a distinctive uniform badge has been approved with the following changes: The Indian faces the heraldic right, his feathers are within the border of the insignia, and the stars bordering the diamond shaped Arkansas flag are in silver.

Maj. Adrian Williamson is the commanding officer of the squadron. His predecessors were Maj. Carroll Cone and Capt. Asbury W. Meadows. The squadron is now composed of twenty-two officers and seventy-one enlisted men, there being a relatively large percentage of the original squadron still on active duty. The efficiency of officer personnel is constantly maintained through an officers' training class, the class now consisting of nine cadets, who are being put through a rigorous training schedule.

Lieut. Gordon Darnell, a former officer in the squadron, was decorated in 1936 by President Roosevelt for outstanding bravery in saving the lives of several passengers when he landed a burning Braniff Airline plane. Col. Carroll Cone, formerly with the Department of Commerce, is now an Executive with Pan American Airlines. Asbury W. Meadows, Murray B. Hall, Joe T. Shumate, and Cico Cline, all former squadron members, are now with the Department of Commerce. The 154th Observation Squadron, while not the oldest of the nineteen National Guard Squadrons in the United States, has one of the best records. Its total flying time compares favorably with the others, and it holds the unique record of never having had a fatal crash. In April, 1927, the squadron received a citation from the Secretary of War for its heroic work in connection with the worst flood in the history of the state. This is the only citation in the history of the United States awarded a unit in time of peace and was in recognition of the entire squadron's untiring work in warning residents to evacuate and in allaying the suffering and hunger of thousands of flood victims. For almost three weeks planes were flown all day on errands of mercy, levees were patrolled, and at night the personnel fought to hold the levees.

In May, 1931, the squadron gained further honors in the Army Air Corps maneuvers. In preparation for the maneuvers the squadron insignia was prophetically painted on the sides of its airplanes, with the slogan, "We Lead" under it. At the beginning of the tour, in which over six hundred and fifty Army and National Guard planes participated, the Arkansas Squadron was assigned to the extreme rear of the flight, but before the flight was half finished the squadron's superior brand of flying was responsible for its being transferred to Headquarters Flight leading the Twenty-second Wing of the National Guard element.

Because of its national record of efficiency over a twelveyear period, the squadron was given a major roll in the Fourth Army maneuvers at Fort Riley, Kansas, in August, 1937. The staff of the Regular Army Cavalry Division to which it was attached stated at the conclusion of the maneuvers that with no exception, either Regular Army or National Guard, had they ever received better cooperation.

Practically all pilots and observers qualified in aerial gunnery during the 1938 field training period at Valparaiso, Florida. Over 30,000 rounds of ammunition were expended, during eight days gunnery operations, with eight airplanes believed to be a record. Total flying time amounted to (Continued on page 173)





## ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-SECOND Gield Artillery

The organization of the 142nd Field Artillery, Arkansas National Guard, was on May 25, 1898, when it was organized as the Second Arkansas Infantry, from selected companies of the Arkansas State Guard whose personnel and units could probably be traced back to the Civil War, but the majority of them were organized after the reconstruction days. The organization of the Second Arkansas Infantry was at Camp Dodge, Little Rock, by Gov. D. W. Jones, upon call of the President, received April 25, 1898; muster-in completed May 25, 1898, with 1,000 officers and men and was ordered to Chickamauga Park, Georgia, arriving there May 30, 1898, and was assigned to Second Brigade, Second Division, Third Army Corps, where it remained until September 9, 1898, when it was ordered to Camp Shipp, Anniston, Alabama. This Regiment did not engage in active service during the Spanish-American War, but it was equipped and trained for service and was mustered out as a Regiment February 25, 1899.

This Regiment was commanded by Col. Virgil Y. Cook, who was a Kentuckian, but had resided in Arkansas since 1866. Among his ancestors were veterans of the Revolution, the War of 1812, the various Indian wars and the Confederate service in the Civil War. He entered the Confederate service before fifteen years of age as a trooper in Company "H," Seventh Kentucky Cavalry, Forrest's Corps, participating in battles and campaigns of the command, and surrendered at Gainesville, Alabama, May 10, 1865. The following are a list of officers who were assigned to the Regimental Staff: Lieut. Col. DeRosey C. Cabell, Maj. Claude H. Sayle, Maj. James Junius Johnson, First Lieut. and Adj. Moorhead Wright, First Lieut. and Quartermaster Hugh Neill, Maj. and Surgeon Zaphney Orto, Maj. and Surgeon Horatio Wells, First Lieut. and Asst. Surg. E. H. Abington, First Lieut. and Asst. Surg. S. M. King, First Lieut. and Asst. Surg. R. M. Enders, Chaplain S. A. Babcock.

The following are the companies of the regiment that were organized from the Arkansas State Guard: Company "A," McCarthy Light Guards, organized in 1889 as Company "C," First Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, at Little Rock. Took prizes at various interstate drills; did arduous service in railroad strike at Little Rock in 1894; the crack Company of the state for many years. Captain Wing was one of the most active and enthusiastic militiamen of the state and commanded the Company since February, 1891.

Company "B," V. Y. Cook Rifles. Organized September 7, 1897, at Batesville as Company "A," Fourth Regiment, Arkansas State Guard; Captain Reed had served in Alabama National Guard, First Lieutenant Neill was promoted to Captain and assigned to Company "A," resigning January 4, 1898, to serve in the Arkansas Legislature.

Company "C," organized January 24, 1898, at Walnut Ridge, as Company "G," Fourth Regiment, Arkansas State Guard. This organization was commanded by Captain Medearis.

Company "D," organized September 28, 1893, as Com-

pany "D," Second Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, and was reorganized in 1897, and mustered in with the Regiment May 25, 1898.

Company "E," Fletcher Rifles. Organized March 1, 1891, as Company "D," First Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, at Little Rock. Attended State Encampment and did service in railroad strike in 1894. Reorganized in April, 1898, and mustered in with the Regiment May 25, 1898, commanded by Capt. J. J. Johnson.

Company "F," Hurley Rifles. Organized as Company "F," Second Infantry, Arkansas State Guard, February, 1894. Did service in railroad strike at Little Rock in that year; disbanded voluntarily in 1895; reorganized for service in Spanish War. This organization was commanded by Captain Stuckey.

Company "G," Cabot Guards. Organized as Company "A," First Infantry, Arkansas State Guard, September 9, 1893; afterward attached to Fourth Regiment as Company "D"; attended state encampments and served in railroad strike, 1894. This organization was commanded by Captain Granberry, who served as a private in the Second Mississippi Confederate Cavalry from September, 1862, until close of war. He has been the only captain of the Cabot Guards since its organization.

Company "H." Organized January 26, 1894, at Forrest City, as Company "I," First Regiment, Arkansas State Guard; attached to Second Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, in 1897.


Company "I," Crockett Rifles. Companies "F," "G," and "H," Fourth Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, were organized at Stuttgart, Gillett and DeWitt in 1897. Upon call for volunteers these three companies were ordered to consolidate, and were mustered in as Company "I" of the Second Arkansas. This organization was commanded by Captain Brewer.

Company "K," Clendenin Rifles. Organized September 2, as Company "A," Fourth Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, at Harrison, and equipped.

Company "L." Organized September 9, 1893, as Company "C," Second Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, at Conway. Reorganized and consolidated with a volunteer company at Morrilton for service in Spanish War, and was mustered in May 25, 1898.

Company "M," Highland Sharpshooters. Organized as Company "F," Fourth Regiment, Arkansas State Guard, at Melbourne, January, 1898, under Captain Kendrick; consolidated with volunteer company from Mountain Home, which was reorganized under Captain South, who was made commanding officer of the consolidated company, and Captain Kendrick was made First Lieutenant.

After the Spanish-American War when this Regiment was mustered out on February 25, 1899, it was not fully reorganized until 1902, and after this reorganization it did state duty and annual field training as National Guard troops until June 19, 1916, when, at the call of the President of the United States, the Regiment was mustered in on that date for service on the Mexican Border, serving (Continued on page 174)

Enlisted as Private in Company "F," Second Arkansas Infantry, October 4, 1904, and served as an enlisted man until September 1, 1905, when he was appointed First Lieutenant and assigned to Company "F," Second Arkansas Infantry. March 4, 1907, he was appointed Captain and assigned to command Company "F," Second Arkansas Infantry. He served as commanding officer of this unit until July 7, 1909, when he was promoted to Major and assigned to Adjutant General's Department as Assistant Adjutant General, serving in this capacity until January 1, 1912. On this date he resigned as Assistant Adjutant General and was appointed Captain, Infantry, and assigned as Regimental Adjutant, Second Arkansas Infantry, serving until April 19, 1912, when he was promoted to Major and assigned to command Second Battalion, Second Arkansas Infantry. On June 19, 1916, under call of the President of the United States, the Second Arkansas Infantry was ordered to the Mexican Border where he served as commander of the Second Battalion until February 22, 1917, at which time he was mustered out of Federal Service. February 23, 1917, he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and assigned to Second Arkansas Infantry as Executive Officer, serving in this capacity until March 3, 1917, when he was promoted to Colonel and assigned to command the Third Arkansas Infantry, which he commanded until August 5, 1917, at which time his regiment was drafted into Federal Service. The Third Arkansas Infantry was redesignated the 154th Infantry, and assigned to the 39th Division which Col. Compere commanded both in the United States and with the A. E. F., from August 5, 1917, to February 5, 1919, when he was mustered out of Federal Service. January 30, 1922, he accepted a commission as Colonel, Infantry, O. R. C., holding this commission until January 23, 1927. April 29, 1929, he was appointed Brigadier General, Adjutant General's Department and assigned as Adjutant General of Arkansas serving in this capacity until January 16, 1937, when he resigned. May 31, 1937, he was appointed Colonel, Field Artillery, and assigned to command the 142nd Field Artillery, Arkansas National Guard, in which capacity he is now serving. Colonel Compere is a graduate of the Brigade and Field Officers' School, 1918.

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Headquarters Battery, 142nd Field Artillery, was organized June 1, 1931, in Texarkana by First Lieut. John W. Mayo, as Headquarters Company, 153rd Infantry, was Federally recognized on the same date with nineteen men and two officers, by Maj. Floyd Hatfield. Lieutenant Mayo, a Reserve Officer in the Field Artillery since 1922, was selected by Maj. Basil E. Newton to organize and command the Headquarters Company, which had been previously disbanded at Ashdown, Ark. Second Lieut. Bert L. Faison, also a Field Artillery Reserve Officer, was selected to be second in command of the unit.

Headquarters Company, First Battalion, first went to camp in July, 1931, at Camp Pike, where the unit drew favorable comment because of the excellence of the work

of the radio section in building a two-way voice radio set which could be operated on the combat range.

In January, 1934, the unit's strength was increased to twenty-nine men. Although the primary function of the unit is communications, an excellent record has been made each year on the rifle range. In 1932 the unit won the Hill-Carruth Trophy for general efficiency and in the same year and the next year the unit won the Major Newton Trophy for the individual high marksmanship score for the Battalion.

When the 142nd Field Artillery was organized, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 153rd Infantry, was transferred and redesignated Headquarters Battery, 142nd Field Artillery, with a strength of two officers and sixty-six enlisted men. Lieutenant Mayo was transferred to the Field Artillery and promoted to Captain and Lieutenant Faison was promoted to First Lieutenant. The unit's new Armory was completed in 1936 and is one of the finest Armories in the state.

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Service Battery, 142nd Field Artillery, was organized December 5, 1923, as Service Battery, 206th Coast Artillery. The original officer personnel consisted of Capt. George F. McKinney, First Lieut. Troy Coffman and Second Lieut. Claiborne V. Wagley. The Battery was called out for relief duty in March, 1927, when the town of Green Forest was partially destroyed by a tornado and about twenty persons killed.

Captain McKinney was transferred to the National Guard Reserve on December 5, 1928, after exactly five years of service. First Lieutenant Coffman was placed in command of the Battery and promoted to Captain January

21, 1929. Second Lieutenant Wagley was promoted to First Lieutenant on the same date and Master Sgt. Charles T. Jones was promoted to Second Lieutenant September 19, 1929. After the transfer of Lieut. Charles T. Jones to the National Guard Reserve on October 2, 1933, Master Sgt. Lawrence L. Cralle was promoted to Second Lieutenant on December 1, 1933.

The Efficiency Cup for the training year ending August 31, 1936, was won by this organization, and was presented to the Battery at Camp Hulen, Texas, by Col. Elgan C. Robertson, commanding officer of the 206th Coast Artillery.

The Service Battery was transferred to the 142nd Field Artillery in its original capacity on April 28, 1937. Since the Table of Organization for a Service Battery in this type of Regiment gives the Battery two additional Second Lieutenants, Master Sgt. Herbert A. Baker and Sgt. John G. Angel were promoted to the rank of Second Lieutenant on April 28, 1927.





#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery "A," 142nd Field Artillery, was originally organized as Company "B," Second Arkansas Infantry, in 1908. The unit was ordered to the Mexican Border in June, 1916, remaining in Federal service until March, 1917.

On August 5, 1917, the Battery was again mustered into Federal service for the war with Germany and was redesignated as Battery "B," 142nd Field Artillery, in October, 1917, becoming a part of the Sixty-fourth Field Artillery Brigade, Thirty-ninth Division. Leaving the United States, for overseas duty, from Hoboken, New Jersey, September 1, 1918, the unit arrived at Brest on September 7, 1918.

After its service in France the Battery sailed from Saint-Nazaire June 3, 1919, and arrived at Newport News, Vir-

ginia, June 16, 1919. The organization was mustered out of Federal service at Camp Pike, Arkansas, on June 26, 1919, and remained an inactive unit until December 4, 1923, when it was reorganized as Battery "A," 206th Coast Artillery (AA).

Training as a Coast Artillery unit was ended when, on September 1, 1931, the organization was redesignated as Battery "A," 142nd Field Artillery.

Since 1923 the organization has participated in the field training of its Regiment at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Camp Pike, Arkansas, Fort Barrancas, Florida, and Fort Riley, Kansas. Capt. James L. Shearer, commander, began his service in Company "B," Second Arkansas Infantry, as a private in 1913 and has been active since that time.

The unit points with pride to the number of officers serving in both the Regular Army and the National Guard who started their military career as members of this organization.

### FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery "B," 142nd Field Artillery, was recognized as Battery "E," 206th Coast Artillery (AA), May 18, 1927, and was redesignated Battery "B," 142nd Field Artillery, September 2, 1931.

First Lieut. Jerome F. Thompson of Battery "A," 206th Coast Artillery, organized Battery "E," and upon its organization was appointed Captain and assigned to command the unit, with Samuel J. Watkins as First Lieutenant and William C. Smith as Second Lieutenant. This unit attended two field training camps at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, one at Camp McRae, Arkansas, and two at Fort Barrancas, Florida.

On September 2, 1931, it was redesignated Battery "B," 142nd Field Artillery, with Captain Thompson as Battery

commander, assisted by First Lieutenant Watkins and Second Lieuts. Paul B. Tidball and William H. Tweedy. Lieutenant Tweedy resigned in 1933 and Lieut. William Smith, one of the original officers of the old Battery, was re-commissioned to succeed him. Lieutenant Smith had resigned from Battery "E," 206th Coast Artillery, in 1930.

Field training camps were attended at Camp McRae, Ark., in 1932 and 1933 and at Fort Riley, Kan., each year since. On April 20, 1936, Captain Thompson was appointed Major and assigned to command the First Battalion, 142nd Field Artillery. He was succeeded by First Lieutenant Watkins, who commanded the Battery for a year. He resigned and was succeeded by the present commander, Capt. James T. Phillips.

Captain Phillips started his military career at the University of Arkansas as a member of the R. O. T. C. He was one of the original enlisted men of Battery "A," 206th Coast Artillery, and is a graduate of the Battery Officers' course, School of Fire, Field Artillery School, Fort Sill, Oklahoma.





### FACTUAL HISTORY

With the organization of the 206th Coast Artillery (AA) completed and Federal recognition granted during November, 1923, Battery "G" of the 141st Machine Gun Battalion (AA), which had been recognized June 23, 1921, was redesignated as Battery "G" of the 206th Coast Artillery December 1, 1923, and located at Ozark, Arkansas.

The organization was again redesignated as Battery "G," 206th Coast Artillery, April 22, 1924, and was disbanded May 25, 1924. With the disbandment at Ozark, the organization was moved to Fort Smith, Arkansas, and was recognized as Battery "G," 206th Coast Artillery, May 26, 1924. Capt. Weston A. Price was placed in command June 16, 1924.



For a period of almost twelve years this organization functioned as a unit of the Coast Artillery. On April 20, 1936, the organization was redesignated as Battery "C" of the 142nd Field Artillery.

During the time it was a Coast Artillery unit, the unit was called upon once for emergency duty. On April 12, 1927, Fort Smith was struck by a tornado, causing considerable damage, and three officers and sixty-one enlisted men of the Company performed volunteer service in the stricken area. Since the unit has been a part of the Field Artillery, it has been called out but once for official duty. On January 28, 1937, at 7 A.M., the men were called out for flood duty at Harrisburg, Arkansas. Two officers and fifty-six men made the trip to Harrisburg, about 300 miles northeast of Fort Smith, arriving there about midnight. After seven days of service one officer and thirty-six of the men returned home. The others remained until February 7. Capt. Weston A. Price and Lieut. Raymond T. Chapman were the officers in command of the unit.

### FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery "D," 142nd Field Artillery, was Federally recognized June 21, 1921, as the Howitzer Company, Fifth Arkansas Infantry, with Capt. Grady H. Forgy in command and First Lieut. Jesse E. Bishop second in command. The Tables of Organization at that time made no provision for a Second Lieutenant in the Howitzer Company.

On October 25, 1921, the official designation of the unit was changed to the Howitzer Company, 153rd Infantry, with the same officer personnel. In addition to the present officers of the organization, First Lieut. Sam M. Ridling and First Lieut. Harry E. Dean have served as officers in the Battery.

### FACTUAL HISTORY





In 1916 the Arkansas National Guard troops responded to a call to protect the lives of American citizens on the Mexican Border. The First Arkansas Infantry was mobilized at Fort Logan H. Roots June 19, 1916, and sent to Deming, N. M. They were mustered out in February, 1917, the final muster coming a week before the call to prepare for the First Officers' Training Camp at Fort Logan H. Roots.

At the time the Arkansas National Guard was drafted into service at the beginning of the World War it consisted of 110 officers and 6,317 men. The First Arkansas Infantry was mobilized for World War service March 31, 1917.

In August, 1917, Col. Charles D. James, the Commanding Officer, moved the Regiment to Camp Pike for guard duty, from where they went to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana. There the Regiment, filled to more than 3,800, became the 153rd Infantry. In May, 1918, the enlisted men were sent to France as replacement troops. The 153rd Infantry officially was ordered overseas with the A. E. F. in July, 1918, by War Department order.

Upon reaching France, the Thirty-ninth Division, of which the 153rd Infantry was a part, was made into a Depot Division and the 153rd Infantry was stripped to a training cadre and stationed at Chery-Lury and surrounding towns, with headquarters at Chery. On October 31, 1918, the entire Thirty-ninth Division was broken up and the personnel sent forward as replacements; one man per company was returned to the States with the records of the organization. The 153rd Infantry was officially mustered out at Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, in January, 1919.

Following the Armistice, November 11, 1918, the troops that had formerly formed the 153rd Infantry were scattered throughout the United States Army and were discharged individually.

The Fifth Arkansas Infantry was organized from men and officers of the old 153rd Infantry per Special Order, No. 1, January 3, 1920, in accordance with letter 325, 4-E-Arkansas, M. B., W. D., December 17, 1919.

The Fifth Arkansas Infantry was redesignated 153rd Infantry per G. O., 63, A. G. O., October 25, 1921, in accordance with M. B., W. D., Letter of October 21, 1921.

Brewer. Several non-commissioned officers were transferred to this organization to form the nucleus and the unit was recruited at once to its full strength of five officers and thirty-one enlisted men.

In the past ten years the organization has functioned with the regiment in the field and has been present to participate in all problems and maneuvers in the dual role of caring for the health of the regiment and getting the benefit of field training.

During the flood of 1937 the Medical Detachment was ordered on duty at Forrest City, where it established and operated a complete hospital in addition to rendering first aid to thousands of refugees. The Detachment has also aided the Sheriff on occasions and participated in all appropriate civic occasions.

The organization is fortunate in having a high morale and enjoys an *esprit de corps* far above the average. The enlisted personnel have become so proficient in the discharge of their duties that they can function ably without the officers. Although first aid is the primary work of the Detachment, the officers and men can do "soldier" right along with the regiment, and are able to enter into all the activities of the other units.

At present the Detachment consists of four Medical officers, one Dental officer and twenty-seven enlisted men. The enlisted personnel consists of one college graduate, one man with two years of college, eighteen high school graduates, and with all the others having from one to three years of high school education.

Quinney, with a full strength of twenty-nine men. First Lieut. Carroll C. King was placed in command June 25, 1926. The Company's first camp was made the next month, and though the men had been handicapped in preparatory training because of the lack of Armory facilities, the Company made a creditable showing and was complimented by the Colonel and the Regular Army instructors.

Soon after the Company's return from camp, suitable Armory facilities were secured and the Company has made a satisfactory showing since that time. The Company further distinguished itself by its record at Fort Riley, Kansas, in 1937, when it maintained all branches of communication under field conditions at all times without the loss of a single item of clothing or equipment and without a single man reporting on sick list. Every member of the Company has a high school education or better, with a large number being college graduates.

27, 1926, as Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 153rd Infantry.

Mart M. Young was commissioned First Lieutenant and placed in command and Lieutenant Harris was promoted to Captain and transferred to the Regimental Staff. On May 24, 1926, Dave C. Abington was commissioned a Second Lieutenant to fill the vacancy that had existed since organization. In August, 1927, the unit moved into the first state-owned Armory in the Regiment.

On June 30, 1928, the officers and sixteen men were detailed to the Big Lake district to assist in patroling levees and protecting property. These duties were efficiently performed until July 14, 1928, the date of relief. At present there are only five officers and men in the company who were members at that time.

Since its present designation the unit has attended field training at Camp Joseph T. Robinson, with the exception of 1937, when it attended the Fourth Army maneuvers at Fort Riley, Kansas. In 1936 the unit was on duty in Little Rock acting as guards during the visit of President Roosevelt. The unit performed a like duty in 1937 at the inauguration of Governor Bailey; and was charged with the care of traffic on the Capitol grounds when the body of Senator Robinson lay in state.

The strength of the Company has varied between eighteen and forty-two men, and, since its present designation, has discharged approximately 180 trained men.

now prominent in official circles in Washington, as Captain. Captain Cone was replaced by the late Capt. Sam J. Trimble, who was in turn followed by Capt. Harry Wilson.

Captain Wilson was succeeded in command by Capt. Freelin Christopher, but later returned to the Company and was in charge during the 1927 flood when the Company carried on splendid work in Pine Bluff and throughout Jefferson County. When Captain Wilson left the Company a second time, Lieut. Bob Hampton was in command for several months until his displacement by Capt. Clell Dildy. Captain Dildy moved from Pine Bluff in 1929 after a short term of service with the Company, and Lieut. Hillery Rudder was the only commissioned officer with the outfit. At this time Capt. R. M. Roe, present commander, was placed in command of the Company.

# CONTINUATION OF HISTORIES

Soon after Captain Roe assumed command, Company "D," machine gun company, became Company "I," rifle company, and has remained so to date. It is commanded at present by Captain Roe, First Lieut. Walter O. Tillman and Second Lieut. Thomas L. Baynham.

Detachment, Second Battalion, 206th Coast Artillery (AA), April 22, 1924. First Lieut. James P. Dunklin was in command until March 18, 1936, at which time the unit was transferred to Monticello.

The Detachment was again recognized on March 18, 1936, the officers and enlisted men being sworn in by Maj. Carl S. Doney, C. A. C. Second Lieut. Crawford R. Mc-Lellan was transferred from Battery "B," 206th Coast Artillery (AA) to the command, and three enlisted men from Battery "B" were transferred to act as non-commissioned officers. The total enlisted strength allotted was eighteen men. Second Lieutenant McLellan was recognized as First Lieutenant on June 30, 1936.

363.35 hours. During camp all pilots were given an opportunity to fly the new 047A North American observation plane, and handled the ship satisfactorily. Two of these ships have just been delivered to the squadron and five more are to follow as soon as possible. In memory and honor of Capt. George G. Adams, deceased, who died in line of duty, the name of the Little Rock Municipal Airport has been changed to "Adams Field."

Brooksher as the Medical Department Detachment, 206th Coast Artillery (AA), being Federally recognized as such on December 18, 1924. Of the original complement of officers and enlisted men, none remains with the organization. The last of the original roster of enlisted men completed service in 1937.

Capt. J. T. Mathews is the senior commissioned officer on duty with the organization, having been assigned to the unit in 1927. During the period in which the unit was attached to the 206th Coast Artillery, the organization uniformly received the highest ratings on Federal inspections. Among the posts at which summer training has been carried out are Camp Pike, Arkansas; Fort Barrancas, Florida; Fort Sill, Oklahoma; and Fort Sheridan, Illinois.

With the expansion of the 142nd Field Artillery to a Regiment, the Medical unit was transferred and Federally recognized April 20, 1936, as the Medical Department Detachment, 142nd Field Artillery, with Lieut. W. D. Powell as commanding officer.

from the Third Battalion to the First, thereby forming a complete Battalion at Fayetteville. Its redesignation from Third Battalion to First Battalion took place on July 15, 1937.

The nucleus of the Battery was drawn from Battery "A," 142nd Field Artillery, and the unit was organized under the supervision of Marc A. Stice, who had previously commanded Battery "A." Lieut. Lincoln M. Cummings, second in command, was transferred from the Infantry Reserve. First Sgt. Edward A. Lehman had been a gunnery sergeant in Battery "A" and Communications Sergeant Frank M. Hinkle had served in similar capacity in Battery "B." Sgt. Arch K. Adams had also been transferred from Battery "B." The balance of the personnel had seen no previous service.

In spite of its limited training the Battery was able to take part in the Fourth Army maneuvers at Fort Riley, Kansas, in August, 1937, three months after its organization, and to acquit itself creditably. At its first Federal inspection the unit received a "Satisfactory" rating, with a special paragraph on training and equipment.
