



The State Staff was accorded Federal recognition on January 1, 1922. Prior to that date there were a number of officers commissioned in the Iowa National Guard who, without Federal status, supervised the administration and supply of the state troops.

The State Staff consists of nine officers, including the Adjutant General. They are assigned various duties in connection with the administration, supply, training and paying of the Iowa National Guard.

In a time of national emergency, the State Staff, assisted by the enlisted personnel of the State Detachment, would be charged, first: with the mobilization of the National Guard, the organization of inactive units, recruiting to authorized strength, supervising the transition from State to Federal troops; and second, with the administration of the selective service law which would be passed by Congress.

During the Armory drill year, the members of the State Staff, in addition to performing duties assigned them by the Adjutant General, meet in conference to study the part they would play in a national emergency.

All officers of the State Staff are well grounded in their respective duties and have enjoyed long periods of commissioned service.

# Camp Dodge

Camp Dodge is located approximately ten miles northwest of the city of Des Moines. It was named in honor of Major General Grenville M. Dodge, native Iowan, and one of the most brilliant military minds on the Union side during the War of the Rebellion.

The reservation comprises approximately 3,000 acres of land, of which 578 acres are property of the State of Iowa, the balance having been purchased by the Federal government.

The Iowa National Guard, except the 185th Artillery, trains on the reservation each year. Here, also, is located the State Arsenal and warehouses, and the office of the United States Property and Disbursing Officer. A fifty-target rifle range, with all ranges including 1,000 yards, is maintained. Fifty mess halls were constructed in 1922, and since that date other buildings have been erected.

During the World War the Eighty-eighth Division, National Army, trained on this site, and more than 30,000 soldiers were trained here.


The camp, proper, is constructed on a level tract of ground between two ranges of hills. There are many trees which provide an abundance of shade on the hot August days during the field training period. Ample maneuver space is available on the reservation. The sandy soil quickly absorbs water, so training is not hindered to an appreciable degree by rainfall.

Improvements are being made yearly. The Iowa National Guard justly boasts of having one of the finest training camps in the country, both as to facilities and natural beauty.

### THE IOWA

Capitol located at Des Moines, 1857. Cornerstone laid, November 23, 1871. Total cost: \$3,292,256. Length: 363 feet, 8 inches. Width: 246 feet, 11 inches. Height to top of dome: 275 feet. Diameter of rotunda: 66 feet, 8 inches. Foundation and basement built of Iowa stone. Main superstructure stone from Carrol County, and St. Genevieve, Missouri

Carrol County, and St. Genevieve, Missouri. Twenty-nine kinds of domestic and imported marble used for finishing. Wood is mainly lowa black walnut, butternut, cherry, oak and catalpa. The original site for the Capitol was given the State and covered about four blocks.

### CAPITOL






The old guns located on the grounds were taken in the Spanish-American War or are relics of a more ancient vintage.



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The Headquarters of the Thirty-fourth Division was first organized at Camp Cody, New Mexico, July 15, 1917. National Guard organizations of the States of Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, North Dakota, and Nebraska had been assembled and were training for oversea service.

It was not until late in the summer of 1918 that the Division arrived overseas, the last units landing in October, 1918. The Division as a whole saw no combat service, although some of the components and a great number of its individuals were engaged. On October 17, 1918, the Division was skeletonized and its components were scattered to other organizations; some units remaining intact and the personnel of other units being used as replacements.


Following the Armistice, a considerable period of time OTOVV2 was required to return such a widely dispersed organization to the United States. The first units of the Division sailed for the United States on Christmas Eve, 1918, and the last arrived in Newport News late in June, 1919.

The Division was mustered out at Camp Dodge, Iowa, and at Camp Grant, Illinois. The World War Commanders of the Thirty-fourth Division were: Maj. Gen. Augustus P. Blocksom, Brig. Gen. Frank G. Mauldin, Brig. Gen. Hubert A. Allen, Brig. Gen. John A. Johnston, Maj. Gen. Beaumont B. Buck.

Upon the reorganization of the National Guard following the World War, certain units of the National Guard of Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota and North Dakota were assigned to the Thirty-fourth Division. By 1924 a sufficient number had been Federally recognized to meet the War Department requirements for the appointment of a Division Commander and the organization of a staff.

The Governors of the states concerned unanimously agreed that Brig. Gen. Mathew A. Tinley, then commanding the Sixty-seventh Infantry Brigade, should be the first Division Commander and accordingly he was promoted Major General, Iowa National Guard, and assigned to the command of the Thirty-fourth Division on July 14, 1924. The vacancies on the newly created Thirty-fourth Division Staff were allotted to the four states in accordance with the number of troops furnished to the Division. While minor changes have been made from time to time in accordance with changes in Tables of Organization and for expediency, the following vacancies were allotted to the State of Iowa as of July 1, 1938: Division Commander, Major General; Assistant Chief of Staff, G1, Lieutenant Colonel; Adjutant General, Lieutenant Colonel; Finance Officer, Lieutenant Colonel; Ordnance Officer, Lieutenant Colonel; Chemical Officer, Lieutenant Colonel; Postal Officer, First Lieutenant; Two Aides, First Lieutenants.

In 1935, during the month of September, a detachment of the headquarters consisting of the Division Commander, (Continued on page 235)



#### MAJOR GENERAL MATHEW A. TINLEY

Commanding Thirty-Fourth Division

Mathew Adrian Tinley enlisted as a Private in Company "L," Third Iowa Infantry, on June 4, 1894. After serving through the various non-commis-sioned grades, he was present with the Company at its mobilization in Des Moines on April 26, 1898, as a part of the Fifty-first Iowa Volunteer Infantry for service in the Spanish-American War. On May 9, 1898, he was honorably discharged to accept a commission as Second Lieutenant; and in that grade was mustered into Federal service. He served through-out the Spanish-American War and the Philippine Insurrection, taking part in the engagements at San Roque, Qunigua, Guadupe Church, East and West Pullian, Calumpit, San Thomas, San Fernando, Calulut and Angeles. He was promoted First Lieutenant on August 5, 1899, while in the Philip-pines; sailed for the United States in command of Company "L," Fifty-first Iowa Volunteer Infantry, on September 22, 1899; and was mustered out of Federal service November 22, 1899. He was appointed Captain. Fifty-first Iowa Infantry, on January 18, 1900.



He was appointed Captain, Fifty-first lowa Infantry, on January 18, 1900, and reorganized Company "L," which he commanded until February 17, 1902, when he was promoted Major, Fifty-first lowa Infantry. He was as-signed to the command of the Third Battalion of the Fifty-first lowa In-fantry, which was shortly thereafter designated the Fifty-fifth lowa Infantry. Having resumed the study of medicine, which had been interrupted by his Spanish War service, he was graduated from the University of Nebraska with a degree of Doctor of Medicine in the summer of 1902. On September 23, 1909, he was promoted Lieutenant Colonel and second in command of the Fifty-fifth lowa Infantry. This Regiment was redesignated the Third lowa Infantry on July 4, 1915, and was Federalized for service on the Mexican Border on June 20, 1916. Upon being mustered out of Federal service on February 20, 1917, he returned to state service and was detailed to take the Musketry course at the School of Fire, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, which he completed in July, 1917. Being mustered into Federal service a third time on August 6, 1917, he was detailed as a member of the advance party of the 168th Infantry, Forty-second (Rainbow) Division, American Expedition-ary Force. ary Force.


ary Force. He served as Lieutenant Colonel, 168th Infantry, A. E. F., until October 17, 1918, when he was promoted Colonel and assigned to the command of that Regiment. He commanded the 168th Infantry throughout the remainder of the war and during its tour with the Army of Occupation in Germany, being stationed at Hiederbreisig. After approximately two years' service overseas, he returned to the United States with the Regiment and was mustered out at Camp Dodge on May 16, 1919. He was carried on the Initial General Staff Corps Eligible List published by the War Department in 1920. (Continued on page 235)

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Headquarters Company, Thirty-fourth Division, was organized late in 1920 as Headquarters Company, 168th Infantry, and received Federal recognition as such on May 5, 1921, under the command of Capt. Harry C. Crowl.



The Sixty-seventh Infantry Brigade is composed of Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Company and the 133rd and 168th Infantry Regiments. This Brigade's history cannot be directly traced to early day military organizations, although the present Brigade is in reality the outgrowth of the combination, redesignation and reorganization of all Infantry units since post Civil War days.

During the Mexican Border campaign, the Iowa Brigade was composed of the First, Second and Third Regiments of Infantry. At the outbreak of the World War the Third Infantry was redesignated the 168th Infantry and assigned to the Forty-second (Rainbow) Division. The First Infantry was assigned to the Thirty-fourth Division and redesignated the 133rd Infantry, one of the Regiments of the wartime Sixty-seventh Brigade.

Following the World War the various Infantry units in the state were combined into regiments and given the collective designation of Sixty-seventh Brigade. The first post-war brigade commander was Brig. Gen. Mathew A. Tinley. Upon his promotion to Major General and division commander, Col. Lloyd D. Ross, who then commanded the 133rd Infantry, was promoted to Brigadier General and assigned to command the Brigade.



# ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-THIRD Infantry



Organized as the Eighth Regiment, Iowa National Guard, in 1879, the present 133rd Infantry originally had units in Boonsboro, Grinnell, Marshalltown, State Center, Gilman, Eldora and Sheldahl. In 1881 the organization was redesignated as the First Regiment.

Its baptism of fire came in 1898. On June 2 of that year, the Regiment was mustered into Federal service for the War with Spain in Cuba. It was then redesignated as the Forty-ninth Iowa Volunteer Infantry and served in Cuba from December 22, 1898, to April 5, 1899. In 1915, by consolidation of units from the Fifty-third and Fiftyfourth Infantries, the unit became the First Infantry.

The Regiment saw Mexican Border service in 1916 and in the following year was mustered into Federal service for the World War. The Regiment left the United States in October, 1918, went to France and returned in January, 1919. Under the provisions of General Orders No. 16, War Dept., 1921, as amended, the Regiment is entitled to a World War streamer, without inscription.

After the World War followed a series of redesignations, the Regiment being known as the 134th Infantry and finally in 1921 it was designated as the 133rd Infantry as part of the Sixtyseventh Infantry Brigade. The Regiment now has units in Cedar Rapids, Dubuque, Waterloo, Fairfield, Mason City, Webster City, Fort Dodge, Sheldon, Le Mars, Cedar Falls and Sioux City. Col. Gordon C. Hollar, who has seen nearly thirty years service in the Iowa National Guard, is the commanding officer and maintains his headquarters at Sioux City. Colonel Hollar is surrounded by a staff of World War veterans. Noteworthy is the (Continued on page 42)



fact that only three changes have taken place in his staff since he took command of the Regiment in July, 1927. One change came through death, another through retirement for age and a third through transfer to a company of the Regiment.

In 1935 the War Department by letter dated May 24 officially approved the blazonry of the coat of arms for the Regiment. The official description of the regimental insignia reads: "Argent, a Spanish castle debased gules, to chief of fleur-de-lis of the like and on a mount a giant cactus vert." The Spanish castle is indicative of the participation of the Regiment in the Spanish-American War; the giant cactus of Mexican Border service and the fleur-de-lis of service with the Allies in France. Across the bottom of the crest appears the official Regimental motto: "Avauncez," meaning "Forward."

At the outbreak of the Spanish-American War in 1898 the Company was called out with the rest of the Iowa National Guard. After a month in camp at Des Moines, the Second Infantry was converted into the Fiftieth Iowa Infantry and as such mustered into Federal service May 17, 1898. The Regiment received orders to entrain for Tampa, Florida, with Cuba its destination, but the orders were later changed and the Regiment never left the United States. It was mustered out of service November 1, 1898.

Following the war a new Company was formed in Fairfield, with Charles Magill in command. This Company was designated Company "M," Fifty-fourth Iowa Infantry. Captain Magill resigned shortly after formation of the Company and his place was taken by Lieut. E. E. Lucas. On June 20, 1916, the Company was ordered out to Camp Dodge for service on the Mexican Border. Its station on the Border was Brownsville, Texas. On January 15, 1917, the Company was mustered out at Des Moines and returned to its state status.



# FACTUAL HISTORY

Company "A," 133rd Infantry, has a glorious history of volunteer service that dates back to 1832, when a group of military-minded citizens organized the first volunteer unit in the state of Iowa. The unit served without pay or compensation of any kind.

In 1858 Judge Hempstead reorganized the Company and was elected its Captain. The following year Captain Hempstead was elected governor of Iowa and the Company adopted the name "Governor's Greys." The present Company still goes by that name. In 1861, while commanded by Capt. F. J. Herron, the "Governor's Greys" was the first military unit to offer its services to the President in the

Civil War. It tendered its services January 14, 1861, and was accepted, and in the ensuing battles and campaigns of the war distinguished itself by bravery and loyalty. Captain Herron was later promoted to Major General.


Company "A" served in Cuba in 1898 as a unit of the Forty-ninth Iowa Volunteer Infantry. At the close of the war the Company was reorganized and remained active during the inervening years to 1916, when it was again drafted for Federal service and served on the Mexican Border as a part of the First Iowa Infantry.

In August, 1917, while the Company was in training at Camp Dodge, Iowa, the bulk of its members were transferred to units of the 168th Infantry and it was redesignated Company "A," 133rd Infantry. The Company was again reorganized in September, 1920, under the command of. Capt. Kendall Burch. Capt. George C. Flanders, the present commander, assumed command upon the resignation of Captain Burch in December, 1922.



# FACTUAL HISTORY

Company "B," 133rd Infantry, was originally organized at Waterloo in July, 1862, as Company "C," Thirty-second Iowa Infantry. Commanded by Capt. Hubert F. Peebles, the Company served with distinction in the Civil War, participating in twelve battles and losing one officer and nineteen men in action. Following the war the Company was reorganized at Jesup, a town ten miles east of Waterloo, but was later moved back to Waterloo.

At the time of the Spanish-American War the designation of the unit was Company "B," Forty-ninth Infantry, and as such it served in Cuba under command of Capt. Frank R. Fisher. Four men were lost during this

tour of active duty. After the war the Company was reorganized and redesignated as Company "B," Fiftythird Iowa Infantry. In 1915 the Regiment was redesignated the First Iowa Infantry. As a part of this Regiment the Company served on the Mexican Border, under the command of Capt. George Weilein.

During the World War Company "B" followed the colors as Company "B," 133rd Infantry, which designation it now bears. At the time the 168th Infantry was organized about sixty men were transferred from Company "B" to the new Regiment. The Company served in France, but was not a combat unit.

The Company has always been noted for its marksmanship, and the names of Donnelson, Dubine, Saunders, Crowell, Durchenwald, Wing, Hoffman, Nicolas, Van Gorder, Carey, Ames, and Ralston are familiar to shooters as being among the best.



# FACTUAL HISTORY

Company "C," 133rd Infantry, was organized as Company "C," First Iowa Infantry, in 1903, and was extended Federal recognition June 3, 1916, when it was called into service for the Mexican Border campaign. In October, 1917, the unit was redesignated Company "C," 133rd Infantry, only to lose its identity by serving as replacement troops during the World War.

In October, 1918, a new Company was organized in Cedar Rapids, designated as Company "K," Fourth In-

fantry. The Company was extended recognition May 10, 1919, later to be redesignated Company "C," 133rd Infantry, July 11, 1921. The Company has maintained a consistently high standard in its training activities, and has participated in all encampments and field training. In 1931 the Company served in Cedar and Des Moines Counties for the duration of the cattle war.

Due to its participation in many local activities this Company is recognized as a valuable asset in the civic affairs of its community. Five members of the organization have in the past few years been examined and accepted for West Point Military Academy. One of the outstanding features of the Company's organization is the fact that the present officer personnel has served continuously with the Company since its reorganization. The Company is now commanded by Capt. John F. Currell and is quartered in Cedar Rapids' million-dollar Memorial Coliseum.





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
