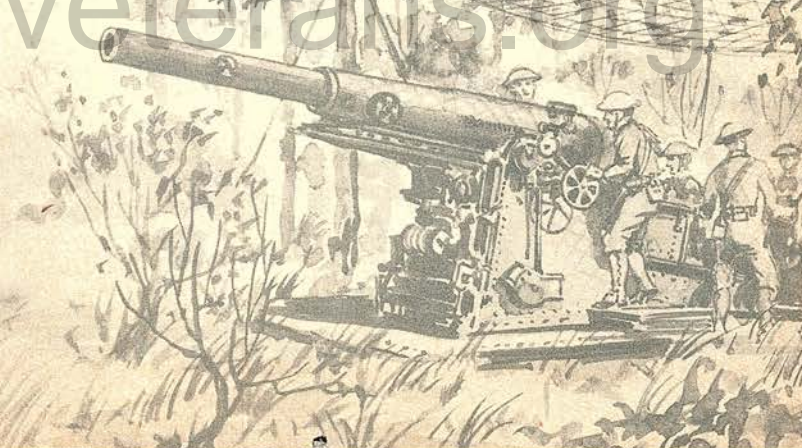

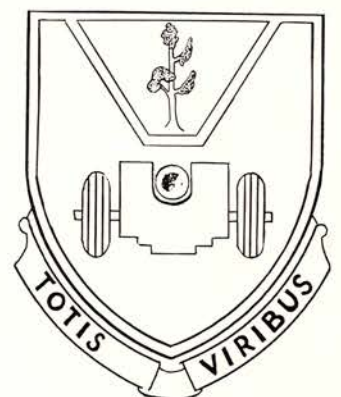
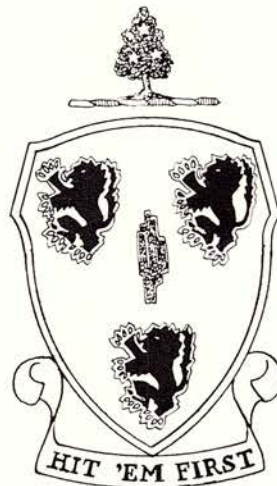

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Graduate Central High School, Washington, D. C., 1909; A.B. George Washington University, 1913. Commissioned 2nd Lieutenant of Cavalry, October 4, 1913. Served at various stations on the Mexican border with the 13th U. S. Cavalry, 1913 to 1916. Crossed the border into Mexico under General Pershing with the Punitive Expedition in Mexico, March 21, 1916. Promoted to 1st Lieutenant, July 1, 1916, and to Captain, May 15, 1917.

During World War I, commanded Battery E, 79th Field Artillery, at Camp Logan, Texas, and later Assistant Director, Department of Reconnaissance, School of Fire for Field Artillery, Fort Sill, Oklahoma. Promoted to Major of Cavalry, National Army, June 21, 1918. Transferred to Field Artillery, July 1, 1920. After the war, assisted in the organization of the Field Artillery unit, Reserve Officers' Training Corps, at Cornell University, and was stationed there from January, 1919, to July, 1922.

Graduate of the Advanced Course, Field Artillery School, 1923. Executive Officer of the 13th Field Artillery, Schofield Barracks, T. H., August, 1923, to April, 1926. Distinguished Graduate, Command and General Staff School, 1927. Commanded Field Artillery Unit, R. O. T. C., Cornell University, 1927 to 1932. Graduate, Army Industrial College, 1933. Senior Instructor of Field Artillery, New Jersey National Guard, Trenton, New Jersey, 1933-1938. Promoted to Lieutenant Colonel of Field Artillery, August, 1935. Commanded 1st Battalion, 3rd Field Artillery, Fort Riley, Kansas, August, 1938, to June, 1941. Artillery Officer, Second Cavalry Division, June to December, 1941. Promoted to temporary Colonel of Field Artillery, July 1, 1941. Commanded 75th Field Artillery Brigade since December 16, 1941.


To the officers and men of the 75th Field Artillery Brigade:

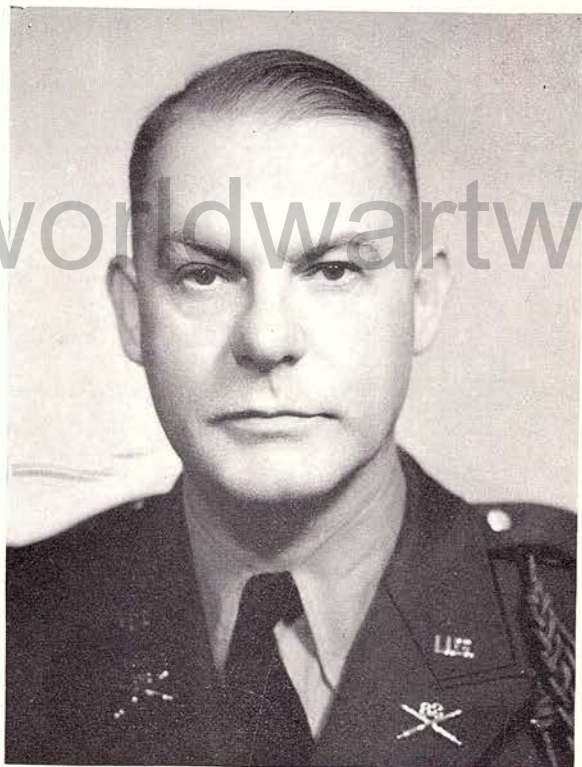
Appointed Captain, Cavalry, June 1, 1915, and assigned to command Troop C, 1st Cavalry, Iowa National Guard. Reported duty call of President of June 18, 1916, on June 20, 1916. Mustered into U. S. service July 19, 1916; mustered out, March 8, 1917. Reported duty call of President of July 3, 1917, on July 15, 1917. Mustered into U. S. service July 30, 1917; drafted into U. S. service August 5, 1917. Served overseas from September 25, 1918, to January 5, 1919. Honorably discharged January 29, 1919, convenience of the Government, services no longer required.

Appointed Captain, Cavalry, May 26, 1921, and assigned to Hq. 1st Cavalry, Iowa National Guard. Federal recognition as Captain, Cavalry, extended May 26, 1921. (Designation of 1st Cavalry changed to 113th Cavalry, November 1, 1921.) Promoted to Major, Cavalry, July 16, 1922, and assigned to command 1st Squadron, 113th Cavalry, Iowa N. G. Federal recognition as Major, Cavalry, extended August 10, 1922. Promoted to Colonel, Cavalry, April 25, 1930, and assigned to command 113th Cavalry. Federal recognition as Colonel, Cavalry, extended April 25, 1930. Promoted to Brigadier General of the Line and assigned to command 57th Cavalry Brigade, March 24, 1936. Federal recognition as Brigadier General of the Line extended March 24, 1936. (Hq. 58th Cavalry Brigade disbanded September 15, 1940.)

Rendered surplus and attached to Hq. 67th Infantry Brigade, September 16, 1940. Relieved from assignment with Hq. 67th Infantry Brigade and assigned to Headquarters 34th Division (Part). Relieved from duty with Hq. 34th Division January 15, 1941, and attached to State Staff for administrative purposes, January 16, 1941. Ordered to active duty February 24, 1941, by direction of the President.

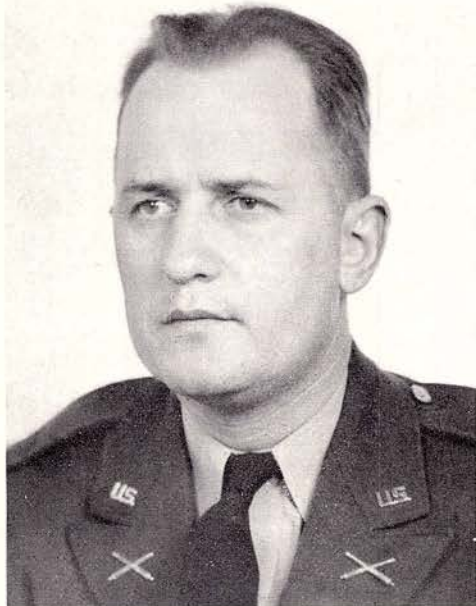

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

# History of the 75th Field Artillery Brigade

The 75th Field Artillery Brigade came into being February 24, 1941. It is comprised of the 168th Field Artillery, 155-gun (tractor drawn) from Colorado, the 181st Field Artillery and 191st Field Artillery, 155-howitzer (truck drawn) from Tennessee. The Brigade was designated as Corps Artillery of the VII Corps. It was first commanded by Brigadier General Raymond A. Yenter, formerly of the 24th Cavalry Division.

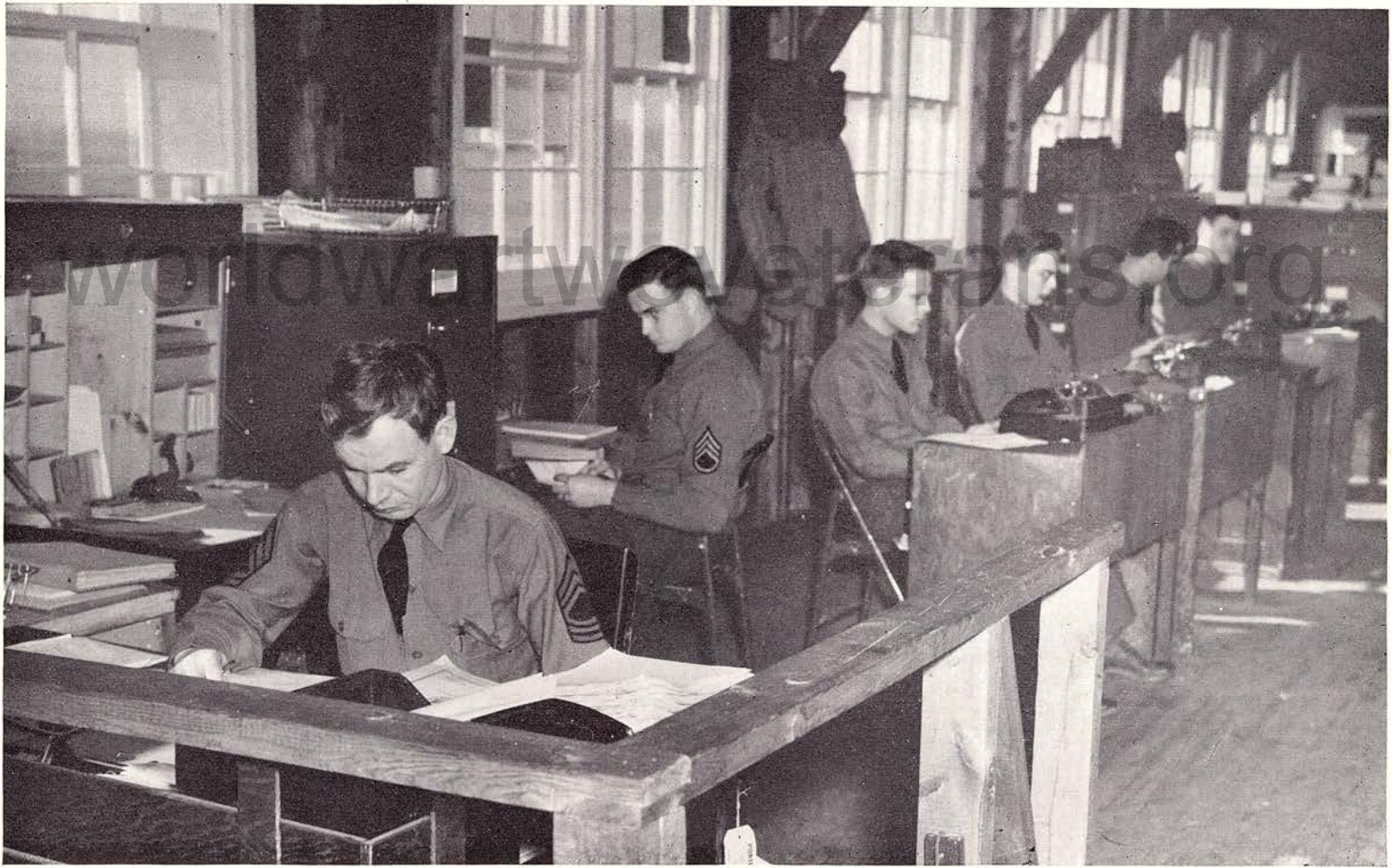
The regiments began to arrive at Camp Forrest about March 3rd which was a newly-constructed camp and was a veritable sea of mud. It was necessary to build duck-boards running from the roads to the barracks to allow the men and officers to enter without sinking calf-deep in soft, oozing, yellow mud.

After the Brigade was assembled at Camp Forrest, Tennessee, and after its initial shake-down, it entered on the 13 weeks' intensive training. Guns and equipment borrowed from neighboring artillery regiments served until finally equipment began to arrive for the Brigade. After a long wait, the Brigade was partially equipped with most needed material, and sub-caliber and service practice started. Many overnight bivouacs with RSOP's were accomplished.

In July, our first allotment of selectees arrived, and by the end of the month the Brigade was brought up to its authorized strength.

August 14, 1941, found the Brigade on the road to the Arkansas-Louisiana maneuvers.

The Brigade functioned as Corps Artillery of the VII Army Corps throughout the entire maneuver with credit and returned to Camp Forrest, Tennessee, on October 7th. Since its return the Brigade has embarked on another strenuous training program.

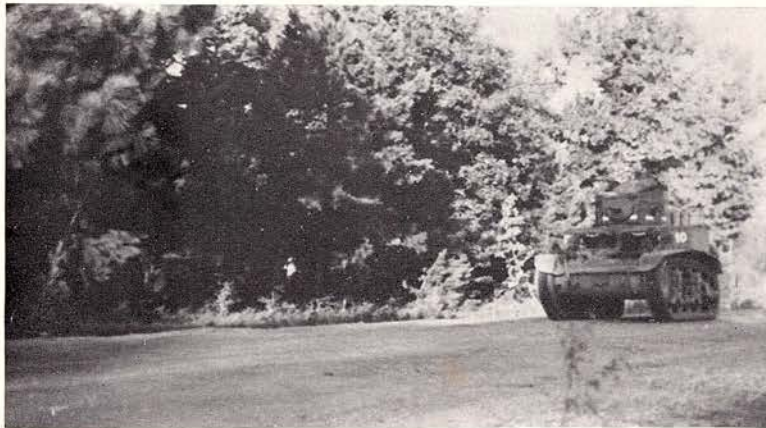

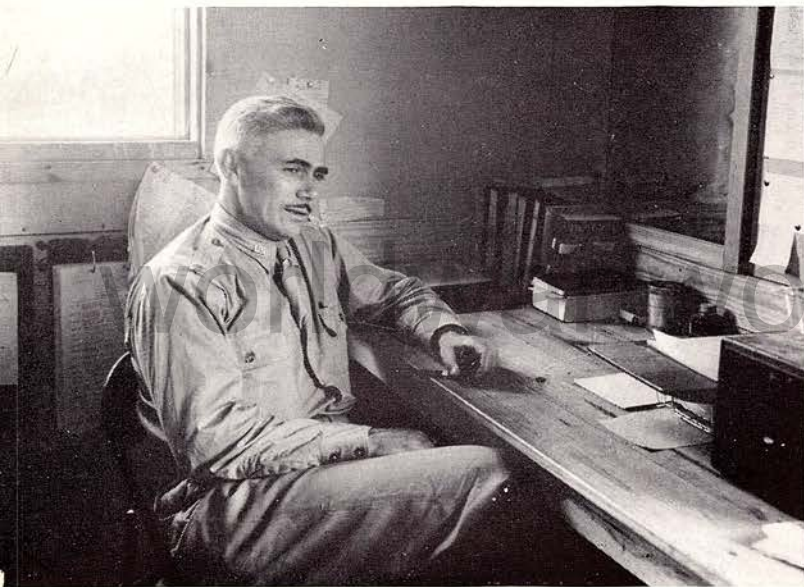

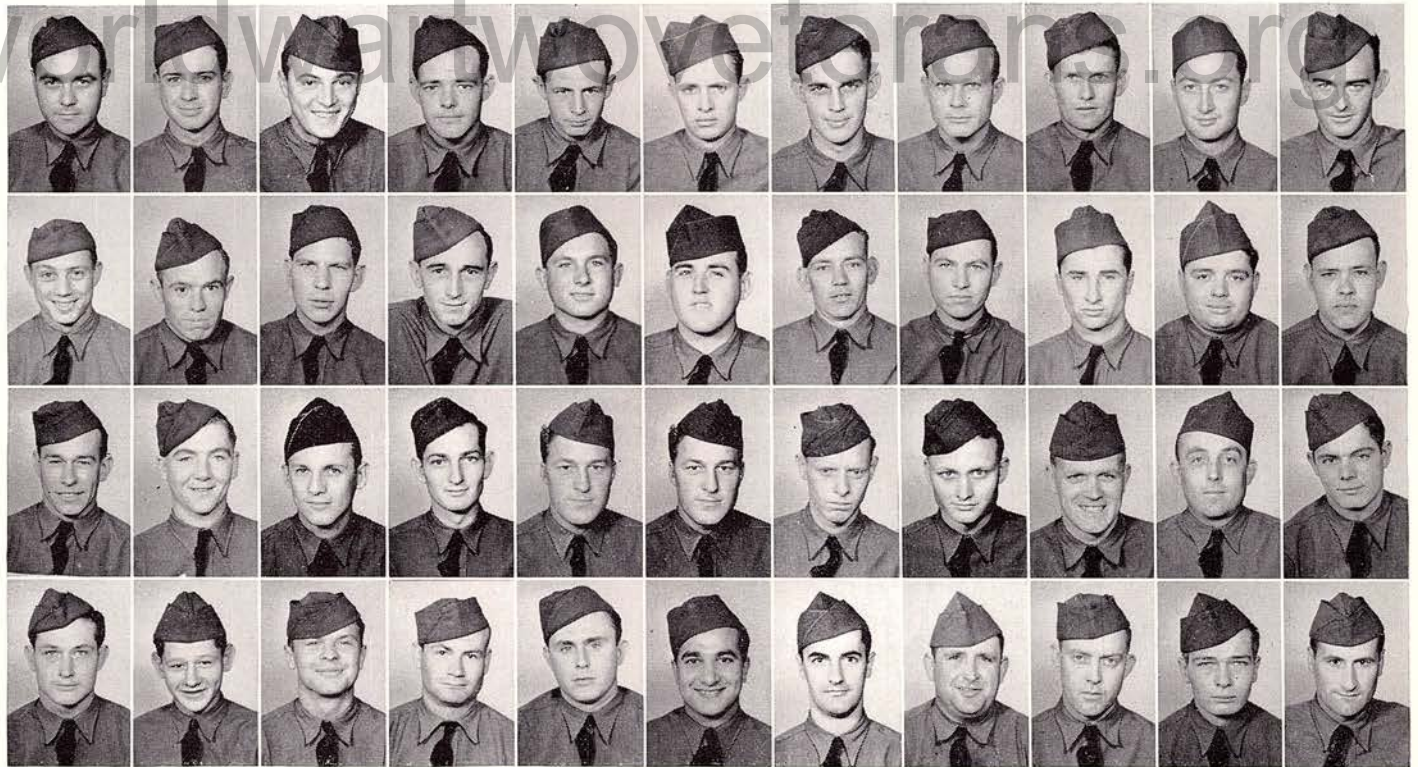

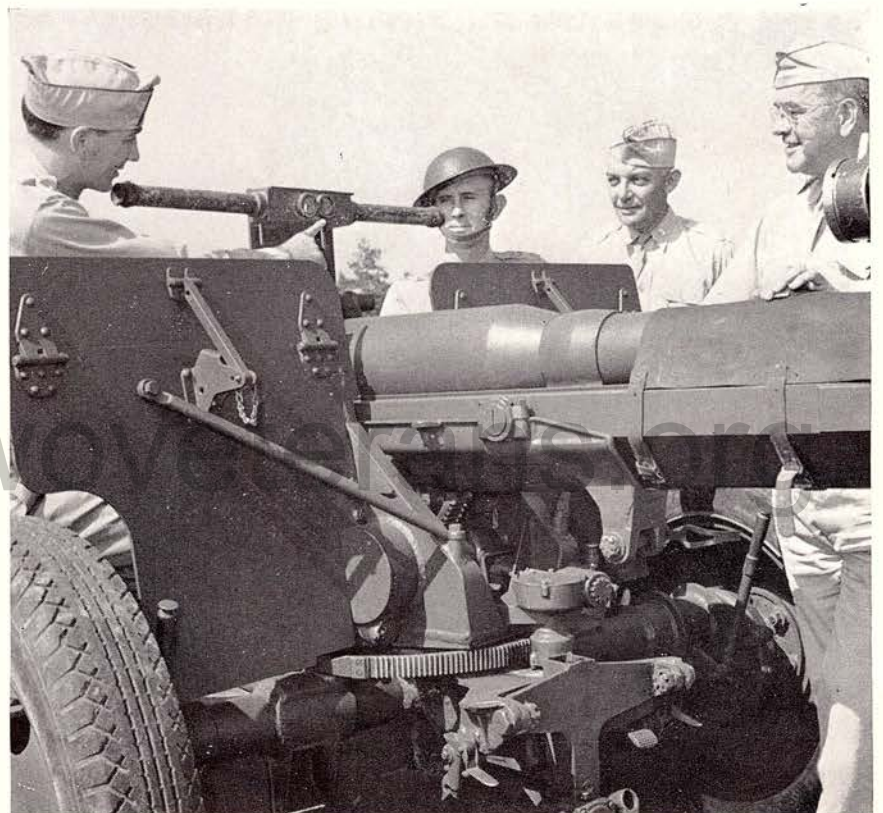

# HISTORY OF THE 168th FIELD ARTILLERY

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COAT OF ARMS: Approved November 13, 1923; amended January 19, 1929.

SHIELD: Gules, on a bend between a scorpion bendways and a sheathed Roman sword, point to base, or five fleur-de-lis paleways azure.

MOTTO: Accomplished with energy.

DESCRIPTION: The shield is red for Artillery. The bend is from the arms of the provinces of Lorraine and Champagne, and with the five fleur-de-lis, denotes the five major engagements in which the organization participated during the World War. The scorpion symbolizes service on the Mexican border; and the sheathed Roman sword from the Spanish War Service Medal, represents Spanish War service. The motto is from a letter of commendation from General De Mondesir, commanding the 38th Army Corps (French), which the 148th Field Artillery supported during the Champagne-Marne defensive.

DISTINCTIVE INSIGNIA: Approved December 12, 1923; amended, January 19, 1929: Shield and motto of the coat of arms.

ORIGIN OF REGIMENTAL MOTTO: During the Champagne-Marne defense, the 66th Field Artillery Brigade was divided in support of both the First Corps, American Expeditionary Force, and the 38th Corps, French. The 148th Field Artillery and the Second Battalion of the 146th Field Artillery were in position to the south of Chateau Thierry in support of the 38th Corps, French. These units were directly under the command of the Sixth French Army. Shortly after the Allies took the offensive, the brigade was united and operated throughout the campaign as Corps Artillery of the First Corps, American Expeditionary Force. After the brigade had been reunited, the following letter of commendation was received from the commander of the French 38th Corps:

VI Army Q. G. 17th July, 1918

(translation)

"The General commanding the 38th Army Corps congratulates all groupments of the Army for their cooperation in the defense of the Marne.

"Altho fatigued under an intense bombardment causing sensible losses and upsetting the liaison, they have *accomplished with energy* all their missions, from the beginning to the end of the action, with a constant care to coordinate their efforts and support at all costs the troops engaged, and this not only on our front, but supporting also the units in the vicinity.

"Troops and staff may take their share of the success obtained over the enemy, which has been entirely thrown back beyond the river, on the front of our Army Corps.

"The present order will be read as soon as possible in all the batteries.

"General Commanding the 38th Army Corps.  
DE MONDESIR."

DIVISION INSIGNIA: Approved August 29, 1922. A red and green rosebud upon a yellow field within a black McClellan stirrup approximately 2½ inches in height. (24th Cavalry Division.)

STREAMERS AUTHORIZED: World War: Champagne, Champagne-Marne, Aisne-Marne, St. Mihiel, Meuse-Argonne.

ORGANIZED: as First Separate Battalion, Field Artillery, September 30, 1911, with two batteries as follows: Battery A organized as "Chaffee's Light Artillery" in 1878. Federal service in Spanish-American War, July 1, 1898; stationed at Fort Logan, Colorado, and Fort Hancock, New Jersey; mustered out, November 7, 1898; reorganized as Battery A in November, 1898; Battery B organized July 17, 1911; Battery C organized May 31, 1916; Federal service on the Mexican border July 7, 1914, to August 14, 1916; Batteries B and C stationed at Deming, New Mexico; marched to El Paso, Texas; Battery A, stationed at Rifle Range, Golden, Colorado; mustered out September 16, 1916; the rest of the battalion between March 6 and March 9, 1917. Federal service, World War, August 5, 1917; merged into the 148th Field Artillery (Heavy) Forty-first (Sunset) Division; arrived in France, via England, February 9, 1918; redesignated Corps Artillery; served with both American and French forces; Army of Occupation from December, 1918, to May, 1919; mustered out, June 29, 1919. Reorganized as First Battalion, 158th Field Artillery, May, 1923, from units previously reorganized; redesignated 168th Field Artillery, Battalion (Horse), July 1, 1926.

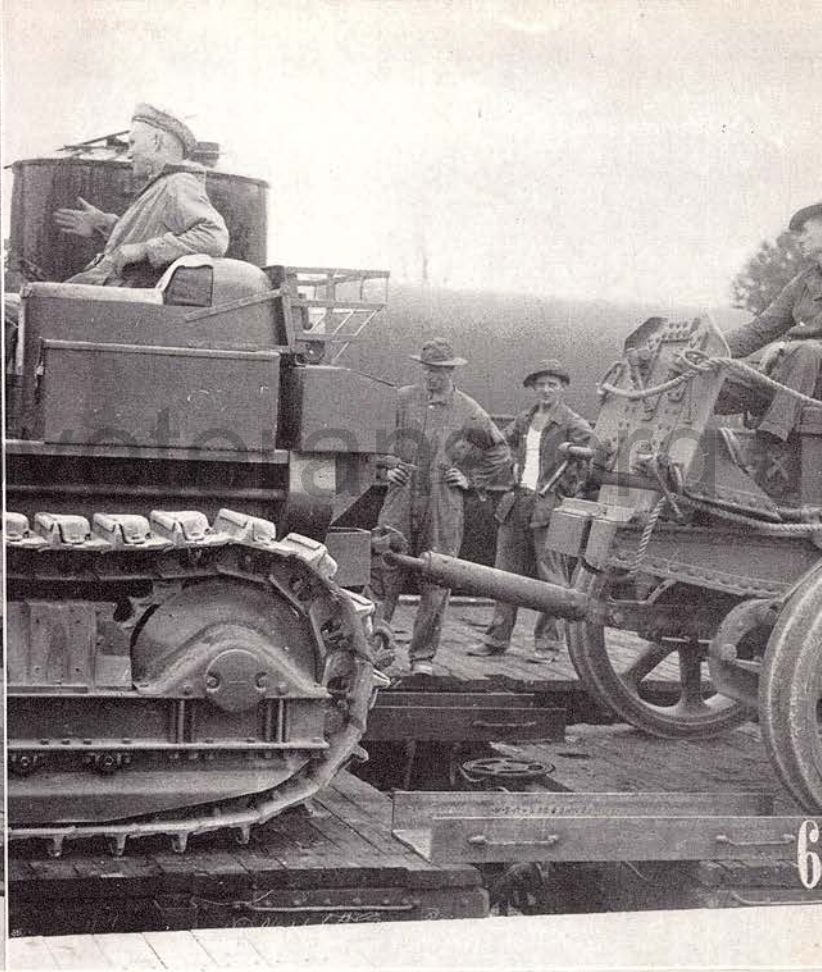
Converted to First Battalion, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn), August 1, 1933, with 117th Separate Squadron Cavalry converted to Second Battalion, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn). Headquarters, 117th Separate Squadron Cavalry converted to Headquarters Second Battalion, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn); Troop A, 117th Separate Squadron Cavalry converted to Battery D, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn); Troop B, 117th Separate Squadron Cavalry, converted to Battery E, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn); Troop C, 117th Separate Squadron Cavalry converted to Battery F, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn) and on September 1, 1933, redesignated Battery C, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn); Medical Department Detachments, 168th Field Artillery Battalion (horse) and of 117th Separate Squadron Cavalry converted to Medical Department Detachment (less Medical Department Detachment Second Battalion), 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn).

Regimental Headquarters, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn) organized August 1, 1933. First Battalion Headquarters Battery, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn) converted to Regimental Headquarters Battery, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn), January 1, 1934. First Battalion Headquarters Battery, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn) reorganized May 1, 1936, at Golden, Colorado, redesignated Service Battery, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn), May 7, 1937, and First Battalion Headquarters Battery reorganized at Durango, Colorado, May 14, 1937. Service Battery, 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn) redesignated Service Battery (less Band Section) 168th Field Artillery (truck drawn), September 17, 1937, with Band Section, Service Battery, given Federal recognition separately, September 18, 1937.

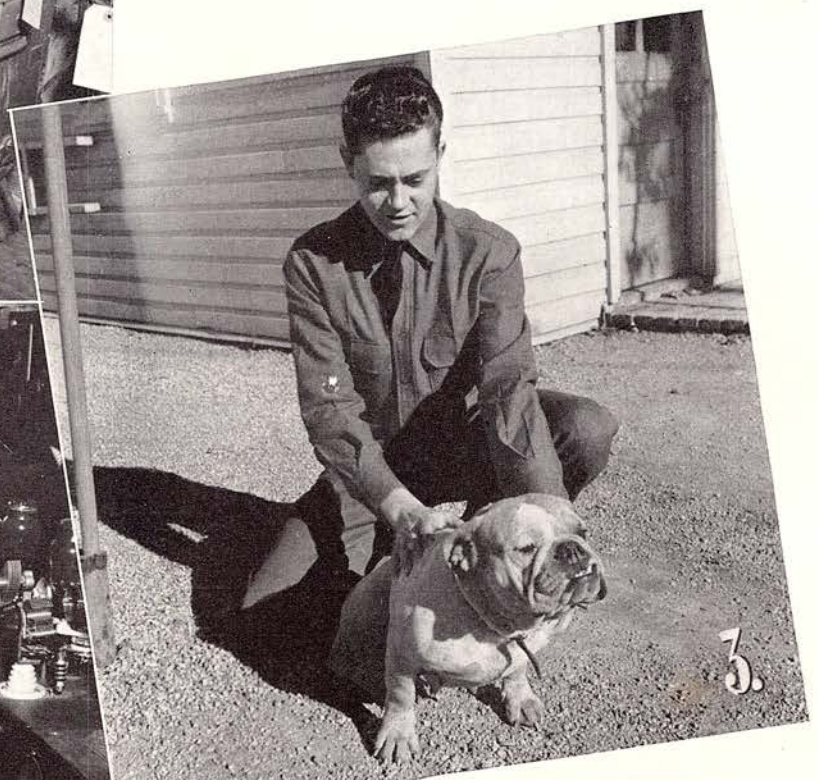

A veteran of two wars and the Mexican border campaign, Col. Ira R. Summers has been a soldier since he was fifteen years of age. He has taken in his stride such diverse duties as commanding a regiment of Artillery and touring Europe with "Buffalo Bill" Cody, and in his sixty-three years the colorful Colonel has changed three times from civilian to soldier to answer the call of his country.

Colonel Summers was born in Rice County, Kansas, on July 9, 1878, moving early in life to Southwestern Kansas and later to Hutchinson, where he joined the 4th Kansas Regiment when only 15 years old. He was discharged as a corporal and enlisted in the 21st Kansas Volunteer Infantry Regiment in 1898. With this Regiment he fought in the Spanish-American War as a sergeant and later served as principal musician. Following this conflict, he was discharged in March, 1899, at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

The following year Colonel Summers embarked for Europe with "Buffalo Bill," an assignment so mutually agreeable that it was continued until 1903.

Colonel Summers' next military connection came seven years later. He had already moved to Chattanooga and was rapidly becoming one of the outstanding band leaders in that section. In 1910, he enlisted in the Third Tennessee Infantry and served as band leader through the Mexican border campaign in 1916 and 1917. When the regiment was converted to the 117th Infantry and sent overseas, Colonel Summers continued as band leader and served through the World War with the 117th, a unit of the famed 30th ("Old Hickory") Division.

When the National Guard was reorganized following the war, Colonel Summers was made Warrant Officer, and in 1923 he was commissioned a Captain of Cavalry. He subsequently was promoted to Major and served as squadron commander of the 109th Cavalry, and as a Lieutenant Colonel he was Executive Officer of the 109th. He assumed command of the 109th in 1936, and was promoted to Colonel in the same year. He retained command of the regiment when it was redesignated the 181st Field Artillery on October 1, 1940.

In civilian life, Colonel Summers continued his profession as a musician. Before the advent of sound films, he served as an orchestra conductor at theaters, and for many years before coming back to active duty in the Army, he was band supervisor of Chattanooga City Schools and a teacher at the University of Chattanooga.

TO OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE 181st FIELD ARTILLERY:

In all my thirty years service with troops I have never felt the pride in my command that I feel in being Commander of this Regiment.


Thinking back to October 1, 1940, when the 109th Cavalry, after eighteen years as such, was, overnight, re-designated the 181st Field Artillery, 155-mm Howitzers, I cannot but marvel at the progress made by both Officers and Men in the efficient functioning of all units in both technical and tactical artillery requirements.

In all tests prescribed by higher authority records show that the work of this Regiment has compared favorably with that of much older artillery regiments, which, naturally, creates a feeling of great satisfaction in the Commander.

To accomplish what we have it was necessary first to have the personnel in both Officers and Men capable of absorbing the highly technical subjects of Field Artillery, and, second, that they have the will and determination to master these subjects. In spite of the long hours of study and schooling, the morale of the Regiment has always been high. Loyalty, that quality without which a Commander is absolutely helpless, has always been unquestioned and lack of it unheard of.

For these qualities of loyalty and cooperation, the Commander is extremely grateful and it is hoped that in all the years to come each Officer and Man of the Regiment when looking over this record will join with me in a feeling of satisfaction at a hard task well performed.

# HISTORY OF THE 181st FIELD ARTILLERY



On a wreath of the colors (or and vert) the crest of the National Guard of the State of Tennessee upon a mount vert a hickory tree proper charged with three mullets one and two argent,

and that the design be described as follows:

The shield is yellow to represent the fact that the organization was created as Cavalry. The giant cactus represents Mexican border duty. The three lions represent World War service as follows:

One is for Flanders, whose coat of arms is Or, a lion rampant sable; one represents the Somme Offensive. Somme is located in the Department of Picardy, whose arms has a black rampant lion. The third lion represents Belgium, in which Ypres is located.

When the 181st Field Artillery was created by conversion from the 109th Cavalry on Oct. 1, 1940, many persons considered it a new regiment. Yet it is far from that—few regiments in the Army have so ancient and fine a tradition. The roots of the regiment had sprouted 160 years before when a band of Tennesseans gathered at Sycamore Shoals at the call of Col. John Sevier. On October 1, 1780, these early Tennesseans were off for King's Mountain to intercept the British in one of the decisive battles of history.

Likewise, by blood and tradition, the 181st is linked with Gen. Andrew Jackson and his Tennessee militiamen who once again drove an enemy from our land in the battle of New Orleans. Too, there is a kinship with the 30,000 Tennesseans who earned the state its name by volunteering to serve in the war with Mexico when only 2,800 soldiers had been called for.

More directly, the regiment springs from Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest's Third and Fourth Tennessee Cavalry regiments, two of the greatest fighting units in American history. These were the key regiments in all of the brilliant Tennessean's 60-odd major engagements. From Forrest comes the 181st motto, "Hit 'em First."

Because organized troops were banned in the Southern States following the War between the States, no official connection is authorized with earlier Tennessee units. Hence the official history of the 181st dates to Oct. 4, 1901, when J. Perry Fyffe organized and commanded Troop B, Tennessee Cavalry, unattached, at Chattanooga. Many of its members had been affiliated with the Third Tennessee Infantry, which was formed from the remnants of Forrest's Cavalry after the ban on organized troops was lifted in the 1880s. Capt. Bruce Douglas organized Troop A at Nashville in April, 1917, as a revival of Troop A, First Regiment Reserves, Confederate Veterans, National Guard, which was formed to honor and perpetuate the memory of General Forrest.

Troops B, C, and D, First Separate Squadron, Tennessee Cavalry, served on the Mexican border in 1916 and 1917, and on Sept. 14, 1917, Troops A, B, and C were converted to the 114th Machine Gun Battalion under command of Colonel Fyffe. Troop D became the 105th Trench Mortar Battery.

As part of the 30th Division, these Tennesseans gained for the 181st the battle honors now carried on its crest—Flanders, Ypres-Lys, and the Somme Offensive. The 114th fought in the following major engagements: Ypres (Canal Sector), August 31 to Sept. 2, 1918; Battle of Bellicourt, Sept. 29 to Sept. 30, 1918; Battle of Montbrehain, Oct. 7 to Oct. 11, 1918; and the battle of LaSalle River, Oct. 17 to Oct. 20, 1918. At Bellicourt, the 114th helped crack the Hindenburg line at its strongest point.

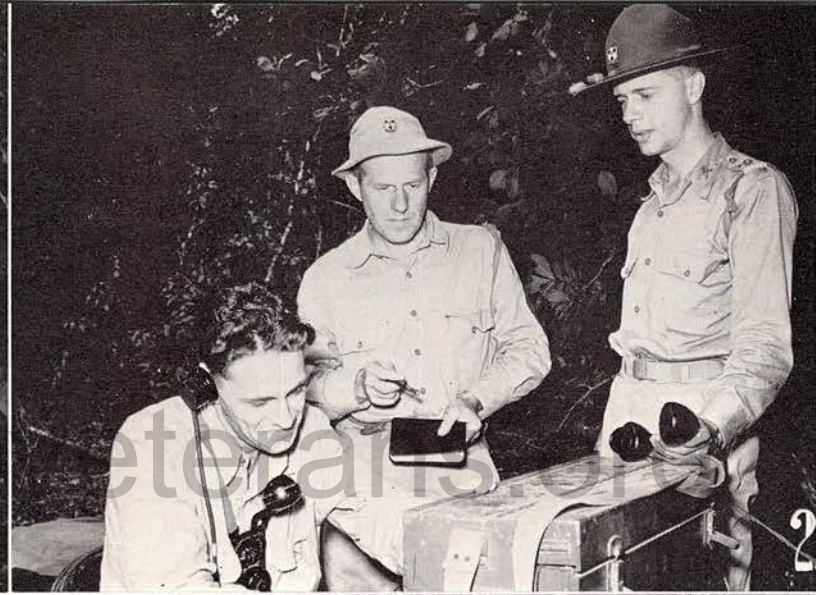
The 114th was mustered out of service at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., on April 4, 1919, and Troop A, 109th Cavalry, at Knoxville, was federally recognized on June 30, 1920. Originally a regiment of Tennessee and North Carolina Cavalry, each year saw added membership in Tennessee until finally the entire regiment was composed of Tennessee Guardsmen.

Col. Ira R. Summers, the present commander of the 181st, assumed command of the 109th Cavalry in 1936 after serving as Captain, Major and Lieutenant Colonel.

But the main concern of the 181st today is not its past. Rather, it is more concerned with aiming circles and prime movers and y-azimuths than with the "mounted rifleman" who accompanied John Sevier. The 155mm howitzer has replaced the smaller weapons, and proficiency in this powerful weapon is now the goal. After a year as field artillery, the 181st is proud of its progress. Rival regiments of several years of field artillery experience find the 181st an able protagonist on the drill field and the firing range. The citations we have received make us feel good—but give us a little more time.

## HARRY S. BERRY

### COLONEL

#### COMMANDING THE 191st FIELD ARTILLERY

"Marked efficiency . . . great resourcefulness . . . military accomplishments of a high order." So read the citation which Gen. John J. Pershing bestowed, along with the Distinguished Service Medal, upon his youngest combat colonel in France. That was in 1918. The 36-year-old Colonel was Harry S. Berry.

Today, not more than half a dozen of the 4,000 officers and men of Colonel Berry's present command have heard of that citation, but its words would have renewed significance in their eyes. They might like to add to his size-up that he exemplifies the "Honor, Duty, Country" precept of his alma mater, West Point; that he has dignity without pomposity; a sense of fairness that is strict, but tempered by keen understanding of human nature, and a warming sense of humor.

These qualities, combined with a military experience ranging from Cavalry officer in the Regular Army, at home and in the Philippines, to Infantry officer on the Mexican border, and artillery regimental and group commander on the battlefields of Europe, enabled Colonel Berry to organize the 191st Field Artillery from scratch in 1940, and place it in the forefront of the Army's fighting units by the close of maneuvers, 1941. Officers of his command take pride, themselves, in another quality for which Colonel Berry has a widespread reputation: the ability to choose able subordinates. Quality of personnel and esprit de corps have always played a large role in the success of units commanded by Colonel Berry, and the morale of his present command is marked. That this condition is largely attributable to the Colonel's efforts and personality is evidenced by the popular approval in all ranks which was accorded his selection by the Army, when a vacancy occurred, to be acting commander of the 75th Field Artillery Brigade. At current writing, he commands both the brigade and the regiment.

Serving the Nation as a leader of her soldiers is not a new thing to the Berry family. The precedent was set in Revolutionary War days by an eminent forbear, Gen. Daniel Smith—later one of the early United States Senators from Tennessee. Today, on a large acreage of rolling Middle Tennessee meadows, inherited through the generations from Daniel Smith's original holdings, Colonel Berry makes his home. Harry S. Berry was born in Nashville, Tenn., January 28, 1882. He attended public schools in Sumner and Davidson counties, and Wallace University School in Nashville, before entering Vanderbilt University. The future soldier and public administrator left Vanderbilt to enter the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1900, and he was graduated at West Point in the class of 1904.

# HISTORY OF THE 191st FIELD ARTILLERY

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In January, 1940, the War Department allocated an additional artillery regiment to the State of Tennessee. This regiment was designated the 191st Field Artillery (GHQ). Later the Regiment was redesignated as Seventh Army Corps troops.

The State of Tennessee officials immediately began to seek the best man in the State to organize and command this new regiment of 155mm howitzers. Colonel Harry S. Berry, WPA administrator for Tennessee, was well chosen as the best qualified man in the State to undertake this tremendous task, being a graduate of the West Point Class of 1904, and having organized and commanded the 115th Field Artillery on the Mexican border and in France from 1916 to 1918.

Colonel Berry immediately began the organization of the Regiment. He secured his staff from Nashville and vicinity, and on February 20, 1940, the Regiment had the required number of units and personnel to receive Federal recognition, and was inducted into the National Guard of the United States on this date. The twelve Batteries, Medical Detachment, and Band were located in Middle and East Tennessee, in the following cities: Knoxville, Maryville, Clinton, Kingsport, Greeneville, Winchester, Pulaski, and Shelbyville. Five Batteries of the 115th Field Artillery were redesignated 191st Field Artillery. One Company, 105th QM, and one Company, 117th Infantry and the Medical Detachment, 117th Infantry, were redesignated 191st Field Artillery. Five new batteries were organized in addition to the Band. This completed the organization of the regiment.

On August 4, 1940, the regiment was called out for three weeks' field training to participate in the war games being held in Mississippi and Louisiana. At this time the regiment was very short of equipment, and due to this shortage remained at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, during the Louisiana phase of the maneuvers. Although greatly handicapped by lack of equipment and its short existence the regiment made a very creditable impression.

On February 24, 1941, one year after its organization, the 191st Field Artillery was mobilized and inducted into the Army of the United States. The regiment now became a unit of the 75th F.A. Brigade, along with the 181st Field Artillery of Tennessee and the 168th Field Artillery of Colorado. Upon completion of the organization and induction period at home stations, the regiment on March 4, 1941, moved into its new home at Camp Forrest, Tennessee. Upon arrival at Camp Forrest, the regiment underwent a reorganization to conform to new tables of organization, and immediately began an extensive training program. At the completion of its first thirteen weeks of training, the regiment underwent a very gruelling test inspection by Seventh Army Corps and came through with colors flying.

On June 29, 1941, the first allotment of selectees, numbering 677, was received by the regiment. This brought on the big task of training these new men, who composed 40 per cent of the strength of the regiment, before the Arkansas-Louisiana war games, to be held in August and September. On August 14, 1941, the regiment entrucked for Arkansas to participate in the largest scale maneuvers ever held in the United States. Throughout the eight weeks of these war games the 191st Field Artillery was carving a name for itself. The regiment received a letter of commendation from Lieutenant General Ben Lear during the maneuvers, of which it is very proud.

With the fine esprit de corps and high state of morale which prevails in the regiment, it is destined for a high place in the history of the Army of the United States.

# HISTORY OF THE 75th PROVISIONAL ANTITANK BATTALION

The 75th Field Artillery Brigade Antitank Battalion is the newest organization in the Brigade. The Battalion is composed of four Firing Batteries, a Headquarters Battery and attached Medical Personnel. The Firing Batteries were formerly the Antitank Batteries of the 181st and 191st Field Artillery Regiments. Batteries D and H of the 181st Field Artillery were redesignated Batteries A and B, respectively, and Batteries G and H of the 191st Field Artillery were redesignated Batteries C and D, respectively. The Headquarters Battery is composed of selected personnel of the 181st F. A., 191st F. A. and the 168th Field Artillery. The Medical detachment is from the 168th Field Artillery.

The Battalion was activated provisionally on August 1, 1941, with Lt. Col. William Q. Howell commanding. Following ten days of organization the Battalion marched to Arkansas with the other units of the Brigade, less the 168th Field Artillery, to participate in the 2nd and 3rd Army Maneuvers.

The history of the Battalion is largely concerned with maneuvers and field exercises. Shortly after arrival at Gurden, Arkansas, the 75th Antitank Battalion was temporarily released from the 75th Field Artillery Brigade and attached to the Third Army, the "Blue" army of the Louisiana maneuvers of 1941. The Battalion became part of the Third Provisional GHQ Antitank Group and began preliminary training. Our Base Camp was located one and one-half miles west of Camp Claiborne, Louisiana.

The Battalion was one of the few units in the Louisiana maneuvers to oppose its parent organization. However, the forces of the 75th Field Artillery Brigade were not encountered. The Battalion served on all sectors of the Third Army front in opposing mechanized advances of the Second Army.

After the Louisiana maneuvers the organization returned to Camp Claiborne for three weeks and departed for home station at Camp Forrest. Arriving at Camp Forrest, October 22, the Battalion prepared to move again, this time to participate in the First Army maneuvers in North Carolina. After five days at home station the Battalion marched from Camp Forrest to Hoffman, North Carolina. During the preliminary phases of the maneuvers the weather became severely cold. However, the men showed the results of months of campaigning: the health of the command was excellent in spite of the inclement weather.

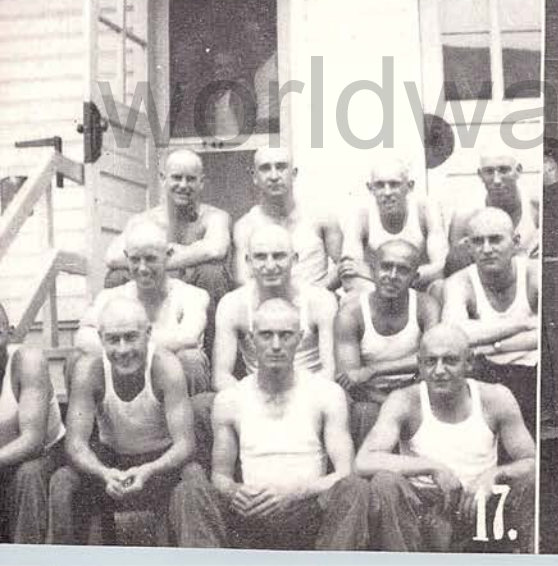
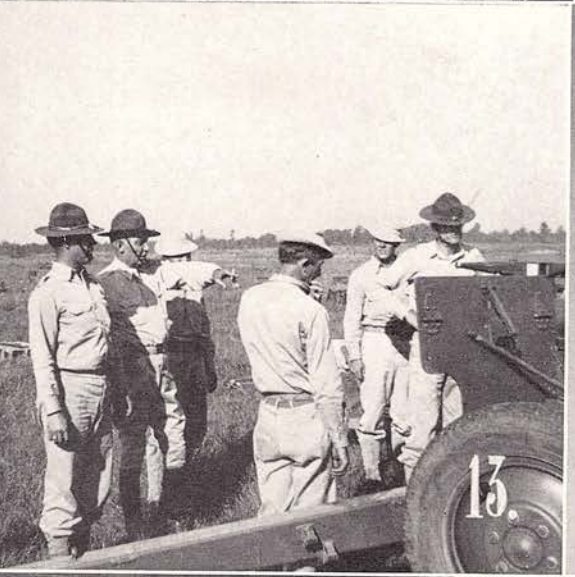
The GHQ phase of the Carolina maneuvers brought the first exhaustive test of the Battalion's ability to stop mechanized forces. The Battalion played an important part in the defense of the Cheraw bridgehead on November 17-18. During the morning of the 18th, the Battalion withstood a massive assault of tanks, half-tracks, and planes. During that period the Battalion destroyed thirty tanks and much other mechanized equipment. The Carolina maneuvers were featured by alert, aggressive antitank operations and the 75th Antitank Battalion played its part well.

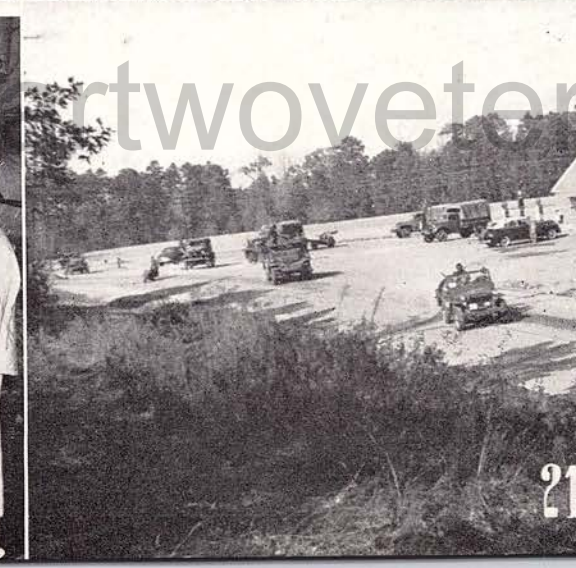
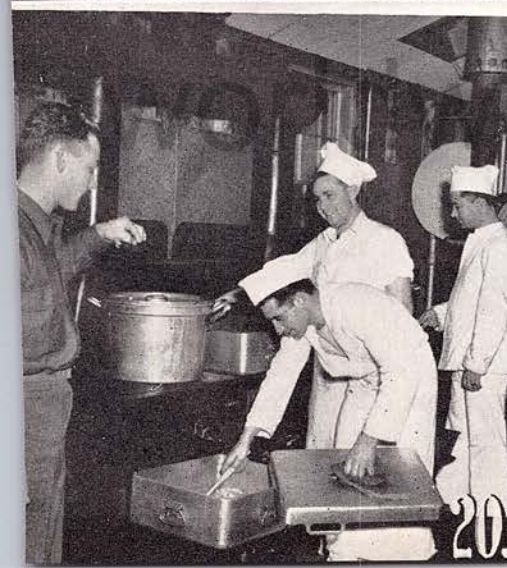
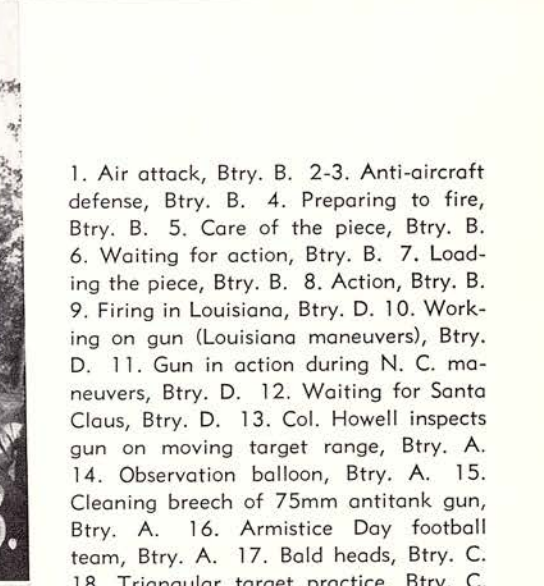
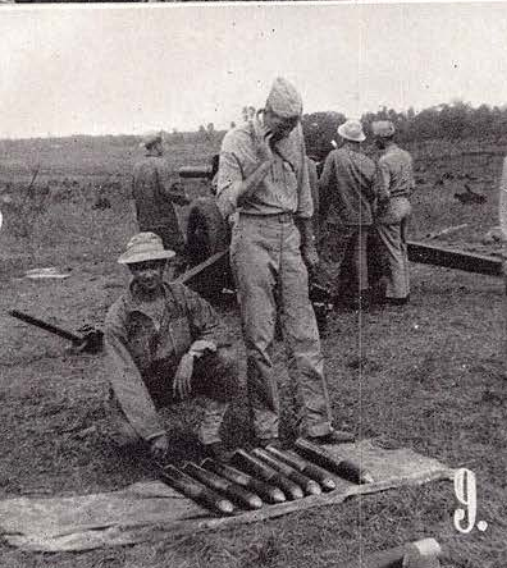
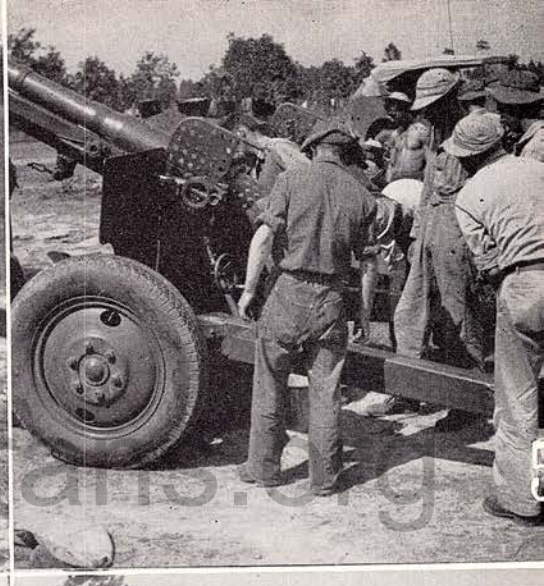
Traveling in excess of 15,000 miles, the Battalion served in the combat forces of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Field Armies and returned to Camp Forrest with the enviable record of not having lost a man or vehicle.

The Battalion returned to Camp Forrest and Brigade on December 4th. On December 15th the Battalion was inactivated. It was reactivated and redesignated the 775th Tank Destroyer Battalion the same date.

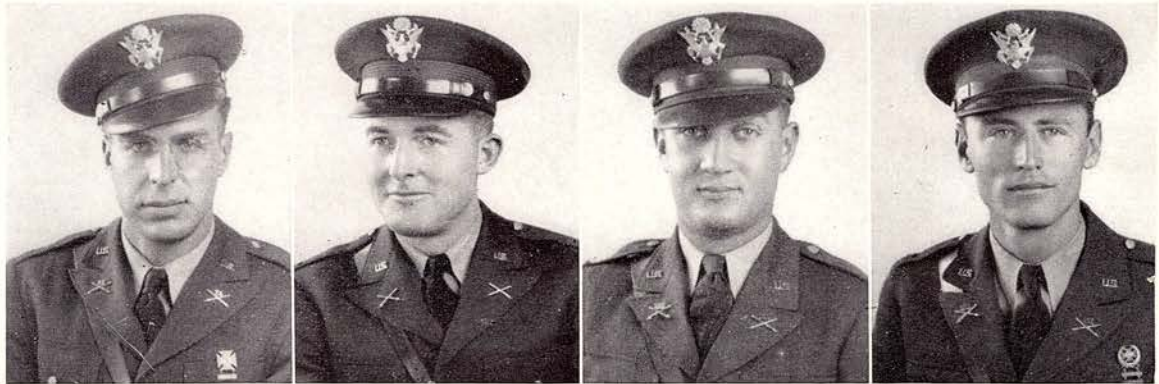

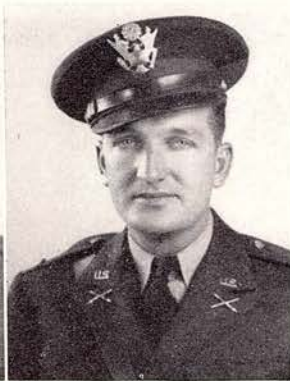

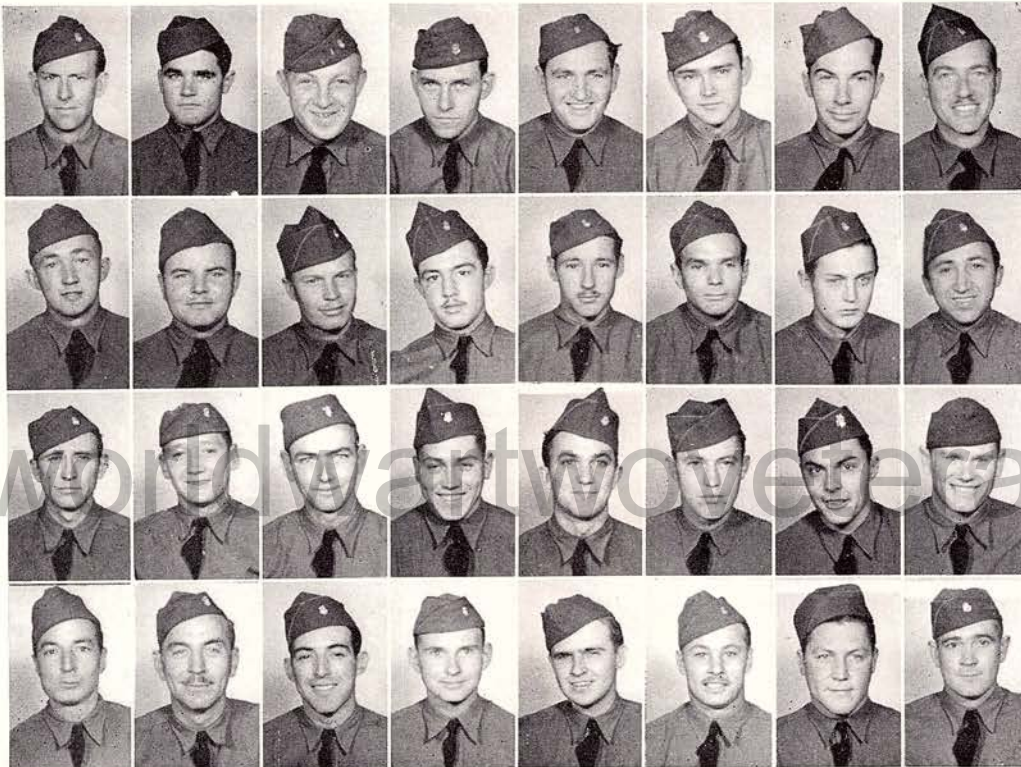

## 168th Field Artillery History

(Continued from page 23)

Following closely upon the successful completion of active duty for the State at Kremmling, Colorado, in August, 1939, normal regimental activity took on an increased tempo, under the stimulation of "unlimited emergency." Additional drills were authorized by the National Guard Bureau, and an additional week of winter field training was participated in during the autumn and winter months of the year. The field training period was completed by battalions, the second battalion going into camp at Pueblo, Colorado, State Fair Grounds, Nov. 19, 1939, to Nov. 25, 1939, and the first battalion (less Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion) with Headquarters Battery, Service Battery and the Band in Camp George West, Golden, Colorado, Dec. 27, 1939, to Jan. 2, 1940.

The next outstanding event in the life of the regiment was Federal inspection, conducted by Major Russell B. Snyder, F.A., of Enid, Oklahoma, between April 15, 1940, and April 25, 1940. The regiment attained a general rating of excellent, with well-trained staffs, qualified officers, and an average of excellent on appearance in ranks, discipline, and general efficiency. An outstanding point emphasized by Major Snyder was that the proficiency, self-reliance, and leadership of noncommissioned officers was a subject of commendation, which was forthcoming to Master Sergeants Michael J. Maloney and Edward B. Richardson, 1st Sgt. Oscar Q. Moon and Corp. Richard F. Grinstead of Service Battery, Sergeant Sidney R. Foster, 1st Battalion Hq. Battery, 1st Sgts. Clark P. Lamphere, Battery A, and James A. Gough, Battery B.

In June and early July, 1940, consideration and anticipation of coming events was the business of the day. On one hand administrative plans contingent upon induction of National Guard troops into Federal service were being made on the basis of scanty information then available, and on the other hand the regiment faced a contemplated three weeks of training, to culminate in III Army maneuvers in Louisiana, in August, 1940. The former plans began with routine consideration such as the issue of serial numbers to enlisted men, a promotion plan for officers and a consideration of property and equipment involved, but eventually evolved into a reorganization of the 168th F.A. into a 155mm gun regiment. The field training plans began with preparation for recruiting, plans for training and transportation, and digestion of directives to cover the maneuvers, proper, and culminated with the regiment acting as Corps artillery, VII Corps, Third Army, Red forces.

On September 16, the 157th Infantry was inducted into Federal service, and work went on apace to complete our reorganization before our own induction, which, at that time, was believed due about January 1, 1941.

A new service battery for the second battalion was organized, and received Federal recognition at Denver, Colorado, as of December 1, 1940 to conform to the 155 mm. gun regiment organization of battalion service units upon redesignation as 155 mm. gun regiment, December 1, 1940. Officers assigned to the new organization were 1st Lt. Aden A. Holson, 1st Lt. Thomas G. Carey, and 2nd Lt. Denny K. Farnsworth. Upon induction, the regiment lost only three officers, by reason of physical disability: Capt. Theodore R. Marshall, 1st Lt. Laurence J. Ensor, and Capt. William P. Carlin, M.C., who had been recently commissioned, and due to the multitudinous changes of assignments and promotions, a roster of officers is appended, showing all promotions and assignments after the completion of promotion to war strength in officers, with the exception of the three losses noted.

On February 6, 1941, Major Ralph M. Bitler was placed on active duty and proceeded to Camp Forrest in advance of the regiment, to act as liaison officer at the new camp. On February 28 an advance detachment of six officers, fifty-one men and six 1½ ton trucks, taken from both battalion service batteries, left Golden at 7:00 A.M. enroute to Camp Forrest by way of La Junta, Colorado, Cimmaron, Kansas, Watonga and Henryetta, Oklahoma, Russellville and Forrest City, Arkansas, and Savannah, Tennessee, to Tullahoma, arriving March 7, 1941. This route was that followed by other units, with the exception of minor variations in reaching the route from their various home stations. 1st Bn. Hq. Battery and Battery D formed serial No. 1, leaving Durango and Monte Vista March 3 and 4, and arriving at Camp Forrest March 11; 2nd Bn. Hq. Battery and Battery F were serial No. 2, leaving Colorado Springs and Pueblo, March 2 and arriving March 9; Medical Detachment, Battery A and C as serial No. 3, left Fort Collins March 2 and arrived March 9; Reg. Hq. Battery and Batteries B and E left Denver March 3 as serial No. 4, and arrived at Camp Forrest on March 10. The completion of this movement found the regiment in excellent condition, neither a vehicle nor a single enlisted man having been left behind because of accident, sickness or injury during the 1500 mile trip under varying weather conditions. This accomplishment is a source of satisfaction in view of the fact that some of the vehicles in each unit were of 1933 vintage, and some two hundred of the men were recent recruits. The remainder of the regiment, together with heavy impedimenta, made a train movement to Tennessee, leaving home station March 9 and arriving at Camp Forrest March 11, 1941. Outstanding incidents of the trip were the blizzard encountered by Serial No. 4 just outside Dodge City, Kansas, and in the rail movement, a fire in Hq. Battery mess car between Colby and Rexford, Kansas which delayed the train briefly.

Immediately after getting settled in barracks, the regiment began its 13-week basic training, March 17. On March 25, 27 N.G.U.S. officers of the regiment were assigned to the 181st and 191st F.A., leaving five with the regiment. Those assigned to the 181st F.A. were: 1st Lt. Fred H. Humphrey, 2nd Lt. Willard L. Croonenberghs, 2nd Lt. William G. Knight, 2nd Lt. Jack B. Marshall, 2nd Lt. Alfred M. Olmstead, 2nd Lt. Henry R. Wiggins, 2nd Lt. George W. Hartung, 2nd Lt. Marion H. Underhill, 2nd Lt. Herbert N. Wicks, 2nd Lt. Clifford B. Martin, 2nd Lt. Stephen Wheeler, 2nd Lt. Ben F. Meching, 2nd Lt. John A. Aubuchon, 2nd Lt. Paul J. Godsmann, 2nd Lt. Horace R. Newton. To the 191st F.A. went 1st Lt. Joel F. Vaile, 2nd Lt. Alwyn N. Riley, 2nd Lt. George N. McKelvy, 2nd Lt. Herbert D. Hart, 2nd Lt. Alva J. Moore, 2nd Lt. Lewis E. Roninger, 2nd Lt. Robert C. Flanders, 2nd Lt. William J. Carey, 2nd Lt. Willard R. Avenius, 2nd Lt. Donald F. Carey, 2nd Lt. Victor H. Kerr, 2nd Lt. George T. Walker.

During this period of service practice combined with additional training, a special commendation for an enlisted man of the regiment was received from the Brigade Commander in a letter dated May 20, which is quoted in part:

"Pvt. 1 cl. Jesse L. Fry, A.S.N. 20840858, Battery E 168th F.A., was placed on duty as range guard at Motlow Range at 8:00 A.M., May 15. He was not relieved at 5:20 P.M., the scheduled time for such relief. At 9:20 P.M. an officer of this Brigade, enroute to 191st F.A. bivouac area discovered this soldier still on post. Although he had been afforded several opportunities to ride to camp, he had refused to quit his post until properly relieved. It is believed that the

soldierly qualities evidenced by Pvt. Fry are worthy of special commendation."

During July, 287 selective service recruits were received from Replacement Center, Fort Bragg, increasing regimental enlisted strength, also. On July 10, the remaining quota of 130 arrived to complete the regimental allotment of 417 selectees. The state of basic training of these men was sufficient to justify absorbing them with the regiment, and to allow them to begin training in specialist phases of the 155mm. gun regiment.

Commendation of the Brigade Commander, dated July 28, is quoted, on the subject of training tests:

"1. The Brigade Commander commends the officers and men of the Brigade for the conscientious effort and faithful performance of duty which enabled the command to make so fine a showing during the VII Army Corps Training Inspection just concluded. The spirit and enthusiasm, the eagerness of officers and men to learn and to fit themselves for the serious task that may be ahead of us, is commendable and is appreciated by every true American.

"2. The Brigade Commander desires to congratulate the 191st Field Artillery for the especial commendatory mention by the Army Commander."

On July 29, Brigade issued Special Order 74, transferring Capt. Fred L. Plahte, Btry. E; 1st Lt. Kenneth M. Burke, Btry. C, and 2nd Lt. Robert H. Risley, Btry. F, effective as of August 1, 1941, to the Brigade Anti-Tank Battalion (provisional), and announced Lt. Col. William Q. Howell, 75th F.A. Brigade (inducted and formerly attached 168th F.A.) as Battalion Commander.

The detail of eight officers and eight non-commissioned officers to Field Artillery Section, Second Army, for maneuver period, was requested by Second Army and made, as follows: Major Jay H. Bouton, Hq. 1st Bn.; Major Arthur Eugene Burt, Hq. 2nd Bn.; Capt. Leslie A. Linn, Hq. 2nd Bn.; Capt. John B. Egan, Hq. 168th F.A.; Capt. Edward D. Egan, Hq. 2nd Bn.; Capt. Kenneth S. Johnson, Hq. Battery; Capt. Schuyler C. Parker, Hq. Btry. 1st Bn.; and Capt. Lloyd C. Haggard, Hq. 2nd Bn.

The enlisted men detailed were: Sgt. Cullor, Btry. A; Fitzgerald, Btry. B; Sgt. Van Dyke, Btry. C; Corp. Townsend, Hq. Btry. 1st Bn.; Colling, Hq. Btry. 2nd Bn.; Tomberlin, Btry. D; Corp. Pass, Btry. E and Corp. Dalton, Btry. F. The detail is to report to Prescott, Arkansas on August 11, 1941. In addition, Capt. Clyde H. C. Braden, S-4, 1st Bn., was detailed to G-2 Section, Second Army, for the period of maneuvers.

On August 21, this regiment held a Military Day which included such military competitions as tent pitching, tire changing, tractor driving, squad drill, gas mask drill, best soldier, etc.

The following day, August 22, an Athletic Day was held for our regiment. Battery C won first place in both the military and athletic contests.

The 168th Field Artillery was ordered to arrive at the Louisiana maneuver area on September 7th, and plans were immediately initiated for the movement. On September 3rd, final preparations were made for the march and on the afternoon of the same day a ceremonial parade was held for the awarding of plaques and prizes won on Military and Field Days. The regiment, under the command of Lt. Col. Richard G. Hunter, left for the 1941 maneuver area on September 4, 1941.

During the maneuver period, on September 18th, Lt. Col. Hunter received orders assigning him to the Philippine Department, and Lt. Col. Combs, Executive Officer, took command of the regiment. Wherever the regiment was used it proved effective, as shown by this terse report from the VII Army Corps: "Due to the fire delivered by the 168th Field Artillery, the evacuating of forward troops was made possible and pressure was relieved along the entire Corps front." After a month of valuable lessons in simulated warfare, the 1941 maneuvers were brought to a close on September 28th, and the regiment arrived at its base camp, Camp Forrest, on October 7, 1941. During the entire maneuver, the regiment had "accomplished with energy" all missions, and it returned home without a man having been killed or seriously hurt, and without a vehicle having been lost to service.

On October 8, Colonel John P. Donovan again took command of the 168th Field Artillery.

On November 12th, Lt. Col. Augustine J. Zerbe was assigned to the regiment. Due to Col. Donovan's recurring illness, Lt. Col. Zerbe took command of the regiment on November 19th, and retained his command until he became ill on December 1st and was sent to the hospital. Lt. Col. Raymond W. Combs automatically became commander in the absence of both Col. Donovan and Lt. Col. Zerbe.

Japan declared war on the United States on December 7th, shortly after a surprise bombing of Pearl Harbor and the Philippine Islands.

From the 9th to the 11th of December, the 168th enjoyed two full days of firing practice at the Spencer Range, Tennessee, with the 155mm service ammunition.

The first group of men on Christmas furlough were allowed to leave shortly after the regiment's return from Spencer Range, however, on the 13th, due to the receipt of a warning order from Brigade of a rail movement to destination unknown, all furloughs were cancelled, and all men who had left camp were wired to return immediately.

On December 16th, the "Antitanks" were transferred from the 168th, and assigned to the 775th Tank Destroyer Battalion.

The regiment, including all equipment and guns, left Camp Forrest on December 22nd, in six train movements, and all trains had arrived at East Garrison, Camp Roberts, California, by the evening of the 27th.

Four days after our arrival at Camp Roberts, the 2nd Battalion was ordered to duty in the vicinity of Monterey Bay, California.

The following letter of commendation was received from Colonel Ralph Hospital, the Brigade Commander: "It is desired to commend you, your officers and men for the most efficient manner in which you loaded the six trains assigned to your regiment prior to departure from Camp Forrest, Tennessee. The dispatch with which this was accomplished was particularly commendable because of the heavy materiel involved."

On January 6th, Colonel Charles A. Beaucond was assigned to the 168th Field Artillery, and assumed command.

Major General Richardson, N.C.S. & VII Army Corps commander visited the East Garrison, and inspected the regiment. He commended Battery B, his escort of honor, with the following letter: "On January 19, 1942, at Camp Roberts, I inspected your Battery, which formed the guard of honor. The standard set in your battery, the appearance of the men and their equipment, is superior. It is indicative of the standards which are set for all types of military duties, including discipline and training. It gives me great pleasure to be able to say to you that you are achieving the goal set for units of this command."



## Military Record of Colonel Harry S. Berry

Assigned to the 13th Cavalry, Lieutenant Berry served five years of active duty, including one year in the Philippines, before resigning in order to manage his farmland in Tennessee. Upon leaving the regular service, he became a Captain in the famed "First Tennessee," National Guard infantry regiment whose history reached back through many wars. He was promoted to Major in 1909, and in that capacity served until July 22, 1916, when he became Colonel of the regiment, at the age of 34.

As commanding officer, he led the regiment during the Mexican border incident of 1916, and into the wartime army in 1917. A few months later, however, the historic regiment was converted to become the 115th Field Artillery, and Colonel Berry continued in command. The task confronted by the youthful Colonel at this juncture was tremendous, as many infantry and cavalry units converted to artillery in the present emergency can testify. Yet the job was done, and the 115th arrived in France early in June, 1918, to begin a successful participation on the war front. The regiment performed with distinction in the St. Mihiel and Argonne drives, and operations of the Second Army east of Verdun.

Colonel Berry likes to contrast conditions then and now, when training difficulties are discussed. He recalls that the 115th arrived in France "without ever having seen a how"—the 155mm. howitzer which it was to use—and without having fired a practice shot. Training had been pursued on occasion with logs representing the guns, and as for instruments: "We had not had any aiming circles," the Colonel remarks. "We'd been using a circular piece of cardboard on a stick!"

The regiment trained briefly with their new howitzers in France and the creditable performance of the 115th in battle is cited by the Colonel as an example of what can be accomplished by exercise of determination and imagination.

The 115th served in France until April, 1919, and during the latter stages of the war Colonel Berry was called upon to command a groupment of the 115th with certain French and American artillery regiments. As commander of the provisional brigade, Colonel Berry was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal, and an unofficial reputation as a "Maker of Generals."

General Pershing's citation accompanying the medal read as follows:

"As commander of the 115th Field Artillery during its organization and training he displayed marked efficiency and great resourcefulness and military attainments of a high order.

He commanded a grouping of his regiment and other French and American artillery units in the Meuse-Argonne offensive; also a grouping of his regiment and other 155 millimeter howitzer regiments in the operations of the Second Army, and by his skillful and energetic handling of his command played an important part in the success of these operations."

In addition to his preliminary academic training and practical experience in the field, Colonel Berry's record reveals him to have attended such schools as School of Fire, Fort Sill, Okla., the Army War College, Washington, D. C., and the Center Artillery Studies (France).

The war ended, Colonel Berry again chose to re-enter private life, but he promptly joined the Officers Reserve Corps, remaining active in the reserve until assuming command of the 191st Field Artillery, new Tennessee National Guard regiment, on February 20, 1940.

The intervening years were busy ones for the Colonel, however, in public as well as private life. He became State Commissioner of Highways in 1928, state engineer of the PWA in 1933, and in 1934-35 he was called to Washington to be deputy NRA administrator by his old West Point comrade, Gen. Hugh Johnson. On June 15, 1935, Colonel Berry became State WPA Administrator, and he filled this important post until called into the federal service with his regiment on February 24, 1941. Colonel Berry also has engaged in many civic-minded enterprises, and has been especially interested in educational matters. He completed 12 years of service as a member of the Board of Trustees, University of Tennessee, in 1940, and was chosen for a second term of 12 years. His civil life accomplishments merit recounting in other than a military history.

Colonel Berry's greatest interest has remained the Army, throughout his life, but when a new War Department ruling lowered age limits a few months ago, and indicated that (since even advancement to general rank would not forestall it) the Colonel might leave the service next year, his unflinching sense of humor was typically prompt. Meeting a fellow Colonel who faced the same retirement possibilities, Colonel Berry remarked:

"Well, Sandy, it looks like they are going to send us home to take care of the women and children. . . . You take care of the children."

Whether or not the regiment and brigade have the misfortune to lose the services of their experienced and able commander, these units and their individual officers and men will, in battle, show the results of his influence and inspiration, and on another war register the imprint of the efforts of one of Tennessee's most distinguished soldiers.



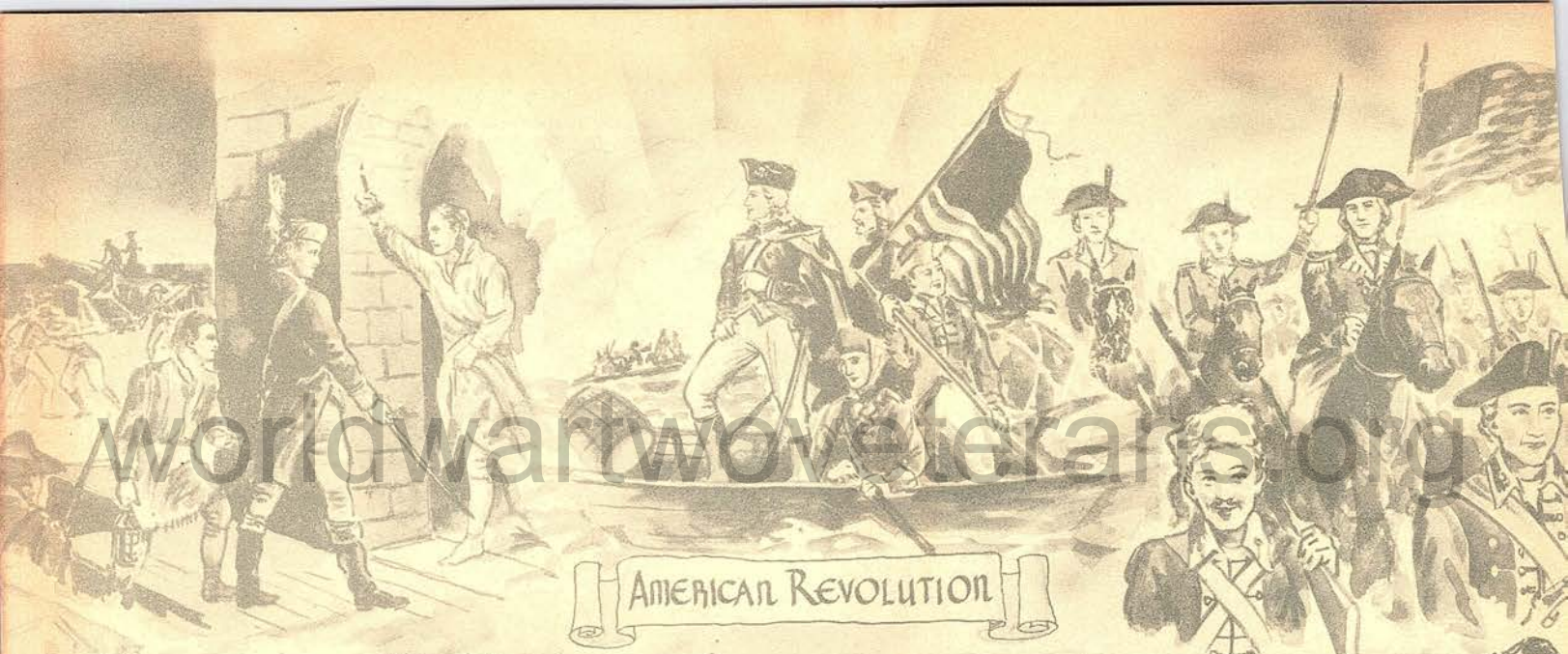
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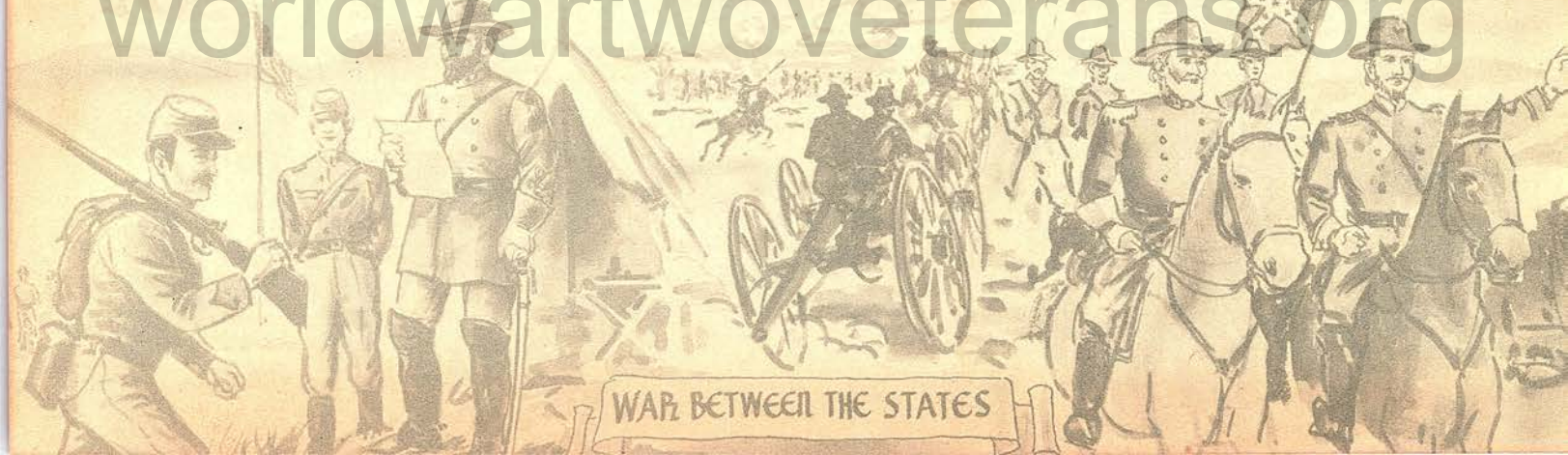

# AUTOS V-6, Latest in Motors, Is a Smooth Operator

It's in the new Buick Special, the substantial sized compact baby of the Buick line. In truth, the new V-6 is a V-8 with the two end cylinders cut off. Many of the parts are interchangeable with Buick's V-8s.

THE V-6 is not experimental. V-6 engines have been used successfully in trucks for years, and Lancia, a classic among Italian cars, has long used a similarly constructed motor in passenger cars. But its introduction into the American passenger car field is a milestone. Through the courtesy of

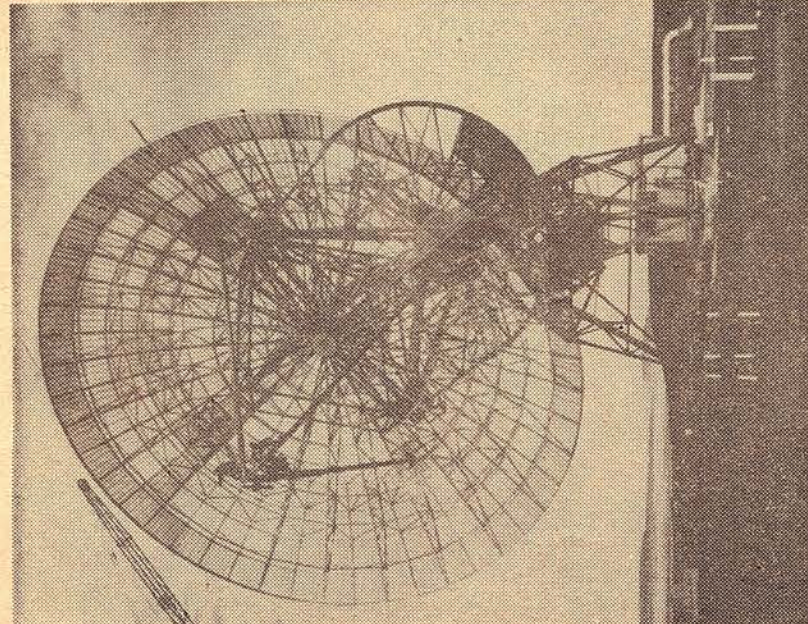

appear to stay above one spot above earth at all times. In orbits at other altitudes, the satellite would move across the face of the earth. Hence, more satellites are needed to make sure that one or more is in site of the earth-bound transmitter and receiver at all times.

The transmitters and receivers for the satellite communications systems are quite different from those which are used for conventional radio and television transmitters and receivers. Since the satellite is quite small and far away, the radio signal which is sent to it must be focused and aimed directly at the satellite just as we aim a searchlight at a plane flying overhead.

BY THE TIME that the signal is reflected or is rebroadcast from the satellite and travels back to earth, the strength of the radio message is quite weak. Therefore, the receiving antenna must be large to collect the signal energy, and the antenna must point toward the satellite as it moves across the sky.

The communications antennas look something like overgrown radar antennas. The antennas are fastened to mounts that can move so that they can be aimed at the satellite at all times. The transmitter and receiver an-
