







COAT OF ARMS: Approved August 10, 1927. SHIELD: Argent, a saltire azure between four fleurs-de-lis gules. CREST: That for regiments of Michigan National Guard. Wreath: Argent and azure. MOTTO: Courage Sans Peur (Courage without fear). DESCRIPTION: The shield is white—the old Infantry facing. The blue saltire represents Civil War service and the four fleurs-de-lis the major engagements during the World War.

First organized as the Second Infantry, July 6, 1874, from existing companies in Grand Rapids and vicinity, the oldest being the "Grand Rapids Guards," organized July 12, 1855, the 126th Infantry has more than 80 years of glorious history behind it, establishing in that time a proud record which the present members faithfully uphold.

The Grand Rapids Light Guard (which became the Valley City Guard) and the Grand Rapids Artillery were organized at Grand Rapids on July 12, 1855, while Ringgold's Light Artillery was formed soon afterwards (also in 1855) at Grand Rapids. On January 7, 1858, the Valley City Cuard, Grand Rapids Artillery and Ringgold's Light Artillery were reviewed as part of the 51st Uniformed Michigan Militia. The Grand Rapids Rifles was added to the above three companies upon its formation in

These four companies went unbroken into the Third Michigan Volunteer Infantry for Civil War service. To complete the regiment, other units were recruited in surrounding towns and mustered in May 21, 1861. The regiment made a gallant record, serving throughout the war on many fronts. It was mustered out of service on May 26, 1866.

Following the Civil War, the Valley City Guards were reorganized as the Grand Rapids Guards on November 26, 1872, and during the years of 1871-72-73, other companies were organized in the surrounding towns. With these units as its components, the Second Infantry was organized on July 6, 1874, with headquarters at Grand

The regiment was mustered into Federal service for

Spanish-American War duty as the 32nd Michigan Volunteer Infantry on April 26, 1898. Although it was not sent to Cuba for active combat service, the regiment was ordered for training purposes to Tampa and Fernandina, Florida. As its services were not needed, the regiment was returned to home stations and mustered out of Federal service between October 25 and November 9, 1898. At this time, the regiment reverted to its former State status as the Second Infantry.

Increased in strength, the Second Infantry was reorganized on July 10, 1899, and continued in State service as the Second Infantry until redesignated the 32nd Michigan Infantry on April 22, 1915.

Called for Mexican Border duty in June, 1916, the 32nd Michigan Infantry was mustered into Federal service on July 1, 1916, and sent to El Paso, Texas, where it performed guard duty and underwent strenuous training that was to prepare it for participation in the great struggle then underway in Europe. It returned from the Mexican Border and was mustered out of service on February 15,

The 32nd Michigan Infantry was called and mustered in for World War service on July 15, 1917. It was again sent for training to Texas, where in the organization of the 32nd Division, it formed the nucleus for the formation of the 126th Infantry on September 12, 1917.

Ordered overseas, it served in the 32nd Division with the French 10th Army Corps and the Ninth and 10th Divisions of Infantry. It was also part of the Army of Occupation. For its gallant action in the World War, the 126th Infantry is authorized the following streamers:

Enlisted as Private, Company M, Second Infantry, June 27, 1901. Promoted to Corporal, May, 1902, and to Sergeant, May, 1903. Appointed First Sergeant, Company M, Second Infantry, February 18, 1904. Commissioned Second Lieutenant, May 1, 1913, and First Lieutenant, May 17, 1913. (Designation of unit changed to Company M, 32nd Infantry.) Was in Federal service for Mexican Border duty from July 1, 1916, to February 15, 1917. Entered Federal service for World War and was commissioned Captain, Machine Gun Company, 32nd Infantry, July 15, 1917. (Regiment redesignated 126th Infantry, September, 1917.) Went overseas on

February 18, 1918, and served in France until May 14, 1919, and was cited for bravery. Appointed Captain, Howitzer Company, April 5, 1921, upon reorganization of regiment. Commissioned Major and regimental machine gun officer, June 11, 1921. Commanded Third Battalion from 1924 to March, 1928. Served tour of duty with regimental headquarters, 1928-1929. Commanded Third Battalion from 1929 to March 16, 1931. Returned to regimental headquarters and commissioned Lieutenant Colonel, July 16, 1933, and appointed regimental executive officer. Commissioned Colonel and appointed to command of 126th Infantry, October 16, 1935.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Headquarters Company, 126th Infantry, was organized at Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas, on or about September 23, 1917, and at that time consisted of a company headquarters section, staff section, band section, orderly section, pioneer platoon, signal platoon, trench mortar platoon and a one-pound cannon platoon,

having a strength of five officers and 289 men.

On January 18, 1918, after four months of intensive

training, the unit left for Camp Merritt, New Jersey, later going to Hoboken, New Jersey, to embark on the U. S. S. President Grant for the trip to France, which started February 18, 1918. The company arrived at Brest, March 4, then went to St. Nazaire and a few weeks later moved into the front line area in Alsace.

During the World War, the company saw heavy, active service with the regiment in the action at Chateau-Thierry, Aisne-Marne, Oise-Ainse and Meuse-Argonne. At the time the Armistice was signed, units of the regiment were preparing to relieve part of the Fifth Division near Breheville, France. The unit was part of the Army of Occupation and returned to the United States on May 14, 1919, and was mustered out of Federal service at Camp Custer, May 22, 1919.

Reorganized in 1920, the company was Federally recognized June 21, 1921, and has been an active unit since recognition. The unit was in State service at Flint in January-February, 1937. Under the present reorganization of the National Guard, it is one of the largest companies in the regiment, having three officers and 128 enlisted men. The company is commanded by Captain Bert Zeeff.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Under recent changes in War Department regulations, the 126th Infantry Band is an independent unit commanded by the Regimental Adjutant, Captain Weyland S. Harvey, but for purposes of administration and supply, it is attached to the Regimental Service Company. Its musical training and direction are supervised by Warrant Officer Oscar E. Kutschinski, a band leader of wide experience and demonstrated ability.

Captain Harvey served for 18 months during the World War, and in June, 1921, he was commissioned First Lieutenant, Infantry, in command of Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 126th Infantry, at Adrian, Michigan, in which rank he served as Battalion Adjutant and Company Commander until May, 1934, when he was promoted to Captain and assigned to the regimental staff. He was appointed Regimental Adjutant upon induction of the regiment into Federal service in October, 1940.







### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

The present Service Company, 126th Infantry, traces its history to the organization and recognition of the Supply Company in Grand Rapids on June 23, 1916, at which time the 32nd Michigan Infantry was mustered into Federal service for Mexican Border duty. After serving at El Paso, Texas, it was mustered out of Federal service in February, 1917. Upon the organization of the 32nd Division in Texas during the World War, the personnel of this unit was absorbed in the 126th Infantry and served in France and with the Army of Occupation in Germany.

Following the war, the unit was re-recognized as Service

Company, Infantry, Michigan National Guard, on February 21, 1921. It was redesignated Service Company, 126th Infantry, its present designation, on November 28, 1921.

Besides following a strict armory drill program and at-

tending the regular annual encampments, the Service Combany participated in the Second Army Maneuvers held in Allegan in 1936 and in Wisconsin in 1940. On October 15, 1940, it was mobilized at its home station and within a few days left for Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, where it is undergoing a year of intensive training under Federal guidance.

Captain Henry D. MacNaughton, the present commander of the unit, has a military record that dates to his attendance at Officers Training Camp from August 27, 1917, to November 26, 1917. He became active as a First Lieutenant on May 27, 1917, and served as a Captain from November 9, 1918, to May 8, 1919. Following the World War, he was commissioned First Lieutenant, Infantry, July 28, 1922, and served as Captain from June 4, 1924, to July 5, 1926. He was in the National Guard, Infantry Reserve, as a Captain from July 6, 1926, to July 8, 1928. He again became active as a Captain, Infantry, July 9, 1928, serving to the present.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company A, 126th Infantry, was first organized as an independent company known as the Coldwater Light Guard in July, 1871, with E. M. Harlow as Captain. In 1873, the unit was redesignated Company A and became part of the Second Regiment, and it has held its designation of Company A since that time.

During the Spanish-American War, Company A was mustered into Federal service for duty on May 12, 1898, and mustered out on September 5, 1898. During this time, the unit, commanded by Captain Frank D. Newberry, was redesignated Company A, 32nd Infantry.

The company next saw service when called out for strike duty on July 24, 1913, in Houghton County, with Captain R. G. Bishop in command. Captain Bishop again mobilized the company on June 19, 1916, for service on the Mexican Border. The company was mustered into Federal service on July 1, 1916, and mustered out on February 15, 1917.

Soon after its return from Mexican Border cuty, to company, now under the command of Captain Roscoe

Graves, was mobilized for World War duty on July 3, 1917. Called into Federal service July 15, 1917, it was redesignated Company A, 126th Infantry, on September 12, 1917, and served as such until mustered out of service on May 24, 1919. During this time, Company A took part in all major engagements participated in by the 126th Infantry.

Following the World War, Captain R. L. Graves, assisted by First Lieutenant L. E. Wheeler, reorganized the unit and it was granted Federal recognition as Company A, Infantry, on February 23, 1921, and redesignated Company A, 126th Infantry, November 28, 1921.

First Lieutenant L. E. Wheeler was promoted to Captain and commanded the unit from July 12, 1923, to March 15, 1931, being succeeded by Captain Frank M. Murphy, who has served until the present time as its commander.

The company was mobilized on January 12, 1937, on call of the Governor and served as aid to civil authorities until February 16, 1937, at Flint, Michigan.

On October 15, 1940, the company was organized at its home station and ordered to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of intensive training.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company B, 126th Infantry, traces its history to 1842, when its parent company known as the Adrian Guards was organized. It continued as such until the Civil War, when its members became a part of one of the Volunteer Regiments. In 1870, it was reorganized and designated as Company B, First Regiment. Its designation changed in 1898 to Company B, 31st Volunteer Infantry, and it served through the Spanish-American War, both in this country and in Cuba. The company saw service again in the Michigan copper strike. On June 22, 1916, as Company B, 32nd Michigan Infantry, it was mustered into Federal service and went to the Mexican Border. It returned home in 1917 and was again called out a few months later for World War service. It became Company B, 126th Infantry. It served throughout the World War as part of the 32nd Division and with the Army of Occupation in Germany.

Following the war, it was reorganized and re-recognized as Company B, Infantry, Michigan National Guard,

March 10, 1921, and then redesignated Company B, 126th Infantry, its present designation, on November 28, 1921. Since that time, Company B has maintained a strict armory training prograth, has attended the regular annual

field training encampments and attended the Second Army Maneuvers in Allegan in 1936 and in Wisconsin in 1940.

It was mobilized at its home station on October 15, 1940, and within a few days left for Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, where it is now undergoing a year of intensive training under Federal guidance.

Captain George C. Bond, the present commander, served as a Private and Corporal during the World War period from June 30, 1918, to January 17, 1919. Following the World War, he re-enlisted and served as a Private, Corporal and Sergeant, successively, from February 8, 1921, to March 19, 1922. He was commissioned Second Lieutenant, Infantry, March 20, 1922; First Lieutenant, September 25, 1928, and Captain, January 7, 1930.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company C, 126th Infantry, is proud of a distinguished record, a long and unbroken history of service. Out of the ranks of this company have risen Brigadier General Perley L. Abbey, Colonel Joseph B. Westnedge, and many other men of distinguished service.

It originated as the Kalamazoo Light Guard in June, 1859, under Captain John Dudgeon. On April 25, 1861, the Guard became part of the Second Michigan Infantry for service in the Civil War. It was reorganized on March 4, 1873, as Company D, Second Regiment; only to be redesignated again, later, as Company C.

At the outbreak of the Spanish-American War, it became Company C, 32nd Michigan Voluntary Infantry, with which it served, beginning April 26, 1898. When it returned from service in November, it was again designated Company C, Second Infantry. Under Captain John P. DeRight, the company was reorganized in the 32nd Michigan Infantry, April 22, 1915.

On July 15, 1917, Company C joined the Federal forces to serve in the World War. It trained at Camp Mac-Arthur, Waco, Texas, until it left for overseas in February, 1918, and saw first action in May of that year. May 17-July 22 it served in the Alsace sector; July 22-August 23, in the Aisne-Marne offensive; August 23-September 9, in the Oise-Aisne offensive; September 22-November 11, in the Meuse-Argonne offensive; November 17-20, at Longwy: November 20-December 1, in Luxem-

berg; and December 1, 1918-April, 1919, on the right bank of the Rhine. The service ended in May, 1919.


On August 25, 1920, the company was reorganized under Captain Claud M. Shook, after which it was known as Company E until April 30, 1921, when it was redesignated Company C, 126th Infantry.

On September 2, 1912, this unit joined with companies from Jackson and Ann Arbor to quell a riot at Jackson State Prison. When the strike occurred in the copper country, the Kalamazoo company joined with the entire Michigan Guard to maintain order from July 24 to November 1, 1913. It was mustered into Federal service at the Mexican Border from June 19, 1916, to February, 1917. From January 12 to February 16, 1937, it rendered service to civil authorities in the Flint strike area.

With but two or three exceptions, Company C has placed a man on the state rifle team in each of the past 16 years. The company's own musketry team represented the regiment in the Hearst Musketry Trophy Match in 1938 and won fourth place in the national meet.

Company C was called into Federal service under the command of Captain Glen H. Walker, First Lieutenant William H. Fitzgerald and Second Lieutenant Arthur D. Bush, on October 15, 1940, and left for Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, on the 23rd for a year of training.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Born from an idea originating in the mind of Lieutenant Henry A. Geerds as he laid in a shell hole in France watching untrained men go to their deaths, Company D, 126th Infantry, has become one of the outstanding National Guard units in the country. After the war, Lieutenant Ceerds toiled night and day until a battery of Field Artillery was authorized for Holland. First enlistments, including some of the present personnel, began June 20, 1920, but before Federal recognition, Lieutenant Geerds was informed of a vacancy in the 126th Infantry, and he promptly took the necessary steps to fill this vacancy. On March 22, 1921, Company D was Federally recognized.

Led by Captain Geerds, the company continuously improved, and in 1928, 1929 and 1930, it was adjudged the outstanding company in military proficiency of the 126th Infantry, receiving the Badger Trophy, a prize plaque donated by the officers of the sister brigade from Wisconsin, the 64th.

Because of its outstanding athletic achievements, the word throughout the annual encampments has been "Beat Holland," but the armory trophy case contains many awards.

In 1929, Captain Geerds was promoted to Major and

was succeeded by First Lieutenant John Bremer, who became a Captain. Lieutenant Oscar W. Johnson, who assisted Captain Bremer, later resigned because of physical disabilities.

The present commander, Captain H. A. Lucas, took

command in 1937. He began his military career in Illinois

as a Private in 1911. During the World War, he served as a Private, Corporal and Sergeant and was commissioned Second Lieutenant February 23, 1918. Commissioned First Lieutenant January 25, 1931, he took command of the unit and was promoted to Captain May 11, 1937.

First Lieutenant Martin Japinga served during the World War and was stationed at Ann Arbor, Michigan, until the Armistice. He enlisted as a Corporal in 1920 in Company D and served as Corporal and Sergeant until 1930, when he was commissioned First Lieutenant. Second Lieutenant Richard Smeenge enlisted as a Private in Company D in 1921 and has served continuously since that date as Private, Corporal and Sergeant. He was commissioned in 1930.


At the \$55,000 armory, which was donated to the unit by the town of Holland for a purchase price of \$15,000 in 1924, Company D was mobilized on October 15, 1940, and within a few days left for Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, where it is now undergoing a year of intensive training under Federal guidance.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company E, 126th Infantry, is the present designation of the military unit that has represented Big Rapids, Michigan, for the past 65 years. It was first organized in 1875 by S. G. Webster, a prominent Civil War veteran. B. F. Brazee was its first Captain, and the company was known as Brazee's Rifles.

During the Spanish-American War, they saw service as Company A, 34th Michigan Infantry, from April 26, 1898, to December 13, 1898, under Captain Eli Falardeau, and participated in the Santiago, Cuba, campaign.

They were in service on the Mexican Border as Company D, 32nd Infantry, from September, 1916, to March, 1917, Captain Charles L. McCormick commanding.

The company returned to the United States in May, 1919, under command of Captain Fred Jankowski, Captain McCormick having been promoted to Major.

In the reorganization of the National Guard after the war, the company was Federally recognized on May 5, 1920.

In addition to its war service, the company has had two tours of strike duty. The first was two months in the copper country in 1913, being stationed at Houghton and Hancock in the Keweenaw Peninsula. The other was seven



On July 1, 1916, the outfit was ordered to Grayling, Michigan, for mobilization, and upon completion the regiment was ordered to El Paso, Texas, where it served, with alternate station of Las Cruces, New Mexico, on border guard until January, 1917, when it was ordered to Fort Wayne, Michigan, and mustered out on February 15, 1917, and returned to home station. In May, 1917, the

commanding officer and several enlisted men were ordered to duty at the armory.

Following its call and mobilization for World War service, this unit became Company F, 126th Infantry, 32nd Division, at Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas, September 23, 1917, following a merger with Company G of Muskegon. The unit served throughout the war with the 32nd Division and as part of the Army of Occupation. In May, 1919, the last men of the organization were mustered out of service at Camp Custer, Michigan.

On March 18, 1919, reorganization was effected, the first Michigan unit being from Grand Haven. The old letter F was restored; however, the regimental designation remained 126th as a part of the 32nd Division.

As a part of this division, the unit was mobilized at its home station on October 15, 1940, and sent to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of intensive training under Federal guidance.

### FACTUAL HISTORY

Company F, 126th Infantry, traces its history to the organization of an independent military company—The Yates Light Infantry—in April, 1879, by about 40 of Grand Haven's young men. This unit was admitted into State service on July 24, 1879, as Company F, Second Regiment. In 1883, the name was changed to the Grand Haven Guards (Company F, Second Infantry).

Mobilized April 24, 1898, for the Spanish-American War, this unit, upon its arrival at Camp Eaton, Island Lake, became Company F, 32nd Regiment of Michigan Volunteer Infantry. It arrived at Tampa, Florida, May 22, 1898, where malaria fever, typhoid fever and dysentary were prevalent among the troops. The regiment was ordered to Fernandian, Florida, July 18, 1898, remaining there until August 21, when ordered to Huntsville, Alabama. On September 4, it was ordered to Island Lake, Michigan, and upon arrival was ordered to its home station, Grand Haven. The company was mustered out of Federal service on October 31, 1898.

After muster out, the members met and continued the organization until August 7, 1899, when reorganization was effected, at which time the letter G was assigned and held until April 26, 1905, when the letter F was restored to the company.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

After sending 736 men for service in the Civil War (1861-65), there was no military organization in Muskegon, Michigan, until 1884, when the Muskegon Rifles, ancestor of the present Company G, 126th Infantry, were organized. Organized as militia company in April, 1884, this unit was mustered into State service as Company G, First Infantry, with D. Alcumbrack as Captain. In March, 1891, it was redesignated Company C, Fifth Regiment.

On April 22, 1898, it was mustered into Federal service for the Spanish-American War. By May of the same year, its roster contained three officers and 106 enlisted men. Reassigned as Company C, 34th Michigan Volunteer Infantry, this unit landed at Siboney, Cuba, and formed a reserve in the attack on San Juan Hill, which ended in the capture of Santiago. Returned to the United States, Company C was mustered out of Federal service December 15, 1898.

this unit became Company I, Second Infantry, and continued as such until 1914, when it became Company G, 32nd Michigan Infantry. Called into Federal service for Mexican Border duty on June 19, 1916, it was sent to El Paso, Texas. Returned to Michigan, it was mustered out of Federal service in February, 1917.

It was again called into Federal service on July 15, 1917, this time for World War duty. In the reorganization of the National Guard and in the formation of the 32nd Division, at Waco, Texas, in September, 1917, Company G was disbanded, part of its personnel going to Company I, 126th Infantry, and part to Company L, 126th Infantry. After the war, the remaining members returned to Muskegon in May, 1919.

On August 23, 1920, it was reorganized and recognized as Company G, Infantry, and it was redesignated Company G, 126th Infantry, November 28, 1921.

When the 32nd Division was ordered into Federal service for a year of intensive training, Company G was mobilized at its home station on October 15, 1940, and sent

Its members, clad in blue overall garments, furnished their own muskets.

Later organizations fought in all of the wars of their

time—the Civil War, the Mexican War, the Spanish-American War and the World War. During the World War, Company H—then Company E of the 32nd Michigan—fought in all of the major encounters of the Red Arrow Division, including the Marne, the Meuse-Argonne, and Belleau Wood. It was also a part of the Army of Occupation in Germany after the

cessation of hostilities.

Company H is housed at its home station in the first state-owned armory. The armory was built in 1908 and has accommodations for a war-strength company. Among the facilities it affords are shower baths, a recreation room, drill floor, and a basketball court. There is a modern kitchen, a large mess hall for the feeding of the men, and an adequately lighted indoor range for marksmanship activities. The commissioned officers have their own quarters.




### **FACTUAL HISTORY**





#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Headquarters Detachment, Third Battalion, 126th Infantry, was first Federally recognized at Grand Rapids as Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, Infantry, Michigan National Guard, June 10, 1921, then redesignated Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 126th Infantry, on November 28, 1921.

Following its redesignation as Headquarters Detachment, Third Battalion, 126th Infantry, in 1940, it was mobilized at its home station on October 15, 1940, and sent to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of train-

First Lieutenant Charles Lawyer was in Federal service as a Private and Sergeant, Infantry, from April 5, 1919, to April 18, 1923. He was commissioned Second Lieutenant, Infantry, October 15, 1924, and First Lieutenant, January 27, 1930. He was transferred to Military Police Company, 32nd Division, as Commander, November 3,

Second Lieutenant Harry C. Menclewski, present commander, who assumed command on November 2, 1940, first enlisted in the 126th Infantry in September, 1927, and served as Private, Private First Class, Corporal, Sergeant, Master Sergeant (Regimental Sergeant Major), and was commissioned and Federally recognized as Second Lieuten-








#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Organized in 1880 as the Custer Guard, in memory of General Custer of the Seventh Cavalry, Company I, 126th Infantry, is one of the 10 oldest National Guard units in the State of Michigan.

The 27th of June, 1882, saw the company reorganized as Company I, Second Infantry, the letter designation being changed several years later to Company E.

On April 23, 1898, Company I, along with the rest of the Michigan National Guard, was mobilized at Island Lake, Michigan, under orders of President William McKinley, for Spanish-American War service. Training was undergone in Tampa and Fernandina, Florida. The unit was preparing to embark for Cuba when the order for Cuban service was cancelled and the organization returned to Island Lake, September 16, 1898, and was mustered out of the Federal service between October 23 and November 9, 1898.

On July 10, 1899, another reorganization of the company was ordered and the letter designation was changed to Company H, Second Infantry, and, as such, it saw service in the Durand Railroad strike, Durand, Michigan, in 1910, and again in the Copper country of the upper peninsula during the Copper strikes of 1913.

Shortly after their return from the Copper country disturbance, Company I went to Washington, D. C., and participated in the parade and ceremonies during the inauguration of President Woodrow Wilson.

Reorganization again hit the company, and on May 14, 1915, the designation was changed to Company I, 32nd

Michigan Infantry. On June 19, 1916, Company I was ordered into Mexican Border service, serving until February 3, 1917, when the unit was mustered out at Fort Wayne, Detroit, Michigan.

Company I was called for World War service July 17,

1917, and was drafted into Federal service with the National Guard, August 5, 1917, going to Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas, for training for World War service. In the fall of 1917, the company was disbanded, the personnel being assigned to Company K and other units of the regiment. Lieutenant Colonel Lewis J. Donovan, then commanding Company I, was transferred to a Wisconsin unit and the letter designation was given to a company from Big Rapids, Michigan.

During the reorganization of the National Guard in 1920, Colonel Donovan organized Company I and it was Federally recognized on August 30, 1920, as Company I, 126th Infantry, with Colonel Donovan as the company commander.

Company I has been active in Post and Regimental rifle matches and sports contests, having the Post Championship ball teams for many years, and winning the Post Rifle matches two years in succession, 1930-1931.

During the motor strike in Flint, Michigan, the company saw active service from January 12 to February 15, 1937.


Captain Claude L. Barkley is the present company commander, having commanded the organization since March 23, 1926.

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Originally organized in 1882 and first Federally recognized on June 25, 1916, Company K, 126th Infantry, has to its credit service on the Mexican Border and throughout the World War as part of the 32nd Division, which also went into Germany with the Army of Occupation.

Reorganized following the war, it was Federally recognized as Company K, Infantry, Michigan National Guard, September 1, 1920, and redesignated Company K, 126th Infantry, its present designation, on November 28, 1921.

As part of this regiment and of the 32nd Division, it was mobilized at its home station under Federal call on October 15, 1940, and sent to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of intensive training.

Captain Merle H. Howe, its former commander who was succeeded on November 25, 1940, by the present commander, was in Federal service as a Private and Private First Class, Air Corps, from August 15,

to January 4, 1918, and as a First Lieutenant, Air from January 5, 1918, to February 19, 1919

Following the World War, he was commissioned Second Lieutenant, Infantry, January 20, 1923; First Lieutenant, August 11, 1923, and Captain, July 7, 1926. At present, he is attending the Battalion Commander and Staff Officer Course at Fort Benning, Georgia.

First Lieutenant Laurel E. Butler, present commander, enlisted in the Michigan National Guard on February 21, 1921, and served in the grades of Private, Corporal, Sergeant, First Sergeant, until April 1, 1926, at which time he was commissioned Second Lieutenant, Infantry. He was commissioned First Lieutenant July 17, 1935, and graduated from the Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia, 1937. He was assigned to command this unit on November 25, 1940.

It is difficult to trace the history of Company L, 126th Infantry, further back than 1861, when the Grand Rapids unit was known as the Grand Rapids Light Guard, but in 1848, several public-minded citizens of Grand Rapids formed the Grand Rapids Rifle and Drill Team. Due to the loss of the unit's records and files, there is considerable difficulty in plotting its history in any great detail. In 1853, it became the Grand Rapids Light Guard.

In 1861, upon the outbreak of the Civil War, the Grand Rapids Light Guard formed the nucleus of the Second Michigan Volunteer Infantry, which later was redesignated Third Michigan Volunteer Infantry. It saw service throughout the Civil War. It is through this service that the present 126th Infantry makes claim to Civil War service.

In 1872, the Grand Rapids Guard was reorganized by former members of the Grand Rapids Light Guard. It was mustered into State service in 1874 as Company B, Second Regiment, Michigan State Troops. In 1874, Company B, Second Michigan Infantry, was sent to Muskegon to aid civil authorities. Later in the same year, it was sent to Greenville to aid in the logging strike.

In 1898, the unit's designation was changed to Company B, 32nd Michigan Volunteer Infantry, and as such saw service in the Spanish-American War. In 1910, Company B, 32nd Michigan Infantry, was ordered to Durand, Michigan, during the railroad strike. In 1913, it was ordered to duty during the copper strike in Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Its designation was changed in 1915 to Company L, 32nd Infantry, Michigan National Guard, and as such was ordered to El Paso, Texas, during the Mexican Border campaign of 1916. In July, 1917, the unit became Company L, 126th Infantry. Later, the company was redesignated Headquarters Detachment, 126th Infantry, and saw service during the World War and as part of the Army of Occupation in Germany. Demobilized in 1919, it was reorganized and Federally recognized as Company L, 126th Infantry, in 1920. It saw service during the automobile strike in Flint, Michigan, in 1937.

This organization claims to have had more general officers come from its ranks than any other organization in Michigan. George E. Judd, who commanded the organization in 1872, later became Brigadier General. Isreal C. Smith, who succeeded Captain Judd, also became a Brigadier General. Colonel Herkimer, who succeeded General Smith, also became a Brigadier General. Charles W. Caulkins, First Lieutenant of Company B, later became Adjutant General of the State of Michigan. William T. McGurrin enlisted as a Private in the unit, was Colonel of the regiment during the Spanish-American War and later became Adjutant Ceneral of Michigan. William S. Kinney enlisted as Private in 1875 and became Colonel, assistant to the Brigadier General during the Spanish-American War and as such commanded the brigade for a short time. Edgar H. Campbell, who commanded the





#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Mustered for both the Spanish-American and World Wars, Company M, 126th Infantry, traces its history to the White Guard and Company G, Second Infantry, Michigan National Guard, organized November 30, 1897, with Captain E. Berkey Jones as commander.

Company G, with the rest of the regiment, was mustered into Federal service for the Spanish-American War on May 14, 1898. The Second Infantry was redesignated the 32nd Michigan Volunteers and ordered to Florida, where it remained until mustered out in September of the same year.

In January, 1899, the regiment was again reorganized and Company G was redesignated as Company M, Second Infantry.

On April 22, 1915, the regiment was again redesignated, this time as the 32nd Infantry, and in the summer of 1916, the unit, then Company M, 32nd Infantry, was mustered for service at El Paso, Texas, for

Mexican Border duty. It performed guard duty on the Border, then was returned home and mustered out on February 15, 1917.

Called into Federal service again for World War duty, it was sent to Texas for training, and upon the organization of the 32nd Division and the redesignation of the regiment, it became Company M, 126th Infantry. It served overseas with the 32nd Division throughout the war, seeing actual combat on several fronts. Returned to the United States, it was mustered out of service in the spring of 1919.

Following the World War, it was reorganized and designated Company M, Infantry, August 30, 1920, and redesignated Company M, 126th Infantry, November 28, 1921.

It was mobilized at its home station on October 15, 1940, and a few days later was on its way to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of intensive training.



#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company C, 125th Infantry, was first organized on December 29, 1870, as the Monroe Light Guard. Its designation was changed on July 6, 1874, to Company F, First Infantry. On May 19, 1876, the organization was redesignated as Company D, First Infantry. On July 3, 1885, it was changed to Company G, Fourth Infantry.

The Spanish-American War brought the company to its first Federal Service, when, on May 9, 1898, it was mustered into Federal Service as Company M, 31st Michigan Volunteer Infantry, and was sent to Cuba, where it served with credit. The organization was mustered out of Federal Service on May 17, 1899, and re-entered State service as Company M, First Infantry.

On July 10, 1899, the company was redesignated Company D, First Infantry, and remained under this status for nearly 13 years, then on January 31, 1912, it became Company K, First Infantry. On April 22, 1915, the company assumed another designation, that of Company K, 31st Infantry.

On June 19, 1916, the Monroe men were again called to Federal Service for duty on the Mexican Border and were stationed at El Paso, Texas. They were mustered out of Federal Service on January 20, 1917. Upon entry of the United States into the World War, the company was mustered into Federal Service on July 15, 1917, and a few months later, September 19, 1917, was transferred to Com-

pany C and Company D of the 125th Infantry. These two organizations served with distinction on the defensive of Alsace-Lorraine, Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne and with the Army of Occupation. The personnel of Companies C and D, 125th Infantry, the former members of old Company K, 31st Infantry, were mustered out of Federal Service in May of 1919.

The personnel of old Company K was the nucleus of a new organization which was Federally recognized on January 19, 1922, as the Howitzer Company, 125th Infantry. The present organization, Company C, 125th Infantry, received its designation on October 4, 1940.

On October 15, 1940, with other units of the regiment, it was mobilized and sent to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of intensive training.

World War—Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne, Alsace. It also was honored with a foreign decoration—the French Croix de Guerre with Palm. Following its return from overseas, the regiment was mustered out of service from May 24 to June 2, 1919.

During 1920 and 1921, the various units of the regiment were reorganized at their home stations, and on June 10, 1921, the regimental headquarters received Federal recognition as Headquarters, Infantry, and on November 28, 1921, it was redesignated Headquarters, 126th Infantry. Since that time, the unit has continued to serve as an important part of the forces of the State of Michigan and the United States.

Following its participation in the Second Army Maneuvers, Camp McCoy, Sparta, Wisconsin, in 1940, the regiment was again called into Federal service, this time for a year of intensive training. On October 15, 1940, the units were mobilized at their respective home stations and soon afterward left for Camp Beauregard, Louisiana.

Thus, as members of an organization which has faithfully served state and nation for more than 85 years, the present personnel of the 126th Infantry again leave their friends and homes to better prepare themselves for any emergency that might arise.

## 107IH ENGINEERS

The 107th Engineers was formed at Camp MacArthur, Cembarkation for the United States was effected May C

Texas, on or about September 18, 1917, with Colonel Paul Stanley Bond in command. The First Battalion was recruited and organized in Northern Michigan, the Second Battalion in Wisconsin.

Only Company A (now Company E) existed prior to 1917. Its history dates back to the "Calumet Light Guard," organized in 1881, and redesignated Company H, Third Infantry, August 8, 1881. In December, 1891, it became Company D, Fifth Infantry. When the volunteers for the Spanish-American War were organized at Island Lake in April and May, 1898, it became Company D, 34th Michigan Volunteer Infantry, and participated in battles in and around Santiago, Cuba. In December, 1899, it became Company E, Third Michigan Infantry.

On June 1, 1906, this company was transferred to the Corps of Engineers and became Company A, Corps of Engineers, Michigan National Guard. During the winter and spring of 1916-17, Company A served on the Mexican Border at Camp Bliss, El Paso, Texas. Late in the spring of 1917, it guarded the locks at Salt Ste. Marie, Michigan. In October, 1917, after detached service (camp construction work) at Camp Custer, Michigan, the company entrained for Camp MacArthur, Texas, where it joined the 107th Engineers.

The men composing the 107th Engineers were for the most part from the copper, coal and lumber regions. They were rough and hardy, well skilled in the use of engineer tools. This early training stressed construction of roads, bridges and trenches. One incident indicating the physical condition of the men follows: Early in the afternoon of a normal work day, the regiment was ordered to assemble, prepared to march at dusk to a site five and one-half miles from its camp, construct trenches for four hours and return. The march both ways was at the rate of over four miles per hour without rest and a new Army record was established for trench construction.

The regiment trained at Camp MacArthur until January 2, 1918, when it was ordered to leave for embarkation at Hoboken, New Jersey. Arriving in Brest, France, February 14, 1918, the regiment (less one company assigned to the Engineer School for demonstrating purposes) was employed in construction of cantonment areas until it entered the combat zone.

On June 26, 1918, it rejoined the 32nd Division in the Alsace defensive sector in the vicinity of Belfort and remained with this division for the duration of the war. It took part in the following offensives: Marne-Vesle, Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne, and served with the Army of Occupation (east of the Rhine River) from December, 1918,

4, 1919. The regiment arrived in Philadelphia on May 18, 1919. After a few days at Camp Dix, it was moved to Camp Custer, Michigan, where it was mustered out of the service on May 25, 1919.

During the World War, the activities of the regiment were governed by the theory, which at present is in effect in the United States Army and most foreign armies, that the engineers can be used to much better advantage behind the front line units in the maintenance of routes of communications. While in division and corps reserve, it continued its engineer operations. Its front line action was by small parties on raids, as wire cutting details, in the reconnaissance of the ground and attempted river crossings. Total casualties due to fire were less than 10 per cent of its strength. This regiment was often left in the forward areas to continue with its engineering work after the remainder of the division was withdrawn to rest. But no matter what its duties, the 107th Engineers performed them faithfully, bravely and efficiently, establishing a most admirable wartime record.

Following the World War, the 107th Engineer Regiment was not permitted to be reorganized immediately, but in 1937, the First Battalion was reorganized with units receiving Federal recognition as follows: Headquarters, First Battalion, Detroit, April 26, 1937; Company A, Calumet, April 26, 1937; Company B, Sault Ste. Marie, April 5, 1937; and Company C, Detroit, April 19, 1937.

In 1938, the following two units received Federal recognition on the dates indicated: Medical Department Detachment, First Battalion, Calumet, June 13, 1938, and Headquarters and Service Company (less Band Section), Detroit, May 4, 1938.

The reorganization of the regiment was completed in 1939 and 1940, when the following Federal recognitions were granted: Company D, Marquette, October 26, 1939; Company E (redesignated such from Company A), Escanaba, October 27, 1939; Company F, Calumet, December 4, 1939; Regimental Headquarters, December 29, 1939; Band, February 19, 1940; Headquarters, Second Battalion, May 21, 1940, and Headquarters, First Battalion, May 24, 1940.

With both a complete armory and field training schedule, training of the 107th Engineers since reorganization has been as the combat engineer regiment of the 32nd Division. Following its participation in the Second Army Maneuvers at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, in the summer of 1940, the regiment was mobilized on October 15, 1940, and ordered to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of in-

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

As the youngest unit in its regiment, the 107th Engineers Band was organized and granted Federal recognition on February 19, 1940. #### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company B, 107th Engineers, was the first unit of its regiment to be reorganized following the World War. It was Federally recognized on April 5, 1937, at Sault Ste. Marie by Major A. D. W. Riley, U. S. A., with two officers and 60 enlisted men present. The company received its equipment, and in June, 1937, it attended summer training camp at Grayling, Michigan.

The armory, home of Company B, was an old building when the company was organized, but much improvement has been made by the company. A new heating plant was installed, as well as a false ceiling of celotex. The labor for the ceiling was donated by members of the company. They went to the armory each evening after their own regular jobs to help on the project. The city commission has since deeded the armory property to the State of Michigan to be used as a state armory.

In August, 1938, a detail of 24 men went to Escanaba, Michigan, to perform guard duty at the Upper Peninsula Fair. They were well received and complimented highly for their work.

In October, 1939, the War Department authorized seven days additional field training. Company B performed this duty at Fort Brady, where certain engineering problems were taken up, such as road repair, road reconnaissance, etc. About this time, the strength of the company was increased to 76 men.

In August, 1940, Company B took part in the Second Army Maneuvers, Camp McCoy, Sparta, Wisconsin, which stressed conditions to be met in actual warfare. On October 15, 1940, it was mobilized at its home station and ordered to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana,





#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company D, 107th Engineers, stationed at Marquette, Michigan, was Federally recognized October 26, 1939. The company officers were First Lieutenant Philip D. Pearson, commanding, and First Lieutenant Allen F. Olson, First Junior Officer. The strength of the company then was 50 enlisted men.

On March 4, 1940, Sergeant William Richards received his commission and was Federally Recognized as Second Lieutenant, becoming the company's Second Junior Officer.

The first public appearance of Company D was made May 30, 1940, and its success was a

compliment to the work done by the entire personnel.

On August 12, 1940, the company left for Second Army Maneuvers at Camp McCoy, near Sparta, Wisconsin, and got its first taste of field work functioning as an infantry unit as well as

work, functioning as an infantry unit as well as combat engineers. It returned to Marquette on August 30.

On October 15, 1940, Company D was inducted into Federal service with the United States Army, and its strength was brought to 78 enlisted men.


The company is now stationed at Camp Beauregard, Louisiana.



#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Company E, 107th Engineers, traces its history further back than any other unit in the regiment, although the present organization was effected on April 5, 1937, when it was Federally recognized as Company A, 107th Engineers. A unit at Escanaba was organized and Federally recognized as Company E, 107th Engineers, on October 27, 1939, but in 1940, these two units exchanged letter designations and the unit at Calumet became Company E, 107th Engineers.

This Calumet unit traces its history to the Calumet Light Guard, which applied for incorporation into the Michigan State Troops in August, 1881. The Calumet Light Guard must have been in existence prior to this time, though, because only organized units could apply for incorporation into the Michigan State Troops at that time.

On August 8, 1881, it became Company H, Third Infantry, and in December, 1891, it became Company D, Fifth Infantry. When the volunteers for the Spanish-American War were organized at Island Lake in April and May, 1898, Company D, Fifth Infantry, Calumet,



became Company D, 34th Michigan Infantry, United States Volunteers, and as such participated in the battles in and around San Diego, Cuba. In December, 1899, the outfits were re-shuffled and the company at Calumet became Company E, Third Infantry, Michigan National Guard.

On June 1, 1906, the company was transferred to the Corps of Engineers and became Company A, Corps of Engineers, Michigan National Guard. It continued as such and served on the Mexican Border in 1916, and for the World War, it became part of the 107th Engineers, composed of Michigan and Wisconsin troops. It served throughout the war with this division, seeing service also in the Army of Occupation. Following the World War, it was reorganized and redesignated as stated above.

On October 15, 1940, it was mobilized at its home station and ordered to Camp Beauregard, Douisiana, for a year of intensive training.





Although an outgrowth of the "Sanitary Train" formed during the World War, the medical regiment, as such, has a relatively short history, as its formation as part of the United States Army did not occur until after the World War. Therefore, as a medical regiment, the 107th has but little to offer as history in the way of participation in battles, campaigns, or overseas operations, but several units of this regiment have been designated by the Adjutant General of the Army as successor units for organizations that have a brilliant record as component parts of the National Guard and of the American Expeditionary Force. The present designation of these units, together with their National Guard and World War designations,

Pre-war, Ambulance Company No. 1; World War, 168th Ambulance Company; Present, Company G. Pre-War, Ambulance Company No. 2; World War, 128th Ambulance Company; Present, Company D. Pre-War, Field Hospital Company No. 1; World War, 128th Field Hospital Company; Present, Company H.

On October 4, 1911, the existing Medical Department of the National Guard was organized into Ambulance Company No. 1 and Field Hospital Company No. 1. Both units served during the Copper Country strike in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan during 1913, rendering medical service as needed to troops and civilians alike. Ambulance Company No. 1 spent several months on the Mexican Border, being mobilized June 19, 1916, and helped chase Villa back to Mexico. Hardly had this unit returned to Detroit from the Border when it was included in the 42nd (Rainbow) Division, reporting at Camp

Mills, New York, for mobilization for World War service early in September, 1917. Its designation was changed to the 168th Ambulance Company, which served overseas as part of the 117th Sanitary Train in the Champagne-Marne, Aisne-Marne, St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives and in defensive sectors in Lorraine and Champagne. It was also in the Army of Occupation in Cermany, not being mustered out of Federal service until

May 12, 1919, at Camp Custer, Michigan.

Field Hospital Company No. 1 was not called for World War service until the mobilization of the 32nd (Red Arrow) Division at Camp Grayling, when, with Ambulance Company No. 2, it was inducted into the Army and made part of the 107th Sanitary Train. Field Hospital Company No. 1 was redesignated the 128th Field Hospital Company and Ambulance Company No. 2 became the 128th Ambulance Company. These units served with the 32nd Division in France during the Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne and Meuse-Argonne offensives, and in defensive sectors in Alsace. These units also were in Germany with the Army of Occupation, finally being discharged at Camp Custer, Michigan, in May, 1919.

After the World War, when the National Guard was reorganized, veterans of the 128th Ambulance Company, 128th Field Hospital Company and 168th Ambulance Company were used as a nucleus in the formation of the 119th Hospital Company, 119th and 120th Ambulance Companies, Medical Supply Section 107 and Medical Laboratory Section 107. These units, together with the 119th Sanitary Company, were assigned to the 107th Medical Regiment March 15, 1923, and the regiment, as

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

The present Company E, 107th Medical Regiment, was Federally recognized as the 121st Ambulance Company on June 18, 1930, a date that also marked the re-entry into State and Federal service of Captain Matthew R. Slattery, who was commanding officer of the 128th Ambulance Company, 32nd Division, at the end of the World War. The unit was redesignated Company F, 107th Medical Regiment, January 1, 1937, and Company E, 107th Medical Regiment, its present designation, April 1, 1940.

In September, 1931, a detail of 10 men assisted at the American Legion Convention in Detroit. On Memorial Day, 1932, the 121st Ambulance Company was presented with the 128th Ambulance Company Guidon by Major R. C. Perkins, as the 128th Ambulance Company during the World War was composed of Bay City personnel. For being the most outstanding company in the 107th Medical Regiment for three consecutive years, the unit received the Chaplain Pullinger Trophy in 1934.

On January 13, 1937, a detachment of 13 men under the command of Lieutenant A. G. Bickel left Bay City for duty in the Flint General Motors strike. This detail was followed 17 days later by the entire company under the command of Captain M. R. Slattery. A detachment of six men from Company D and six from Company E were attached to the company. The unit returned to Bay City February 17, 1937.

In 1939, the unit gave a field demonstration for the Reserve Officers at the City Airport, and in 1940, it participated in a review at Detroit in honor of Ceneral Heinrich Pickert who retired April 23, 1940. Captain Clyde S. Tarter was assigned to command Company E in April, 1940, and continued during Second Army Maneuvers at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, August, 1940. He was succeeded by Lieutenant Harry F. Vail, October 8, 1940. On October 15, 1940, the unit was mobilized and sent to Camp

Beauregard, Louisiana, for a year of intensive training. S.O.O.







### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

An old outfit with a new job. This phrase fits Company H, 107th Medical Regiment, to a "T." Organized and Federally recognized on October 27, 1922, as the 120th Ambulance Company (horse-drawn), it was still an ambulance company when the designation was changed January 1, 1937, to Company E, 107th Medical Regiment. On April 1, 1940, the unit was transferred to the Third Battalion and redesignated Company H, a Hospital or Clearing Company, but the boys took the complete changeover as a matter of course, performing exceptionally well at its first camp as a Hospital Company at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, in 1940.

This unit traces its history to the Medical Detachment, Second Infantry, which was recognized July 19, 1904, and then redesignated Field Hospital No. 1, January 31, 1912.

This unit served during the Mexican Border disturbance from July 9, 1916, to March 25, 1917, and was stationed at El Paso, Texas. On July 15, 1917, it was mustered into Federal service for the World War, and on September 22, 1917, it was redesignated the 125th Field Hospital, 107th Sanitary Train, 32nd Division. After serving throughout the war with the 32nd Division, it was mustered out on May 16, 1919. Its history since the World War is given above.

Captain Alfred E. Hollard was the first commander following the unit's reorganization in 1922. On April 1, 1940, he was promoted to Major and commanding officer of the Third Battalion, being succeeded as company commander by Captain Marco Hansen. The following three sergeants have been with the unit since it was organized in 1922: Staff Sergeant Burr Smith, Staff Sergeant D. Rhodes and Staff Sergeant Earl Haines. Most of the remaining enlisted men have been with the unit for periods accruing to six or seven years but their terms of service

Active Duty National Guard Bureau, May 20, 1938, to November 15, 1940.

The 72nd Field Artillery Brigade came into being in September, 1940, when the 119th Field Artillery, 177th Field Artillery and 182nd Field Artillery regiments were assigned to it. Colonel Joseph H. Lewis, formerly commander of the 57th Field Artillery Brigade, was assigned to command the 72nd Brigade and now holds the rank of Brigadier General.

72ND FIELD ARTILLERY

The 119th Field Artillery was changed from a 75-millimeter gun regiment to a 155-millimeter gun regiment by Special Orders 224, Adjutant Ceneral's Office, State of Michigan, September 18, 1940. By this same order, it was assigned to the 72nd Brigade.

The 177th Field Artillery was formed, by authority of the same General Orders, through the conversion of all the Michigan units of the 107th Quartermaster Regiment and the First Squadron, 106th Cavalry. It was also assigned on this date to the 72nd Brigade.

commander of the First Battalion, 126th Infantry, was given permission by the Adjutant General of Michigan to organize his Battalion Headquarters Company in Adrian as a permanent unit assigned to that city. Accordingly, in April, 1921, Major Benner appointed as his Adjutant and Commanding Officer of the new unit First Lieutenant Weyland S. Harvey, who immediately started recruiting and organization work.

With the cooperation of members of Company B, city officials and business men, the recruiting campaign was highly successful, with the result that on June 7, 1921, a total of 41 men was enrolled and Federal recognition was granted the new unit as Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 126th Infantry. The members were largely high school and college students.

From the date of its recognition, the company has made a fine record in its field training duties, armory training and general efficiency. Its communications platoon has been especially outstanding, having won many commendations for its excellence in the various phases of communications work.

In one respect, the company is unique. In the 20 years since its inception, it has had only three commanding officers—Lieutenant Weyland S. Harvey, Lieutenant Alfred J. Mead and Lieutenant Albert H. Mead. The last two are twin brothers.

Of the early members of the company, four are still active in the National Guard. Technical Sergeant Edward Lezotte and Staff Sergeant Percy Coleman are still on this company's rolls, while First Lieutenant Leroy Richardson and Second Lieutenant Victor Shadbolt are officers assigned to Company B, 126th Infantry.

Ordered into service for a year of intensive training, this unit was mobilized October 15, 1940, and soon after left for Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, under its recently acquired designation of Headquarters Detachment, First Battalion, 126th Infantry.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Granted Federal recognition on May 4, 1938, the Headquarters and Service Company, 107th Engineers, has efficiently functioned as a part of the regiment. Besides its armory training schedule, the unit has participated in the annual summer field training encampments since its reorganization and proved to be a well-trained unit during the Second Army Maneuvers at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, in 1940.

SHIELD: Gules, in sinister chief the badge of the First Corps of the Spanish War argent and in base issuant a demilion rampant or, on a canton of the last (or) a bend of the first (gules) charged with three alerions of the third (or).

CREST: That for regiments of Michigan National Guard. Wreath: Argent and gules.

MOTTO: Viam Praeparamus (We prepare the way).

DESCRIPTION: The baptism of fire of this regiment occurred in the Toul Sector; this is represented by the canton, the arms of Lorraine. The silver badge of Second Division, First Corps, of the Spanish War is displayed in sinister chief. History shows that for many years the district around what is now the city of El Paso, Texas, was known as Ponce de Leon's Ranch, having been settled and colonized by a group of the followers of that explorer, and who named their new home after their leader. The lion issuant is, therefore, taken from Ponce de Leon's crest, to denote service on the Mexican Border at El Paso, Texas.

The 119th Field Artillery was first organized as such during the World War period on September 22, 1917, when the following units of the Michigan National Guard were merged to form the regiment: First Battalion Field Arillery, First Squadron Cavalry and Headquarters and Supply Companies of the 31st Infantry.

Although the 119th Field Artillery as a regiment dates only to 1917, some of its units trace their histories back to the 1870's, and they are credited with prior service as

follows:

Company K, First Infantry, was organized June 16, 1877, and redesignated Company F, First Infantry, July 3, 1885. Company H, First Infantry, was organized March 17, 1876, and was redesignated Company E, First Infantry, July 3, 1885. The First Infantry entered Federal service for the Spanish-American War on April 26, 1898, and was redesignated the 31st Michigan Volunteers. After serving in Cuba from February 1 to April 13, 1899, it was mustered out at Savannah, Ceorgia, May 17, 1899, the units reverting to their former State status.

Company F, First Infantry, was redesignated Company B, First Independent Battalion, July 10, 1899, and again redesignated Fourth Section, First Battery, May 20, 1905. The First Battery was redesignated Battery A, First Field Artillery, May 18, 1911. Company E, First Infantry, was redesignated Company E, Second Infantry, July 19, 1899, and then redesignated Battery B, First Field Artillery, on

November 6, 1911.


Both Batteries A and B, First Field Artillery, entered Federal service for Mexican Border duty on June 19, 1916, and were stationed at El Paso, Texas. They were mustered out on March 23, 1917.

Besides the Field Artillery units, two Cavalry troops and two Infantry companies, which later became part of the 119th Field Artillery, served on the Mexican Border. Troop A, First Cavalry, which had been organized June 1, 1905, and Troop B, First Cavalry, which had been organized January 30, 1908, entered Federal service for Mexican Border duty on June 19, 1916. They were stationed at El Paso, Texas, and were mustered out March 28, 1917. Headquarters and Supply Companies, 31st Michigan Infantry, which were organized January 21, 1915, also entered Federal service for Mexican Border duty on June 19, 1916. They were also stationed at El Paso, Texas, and mustered out January 20, 1917.

During the period between the Mexican Border disturbance and the World War, several other predecessor units of the 119th Field Artillery were organized. Battery C was organized May 28, 1917, while Troops C and D were organized and combined with Troops A and B to form the First Cavalry Squadron on June 26, 1917.

All these units entered Federal service for the World War on July 15, 1917, and on September 22, 1917, as stated above, the First Battalion Field Artillery, First Squadron Cavalry and Headquarters and Supply Companies, 31st Infantry, were combined to form the 119th

ment, this unit received very favorable comments on its adaptability to field conditions. From 1927 to 1929, this unit was commanded by Captain Austin Jenison. On May 3, 1929, Captain Marshall D. Barr assumed command and carried through to August 2, 1940. During his command many interesting events occurred. In 1932, the unit, with the rest of the 119th Field Artillery, experienced its greatest training in a 170-mile march, from its summer encampment to home station. In 1933, the unit was redesignated from Horse-Drawn 75-Millimeter to Truck-drawn 75-Millimeter.

On July 1, 1940, the Service Battery was merged with Headquarters Battery according to new Tables of Organization, and on September 18, 1940, this unit, along with the regiment, underwent a greater change than ever before, when War Department Orders redesignated the regiment from a 75-Millimeter Truck-

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

The history of Battery A, 119th Field Artillery, dates back to the organization of Company K, First Michigan Infantry, on June 16, 1877. After service during the Spanish-American War and several redesignations, the unit was converted to Field Artillery on May 20, 1905, and redesignated as Fourth Section, First Battery, Michigan Field Artillery. A subsequent redesignation on May 18, 1911, changed the unit to Battery A, First Michigan Field Artillery.

Under this status, the battery saw service on the Mexican Border from June 19, 1916, to March 23, 1917, being stationed at El Paso, Texas. Shortly after returning home, the unit was ordered into Federal service on July 15, 1917, for the World War. It served until May 16, 1919, as Battery A, 119th Field Artillery, 32nd Division. The battery received its baptism of fire, with the regiment, in the Toul sector, where on June 12, 1918, it fired the "first round" fired by Lansing artillery. The shell case from this

first round, properly mounted and engraved has found its place among other regimental mementos in the club room of the Lansing armory.

Following the war, the battery was reorganized and Federally recognized on November 9, 1920, as Battery A, Field Artillery. On July 1, 1921, it was redesignated Battery A, 119th Field Artillery (Horse-Drawn), which was changed to (Truck-Drawn) on July 1, 1933. On September 18, 1940, prior to National Guard mobilization, the regiment was redesignated and reorganized from 75-mm to 155-mm Gun and relieved from assignment to the 57th Field Artillery Brigade, 32nd Division, and assigned to the 72nd Field Artillery Brigade, Corps Artillery.

Among the honors held by the battery is that of being awarded the "Fye" efficiency guidon in 1928 and 1931. This honorary guidon was awarded to the unit within the regiment which displayed the best all-around efficiency for the year. Although this guidon was awarded for only a five-year period, this battery enjoyed the singular distinction of being the only unit to receive this honor more than



### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Battery B, 119th Field Artillery, was first organized as an infantry company in 1876 and served with its regiment including the Spanish-American War and finally became Company E, Second Infantry, It


transferred on November 6, 1911, to be part of the First Field Artillery. It was called to Federal service June 19, 1916, at which time it was sent to El Paso, Texas, for service on the Mexican Border. The battery was mustered out on March 23, 1917.

It was again mustered in on July 15, 1917, and drafted on August 5, 1917, for World War duty. On September 22, 1917, it was reorganized as Battery B, 119th Field Artillery. It served with the 119th Field Artillery, which was assigned to the 32nd Division, and fought in many important engagements with this famous Red Arrow Division while in France.

After demobilization, it was re-recognized as Battery B, Field Artillery, on May 10, 1921, and redesignated Battery B, 119th Field Artillery, on July 1, 1921.

Commanding at that time was Captain C. O. Skinner, who was relieved by Captain R. C. Huston on October 5, 1921. Captain A. R. Many took command on October 6, 1922, and he was relieved by Captain C. E. Cook on May 3, 1924. On September 9, 1934, Captain H. R. Palmiter relieved Captain Cook and is the present





### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Originally organized in St. John, Michigan, then transferred and organized in Jackson, Michigan, August 26, 1929, this unit's organization letter was officially changed from Battery E to Battery C, 119th Field Artillery, September 18, 1940. It was called for riot duty on January 13, 1937, and returned to its home station January 15, 1937. It was again called for riot duty on February 1, 1937, and returned to its home station February 13, 1937.

Prior to its transfer in 1929, the unit was commanded by Captain Allen O. Beach. On its organization in Jackson, Captain Harold D. Miller assumed command, assisted by First Lieutenant Jesse F. Messer and Second Lieutenants Frederick L. Till and James C. Wood.

On April 21, 1931, Lieutenant Messer was transferred to Battery D, 119th Field Artillery. First Sergeant Romaine L. Swick was commissioned Second Lieutenant in this unit but later transferred to Battery D. On May 21, 1931, First Lieutenant Charles P. Ismon and Second Lieutenant Barry L. Frost were assigned to this battery. On June 14, 1931, Second Lieutenant Wood was transferred to Headquarters Battery, Second Battalion, and Sergeants Clifford R. Miller and Wm. E. Hunt were commissioned Second Lieutenants and assigned to the same unit.

On June 15, 1931, First Sergeant John A. Miller was commissioned Second Lieutenant and assigned to this battery. Second Lieutenant Frost was transferred to Headquarters Battery, Second Battalion, March 1, 1932. On

July 14, 1932, First Sergeant Warren J. Fenn was commissioned Second Lieutenant and assigned to this battery. On May 3, 1934, Sergeant Leo J. Conway was commissioned Second Lieutenant and assigned to this battery.

On July 6, 1935, Sergeant Edwin J. Latoszewski received a discharge for the purpose of entering the United States Military Academy, from which he was graduated June 12, 1939. On February 22, 1937, Sergeant Leo H. Keyzer was commissioned Second Lieutenant and assigned to this battery. On June 14, 1937, Lieutenant Conway was transferred to Headquarters, Second Battalion.

On February 7, 1938, Sergeant Homer K. Curtis was commissioned Second Lieutenant and assigned to this battery. On April 18, 1938, Sergeant George E. Slade was commissioned Second Lieutenant and assigned to Battery D. On March 1, 1940, First Lieutenant Ismon was transferred to Battery D and was replaced by First Lieutenant Harold L. Anderson on March 23, 1940. A total of 10 enlisted men from this organization have received commissions either in the United States Army or as National Guard officers.

Captain Harold D. Miller was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and assigned to command the Second Battalion. Captain Leo J. Conway now commands the battery, assisted by First Lieutenant Leo H. Keyzer and Second Lieutenant

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Battery D, 119th Field Artillery, had its inception in the reorganization of Battery C, prior to that time located in Flint, the new unit being Federally recognized April 23, 1931, under command of First Lieutenant Jesse F. Messer, transferred from Battery E. The 32 enlisted men also transferred from Battery E were joined by recruits, bringing the strength to 49.

Among those transferred was Sergeant Willbur, appointed First Sergeant in May, 1931, and still serving in that capacity.

On May 21, First Lieutenant Romaine L. Swick joined the battery. Camp Grayling was attended by Captain Messer, promoted in June, First Lieutenant Swick and 62 enlisted men. On September 9 the officers' roster was increased by transfer of Second Lieutenant Clifford R. Miller from Second Battalion Headquarters Battery, and on September 15 Captain Messer resigned and First Lieutenant Swick asumed command. Second Lieutenant Thomas F. Meagher joined the battery in October, and in December First Lieutenant Swick became Captain. Second Lieutenant Walter F. Hodgeboom joined in January, 1932.

In April, 1933, Second Lieutenant William C. Sanders replaced Lieutenant Meagher, who resigned at that time.

The battery was motorized in July, 1933, and attended its first camp as a motorized unit in August.

Battery D participated in Second Army Maneuvers in Southwestern Michigan in August, 1936, and was on strike duty in Flint in February, 1937. In April, Second Lieutenant Hodgeboom resigned and eventually was replaced by Second Lieutenant Ceorge E. Slade, in April, 1938. Captain Swick resigned March 1, 1940, and First Lieutenant Charles P. Ismon, transferred from Battery E, took command on March 2, being promoted to Captain on March 20.

On August 2, First Lieutenant Miller was transferred to Second Battalion Headquarters, and Second Lieutenant Noble O. Moore joined the battery. Battery D began the march to Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, on August 11 to participate in Second Army Maneuvers with other units of the 119th Field Artillery, returning to Jackson on August 31.


First Lieutenant Sanders resigned on October 1, and Second Lieutenant Slade went to Battery E while Second Lieutenant Homer K. Curtis was transferred from that unit to Battery D. With the 119th Field Artillery becoming part of the 72nd Field Artillery Brigade (Corps Artillery), Battery D is awaiting the new 155-mm. guns which will replace the French 75's in service since organization of the battery.

Battery E, 119th Field Artillery, was first organized as Battery D, 119th Field Artillery. Formation and the plans for the organization of this unit were completed and Federal recognition granted May 23, 1921, under the command of Captain B. G. Cameron, who commanded the unit until June 26, 1926. He was succeeded by Captain Edward F. Biebesheimer, who commanded the organization until March 30, 1929, and was succeeded by First Lieutenant William H. Briggs, who was promoted to Captain May 28, 1930, and is still in command.

Field Artillery, April 23, 1931. It was again redesignated, this time as Battery E, 119th Field Artillery, September 18, 1940. At this time, it was reorganized into a battery of 155-millimeter guns and relieved from further assignment to the 57th Field Artillery Brigade, 32nd Division. It is now part of the 72nd Field Artillery Brigade, Corps Artillery.

### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Battery F, 119th Field Artillery, was Federally recognized October 5, 1921, and consisted at that time of four officers and 60 enlisted men. Those first officers were George B. Ely, Captain, commanding; Robert Widrig, First Lieutenant; Dr. John R. Snow, Second Lieutenant, and Dr. Ward W. Norris, First Lieutenant.

For several years Battery F was housed in an old livery stable; after it became unsuitable, the unit was moved to the Fair Grounds for a time. In 1926, Captain Ely was successful in having the state build a new armory across from the city park.

Since the battery has been organized, several hundred men have received training in it.



### FACTUAL HISTORY

A descendant of the old wartime Sanitary Detachment, 126th Infantry, the Medical Detachment, 126th Infantry, was reorganized and Federally recognized as the Medical Department Detachment of the reorganized regiment on May 12, 1921, at Kalamazoo, Michigan. Many veterans who had served with the unit during its engagements in France were included on the original rolls. The detachment commander, Major Leo Crum, M. C., had seen active service with the organization and had been awarded a Distinguished Service Cross during the war for exceptional bravery while operating a battalion aid station under enemy fire. Serving as the unit's commander for more than 10 years, he resigned because of ill health and was succeeded by Major Albert E. Henwood, M. C.

In 1936, the Medical Department Detachment participated with the rest of the regiment in the Second Army Maneuvers held in Allegan. The following spring, the unit was again called to active duty during the auto strike in Flint. At the close of the state duty, Major Henwood, because of illness, relinquished the command of the detachment to Captain Melvin F. Anderson, D. C.

The Medical Department Detachment was formally transferred from Kalamazoo to Grand Rapids and reorganized at the latter station in June, 1937, still under the command of Captain Anderson. Major Henwood was later succeeded as Regimental Surgeon by Captain Jack Hoogerhyde, M. C., and upon the latter's resignation, by Captain Charles H. Frantz, M. C. Captain Frantz was promoted to Major in March, 1940, and assumed command of the organization, which was redesignated Medical Detachment, 126th Infantry, upon its Induction into Federal service on October 15, 1940. Other present officers, in addition to Major Frantz and Captain Anderson are Captains John T. Boet and Simon Warmenhoven. With

such, was Federally recognized April 20, 1923. During the past 17 years, the regiment has come a long way. New units have been formed in various towns in the state, new personnel have been absorbed and trained, several reorganization and redesignation orders of the War Department have been prescribed and obeyed. The regiment has carried out its missions, until today the 107th Medical Regiment is completely organized under peace strength tables with three battalions, the Headquarters and

Service Company and the Band. Colonel John D. Buck has been the only commanding officer of the regiment. He served on the Mexican Border and overseas, obtaining the rank of Major and command of the Ambulance Section, 117th Sanitary Train, in July, 1918. Lieutenant Colonel Carl Hanna, regimental executive officer, served as a Lieutenant in Ambulance Company No. 1 and became Captain of the 168th Ambulance Company overseas. Captain Harry E. Northrup, commanding officer of the Service Company, served overseas as a Sergeant with the 168th Ambulance Company. Colonel Buck, Lieutenant Colonel Hanna and Captain Northrup have been members of the regiment since its organization.

The regiment has been better off for the sound advice of these and other veterans, and whatever may be the future, whatever the game, whatever the price, the 107th Medical Regiment may be counted on to be in there fight-

ing, doing its best for country and for humanity.

SHIELD: Gules, seme of quatrefails voided or a fess sable fimbriated of the second. CREST: That for regiments of Michigan National Guard. Wreath: Or and gules.

MOTTO: Might If Right.

DESCRIPTION: The background of the shield, seme of quatrefoils in gold on a field of red, is from the coat of arms of Count Pontchartrain, the Minister of Marine in France at the time Detroit was founded. The black fess across the center of the shield is from the coat of arms of Cadillac, the founder of Detroit, sent there by Count Pontchartrain. The field of red has been substituted for the field of blue of Pontchartrain's arms, symbolizing the arm of the service, Artillery, to which this regiment belongs.

The organization of the 182nd Field Artillery was started early in 1922 under the leadership and inspiration of Colonel Heinrich A. Pickert, who headed a group of men who had served either as officers or enlisted men during the World War. The majority of the group, like Colonel Pickert, had served with the 119th Field Artillery, although other Artillery regiments, such as the 329th, were well represented.

Armory quarters were secured in an old street car house at Woodward and Amsterdam Avenues, where a considerable amount of repairs, alterations and construction was found necessary to make the quarters habitable. At this armory, the first unit, Battery F, was mustered for Federal recognition on June 12, 1922, followed by the other units until the recognition of regimental headquarters was received as of December 6, 1922. The organization of the Second Battalion could not be accomplished for some seventeen years, through lack of War Department funds for maintenance.

Better quarters were secured in 1927, when the regiment moved to a building at the corner of Vermont and Kirby Streets. The increased amount of floor space made it possible for each unit to have more suitable quarters and resulted in improved efficiency.

Major C. F. Sawyer, for howitzer section, alternate signal communication (runner with written field message) and for fire control instruments. In 1937, the enlisted men's baseball team won the regimental championship.

Part of the battery was present at Flint, Michigan, during the strike there as a component of the transportation section of the Service Battery.

First Sergeant Clinton Clear has a service record of 13

years in the First Battalion (five years in Battery B). Staff Sergeant Will Ingram has served 17 years in this battery. Sergeant C. Mayes has an enlistment record of about 11 years in the battalion (five in Battery B), and Sergeant F. S. Poole has an enlistment record of nine consecutive years in Battery B.

Captain James A. Pierce enlisted in this battery as a Private, December 2, 1929, and, after much shuffling around in the First Battalion, returned to this unit as First Lieutenant. He became Captain upon the retirement of Captain Frank T. King.

Captain King enlisted in the 182nd when the regiment was in its infancy. He was a World War veteran and served overseas with the 119th Field Artillery. Retiring after 17 years of service, he was presented with a miniature saber by Battery B's officers and non-coms.

The members of the unit have an unwritten motto that they claim others might well copy: "We don't know how to fight but we've never been beaten."

The culmination of efforts to form Battery B, 182nd Field Artillery, came on July 12, 1922, when the unit was Federally recognized in the old car barns at Amsterdam and Woodward Avenues. With the regiment, it has been stationed at the following armories: 5333 Vermont Avenue, Piquette and Brush and 285 Piquette.

**FACTUAL HISTORY** 

When first formed, the battery was equipped with fiveton caterpillar tractors, with a maximum speed of seven miles per hour, and howitzers mounted on solid rubber tires. Personnel was carried on caissons, machine gun carts and in White and GMC trucks of 1917 vintage. At present, the equipment consists of two-and-a-half and threeand-a-half-ton trucks (about one-third of the normal equipment being available), and the guns are mounted on pneumatic tires with high-speed axle bearings capable of 45 miles an hour speed.

Battery B won the Battalion Proficiency cup twice at Camp Grayling, Michigan. In competition at Birmingham, it won cups presented by the Battalion Commander,

With a personnel of eight officers and 50 enlisted men, the 107th Observation Squadron, Michigan National Guard, was organized in the spring of 1926 and Federally recognized on May 7 of that year. Squadron armory drills were held at the Municipal Carage at Chene Street and East Jefferson, Detroit, Michigan, where all clothing and supplies were stored in one room in the rear of the second floor. Federal recognition was extended to the squadron on the promise by the State Adjutant General that a suitable flying field and proper housing facilities would be available during the summer on a new million dollar Detroit Airport, which was just about to be developed.

Court difficulties and good judgment on the part of the city council and aviation leaders of the city caused the abandonment of the proposed location and the million dol-

lars voted by the people for the construction of this port was voided. This change left the 107th Squadron without any prospect of an airport and it was necessary to secure a substitute location. The location then decided upon was the Grosse Ile Airport, and a promise was secured from a local citizen to underwrite the cost of the erection of a hangar thereon. After two months of work on the part of the squadron members in clearing a suitable area for the construction of a flying field at the above location, it was found that the great distance, combined with a bridge toll and the failure in business of the citizen who was to erect the hangar, caused the squadron to abandon the otherwise fine Grosse Ile location.

The Detroit City Council came to the assistance of the (Continued on page 270)

## 210TH COAST ARTILLERY

As one of the youngest units in the Michigan National Guard and as its first Coast Artillery Regiment, the 210th Coast Artillery (AA) was authorized on September 18, 1940, and was organized by the conversion of the Michigan units of the 106th Cavalry, September 20, 1940, less the First Squadron, and the organization of new units, October 1 and 10, 1940.

The conversion of the 106th Cavalry units was as follows: Medical Department Detachment, Third Squadron, 106th Cavalry, formed the Medical Department Detachment, 210th Coast Artillery; Headquarters (Michigan contingent) and Headquarters, Third Squadron, 106th Cavalry, formed Headquarters, Second Battalion, 210th Coast Artillery; Troop I, 106th Cavalry, formed Battery E, 210th Coast Artillery, and Troop K, 106th Cavalry, formed Battery F, 210th Coast Artillery. All these units and the newly organized units of the regiment are stationed at Detroit.

Lieutenant Colonel Robert F. Gleim, 182nd Field Artillery, in addition to his other duties, was assigned to the command of the 210th Coast Artillery and given the task of organizing the new units and preparing them for Federal recognition.

The units of the Third Squadron, 106th Cavalry, which were converted to form part of the 210th Coast Artillery, trace their history to an association of individuals, called the Detroit Cavalry, organized April 17, 1907. During the winter of 1907, this organization was mustered into service as Troop B, First Michigan Cavalry.

In 1913, the troop served during the copper riots near Calumet in the Upper Peninsula. Its first Federal service was during the Mexican Border disturbance of 1916, when Troop B of Detroit and Troop A of South Flaven were sent first to Camp Grayling for training and then to El Paso, Texas, for patrol duty on the Mexican Border.

Following the declaration of war on Cermany, Troop B became the nucleus in the rapid formation of three cavalry troops in Detroit. These troops were joined with Troop A of South Haven to become the First Squadron, First Michigan Cavalry, which was drafted into Federal service on August 5, 1917. After training at Camp Grayling, Michigan, and Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas, the Michigan Cavalry was redesignated the Second Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, 32nd Division, in October, 1917.

As part of the 119th Field Artillery, these units served overseas for 14 months, engaging on five fronts during three offensive operations in the Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne and Meuse-Argonne. Returning to the United States, the 119th Field Artillery was demobilized May 15, 1919.


On August 14, 1921, the First Squadron, 106th Cavalry, was organized, with Troop A, South Haven; Troop B, Headquarters and Medical Detachment, Detroit, and Troop C, originally at Detroit but soon after transferred to Alma. In 1927, the 106th Cavalry became a complete unit divided between Michigan and Illinois. Squadrons were changed from three- to two-troop units. Troop B, Detroit, was redesignated Troop K. First Squadron Headquarters Detachment was expanded and redesignated Troop I, and Troops I and K formed the new Third Squadron, until converted and assigned to the 210th Coast Artillery in September, 1940.

Although a new unit, the 210th Coast Artillery, under the guidance of Colonel Gleim, is efficiently preparing to take its place among the other units of the Michigan National Guard.

#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Battery F, 210th Coast Artillery, was Federally recognized at Detroit, Michigan, September 20, 1940, with two officers and 60 enlisted men present. Officers assigned to the unit at the time were Captain Milford H. S. Hicks and First Lieutenant Stewart A. Andrews, while the Federal mustering officer was Lieutenant Colonel John H. Milam, F. A., U. S. A.

This unit was formerly Troop K, 106th Cavalry, which traces its history to the Detroit Cavalry, organized April 17, 1907, and which was mustered into service as Troop B, First Michigan Cavalry, in the winter of 1907. This unit served during the copper riots near Calumet in the Upper Peninsula in 1913, and during the Mexican Border disturbance it was sent first to Camp Grayling, Michigan, then to El Paso,

For the World War, it formed the nucleus for three Cavalry troops formed in Detroit which, joined with Troop A of South Haven, became the First Squadron, First Michigan Cavalry. Drafted into service August 5, 1917, and sent to Camp Grayling, Michigan, and Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas, for training, it was converted and became part of the Second Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, 32nd Division, in October, 1917.

It served overseas 14 months, engaging on five fronts during three offensive operations in the Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne and Meuse-Argonne. It was demobilized May 15, 1919.

Reorganized as Troop B, 106th Cavalry, at Detroit on August 14, 1921, it was redesignated Troop K, 106th Cavalry, in 1927, and continued under this designation until converted and designated Battery F, 210th

The present Battery A was formerly Troop A, 106th Cavalry, which performed patrol duty on the Mexican Border at El Paso, Texas, in 1916. As part of the First Squadron, First Michigan Cavalry, Troop A was drafted into Federal service for the World War on August 5, 1917, and on August 15 entrained for Camp Grayling, where it remained in training until September. In October, 1917, at Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas, the First Squadron Cavalry was redesignated the Second Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, 32nd Division.

As part of that regiment, the former Troop A served overseas for 14 months and engaged on five fronts during three offensive operations in the Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne and Meuse-Argonne. It returned to the United States and was demobilized at Camp Custer on May 15, 1919.

Following the World War, this unit was reorganized and Federally recognized as Troop A, First Separate Squadron Cavalry, on August 19, 1920, and was redesignated Troop A, 106th Cavalry, on July 1, 1921, serving as such until converted to Field Artillery in September, 1940, as stated above. This Battery was originally organized at South Haven as Troop A, Cavalry in 1905.

Troop B, 106th Cavalry, which was converted to form Battery B, 177th Field Artillery, was recognized as Troop C. First Separate Squadron Cavalry, June 3, 1921; redes-

ignated Troop C, 106th Cavalry, July 1, 1921, and redesignated Troop B, 106th Cavalry, April 16, 1929, serving as such until converted to Field Artillery. This Battery was originally organized at Detroit as Troop B, Cavalry in 1908.

Of the Quartermaster units which were converted to Field Artillery, Company F (now Headquarters Battery, First Battalion, 177th Field Artillery) is the oldest. It was first recognized as the 107th Motorcycle Company, Special Troops, 32nd Division, on January 31, 1922, and redesignated Company F, 107th Quartermaster Regiment, on December 20, 1936. Was in Federal service during the World War from May 16, 1917, to August 1, 1919, serving as Private and Sergeant in Corps of Engineers and Air Corps. Was commissioned Second Lieutenant, Q. M. C., in Officers Reserve Corps on September 10, 1919, and served as First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, in Officers Reserve Corps from May 5, 1924, to January 31, 1927. Commissioned Second Lieutenant, Field Artillery, November 28, 1922; First Lieutenant, December 11, 1923, and Captain, November 23, 1926. Transferred to Quartermaster Corps, February 9, 1938, and promoted to Major, April 1, 1938. Promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, then to Colonel and assigned to command and to complete the organization of the new 177th Field Artillery on September 18, 1940.







ground, the Michigan troops have always been able to have maneuvers under field conditions and they have been so well handled that Michigan troops are well versed in field warfare conditions and the Division Headquarters is particularly capable along these lines.

With such a fine esprit de corps and such excellent training facilities, the members of the National Guard were preparing themselves for any service for which they might be called, and it was in 1937 that they had the opportunity of testing the results of years of armory and field training.

When riots resulted from labor troubles in Flint in 1937, one regiment and then practically the entire Michigan National Guard were sent to the area to maintain law and order and to prevent any further rioting. They remained on duty there for some 42 days.

The situation was very ominous and fraught with many pitfalls, but by the organization of a very skill-fully conducted area headquarters in Flint and the proper control of matters by the commanding officers, no untoward incident occurred. There was no loss of life and the affected factories went back to a normal status.

The troops received the highest commendations possible from the governor of Michigan for the skill with which they conducted themselves and he was unstinted in his praise of the officers for the manner in which they handled matters. It was another occasion on which the National Guard proved of value in peacetime.

In the year following this state service, in 1938, Michigan was authorized to organize its portion of the 107th Quartermaster Regiment and to complete the organization of the 107th Medical Regiment and the 182nd Field Artillery. The new units were soon organized and functioning smoothly with the other troops of the state.

#### COLONEL JOHN S. BERSEY

On August 8, 1940, the Michigan National Guard bowed out of its official active ranks one of the most colorful characters of its history—Colonel John S. Bersey, who had served more than 25 years as Adjutant General of Michigan and 51 years as an active member of the National Guard.

Colonel Bersey first enlisted as a Private in Company A, Fourth Infantry, on December 16, 1889. He was promoted to Corporal July 20, 1890, and to Sergeant July 13, 1891. After receiving an honorable discharge

Company A, Fourth Infantry, January 1, 1893. He was promoted to First Sergeant January 1, 1893, and to Regimental Sergeant Major, Fourth Infantry, January 5, 1894.

December 15, 1892, he re-enlisted as a Sergeant is

He was honorably discharged October 22, 1894, to accept promotion and on the following day was commissioned First Lieutenant, Company F, Fourth Infantry. He served during the Spanish-American War as a First Lieutenant in the 31st Michigan Volunteer Infantry from May 9, 1898, to May 17, 1899, seeing active service in Cuba.

Following the war, he reverted to First Lieutenant, Fourth Infantry. This company was redesignated Company H, First Infantry, July 24, 1899, and he was promoted to Captain on December 1, 1899. Promoted to Major on January 26, 1905, he was assigned to the First Battalion, First Infantry, and on January 17, 1914, he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, First Infantry (which was redesignated 31st Infantry, April 22, 1915).

He was appointed The Adjutant General of the State of Michigan, with rank of Colonel, on June 23, 1915, and served in that capacity until his recent retirement. During the World War, he was draft executive for Michigan. On December 20, 1920, he was Federally recognized as Colonel, Adjutant General's Department, State Staff. He was graduated from the Army War College, G-1 Course, in 1924 and from the Garrison School for Officers, U. S. A., at Fort Wayne, Michigan (four-year course), in 1907.

Although he has retired as an active member of the Michigan National Guard, Colonel Bersey has in this organization an active interest prompted by a devotion born of more than half a century of service.

#### REORGANIZATION-MOBILIZATION

Effective as of September 30, 1940, a reorganization took place in the Michigan National Guard, involving the conversion of old units and the organization of new ones.

The 210th Coast Artillery (Anti-Aircraft), a new regiment, was organized, with the Third Squadron, 106th Cavalry, as a nucleus. The remaining units of the Michigan contingent of the 106th Cavalry and the Michigan contingent of the 107th Quartermaster Regiment served as a nucleus for the formation of another new regiment—the 177th Field Artillery, 72nd Field Artillery Brigade. The 119th Field Artillery, transferred from the 57th to the 72nd Field Artillery Brigade, was changed from a 75-millimeter to a 155-millimeter gun regiment. The 72nd Field Artillery Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Battery were also organized.

Although this reorganization entailed the recruiting of hundreds of new men and the transfer of veterans from the old units to the new, the two new regiments were soon organized and Federally accepted as part of the Michigan National Guard.

Under a stepped-up Federal military program, the following units of the Michigan National Guard were mobilized at their armories on October 15, 1940: Michigan contingent, 32nd Division Headquarters; Headquarters Detachment, 32nd Division; 63rd Infantry

Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Company; 125th Infantry, 126th Infantry, 107th Medical Regiment, 107th Engineers and the 32nd Division Aviation.

Within a week to two weeks after their mobilization, these units were sent to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana,

for a year of intensive training in Federal service. Fol-

lowing their departure, the only units of the Michigan National Guard left in the state were: 119th Field Artillery, 177th Field Artillery, 182nd Field Artillery and 210th Coast Artillery, a few enlisted men of the State Detachment and officers of the State Staff.

Continuing to perfect their organizations, the Artillery regiments, as 1940 drew to a close, awaited their turn to be called for the year of training under Federal guidance.

The speed with which the hundreds of new men were recruited and the spirit of the older officers and men in working hard to perfect these organizations are just more evidence of the willingness of the present Michigan National Guard members to serve either their state or nation. They are faithfully upholding a proud military heritage.

Copper Country strike. Mobilized for Mexican Border service on July 9, 1916, it was stationed at El Paso, Texas, and finally mustered out March 23, 1917. Mobilized for World War service on July 15, 1917, it was redesignated the 128th Ambulance Company, 107th Sanitary Train, 32nd Division. The organization turned in a brilliant job serving the 32nd Division during the World War (as noted in the regimental history) and was mustered out May 29, 1919.

The unit was reorganized and Federally recognized as the 119th Ambulance Company, 107th Medical Regiment, January 19, 1922, and redesignated Company D, 107th Medical Regiment, January 1, 1937. Since its reorganization in 1922, the unit has not missed an encampment. It has established quite a safety record, driving to and from the training areas for 19 years without a serious accident or more than a slight injury to the personnel.

There have only been three commanders of the unit. Major James A. Humphrey, now commanding officer of the Second Battalion, was the first "Skipper." He was succeeded by Captain Samuel R. Rubley, who served a little over a year and was succeeded by Captain W. W. Bond, then Captain Robert H. Mahr, present commander, who has been with the unit since October 28, 1924. Sergeants Frank Fish and Corns are also veterans of the unit.

squadron at this time, in order to prevent its removal from Detroit, and allowed a portion of Rouge Park to be utilized for a flying field. They also erected a temporary steel hangar at this field which the squadron supplemented with wooden additions for the housing of equipment. On May 7, 1927, this field was deemed suitable for operation until the new Wayne County Airport was completed, which at that time seemed to be only a few months distant. Thus the Federal Government provided the squadron with four JN-4 type Curtiss planes, together with the necessary spare parts, repair equipment, etc. At this time also was organized the other two units of the 32nd Division Aviation, consisting of the 107th Photo Section and the 107th Medical Detachment.

The year 1927 passed and the county airport was no nearer realization than it had been the year previous. In the meantime, however, the new Detroit Municipal Airport had been started and a promise from the Detroit City Council that the squadron would be taken care of temporarily thereon until the county airport materialized was all that saved withdrawal of the squadron from Detroit. By this time, the Curtiss planes had been replaced by the newer PT-1 Consolidated training planes and more equip-

WORDWartwoveterans. Charles G. newer PT-1 Consolidated training planes and more equip-

ment received. The squadron strength had grown to 14 officers and 100 enlisted men.

True to their promise the City Council provided temporary quarters on the Municipal Airport in 1928 and the squadron was provided with their first service type airplanes, consisting of four Douglas 02-H planes. Facilities on this airport were inadequate and only by a great effort on the part of the 32nd Division Commander, the Adjutant Ceneral and the National Defense Committee of the Detroit Board of Commerce was the squadron granted an extension of time to secure a suitable field and proper housing facilities.

In the fall of 1929, the Wayne County Airport was well on its way to completion and the county supervisors were prevailed upon to prevent the 107th Observation Squadron from being reallocated to another Michigan city, where every facility had been guaranteed. The supervisors voted to erect a hangar for the organization and provide therein facilities for the required offices and storage space. This hangar was completed in 1930 and is one of the finest in the United States housing a National Guard Squadron.

During the National Convention of Exchange Clubs at Indianapolis, the Detroit delegation was advised of the plight of the 107th Squadron. These delegates brought the story back to their local clubs and a meeting was called at which all clubs in the Detroit area were represented. It was unanimously agreed that the squadron was deserving of their support and that they would take the problem of furnishings upon their shoulders. To best raise the funds required, it was decided rather than to ask for individual contributions from the Exchange members that a field dedication program would be held and admissions charged. The squadron provided the flying activity, while the Exchange Club members disposed of the tickets and arranged the entertainment. The project was an allaround success and the hangar was nicely furnished.

In 1938, it became apparent that approximately 100 per cent additional space would be required to house the new and larger type airplanes. New motor transport vehicles arriving required the construction of a suitable garage. This new construction project was nearing completion when the organization was mobilized and inducted into the Federal service on October 15, 1940.

The 107th Squadron was ordered to move during the week of October 21-28 to Camp Beauregard, Louisiana, where it entered upon what was termed one year of intensive training.

Field Artillery, which was assigned to the 32nd Division and served with that division in France. The regiment was mustered out May 16, 1919.

From June to November, 1918, the regiment was in the fight. In their five months of continuous fighting, the regiment smashed the way for 11 Infantry divisions in combat in recovering a total of 70 kilometers of French territory. On board ship on the trip back to the United States, Colonel Chester B. McConnick, regimental com-

mander, wrote the officers and enlisted men of his regiment, giving the activity of the organization in France, and in one sentence, he summed up the spirit of the men under his command when he said:

"The missions entrusted to you have been ably performed with a spirit of cheerfulness and steadfast self sacrifice and devotion to dury, serving under conditions of extreme hardship and danger, you have acquitted yourselves in a highly gratifying and satisfactory manner."

Because of its gallant participation in the engagements named, the regiment is authorized the following World War streamers: Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne, Meuse-Argonne, Lorraine, Alsace and Champagne. The regiment also received the following foreign decoration: French Croix de Guerre with silver star.

With such a proud record, the designation—119th Field Artillery—could not be allowed to pass into history but had to be carried on, so on July 22, 1921, the First Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, was reorganized. Expanded into a regiment, it was redesignated the 119th Field Artillery (AD) on February 10, 1922, and redesignated the 119th Field Artillery (truck-drawn) on July 1, 1933.

Until September 18, 1940, the regiment was equipped with 75 millimeter guns, but on that date, it was reorganized as a 155 millimeter gun regiment. In this reorganization, the regiment was also changed from a two-battalion to a three-battalion regiment and Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, Third Battalion, had to be organized. It was also reassigned from the 57th Field Artillery Brigade, 32nd Division, to the 72nd Field Artillery Brigade, Corps Artillery.

Tracing the military heritage of their organization back over more than half a century, the present members of the 119th Field Artillery, under the command of Colonel Glenn W. Carey, are ready to fulfill any duty for their country and state.

Headquarters Battery, 72nd Field Artillery Brigade, was organized and Federally recognized on September 27, 1940, at Lansing, Michigan, under Special Orders from the Adjutant General, State of Michigan.

There were two officers and 40 enlisted men present for Federal recognition.

Captain Leslie B. Keeny, former commander of Headquarters Battery, First Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, was assigned to command the new unit. First Lieutenant

small sanitary detachment, and at the beginning of the World War, a battalion detachment was organized for the First Michigan Field Artillery. Mobilized in July, 1917, it served throughout the war with the regiment and was demobilized in May, 1919, after having served in the Army of Occupation in Germany.

The present Medical Detachment, 119th Field Artillery, was organized and Federally recognized on July 22, 1921, in Lansing. During the early period, the men were practically all without previous military experience, but gradually some of the former 119th wartime veterans enlisted again. The regiment was horse-drawn at first, but in 1932, it was motorized.

In February, 1937, the Medical Detachment served 13 days during a strike at Flint, Michigan.

Since its organization in 1921, the unit has trained in three armories: at the old armory building on South Capital Avenue, old State building on the corner of Washington Avenue and Allegan Street and the new 119th Field Artillery Armory at the foot of Elvin Court, its present

home.

Besides offering its services for any civic functions and participating in all parades in which the regiment took part, the Medical Detachment has maintained an excellent armory drill program and has proved itself an efficient unit during the annual field training periods, including the Second Army Maneuvers in 1940.

In September, 1940, the regiment was transferred from the 32nd Division to the 72nd Field Artillery Brigade, Corps Troops. The detachment is now preparing for a

year of training in Federal service.

#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

First organized and Federally recognized as Headquarters Detachment and Combat Train, Third Battalion, 182nd Field Artillery, on October 4, 1922, this unit was redesignated Headquarters Battery and Combat Train, Third Battalion, 182nd Field Artillery, on March 21, 1925, and on June 30, 1940, it was redesignated Headquarters Battery, Third Battalion, 182nd Field Artillery, its present designation.

Stationed in Detroit, Michigan, it has "been at home" in four different armories. The first armory was at Woodward and Amsterdam Avenues, followed by the second at Vermont and Kirby Streets in 1927, the third at the corner

of Brush and Piquette in 1935, and its present armory at 285 Piquette Street, which it first occupied in 1936.

It participated in the Second Army Maneuvers in 1936 in the Allegan area and in the Second Army Maneuvers in 1940 at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin. Besides the two maneuvers, it has attended the summer training encampments with the regiment each year and has efficiently followed an armory training schedule.

Captain Ralph H. Franklin, present commander, first enlisted in the National Guard on July 7, 1924, and served until September 22, 1924. He again re-enlisted on January 28, 1929, and served as a Private and Corporal until June 16, 1929. He was commissioned Second Lieutenant, Field Artillery, on June 17, 1929; First Lieutenant, September 16, 1935, and Captain, April 18, 1939.

#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Headquarters Battery, Second Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, was originally recognized October 21, 1921, as a headquarters detachment and combat train for the Second Battalion, 119th Field Artillery.

Disbanded on August 1, 1922, this organization was reorganized March 11, 1923, and redesignated Headquarters Battery and Combat Train. It was disbanded in Flint, May 28, 1931, and reorganized and Federally recognized June 15, 1931, in Jackson.

Most of the non-commissioned officers in the battery at present have been members of the organization since Fed-

eral recognition in 1931.

Since the regiment has been reorganized as a 155-millimeter rifle organization, this battery still continues as Headquarters Battery, Second Battalion. Lieutenant Hunt has been with the unit since its Federal recognition in Jackson.

The battery participated in all field training camps and army maneuvers with the rest of the regiment and was also on strike detail duty in Flint in 1937.

#### **FACTUAL HISTORY**

Headquarters Battery, First Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, was Federally recognized July 21, 1921, as Headquarters Battery and Combat Train. Captain Glen W. Carey (now Colonel and commander of the regiment) was the Battery Commander.

Since that time the unit has been commanded by Captains Jay Robbins (1922), Everett V. Eschbach (1923-1927), John H. Nussdorfer (1927-1939), Leslie B. Keeny (1939), and First Lieutenant John H. Murray, its present commander.

The battery attended its first camp at Crayling, Michigan, August, 1921. The following year, it camped at Custer for two weeks. It was there the men had their

first experience with army mules, which were used to supplement the horses in the regiment. From 1922 until 1936 the unit went to Grayling two weeks each summer for training. In 1932 the organization traveled by train to Grayling and returned to Lansing overland with horses, a distance of 160 miles.

In 1933 the unit was changed from a horse-drawn to a truck-drawn battery. In 1936 it accompanied the regiment to the Second Army Maneuvers at Saugatuck, Michigan.

The battery designation was changed from Headquarters Battery and Combat Train to Headquarters Battery, First Battalion, in 1940. Also in 1940, the battery attended the Second Army Maneuvers at Sparta, Wisconsin. Along with the regiment, it was changed from a 75-millimeter to a 155-millimeter gun unit in September, 1940.

Headquarters Battery, Third Battalion, 119th Field Artillery, was formed around a nucleus of 24 members of the Regimental Band, supplemented by men from Batteries A and B and Headquarters, First Battalion, in Lansing and Battery F in Charlotte. It was Federally recognized September 22, 1940.

Although the unit is a new organization, the 11 noncommissioned officers are by no means recruits. They have an aggregate of 70 years of service.

Two of the three officers commanding the battery were transferred from Battery F, and the third was formerly the chief of section in one of the record-holding gun crews in Battery B.

While still in the process of organization, the battery is showing signs of proficiency in the normal functions.

for various functions. The band has appeared at the Cherry Festival in Traverse City, the Michigan State Fair in Detroit, the Firemen's Field Day at Windsor, Ontario, Canada, and has played concerts at Petoskey, Gaylord, Higgins Lake and Camp Grayling, Michigan, and at La-Crosse, Wisconsin, during the 1940 summer maneuvers. It has also played at the Michigan State Prison at Jackson. For the past several years, this band has played for the annual review of the 107th Observation Squadron, Michigan National Guard, at the Wayne County Airport. It has also played for several of the horse shows sponsored by the 106th Cavalry.

The regimental march of this unit is a medley of "Michigan," My Michigan" and "The Cassions Song," arranged by a former band sergeant, Aaron Snyder, now deceased.

Until recently National Guard bands have been attached to the Service Battery under the command of the Captain of that unit, but as of May, 1940, this band has been known as the Regimental Band under the command of a staff Captain designated by the Colonel.

In 1935, the regiment moved to a modern building at the corner of Brush and Piquette, but this building being sold early in 1936, the regiment again moved, this time to its present quarters in a block of former Studebaker fac-

tory buildings at 285 Piquette.

In 1926, the regiment set a record for other motorized units of its day to shoot at—a march of 230 miles to Camp Grayling, Michigan, without the loss of a single vehicle and without a casualty. The march required five days, averaging around 40 miles per day, which was not bad for tractors of wartime manufacture.

In 1935, the personnel of the regiment went to camp for the first time in modern motor vehicles, the tractors and howitzers being shipped by rail. In the year following, the entire regiment marched to the Allegan area to participate in the Second Army Maneuvers, this being the first long march in which all units traveled under their own power.

The year of 1935 also saw the promotion of Colonel Pickert to the command of the 63rd Infantry Brigade. The present regimental commander, Colonel George V. N. Lothrop, succeeded him.

In the spring of 1939, Major Miles N. Culehan organized the Second Battalion of the regiment, thus completing the organization started 17 years before.

In 1940, the regiment marched to Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, again to participate in Second Army Maneuvers, this time for a three-weeks period. Six days were spent in travel to and from this area, and this march, like all others, was completely without serious accident or delay.

The majority of the officers of the regiment have come up from the ranks of the regiment. Of the original group who attended the first field encampment in 1923, only a few remain. Several have transferred to other regiments of the Michigan National Guard, but the majority have retired to civilian life.

The motto of the regiment—"Might if Right"—was originated by Colonel Pickert. No wartime history can be claimed by the regiment, not even descent from a former organization in Detroit. Lacking a combat record, the present attitude is to acquire a history so outstanding it will make up for its brevity. In other words, "If you have no history, get out and make one."

#### FACTUAL HISTORY

Battery D, 182nd Field Artillery, was organized and Federally recognized in Detroit, Michigan, on April 3, 1939, with Captain James M. Cunningham, now regi-

mental adjutant, in command. Junior officers were First Lieutenant Thomas W. Muston and Second Lieutenant George H. Russel.

Captain Thomas J. Martin succeeded Captain Cunningham on September 15, 1940, following the latter's assignment as regimental adjutant. Lieutenant John J. Boitos is now Motor Officer.

Five non-commissioned officers of the unit have recently accepted commissions as Second Lieutenants. They are Second Lieutenants George Bolton, Carl Henrich, Richard L. Kureth, Howard F. Leitner and Elmer O. McBride.

Approximately four months after its organization, the unit attended its first camp at Camp Grayling, Michigan, in August, 1939, with borrowed equipment. In 1940, it participated in the Second Army Maneuvers, Camp McCoy, Wisconsin.

plains and open valleys. It is suitable for use of light, medium and anti-aircraft artillery. The artillery range at Frederic is similar to the one at Camp Grayling and it also is suitable for use of light and medium and anti-aircraft artillery.

A landing field, leased by the United States, lies about one and a half miles north of Grayling, next to Highway No. 27. The field has no hard-surfaced runways but is heavily sodded, with a cleared landing area of approximately 1,700 by 2,700 feet.

One of the most interesting buildings on the reservation is the officers' club house, which was also donated by Rasmus Hanson and built in 1914. A frame building, 40 by 120 feet, it has two parlors, one lounge, one ballroom, one kitchen, 10 sleeping rooms, two baths, lights and other modern conveniences. It also has a separate suite of completely furnished rooms for the use of the Governor or "The General Comdg."

Besides this building, the reservation has the following buildings: 7 frame dwellings, 1 hospital, 1 infirmary, 1 veterinary hospital, 1 small officers' club house, 5 office buildings, 122 kitchens and mess halls combined, 23 bath houses, 92 latrines, 1 stable, 14 animal shelters, 6 garages, 2 power houses, 1 administration building, 2 warehouses, 1 forage warehouse, 1 bakery building, 1 incinerator and can wash equipment building, 1 message center, 1 radio building, 1 carpenter shop, 4 magazines, 1 range house, 1 barrack building, 1 ice house, 6 canteen buildings, 1 gasoline and oil filling station, 1 granary, 1 paint house, 3 water reservoirs, 2 band stands, 1 boxing ring, 3 boat houses, 1 target storage house, 1 machine repair shop, 1 operations building, 1 storage building and 1 pump house.
