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FORWARD

This Pictorial Honor Roll Book of World War II marks the culmination of three years' effort to present a comprehensive picture of the part which the people of Niles and Weathersfield Township played in the second world war. The critical shortage of paper caused considerable delay in the production of the book, but the publishers were finally able to secure a satisfactory allotment.

Although every effort—including personal calls, phone calls, newspaper advertisements, and post cards—was used to secure the names and pictures of everyone in Niles and Weathersfield Township who served in World War II, such an effort occasionally met with no response. Therefore, in spite of a sincere effort, there are errors and omissions.

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Prefacing the pictures and names of those who served in the armed forces, is a brief history of the war effort on the home front. Without attempting to evaluate the part which each organization contributed, the various groups are listed in alphabetical order.

A special section is devoted to those who paid the supreme sacrifice that this nation might benefit from the fruits of democracy.

To the people of Niles and Weathersfield Township who so generously cooperated with the staff in securing the necessary information, to the organizations who aided in preparing the history of the home front war effort, to the advertisers who helped defray part of the cost of producing this book, and to our faithful subscribers who have patiently waited for the Pictorial Honor Roll Book the publishers say "Thank You!"

Niles went to war on October 30, 1941. At exactly 5:48 a.m. on this date, 144 Niles men were numbered for selective service in the newly formed national army.

From that moment hundreds of Niles youths awaited anxiously for their questionnaires to break the suspense of wondering whether or not they would be eligible for military service.

These were "back in a year men" and completely unaware of the Japanese menace in the South Pacific. Thousands volunteered to "get their year over with" and return to their normal way of life. By the end of June, 1942, they, along with the thousands of others, were in various military camps throughout the United States preparing to defend our "life, liberty and pursuit of happiness."

Pearl Harbor

Dec. 7, 1941, a war, which had already been raging two years in Europe, became cold, stark reality to the city of Niles. At the time of the Pearl Harbor attack many Niles boys who had enlisted before the first draft were listed in the South Pacific, Pearl Harbor, Philippines and the Panama Canal Zone. It wasn't long after this date that the war was brought home to Niles when the casualty list was published and it included the name of Charles and Richard Casto, killed on ships sunk by Japs; Jack Sawyer, first Niles service man to be taken prisoner by the Japs and Alex Polinsky, civilian construction worker on Wake Island and the first Niles man to be taken as a Jap prisoner.

On Jan. 6, 1942 the first large contingent of draftees left Niles at 8:30 a. m. by a Penn-Ohio bus for Cleveland and from there to Camp Shelby, Miss., to form part of the 37th Ohio Division.

Many contingents followed that first one, some smaller and some larger, until the end of June they numbered 144, situated in almost every state in the Union. At first there were letters with vivid descriptions of the new army life, then signs of home-sickness then boredom until finally they were assigned to active duty in the South Pacific, Africa or Italy.

"There's A War On"

War began to have its effect of the civilian populace in Niles, too. Relief organizations sprouted up like weeds in a garden. The Red Cross, British War Relief, Civilian Defense and the U.S.O. became part of every day life. Women, who had never before done anything but housework, donated their services to these organizations. Slacks became as prevalent as handkerchiefs and it was not unusual to find as many pants-cla-

ding the early morning and late evening busses.

The home town industries that here-to-fore had been making peace time products were converted into war plants, supplying vital materials to America and her allies. Leisure time hit a new low. With the conversion of the industries came a 48-hour work week, vacations and the family weekly Sunday excursion into the country were out for the duration.

Then rationing: sugar, butter, meat all in quick succession. But the only ones to really feel the horrible impact of the war were the families and wives of the servicemen who saw their Johnny in a new light when he came home in khaki.

New War Songs

What Niles family doesn't recall "Remember Pearl Harbor." America's first war song. That song along with scores of others from the last war was sung by every man, woman and child in the whole country. "Over There," "Tipperary," "When Johnny Comes Marching Home," "Hinky Dinky Parlez Vous," "My Buddy" were echoed at every gathering until new songs were found to take their places. "Don't Sit Under The Apple Tree," "Johnny Doughboy," "This is the Army, Mr. Jones," "Everybody Every Day," "Say a Prayer For the Boys Over There," "When The Lights Go On Again," "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas," "I'll be Home for Christmas" and "I've Got Sixpence," proved to be fair substitutes for some; other were irreplaceable and marching feet still beat out the rhythm to "Over There," "The Marine Hymn," "The Song of the Caissons" and ships were still launched to the tune of "Anchors Aweigh."

Youngsters still held out for boogie woogie and jive and no hep cat would call the party on the beam unless the "GI Jive" was included. If they didn't like it they became "strictly a square from Delaware" and not cookin' with helium.

It wasn't long until "They're Either Too Young or Too Old" became the "wail" of every American girl in her prime. Dates and dances became an exclusive privilege of those under sixteen and over forty. Man suddenly became an ethereal being, holy, enchanted and revered. And at last had come into his own.

American womanhood was not to be undone, with Mama in a war plant, sister answered the call, the WACS, WAVES, WAFS, Marines and Spars blossomed forth with much gusto and it became a disgrace not to have at least one service star in the window.

Struggle For Life

A smartness of gold mixed in

with the blue was the first warning that war was a struggle for existence. The existence of every institution that democracy upheld; the existence of life itself.

LIFE—newsreels painted a never-to-be-forgotten picture of how life in a split second became death and war, hell.

Until the winter of 1943 all eyes had been focused on the Pacific. It was there that battles were being fought, lives lost and the drama of life and death played by Niles boys. Then came talk of a European Invasion, first only whispers, followed up by speculations and the usual arm chair and barber shop prognostications.

In the spring of 1944 the pent-up emotions of the town's populace began to look upon the Invasion of the European Continent as something real and not quite so far off. "It will come for sure before summer." "They won't use France, they'll go through the Balkans." "What are they waiting for?" "They're waiting until Rome is out of the picture."

Invasion and Victory

INVASION — everyone had been expecting it, everyone was staggered when the news broke June 6, 1944. D-Day had come, and with it the first faint glimmer of peace.

Niles prayed: the whole country prayed on that day. For the first time since the war began churches were filled—and it wasn't Sunday.

As Allied armies swept across Normandy the country's morale skyrocketed. The fangs of death again stung. Invasion casualties came to the Times office at the rate of one a day for three weeks. Everyone felt the terrific impact of the inevitable. War made heroes, but at a tremendous price.

Normandy was ours, Paris, Brussels, Holland. Hitler's satellites came over to our side one by one.

This, like any other war had its false reports. Always in the end these reports were made good and we kept going on and on until what America had known all along would happen, happened.

With the war in Europe over action was intensified in the Pacific. There was some relief, however, as the War Department made public an elaborate system of demobilization and Niles soldiers were released from Nazi prisons.

Then came headlines from the battlefield: 500 B-29s leave Nagoya in flames; Task Force 58 bags 357 enemy planes in Nip homeland; Jap Imperial Rule quits; Japanese admit Tokyo laid waste by flames; more Superfort Raids; fire bombs leave Osaka in flames; 2000 planes pour bombs on Japan. In the midst of this the Selective

Service halted the draft of men 30 and over; Winston Churchill resigned and the Philippine campaign came to a close.

Atom Bombs

Peace came closer as the Japs made an unofficial plea for peace and the defeat of Japan by Christmas was predicted.

Then on Aug. 6, 1945, came the startling news that an atom bomb had been dropped on Hiroshima with an estimated 150,000 Japs killed. Three days later Nagasaki got the second bomb with another 150,000 estimated dead.

Peace was only a matter of days at this point, the Allies were considering a peace offer on Aug. 10, with the Japs requesting retention of Hirohito. The Allies offered a counter plan and the world was tense while the enemy made their decision.

On Aug. 15, 1945, a war weary world returned to the ways of peace as six years of human bloodshed ended when Emperor Hirohito ordered his government to surrender unconditionally to the Big Four.

That, in brief, is the story of the war years. Here are details of the various activities in which the people of Niles engaged during those years. They are not listed in order of importance but in alphabetical order.

AMERICAN LEGION

William McKinley Post No. 106, American Legion, under Commanders Wade Trimbur, Francis McGurk, James Hofius, Frank Pendleberry, Ralph Tipper and Charles Ramsey, past commanders for six war years, was one of Niles' most progressive organizations in the support of the war effort.

This post arranged for the construction of the Honor Roll boards which stood on the McKinley Memorial grounds. Assistance to the Local Selective Service Board in send-offs and farewells for the men leaving for military service—supplying them with various kind of pamphlets, was furnished by William McKinley Post.

The post rooms were made available for any and all purposes connected with the war effort.

The members of the post organized and trained three Victory Corps, units in McKinley High School. These program were very successful and were of great benefit to the boys participating because of the pre-induction military training received.

All of boys had high praises for pre-service training and many of them favor universal military

training after their experience in the Victory Corps.

Ceremonies were held for the presentation of medals to families of servicemen killed in action and members of William McKinley Post gave a testimonial dinner in recognition of the services rendered the community and the country by the Local Board, the appeal agent and physicians who served with the Selective Service System, the local Civilian Defense Council and members of the Union Cemetery commission.

With the co-operation of officials of Union Cemetery a beautiful Memorial Burial Plot was secured and has been maintained.

A number of postmen served on the Ohio State Highway Patrol Auxiliary.

Daniel McMullen Post No. 187 was named for Lt. Daniel McMullen who was killed in an air crash over Europe. First officers of the new organization were installed and colors presented by William McKinley Post Mar. 12, 1945.

ARMY & NAVY UNION

Army & Navy Union under Commander Phil Klatt, planned huge public rallies and demonstrations preceding the departure of district men for induction in the early war years. They also gave them many departing gifts.

The Union continued service to the men in uniform, assisting them in a possible way and endeavoring to keep up their morale while on the battle front and home on furlough.

BLOCK PLAN

Prominent in the mobilization of the home front for the war effort was the block plan or organization for civilian war services. The aim of the block leader plan, carried out in Niles as elsewhere, was to take every individual and every household into the community war effort.

Mrs. Ray Koken was appointed assistant director of civilian defense in charge of war services in Mar. 1943. Activities of the Niles block plan included all civilian activities other than protection—such as salvage, transportation, war savings, services for service men, recreation, consumer interests, nutrition, health and medical care.

Executive committee members of the Niles war service group were Mrs. John Wilder, Mrs. H. G. Porter, Mrs. Clare Batson and Mrs. Carmen DeChristofaro. Assisted by 125 block leaders, this committee participated in collecting paper and tin for salvage, the promotion of victory gardens, collected books for veterans' hospitals and worked for the 3rd, 4th and 5th War Loan drives.

BLUE STAR MOTHERS

The Blue Star Mothers, with a small group of members, contributed an outstanding record in the war years, and still continue in their good work, lending a helping hand whenever needed. Branches that had their origin in the Niles Blue Star Mothers, founded by William Klatt Dec. 9, 1941, are doing good work in many parts of the United States.

During four years of active service, helping servicemen and women, the Blue Star Mothers spent more than \$6,700, raised by various methods, sponsoring a gift shop, lawn fetes, raffles, dinners, rummage sales, sales tax refunds, donations by members and many other projects.

Servicemen at Camp Reynolds, Camp Reynolds Hospital, Camp Dix, Fletcher Hospital, Brecksville Hospital, Deshon Hospital and Crile Hospital benefited by their gifts and good deeds. For four years they had a weekly program at Reynolds.

Lonesome boys from Camp Reynolds were brought to Niles where they were entertained by picnics and dances, the Blue Star Mothers located musical instruments for their band and keep them in repair.

Not only servicemen, but their families were remembered in the long list of good deeds performed by the Niles Blue Star Mothers. Gifts of groceries, gold stars for mothers who lost sons in service, flowers, masses were included.

They donated to the T. B. fund, the Trumbull Arboretum, Kiwanis Camp, Red Cross, Children's Home, Band Boosters, U.S.O. War Fund, worked for the Red Cross, assisted at the Blood Bank, the salvage drive, had a member of the Com-

munity War Fund Board of Trustees all through the war, helped sell \$200,000 in war bonds.

Mrs. Belva Watkins, who served four years as president of the Blue Star Mothers, was a member of the board of directors of the Trumbull County U.S.O. Seven other Blue Star groups were direct offspring of the Niles organization. Mrs. Mabel Baldwin was president the first year.

Latest gift of the Blue Star Mothers was a hospital bed and wheel chair to the city. Projects of other Blue Star groups throughout the country include an amphitheatre in Chillicothe, a rehabilitation farm in Michigan and Vet Ville in California.

BOND DRIVES

Niles passed their quota in the seven War Bond drives conducted between Nov. 30, 1942 and June 26, 1945. Citizens purchased \$8,262,277.45 in bonds to furnish the equipment to back up our armies.

The War Bond army of volunteers called on every wage and income owner in the city in the "Victory Bond Drive" passing a quota of \$776,000 by \$1,192,451.

The War Financing Committee was headed by John Wilder who succeeded in keeping the tempo of the first drive, and the six that followed, at a pace with that of our efforts on the battlefronts.

Stress was put on the series "E" bond of each drive and Niles was especially proud of the showing made in the purchase of these bonds.

With the stirring slogan "They give their lives—you lend your money" of the second War Loan drive, quota of \$67,000 was met and passed, with a total of \$1,047,281.

In the dark early days of the Italian campaign the citizens of Niles were asked to raise \$1,071,230 and oversubscribed by \$30,356.70.

"Have you done your part to reach the goal?" was the challenge of the Fourth War Loan Drive on Jan. 11, 1944. The final total, raised through bankers, was \$1,508,669—\$308,669 more than was asked.

The appeals "Buy extra bonds" and "Buy more than before," which were slogans of the Fifth War Loan Drive, were not in vain. Niles exceeded its goal purchasing bonds to the value of \$1,749,462.75 against a quota of \$1,444,000.

The Sixth War Loan Drive started Nov. 20, 1944, with the call to arms "Back the attack!" The goal of \$1,274,000 was oversubscribed by 38 per cent—netting \$1,750,634.25.

When the call of "The Mighty Seventh" came May 14, 1945, Niles again came through, surpassing a quota of \$618,250, with purchases totaling \$824,479.

After the war was over an 8th bond drive, the Victory Loan, was conducted successfully between Oct. 29 and Dec. 8, 1945. A quota of \$897,000 was over-subscribed by \$40,560.

BOY SCOUTS

Boy Scout troops of Niles co-operated with civic organizations during the war years to help speed the date of victory.

When the government's call for aluminum in all shapes and forms first came through, the Scouts started their scrap collecting campaign. Their assistance included house to house collection and boosting the local drive in every way possible. When scrap iron and paper salvage calls came they continued their good work.

Fifty-three members of ten Niles Boy Scouts troops received General Eisenhower medals July 1, 1945 for collecting 1,000 pounds of scrap paper per person. Troop 132, supervised by David Davies, received a special award for collecting 20,255 pounds, more than 1,000 pounds for each member of the troop.

Literature explaining the essential importance of civilian defense, victory gardening and all salvage efforts was distributed in Niles and district neighborhoods through the combined work of the local groups.

Suiting their own literature to action, the Scouts contributed their time to the development of civilian defense. Lack of messenger boys during practice blackouts and bombing exhibits was quickly eliminated by the Scouts, Joseph Doran was head scoutmaster.

"On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country." The Boy Scouts of America lived up to their pledge.

BRITISH WAR RELIEF SOCIETY

The British War Relief Society was permanently organized Oct. 21, 1940, at a meeting in City Council Chamber. Mrs. Rose Homer Rose was elected chairman. The aim of the society was to render all possible aid to distressed Britain.

The first shipment of garments from the British War Relief Society was made on Oct. 28 when over 300 pieces of clothing and shoes were sent.

In January, 1941, the Society sent \$40 for a hospital bed and in April, 1941, \$1,500 for a mobile kitchen or tea cart. Later they sent \$500 for the maintenance of the vehicle. In October of the same year \$500 was sent to the children's Christmas gift fund. In March, 1942, the organization sent \$100 to purchase seeds.

The Junior British War Relief Society, with David Gill Evans, later with the U. S. Navy, as chairman, raised \$718. During the time of the organization of the senior group they raised a grand total of \$7,079.86.

CHURCHES

A country at war is a country at prayer, and Niles and Mineral Ridge churches also went to war.

Before many a church an American flag waved at all who passed, or perhaps an honor roll bore the name of members in service. One could not enter a church without being aware of the change.

Everywhere, wives, sweethearts, mothers, fathers and children entered the church of their choice to offer prayers for the safe return of loved ones. They prayed at home, they offered silent prayers, or they joined together in groups to ask God to end the war and bring lasting peace.

They attended memorial services in churches where the minister or priest counseled the congregation to "forgive them, for they know not what they do," and added a fervent "may he rest in peace."

Churches here gave much to the country. They sent forth many a well-trained young man or woman to take part in the grim reality which is war. Chaplains went from Niles and Mineral Ridge to stand side by side with the men on the battlefield of North Africa, the E.T.O., the South Pacific.

But the service of the church did not stop with this. By activities initiated on the home-front, the church congregations contributed much to the welfare of the uniformed American.

Many different ideas were thought of to help those in service. No matter what the denomination, however, one thing all had in common—prayer.

Many conceived the idea of gifts to the men as they left. Soon after numbers began to mount the idea of news letters published weekly, monthly or bi-monthly became popular.

CITY OFFICIALS

Mayor Elmer E. Fisher was elected to office Nov. 4, 1941, just a few days after Niles officially went to war. He succeeded Mayor William P. Kearney who had served two terms.

Mayor Fisher found many additional duties falling to him in the years which followed. Emergencies had to be met as Niles became more and more involved in the conflict.

Taking office in 1941, with Mayor Fisher, were Murray I. Wick as president of council, Leroy Swegan, Carl Solomonson and Joseph McNamara councilmen-at-large; Clarence Crawford, 1st Ward; Daniel Holmes, 2nd Ward; Anthony Reigle, 3rd Ward; Edwin R. Standley, 4th Ward.

Apparently satisfied with their Mayor's ability to handle the job as their leader, Niles re-elected him in November, 1945, as well as Wick, Holmes, Reigle, Swegan and Solomonson. Matt McGregor was elected councilman-at-large; Robert Wilson, 1st Ward councilman and James Monroe, 4th Ward.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE

An invasion by Germany or Japan in 1943 or 1944 would have found Niles well prepared as the Civilian Defense Council swung into action after an organization meeting called by William P. Kearney, then mayor, on Dec. 11, 1942.

From this beginning activities started which were to prepare the town for any emergency. Auxiliary policemen, auxiliary firemen, fire watchers, air raid wardens, mes-

sengers, an emergency food and house corps, motor corps, emergency medical aides were trained and prepared for their jobs.

When America feared invasion attacks by air in 1943 over 500 Niles citizens organized the Civilian Defense blackout system, headed by Director Wallace H. Hoak and Citizen Commander Elmer Kraemer. During Niles' four blackouts the efficiency of the organization proved itself over and over again.

On March 14, 1943, Director Hoak led the Northeastern Ohio blackout which covered 29 counties. Local civilian defense heads reported that for all practical purposes the blackout in the Niles residential sections was 100 per cent effective.

On March 16, 1943, Director Hoak ordered a city blackout which was executed between 9:25 and 9:55 that evening. Although some confusion caused difficulty in determining when the all clear signal lights could be put back on, Commander Hoak expressed the Civilian Defense's gratitude for the co-operation the public gave zone leaders.

Civilian Defense heads stated that the state authorized blackout May 25 was "the most successful yet." The total blackout signal came at 10:10 p. m. and 14 test cases involving the use of ambulances, were tabulated by the switch board operators.

Jan. 1, 1944, marked the end of the blackout alerts by order of the Army home defense authorities.

Upon the outbreak of war, Dec. 8, 1941, Niles prepared to guard against sabotage in defense industries. All metal fabricating plants in the city looked up "hot spots." Workers were required to register and carry identification cards with their photographs. Auxiliary Police were stationed in defense industries to check vehicles and workers.

Adequate precautions, with the addition to the police guard, were taken to protect substations and the Meander Reservoir, which furnished water for Niles.

With the organizing of the police auxiliaries and other defense groups, Niles was well fortified against any sabotage.

At the first meeting W. R. Robinson was named executive director and John P. Hosack, Ola Gambridge, Mrs. John Thomas and James Griffin members of the advisory committee. Robinson remained executive director until his retirement on Sept. 1, 1942, when Wallace H. Hoak was appointed by Mayor Elmer Fisher to succeed him.

Zone leaders and their headquarters included Zone 1, Paul K. Rader, Niles Post Office building; Zone 2, Stanley Bowers, Lincoln School basement; Zone 3, Alfred Canterbury, gate house, National Gypsum Co.; Zone 4, George Davis, George Davis basement.

Members of the Civilian Defense Council Staff were as follows:

DRAFT BOARD

Members of Niles Draft Board No. 5, T. Frank Pendleberry, chairman, Lamar Young, John P. Hosack, George Frech and Samuel P. Mango, worked tirelessly at their tremendous job of furnishing the Army, Navy and Marines with young men who were to bring victory to their country.

There were heartaches connected with the job, but "99½ per cent of them took it like men," Pendleberry said in summing up the work. "They had a job to do and they knew they were the ones to do it."

The Niles Draft Board, which registered 3,898 men for military service in October, 1940, was one of the best in the state. There was no break in personal until five years after when George Frech re-

signed. Miss Reba Howells was appointed chief clerk and served the entire life of the draft board. Mrs. Marie Heitman and Miss Lena Gentile served faithfully following their appointment. Draft Board members worked without pay, only the clerical staff receiving remuneration.

The members were appointed by John Bricker, then governor. Oct. 12, 1940 and they chose Pendleberry as chairman and Young as secretary. Pendleberry resigned in July, 1946, after five years and eight months of devoted service. The group functioned only a short time after that, with Wallace Hoak appointed as a member during the period.

Office headquarters was first in the city building, later in the Calvin block and finally in the Niles Bank Building.

Certificates for service were received yearly from the President and Governor and on the fifth year members of the Board were rewarded with pins.

First job was the registering of all men between the ages of 21 and 35, on Oct. 16, 1940. Oct. 30 marked a memorable day for at exactly 5:48 a. m. after more than 17 hours of drawing numbers from the World War military service lottery bowl, 17,000,000 young Americans were numbered for selective service in the new national army.

Niles Draft Board No. 5 was authorized to draw men from all the Weathersfield Township and included Girard, Hubbard, McDonald, Mineral Ridge and adjacent sections of Youngstown and Warren. The total number of soldiers which Niles had contributed at the end of June was 197.

Three volunteers were Niles' first contribution to the 996 men required to fill Ohio's first Selective Service quota. They were Nick Cioffi, Mike Pirigyi and Steve Hallock. Frank Sallustio had No. 153, first number drawn from the lottery bowl and Joseph Guy Miranda, 1109 Mason St., was No. 1 in the cards of the draft board.

The first group of selectees, 50 strong, left Niles Jan. 30, 1941.

During the years in which the Draft Board functioned 3,702 men entered the service, or nearly 15% of the population.

FRATERNAL ORDERS

Among the groups who contributed to the job of keeping up the morale of the servicemen were the fraternal orders of both men and women. Most of them had honor roll boards in their headquarters, supported service centers throughout the United States, remembered their absent members with gifts cards and letters, kept up their membership during their absence, sent them subscriptions to the local paper and comforted and helped their families.

Niles many fraternal orders, whose work during the war years will never be forgotten, include: Catholic Men's Society, Dames of Malta, Eagles, Odd Fellows, Rebekahs, Saxon Sick Benefit Society, Hungarian Catholic Association, Eastern Star, Redman, Garibaldi Lodge, Anita Garibaldi Auxiliary, Knights of Columbus, Knights of the Golden Eagle, Knights of Pythias.

Ladies' Catholic Benevolent Association, Ladies of the Golden Eagle, Loyal Order of Moose, Mahoning Lodge F. & A. M., Amaranth, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society, Degree of Pocahontas, Protected Home Circle, Pythian Sisters, Sincerity Lodge, F. & A. M., Sons of Italy, St. Philip Society, Women's Benefit Association, Women of the Moose, Barea Society.

GIRL SCOUTS

Taking their part in the job of speeding the day of Victory in both Europe and the Pacific areas were Niles 200-odd Girl Scouts.

Senior Girl Scouts who had completed a course in home nursing assisted each month at the Blood Bank. They had the job of cleaning tubes and aided in checking.

The booth in the stamp and bond booth at Woolworth's was often manned by a Girl Scout in uniform. They also collected for the Red Cross during drives.

The Girl Scouts knitted afghans, made scrap books for USO centers, made surgical dressings, collected silk stockings during the drive and reconditioned toys to sell during the holidays.

They sang a chorus on a British

War Relief Society program, participated in Memorial Day services and parades, carried flags of the Allied Nations in a July 4th parade and took part in the July 4th pageant in 1942.

Whenever help was needed in collecting articles for the armed forces they were always ready to offer a helping hand. They collected old furs, funds for the Allied nations in a drive through the theatres, and packed box lunches for inductees leaving for camps.

Much of the work was done under Mrs. J. H. MacQuarrie who served two years as Girl Scout commissioner.

HONOR ROLL BOARDS

Honor roll boards on the grounds of the McKinley Memorial, in front of churches, in Mineral Ridge on the school lawn, in the lobbies of other churches, in headquarters of fraternal, social and patriotic organizations, were a constant reminder that it was our own young men and women who were risking their lives to bring Victory to our country.

William McKinley post of the American Legion arranged for the construction of Honor Roll board on the McKinley Memorial grounds. The boards were made possible by the assistance of the carpenters' union, whose members very generously contributed all of the necessary labor in the construction, and the painters' union, who also donated their time and work.

A large portion of the material cost was covered by cash contributions from individuals and corporations in the community, as well as a donation of considerable material by the local merchants, lumber dealers and manufacturers.

A city-wide public dedication of the Honor Rolls was sponsored by the post.

Later a Gold Star board was built, facing Main St. and bearing the names of the boys whose lives were lost in World War II.

Our Lady of Mt. Sarnel Church dedicated an honor roll board in front of their church, bearing the names of hundreds of boys of the parish.

INDUSTRY

Niles industry and workers gave their full share in production for the war effort. Record breaking production for which some plants received "E" awards was Niles answer to the call for more of everything to defeat the enemy.

More than 7,000 men and women gave their time, energy and talent in Niles industrial plants, to supply the needs of America and her Allies on the battle front. In addition there were probably 3,500 Nilesites employed in other industrial plants in Warren, Youngstown, Lordstown and Newton Falls.

Niles' reply to the aggressors, who preferred to speak in terms of mechanical and chemical forces, was heard in no uncertain terms. Censorship prohibited publication of much of the work of industry at the time but there was plenty of proof in the destruction of the industrial organization of Europe and Japan.

Flying Fortresses contained parts supplied from Niles. Many a rolling jeep, truck or bulldozer was made of steel processed or fabricated by Niles men with the "know how."

Mounts for artillery pieces, shells, and also the ammunition started their long journey to the battle fronts from here. Tin plate, for which Niles is well known, played an important part in the supplying of properly preserved foods.

Proper supply of gasoline and oil contributed to the downfall of the enemy. Niles produced steel drums and helped assemble various kinds of steel pipes to get fuel where the military forces wanted, and when they wanted it.

Outstanding contributions were the supplying of landing mats for the construction of airfields and the production of incendiary bombs.

Equally important in the winning of the war were the efforts of labor and management in the production of electric bulbs, fire brick, chemicals, bronze castings, industrial trucks, bridge hardware, stampings of all kinds, steel drums, forgings of all kinds, machine and foundry products, railroad cars, sealedbeam headlights, sheet steel, hot rolled, annealed and galvanized sheet steel, steel barrels, steel fabrications, structural steel, sulphuric

acid, trailers, welding operations, blast furnaces and the other numerous war products.

Less glamorous was the value of the work done by Niles organizations in the building trades. War plants, arsenals, supply depots and housing projects for war workers in more than 15 cities in five states were serviced with heating, ventilating equipment, sanitary devices and plumbing by aggressive Niles contracting organizations.

Containers and crates for overseas shipment occupied virtually all the production facilities of one lumber company.

High school students worked part time in stores and factories; women kept their homes going and worked in stores or war plants; fathers and brothers of men in the armed forces gave the best they had — and it was good.

Among Niles plants receiving Army-Navy "E" award were the Mahoning Valley Steel Corp., the National Gypsum Co., Niles Steel Products Division of Republic Steel Corp., and Allied Metals.

JAYCEES

Niles Junior Chamber of Commerce members were busy Aug. 22, 1942, putting finishing touches to plans for the drive to raise \$3,790 for the United Service Organizations. The drive began Aug. 25, 1942, and was to end Sept. 1, 1942, but was extended an extra week to meet the goal.

Contacts with the city's industrial plants were completed and nearly every wage earner in the community donated the dollar that was suggested as his fair share.

Clubs and organizations voted contributions to the U.S.O. Merchants and professional men were also contacted during the drive. F. W. Bohne Jr. had charge of these donations.

Industry and labor were reported equally loud in their praise of the Jaycees plan to ask only one dollar from each working man. The goal was not only reached but was far over the needed amount.

MERCHANTS DIVISION

Every civic organization in Niles claimed membership in the campaign for victory. The Merchants Division of the Chamber of Commerce, then headed by Henry F. Davis, decided to contribute to the war effort and when members suggested the importance of transportation for Mineral Ridge war workers, the Division sponsored a drive to extend bus service to this vital area.

Another method the Merchants Division found to contribute to victory was the instigation of send-offs for the boys leaving for induction. When the draftees first left nothing was done for them. By the time the second group was ready to leave the McKinley High School band was secured through the assistance of Superintendent of Schools S. J. Bonham and cigarettes and candy were given the departing boys from Division funds. Later belts were secured to replace the previous gifts, through the courtesy of Pritchards'.

When boys were sent from McDonald, Mineral Ridge and Hubbard areas bands from these schools often contributed music for the occasion. Because of the sadness involved in send-offs, the Division decided to abandon this idea early in 1944.

MOTHERS WATCH

A group of 45 women gathered in the First Baptist church house at 9 a. m., Sept. 30, 1942, to offer prayer for our men and women in service. This group, averaging about 30 women at each meeting, continued to hold services each Wednesday morning. Half of the hour long service was used for devotions and the rest of the time was spent in voluntary prayer.

"Watch and Pray" was the motto of the Mothers' Watch Prayer Service, and the membership was comprised of mothers of servicemen and women. It was not an organized group and women from most of the Protestant churches in the city attended.

These women sponsored a pre-invasion Day of Prayer held May 24, 1944, from 10:30 a. m. until 3:30 p. m., in the First Baptist Church, with a large group attending.

Mrs. Ross Adgate, Mrs. Rees Harris and Mrs. William Martin,

original starters of the group, reported having "wonderful experiences and answers to prayer."

The prayer list originally contained 100 names and grew to contain more than 400 names of those in service.

These women were faithful in remembering bereaved families of Niles boys with notes of sympathy. When any boy on their prayer list was wounded or sick they remembered him with letters and cards.

Besides spiritual welfare this group of women contributed to Red Cross work, assisting at the blood bank, and donated during war fund drives.

NILES DAILY TIMES

Contributing to the war effort the Niles Daily Times gave wholehearted support to every drive for funds, Red Cross, U.S.O., War Bonds and Stamps and Scrap.

In January, 1942, TIMES carriers sold \$5,152.05 worth of stamps and bonds, marking up one of the highest per capita sales of stamps by newsboys in the country participating in the carrier drive for sale of bonds and stamps. Up to Jan. 1942, 19 Times carrier boys had earned merit badges for the sale of bonds and stamps.

The Niles Daily Times endeavored to keep its readers posted on every battle front, carried all available stories of local young men and women serving in the armed forces, printed thousands of pictures, printed poetry, letters and other contributions from the servicemen.

Valued employees left for the armed forces, leaving behind a dwindling staff to keep the paper going.

NILES FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUB

Niles Federation of Women's Clubs had a major share in civilian defense efforts by taking charge of cash sales of War Bonds and Stamps at the F. W. Woolworth Co. Total sales made at this booth from Aug. 31, 1942, to Sept. 11, 1944, netted \$83,983.29. This sum was considerably in excess of expectations and fully justified the considerable expenditure of time and effort on the part of hundreds of Niles women, according to Mrs. John Hults, Federation chairman of this activity.

In addition the Niles Federation obtained War Bond pledges here totalling \$54,670, which were earmarked for the purchase of a U. S. bomber plane, bearing the name "Ohio." This was Niles' contribution to the statewide campaign of the Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs, which through the cooperation of banks, obtained the purchase of a number of bombers to be named for Ohio.

The principal defense effort of the Niles Federation was the maintaining of the Woolworth store booth and in this activity, every member club, as well as several clubs not in the Federation, cooperated to the fullest extent.

Niles and Mineral Ridge churches, the Girl Scouts and all women's lodges and women's auxiliaries in Niles lent their assistance.

The Federation assumed charge of the booth Aug. 31, 1942, as the result of a request from H. E. Smutz, manager of the Woolworth store in Niles. At that time Mrs. Bruce Miller was president of Federation.

All organizations assisting in the campaign contributed two weeks time during each year, so that the booth was staffed during store hours every day in the week.

POST OFFICE

Carriers of the Niles Post Office during the war years carried heavy burdens with light hearts, glad when they were able to deliver the letter that would bring smiles to faces of the family anxiously awaiting word from some loved one. Whistling as they neared the home whose address was the same as a long-hoped-for letter bore.

Dudley C. (Dud) Smith took over the job of Postmaster in May, 1940, just in time to shoulder his share of the heaviest load the U. S. Postal Department was ever called upon to bear. Other employees of the post office worked at an ever-increasing tempo in the effort of keeping on schedule.

There were tremendous loads of incoming and outgoing mail, with a very small percentage of claims for losses in the exceptionally large

volume of packages for boys all over the world.

Christmas mail started in October, V-mail stationery was distributed free to the public and there was a large volume of sales of bonds and war stamps. The revenue of the Post Office jumped to more than three times that of 1939, in the peak year of 1944, and leveled off slightly with a consistently high yearly average since that date.

At the outbreak of the war the Post Office department fingerprinted all aliens in the city, and vicinity, and turned all information over to the F. B. I.

A great deal of credit was due high school boys who substituted afternoons and summer while going to school, turning in a remarkably good job.

V-MAIL

V-Mail for use in correspondence to and from our armed forces abroad was first available at the Niles Post Office July 28, 1942.

The characteristic forms of V-Mail were not used for mail within the United States, however. On the light gray of the single sheet letters of deep orange are printed, stating that this was V-Mail and listing instructions as to how and where to write the message. The sheet was constructed in such a way as to provide uniform folding and sealing. It was also arranged so as to provide standard, uniform writing of the name and address of sender and receiver.

Postage was three cent stamps by ordinary mail to postoffices at points of embarkation, six cents by airmail, and was necessary to be affixed prior to mailing. OUR BOYS were, however, allowed to use the usual franking privilege.

The actual forms filled out here and abroad by correspondents were not delivered. Through use of special machines, the letters were photographed on a tiny 16 millimeter film. The film was mailed and the original was kept on file here.

RATION BOARD

A major civilian activity on the home front was the organization and administration of the Niles War Price and Rationing Board. Harry Smutz was first chairman of the board when it was organized, with offices in the McKinley Memorial building. He was succeeded by Joe Stein.

Board members met at regular intervals, served faithfully and unselfishly and worked long hours, without pay, in order to handle the many phases of war rationing. As the work of the board grew paid officer workers were added to the staff.

The Board moved from the McKinley Memorial building to Jefferson School, and in May, 1943, to quarters on Robbins Ave.

In Jan. 1942 three permanent members of the Niles Tire Rationing Committee, serving on a voluntary basis, were appointed by W. R. Robinson, who was executive director of the Niles Civilian Defense Council. They were R. D. MacLean, Harry L. Cook and Henry Davis.

Harry L. Cook was first executive secretary of the Niles board, resigning in July, 1943, when he was succeeded by Mrs. Katharine Griffiths, who became chief clerk.

The Niles board was one of four in Trumbull County and held jurisdiction over this city as well as Lordstown, Weathersfield, Liberty and Hubbard Townships.

Besides the voluntary service of board members, and the office volunteers, much credit was due Niles schools. All Niles schools cooperated with rationing activities from the start, turning over the buildings for the use of the board and assisting in many ways. When A ration books were issued high school girls and various teachers were of great help and without their assistance much that was accomplished would have been impossible or considerably delayed.

RED CROSS

Niles branch of the Trumbull County Chapter of the American Red Cross assumed many extra duties during the war years. Much heavier budgets, required for war relief, were met, or exceeded, in Niles, while citizens rallied to par-

ticipate in volunteer services offered by the Red Cross.

During the war period the Red Cross was under the direction of D. L. Evans, as chairman, until February, 1945, when he was succeeded by Robert Sharn.

All the activities of the Niles branch, with the exception of those of the executive secretary, Mrs. Ola S. Gambridge, were carried on by a strictly volunteer group of men and women, who also paid all the expenses incurred in the voluntary duties, such as the cost of uniforms, gasoline, etc.

Red Cross volunteer special services were headed by Mrs. Edgar Madden until September, 1944, when she was succeeded by Mrs. Gertrude Freese as general chairman of all these activities of the local branch.

The American Red Cross Blood donor service visited Niles many times after the first call Jan. 16, 1943. They collected thousands of pints of blood, turned over to the armed forces for blood plasma, the same blood plasma that saved the lives of tens of thousands of wounded servicemen on the field of battle and in Army and Navy hospitals.

Mrs. T. F. Pendleberry was the faithful and hardworking chairman of the blood donor service.

An exclusive club was organized, all members having donated at least a gallon of blood. First two members of the "Gallon Club" were Mrs. Gertrude Fendley and Eugene Heffner.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Fred Lewis, surgical dressings were made to comply with the most sanitary regulations and restrictions. Hundreds of Niles women devoted thousands of hours to the job of preparing hundreds of thousands of dressings.

Home Nursing

Mrs. Frank Forney was chairman of the Home Nursing Service which trained many women to care for the sick or injured in their own homes. Prevention of sickness was taught, thus building up the health of the community. Instructors in the work included Mrs. W. O. Savers, Mrs. J. M. Harner, Mrs. Ed Collins, Miss Selena Copeland and Mrs. Ed Lally.

Niles women and girls acted as Nurses Aides, assisting nurses at Warren City and St. Joseph's Hospitals in Warren, and working in Republic Steel Corp. hospital. Work in the latter hospital was suspended by the Nurses Aides in order to work at Camp Reynolds. Mrs. Bert Shaffer was chairman.

Under the production program Mrs. Thomas Jones was chairman of sewing, assisted by Mrs. Ed Snelus.

The Niles Red Cross Motor Corps was organized April 22, 1942 at the American Legion Hall with Miss Ann Campana as captain and Mrs. Carolyn Lewis Siddall as adjutant. The girls became trained mechanics, all graduates of a course of instruction under the direction of George Potter.

During January, after Pearl Harbor, some 200 Nilesites gathered at McKinley High School to begin First Aid courses. At that time there were only four Red Cross First Aid instructors in Niles, Mrs. Ola Gambridge, Robert Wilson, Richard Swager and Miss Hazel Moore. Miss Ida Madden acted as chairman.

Every Red Cross chapter shared its responsibilities to servicemen and their families, as well as to ex-servicemen, by providing Home Service as part of the Red Cross program of service.

This branch was an important wartime medium of communication between civilians and their relatives in the Armed Forces. Voluntary aid to the sick and wounded was also administered through Home Service. Niles Home Service was under the direction of Mrs. Ola S. Gambridge. She was assisted by the Rev. Roland H. Shaefer, Mrs. Charles Crow, Mrs. Homer Rose, Miss Margaret Pater-son and Dudley Smith.

Knitting Division

The women of Niles rallied to offer their services to knit garments of many kinds needed for soldiers and sailors. All garments were made of regulation yarn, furnished by the Red Cross and knitted to conform with the exact requirements of the Armed Forces.

When first organized the knitting division was under the direction of Mrs. Edgar Tricker. In Oct. 1942, Mrs. R. M. Smith became chairman. Her first co-chairman was Mrs. Thomas Hutchinson, who re-

signed because of ill health, and was succeeded in 1943 by Miss Eleanor Allison. In October, 1944, there were 175-200 women regularly enrolled.

The Camp and Hospital Council started working at the Deshon General Hospital at Butler, Pa. and at the Camp Reynolds hospital after their organization. Chairman of the Niles council was Clem Diamond, assisted by Mrs. John Rose, Mrs. Mayme Flanagan and Charles Heleton. Branches were formed with the object of supplying service men with reading material and other things not furnished by the government.

Thomas H. Madden was chairman of the Home Service Department, Disaster Preparedness and Relief Committee.

The Staff Assistance Corps was a group of women organized to give clerical assistance to the executive offices, to conduct the details of operating the Blood Donor Service, and to help other civic bodies in their war defense work when requested. Mrs. John P. Hosack headed the group for two years and was succeeded by Mrs. G. N. Williams.

During the drive for Volunteer Canteen Workers of the Red Cross in Dec. 1941, 118 Niles women offered their services. Mrs. R. L. Knight acted as chairman.

SALVAGE

All scrap and salvage drives in the city and Weathersfield Township officially ended early in December, 1945, as the Weathersfield Township Salvage Committee dissolved itself after hearing a full report on collections over the four-year period.

In dissolving the committee voted unanimously to turn over a balance of \$336.41 to the "Cabin Project" of the Niles Federation of Women's Clubs.

Chairman A. P. Stillwagon reported a total of 11,392 tons of scrap iron and metals were salvaged, exclusive of industrial scrap, of which 146 tons were collected by the committee, with the assistance of city trucks through the co-operation of Service Director John F. McGlynn and his foreman, Ray Hubbard; the Niles Park Commission; the Weathersfield Township trustees; and scrap dealers Morris Clayman and the Main Auto Wrecking Co.

He also reported 7,860 pounds of rubber and 5,280 pounds of rags salvaged, of which 1,700 pounds of rubber and 1,660 pounds of rags were collected by the committee. One used garment drive netted 16,500 pounds of clothes for the aid of war refugees.

The latter collection necessitated the sorting, cleaning, packing and labelling of over 200 large cartons, and the committee expressed its appreciation of those who had assisted in the large amount of labor entailed in this drive.

It was further reported that 1,585 tons of scrap paper were salvaged, 31 by the committee and approximately 510 tons by Niles and Mineral Ridge schools. Other collections in the scrap paper drive were made by the Boy Scouts, Federation of Women's Clubs and various other collections.

Total tin collections amounted to 117,035 pounds, the report shows.

Chairman Stillwagon and the committee were honored with two awards for their efforts. One was the certificate of recognition for patriotic effort in the National Salvage program and the other was a citation in acknowledgment of meritorious services in behalf of the National War Salvage program from J. C. Krug.

Paper, tin, scrap and clothing drives were eminently successful in Niles, which maintained in these, as in other drives, its reputation for exceeding the set quotas. The trucks from the city service department, school children, Boy Scout organizations and other civic and patriotic groups.

One old clothes drive found Niles contributing two pounds per capita as compared with Cleveland's contribution of only one-fourth pound per capita. Mineral Ridge and McDonald also had excellent records in salvage drives.

Amusing items turned up in rubber and metal salvage drives. A century old bathtub came from the old Mason homestead, which still stands at 1355 Robbins Ave., ladies corsets, rubber mats, rubber bands, baby nipples, were turned in. Children brought in much of the material during the rubber salvage drive, parents later hunting in vain for

needed articles which had already been "salvaged."

Gas stations in the city acted as headquarters for collections. Girl Scouts worked on a fur drive, nylons, tin cans, greases, added to the huge piles brought in the "Scrap the Axis."

General Eisenhower medals for collecting 1,000 pounds of scrap paper per person were awarded 53 members of ten Niles Boy Scout Troops with Troop 132 making an enviable record. Pete Rufo of the Butler Theatre admitted hundreds of children free to the theatre when they brought in bundles of paper. Scrap dealers often "took a beating" as they paid cash for useless articles.

Mrs. J. H. MacQuarrie, who acted as secretary of the Salvage Committee, performed a tremendous amount of work. Among others who assisted Stillwagon in the work were Joe Doran, district committeemen for the Boy Scouts, Miss Beatrice Millard, Maurice Clayman, Abe Van Wye and Mrs. Leslie Rader. Blue Star Mothers helped. Mrs. Herbert Wilson contributed her time and hundreds of others were instrumental in putting Niles over the quota time after time.

SCHOOLS

Niles teachers and students showed how truly war conscious America was by their co-operation whenever a need was brought to their attention. Not only did schools aid and abet the United States war program but also encouraged civic participation.

Among the important contributions Niles schools made was the sale of government stamps and bonds and issuance of War Ration books. Both teachers and pupils added their combined efforts to make these programs successful. Grade and high school teachers worked extra hours to issue war ration books and register district consumers for sugar rationing.

School children contributed to all salvage campaigns conducted in the vicinity. Tin can, scrap rubber, iron, aluminum and paper collections were bolstered by the efforts of Niles' pupils.

High school pupils added extra duties to regular work by volunteering for first aid courses, Victory Corps, Red Cross work and home nursing courses. Teachers also contributed their time teaching classes and taking lessons themselves.

The importance of education itself was added to the list of wartime necessities. The campaign to encourage pupils to return to their desks was emphasized by front-line reports from soldiers who found a high school education necessary to cope with the problems of modern warfare.

In observance of victory in Europe McKinleyites viewed an impressive V-E Day ceremony under the supervision of faculty members Misses Valer Shurrager and Olive Bowman, N. C. Davis and T. C. Bond.

SERVICE CLUBS

The Service Clubs of Niles, Kiwanis, Rotary, Chamber of Commerce and Junior Chamber of Commerce, were instrumental in sending cards and gifts to their members in the armed forces. In addition dues of absent associates were kept up and the Clubs donated to the various war drives.

Individual members of the four service clubs were active in numerous local war agencies.

V.F.W. POST 2074

Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 2074, lent a helping hand during World War II by sending cigarettes to hospitals and servicemen overseas. They wrote letters and kept members informed as to what was going on back home. They later assisted ex-servicemen in filing for terminal leave pay and in making claims for pensions.

VICTORY GARDENS

A committee to plan a "Victory Garden" campaign back in February, 1942, met at the Civilian Defense office in the McKinley Memorial at the request of W. R. Robinson, the executive director. The group included Warren Van Wye, Frank Thomas, Ted Hutchings, Mrs. J. D. Neuman and Mrs. Arnold Randall.

W. G. Llewellyn and Mrs. John Wilder were in charge of plans for Victory Gardens in 1943. Garden plots were plowed on Vienna Ave. and given out to gardeners.

PVT. SAM ACCORDINO

Sam Accordino, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Accordino, enlisted in the Air Corps in 1942 and received a medical discharge a short time later. He died at Veteran's Administration Hospital at Perry Point, Md., Aug. 2, 1944.



CPL. GEORGE ALBU

Cpl. George Albu, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Albu, died Aug. 21, 1944, from pneumonia which developed from injuries incurred disembarking during the southern invasion of France. Albu entered service in Dec. 1940, and went overseas in June 1943. He was commended by the government for saving a buddy's life in Sicily.



SGT. ROBERT BETTS

Sgt. Robert Betts, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. William M. Betts, now living in Youngstown, lost his life when his plane was shot down by Japanese aircraft in Bougainville Straits Oct. 10, 1943. Betts enlisted in the Air Force in July 1942 and was immediately sent to the Southwest Pacific.



SGT. PAUL BROTHERS

Sgt. Paul Wesley Brothers, 24, son of Steve Brothers of Mineral Ridge, lost his life in an accident in Algiers Oct. 28, 1943. Brothers had been in the Army since April 1941. He was the second Mineral Ridge man to die in World War II.



LT. CHARLES BROWN

Lt. Charles Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Pearce, Main St., Mineral Ridge, died in a plane crash in Connecticut May 4, 1943. He received his wings and commission at Mariana, Fla., Jan. 14, 1943.



PVT. JOHN BRUTKA

Pvt. John Brutka, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Brutka, McKinley Heights, was killed in France, June 12, 1944. Widely known because of his ability as a banjo player, Pvt. Brutka entered the service May 13, 1943.



DAVID CAMPBELL S 1c

David Campbell S 1c, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert K. Campbell, lost his life when LST 577 was sunk Feb. 11, 1945 while participating in action in the Philippine area, attempting to return to reinforce the Lingayen Gulf beachhead. Campbell left high school to enlist in the Navy Nov. 19, 1943.



WALTER S. COATES WO

Warrant Officer Walter S. Coates, 41, veteran of 18 years service with the U. S. Army, died as the result of injuries received while engaged in fighting fires in the Bar Harbor, Me., area Oct. 23, 1947. During World War II Coates spent 34 months overseas, in North Africa and Italy.



SGT. DOMINIC DAGATI

Dominic Dagati, 26, was killed Nov. 6, 1945, in an automobile accident. He was inducted into the Army in November 1941, and discharged Oct. 28, 1945. A sergeant at the time of his discharge he had served in the Southwest Pacific and took part in the invasion of the Philippines. He was attached to the Ohio 36th Division.



T-SGT. JOHN W. DALEY

T-Sgt. John W. Daley was killed in action in Brittany Aug. 9, 1944. He was a member of the 6th Armored Division of the Third Army. He was the son of Mrs. Luke Daley, 602 Warren Ave., and the husband of Florence Daley of Mineral Ridge.



CPL. JACK DAVIS

Cpl. Jack Davis, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. John L. Davis, was killed in action during activities on the French front on June 6, 1944, D-Day. He was a member of the 506th Parachute Infantry. Davis enlisted in the Army in July, 1942, and went overseas in Oct. 1943.



PFC. GEORGE CAMP

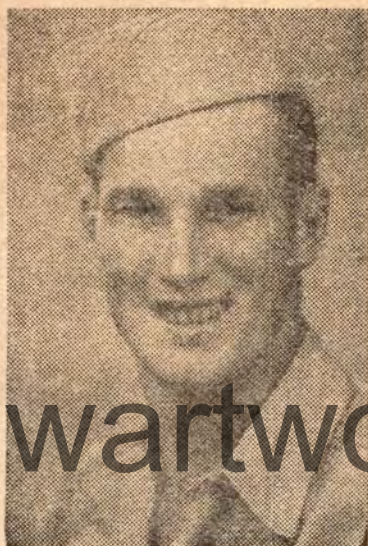

SGT. SAMUEL GAYONSKI

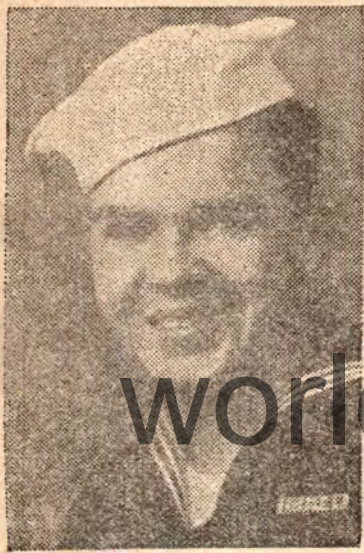

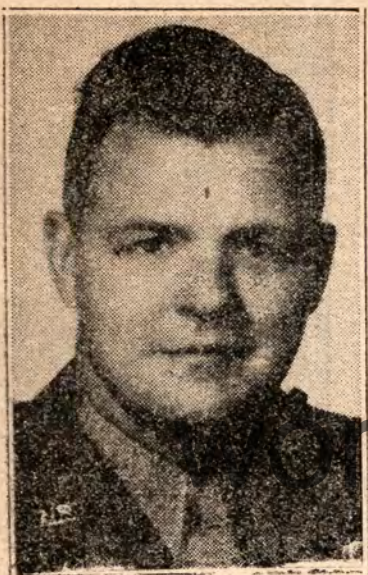

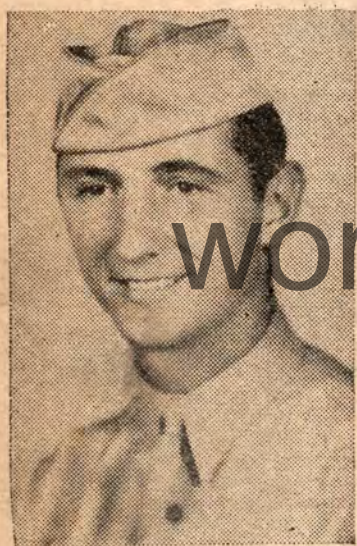

Richard Casto, brother of Charles, was also reported missing after the sinking of the U. S. S. Wyoming at Pearl Harbor. They were the first Niles casualties in World War II.

PVT. WAYNE E. CLEMMENS
Pvt. Wayne E. Clemmens, 25, of Lordstown, was killed in a train wreck at Jellico, Tenn., July 7, 1944. He had been inducted into the Army June 26, 1944.

PVT. FRANK CORDY
Pvt. Frank Cordy of the Marines lost his life in the battle for Iwo Jima Feb. 26, 1945. Frank joined the Marines June 19, 1944. He was the son of Mrs. Frank Cordy, and was widely known as an amateur boxer.

SGT. EARL DICKS
Sgt. Earl Dicks, 28, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. G. Dicks, and husband of Mrs. Earl Dicks, died in an Army hospital after being wounded in action in France June 25, 1944. Sgt. Dicks, member of the 313th Infantry, enlisted in May, 1942, and was sent overseas in April, 1944.

PVT. LUBERT DYCE
Pvt. Lubert Dyce, 26, son of Lubert Dyce of Evansville, was killed in action on Iwo Jima Mar. 7, 1945, while serving with the Marines. He was the husband of Mary Alice. Dyce entered the Marines Mar. 27, 1944, left for overseas duty in July of the same year and had been stationed in Hawaii.

T-SGT. EUGENE EISENHOWER
T-Sgt. Eugene J. Eisenhower, former Niles resident, was killed in a plane crash in France May 23, 1945. He was a member of the ordnance evacuation company of the 9th Army and had been overseas a year. He served in the Coast Guard from 1928 until 1931.

PVT. HOWARD J. EMCH
Pvt. Howard J. Emch, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Emch, McKinley Heights, was killed in action in North Africa Apr. 1, 1943.

S-SGT. JOSEPH C. FERRELL
Joseph C. Ferrell, 30, husband of Irene Nicholas Ferrell, and veteran of 57 missions as a gunner on a B-26 bomber in the ETO, was killed in an auto accident near Akron, Jan. 3, 1947.

PFC. PHILIP N. FESTA
Philip Festa, 27, veteran of three years in the ETO in World War II, died Sept. 27, 1947, as the result of injuries received in an accident while working at the Marioning Valley Steel Co. He was the son of Philip Festa and husband of Yolanda.

CPL. JACK FLECK
Cpl. Jack Fleck, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Fleck of Warren, was killed in action in Germany Mar. 15, 1945, where he was a member of the 290th Field Artillery, Observation Battalion.

S-SGT. WESLEY GRAHL
S-Sgt. Wesley Grahl, formerly of Niles, was killed in action in the Southwest Pacific Nov. 17, 1944. S-Sgt. Grahl volunteered in the Marine Corps in August 1944 and had been overseas about a year.

PVT. CHARLES E. GEORGE
Pvt. Charles E. George, 21, son of Mrs. Laura George, died in Italy Dec. 6, 1943, as the result of wounds received in action. Pvt. George was inducted into service Sept. 7, 1942.

PVT. JOHN M. HALE
Pvt. John M. Hale, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ione Hale, Niles Road, was killed in action in New Guinea, June 23, 1944. Hale was inducted Mar. 25, 1943, and was sent overseas in September of the same year.

EARL EUGENE HONE
Earl Eugene Hone, 36, husband of Esther, was killed in the Pacific area July 16, 1944. He was inducted in Oct. 1943.

PVT. GLEN HOSKINS
Pvt. Glen Hoskins, 24, formerly of Mineral Ridge, was killed in action in the ETO Nov. 27, 1944. He was the husband of Lois and son of Mr. and Mrs. Leland Hoskins. Hoskins was inducted in January, 1944.

COMDR. W. G. HURLBERT
Comdr. W. G. Hurlbert Jr., USN, of Warren, died in England following an attack of acute appendicitis in July, 1944. Hurlbert had enlisted in the Navy Jan. 1, 1942 and was sent to England in 1943.

LT. LEE A. JOHNSON
Lt. Lee A. Johnson, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Hetz, Niles-Cortland Road, was killed in action in New Guinea Jan. 10, 1943. Lt. Johnson was a bombardier and member of the 19th Bombardment Squadron.

PFC. JACK H. JONES
Pfc. Jack H. Jones, 23, brother of Earl G. Jones, a Marine ranger, was killed in the Pacific area in July 1944. He enlisted in July, 1942, and was sent overseas the following February.

CPL. WILLIAM E. JONES
Cpl. William E. Jones, 27, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Jones, formerly of Niles, was killed in action in France June 27, 1944. He was inducted in Jan. 1944 and went overseas in April 1944.

PVT. ROBERT M. KERR
Pvt. Robert M. Kerr, 26, grandson of Mrs. Alexander Kerr, died in Italy Jan. 8, 1944, of wounds received in action. Kerr, a paratrooper, had been in the armed forces two and a half years.

SGT. HAROLD M. KIRKPATRICK
1st Sgt. Harold M. Kirkpatrick, 27, formerly of Niles, was killed in France Nov. 10, 1944. He had been overseas six months and was with Patton's Third Army. He was the son of Rev. and Mrs. H. M. Kirkpatrick and husband of Esther.

PFC. EUGENE A. KOENIGSMAN
Pfc. Eugene A. Koenigsmann, 17, grandson of Mrs. Ella M. Clawson, was killed Nov. 16, 1946, in a ground accident at White Sands Proving Grounds, Roswell, N. Mex., during tests of the German V-2 rockets.

CPL. NICK R. KOVACICK
Cpl. Nick R. Kovacick, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Kovacick, was killed in action in Italy Jan. 31, 1944. Kovacick entered the Army in Sept. 1941, and saw action in the Tunisian and Sicilian campaigns.

PFC. STEPHEN KUKO JR.
Pfc. Stephen Kuko Jr., 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Kuko, formerly of Niles, was killed in action in Sicily July 11, 1943. Pfc. Kuko, a paratrooper, entered the service Mar. 24, 1942.

Flight Officer Harold Lisdell Jr., 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Lisdell, Mineral Ridge, was killed Apr. 11, 1945, when two B-17 Flying Fortress collided at the Jackson Army Air Base, Jackson, Miss. Lisdell entered the service Sept. 16, 1943.

PFC. JOHN L. McDERMOTT
Pfc. John L. McDermott, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. John L. McDermott Jr., was electrocuted while serving with the Marine Corps at Camp LeJeune, N. C., in Sept., 1947. McDermott enlisted in the Marines in Sept. 1946.

SGT. EUGENE McGLONE
Sgt. Eugene McGlone, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel McGlone, Mineral Ridge, was killed in action in the ETO Dec. 25, 1944. McGlone entered the service in Mar. 1943 and left for overseas in Nov. 1944.

Pfc. Paul McGlone, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel McGlone, Mineral Ridge, died Aug. 8, 1944, of wounds received in action in France.
