






THIS is a book of peace. Lest you be deceived by the garments of war in which the citizens herein are pictured, remember that these are truly peaceful people. They fought and they labored in ranks only because, one black day in 1941, others warred upon them, seeking to destroy the unity and brotherhood which they, as all Americans, believed was mankind's right.

Millions of Americans were these uniforms in that dark third of a decade between 1941 and 1946. Those pictured here did not win our war, nor could it have been won without them, for if they had not served then no Americans would have served. They are of the whole and represent the whole, but they are only part. Vast armies were composed of such as these, and vast armies who were no uniforms and are not pictured here, stood behind them.

This book of peace is a local book. It is dedicated to a tiny fraction of the surface of our country, a thimbleful of the people of our country. These, fitted by age and health to be the representatives of other thousands, are people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the county of Bucks. Bucks is an easternmost county of the Commonwealth, bordered on two of its sides by the Delaware River. There are thirty townships within its boundaries, and of these thirty we deal here only with parts of four, the townships of East Rockhill and West Rockhill, of Hilltown, of Bedminster.

Who are citizens of these townships? First, they are Americans. They are white, but a few also are black. They are Gentile and Jew. They are Protestant and Catholic. They are poor and rich. Many of them are the so-called Pennsylvania Dutch who found refuge here from persecution in their native Germany and who have contributed mightily over the decades to this land. Some of these are the plain people, dedicated to simplicity of life and the asceticisms of their God-fearing.

There are numbers in these townships who came from Central Europe and from Southern Europe, Poles, Magyars, Italians. In great part those from Central Europe came by way of the heavy industries that lie to the north and south of this county of Bucks, but not in important size within it. Whatever route they may have taken they are today chiefly farmers. Bucks is predominantly a county of farms. They are, as a rule, small farms, rarely large, and rarely producing great wealth.

There are lovely spotless farms among them. There are, too, neglected and ill-appearing farms. But these are extremes, and good or bad, they are all touched and softened by the blanket of greenery that is a great asset of this part of the land. The greenery is that of fields and woods, spread across the undulating, well-watered surface of these ancient and mellowed ridges and valleys.

There are farm youths and men, farm girls, in these pages, many of them. There are also the youth of towns, and there are many of these, for there are many towns. If the farms are modest in size, the towns are also, but they are close to one another and the people of these townships are rarely beyond the sight and never beyond the thought of neighbors and of neighbor towns.

Nor is there any sharp lines between the farms and the town in our region. The farmers till the soil, but they know the town and often they find work to do in town when the farm work rests. There are industries where the town and the farm meet. There are textile mills whose spinning machines are tended by workers from both town and farm. There are other fabricators and manufacturers and processors. There are no great giants among them. They are rather of modest and intimate size. So, too, are the multifold service shops in our community, the stores and the trade establishments.

Perkasie is the largest town in this area. It is a town with roots embedded in the distant past and stock from that past still showing. All our towns are like this. They are overlaid with a briskness and a sprinkling of newness that makes them kin to two worlds. They are exactly what one would expect to find in eastern Pennsylvania. There is a great deal of red brick in their buildings, and pointed field stone, both materials and styles handed down from colonial days. There is also the frame and modern brick of modern times in these towns and on these farms, just as horses are seen on one farm and the newest of machinery on another.

Mostly the industries and the service shops of our townships are home-owned and home-controlled, but no prohibition is laid on outsiders who have placed branches of their enterprises among us and compete with the home people in healthy America striving for success through service. We tend to favor our neighbors where the scales are even, but we take no dangerously narrow view either one way or another.

We tend, also, to be occupied in our social living with the residents of our immediate townships, but here, too, no confining walls are set up. Our life centers are here, but there is a wholesome co-mingling with other communities and other people. There is a brisk flow between the population clusters within our townships. But people from all of these places, sometimes a few, sometimes more, spend their working hours in the metropolitan areas which are convenient to us.


Many of us travel daily to Philadelphia, the closest great city to our townships. Some also commute to the industrial basin of Allentown and Bethlehem, some as far as New York. By this means the bloodstream of our community life flows over a wider range and both gives and receives benefits beyond our immediate horizons.


But always there is a time of day, or a time of week, when those who move out on their daily tasks return home. This is home. The parts of these four townships with which we are concerned here are home. Perkasie, Blooming Glen, and Silverdale, Bedminster, Kellers Church, Keelersville, Hagersville and Rockhill are home. These and all the farms and country places between are home.

This book is dedicated to the home for which the men and women within these pages who fought and to which they returned. It is even more deeply dedicated to those who did not return among us, but are still and always will be here at home.

This is a book of peace. It comes from the townships of East Rockhill, West Rockhill, Bedminster and Hilltown, in the county of Bucks, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. These are peaceful people. Their home is part of America.

Community Service Group

PERKASIE — SILVERDALE — BLOOMING GLEN — HAGERSVILLE

This association was known by the name of COMMUNITY SERVICE GROUP, and had for its object and purpose to give aid and assistance to all members (male or female) in the armed forces of the United States, and particularly by the accumulation of a fund by the contribution of citizens of the community served in order to carry out the purposes of the association.

I. OFFICERS. The affairs of the group were managed by an executive committee consisting of twenty-two members. All officers of the group were members of the executive committee. The officers consisted of: a president, a vice-president, secretary, assistant secretary, and a treasurer. There also was a correspondent.

II. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE approved all expenditures, and had the sole authority to conduct and carry on all business of the organization, employ such agents or servants as might be necessary, provide the books, materials or appliances requisite for the purpose and management of the group, and had the sole authority to act in all matters in or on behalf of the group.

V. MEETINGS. Meetings were held on the second Sunday of each month.

VI. In addition to the powers granted to the officers and members of the executive committee they also had the absolute right, power and authority to determine the persons (whether male or female) were entitled to the benefits of this organization, and their judgment in that respect was final.

The success of the organization—actively engaged from June, 1942, until February, 1946, was only possible because the folks of the community were generous in their voluntary contributions.

We record with modest pride the names and faces of the Youth of our Community, who served their God and their Country in the hour of need. Most of them have returned and taken their places in the hearts and homes of their loved ones.

Our thoughts will ever linger with those who made the supreme sacrifice on foreign soil, on sea, and on their homeland. They now rest from their labors. They saw the world's great anguish and wrong, and dared to speak, what e'er the cost.

We best honor them as we strive for righteousness and justice for all peoples. We must tread the path they trod, which is the way of love, and service, and sacrifice.
