Keesling had two Focke-Wulf 109's to his personal credit, one "kill" over Paris, and a second over Oschersleben, Germany, blowing it up about 300 yards from his plane. With the few planes they had left they were still operating as an air squadron when Bataan was lost. The survivors of the squadron were taken prisoners at Mariveles April 10, 1942. And then came the tragic "Death March of Bataan." For nine terrible days the several thousand prisoners were unmercifully tortured under a broiling sun in this forced march, those unable to keep up being brutally beaten, Sgt. King explained, later.

"If a prisoner collapsed the Japs would kick him or beat him with rifles or clubs," he said. "If he didn't get up and go on he would either be shot or bayoneted to death. Corpses were left lying along the road as a symbol. I saw a great number of beheaded Filipinos along the road and some American soldiers. However most of the men died in the night stops. They would drag along during the day but when they relaxed at night they would die."

The survivors of the terrible hike were loaded onto railroad cars at San Fernando, 100 packed in little narrow-gauge cars, in which many died. They were taken by railroad to the prison camp at Cabantuan. Here they were held prisoners for nearly three years.

Half starved, and dying at the rate of over fifty per day, they remained prisoners in this camp for 32 months until on the evening of Jan. 31, 1945 a force of American Rangers reached the camp, drove off the Japs and freed the survivors.

Sgt. King had been in the army nearly 12 years, first enlisting in the regular

army, infantry, Jan. 1932. He served three years in Hawaii, and went to the Philippines in 1936. Son of N. W. King, 518 East 7th.
