



*Warren R. Schmitt, Sgt., 285th Field artillery of Hutchinson, is a survivor of the brutal massacre near Malmedy, Belgium, Dec. 17, 1944. A convoy of Battery B, 285th F.A. Obs. Bn. was moving on the road leading to St. Vith about 3 miles south of Malmedy, when enemy riflemen. when enemy riflemen, mortars hidden in the

surrounding woods suddenly opened fire. The men jumped off the vehicles and took cover in ditches lining both sides of the road. Several minutes later they were flushed out of their hiding places by flushed out of their hiding places by Tiger tanks from a German armored column, spraying machine gun fire. Other tanks quickly knocked out 24 American trucks and vehicles. The American soldiers, armed only with small weapons, were rounded up and taken prisoner.

Sgt. Schmitt had jumped into a ditch when his battery mates leaped from the vehicles. He concealed himself by sub-

vehicles. He concealed himself by sub-merging in water in the ditch, and cover-ing himself with grass and mud, and thus

avoiding capture.

As he lay there he could see and hear what was going on. The prisoners were lined up along the road when a German command car drove up. The Nazi officer in the car stood up, took deliberate aim with a pistol at an American medical officer in the front rank of prisoners and shot him dead. He fired again, and an-

other officer dropped.

Immediately two tanks at the end of the field opened up with machine guns on the defenseless prisoners, some of them noncombatant medical corpsmen, with Red Crosses marked on their helmets. The prisoners, standing with hands raised over their heads were mowed down by the machine gunners. The unwounded dropped to the ground along with those who were shot. Flat on their stomachs with their faces pushed into the snow and mud they

faces pushed into the snow and mud they were raked by machine gun and small arms fire from a column of tanks moving along the road 25 yards away. Of approximately 150 American prisoners rounded up as human targets, 107 were killed outright and nearly all the others were badly wounded. Only 25 survived. The Nazi guards walked among the American soldiers, shooting at those appearing still to be alive, shooting them as they lay groaning in agony. They kicked them in the faces to see if they were really dead or just faking. Those who moved were shot through the head. One American medical officer got up to bandage the wounds of a badly wounded man of his own medical unit. The Nazi gunmen permitted him to finish the work, and then calmly shot both the officer and and then calmly shot both the officer and his patient.

An hour after the armored column had

left, several of the survivors, all badly wounded, succeeded in reaching American lines. Sgt. Schmitt, one of the few to escape, lay hidden in the stream "playing dead" during this time. The water was icy cold and he became so numb he could

"I lay in the stream approximately two hours," he said. "For about an hour after they first started firing into the group of prisoners all of the tanks that passed fired into them. Forty half-tracks that passed fired also. I was so numb after lying there for about two hours I couldn't move my legs, but by crawling and dragging myself I made my way to some woods. I rubbed my legs to get back circulation and then, by means of my compass, found my way back to the road, where I was found and taken to a first aid station." aid station."

major, was one of 32 Americans with the OSS, who with British, French, Dutch and Belgian officers made up a group known as the "Jedburghs," a secret international

as the "Jedburghs," a secret international unit that parachuted into France behind enemy lines to train and lead resistance forces of the French underground.

In July 1944 a force of 40,000 Germans was holding the city of Brest, an important seaport of France. Maj. Summers, a radio operator, of his "Cloak and Dagger" radio operator, of his "Cloak and Dagger" secret squadron, and a French interpreter, crouched inside 4½ foot wine kegs on a truck, and were driven by a French trucker, a member of the French resistance force, inside the German garrison. The Frenchman was hauling a load of wine to the German officers, the kegs in which the three members of the secret force were concealed being among the kegs of wine

kegs of wine.
Entering the fortified city, the wine truck had a flat tire, and German soldiers truck had a flat tire, and German soldiers helped repair it. Maj. Summers and his two companions were hidden in the wine kegs for 3½ hours. They had come 30 miles behind the German lines on this mission. In Brest Maj. Summers organized the French of the city into a resistance force of 2,500 men behind the German lines man lines.

Maj. Summers also volunteered for a dangerous night reconnaissance trip 30 miles behind enemy lines on Aug. 12, 1944, negotiating the surrender of 280 Germans in the garrison at St. Pabu. Later he led a small task force from the Sixth Rangers a small task force from the Sixth Rangers battalion against Point de Corsen. Summers and the commander of the Sixth Rangers commandeered a German staff car, and in it circled the German position, coming up to the garrison at Lochrist, and demanded its surrender. Although they were miles behind their lines, the Nazis thought they were surrounded and surrendered. The prisoners included the former commanding officer of the German battleship Graf Spee, and his whole staff.

battleship Graf Spee, and his whole staff. In Feb. 1945 Col. Summers was sent to the China-Burma-India theater to command a group of special teams operating against the enemy lines of communication in southern China, back of the Jap lines. He parachuted in behind the enemy lines in Indo-China, blowing up Jap installations, and making raids in southeast China. On one raid, Col. Summers was wounded by a Jap patrol. He was sta-tioned in that theater at the OSS head-quarters in Chihkiang, China.

Col. Summers was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross "for extraordinary heroism as organizer and director of French resistance forces," the Bronze Star medal, and the French Croix de Guerre, with Palm, presented by the French government. ernment.

He had gone overseas Sept. 1942 to Hickam Field, Hawaii. Later moved with his squadron to Guadalcanal where he was based for the next year, taking part in the campaigns of Guadalcanal, Upper Solomons, Bismarck Archipelago and Central Pacific operations.

On Dec. 30, 1943, he was leading his group of more than 20 B-24 bombers, with fighter escort, away from the target area over Rabaul, flying back to Munda. Col. Unruh was heading the group in his "Pretty Prairie Special," his bomber being named after his home town in Reno County. About 12:30 p.m. Jap Zeros swarmed up in attack. The "Pretty Prairie Special," leading the group, was shot down, crashing into the sea, ablaze. The eleven members of the crew bailed out above the southeast coast of New Ireland, coming down in the ocean, scattered from a quarter of a mile to a mile off shore. As they tried to reach land the Japs flew over, strafing them with machine guns.

Natives in outrigger dugouts went out after the enemy had left and brought to shore nine of the crew members. Among them was Col. Unruh.

The natives gave the Americans taro roots to eat, and one of their thatched huts to sleep in. The next day they saw a B-24 searching for them. They held up a parachute to attract attention and the crew in the plane spotted them and dropped food and first aid supplies. That night, as the airmen lay on bamboo bunks in the hut, automatic rifles opened fire on them from the darkness. The Americans who escaped the volley dashed from the hut in the darkness into the jungle.

As Col. Unruh fled from the hut he

As Col. Unruh fled from the hut he bumped into another American, Lt. Robert Fessenger, co-pilot of the "Pretty Prairie Special." For the next two weeks they hid in the jungle by day, and tried to make their way northward at night, away from both the Japs and the natives.

"While we lay concealed we could see a seaplane with a fighter escort searching vainly for us, and finally fly away," said Col. Unruh. "It was a heart-breaking experience. For two weeks we hid in the jungle. Hunger and thirst were always with us. Green cocoanuts provided milk to drink when we could find them. A wad of gum that Fessenger had was traded back and forth to prevent thirst. All the food I had in fifteen days was two cocoanuts, 12 snails and a hermit crab."

The natives finally located the fugitives, returned them to the village and turned them over to the Japanese. Col. Unruh was kept in solitary confinement by the Japs for over a month, until Feb. 17, when he was taken to Tokyo. For the next 1½ years he was a prisoner in Japan, for one year at Camp Zentsuji, on Shikoku, and the rest of the time at Camp Hokuroshi, on Honshu.

A meal consisted of a cup of rice for each prisoner. The prisoners added to that whatever they could find, watercress, lily pods or anything else they ran across along the roadside, boiling the accumulation into soup. Working in the fields, if they found any creature, even a snake or snail, they would catch it and roast it over a fire made of the brush they were clearing away.

"It didn't make any difference what it was, you'd eat it, just anything to eat," the colonel explained. "I lost fifty pounds while a prisoner. We became so weak it was an effort to move. When we awakened one morning one of the men, who had gone down to a skeleton weighing 100 pounds, was dead. He had starved to death. It was a simple case of malnutrition. Actually, without the Red Cross supplies, none of us would have survived." During the nearly two years in which

During the nearly two years in which Col, Unruh was a prisoner in Japan, his parents and wife, the latter a former Castleton school teacher, did not know whether he was living or dead. The last word received from him was a letter written Dec. 27, 1943, only three days before he left on the New Britain raid in which

he was shot down. After that nothing was known except that he was missing in action until a year later, Dec. 21, 1944, when it was officially announced he was alive, but a prisoner of war.

Col. Unruh was shot down before, on March 20, 1943, while on a mission over Kahili, landing in the water, near the Russell islands. He was wounded in the right leg, but was rescued. Col. Unruh was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and four Oak Leaf clusters, Silver Star medal, Air medal, Silver Oak Leaf cluster and Legion of Merit award. The latter honor was conferred because of his designing an original nose-turret installation in B-24 airplanes, which proved so successful that the Japs were forced to abandon head-on attacks against Liberators.

When Col. Unruh flew a plane to Hawaij to have the improvements made on it, his commanding officer insisted that he name the plane the "Pretty Prairie Special," and that name and the Kansas sunflower were painted on the side of the plane. Sent on a special mission to Dayton, Ohio, later that month, the colonel flew his bomber, at the request of the crew, over his home town, the Liberator passing low over the town, giving the home folks a thrill. Within a few weeks the "Pretty Prairie Special" was back on the job blasting Jap installations at Kahili and other points.

Col. Unruh has been in the Army Air Force since June, 1932, about 15 years. Since return from Japan, Sept. 1945, he spent several months in army hospitals, recuperating. Returned to his home farm near Pretty Prairie, Aug. 1946, but was recalled to active duty at Wright Field, Okio New 1946, and later appointed in

recalled to active duty at Wright Field, Ohio, Nov. 1946, and later appointed instructor at the army air field at Ft. Worth, Tex., and in Jan. 1947 appointed T-3 deputy at maintenance and supply depot, Hill Field, Ogden, Utah. Son of Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Unruh, Pretty Prairie.

Webster related, after the war was over, when what had been a highly guarded secret, could be told. "About 70 American four-engined bombers were destroyed on the ground. Fliers and ground crews alike were housed in tents and the only shelters were slift trenches. and the only shelters were slit trenches.
"The Nazi bombers destroyed the anti-

The Nazi bombers destroyed the anti-aircraft batteries, the only protection the base had, then bombed and strafed the tents and planes at will for two hours. It was one of the most serious losses in aircraft suffered by U. S. forces during the war."

Sgt. Webster escaped injury and death that tragic night in Russia. He went through more than three years of service in the army air force in America, England and Russia, without injury. And then six months after his discharge from the service he met death in a bighypay. the service, he met death in a highway traffic accident in his home town. On the night of April 11, 1946, he was

fatally injured in an automobile crash at the east edge of Hutchinson, on the Fourth street road. He died three days

The chief shipfitter of the Yorktown, a Russian, sang the tune to Petty Officer Weed. who copied the melody and produced the score which was rushed to the battleship Missouri. and turned over to the band on the flagship, which played the Russian national anthem with gusto at the ceremonial the next day, much to the delight of Gen. MacArthur, Weed was the delight of Gen. MacArthur. Weed was a music teacher in Langdon high school and violin instructor in Hutchinson.



About midnight March 8 the sub-chaser made contact with an enemy ship just off Granville, and got within firing range only to discover two more enemy E-boats, flak barges behind the rocks along shore. The three barges, each with eight artillery turrets, surrounded the sub-chaser, trapping it. The first hit went through the PC-564's bridge and knocked out the steering.

steering.

A direct hit was scored on the gun served by Wray, blowing him onto the deck, badly wounded and unconscious. When order to abandon ship was given he was lowered into a life raft. Fourteen of the crew were killed and 14 taken prisoners. Others, wounded, left on the deck were found on the wrecked ship on the rocks next morning by Allies. Wray and the other prisoners were taken to a prison on Jersey island where they were held for over two months, nearly starved, fed only cabbage soup and fragments of fed only cabbage soup and fragments of dog and cat meat. After German sur-render, and their liberation, they found the Germans had large stores of food on the island.

After liberation by the British troops May 10, 1945. Wray was taken to France on a tugboat, and then returned to the USA, June 1945. He remained under treatment at the naval hospital at Great Lakes, Ill., until his discharge, Sept. 19, 1945, after almost exactly three years of naval service.
