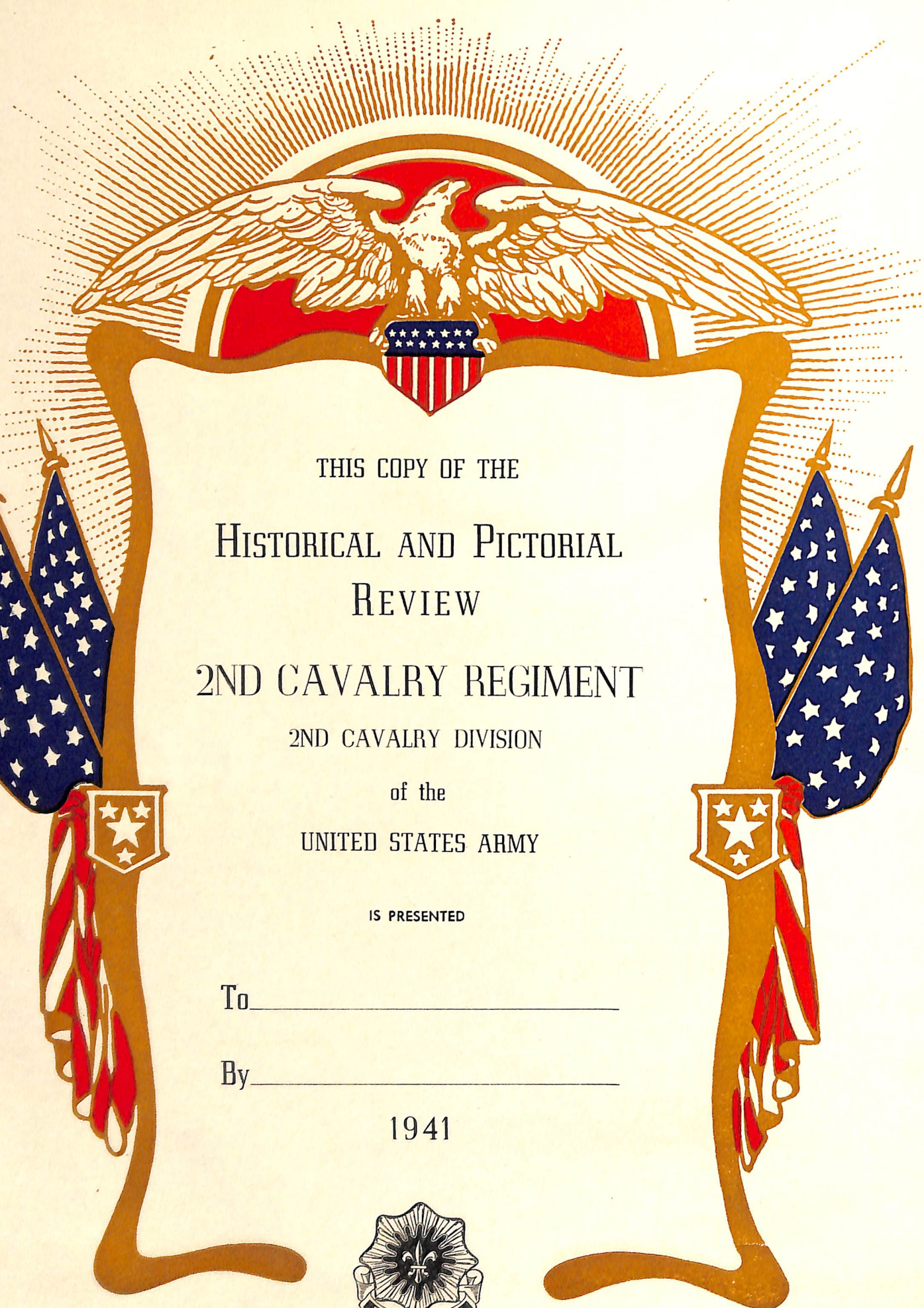

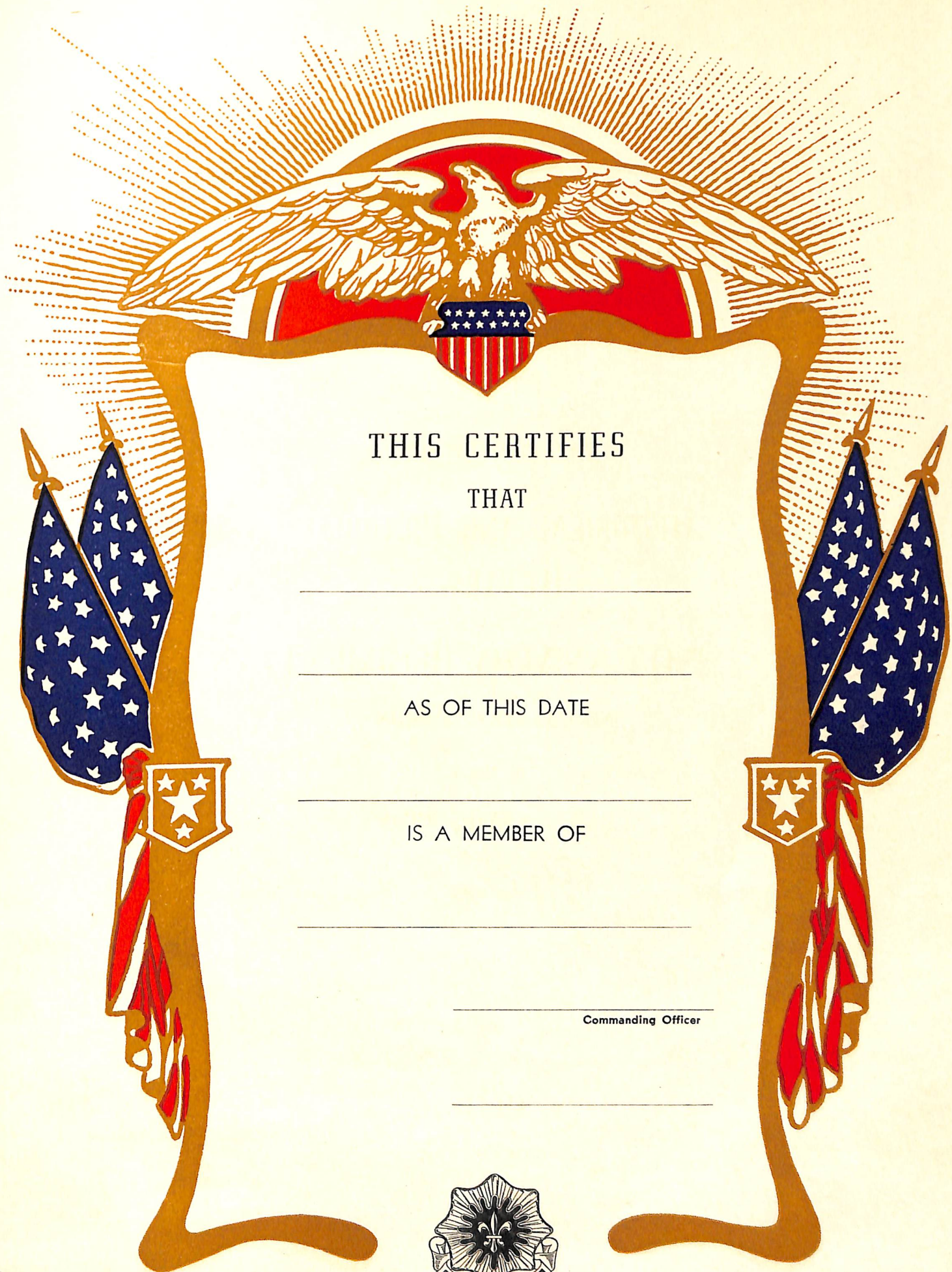


TO: The Officers and Enlisted Men of the Second Cavalry Division:

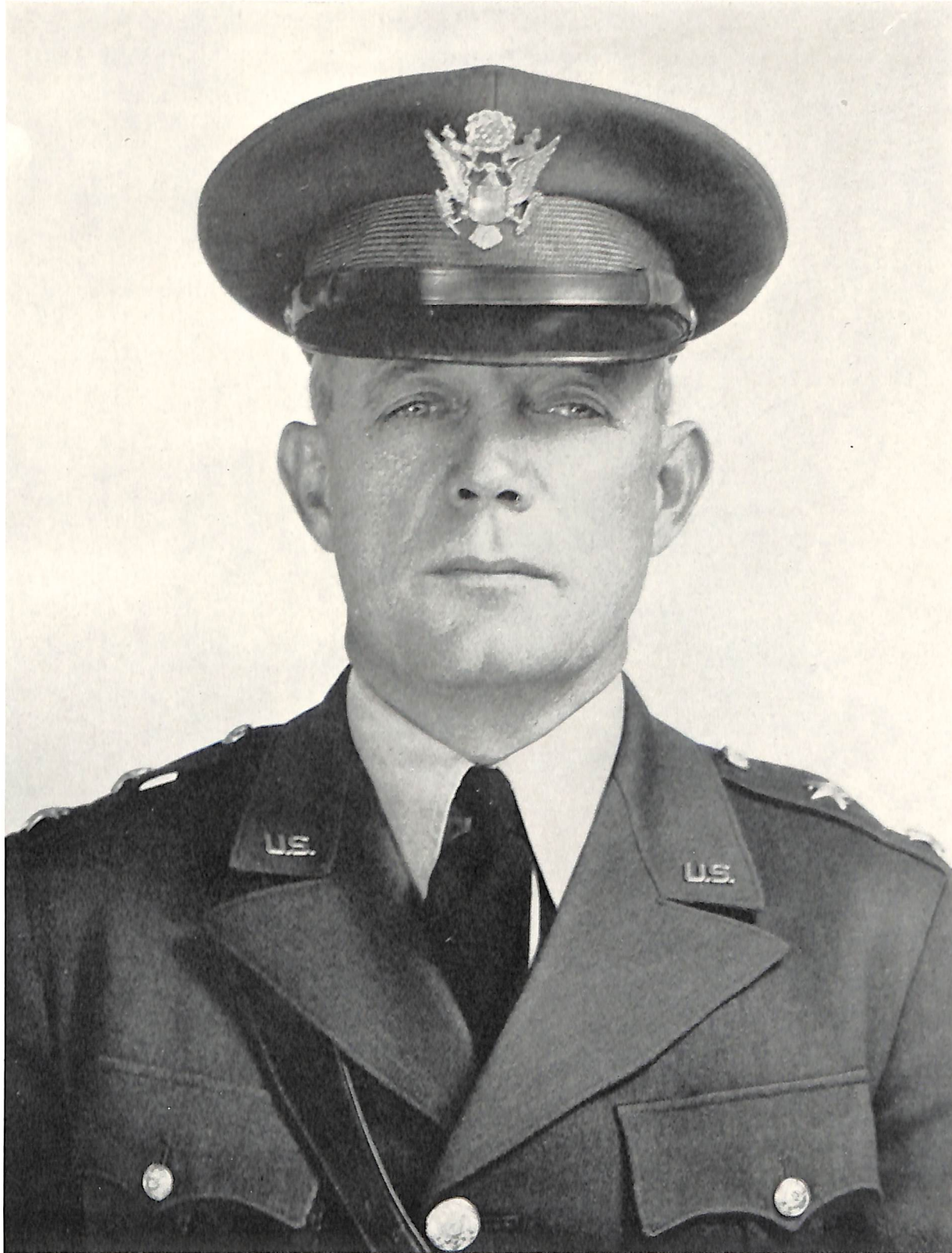
The Second Cavalry Division is young, still in the process of becoming a well-knit military organization.

Commanding Second Cavalry Division

Major General John Millikin, Commanding General of the Second Cavalry Division, was born on January 7, 1888, at Danville, Indiana, and was graduated from the United States Military Academy in the class of 1910. Prior to the World War he served with various Cavalry units in the United States and Hawaii.

General Millikin joined the American Expeditionary Force in France in February, 1918, serving as Executive Officer of the Army General Staff College at Langres, France. For this service he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal. On his return to the United States in June, 1919, General Millikin served as a

member of the War Department General Staff and also as aide to the Secretary of War and to the Chief of Staff. Subsequently, he was on duty as Assistant Chief of Staff of the Hawaiian Division, as a member of the faculty of the Cavalry School, and as Commanding Officer of the Third Cavalry at Fort Myer, Virginia, and of the Sixth Cavalry at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia. Just prior to assuming command of the Second Cavalry Division, he was on duty with the First Cavalry Division.

General Millikin is a graduate of the Cavalry School, the Army War College, and a distinguished graduate of the Command and General Staff School.



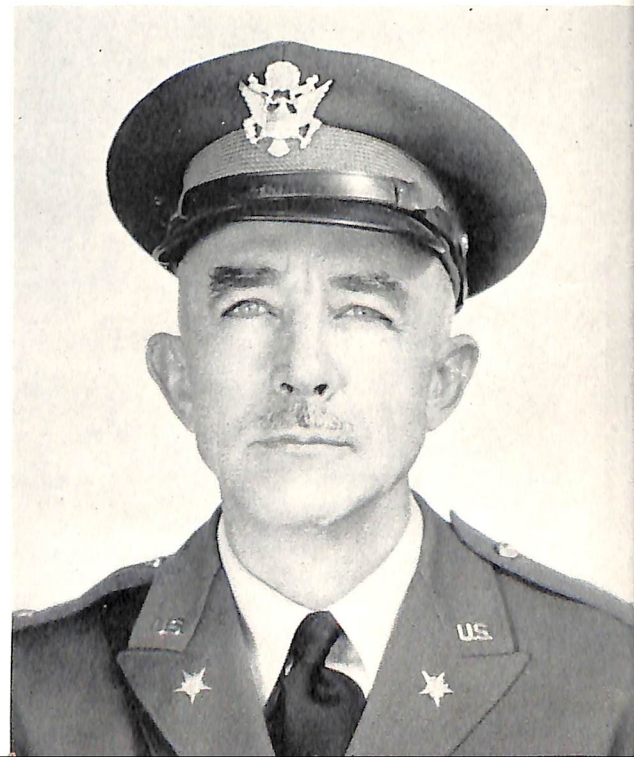
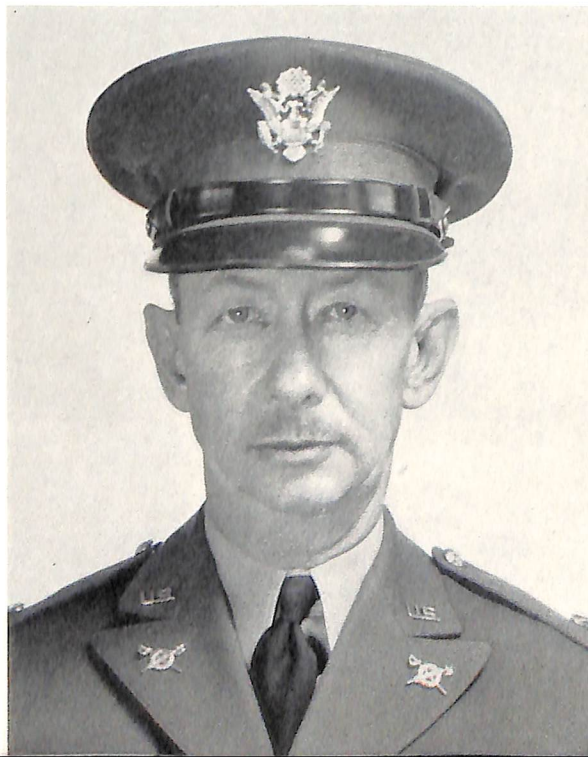
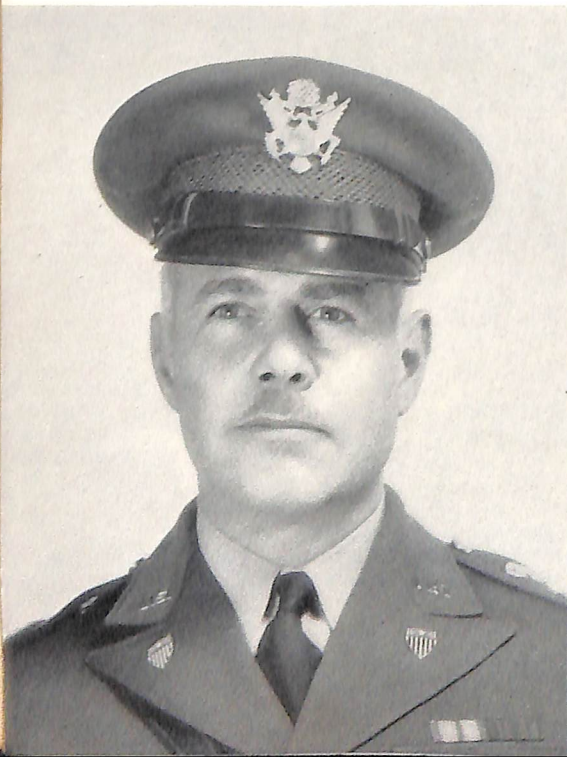

SECOND CAVALRY DIVISION



HISTORY OF THE SECOND CAVALRY DIVISION

Composed of a group of the oldest cavalry regiments in the United States Army, the Second Cavalry Division, stationed at Camp Funston, Fort Riley, Kansas, came into being on April 1, 1941.

The earliest days of the newly created Division were under the command of Brigadier General Terry de la M. Allen, Commanding General of the Third Cavalry Brigade. Major General John Millikin assumed command on June 12, 1941. Building on the fine groundwork of General Allen, General Millikin lost no time in bringing the Brigade into Military order.

The Division is proud to a man that within three weeks of General Millikin's arrival the Second Cavalry Division made its bow to the public in its first formal review. The personnel of the Division consisted of 75 per cent Selectees, the majority of them riding unseasoned mounts.

EARLY DAYS

Officers of the Division came from all sections of the Nation and were drawn from the Reserve Corps and the National Guard. Almost every Reserve Officers' Training Corps offering training in cavalry is represented in the Division, with the largest group of officers coming from the 107th Cavalry (horse-mechanized) now stationed at Camp Forrest, Tennessee. Among the enlisted men, cadres were formed from three-year enlistments before the selectees arrived. New troops were organized within the regiments, as in brigades. Divisional units, also received men for their cadres from the regiments.

Immediately after the first of the year Selective Service Trainees were received from induction centers, each in possession of varying amounts of equipment and clothing. The majority of these Trainees came from Kansas, Iowa, Missouri and Arkansas, a great many of whom

were from farms and who were extremely pleased with the idea of service in the horse cavalry. The majority of these men had expected to meet hard-boiled Cavalry sergeants when their service began but were pleased when they were greeted by a warm meal and a cheerful welcome.

Trainees were launched immediately upon the intensive 13 weeks' training program and met this new rigorous life with high spirits and undaunted courage. From week to week their personal appearance as soldiers and their outlook on their training as Cavalrymen improved.

This training period was designed to build raw material into competent horsemen skilled in the use of arms. The early weeks emphasized equitation, physical exercises and dismounted drill. As the program advanced, the men were instructed in map reading and dismounted combat tactics while mounted drill occupied an increasing amount of training periods. Much time was devoted to "dry" shooting and a nomenclature of the rifle, pistol and machine gun. Extra weeks of instruction were given in courses which the men found difficult to master.

"HARD" TRAINING

When range-scouring began the intensive effort of the troopers was evident, with the result that many units qualified 90 per cent or more of their men as marksmen.

Remounts began arriving about seven weeks after the men. The first group of horses was a shipment of 500 from Fort Robinson and Fort Reno. The total number of remounts on April 15, reached almost 1,200 for each regiment; the total for the Division approximated 6,000. Now began a series of introductions that could hardly be called "social." Men who had seldom ridden and horses that had never been ridden met in-

formally with surprising results. There was enough minor disaster to provide amusing breaks in routine but at the end of the 10th week of training all selectees were riding regularly assigned mounts, and with very few exceptions, fired a modified mounted pistol course.

SECOND CAVALRY REGIMENT

The Second Cavalry Division is made up chiefly of four of the most historic mounted regiments in military history. The Second Cavalry is the oldest horse regiment in service. Organized in 1836 to fight the Seminole Indians in Florida, this regiment was first known as the Second Dragoons and saw service in the Civil War when it battled from Bull Run to Cedar Creek. It served in the Spanish-American War and was the only mounted regiment of the American Army to reach the front in the war with Germany. Following World War service it returned to Fort Riley, its home station.

14TH CAVALRY REGIMENT

The 14th Cavalry built an enviable history in the Philippine Islands where it served from 1903 to 1905. It participated in 22 major engagements in the Islands. During the World War the 14th Cavalry served well on the Mexican Border and only the Armistice prevented the Regiment from completing plans for overseas service.

NINTH CAVALRY REGIMENT

The Ninth Cavalry Regiment was organized in New Orleans in July, 1886, as one of the first Colored Cavalry Regiments in the United States Service. It was active in the Spanish-American War where it participated in the battle for San Juan Hill, and again distinguished itself on the Mexican Border in 1915. Throughout the World War the Ninth Cavalry served in the Philippine Islands.

10TH CAVALRY REGIMENT

The 10th Cavalry also came into being in July, 1886, at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. It served well in the Middle-West Indian wars. It was present at the Battle of San Juan Hill in the Spanish-American War, and then returned to internal Indian strife. The Regiment distinguished itself in the Punitive Expedition into Mexico and then served on the Mexican Border throughout the World War.

DIVISION ARTILLERY

The Division Artillery includes the Third Field Artillery which was already at Fort Riley and the 16th Field Artillery which was transferred from Fort Myer, Virginia.

SPECIAL UNITS

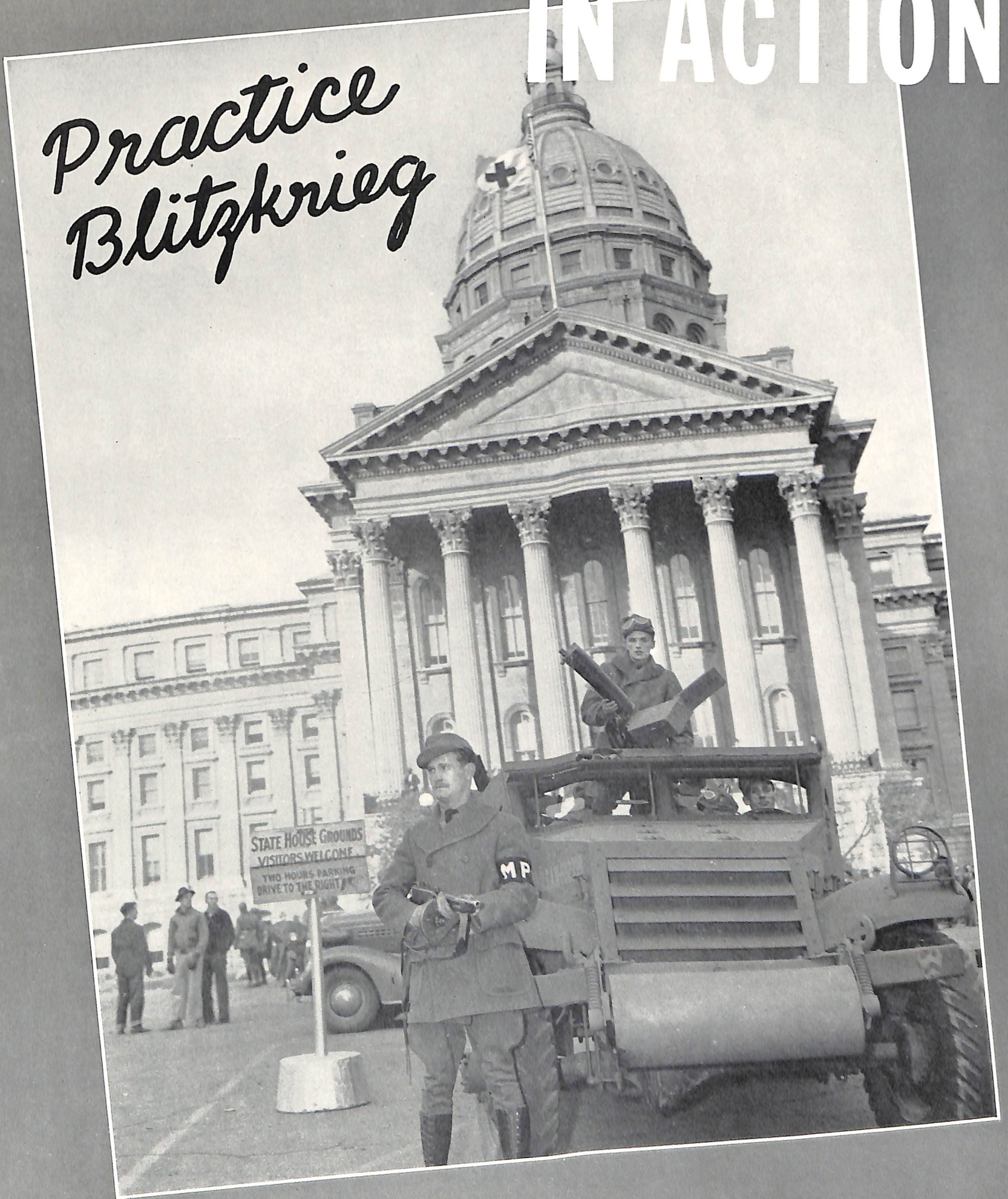
The special units of the Division includes: Headquarters Troop, Reconnaissance Troop, Ninth Engineer Squadron, 17th Quartermaster Squadron, 2nd Medical Squadron, the 24th Ordnance Company and Antitank Troop and the attached First Observation Squadron.

CAMP FUNSTON

The entire Division is stationed at Camp Funston, with the exception of one or two units whose quarters are at the adjacent Fort Riley. Camp Funston came first into prominence during World War I, when it housed 41,000 men under General Leonard Wood. At the beginning of the National Defense Program this once active camp had fallen back into its original state called Funston's Pastures. With the beginning of the Defense Program work was launched in such great haste that buildings were begun at the rate of one every 45 minutes and every 39 minutes saw a structure completed. This building program continued until Camp Funston stood as one of the most comfortable, sanitary and adequate Army Posts in the Nation.

LIGHTNING ATTACK

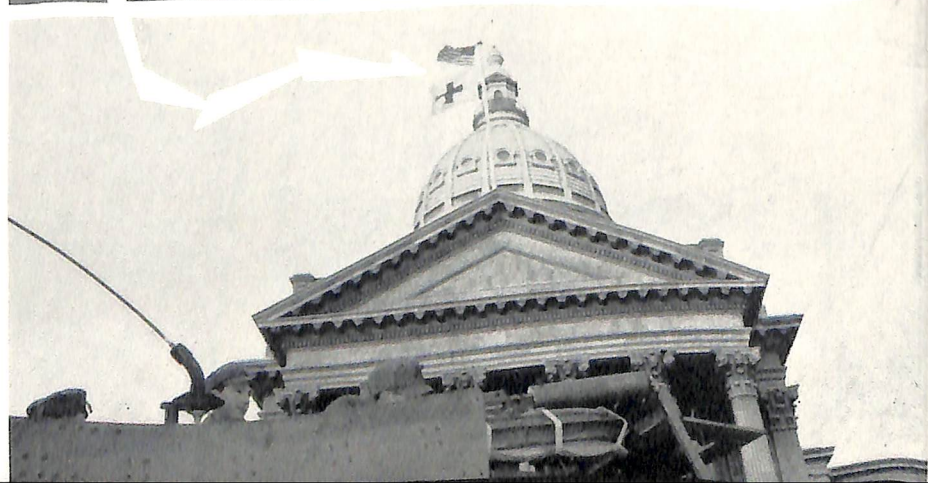


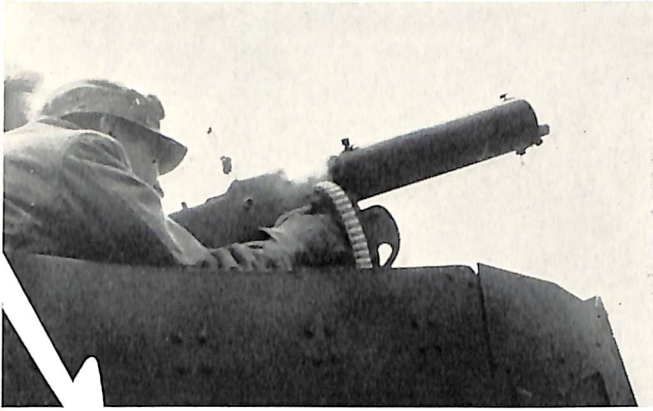
The attack came with all suddenness and swiftness, and even before the defenders could gather their arms Topeka was overrun with, and completely in the hands of the Second Cavalry Division.

The reconnaissance plane of the First Observation Squadron, which flew over the State Building (top), was the only indication that an attack was imminent.

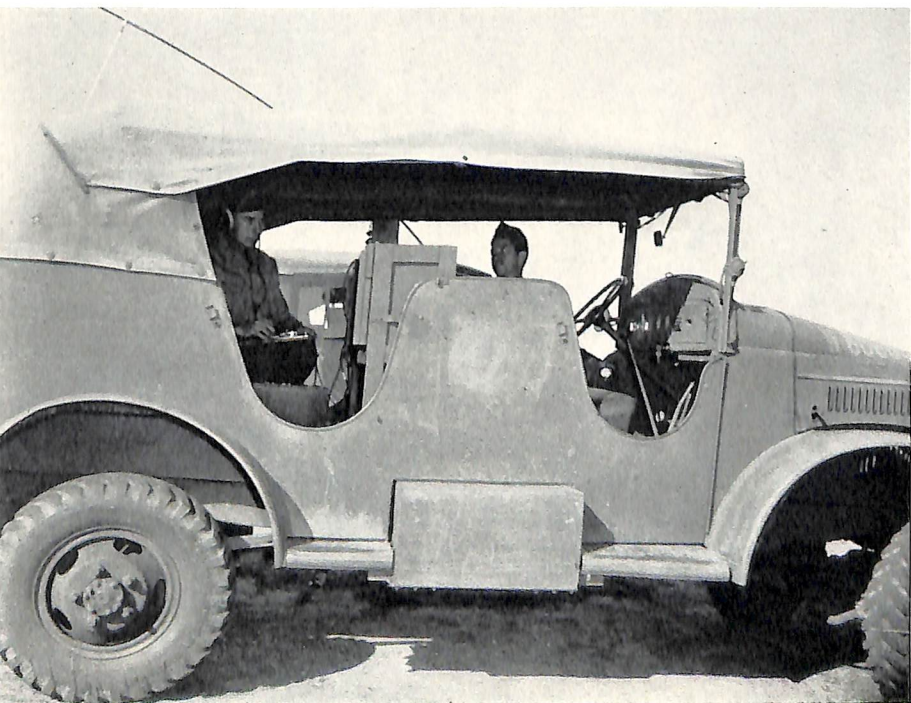
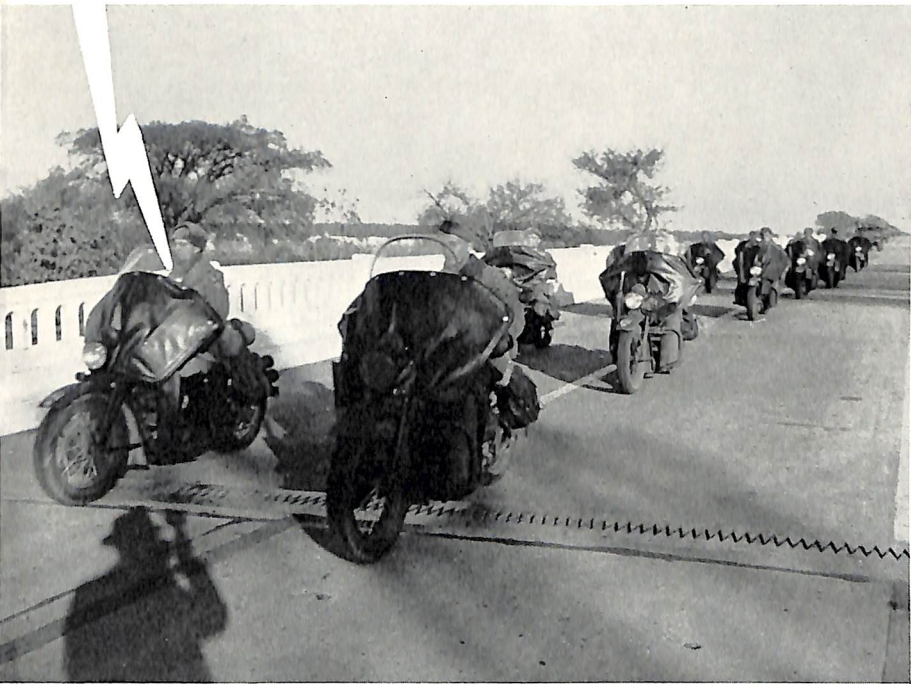

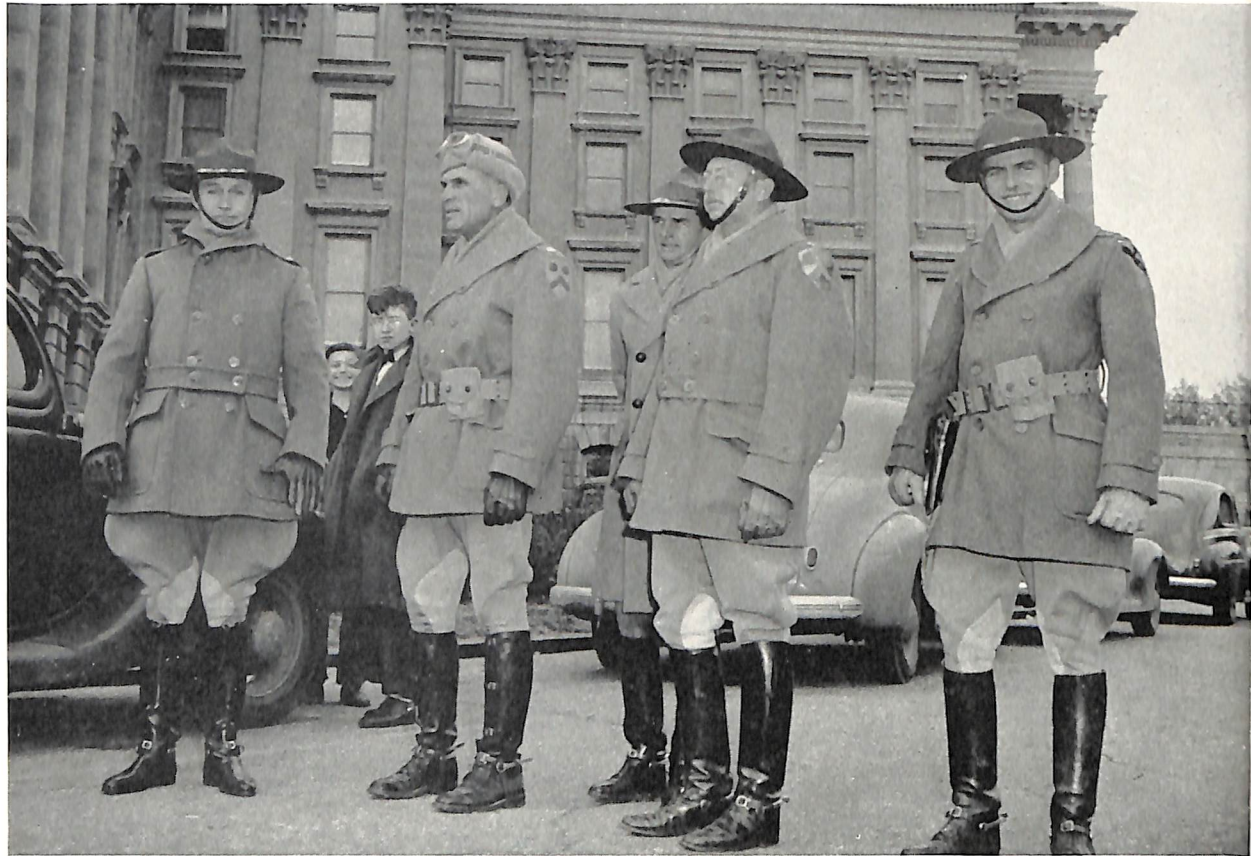
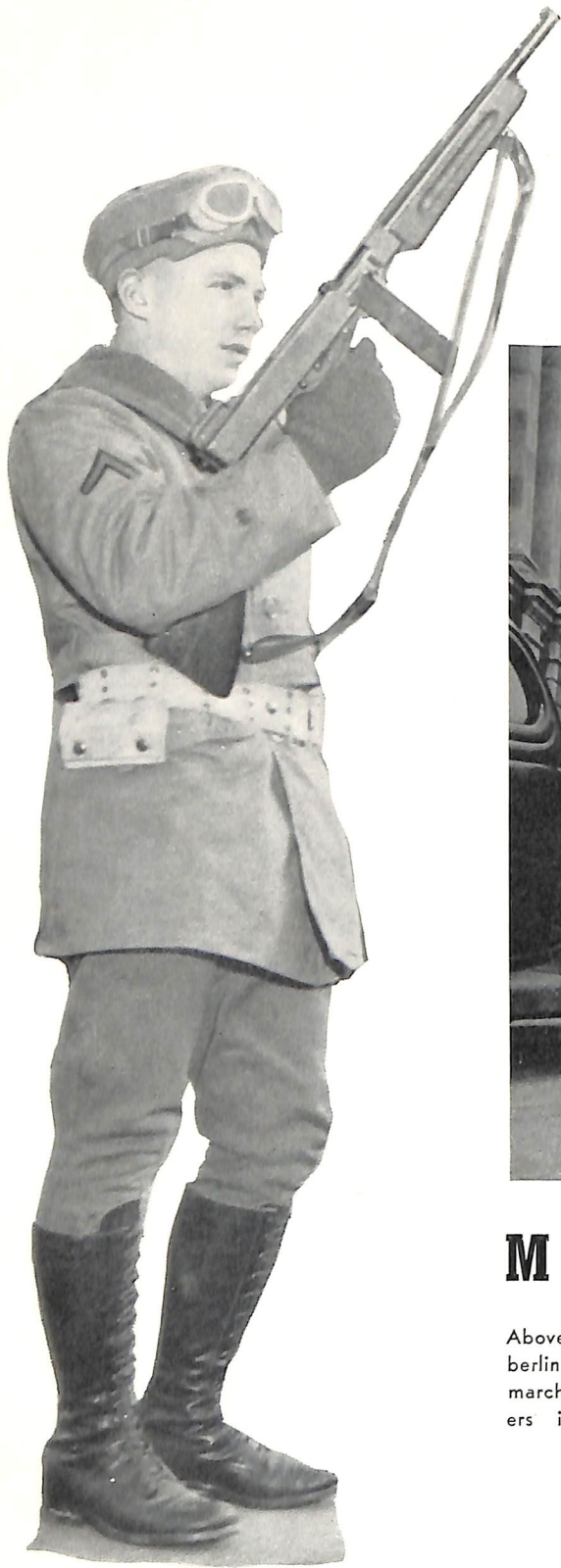

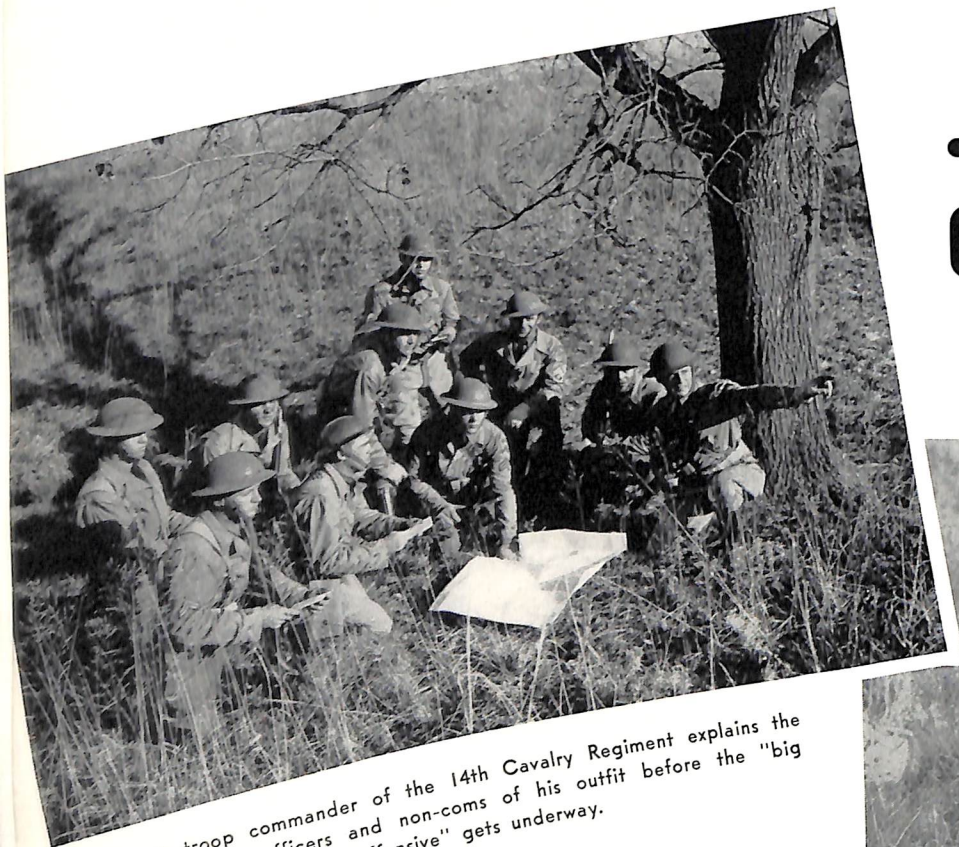

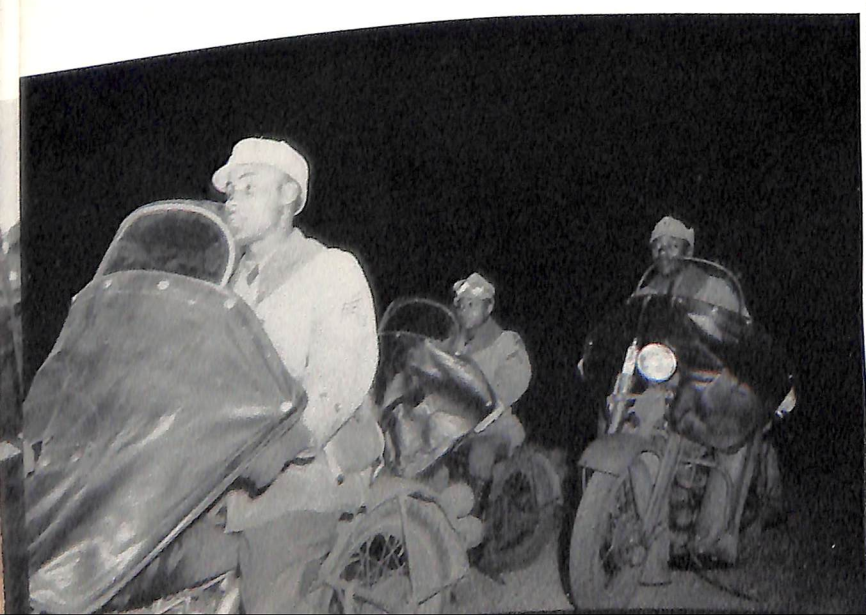

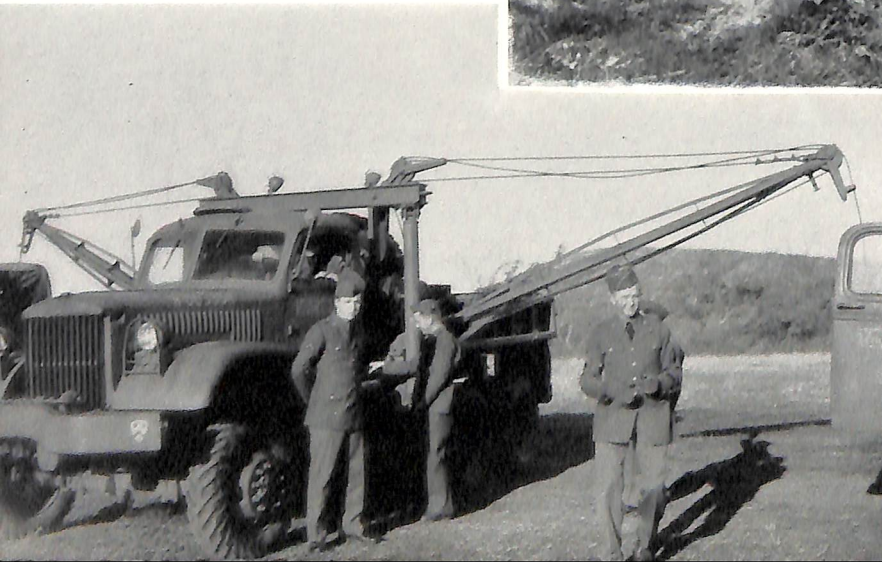

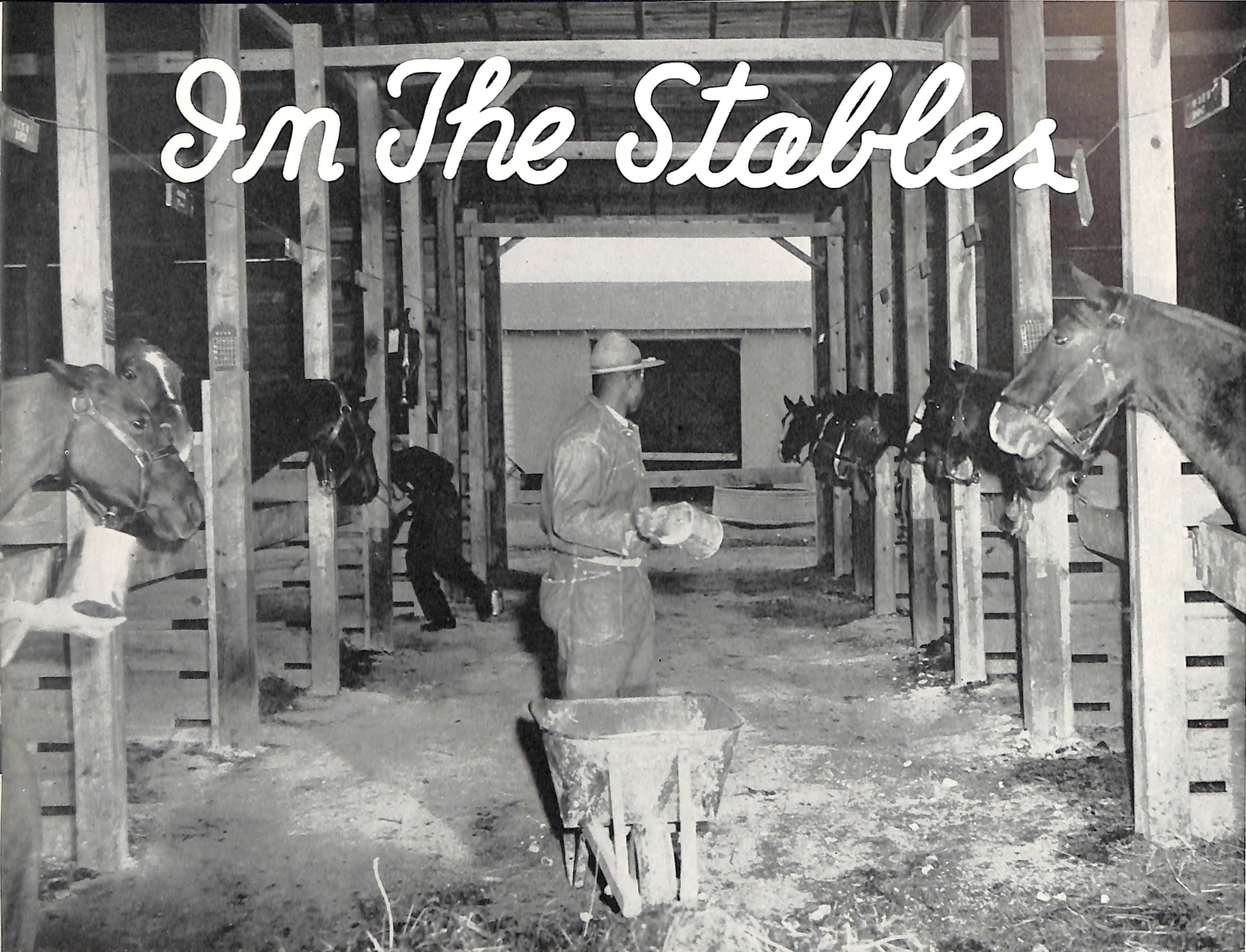

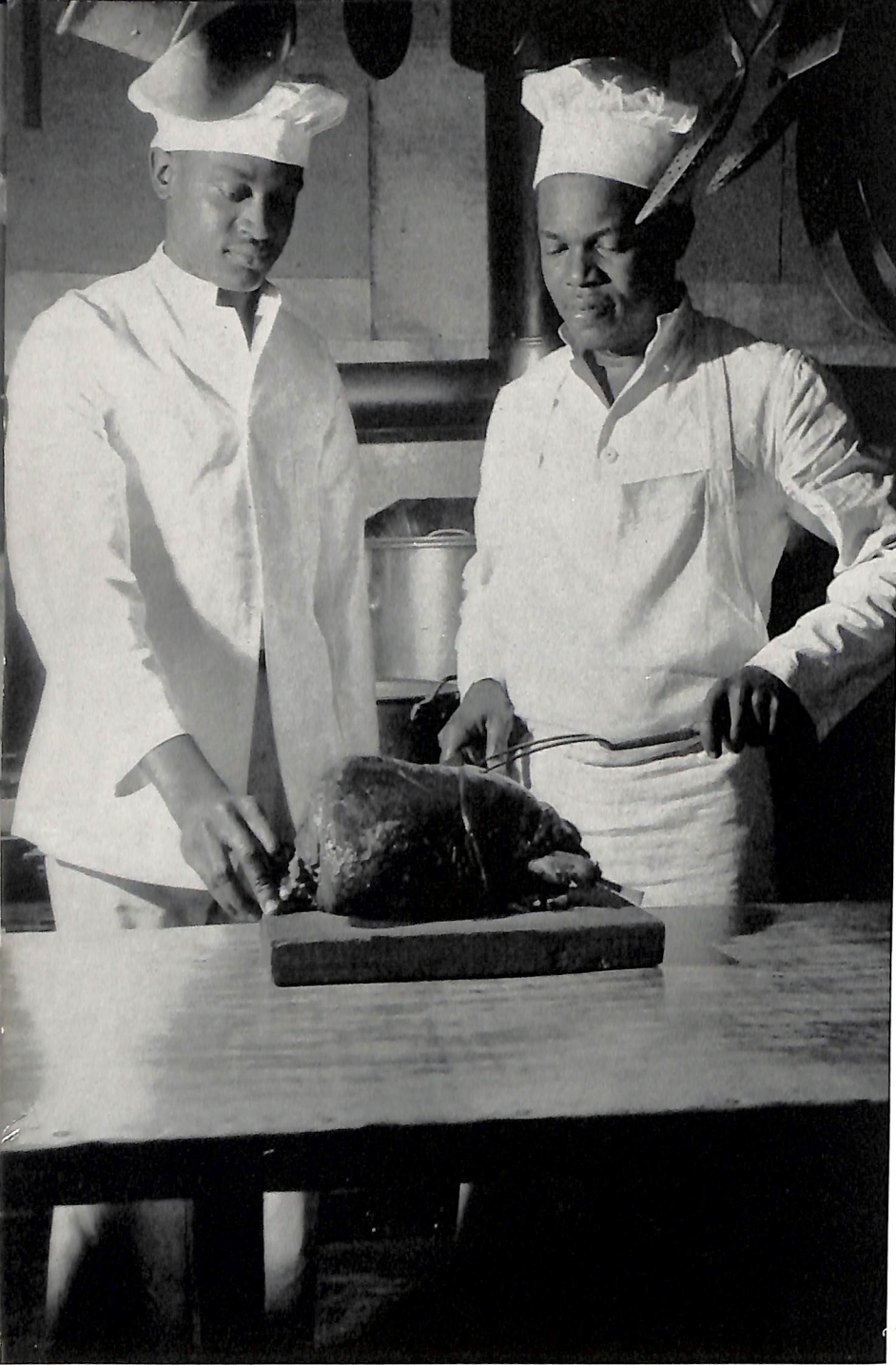

Great credit is due our officers and non-commissioned officers for having developed all units of the brigade to their present state of combat efficiency.

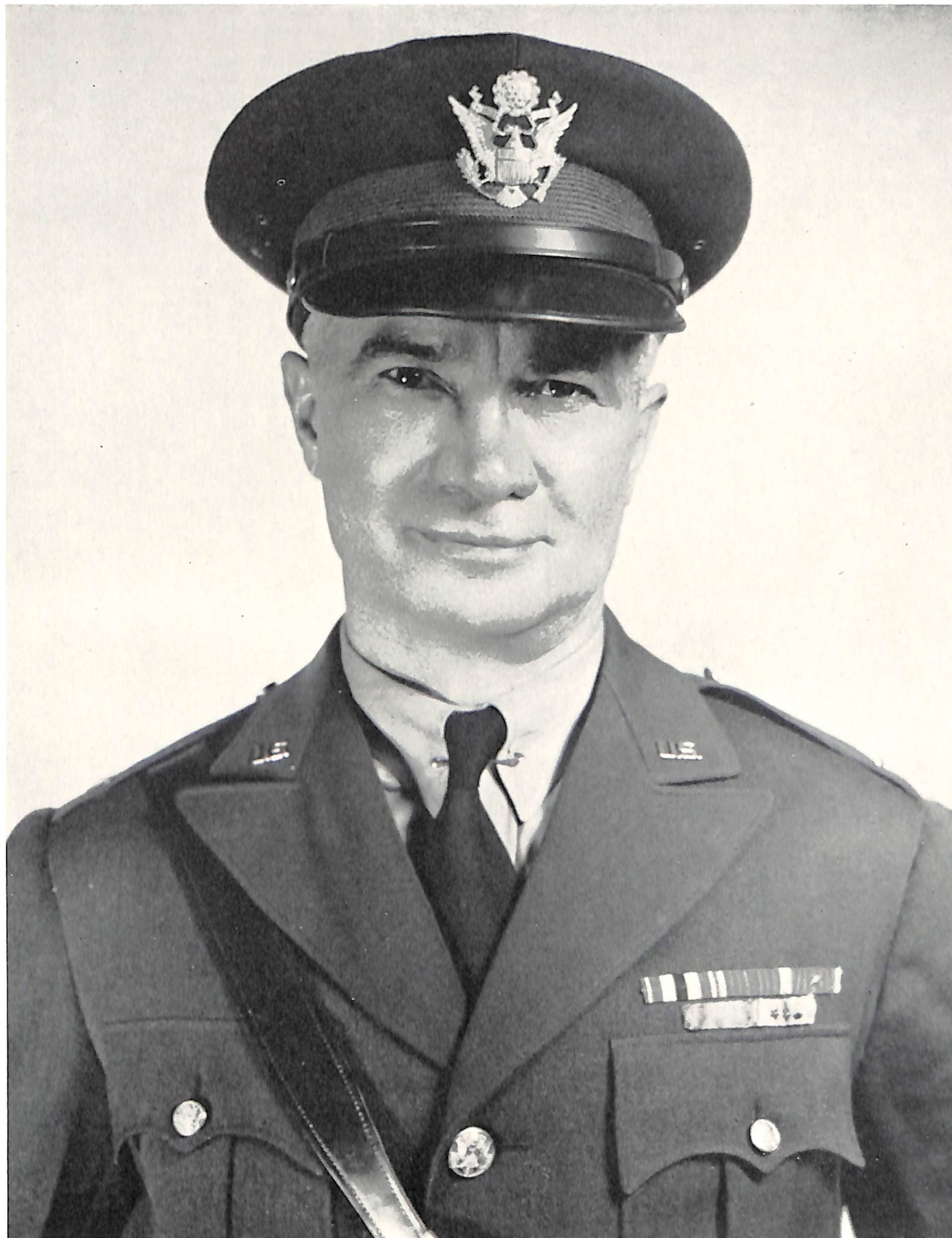

After a period of duty as instructor at a Reserve Officers Training Camp in 1918, joined the 90th Division. As a battalion commander and acting regimental commander of 358th Infantry, 90th Division, participated in all combat operations of the Division in the Saizerais Defensive Sector, the St. Mihiel Offensive and the Meuse-Argonne Offensive of the First World War.

Following the Armistice, served with the Army of Occupation in Germany until 1921.

Later served with the Fourth Cavalry and Sixth Cavalry and served several tours of duty with the Seventh Cavalry, as a squadron commander. This service was interspersed with various Service School details and other special details.

Was promoted to Brigadier General, while serving as Executive Officer of Seventh Cavalry, on October 1, 1940.

Joined the Third Cavalry Brigade in November, 1940.



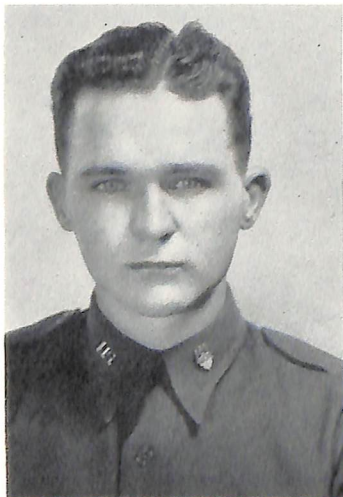

HISTORY OF THE THIRD CAVALRY BRIGADE



The Third Cavalry Brigade is young in years as a unit. However, it is comprised of two old and tried regiments, the Second Cavalry and the Fourteenth Cavalry, both of which have long and envious records of service and achievement.

The Third Cavalry Brigade was activated October 15, 1940, to combine the two regiments under one tactical head. Brigadier General Terry M. Allen was assigned command and joined the Brigade, November 24, 1940. In addition to his duties as Brigade Commander it was necessary that he organize the Second Cavalry Division, for which there had been no commander assigned. General Allen commanded the division until the arrival of Major General John Millikin, who assumed command on June 12, 1941.

The orders for the activation of the Third Cavalry Brigade found the Second Cavalry at Fort Riley, Kansas; the Fourteenth Cavalry (less the First Squadron and Band) also at Fort Riley. The First Squadron, 14th Cavalry and Band were at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, and joined the Regiment at Fort Riley on October 20, 1940.

Camp Funston, which was to be the home of the Second Cavalry Division, was in the process of construction at the time the Brigade was activated and it was not until some time later that the regiments moved into their areas at Camp Funston.

On February 21, 1941, orders activating the two Brigade Troops, namely the Brigade Headquarters Troop and the Brigade Weapons Troop, were received and these two troops were set up with the cadres necessary, to await arrival of Selective Service men to fill their complement. However, housing facilities and hospital accommodations were not available until late spring to allow the Brigade to receive its full quota of men and animals. As soon as these were available, the Brigade moved into its new area and began to receive the necessary men and animals to bring it up to strength.

Meanwhile training was intensive, new men were receiving their recruit training, the older men assisting to expedite this training as rapidly as possible. Late in June, men were received from the Cavalry Replacement Training Center at Fort Riley to fill up the existing vacancies, animals were being received from the various Remount Depots and equipment continued to arrive. At this time, training for the Second Army and General Headquarters Maneuvers was progressing very satisfactorily. The 16th Field Artillery Battalion was assigned as a part of the Third Cavalry Brigade Combat Team and joined in the training. The task of training the Brigade for the maneuvers was great considering the large percentage of first year men in the Brigade and also the large number of remounts assigned. This task was well done as evidenced by the manner in which the Brigade conducted itself during the maneuver period.

The problem of new men, new horses and lack of equipment was one of no mean importance. This, however, was overcome without much difficulty. Remounts

were received up until two weeks of the time for maneuvers. Arms and equipment were slow in arriving. Motor vehicles were not available in sufficient quantities to completely outfit the Brigade. Notwithstanding these obstacles, the Third Cavalry Brigade moved from Camp Funston on August 21, 1941, to participate in the largest maneuvers ever staged by the United States Armies.

Motor columns rolled down the highways, horses were loaded onto trains, moved to the maneuver area and detained in a manner which would have done an older organization proud.

On September 1, 1941, the Third Cavalry Brigade Combat Team moved out into the Second Army phase of the maneuvers. Moving under cover of darkness and very adverse weather and road conditions, the Brigade forced a river crossing and continued on its succeeding missions, to accomplish them with creditable performance. At the termination of this phase, the command rested two days and again marched to positions in readiness for the start of the General Headquarters phase.

Executing a delaying action, during this phase, the Brigade succeeded in the protection of the Second Army's West flank against hostile mechanization until the termination of the maneuver. Moving into the entraining area, the animals were loaded, the motor column moved out, and October 5, 1941, found The Third Cavalry Brigade back in Camp Funston, ready to again take up its training program, to smooth out the rough spots brought to light during the maneuver period, and to continue in toward its goal as the best Brigade in the service.

General Allen, upon return from the maneuvers, said:

"I wish to express my gratitude to all officers and enlisted men of the Third Brigade Combat Team, for services rendered during the recent maneuver period. The successful execution of all tactical missions assigned you was made possible by the highest degree of cooperation and discipline, by a cheerful readiness to accept the hardships imposed, and by an unusually high esprit and pride in your organizations. Great credit is due to all officers and enlisted men of both the combat and service elements.

"You left here to participate in the Second Army and General Headquarters Maneuvers as a group of comparatively inexperienced and untried units. You returned as a thoroughly welded combat team, which had clearly demonstrated its combat efficiency, its marching ability and its ability to successfully undergo the most arduous hardships of field service.

"I take great pride in having commanded this unit during this period of field service."

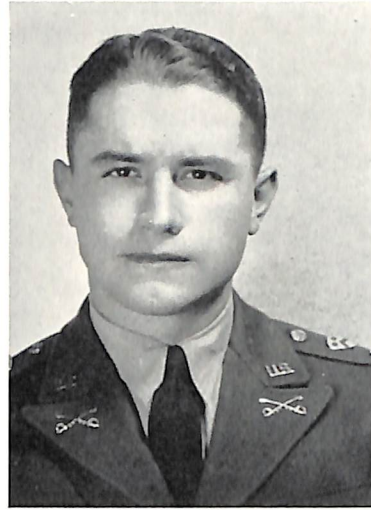
The Third Cavalry Brigade has now completed the first year of its existence with a record as enviable as any of its accomplishments and its ability to do its part in the fighting forces of our country.

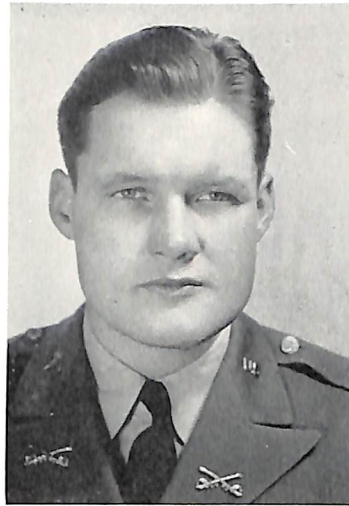

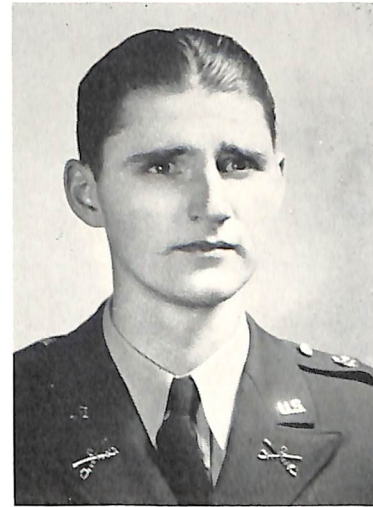

REGIMENTAL HISTORY

This is the story of the Second United States Cavalry, a saga of men and horses and the will to win in battle, patrolling the frontiers, and guarding the march of progress under the most trying conditions. Neither the heat of the tropics nor the cold of the Northwestern States succeeded in diminishing one whit the Second Cavalryman's devotion to duty or his prosecution of his country's enemies.

Until 1833, United States Cavalry had an uncertain existence. It had been the custom to raise troops to meet national emergencies, and to disband them when no longer needed. Following the Revolution, the first mounted troops in this country were four companies of light dragoons established in 1792. These were reduced to two companies and then in 1798 increased to a regiment of eight companies. The expanded force, however, was short lived for 1800 saw but two mounted companies in Federal service, and these were mustered out in 1802. It was not until 1808 that a new regiment of light dragoons was organized, followed by a second regiment in 1812; these regiments were merged in 1814, and in 1815 men and officers retained were assigned to artillery.

Cavalry ceased to exist in the United States service until 1833 when the First Dragoons were organized. At this time the Army became a vocation rather than an avocation, for a system of promotion was established whereby officers could expect to remain permanently in the service and to rise in rank with the passing years.

CREATED IN 1836

The Second Dragoons, today's justly proud Second Cavalry, came into being in 1836 to augment the force being assembled in Florida to fight the Seminole Indians. David E. Twiggs served the Regiment as its first Colonel, with Wharton Rector as Lieutenant Colonel, Majors William S. Harney and Thomas T. Fauntleroy, and First Lieutenant Lloyd J. Beall, Adjutant. There was also a full complement of line officers for Companies A through K. Wharton Rector declined his appointment and Major Harney was appointed Lieutenant Colonel. Four line officers also declined commissions with the Second Dragoons.

A native of Augusta, Georgia, Colonel Twiggs was a veteran of the War of 1812 and served much time in the infantry, where he attained the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. In 1836 he was second in command of General Gaines' expedition into Florida. Of a definite and positive nature, Colonel Twiggs impressed his personality upon the regiment, originated certain regimental characteristics and customs, and developed an admirable esprit de corps. Lieutenant Colonel Harney, a native of Louisiana, and later Colonel of the regiment, had served nearly 20 years in the Army, part of it under General Zachary Taylor, part of which was in the Black Hawk War.

Regimental Headquarters, Second Dragoons, was organized in June, 1836, and took station in Washington, D. C. Companies A and I began recruiting and assembling recruits near Fortress Monroe, Virginia; Company B in Virginia and Louisiana; Company C in Tennessee; Company D was organized from a detachment of First Dragoons in Florida; Companies E, F, G, and H in New

York, and Company K was organized in March, 1837, at New Orleans, Louisiana.

FIRST DUTY IN FLORIDA

Spain ceded Florida to the United States on July 17, 1821, and immigration was started immediately from adjoining states. But the would-be settlers found Seminole Indians squatting on the most desirable lands, and unwilling to give way before the influx of American civilization. Indian culture was not a high one, and the villages usually comprised a few log or palmetto huts surrounded by cleared fields of less than 20 acres. Here Indian lord and Negro slave, the latter finding only deeper abjection than the plight he had fled in adjacent states, lived in poverty.

It was with these Indians in Florida that the Second Dragoons were engaged continually from 1836 to 1839, fighting in the thick jungles known as the Everglades. The Second Dragoons fought at Micanopy, June 10, 1836; Welika Pond, July 19, 1836; Locha Hatchie, January 24, 1836. During the spring of 1839 the Regiment refitted with recruits and horses at Camp Washington, New Jersey, returning to Florida in 1841. The capture of Coacoochee ended hostilities, and Companies A, D, E, F, and G were ordered to Fort Jesup, Louisiana, and to Fort Towson, Arkansas, in October, 1841. This movement was accomplished by land and water.

This change was followed by one of the greatest disasters that can affect the lives of cavalrymen. Seeking to curtail expenses, Congress, on August 23, 1842, dismounted the Second Dragoons! For an interval the Regiment was styled: "Regiment of riflemen," stationed as follows: Companies H and I, Fort Washita, Arkansas; G at Fort Towson, Arkansas; B and K at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and the remainder at Fort Jesup, Louisiana.

Through the efforts of General Winfield Scott and the insistence of the States of Missouri and Louisiana, the Regiment was remounted in January, 1844.

MEXICAN WAR SERVICE

War clouds were already hovering over the nation's Southern borders, and war with Mexico was looming as inevitable. When the war broke, the Second Dragoons drew first blood, won the last engagement, and escorted General Scott into the City of Mexico to the strains of "Hail Columbia" and "Yankee Doodle" played by the band of the Second Dragoons. As the war approached, the Regiment, less the Squadron on the Washita, moved to Corpus Christi, Texas, arriving there August 27, 1845. The Washita Squadron moved to San Antonio and Austin, Texas, where it engaged in reconnaissance for General Taylor's Army of Occupation until Thornton's skirmish at La Rosa, April 25, 1846, started the war in earnest. The Regiment won glory at Palo Alto, May 8, 1846, and again at Resaca de la Palma, May 9, 1846, in which place occurred the charge and capture by Charles A. May's squadron of seven Mexican batteries. Of this gallant charge, General Taylor wrote:

"Perceiving that no decisive advantage could be gained until this artillery was silenced, I ordered Captain May to charge the batteries with his squad-

ron of Dragoons. This was gallantly and effectually executed, and it was completely silenced."

Reconnaissance work followed until Santa Rosa, and the subsequent siege and capture of Monterey. The unit was present also at Buena Vista on January 21, 1847.

When it was decided to reinforce General Scott's expedition into Mexico through Vera Cruz, January, 1847, with all regular troops available, Companies A, B, C, F, I, and K left Agua Nueva on January 9, under Colonel Harney, and arrived before Vera Cruz and disembarked on March 20. The action before Medelin, March 25, routed the rancheros who had been harrasing American lines invading Vera Cruz, which fell the same day. Colonel Harney occupied Antigua on April 2, 1847. During the first day's fighting, Cerro Gordo and Hill Ei Telegrapho fell to Colonel Harney's Dragoons who were battling without mounts. Upon the successful termination of the fighting of April 18, Jalapa was taken, and the next day a brigade of Mexican Cavalry defending Puebla was routed and the town occupied May 15. Other engagements of the Regiment included La Hoya, June 18, 1847; Contreras and Churubusco, August 19; Molino Del Rey, August 20, and the two-day battle for the semi-final victory of Chapultepec, September 7 and 8, 1847. Units of the Regiment were present at General Scott's triumphant entry into Mexico City, September 13, for he was escorted by Major Sumner's Squadron to music by the Second Dragoon Band.

The last engagement of the war was fought at Agua Fria, November 2, 1847, by a detachment from Companies D, E and H which had remained with General Taylor in the vicinity of Monterey.

FRONTIER ENCOUNTERS

At the end of the war Companies D, E, and H were sent to California, marching by way of Chihuahua City, Santa Fe and Tucson, arriving in Los Angeles January 9, 1849. Company H had been detached at Santa Fe for protection against hostile Indians, and at Dog Canyon it had the first of many encounters with Apaches. The remaining companies took station at various posts throughout Texas. Minor engagements with Indians and Mexican bandits furnished the only break from a routine of garrison building and duty until January 25, 1852, when the Second Squadron (Companies D, E, F, and H) defeated the Apaches at Leguna Jornada Del Muerto, New Mexico. On September 3, the same squadron plus Company K struck hostile Sioux Indians and routed them at Blue Water, Nebraska.

In August, 1855, the remainder of the Regiment marched for the first time into Fort Riley, Kansas. Since then it has served many tours of duty at this post, the present one dating from July 6, 1919. Two years later the Regiment moved into Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, for its first tour as a whole since the early days of the Mexican War. In August of this year the Regiment made one of its most famous marches, from Lawrence to Fort Riley, a distance of 98 miles, when rumors were spread that Fort Riley had been attacked by the Indians. The reports were false. During 1857, troops of the Regiment were called upon to suppress a near-civil war in Kansas; while the Blue Water force continued as punitive force on the frontiers of Kansas and Nebraska.

Upon only four days' notice, on September 17, 1857, the Regiment marched out of Fort Leavenworth and began a march of 1,100 miles to Salt Lake, to observe operations of the Mormons. The trek was marked with severe hardships, for the Regiment made it in below

zero weather. Camps were without fuel or forage, and many of the horses died of starvation before the Regiment arrived at Camp Scott, Utah, on November 19, 1857. It was then that Colonel Albert Sidney Johnston, destined for fame as a General of the Confederate Army, took command. For about three and a half years the Regiment served in this far-Western territory. Activities of the Mormons were closely watched, and it was necessary to provide heavy guards for both immigrant and freight trains which were plying the Oregon Trail. Five troops were constantly engaged in the Wyoming, Nebraska and Kansas territories, protecting the settlers and keeping a close check upon the Indian tribes. In May, 1860, troops G and I were ordered to New Mexico where they were engaged against the Navajo Indians from the moment of their arrival on July 27.

BEGINNING OF CIVIL WAR

The clouds of civil war were gathering over the nation, and with the beginning of hostilities the Second Cavalry was ordered to Fort Leavenworth, the first move toward a long and glorious record of campaigns in the War Between the States. Shortly after the arrival at Fort Leavenworth the Regiment was ordered to Washington, D. C., and Troop K, the first to arrive, participated in the battle at Bull Run on July 21, 1861. The Troop conducted itself with valor, playing an important role in the retreat of Union troops on Washington. By December, 1861, the Regiment, less Troops C, G, and I, were assembled and ready for duty in Washington.

Leaving Fort Leavenworth in June, 1861, Troop C, under Lieutenant Ferrand, arrived in Springfield, Missouri, in August and formed a part of General Lyon's force. It was soon under fire, for General Price, with about 20,000 Confederates, forced a fight with General Lyon's Army of only 5,000 men on Wilson's Creek, near Springfield, Missouri, August 9. General Lyon made the attack, fearing that the Union would lose face in the questionable State of Missouri if he refused Price's strong bid to battle. So swift and sure was the charge of the small force that the Southerners scattered and the Union soldiers had every right to expect victory. This hope was dashed, however, when an apparent force of Federal reserves joined, only to open fire on General Lyon's men. It was an unfair trick of war, for the "Reserves" were Confederate soldiers in disguise. Company C then fought its way east and joined the Regiment at Falmouth, Virginia, in May, 1863, after distinguishing itself at the battle of Wilson's Creek, Missouri, the surrender of Fort Donaldson, Pittsburg Landing.

Troops G and I remained in New Mexico until October, 1862, when they moved to Fort Leavenworth, and finally joined the Regiment in Washington on November 3, 1862. Meanwhile, as the army was expanded under Presidential Order, Companies L and M were organized. Troop L joined the Regiment in December, 1863, and M a few months later.

The Regiment participated as a unit in the famous Stoneman Raid of 1863. On June 5, 1863, the Second Cavalry was brigaded with the First, as a Reserve Brigade, thus forming the First Cavalry Division in American history. Prior to this time the Union Cavalry had been subservient to all other branches of the armed service. Cavalry rosters up until this time had been literally raided for grooms, orderlies, and pickets. Almost every general seems to have rated an escort of a complete cavalry regiment. This stopped with the creation of the Cavalry Division, and on the morning of June 5, 1863, it slipped

across the Rappahannock River, surprised the great J. E. B. Stuart, and administered a trouncing that the Confederates found hard to forget. Stuart's greatest humiliation was the loss of his Headquarters and the capture of all of his papers. The events of this day are recorded as the battle of Beverly Ford.

BATTLE OF GETTYSBURG

Still breathless from this major engagement, the Second Cavalry found no time for respite, for General Lee launched his long-expected invasion of the North. Every available trooper of the Second was rushed northward, there to be hurled against the enemy at Gettysburg, where they accredited themselves gallantly. Following the great defeat of the Southern forces at Gettysburg, the Second Cavalry launched upon a mopping-up expedition that made the bloody fields of Williamsport, Hagerstown, Falling Waters and Funkstown routine. Nine major engagements were fought in 10 days, and 800 wagons were destroyed while 5,000 men and 3,000 animals were captured.

July 18, 1863, found the Regiment again in Virginia, this time not to leave until the close of the war two years later. The Regiment was ordered immediately to Manassas Gap which it defended until relieved by infantry on July 23. The next month it participated in a massed reconnaissance of the Reserve Brigade, and was engaged with Confederate Cavalry at Brandy Station. Two days later it defeated a Confederate Cavalry Regiment and toward the end of the month the Second went to Giesborough Point to refit. The Second Cavalry was again with the Army of the Potomac on October 14, and on November 10 it occupied Culpepper Courthouse. Shortly afterward the Regiment moved into winter quarters at Mitchell Station where it passed the cold months refitting and preparing for the final campaigns, under Generals Grant and Sheridan.

It emerged on May 3, 1864, and four days later it helped drive the Confederates from Todd's Tavern. Engagements followed in rapid succession at Yellow Tavern, Mechanicsville, Hawes Shop and Old Church. General Philip Sheridan commanded the Second Cavalry at Trevillian Station on June 12, and the Regiment stayed under his command until the end of the war, giving a good account of itself in the campaigns before Richmond and in the Shenandoah Valley. The Second Cavalry arrived at Harper's Ferry on August 8, 1864, and fought almost daily against Early's Cavalry, often against his infantry, with major engagements at Fisher's Hill, Winchester and Cedar Creek.

With the close of the Civil War the Regiment returned to the plains, particularly to Kansas. Troops were scattered to various posts and engagements were frequent.

THE INDIAN WARS

The massacre at Fort Phil Kearny was the first of many Indian depredations which culminated in the Sioux campaign. It was this campaign that carried so much weight in the eventual breaking of the Indians' resistance to American law and order. The Sioux under Sitting Bull and Gall stubbornly resisted the opening of a wagon-trail through their domain, and the Second engaged in many gallant battles until force in the field coupled with diplomacy in Washington ended hostilities. In 1869 one battalion was detached and stationed in the Montana Territory, where it soon launched a campaign against the

Piegian Indians, a nation that was not brought to final terms until 1874 and 1875.

The campaign against Sitting Bull and Gall was made in the year of 1876.

Troops A, B, D, and I, under General Crook, the Montana battalion and the remainder of the Regiment under John Gibbon, whose column discovered the bodies of Colonel Custer's regiment, all took part in the engagements which led to the final defeat of the Indians.

The Montana battalion participated in the defeat of Lame Deer and his Sioux in the spring of 1887. Troops L, F, G, and C were in the field against the Nez Percés until late fall, and decisively defeated the tribesmen near Bear Paw Mountain.

Several expeditions against the Sioux occupied the battalion during the remainder of the Montana visit. From 1870 to 1877 this battalion had been constantly marching and fighting.

Reassembled in Montana in 1879 the Second Cavalry was engaged in several actions against the Sioux, the most notable of which was the defeat of the Indians at Milk River, June 17, 1879. The Regiment remained in the Montana Territory until 1884, when it was ordered to the Washington Territory. Early detachments reached Walla Walla on June 30, 1884. The Regiment remained at various posts on the Pacific Coast until 1890, when it moved to the Southwest, taking station in Arizona and New Mexico with headquarters at Fort Wingate, New Mexico.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR

Troops A, C, D, and F were moved to Fort Riley, Kansas, in 1894, where they won fame as School Troops, and were known familiarly as "Rafferty's Squadron." So great was their reputation that General Shafter picked these troops to accompany him on his Santiago Expedition during the war with Spain. This squadron left Fort

Riley in April, 1898, and proceeded to Cuba by way of Mobile, Alabama. The unit reached Daiquiri, Cuba, June 22-23, and participated in the battle of San Juan Hill, El Caney and the siege of Santiago. It was present at the final surrender.

Troop B accompanied General Miles to Porto Rico, and the entire Regiment participated in the Cuban occupation, having been returned to the Island after first having been sent to Florida on what had seemed to be the end of their role in the hostilities.

In the army of occupation half of the Regiment went to Natanzas, while half with Headquarters went to Cienfuegos. This second group served later at Santa Clara and Plecetas. Finally the Regiment was reunited at Matanzas, where it remained until 1902.

For Myer, Virginia, was to be the next stopping point for Headquarters and Second Squadron, while the First Squadron went to Fort Ethan Allen, and Troops L and M went to Fort Sheridan, the change taking place early in 1902 and remaining in effect until December, 1903, when the Regiment sailed for the Philippines via Suez—less Troops L and M which sailed from San Francisco.

During the tour of the Philippines the Regiment occupied garrisons in Luzon, Camp Wallace, and Union. There were many brushes with Moros, and in the spring of 1905 the Third Squadron engaged in numerous expeditions against the Ladrones, Cavite Province. In August of this year the entire Regiment was stationed at Camp Stotsenburg, Pampanga.

The following year the Regiment returned to the United States, where on February 15, 1906, Headquarters and the First Squadron arrived at Fort Assiniboine Montana; the Second Squadron reached Fort Riley on March 11, and the Third Squadron, Fort Snelling, Minnesota, the following day.

The entire Regiment was assembled at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, for station in June, 1907, and during November and December they took the field in South Dakota to discourage Indians who were threatening an uprising. The Regiment retained its station at Fort Des Moines until November 28, 1909, when it again departed for the Philippines.

Again in the Islands the Regiment took station as follows: Headquarters at Jolo; Third Squadron at Camp Overton; Troops F, G, and H at Malabang. On February 14, 1910, Troop H took part in a sharp fight at Tiradores Hill, near Pantar, Mindano. Troop B was long in the field in the Davao district.

There was much field activity during 1911, particularly upon the Island of Jolo, on October 17, and November 24; at Mount Bagsok December 3, and at Bud Dajo from December 16, to the end of the year. The Bud Dajo campaign ended on January 4, 1912. After a series of other minor engagements the Regiment departed from Manila on May 15, and arrived at Fort Bliss, Texas, on June 13, where it remained on border patrol duty until December, 1913. The Regiment moved to Fort Ethan Allen December 29, 1913, and remained there until April 1, 1917.

WORLD WAR SERVICE

When the United States entered World War I, the Regiment was recruited to full strength and from its personnel the 18th and 19th Regiments of Field Artillery were formed. The Regiment has the distinction of being the only American Cavalry unit to fight as such in France. Within three weeks after landing on French soil, the Second United States Cavalry was active in the Toul Sector.

When the Second Cavalry left Jolo in 1912 General Pershing telegraphed its commander, Colonel West:

"I should consider myself fortunate to again have your splendid Regiment a part of my command."

And now half way around the world the Second Cavalry is again under the command of General Pershing, this time to suppress the Hun's desire to rule the world. Eleven troops of the Second Cavalry have credit for battle participation and four have high commendation for service in the St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives of the World War. More than 250 enlisted Second Cavalrymen won commissions, and 23 of the Regiment's officers became Generals. Following the World War the Regiment took station at Fort Riley.

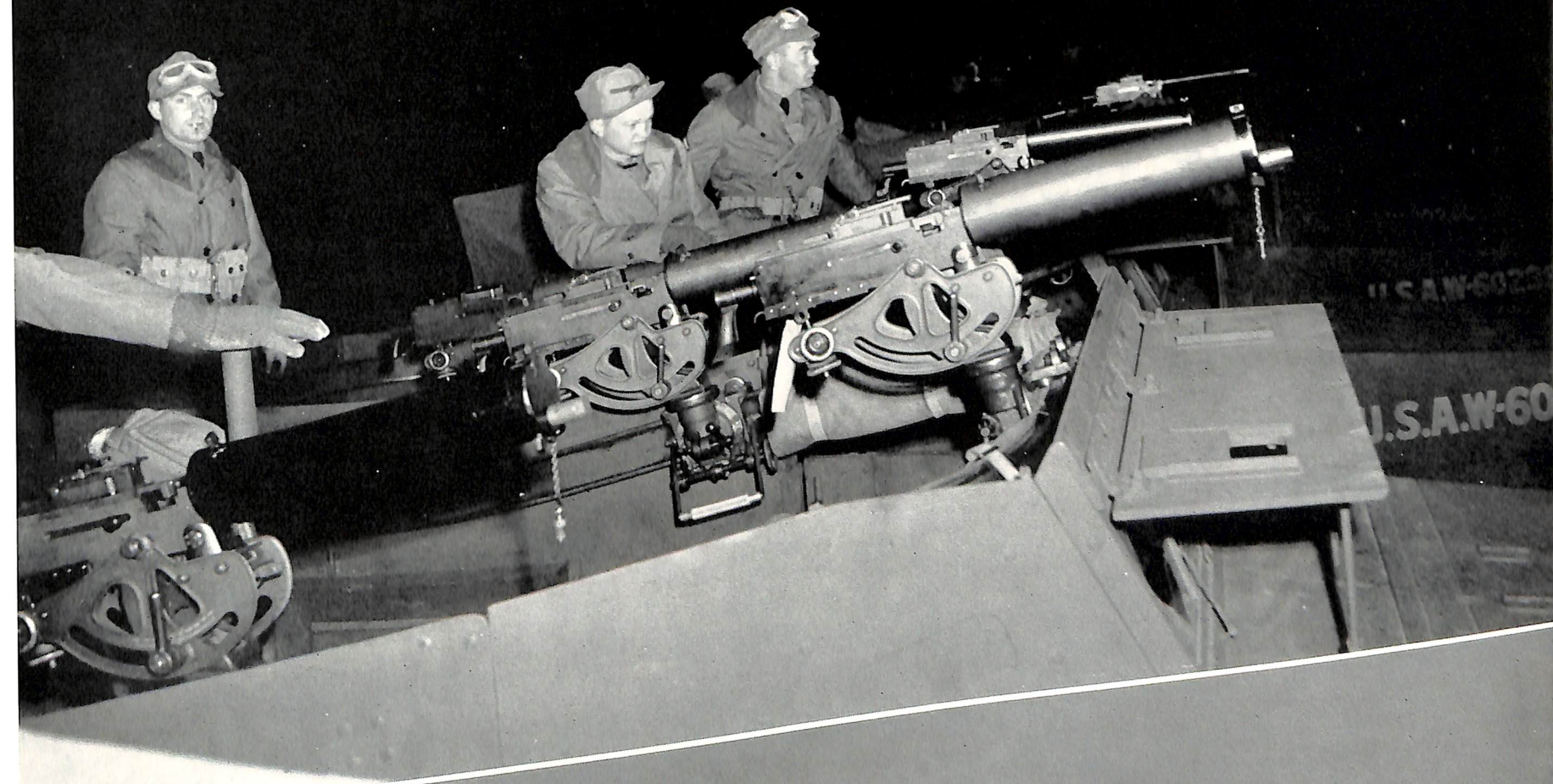
In 1940 the Second Cavalry Regiment was brigaded with the 14th Cavalry as the Third Cavalry Brigade and in the spring of 1941 became part of the Second Cavalry Division furnishing nucleus of Division Special Troops as well as furnishing many cadres for the armored forces and as various Divisional Reconnaissance Troops.

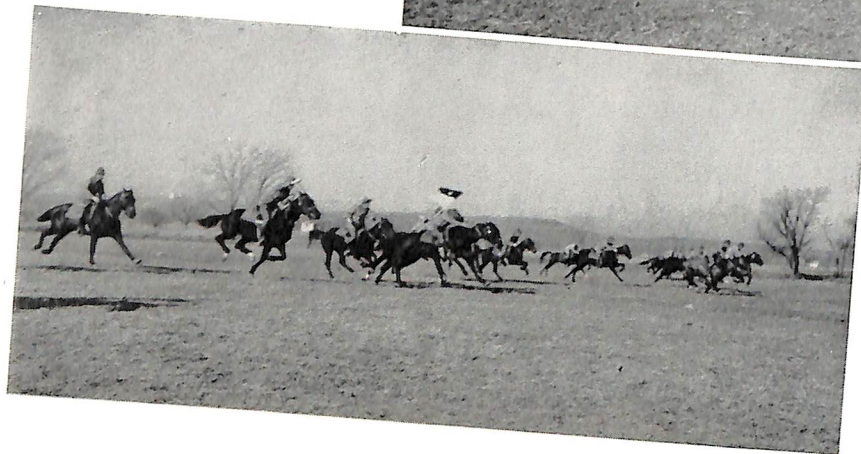

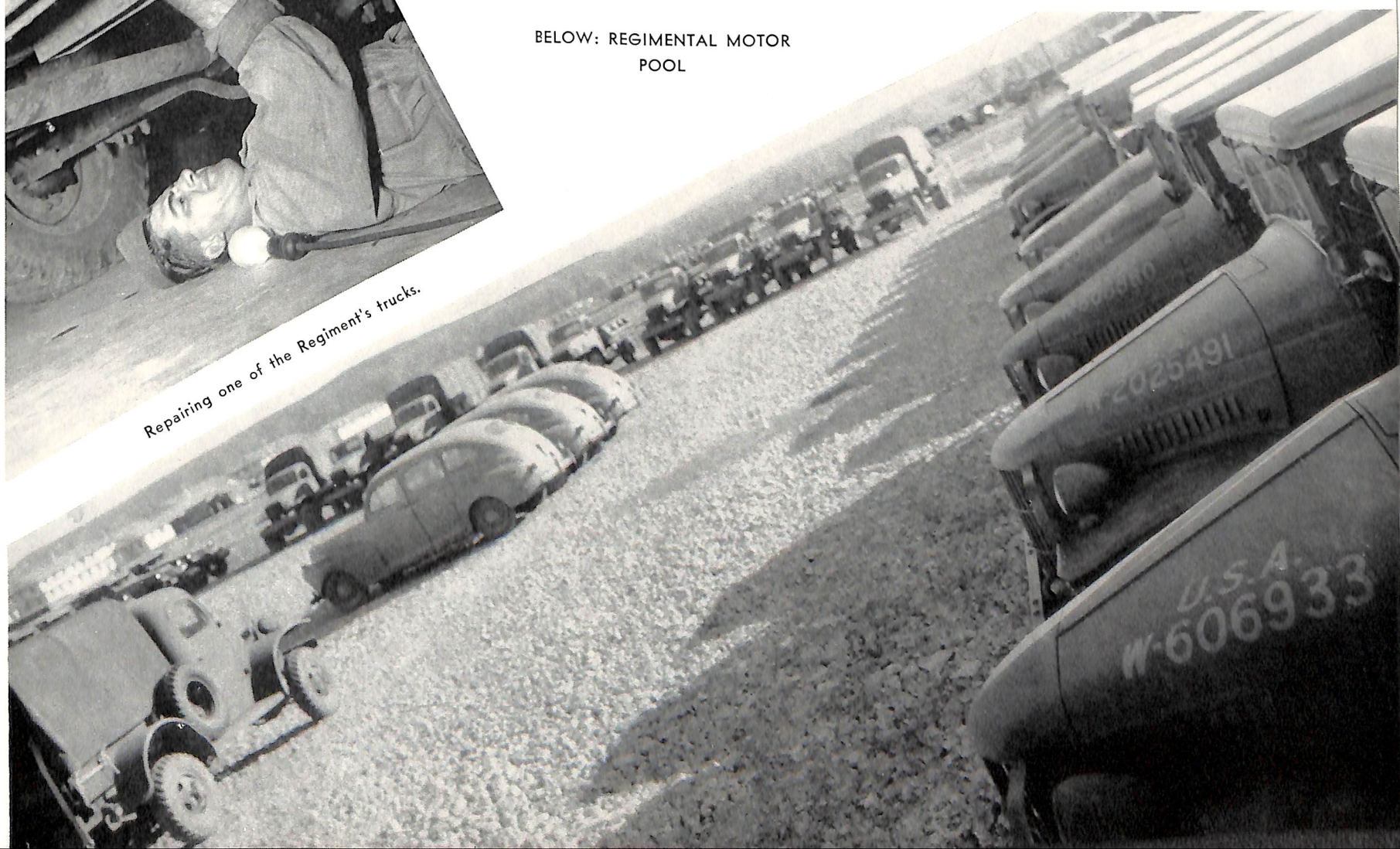

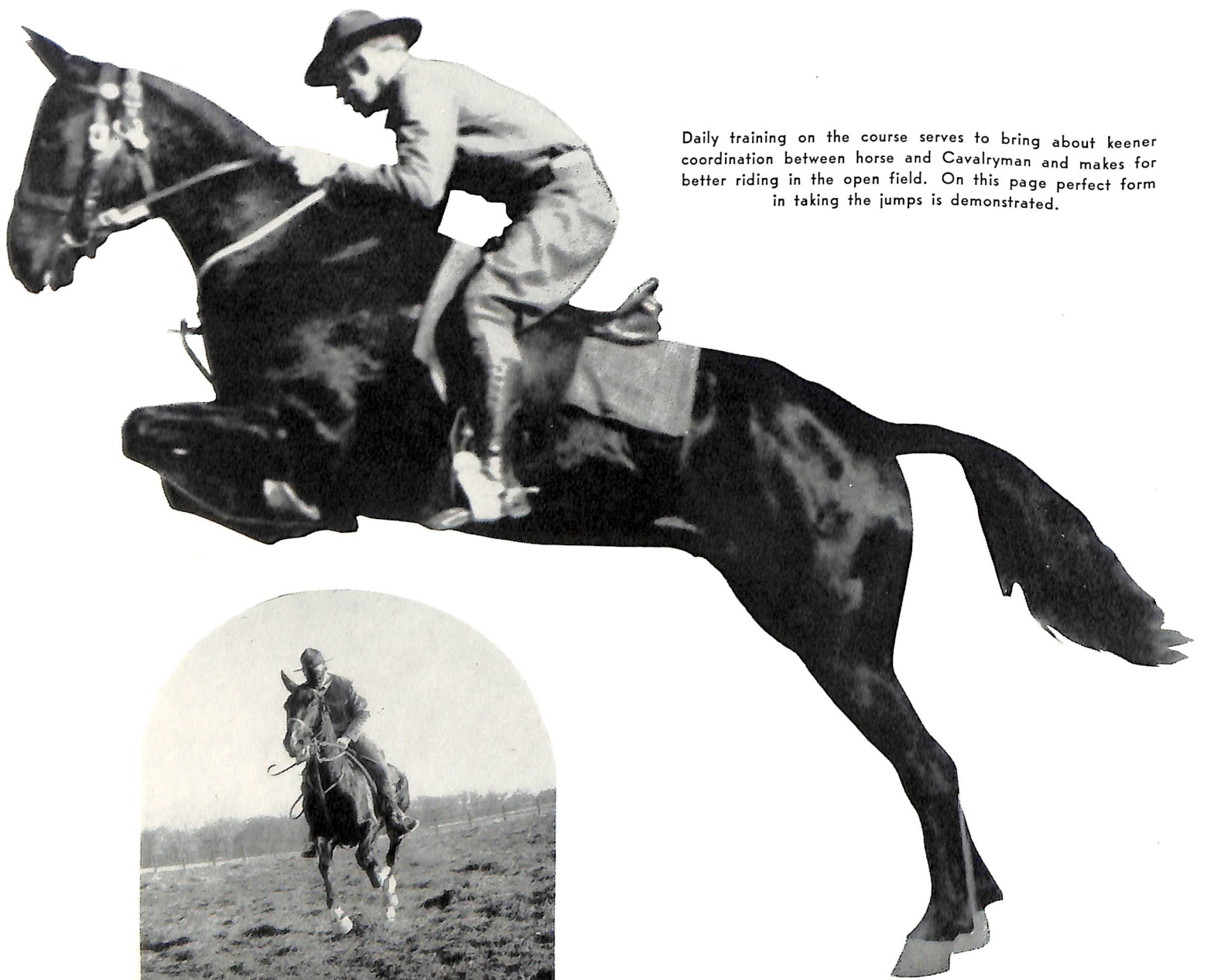

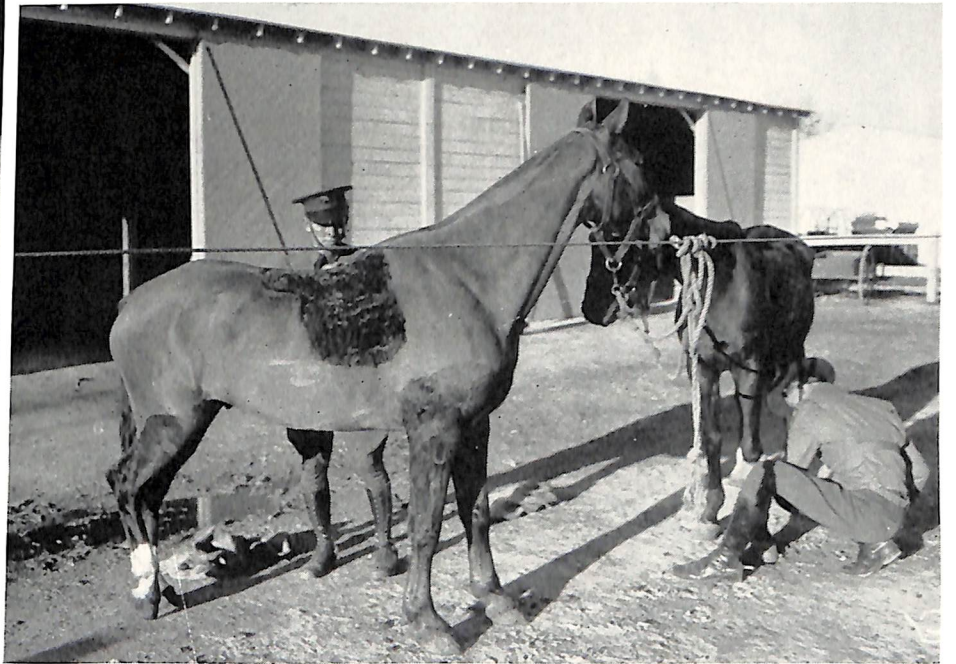

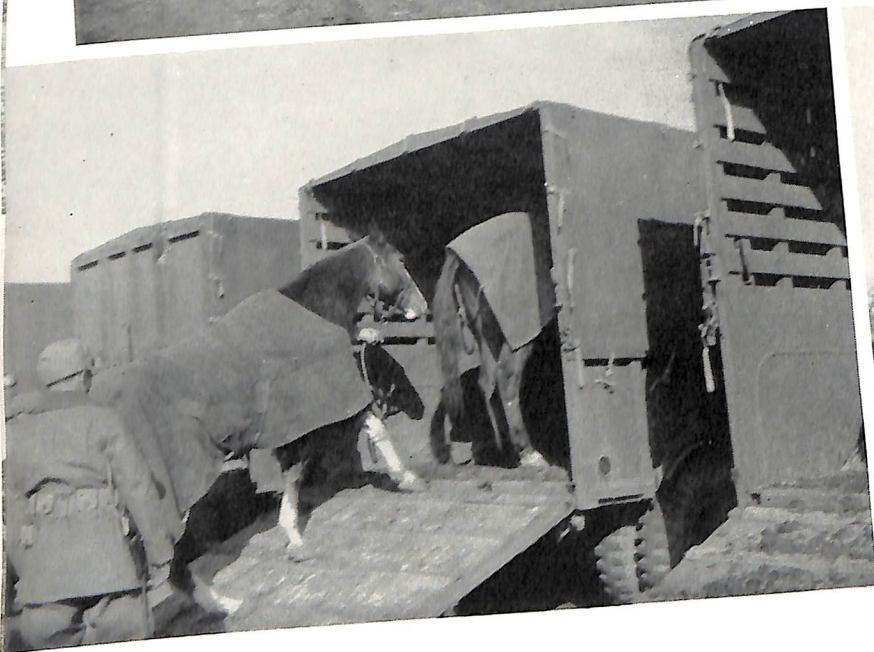

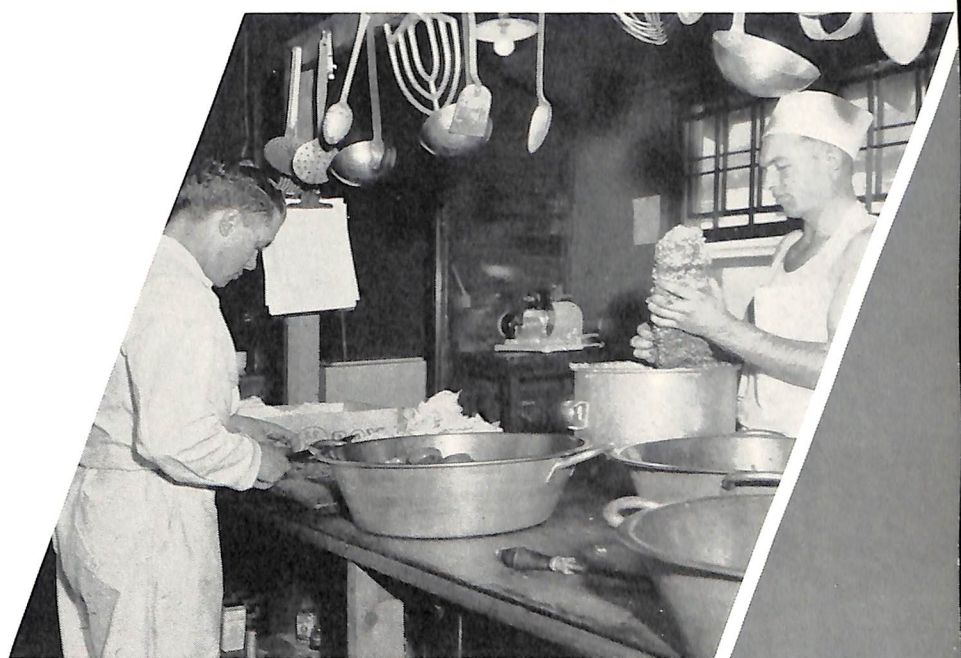

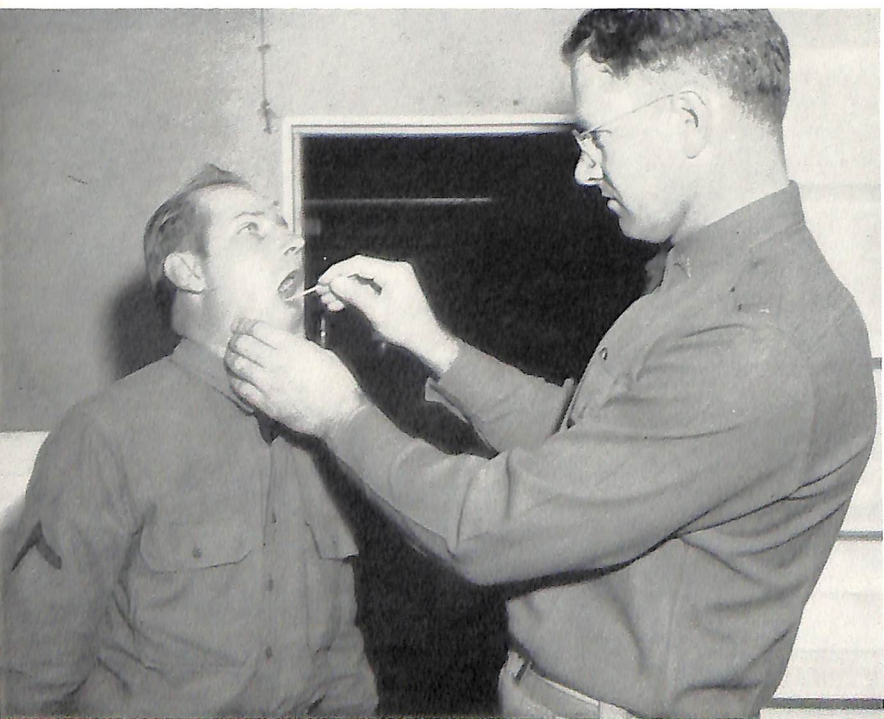

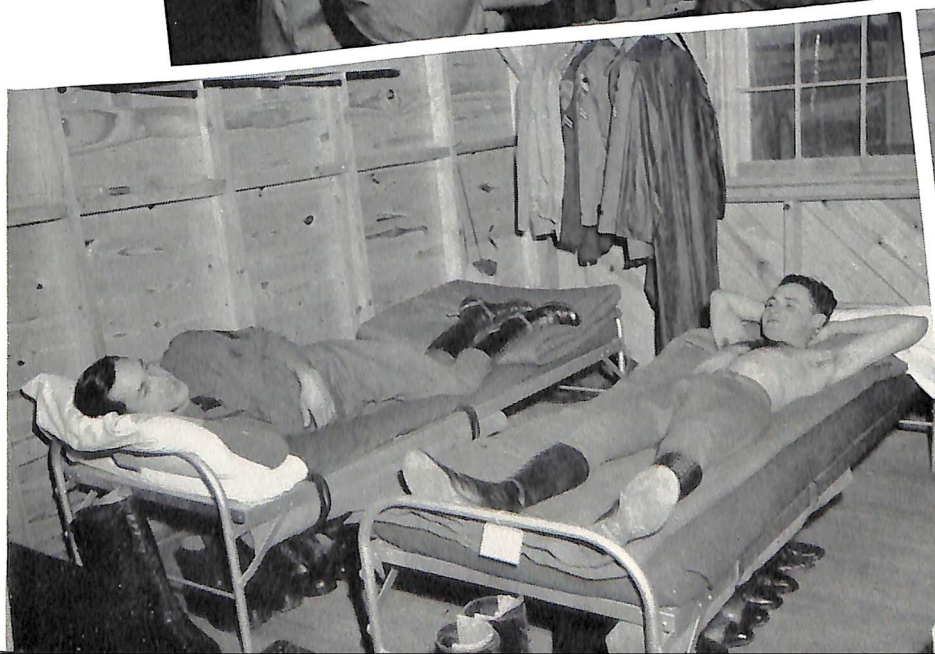

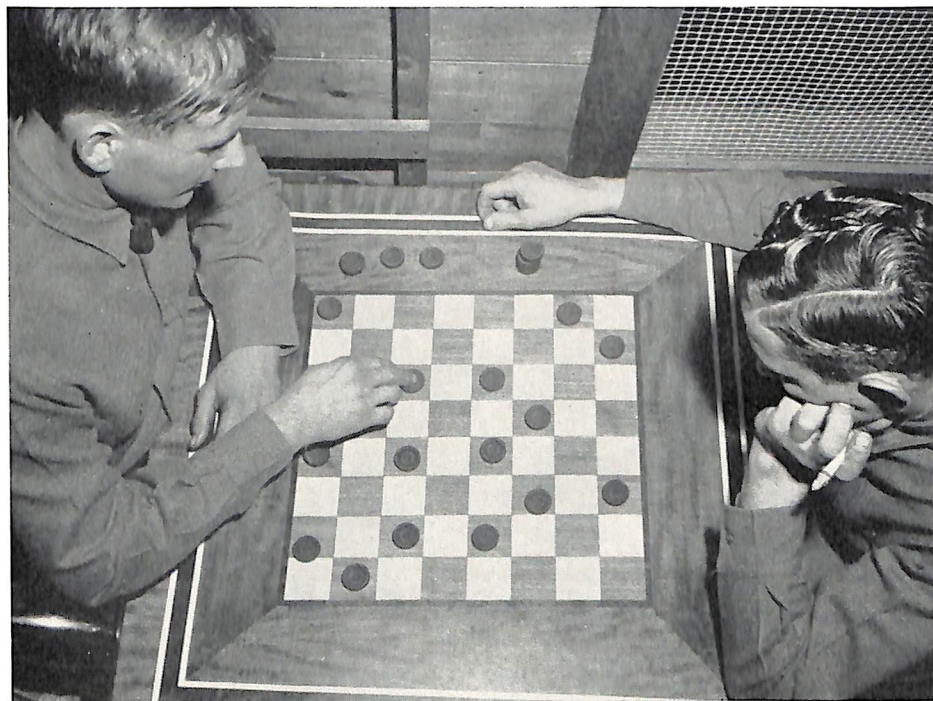
