





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Howard W. Allens

Corporal, U. S. Army

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
Fatally wounded on May 14, 1945 while fighting on Okinawa, Corporal Howard W. Allens died on June 1. Allens, who was serving with the 96th Division at the time of his death, joined the Army on September 25, 1944 at Chicago, Illinois and received his training at Camp Robinson, Arkansas.

He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with one Battle Star.

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Charles W. Anderson

Quartermaster First Class, U. S. Navy

Quartermaster First Class Charles W. Anderson died in Florida

on April 8, 1943 from injuries he received while in action
in the Pacific Theater. Anderson rejoined the Navy in February, 1942

after six years of previous service. He was attached to
the submarine chaser U.S.S. "Jet" from early 1942 until
January 20, 1943. Anderson wore the Asiatic-Pacific Theater
Ribbon with Battle Stars, the American Theater Ribbon,
and the American Defense Ribbon.



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Herbert E. Anderson

Lieutenant (j.g.), U. S. Merchant Marine


Lieutenant (j. g.) Herbert E. Anderson was lost at sea April 18, 1945 when his ship, the "Cyrus H. McCormick," was torpedoed off the southwest coast of France.

Anderson joined the Merchant Marine in April, 1942 and was commissioned at the United States Merchant Marine Academy in September, 1943. He was awarded the Mariner's Medal commemorating the "greatest service anyone can render cause or country."



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Jay W. Anderson

Second Lieutenant, U. S. Army

Second Lieutenant Jay W. Anderson, a fighter pilot with Chennault's 14th Air Force in the India-China-Burma Theater, was reported missing in action after he had failed to return from a mission over enemy-held territory on November 6, 1944, and was presumed dead in March, 1946.

Anderson entered the Army in October, 1942 and was commissioned at Craig Field, Selma, Alabama January 6, 1944. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon.



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Walter P. Antul

Private, U. S. Army

Private Walter P. Antul was killed near Luxembourg, Germany on January 22, 1945 while in action with Patton's forces. Antul joined the Army in June, 1944 and received his training at Camp Blanding and Camp Myles Standish. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Raynald J. Arsenault

Private, U. S. Army

Fatally wounded on August 19
while fighting with Patton's 3rd Army near Argentan, France,
Private Raynald J. Arsenault died on August 22, 1944.
He joined the Army on May 4, 1943 at Fort Devens, was assigned
to the Coast Artillery and took his basic training
at Fort Eustis, Virginia. He received the Purple Heart and the
European-African-Middle Eastern Theater
Ribbon with two Battle Stars.



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Harry G. Berglund

Private First Class, U. S. Army

Private First Class Harry G. Berglund

was killed on May 27, 1944 while in action with an armored reconnaissance unit on the Anzio beachhead. Berglund entered the Army in September, 1941 at Fort Devens and, after being assigned to an Armored Forces division, trained at Forts Knox and Lewis. For his service in the Tunisian, North African and Sicilian campaigns, as well as at Anzio, Berglund was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Kenneth E. Bird

Aviation Cadet, U. S. Army

Only two weeks before he was to receive his wings,

Aviation Cadet Kenneth E. Bird was killed

when his plane crashed during a routine flight at Moody Field,

Georgia on December 4, 1944. Bird joined the Army Air Forces

in November, 1943 and trained at Greensboro, North Carolina,

Maxwell Field, Alabama, and Shaw Field, South Carolina.



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Albeny J. Blanchard

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

While on a meteorological reconnaissance mission, Staff Sergeant Albeny J. Blanchard, a tail-gunner on a B-17, was killed on Christmas Day in 1943 when his plane crashed during a storm in Devon, England. Blanchard entered the armed forces in October, 1942 at Fort Devens, and trained at Miami and Texas air bases. He took part in bombing and reconnaissance flights over France, Belgium and Germany and received the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the European-African-Middle Eastern and the American Theater Ribbons.



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Stephen F. Burke

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

Flying as radioman-gunner,

Staff Sergeant Stephen F. Burke was killed over Burma when his B-24 Liberator was shot down March 31, 1943. Burke joined the Air Forces in January, 1942 and trained at Jefferson, Missouri, Harlingen, Texas, and Miami. He had been in the India-Burma theater for three months before his death, and was awarded the Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon with three Battle Stars.



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Adelard G. Caron

Private First Class, U. S. Army

Private First Class Adelard G. Caron died in Germany on December 14, 1944, sixteen hours after being hit and fatally wounded by a mortar shell. Caron, who entered the service at Fort Devens on March 15, 1944, went overseas as an infantryman with the 30th Division and was awarded the Belgian Fourragère for his part in the liberation of Belgium and action at Ardennes.

Caron's other decorations included the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Carroll F. Clifford

Private First Class, U. S. Army

Attached to C Battalion 280th Engineers,
Private First Class Carroll F. Clifford died of injuries received
in France, September 28,
1945. Clifford joined the Army in March, 1943 and trained
at Camp Maxey, Texas, Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, Fort Leonard
Wood, Missouri, and the Ohio State University Cadet Training
School. For his action in the Rhineland, Central Europe and
at Ardennes, he was awarded the European-African-Middle Eastern
Theater Ribbon with three Battle Stars.



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George F. Collins

Second Lieutenant, U. S. Army

On his ninth mission as a B-24 Liberator bombardier, Second Lieutenant George F. Collins was reported missing in action over Augsberg, Germany February 27, 1945 and was presumed dead a year later. Collins joined the Air Forces in July, 1942 and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant at Midland, Texas in September, 1944. He was attached to the 15th Air Force in Italy, and was awarded the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Distinguished Unit Badge, the Purple Heart, European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with two Battle Stars and the American Theater Ribbon.



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Arthur R. Creamer

Private First Class, U. S. Army

Private First Class Arthur R. Creamer

died February 6, 1943 of pneumonia contracted while on duty

at Truax Field, Fort Madison, Wisconsin.

Attached to an Air Forces ground crew,

Creamer joined the Army at Fort Devens in November, 1942,

then received his basic training at Shaw Field, South Carolina.



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David A. Danahy

Seaman First Class, U. S. Coast Guard

Seaman First Class David A. Danahy lost his life
during a landing barge accident on July 11, 1944
while he was in training at Greenwood, Louisiana. Danahy entered
the Coast Guard on September 17, 1942, was indoctrinated
at Manhattan Beach, and served for a year
aboard the destroyer escort U.S.S. "New Bedford."



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William J. Driscoll, Jr.

Captain, U. S. Army

After completing 35 missions over Europe, Captain William J. Driscoll, Jr., of the 8th Air Force, was killed October 18, 1944 when his plane exploded over Birkenhead, England. Driscoll entered the service in March, 1942, trained at Maxwell Field, Alabama and was commissioned a pilot at Moody Field, Georgia. He was awarded the Air Medal with four Oak Leaf Clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with four Battle Stars.



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Harry W. Durant

Private First Class, U. S. Army

On February 25, 1945, while fighting with the 413th Infantry,

Private First Class Harry W. Durant was killed in action

near Cologne, Germany. Durant entered the service

in March, 1941 and trained at Fort Dix, Fort George Meade,

and the Burlingame Reservation. He was awarded the Purple Heart

and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon

with Battle Star.



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Roland H. Edstrom

Lieutenant, U. S. Navy

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Lieutenant Roland H. Edstrom, a naval aviator,

was killed in Florida on May 10, 1946

when his plane crashed following a collision.

Edstrom, who joined the Navy and
was commissioned an Ensign on October 16, 1942, trained
at Philadelphia, Dallas, New Orleans and was stationed at the
Naval Air Base, Pensacola, Florida at the time of his death.



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C. Robert Fisk

Private, U. S. Army

Fighting with General Patton's famed Blue Ridge Division,
Private C. Robert Fisk was killed in action
in northern France on October 12, 1944
less than two months after he embarked from Fort Meade,
Maryland. Fisk joined the Army in March, 1944
and trained at Camp Croft, South Carolina. He was awarded the
Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater
Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Daniel L. Ford

Private First Class, U. S. Army

Private First Class Daniel L. Ford was killed on November 26, 1944, one month after going overseas, while fighting with the 319th Infantry in the Province of Lorraine, France. Ford entered the service in April, 1944 and received his training at Camp Blanding, Florida and Fort Meade, Maryland. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Alvar Friberg

Private, U. S. Army

After being wounded near Brest, France on August 3, 1944 and hospitalized in England for four months, Private Alvar Friberg returned to active duty in November and was killed on December 11, 1944 while fighting near Aachen, Germany. Friberg entered the service at Fort Devens on February 26, 1944, trained at Camp Wheeler, Georgia, Fort Meade, Maryland, and Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, before going overseas on July 10, 1944. He received two Purple Hearts and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Knut Friberg

Private First Class, U. S. Army

On August 30, 1944, Private First Class Knut Friberg, a scout in the 9th Infantry, was killed by enemy fire near Brest, France when he elected to fight rather than withdraw during an attack. For his heroic actions, Friberg was awarded the Silver Star. Among his other decorations were the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars. Friberg joined the Army at Fort Devens on January 27, 1944. He received his training at Camp Wheeler, Fort Meade and Camp Kilmer and went overseas on June 20, 1944.



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Robert N. Giard

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

Staff Sergeant Robert N. Giard lost his life on July 18, 1944 when the B-17 Flying Fortress, on which he was a tail gunner, was shot down near Memingen, Germany. Giard joined the Army at Fort Devens in December, 1941 and trained at Keesler Field, Mississippi, San Antonio, Texas, Rapid City, South Dakota, Tampa, Florida, and Spokane, Washington, before receiving his gunner's wings at Harlingen, Texas. He had flown 32 missions over Central Europe, and was awarded the Air Medal with an Oak Leaf Cluster, the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Leon L. Gionet

Private, U. S. Army

While resisting an enemy counterattack near Liacotico, Italy, Private Leon L. Gionet, an infantryman with the 5th Army, was struck and killed by a shell fragment July 13, 1944. Gionet joined the Army on September 15, 1943 at Fort Devens, trained at Camp Wheeler and embarked for Italy in February, 1944. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Lionel P. E. Girard

Second Lieutenant, U. S. Army

Second Lieutenant Lionel P. E. Girard was killed on May 25, 1944 when the B-24 Liberator, on which he was a co-pilot, accidentally crashed during a routine flight from Will Rogers Field, Oklahoma. Girard joined the service in January, 1943. He received his basic training at Atlantic City, attended the pre-flight school at Maxwell Field, Alabama and was commissioned a pilot at Stuttgart, Arkansas on December 5, 1943.



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Arthur W. Goulet

Private, U. S. Army

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As the result of an accident

at Bard College, Columbia University,

where he was stationed, Private Arthur W. Goulet died

in West Point Station Hospital, New York, September 16, 1943.


Goulet joined the service at Fort Devens in March, 1943

and had trained at Fort McClellan, Alabama.

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Arthur H. Gustafson

Fireman First Class, U. S. Navy

Fireman First Class Arthur H. Gustafson contracted spinal meningitis while in the Navy and died on August 22, 1943.

Awarded the European-African-Middle Eastern, the American and the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbons, he was assigned to both the submarine and tank transport service before becoming an instructor at Miami, Florida. Gustafson joined the Navy on April 23, 1942 in Springfield, Massachusetts; trained at Great Lakes, Illinois and Portsmouth, Virginia and was on active duty in the African, South Pacific, Cuban and Canal Zone areas.



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Frank H. Hadley

Private, U. S. Marine Corps

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Private Frank H. Hadley died

after a brief illness

at Parris Island, South Carolina on

January 18, 1943.

He had been in training there

after entering the Marine Corps in December, 1942.

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Edward L. Hines

Private, U. S. Army

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Private Edward L. Hines was killed in action at St. Lô, France, on July 3, 1944 after his company had fought its way inland from the Normandy beachhead.

Attached to the 358th Infantry, Hines joined the Army in September, 1943 and trained at Camp Wheeler, Georgia and Camp Shanks, New York. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Roger W. Holt

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

A member of the 13th Air Force, Staff Sergeant Roger W. Holt took part in the bombing of Truk and the Palau Islands before losing his life over Pelelieu on August 28, 1944 while on his twenty-fourth mission. Holt entered the service on November 2, 1942 at Fort Devens, received his wings at Fort Myers, Florida and was stationed at March Field, California before going overseas in April, 1944. He was awarded the Purple Heart, Air Medal with Oak Leaf Clusters, Presidential Unit Citation and the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon.



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Yuven E. Ingle

Private First Class, U. S. Army

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On December 3, 1944, Private First Class Yuven E. Ingle
was killed in action near Luden, Germany
as the result of shell-fragment wounds.

Ingle joined the service on April 15, 1944 at
Fort Sheridan, Illinois and trained at Camp Robinson, Arkansas
and was assigned to the 413th Infantry.

He was awarded the Purple Heart
and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater
Ribbon with one Battle Star.



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Frederick L. Jensen

Sergeant, U. S. Army

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As gunner-photographer on a B-24 Liberator

with the 15th Air Force in Italy, Sergeant Frederick L. Jensen was killed on his nineteenth mission November 20, 1944 over Jugoslavia. Jensen entered the Army in July, 1943 and before receiving his gunner's wings at Harlingen, Texas trained at Keesler Field, Mississippi and the University of Alabama. He was awarded the Air Medal, Purple Heart, European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with one Battle Star and received the Presidential Unit Citation for his part in the bombing of the Ploesti Oil Fields.



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Carl H. Johnson

Private, U. S. Army

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Private Carl H. Johnson entered the service at Fort Devens on February 23, 1944 and was killed near Aachen, Germany on November 19 of the same year. An infantryman in the 117th Division, Johnson took his basic training at Camp Wheeler and embarked from Fort Meade in August, 1944. Prior to his death he saw action in Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Nils S. Johnson

Sergeant, U. S. Army

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Sergeant Nils S. Johnson, who served in the Quartermaster Division, 8th Air Force, was killed in England on March 24, 1944 when a plane crashed into his barracks. Johnson wore the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon and had been in England nearly a year at the time of his death. He joined the Army at Fort Devens on February 4, 1942, received his basic training at Camp Lee, Virginia and attended the Quartermaster School in Orlando, Florida.



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Walter F. Johnson

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

During the invasion of Leyte, Staff Sergeant Walter F. Johnson was reported missing in action on January 2, 1945 when his commando transport plane failed to return from a mission to Biak, Netherlands East Indies.

He was officially presumed dead a year later. Johnson entered service on March 16, 1942 at Fort Devens. He received his training at Johnson Field, North Carolina, Columbia, South Carolina, and Willow Run, Michigan, before he went overseas in October, 1944 with the 7th Combat-Cargo Squadron. He was awarded the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon.



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Allan O. Ketola

Private First Class, U. S. Army

On February 10, 1945, Private First Class Allan O. Ketola was killed in action during the battle for Luzon. He entered the Army at Fort Devens on March 1, 1943, received his basic training at Camp Croft, became a member of the U. S. Army Ski Troops at Camp Carson, and was stationed at Kiska, Alaska until the end of 1943. After a short furlough, he embarked for the Pacific Theater. Ketola's awards included the Purple Heart, Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars, Philippine Liberation Medal and the American Theater Ribbon.



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
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Edward J. Kunzer, Jr.

Second Lieutenant, U. S. Army

Lieutenant Edward J. Kunzer, Jr. lost his life when the A-20 Havoc Attack Bomber he was piloting was knocked down by enemy fire over Negros Island on April 19, 1945. Kunzer entered the armed forces on September 23, 1942 at Camp Grant, Illinois and was stationed at Madura Island in the Philippines at the time of his death. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon.



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Nicholas G. MacKoul

Second Lieutenant, U. S. Army

Second Lieutenant Nicholas G. MacKoul, attached to the 15th Air Force in Italy, lost his life over Wuerenlingen, Switzerland on Christmas Day, 1944 while flying his fifty-second mission. MacKoul joined the Army in November, 1942, trained at Santa Ana and Lemoore Army Air Fields in California, and received his wings at Williams Field, Arizona.

For his achievements, MacKoul was awarded the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with five Battle Stars, the Purple Heart, and the Presidential Unit Citation for his part in the bombing of the Ploesti Oil Fields.



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Robert MacMillan

Private, U. S. Army

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Private Robert MacMillan

died on January 28, 1943 at Camp Hood, Texas

while serving with a tank destroyer battalion.

MacMillan joined the service

at Fort Devens December 23, 1942.

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Dominick W. Marrone

Private, U. S. Army

Private Dominick W. Marrone was killed on September 18, 1944 while in action with the 9th Army in Holland. Attached to the 30th Infantry Division, Marrone entered the Army in December, 1943 and trained at Camp Croft, South Carolina, Fort Meade, Maryland, and Camp Kilmer, New Jersey. He was awarded the Purple Heart, European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars and the Belgian Fourragère.



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John McCracken, Jr.

First Lieutenant, U. S. Army

Flying his second mission over Germany

on December 4, 1944, First Lieutenant John McCracken, Jr. was killed when the B-24 Liberator on which he was navigator was shot down. After receiving basic training at Camp Edwards in March, 1941, McCracken trained as an engineer at Camp Belvoir, Virginia and was commissioned at Camp Gordon, Florida.

Later, he transferred to the Air Forces and after pre-flight instruction at Santa Ana received his navigator's wings at Hondo, Texas. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Robert H. McFeely

Corporal, U. S. Army

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On October 9, 1943, Corporal Robert H. McFeely
was killed in England during an air raid attack.

McFeely, who joined the Army at Fort Devens on May 9, 1942
and trained at Miami, Florida, Lincoln, Nebraska, and Chanute
Field, Illinois, was stationed in England as a mechanic
in the Air Corps at the time of his death. He wore
the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Bernard L. McGann

Private First Class, U. S. Army

On October 10, 1944 while fighting at Aachen, Germany with the 9th Army, Private Bernard L. McGann received battle wounds from which he died two days later.

McGann entered the Army at Fort Devens in September, 1943 and received basic training at Camp Blanding, Florida.

He was awarded the Silver Star for "gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety," the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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John F. McKeon


Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

Staff Sergeant John F. McKeon was killed in an airplane crash near Freetown, Africa on April 19, 1942 while on a special assignment with a group of technicians. McKeon joined the Army in November, 1940 and trained at Fort Devens and the Raritan Arsenal, Edgewood, New Jersey. He wore the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Robert E. Nelson

Apprentice Seaman, U. S. Navy

On January 27, 1942 off the coast of Panama,

Robert E. Nelson lost his life

when his submarine, the "S-26", went down with all hands

after a collision with an escort vessel. Nelson joined the Navy

December 1, 1941 and trained at Newport, Rhode Island.

He had been in the Panama area for only one month.

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Charles Albert Newton

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

Staff Sergeant Charles Albert Newton, a nose gunner on a bomber, with a record of several missions over Germany and holder of the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon, was killed in Chelveston, England on November 15, 1943.

In November, 1942 Newton joined the armed forces at Fort Devens, Massachusetts and before going overseas trained at Atlantic City, New Jersey, Kingman, Arizona, Salt Lake City, Utah, and Scott Field, Illinois.



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Joseph L. O'Bara

Private First Class, U. S. Army

On November 17, 1944 in the Po Valley north of Florence, Italy, Private First Class Joseph L. O'Bara was killed by a mortar blast while standing guard duty. An infantryman in the 91st Division, 5th Army, O'Bara entered the service in December, 1943 at Fort Devens, trained at Camp Shelby, Mississippi and embarked from Fort Meade in July, 1944 to take part in the Italian Campaign. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Martin J. O'Brien

Second Lieutenant, U. S. Marine Corps

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Leading his platoon in a courageous assault
against enemy-held fortifications on Guam, Second Lieutenant

Martin J. O'Brien was mortally wounded July 22, 1944.

For his courageous action in this assault he was awarded the Navy
Cross. He also received the Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific
Theater Ribbon with Battle Star. A member of the
Third Division, O'Brien entered the Marines
in February, 1943; trained at Parris Island; and was
commissioned at Quantico, Virginia.



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Frederick L. Oickle

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

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Flying as top turret gunner on a bomber in the Pacific Theater, Sergeant Frederick L. Oickle was reported lost in action on March 11, 1944 after his airplane failed to return from its first mission over Rabaul.

He was officially presumed dead on January 24, 1946. Oickle entered the Army in May, 1942 and received his wings at Tyndall Field, Florida in January, 1943.

He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon.

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Jorma Palonen

Private, U. S. Army

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Wounded in action on October 11,

Private Jorma Palonen died in Italy on November 21, 1944.

Palonen entered the service at Fort Devens on January 10, 1944,

trained at Camp Croft, South Carolina and embarked

from Fort Meade, Maryland in early October

for the Italian Campaign. He received the Purple Heart and

the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.

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Victor L. Peristere

Pharmacist's Mate Second Class, U. S. Navy

A survivor of eight Channel crossings during the Normandy invasion,

Pharmacist's Mate Second Class Victor L. Peristere died from exhaustion and exposure when his ship went down 700 miles off the coast of Virginia on September 13, 1944. Peristere joined the Navy in September, 1943 and trained at the Newport and Norfolk Naval Bases. He wore the European-African-Middle Eastern

Theater Ribbon with Battle Star.

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Jefferson D. Pierce, III

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army



While on a reconnaissance patrol north of Metz on October 24, 1944, Staff Sergeant Jefferson D. Pierce, III received wounds from which he died ten days later in a German prison hospital. Pierce entered the Army in March, 1941, attended the Camp Richie Intelligence School, and trained at Fort Dix. He served in the 90th Division and took an active part in the Normandy invasion and fought with his company through France to Luxembourg. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Thomas J. Reilly, Jr.

Sergeant, U. S. Army

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On September 17, 1944 Sergeant Thomas J. Reilly, Jr. was killed by intense enemy fire encountered while he was leading a reconnaissance patrol into German territory near Metz. After joining the Army in January, 1942 Reilly trained at Camp Lockett, California, Fort Riley, Kansas, Fort Benning, Georgia, and Fort Jackson, South Carolina. He participated in the Normandy invasion and was awarded a Bronze Star for "outstanding service," the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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Norman F. Schofield

Corporal, U. S. Marine Corps

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Corporal Norman F. Schofield lost his life

September 19, 1944 on Pelelieu in the Palau Islands.

A member of the First Division, he joined the service at Boston
in April, 1942 and trained at Parris Island, South Carolina before
leaving for the Pacific area. He was awarded the Purple Heart
and the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with one Battle Star.



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Albert Stuart Simpson

Private, U. S. Army

Shortly after recovering from wounds received near Faulquemont, France, Private Albert Stuart Simpson of the 3rd Army was killed on January 8, 1945 at Dahl, Luxembourg during the Battle of the Bulge.

Prior to his death, Simpson took part in more than ten battles including the Utah beachhead operations. He entered the Army on February 15, 1943 at Fort Devens, was assigned to the Ski Troops at Camp Hale, Colorado, transferred to desert maneuvers in September, 1943 and went overseas in June, 1944. In addition to two Purple Hearts, he was awarded the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with Battle Stars.



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William A. Stenmark

Sergeant, U. S. Army

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On Christmas Day, 1944

Sergeant William A. Stenmark died of injuries he received
in an automobile accident at Smyrna Army Air Field, Tennessee.

Stenmark joined the Army in May, 1942.

He was assigned to the Air Forces and received ground
crew training at Miami Beach, Florida and Maxwell Field, Alabama.



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Rudolph Ernest Toko

Gunner's Mate Third Class, U. S. Navy

Gunner's Mate Third Class Rudolph Ernest Toko lost his life on December 3, 1944 when his ship was torpedoed and sunk off Antwerp. Toko entered the service at Boston, Massachusetts on May 18, 1943. After training at Newport and Brooklyn, he made numerous Atlantic crossings on convoy duty and took part in D-Day operations at Omaha beachhead. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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Franklin S. Wescott

Flight Officer, U. S. Army

As navigating officer aboard a B-24 Liberator attached to the 5th Air Force, Flight Officer Franklin S. Wescott was killed in action over Mindoro, Philippine Islands on April 7, 1945. Wescott entered the service in July, 1943 and trained at Greensboro, North Carolina and Mount Union College, Alliance, Ohio, before graduating as a flight officer from San Antonio Army Air Field, Texas in January, 1944. In September, 1944 Wescott received his navigator's wings at Selma Field, Louisiana then transferred to Walla Walla, Washington for advanced training. He was awarded the Purple Heart and the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon.



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Arthur A. Wickstrom

Staff Sergeant, U. S. Army

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Staff Sergeant Arthur A. Wickstrom was killed March 4, 1944 while fighting on Bougainville in the Solomons.

After joining the service in March, 1941 Wickstrom trained at Camp Edwards and Fort Bragg, then studied jungle fighting tactics for several months in New Caledonia. He was awarded the Purple Heart, Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon with two Battle Stars and received a Presidential Unit Citation for his part in the Tulagi and Guadalcanal Campaign.



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Walter S. Zawalich

Private, U. S. Army

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Fighting with Patton's Third Army,

Private Walter S. Zawalich was killed in action
at Wisbeck, Germany on April 11, 1945. Zawalich joined
the Army in September, 1944 and trained at Fort McClellan,
Alabama until March, 1945 when he went overseas. He was
awarded the Purple Heart and the European-African-
Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon.



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
