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Foreword . . .

"Schuyler Against the World" is a catchy slogan; but "Schuyler Serves Democracy" is a vital ideal. To worthily perpetuate the memory of those who served in World War II is the purpose of this book.

We have come through the most stupendous struggle in history. The destiny of millions of people rested in its outcome. The total cost in lives, homes and resources is a challenge to the imagination. Schuyler County took up the challenge in every way possible. Its citizens helped carry the fight to the four corners of the earth until there no longer existed a threat to the things in which we believed and for which we were willing to give our lives. For those who made the supreme sacrifice, no honor can do them or their loved ones justice. For every person in the armed forces there were many more at home who did their part to keep the supplies flowing steadily.

This is the price we had to pay for our freedom. May the causes which created this human tragedy be written so deeply into the hearts and minds of all persons so that no such similar action shall ever have to be taken again.

The historical value of this record of Schuyler's contribution will increase more and more as the years go by. The county has lost much by not having such a record of the veterans of World War I. Such a project was started but not completed because of a lack of public appreciation and support. To bridge this gap, as much as now possible, an Honor Roll of World War I has been added to the contents of this book.

Now is the time to compile and distribute such a volume as this while the memories of survivors are keen and relatives and friends can supplement government records of enlistment, areas served, decorations received, etc. The true value of this record cannot be appreciated at this time. It includes Schuyler boys inducted in other counties where they were currently employed. Some information on nearly 1500 World War II veterans is given with photograph, where obtainable, while only some 1200 are listed on the Honor Roll in the Court House. This is a measure of thoroughness and completeness seldom attained in similar projects, especially if promoted by outside interests.

This book is a product of the "Free Enterprise" system yet prevailing in our U.S.A. It is hoped that the unstinting energy and time spent by those compiling and editing this historically valuable material will be rewarded by the full co-operation of all citizens of Schuyler who take a pride in her people and history.

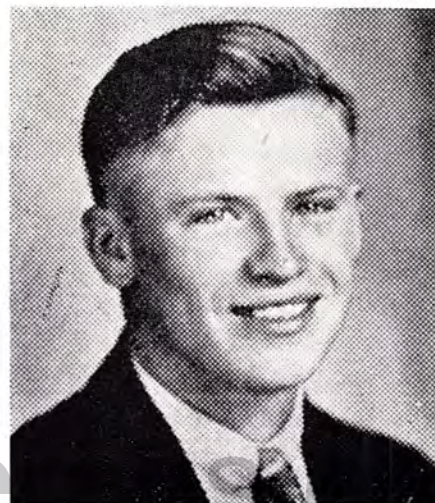


Bedenbender, Ralph Owen

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bedenbender of Woodstock Township. Born in 1917 in Brown County. Inducted into the Army, August 19, 1943, and was shipped overseas from Fort Ord, California, October 19, 1944. He was killed in action on Luzon, February 19, 1945, while serving with Co. D of the 108th Infantry.

Blurton, Ralph

Corporal. Enlisted at Peoria, Illinois, in February, 1940. Died in Japanese prison camp, Cabanatuah, of Beriberi, November 26, 1942, where he had been held following the fall of Bataan in the Philippines. This information received by his sister, Mrs. Lyle Nelson of Rushville, July 18, 1943.



Brackett, Robert W.

Private First Class. Son of Mrs. Della Brackett, now of Quincy, Illinois. Entered service September 11, 1944, at Ft. Sheridan, Illinois. After basic training with the 193rd Infantry he was shipped to the Hawaiian Islands and from there to Okinawa where he was killed May 31, 1945, while serving with Co. F, 382nd Infantry in the 96th Division.



Cady, Marshall

Private First Class. Son of Rev. and Mrs. H. M. Cady of Vienna, Illinois, formerly of Rushville. Killed at Raffatsbrand, Germany, December 13, 1944, while serving as a rifleman with the Third Army. He was sent to Camp Kilmer, N. J., in railway car No. 13. His unit was at Camp Kilmer 13 days and then embarked for England on October 13, 1944. The trip required 13 days. His unit was in England 13 days and then was sent to the European Continent where on December 13, the day of the first attack at Raffatsbrand, Marshall was killed.



Cole, Walter LaVerne

Private First Class. Son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Cole of Buenavista Township. Enlisted June 14, 1943. Was killed December 9, 1944, while serving with Patton's Army in Germany.

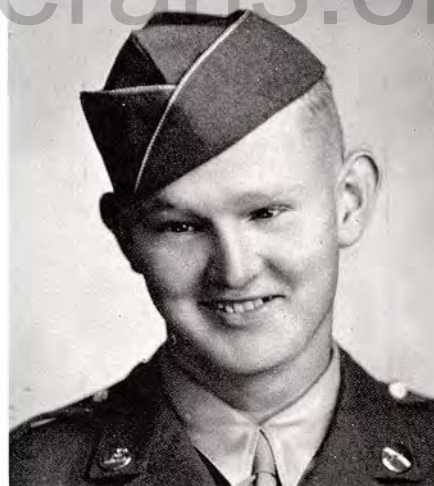


Conrad, Charles L.

Staff Sergeant. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Forest Conrad of Peoria, former residents of Bainbridge Township. Killed at Iwo Jima, February 8, 1945. After leaving the target an enemy plane crashed into his plane, both aircraft went down. Charles enlisted before the war and was an engineer on a B-24 Liberator bomber. He had made his required number of missions and was on voluntary duty when killed.

Constable, Stanley

Private. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Constable of Rushville. Stanley was a machine gunner in Co. B, 134th Infantry. He was killed in action, August 13, 1944, near Mortain, France. Interment in St. James United States Military Cemetery near Rennes, France.



Corman, Edward J., Jr.

Captain. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed J. Corman of Littleton Township. Killed in action in Germany, March 26, 1945, as a member of an airborne division.



Cunningham, Charles L.

Staff Sergeant. Grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Boyles of Rushville. Charles was reported missing in action from a plane mission over Borneo on October 18, 1944. He has since been declared officially dead.

Doyle, William Henry

Corporal. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Doyle of Rushville. Died April 28, 1945, of injuries received in action as a Rifleman on Guam.



French, George D.

Lieutenant. Brother of Mrs. William Bigham of Rushville. Died in a hospital in England May 13, 1944, as the result of wounds received while on a bombing mission over Germany.

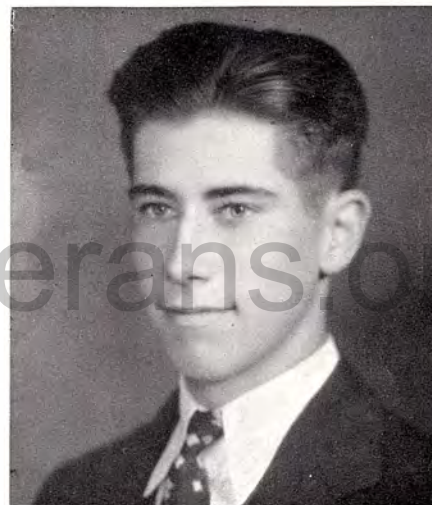
Gillenwater, Gayle C.

Fireman First Class. Son of Mr. Charles Haffner of Canton. Killed in action at Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, a member of the crew of the ill-fated "Arizona."



Hendricks, Archie

Technical Sergeant. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Hendricks of Ray. Killed in action, January 20, 1945, in Luxembourg.





Homberger, Howard G.

Second Lieutenant. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Homberger of Plymouth, Illinois. Killed in the crash of a heavy bomber from the Alamogordo Air Base, New Mexico, April 18, 1943.

Ingles, Harold

Lieutenant. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ingles of Coatsburg, Illinois, former residents of Camden township. Pilot of a B-29 bomber. Killed in action over Yugoslavia, November 7, 1945.



Jones, Dean W.

Corporal (Technician Fifth Grade). Son of Mr. and Mrs. Cleve Jones of Rushville. Killed in action on the morning of March 9, 1945, during an attack on enemy positions in Germany in which his company was engaged. He was killed instantly. He was awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge for exemplary conduct in action against the enemy. Dean was very devoted and loyal to his organization and strived to make it the best in the army.

Jones, Frank J.

Chief (U. S. Naval Reserve). Son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Jones of Rushville. Died of dysentery on July 25, 1942, while held a prisoner of war in the Cabaatuan Camp in the Philippines. Frank enlisted in the navy at the age of 19 and served 23 years. He spent three years in the Asiatic Theater and was stationed at Manila when reported missing in action.



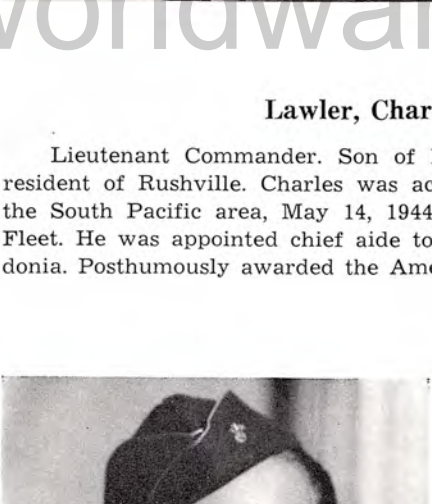
Kirkham, Verlin P.

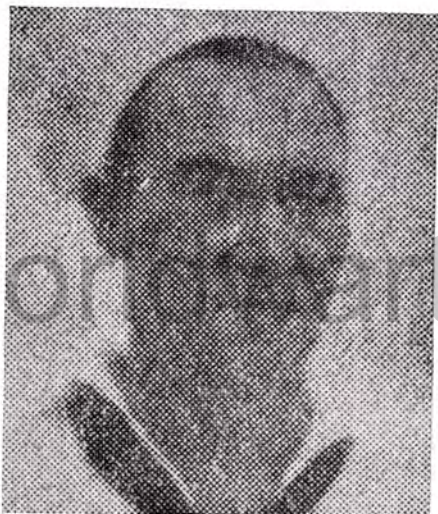
Lawler, Charles H.

Sergeant. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Oliver of Blandinsville, Illinois, former residents of Camden township. Killed in action on Iwo Jima, March 1, 1945, while serving with the First Marines, Second Division, Company C.



Overfelt, W. Fenton

Technical Sergeant. Son of Mrs. Bessie Overfelt Stroup. He enlisted in the army, February, 1941. Was sent overseas in November, 1944, where he became attached to General Patch's Seventh Army, first in the quartermaster branch and later in the infantry. He was killed in Germany on April 7, 1945.



Poole, Wilson J.

Corporal. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Poole, formerly of Rushville. Killed in action near Cefula, Sicily, July 27, 1943. Wilson served with the 2nd Armored Division, 180th Cannon Co., through the Mediterranean and African campaigns.



Shores, John R.

Lieutenant. Son of Rev. and Mrs. R. L. Shores of Rushville. Reported missing on a bombing mission near Cape Bon, off the coast of Tunisia on October 14, 1943. Reported officially dead as of October 15, 1944. John was a bombardier on a B-17.



Taylor, Carl Wayne

Aviation Ordnanceman Third Class. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael H. Taylor of Rushville. Carl was a member of one of two PBM Mariners of Patrol Bombing Squadron 18 that took off from Kerama Retto, Okinawa at 0630, May 15, 1945, on a routine search and reconnaissance mission of Tsushima Straits area. At 1045 the planes sighted a 200-ton freighter and proceeded to sink it with their bombs. Some 10 miles to the north they encountered a 3500-ton freighter; and after making two direct hits with their bombs, the freighter exploded. Immediately they spotted another freighter of about 4000 tons. They attacked this ship and left it listing heavily. Out of bombs, the planes headed for home with only enough rounds of ammunition to stand off enemy fighters. Off Kemino Shima the planes were attacked by enemy fighters. Carl's plane was attacked by a fighter coming head-on at his ship. Carl shot this plane down; but the enemy plane had scored hits also. Both

planes dropped into the ocean at about the same spot. The PBM exploded upon hitting the water and sent a column of smoke and water 300 feet into the air. The area was searched for 24 hours with no traces of survivors in the heavy seas. His home ship was the USS St. George. Carl was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.



Turner, Aubrey E.

Private First Class. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Byron Turner. Died July 31, 1944, in a station hospital at Pearl Harbor from pneumonia. Most of his life was spent in the environs of Lewistown, Missouri, with the exception of a few years in Huntsville, Illinois.





Tweedell, William

Staff Sergeant. Son of Mr. and Mrs. William Tweedell of Beardstown, Illinois, former residents of Rushville. Sergeant Tweedell was born October 30, 1916. He enlisted in the U. S. Army, April 2, 1942, and received his preliminary training at Fort Knox, Ky. He was sent overseas in November, 1944, and served with the 88th Mechanized Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron in Europe. He was overseas less than two months when killed in action in Northern France on January 22, 1945. His body now lies in Grand Faily Military cemetery in France.

Vincent, Ivan Ray

Seaman First Class. Son of Mrs. Gertrude Vincent of Camden township. Was reported missing as of October 24, 1944, on the carrier, Princeton. He has since been declared officially dead.



Young, Marion R.

Aviation Radioman Third Class. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Young of Oakland township. Reported missing in action January 7, 1945, when he was on a bombing mission from a carrier in the Pacific war area. He has since been declared officially dead.

Wherley, Russell W.

Private First Class. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Wherley of Hickory township. Killed in action near Taconada, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on January 29, 1945. Private Wherley was a member of the crew of a self-propelled howitzer being moved in defilade behind a recently captured hill. Two enemy tanks suddenly appeared around the side of the hill, at an angle to which the howitzer could not be traversed. While the driver attempted to drive the carriage into firing position, Private Wherley moved to the machine gun mounted at the side of the carriage. Sitting on the tube of the howitzer and completely exposed to fire from the advancing tanks, he trained the machine gun on the tanks and delivered steady fire. An artillery shell hit the tracks of the howitzer, stopped it completely and wounded every member of the crew. As his comrades left the vehicle to take cover, Private Wherley, though himself wounded, remained at his gun and covered their withdrawal. A moment later another shell struck the mount and he was fatally wounded. Private Wherley's outstanding heroism in voluntarily holding a position of great and obvious danger, in the face of heavy fire at the cost of his life, reflects the highest traditions of the military service. Private Wherley was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for his heroic deed.



Winston, Elmo Dean

Sergeant. Entered the army on April 2, 1942. He was sent overseas, January 2, 1944. He participated in the second invasion of France and was killed in action in the Cherbourg drive on August 2, 1944. Interment was in St. James U. S. Military cemetery, Lot C, Row 7, Grave 159, near Rennes, France.



Winston, Merle

Private First Class (Infantry). Entered the army, July 18, 1942. Was sent overseas April 25, 1944. Private Winston was killed in action on July 25, 1944, in France. Interment was in the St. Mere Eglise U. S. Military Cemetery No. 2, France, Plot J, Row 3, Grave 54. He spent most of his life near Browning.

Ward, Lyle D.

Lieutenant. Son of Mrs. Walter Tolles of Rushville. Killed in action in Germany, April 3, 1945, while serving with the infantry near Kassel, Germany. Those appearing in the picture are, left to right: Gene, Mrs. Jeanne Ward, Billy, and Lt. Ward.

RUSHVILLE, ILLINOIS: In 1826 — when Fort Dearborn yet stood on the present site of the City of Chicago — pioneers who had followed after Father Marquette up the meandering course of the Illinois river, came inland some nine miles north and west, and founded what is now the City of Rushville, Illinois. It was incorporated as a Village in 1831.

Here, on an elevation that overlooks the rolling hills to the south, and the wide prairies to the north, these early settlers availed themselves of their opportunity and set up homes, established business houses, erected schools and churches, and made welcome others who came by steamboat on the Illinois river, and by stage-coach overland from points along the Mississippi. The growing Village soon became a Town, and finally came under a form of City government.

Situated near the geographical center of Schuyler county, Rushville, the county seat, stands today at the intersection of U. S. Routes 24 and 67 — the hub of the Illinois system of paved highways in Western Illinois — about an equal distance from the industrial cities of Peoria, to the northeast, Springfield, the State Capital, to the east, Quincy, and Keokuk, (Iowa), on the Mississippi river to the west.

Well may Rushville and Schuyler County proclaim today their business houses, their modern homes, their paved highways, their wide shady streets, their fine farms, their churches, their schools — and the loyalty of their citizens to both State and Nation in time of peace or in time of war. Theirs is an all-American community, set in the wide open spaces of the Midwest.

For more than a century, Rushville and Schuyler County have sent their youth to the larger cities to play an important part in the industrial, commercial, financial, and political life of the nation. From their farms have gone livestock and foodstuffs to the markets of surrounding cities. From their churches have gone able scholars, ministers and missionaries. From their schools, sparked by good high school bands and cheer leaders, students have ranged far and wide in quest of trophies and awards for athletic prowess. And from all of these institutions have gone their young men and women to the far-flung battle fronts of the world in quest of a permanent and lasting peace — so universally desired by the peoples of all nations.

Rushville, a City of 3,000 population, gained its national prominence as a recreational center when, in 1921, the Scripps homestead farm was donated to the City by E. W. Scripps, founder of the Scripps-Howard newspaper syndicate, and other members of this family, whose forebears settled here in 1844. This gift to the City included the 80-acre farm home, a \$100,000 community house, golf course, swimming pool, athletic field, and community playground — all of which are widely patronized by the citizens of Western Illinois.

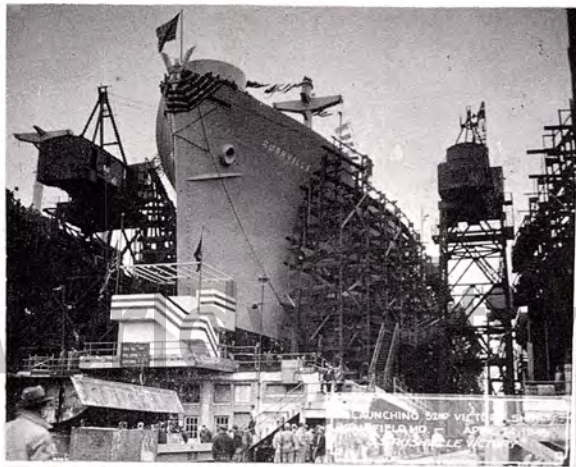
Rushville is now signally honored by having this ship carry the name — Rushville Victory — to which ship, and to its worthy crew, the citizens of Rushville, and of Schuyler County, extend the wish — Bon Voyage!

S S Rushville Victory

Rushville was the second city in the state to have a Victory ship named after it. Names were selected for Victory ships built at the Bethlehem-Fairfield Shipyards in Baltimore, Maryland, by the U. S. Maritime Commission after extensive historical research was made of all towns of small or medium population in the state. Rushville was selected as typical of the state because of its historical background and its part in the war effort.

The keel of the Rushville Victory was laid March 3, 1945, and was constructed in the short time of 52 days. It is 455 feet long, 62 feet wide, weighs 3,100 tons and cruises at a speed of 15.5 knots.

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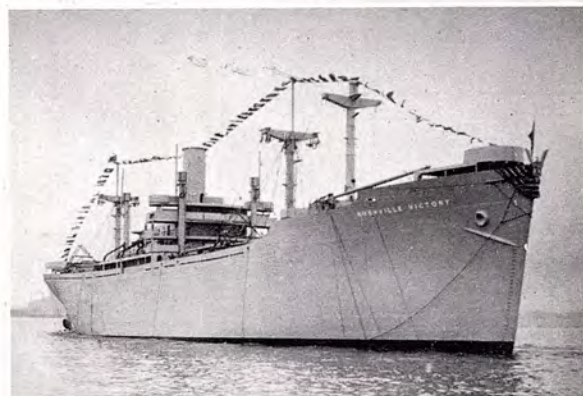

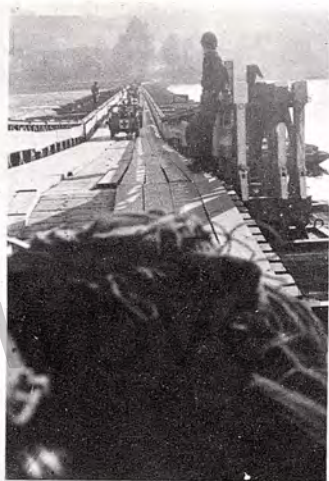

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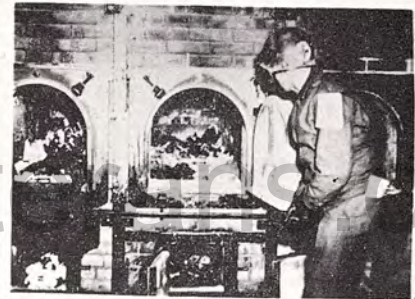

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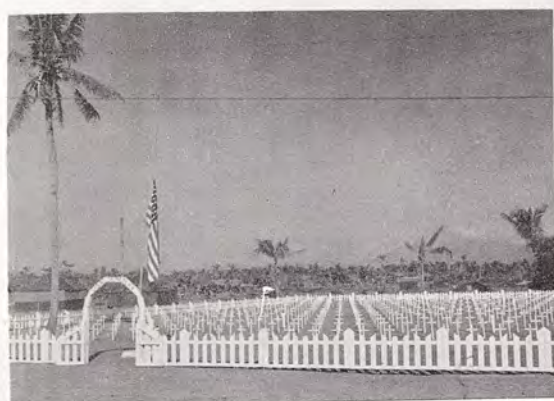

- August 7—U. S. Marines land on Guadalcanal and Tulagi in first major Allied offensive of the Pacific war.

- 10—Three American cruisers are lost in the battle of Savo Islands, north of Guadalcanal.
- 19—Commandos raid Dieppe.

- September 17—Germans penetrate Stalingrad.
- 25—Japanese turned back from Port Moresby.

- October 23—British break Axis line at El Alamein.

- November 3—Rommel beaten near Alamein.
- 8—Allies land in North Africa.
- 13-15—U. S. wins decisive naval victory at Guadalcanal as 16 Japanese warships and four transports are sunk.
