



### THE EIGHTH IN ACTION

Failure to get into action during World War I was no fault of the Eighth Infantry Division. It was simply a question of being beaten to the punch by the arrival of the Armistice. As a consequence, the Eighth Division was, prior to Normandy D-Day, young in both experience and point of service. It was young in service for it had been activated first in January 1918. It was young in point of experience because it was just preparing to move out of its training camps in France and up to the front lines when that November morning in 1918 occurred.

To offset this dual handicap, the Eighth took into its re-activated organization, I July 1940, units which had impressive histories of long and meritorious service. In some cases this service dated as far back as the beginnings of our constitutional government.


None of the units which now comprise the Eighth Division was to be found in the original organization: 13th, 28th and 121st Infantry Regiments, Special Troops Units and Division Artillery Battalions.

So it was that, although the Division, as such, was untried, it hit Omaha Beach, Normandy, France, on 4 July 1944, with units of highly colorful tradition.

Here, as a member of the VIII Corps, which had gained the barest of footholds on the enemy's shore, the Eighth Division had only to wait four days before attacking to the south in the La Haye Du Puits sector. For the first five gruelling days of combat experience for the young, untried Division, it advanced rapidly against stiff, well-organized resistance, until, on 13 July, it reached the hard-earned north bank of the Ay River. The Division dug in and held on until 26 July, when it effected a difficult crossing of the Ay to establish the bridgehead which was to enable the ramaining units of the VIII Corps and the Fourth and Sixth Armored Divisions to rupture the wall of resistance and spill over into Brittany and Northern France.

Racing closely behind these pile-driving units, the Eighth Division rolled up impressive advances, moving rapidly through Coutances, Granville and Avranches, against a Germany Army which was showing the strain by becoming increasingly disorganized.

Driving relentlessly south from Avranches, the Division had seized the key communications city of Rennes by nightfall of 3 August. Here, for the next ten days, the Division dug in for the valiant defense of this nerve center which was so vitally important to the suc-





cess of the Allied offensive. While they were still carrying out this tremendous mission, the Division's 121st Infantry Regiment was temporarily attached to the 83rd Division to take part in the fiercely bitter fighting then going on in the St. Malo area. In the course of this fighting, the 121st took Dinard by storm on 14 August, sweeping aside the stubbornly resisting German garrison.

From Rennes, the Division, preceded by a task force of 28th Infantrymen, then made another rapid move to Brest, this time by motor. Shortly after noon of 25 August the Division, together with other chosen units of the VIII Corps, began the battle for this iron-bound, seemingly impregnable French port which, with its excellent harbor and docking facilities, was to prove to be one of the strongest links in the chain that was ultimately to bind the muscles of the arrogant monster, Germany. It was among the bitterest of fighting the Division was to experience. And the Division gave an exemplary

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account of itself, trading blow for blow with the German garrison of 50,000 until just a week before the port finally fell.

Ordered out of its positions around Brest, the Division now moved to the Crozon Peninsula, a strongly-fortified finger of war-pocked land that continued to menace Brest from the south. In one of its most sparkling engagements, the Division over-ran the rugged enemy defenses in short time, completely routing the de-moralized and disorganized Germans. In just four days of brilliant in-fighting and team-work, the Division cleared the stubborn peninsula, bagging a total of more than 7,000 prisoners.


Dusting off its hands, the Division moved September 30, on to the Duchy of Luxembourg, where it assumed the task of holding a 23-mile sector of the Our River front.

Several weeks later, on 16 November, certain elements of the Division began to relieve comparable units of the 28th Division in the sector southeast of Aachen, Germany. From here, on 21 November, the Division began a hard drive through dense, forbidding forests, clinging mud and ever-present mines to seize the town of Hurtgen. Many casualties and exhausting difficulties were suffered in the Hurtgen Forest, for seven diffcult days. After one more day of slow, bloody and torturous street fighting, the town was captured on 28 November, paving the way for the next offensive: against the town of Kleinhau, which was summarily taken the next day.

In rapid succession, Brandenberg fell on 3 December and Bergstein on 5 December. Other foot troops of the Division fought their way through heavily mined woods and dug-in bunkers of concrete and logs to reach the Roer River along a six mile stretch, east of Bergstein.

Building efficient all-around defenses, the Division held its positions firmly during the powerful German counter-drive in mid-December. On 21 December, with a bleak Christmas in the offing, elements of the Division began a limited offensive, seizing the Roer River town of Obermaubach and the remaining enemy-held territory in the Division sector west of the Roer.

Well after a New Year's that had been as bleak as Christmas, the Division continued to hold. Not until early February did it move slightly north to take over a Roer River front opposite Duren and Niederau, on 23 February, the Division crossed the flood-swollen Roer, at the south flank of the great First and Ninth U. S. Army combined offensive. Troops of the Eighth Division cleared the stubborn south half of Duren on 25 February and drove to the Rhine in





a brief ten days, taking approximately 50 German towns, more than 10,000 prisoners; and destroying tons of equipment that the enemy could ill afford to lose.

The Division's 13th Infantry was attached to the Third Armored Division, cutting another wide, bleeding swath to the Rhine, and seizing the northern third of the key city of Cologne.

Still involved in the Cologne offensive, the Division, after six days in Corps Reserve, took over the Cologne-Bonn sector of the west bank of the Rhine, where it fought and held until the early days of the Remagen bridgehead. Then, on 28 March, troops of the Division began the move across the Rhine in the Remagen area. On the following day, the entire Division began its attack north of the Siegen area. As a result of this, Division elements crossed the Siegen

River on I April. After three days of fierce, determined enemy resistance, the city of Siegen fell.

Two days later, the Division, now integrated into the team of the XVIII Corps, began the drive which was to result in the entrapment or annihilation of more than 350,000 German troops. In a mere ten days, the Division rolled up a satisfying advance of more than sixty miles, seizing a total of nearly 200 towns and villages and capturing well over 48,000 completely beaten Wehrmacht veterans. With this outstanding successful completion of its mission, the Division next received orders to occupy and govern the Dusseldorf-Wuppertal-Wissen-Mulheim area.

Once again shifting to new commanders, the Division was ordered under the control of the British Second Army, with which organiza-






The troops which followed us entered Duren through the courtesy of the Eighth Division.

tion it crossed the Elbe River, early on the morning of 1 May, at Bleckede, which then marked the extreme northeast sector of the Allied front. A lightning stab toward the Baltic Sea netted more than a hundred German towns before the Division reached Schwerin at noon of 2 May. Here, at the capital city of the province of Meck-

lenberg, the Division halted and stepped aside to permit the British troops to sweep on to the Baltic.

By now, the disorganization and demoralization of the enemy were rushing toward a feverish climax, as was evidenced by the large bodies of German troops which marched up to surrender all along




the roads of advance. So great was the enemy's desire to capitulate that, by 4 May, when the final announcement of the surrender of all German troops in the north came, the division's bag of prisoners reached a grand total in excess of a quarter of a million men.

By 3 May, elements of the Division had made triumphant and joyous contact with the Russians, thus marking the end of the long and

arduous struggle to convince the hard-headed adversary that he was beaten.

And so, with the complete and ignominious capitulation of all German land, air and sea forces, the combat record of the Division in World War II was completed.

The Eighth Infantry Division had come of age in service and experience.

MOTTO: "First at Vicksburg."

SHIELD: Barry of four azure and argent, a saltire gules, and in fess two billets paleways sable fimbricated or each bearing four mullets of the second (the shoulder strap of a general of 1870.) CREST: On a wreath of the colors two palm branches saltirewise proper and thereon a McKeever Cartridge Box sable bearing the legend "Forty Rounds" "U.S."

DESCRIPTION: The four blue and white bars of the shield are the old and the present infantry colors and indicate the four wars (not including World War II) in which the regiment has participated. The saltire cross is from the Confederate battle flag with the color changed from blue to red. The billets are the shoulder The crest is the badge of the 15th Corps of 1863 and the motto.

To all of you who have fought so well with this Regiment I extend my deepest gratitude and admiration. I wish you all possible success, health, and happiness. Again I say,





#### **EXECUTIVE OFFICE** STATE OF MISSOURI

To the Officers and Men of the Eighth Infantry Division:

On behalf of the people of Missouri this message of Welcome is sent to the Officers and Men of the Eighth Infantry Division, now returned to the scene of their initial training at Fort Leonard Wood.

It is especially appropriate that this great Division, which prepared for overseas duty within our borders and which acquitted itself so gallantly in action, should be returned to Fort Leonard Wood after its overseas duty. We in Missouri remember your training period during the winter of 1942-1943, and have followed with pride the brilliant combat chapters of your history in this war.

The Golden Arrow doughboys, we recall, landed on the Normandy beaches on the Fourth of July, 1944—when Invasion was a tiny, 28-day-old beachhead. From that combat start the Eighth Division gallantly fought through ten consecutive months in the line, with only ten scattered days out of contact with the enemy. During those ten months the record of the Division was an outstanding one. The Golden Arrow doughboys took 316,000 prisoners—equal to thirty German divisions—one of the most amazing records made by any division in the Army. Your victory march led:

Through the hedgrows of Normandy, where the Eighth cracked the Ay River line and punched

a hole for the armor in the big breakthrough;

To the supposedly impenetrable fortifications of Brest, where you captured the Crozon Pen-insula and its defenders, including General Herman Bernard Ramcke, famed as the invader of Crete and commander of all German paratroops;

Into the frozen wastes of the Hurtgen Forest, one of the worst defensive positions encountered by any American unit in this war, where the Eighth ripped the Germans from the last bitterly defended fringes of the forest and captured the town of Hurtgen itself;

Across the swollen, torrential Roer River—the beginning of the last big drive—through the City of Duren, and over the plain to Cologne and the Rhine in a series of brilliant night attacks; To the Sieg River line broken by the Eighth in 10 days of savage fighting, during which Germans mounted 19 separate counterattacks; then a thrust—45 miles in eight days—through the center of the Ruhr Pocket to the Ruhr River, splitting the German armies in the pocket into two disorganized groups; and across the Elbe River for a swift drive which linked the Eighth with Russian forces pushing along the Baltic Coast from the East.

In ten months of combat your history shows that the Eighth Infantry Division took every one of its objectives, thrashed the enemy wherever it met him. These great results were not attained without sacrifice, however. Some 13,600 men were killed or wounded. Those who lost their lives will forever remain enshrined in the hearts of the people of this state as heroes who paid the supreme sacrifice that this nation might live in freedom. Despite its losses, the Eighth maintained its high morale, and according to the annals of the Division, fought its way always forward, taking the inevitable wounds of war as they came. In the words of your gallant commander, Major General Bryant E. Moore: "The courage and fortitude of the Golden Arrow doughboys under fatigue and privation is impossible to describe. The speed and valor with which they accomplished their hazardous assignments will never be forgotten."

Missouri is honored to welcome back the distinguished veterans of a distinguished Army unit which covered itself with glory—the Eighth Golden Arrow Infantry Division. The affection and best wishes of the people of this state will always be with you, the veterans of the Eighth, wherever your paths may take you and whatever you may do in the days to come.

### HISTORY OF THE 13TH INFANTRY REGIMENT

#### PRIOR TO THE CIVIL WAR

War Department records of the 13th Infantry prior to its reconstitution in 1861 are unavailable. It is established, however, that during the first post-war expansion of the United States Army, following the Revolution, the 13th Regiment of infantry was formed July 16, 1798, and was mustered out January 11, 1800.

The War of 1812, however, saw the reconstitution of the Regiment on January 11th of the same year. From then until May 17, 1815, when it was consolidated with the Fifth Infantry, it took part in a long series of engagements. On October 10, 1812, after several months of strenuous training, the 13th took part in the capture of Lewiston on the Canadian border. Three days later, October 13th, it captured Queenston Heights, and according to records of the Buffalo Historical Society, "outside of the casualties of war—the death of the distinguished British General Brock—it had no military significance for us to record except the introduction into history of the gallant 13th Regiment of U. S. Infantry, so dear to the whole frontier, but especially the Niagara frontier."

The city of Buffalo raised a monument to the 13th at Fort Porter in commemoration of its outstanding service.

In 1813, a company of the 13th Infantry, after considerable loss, captured a British battery at Black Rock. A few days later an attack was made on Fort George with the Regiment supporting General (then Lt. Col.) Winfield Scott's artillery. For some obscure reason the 13th was known at that time as "the Jolly Snorters," and as such were exhorted by Capt. Myers in this successful battle during which the British were forced back to "12-mile creek."

Continual skirmishes followed on the northern frontier in most of which the 13th took part. Then came the final battle of Plattsburg, September 11, 1814, when the American General Macomb, with 1500 men and a small naval detachment defeated a mixed army and navy command composed of 15,000 of Wellington's veteran's.

There was no more active service for the 13th until the Mexican War, the record of which is unavailable, although a roster of officers is in existence.

#### THE CIVIL WAR

The service of the Regiment from May 3, 1861, to date is continuous. Reconstituted on that date, with General W. T. Sherman as its Colonel, and General Philip Sheridan as one of its original Captains, the Regiment continued to render outstanding service. Less than three weeks after President Lincoln's call for 75,000 volunteers the reconstitution was completed, and soon after, the 13th was given the uncongenial task of guarding prisoners at Alton, Illi-

nois. General Sherman was then made a temporary Brigadier General.

On October 8, 1862, seven of the eight companies of the Regiment were assigned to Sherman's command at Memphis, Tennessee. There had been much correspondence, consuming several months, concerning the movement, although the 13th had been promised General Sherman from the fall of 1861. When the General assumed command of Memphis and vicinity July 21, 1861, and was asked his real rank as distinguished from his temporary, he proudly replied "I am Colonel of the Thirteenth Regiment of United States Infantry."

At this time the West was controlled generally by the Confederates and Grant decided, "there was nothing left to do but go forward to a decisive victory." After the Mississippi was forced, the reduction of Vicksburg became necessary. Grant's plan was to hold Pemberton about Granada, while Sherman, with the 13th among other Regiments was to land in rear of the city. On the 22nd of December, 1862, after much difficulty, a landing, in which the Navy participated, was made near Walnut Hills. On the 29th, the 13th Infantry sharpshooters enabled the Sixth Missouri Infantry to cross Chickasaw Bayou. Although the main attack failed and Grant was forced back, the action of the 13th was highly commended. On January 11, 1863, the Regiment was withdrawn to participate in the capture of Arkansas Post and received a citation for gallantry.

Between battles, each new camp found the men of the 13th policing, shining up and drilling, "to the wonder and awe of the neighboring volunteers and militia." All combined produced results and the battle record speaks for itself.

On May I, 1863, the Regiment took part in the battle of Haynes Bluff, was at Champion Hill May 16th, saw action at Black River May 17th, and on May 19th took part in the assault on Vicksburg. Grant believed the Confederates beaten when he ordered the attack. They were far from that for the attack was driven off with heavy losses and of all the troops engaged, the 13th was the only regiment to plant its Colors on the Confederate position. Seven men lost their lives that day carrying the Colors. Captain Washington, who led the attack, was mortally wounded after gaining the enemy trenches. So impressed was the Army by the achievement of the 13th that a board of ranking officers, all of them volunteers, recommended to the Commanding General that the Thirteenth be permitted to carry on its colors the motto "First at Vicksburg." The recommendation was approved and "First at Vicksburg" remains today the Regimental motto. It was a heavy price to pay, for the casualties, 43.3 percent were greater than those of the Light Brigade at Balaclava.

Though thinned by battle casualties, the 13th took part in the remainder of the campaign until the surrender of Vicksburg on July 4th. General Sherman, throughout the remainder of his career, maintained great affection for the 13th and honored the Regiment by detailing it as Headquarters Guard.

The small but hotly contested engagement of Collier-ville earned a commendation for what the General called "My little battalion of regulars." After a long forced march on November 23, the 13th engaged in the Battle of Missionary Ridge. This was their last battle during the Civil War. Their casualties had been over 60 percent.

The thanks of Congress were tendered three times to former members of the Regiment; once to General Sheridan and twice to General Sherman.

#### INDIAN WARS

In September, 1866, the 13th furnished cadres for the formation of the 22nd and 31st Infantrys. In 1869, only four Regiments of Infantry, the 13th, 12th, 20th and 23rd, remained intact. The remaining Regiments were either consolidated or became inactive. Then followed years of small one- and two-company posts, fighting Indians and assisting in the development of the great west.

Of the many colorful incidents of this period only few

can be recorded here. Perhaps one of the most characteristic occurred during the Mormon uprising on July 4, 1871. The 13th Infantry marched into Salt Lake City and held the streets, while Colonel DeTrobriand, commanding, invited himself to luncheon with Brigham Young. He then dared the latter with his thousands of Nauvoo guards to attack his Regiment. His forceful handling of the situation, however, crushed the uprising without further serious armed clashes.

In 1874 the Regiment was moved to New Orleans for station. On January 4, 1875, by some strange quirk of politics and under official orders, the Regiment arrested the Louisiana Legislature.

Companies E, F. and H had the honor of forming part of the funeral escort of General Sherman. The following year Company F was present at the opening of the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago. In 1894, the Regiment garrisoned Fort Porter, Fort Niagara and Governor's Island, New York, remaining at those stations until the Spanish War.

#### THE SPANISH WAR

On April 15, 1898, the Regiment was ordered to Tampa, Florida. On the 25th of May, the 13th, Ninth, and 24th Regiments of Infantry formed the Third Brigade, First Division, Fifth Corps. The Regiment arrived off Santiago,

Cuba, on June 20th. On the first of July it was engaged at El Caney. Due to the exigencies of battle the 13th, after receiving heavy fire from the Spaniards, was forced to deploy within 800 yards of the hostile trenches and suffered severe losses.

Following El Caney, the 13th led the Division attack on San Juan Hill and to an enlisted man of Company H, Private Agnew, belongs the distinguished honor of capturing the Spanish Flag. After the battle of San Juan Hill and until the capture of Santiago on August 8th, the Regiment was in reserve. From August 9th until its departure from Cuba, it was charged with the duty of guarding Spanish prisoners.

On September 14th the Regiment sailed from Santiago for its old stations in New York State.

#### THE PHILIPPINES

Early in April, 1899, the 13th entrained for San Francisco enroute to the Philippines. The voyage was uneventful and the Regiment arrived at Manila, May 29th. On June 10th the Third Battalion was the first unit of the Regiment to engage the Insurrectors in one of the numerous forays in the vicinity of Manila. The Regiment continued to take part in these expeditions until October when it was ordered north. On November 7th the 13th arrived at San Fabian on the Transport "Sheridan." It was part of the sea expedition which joined with land forces moving north to cut off the retreat of Aguinaldo through the Province of Pangasinan.

The full history of the Philippines with its innumerable actions of small, semi-independent groups, has not yet been written, but the records show that the 13th took a prominent part. The excellent work of the Regiment in the pacification and administration in various parts of the Philippines earned the thanks of the Commanding General.

In June cholera broke out and the whole Regiment was

fumigated at Manila prior to sailing for San Francisco on June 22nd. Before being permitted to land in Japan enroute there was a second fumigation and finally after many storms and dangerous typhoons the Regiment arrived in San Francisco July 19th. The Second Battalion was assigned to Alcatraz Island as guard for the military prison and the Regiment, less the Second Battalion, was ordered to different California posts. The second of May, 1903, Company I was sent to Fort Liscum, Alaska.

In 1905, the 13th was again moved to the Philippines, where for two years it was continually in the field. Upon return to the United States in 1907, the Regiment was stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and September 30, 1911, again entrained for the Pacific Coast enroute to the Philippines. On November 7, 1913, it garrisoned at Fort McKinley, Philippine Islands, remaining there until the outbreak of the World War.


#### WORLD WAR I

In July, 1917, the 13th left the Philippines for Camp Fremont, California, where it trained elements of the National Army. In October, 1918, it moved to Camp Mills, Long Island, enroute to France. The Armistice, however, cancelled the over sea movement.

After the World War, elements of the 13th Infantry were stationed at Fort Devens, Massachusetts, Boston Harbor Forts, Fort Ethan Allan, Vermont, and Fort Adams, Rhode Island. On October 21, 1939, the Regiment embarked at Boston, Mass., for service in the Panama Canal Zone. Sailing on the United States Army Transport, "Hunter Liggett," the 13th arrived in Cristobal, Canal Zone, October 27, 1939. Stationed at Fort William D. Davis, it had the task of finishing the construction of its cantonment area, begun by the 14th Infantry.

In June, 1940, with the exception of the band, all personnel of the 13th were transferred to organizations in the

Canal Zone. In July the Regiment was reconstituted at Fort Jackson, South Carolina, by a cadre of the 12th Infantry. The band arrived in August.

On July 8, 1940, Colonel Sumner Waite was assigned to command the 13th Infantry. Until his assumption of command on September 12, 1940, the Regiment was commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Eustis L. Poland.

#### PREPARATION FOR WORLD WAR II

During the period July 8, 1940, to July 13, 1944, the 13th Infantry, part of the Eighth Infantry Division, trained intensively for combat. This training involved many things. The Regiment occupied itself initially with the training of a large number of one-year Regular Army enlistments and several hundred Reserve Officers. These Officers were brought in from all over the Southern States and were for the most part ROTC graduates. In the spring of 1941 several thousand new draftees joined the Regiment, coming mostly from the Northeastern States. Basic training was given these men initially and the Regiment participated in extensive field exercises at Fort Jackson and Poinsette Park, South Carolina, during the heat of the 1941 Carolina summer.

On September 12, 1941, the Regiment moved out with other First Army units and participated in the large-scale Corps, Army and GHQ maneuvers which lasted until about December 1st. These maneuvers were held in North and South Carolina. On February 12, 1942, the Regiment moved and occupide guard positions on the Southern Aalantic Coast. Parts of the Regiment were stationed at Fort Fisher, North Carolina; Charleston, South Carolina; Key West, Florida, and Pensacola, Florida. The 13th remained on coastal duty until about April 1st, when it reassembled at Fort Jackson, South Carolina for further training. This training continued at Fort Jackson until September, 1942.

During the period from its formation until September, 1942, the 13th Infantry furnished cadres for one Regiment in the 77th Infantry Division, one Regiment in the 80th Infantry Division, hundreds of miscellaneous units, and sent hundreds of men to Officers' Candidate School. Also sevveral hundred officers were trained and sent out to other units all over the world. On June 30, 1942, Colonel Sumner Waite, who had commanded the Regiment for two years was transferred. Lt. Colonel Sherwood Dixon commanded until August 10, 1942, when Colonel Carter Collins assumed command of the 13th Infantry.

Early in September, 1942, the 13th Infantry Regiment commanded by Colonel Carter Collins, moved by truck from Fort Jackson to the Tennessee Maneuver Area located generally south of Nashville, Tennessee, and until November 15, the Sixth and Eighth Infantry Divisions together with the Fourth Armored Division participated in maneuvers. Although the Regiment was lacking in both men and equipment it received valuable training in motor movements, as

well as practical experience in living under field conditions.

Following the maneuvers, the Regiment remained at Camp Forrest, Tennessee, until November 26th when it started the move to Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. The training at Fort Leonard Wood, while not unlike previous training, was marked by an increase in the tempo of the schedule. Stress was placed on physical conditioning. There were almost daily rapid foot marches, courses were conducted in ranger training, and everyone crawled through the icy mud and water of the infiltration course which was designed to familiarize personnel with the sound of machine gun fire passing directly overhead. Throughout the time at Fort Leonard Wood, in all phases of training, regardless of whether the duties involved were tactical or garrison, the development of non-commissioned officers was emphasized.

On March 10, 1943, Colonel Carter Collins was transferred from the Regiment. Lt. Colonel James C. Welch assumed command until March 15, 1943, on which date Colonel Robert A. Griffin became the Commanding Officer of the 13th Infantry.

The next step in the training growth of the 13th Infantry was in marked contrast to the winter snow and cold of Missouri, for the move on the 18th of March was to the Desert Training Area, east of Yuma, Arizona, There at Camp Laguna for five months the Regiment worked under the blazing desert sun. During that time the Eighth Division was changed from a motorized division to an infantry division. Despite the heat, the desert experience was an interesting one, and for those who participated in it, such words as "Castle Dome," "sidewinder," "wadi," "salt tablets," and "sand storm" have a special significance. The period was also one of great training benefit. Individual combat courses, small unit combat firing problems, and the final period of maneuvers, all contributed toward the development of a spirit of confidence in the Regiment as a potentially great fighting unit.

The final preparation for overseas movement was made at Camp Forrest, Tennessee, where from about the 22nd of August details of training and supply were worked out. It was a period of "great training and administrative activity." The walls of every orderly room were lined with progress charts, firing charts, organizational charts, and every other record or device necessary to show the state of preparedness of the organization for movement.

On November 22, the Regiment moved to Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, for the final touches of preparation prior to sailing. There, shortages in equipment were filled, men were instructed in life boats, work was given on cargo nets, and practice loadings were made in dummy cars and boats.

The date of sailing, the day toward which all efforts had been directed for months, was December 5, 1943. The Regiment, less the Second Battalion, was loaded on the French Liner "SS ATHOS II." The Second Battalion was on the smaller ship, United States Army Transport "EXCEL-

SIOR." At noon on December 5th, as part of a large convoy, the 13th Infantry Regiment of the Eighth Infantry Division sailed from the New York harbor to a then unknown destination. After one day out the Athos II developed mechanical trouble, and drifted idly for several hours while the remainder of the convoy disappeared over the horizon. However, necessary repairs were made, and on the following morning the Athos II and its single escort vessel overtook the convoy. The remainder of the voyage, with the exception of one blustery day, was uneventful.

On December 16th the 13th Infantry Regiment arrived in the harbor of Belfast, and entrained that night for the area which was to be home for a period of six months.

Throughout the time in North Ireland the Regiment lived and trained in an area approximately six miles west of the town of Enniskillen and along the southern shore of Loch Erne. Regimental Headquarters was located at Ely Lodge on Ely Island, which was also occupied by the First and



Second Battalions, Service Company, and the Medical Detachment. Headquarters, Anti-Tank, and Cannon Companies were on the mainland in the vicinity of the bridge which connected Ely Island. The Third Battalion occupied Drumcose Camp, approximately one mile east of the remainder of the Regiment.

As one looks back on the time spent in North Ireland, he appreciates more and more the value of that period to the Regiment. The training there completed the development that was necessary before successfully engaging in combat. There were liberal allowances of ammunition so that it was possible for all personnel, especially those operating crew-served weapons to improve their firing ability. Ranges were available at St. Johns Point and Benbane Head for fifty caliber anti-aircraft, and 57 mm. anti-tank firing. Other valuable training was obtained on night problems in the inky blackness of the winter nights.

Despite the strenuous training program there was time for some recreation. Night passes were given to Ennis-killen. Occasional 24-hour passes were granted to Belfast and a limited number of men were able to visit England on furlough. Many company parties were held, and well attended by the friendly Irish girls.

During the time that the Regiment was in North Ireland, Company B, commanded by Captain William A. Gardner, was given a guard mission at the Naval Depot in the vicinity of Roseneath, Scotland, where, during the month of their mission, the members of Company B performed in such a manner as to bring high credit upon themselves, and upon the 13th Infantry.


The pre-war training of the 13th Infantry terminated on June 29, 1944, when the Regiment left the pleasant surroundings of Ely Lodge and Drumcose Camp and entrained for Belfast.

The Regiment, less those persons who had accompanied the vehicles was loaded on the "SS SEA PORPOISE," a Liberty ship. The sea voyage from Northern Ireland was uneventful, with neither weather nor enemy action interrupting the steady progress of the Sea Porpoise, as she moved steadily toward the coast of France. Late in the afternoon of July 3rd, the coast line was sighted, and by early evening, members of the 13th Infantry were able to clearly see the battle wreckage along the shore of the Cherbourg Peninsula in the vicinity of St. Germaine.

#### WORLD WAR II

On July 4, 1944, when the 13th Infantry went ashore at Utah Beach, which was generally east of the town of Ravenoville, the following officers were commanding: Regimental Commander, Colonel Robert A. Griffin; First Battalion Commander, Lt. Col. Morris J. Keesee; Second Battalion Commander, Lt. Col. (then Major) Eugene F. Clark; Third Battalion Commander, Colonel (then Lt. Col.) Earle L. Lerette; Medical Detachment Commander, Major John W. Pepe; Headquarters Company, Captain Joseph C. Brown; Cannon Company, Captain Paul W. Heidt; Anti-Tank Company, Captain Alfred W. Brown; Service Company, Major (then Captain) William B. Morrison; Company A. Captain Seth Worthington; Company B, Captain William Gardner; Company C, Major (then Captain) Benson C. Parrish; Company D, Captain Daniel Morgan; Headquarters Company First Battalion, Captain Alphonse Zerofsky; Company E. Captain Richard C. Warren; Company F, Captain Graham V. Chamblee; Company G. Lt. Col. (then Capt.) Theodore Leonard; Company H, Captain James M. S. Strickland; Headquarters Company Second Battalion, Captain William Schaub; Company I, Captain Paul Marks; Company K, Captain Ben Anderson; Company L. Captain Joseph Gray; Company M, Captain William B. Sharp; Headquarters Company Third Battalion, Captain Donald N. Hill.

At the time of the arrival of the Eighth Infantry Division in France, the tactical situation in the sector of the Eighth Corps of which the Eighth Division was a part was briefly this: A line running generally east and west just north of



the town of La Haye du Puits was held by the 90th Infantry Division on the east, and the 82nd Airborne Division on the west. It was contemplated that the Eighth Division would pass through the 82nd Division and elements of the 90th Division on the 8th of July and would attack to the south with the 13th and the 121st Infantry Regiments abreast. However, due to a change late on July 7th in the Division plan of attack, a change which altered both the sector and the scheme of maneuver, the 13th Infantry went into Division reserve. The Eighth Infantry Division, with the 28th and the 121 Infantry Regiments abreast, attacked on the morning of the 8th of July.

The first action in World War II, in which elements of the 13th Infantry Regiment participated occurred on the 9th of July, 1944, when the Third Battalion cleared out pockets of resistance in the town of La Haye du Puits, capturing approximately 100 prisoners.

The real D-Day for the 13th Infantry came on July 13th when the Regiment passed through the 28th Infantry, south of La Haye du Puits. At 0800 it attacked to the south with the First Battalion on the right, the Third Battalion on the left, and the Second Battalion in reserve. The dense hedge-row country through which the fighting progressed was strongly defended by enemy mortar, artillery, and small arms fire. Both the First Battalion and the Third Battalion advanced steadily all day against strong resistance and by darkness both Battalions had reached their objectives some 1800 yards south of the jump-off line. The fighting in the First Battalion area was particularly bitter near the town of Vesly. For its action at Vesly, Company B, commanded by Captain Allen J. Mauderly, received a Division citation. For the Third Battalion, the town of La Puits Ruault constituted the main strong point.

Early on the morning of July 14, the attack was resumed. The heavy resistance of the previous day had been broken and all units moved forward rapidly. By the middle of the afternoon the 13th was astride the Corps objective just north of the Ay River. This was an advance of about 4,000 yards and the 13th was the first unit to arrive on the river line.

During the period 15 July to 30 July, the 13th Infantry occupied a defensive position on the Ay River line and during the latter part of the above period was in reserve. Numerous patrols were sent out and the Regiment prepared for its next mission which was to come in the big breakthrough launched by General Bradley to break out of the Normandy Peninsula.

During its combat in the European Theater of Operations, the 13th Infantry worked with armored forces in many operations. The introduction to the work with an




Destroyed buildings in Rennes, France, August 1944

armored division took place on the 30th of July when the Regiment formed a task force moving behind the Fourth Armored Division which was then commanded by Major General John T. Wood. On that date starting at 0200 from the vicinity of La Fouberdire, the Regiment moved by truck into the area generally west of the town of Mesnilaubert. There the Regiment detrucked, and the First and Third Battalions advanced toward the town of Cerenees where, throughout the day, pockets of resistance were cleared and a total of over 400 prisoners taken.

The Regiment then moved to the city of Ducey where several dams were guarded and numerous German stragglers rounded up. It was in the vicinity of Ducey that the then largest attack by enemy air craft was experienced, when early in the evening of August I, an estimated 25 FW 190's and ME 109's attacked the area occupied by the Regiment. However, no casualties were incurred.

The next offensive action of the 13th Infantry took place against the city of Rennes, an important communication center. The original plan of attack called for the relief on August 3rd of a Battalion of Armored Infantry from the Fourth Armored Division, which held the high ground north of Rennes by the First Battalion of the 13th Infantry. The attack then would be made August 4, by the Third Battalion passing through the First. However, orders were received on the afternoon of the 3rd of August to attack that day at 1700. At the time that the order was received, the battalions were marching along the main road leading from St. Aubin d' Aubigne toward Rennes with the First Battalion in the lead. The attack was made by the First Battalion from the area just east of the village of St. Laurant. Company C, commanded by Major (then Capt.) Benson C. Parrish, with a platoon of tank destroyers attached and supported by the 95th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, led the attack. The attacking company fought



against heavy automatic fire, as well as, 20 mm. fire, and suffered many casualties. Company B, commanded by Captain Allen J. Mauderly was committed on the left of Company C. Company A, commanded by Captain Seth Worthington, became involved in a fire fight on the left flank. By 2200, the enemy had been driven back several hundred yards.

During the night careful plans were made for an attack to be made the next morning. However, reconnaissance patrolling revealed that the enemy had withdrawn under the cover of darkness. On the morning of August 4, with the Second Battalion and Third Battalion leading, the Regiment moved into the city of Rennes, the first large inland city of France to be captured. The populace of the once beautiful capital of Brittany greeted the entering troops with unrestrained demonstrations of joy. Throngs of civilians surged through the streets to cheer and shake hands with the American Soldiers. Women, young and old alike, showered them with flowers and kisses, and bedecked the vehicles with flowers.

From then until August 12, the Regiment, less Company I, remained in the vicinity of Rennes. The days were devoted to patrolling, training, rounding up German stragglers, and the preparation of defense plans against possible counter-attacks. Company I, commanded by Captain Paul Marks, had the mission of securing an important bridge in the vicinity of Messac, a town south of Rennes.

#### BATTLE OF BREST

During the time that the 13th Infantry remained in the vicinity of Rennes, the following general situation had developed on the Brittany Peninsula. The 83rd Infantry Division with the 121st Infantry Regiment attached, was attacking the strongly fortified and well-defended cities of Dinard and St. Malo. The Sixth Armored Division, with one battalion of the 28th Infantry attached, had advanced to the western end of the peninsula and to the northern outskirts of the fortress city of Brest.

On the 13th of August the 13th Infantry moved to an assembly area in the vicinity of Dinan and remained there until moving August 17-18, to the general vicinity of the town of Plouvien, north of Brest. The next five days were devoted to preparations for the coming attack against the city of Brest. Quite a bit of jockeying around was necessary since the 29th Division and the Second Division, both a part of the Eighth Army Corps, had not arrived in the area. It was necessary that the 13th Infantry infiltrate down, knocking out the enemy outposts, and secure the line of departure for the 29th Division. This was accomplished and all units occupied themselves with continuous patrolling to determine the enemy main line of resistance north of the city.

The Division plan called for the attack to be made by the 13th and 28th Infantry Regiments with the 13th in the right portion of the Division sector. On the right of the 13th initially was the 115th Infantry of the 29th Division.

Combat Team number 13, which was normally composed of the 13th Infantry Regiment; the 43rd Field Artillery

Wiggenhorn, of the 644th Tank Destroyer Battalion; Company C, commanded by Captain Sills, of the 709th Tank Battalion; and Company B, commanded by Capt. Overbeck, of the 86th Chemical Battalion. Colonel Griffin, commanding Combat Team 13, planned to attack with his First Battalion on the right and the Second Battalion on the left.

On the night of August 24, the 13th and 28th Infantry Regiments were ordered to infiltrate down during hours of darkness, knock out the enemy outposts and place themselves on a jump-off line approximately 1,000 yards north of the Penfeld River, preparatory to a general attack the following day. This plan of infiltration worked and several strong enemy positions were destroyed during the night. The general attack jumped off at 1300 hours, August 25, after a 30-minute preparation. Immediately both the First and Second Battalions encountered extremely heavy enemy resistance. The enemy, elements of the Second Paratroop Division, had set up their defenses well and fought fanatically. Men and guns were dug in deeply and maximum advantage taken of coverage offered by the hedgerows. Heavy concentrations of mortar and artillery fire fell throughout the Regimental area. Despite the strong resistance at 2100 hours the First Battalion had advanced approximately 1200 yards from the original line of departure and was locked in a bitter fight just northeast of the town of Bohars. The Second Battalion was locked in the battle for Hill 88, after advancing approximately 700 yards.

The battle for Brest is perhaps best remembered in the 13th Infantry by reference to "Hill 88" which is located just north and west of the small town of Keranchoasen. The name "88" was given because of the large number of 88 mm. guns which were mounted in defense of the hill.

Captured German overlays showed the area of "Hill 88" to have been one of the key defensive positions of the enemy line north of Brest. In their effort to improve the natural defensive value of this important terrain feature the Germans had dug a labyrinth of trenches, constructed numerous concrete emplacements and underground shelters.

The fortified portion of "Hill 88" lay almost entirely in the sector of the Second Battalion, and the fight for it was the fight of the Second Battalion, commanded by Lt. Colonel (then Major) Eugene F. Clark. It was a fight in which the attacking elements, before reaching the actual defenses, had to cross nearly 600 yards of open terrain while exposed to heavy machine gun, mortar, and artillery fire. The assaulting companies continued to advance, despite the enemy fire, and clammered up the steep slopes of "Hill 88," where for 30 hours they fought among the trenches and emplacements. It was the bitterest type of close-in fighting where opposing forces became intermingled and where in the darkness, it was impossible to tell American from German. During the fight for the hill the entire left flank of the second Battalion was exposed, and enemy machine gun fire from the flank was so intense during daylight hours that the wounded could not be evacuated, and even small quantities of supplies were brought forward with great difficulty. However, by 2100 hours on August 26, "Hill 88" was held by the Second Battalion of the 13th Infantry. It had cost the Second Battalion 37 men and two officers killed and 174 men and officers wounded.

On August 27, the Third Battalion passed through the Second Battalion and together with the First Battalion continued the attack against strong resistance. The advance continued to be made difficult by the fact that both flanks were still exposed, and many casualties were being caused by flanking fire. However, by 2100 hours both First and Third Battalions had reached the Regimental objective after suffering terrific casualties. The Regiment now held a deep bulge in the enemy main line and higher headquarters directed that the 13th's attack hold up while other units con-

tinued. During the period August 28 to August 31, the Regiment held its position and patrolled, moving forward gradually whenever enemy resistance could be knocked out by attacking with small units.

Due to a serious shortage of artillery ammunition, there was little activity during the first week of September, other than the readjusting of the front lines. The 121st Infantry had relieved the 28th Infantry on the left, and the Second Battalion of the 13th Infantry had relieved a battalion of the 115th Infantry on the right.

On the 8th of September, the Eighth Corps launched a coordinated attack. In the 13th Infantry sector the Second and Third Battalions reached their objectives with but slight opposition. The First Battalion, which had had no relief since the initial attack on the 19th of August encountered heavy resistance from the vicinity of the town of Les Coat and "Hill 82." However, by evening the First Battalion had driven the German paratroopers from their entrenched positions.


On September 9-10, the 13th Infantry was relieved by the Ninth Infantry Regiment of the Second Infantry Division, and by one battalion of the 28th Infantry Regiment. The 13th Infantry had driven down into the center of the Fortress of Brest and through four enemy fortified lines. This represented an advance of approximately 6500 yards. Casualties amounted to 839 men, of whom 209 were killed or died of wounds.

To the south of the City of Brest and across the harbor lies the Crozon peninsula. The possession of this peninsula controlled the entrance to the harbor of Brest. To the Eighth Division went the mission of clearing the enemy from that hilly and well-defended strip of land.

The main shaft of the Crozon Peninsula was cleared by the 28th and 121st Infantry Regiments, attacking August 15-17. The mission of the 13th Infantry in the final phase of the fighting was to clear the enemy from the large northern finger, the Quelern Peninsula and the Point Des


German Fortification on Crozon Peninsula, France, September, 1944.

Espagnoles. In order to accomplish this mission, it was necessary for the attackers to force their way through the massive stone wall which extended completely across the neck of the Quelern Peninsula. The wall, part of an ancient defensive system, had been prepared for modern defense. For hundreds of yards to the front were wire obstacles and mine fields. Anti-tank ditches had been dug, and immediately in front of the wall was a moat full of water and from which the wall rose straight up, approximately 30 feet.

To the Third Battalion of the 13th Infantry was given the mission of breaching the wall and continuing the attack to the north in the west portion of the peninsula. The Second Battalion was to follow the Third Battalion through the wall and to attack to the north in the east portion of the peninsula. The First Battalion was to be in reserve.


During the night preceding the attack, careful plans were

made, and particularly close coordination was made with the artillery, 14 Battalions of which, including 8-inch guns, were in support of the Third Battalion.

At 1100 hours on September 19th the Third Battalion jumped off in the attack. In this attack the riflemen followed the friendly artillery so closely that some minor wounds were inflicted by it. However, the speed of the attacking infantry explained the reason for the wall being taken with few casualties. In many cases, the 13th Infantry riflemen scaled and entered the wall before the Germans had left their shelters and got into fighting positions.

The technique of following artillery fire closely proved its value in many other attacks made by the 13th Infantry against the Germans.

After the wall had been breached, the attack progressed steadily up the peninsula. The appropriate climax to the

entire battle of Brest came at about 1700 hours when word was received that the Nazi General Herman Bernard Ramcke wanted to surrender his forces. This same general had refused on two previous occasions to surrender his forces at Brest. General Ramcke and certain members of his staff occupying a headquarters located some 75 feet underground had been discovered by 1st Lt. James M. Dunham, platoon leader of I Company, 13th Infantry.

The actual surrender was made at 1830 hours on the 19th of September to Brigadier General Charles D. W. Canham, Assistant Division Commander of the Eighth Infantry Division, who was accompanied by Colonel Robert A. Griffin and Colonel (then Lt. Col.) Earle L. Lerette.

#### SIEGFRIED LINE—HURTGEN FOREST


Following the battle of Brest the 13th Infantry moved by rail and motor to the vicinity of the junction of the borders of Belgium, Luxembourg, and Germany. There Combat Team number 13, relieving Combat Team number 109 of the 28th Infantry Division, took up a holding mission in the Siegfried Line.

The operational activities of the 13th Infantry during that period consisted of improvement of defensive positions and living quarters, and of extensive patrolling. Throughout the time that the Regiment was in Europe, no opportunity for training was overlooked, and the period in the Siegfried was no exception. A training program was drawn up, and followed by any part of an organization which was not exposed to direct enemy fire.

At all Echelons of Command efforts were made to provide the maximum amount of recreation for the men. However, the facilities were limited. A few were given passes to Paris. The Division set up a recreational center at the Luxembourg town of Clerveaux (Clerf) and the Regiment established a recreational center for the combat team in the town of Ouren, Belgium.

On the 15th of November, a wet disagreeable day during which it rained and snowed, Combat Team 13 was relieved on position by Combat Team 112 of the 28th Infantry Division which had been fighting in the Hurtgen Forest. The following day, Combat Team 13 moved by truck to the Hurtgen Forest to relieve Combat Team 110 of the 28th Infantry Division. With the move to the Hurtgen Forest, the Eighth Infantry Division passed from the Eighth Corps to the Fifth Corps, then commanded by Major General Gerow.

In the gloomy wetness of the Hurtgen Forest the 13th Infantry, with the mission of holding, took over a front of approximately 2700 yards along a small stream and east of the ridge upon which the town of Schmidt was located.

In the meantime the 28th and 121st Infantry Regiments were attacking through the forest on the left. It was most bitter fighting, for in addition to the normal problems of battle, there were the difficulties of supply over muddy trails, and the hardships imposed by winter weather. A matter of great concern during the fighting in the Hurtgen Forest were the casualties caused by "Trench Foot," a condition resulting from cold and wetness. On November 22nd, the First Battalion, commanded by Lt. Col. Morris J. Keesee, less Company A, was attached to the 28th Infantry and given the mission of clearing out pockets of enemy which occupied the dominating terrain between the 28th and the 121st Infantries. The terrain was ideally suited for defense, having steep embankments, dense woods, and deep mud, with the added obstacles of fallen trees, enemy wire and mines. During the attack the First Battalion was subjected to some of the most intense artillery fire experienced by the members of the 13th Infantry in Europe. The enemy artillery was effective, since in the woods, nearly every round was a tree burst, against which there was little protection. Despite the heavy casualties suffered, the First Battalion accomplished its mission, and that night returned to its area in Regimental reserve, where it had a belated Thanksgiving Dinner.

Three days later, November 26th, the Division Commander, Major General Donald Stroh, again called on the First Battalion, 13th Infantry. This time the attachment was to the 121st Infantry.

The mission of the First Battalion, 13th Infantry, was to capture a vital hill to the northeast of the town of Hurtgen, Germany. The 121st Infantry was to capture the town of Hurtgen. The attack was launched at 0700, 27 November 1944. The First Battalion advanced rapidly and by noon had cut the road leading north from Hurtgen to Kleinhau. This was an advance of about 2000 yards. This position was held all through the day on the 27th against several counter attacks and very heavy enemy fire. Intense enemy fire across the open approaches to the town of Hurtgen prevented entrance into this town during the 27th of November 1944. However, at midnight on the 27-28th of November, Company C, commanded by Major (then Captain) Benson C. Parrish, seized the initiative and attacked south, entering the town. They seized a perimeter near the center of the town and began the systematic elimination of the enemy. Early on the morning of 28 November 1944, Companies A and B continued the attack to the east and captured the hill north of Hurtgen, which was originally assigned as the Battalion objective. Company C continued clearing Hurt-

gen until late in the afternoon of the 29th of November when the Second Battalion, 121st Infantry, drove into town from the south. Extremely bitter fighting occurred in this area.

Prior to return to the control of the 13th Infantry, the First Battalion also accomplished the mission of attacking along the left of the Kleinhau-Brandenberg Road, clearing the enemy from the woods, and protecting the left flank of the Reserve Combat Command of the Fifth Armored Division while it advanced into the town of Brandenberg.

The ferocity of the fighting in which the First Battalion participated is indicated by the casualty figures which show that in accomplishing the assigned missions while attached to the 28th and 121st Infantries, 48 men of the First Battalion, 13th Infantry, gave their lives, 237 were wounded and 19 were reported missing. During this period, the remainder of the 13th Infantry continued its mission of holding and conducting vigorous patrolling.

Two important changes in command took place during the period in the Hurtgen Forest. The Division Commander, Major General Donald Stroh, who had commanded the Eighth Infantry Division since the 13th of July 1944 was granted a leave of absence. Brigadier General William Weaver joined the Division as its commander.

Colonel Robert A. Griffin, who had commanded the 13th Infantry since March of 1943 and through all of the fighting in Europe, was evacuated because of illness. Lt. Colonel Earle L. Lerette commanded during the period November 25, 1944 to December 1, 1944. Colonel Numa A. Watson joined the Regiment as its commander on the 1st of December 1944.

On the 9th of December the 13th Infantry was relieved in place by the 311th Infantry Regiment of the 78th Infantry Division, and moving laterally to the left, took up positions in the vicinity of the towns of Brandenberg, Bergstein, and Kleinhau. The mission was that of holding and of making preparation for a coordinated attack.

However, following the German counter-attack in the area to the south which led to their breakthrough into Luxembourg and Belgium, the mission of the 13th Infantry

was that of holding at all costs. Consequently, for the duration of the time in the vicinity of Brandenberg, and Bergstein, all possible effort was directed toward the perfection of defensive positions and plans. Since the terrain in the sector of the 13th Infantry held the key to the defense of the entire Corps sector and was the anchor for any maneuver within the Corps area, assistance was given by both Corps and Division engineers in the laying of mines and wire and in the construction of emplacements. Although the mission was one of holding, still several sharp offensive engagements occurred while the Regiment was in the vicinity of Brandenberg. The first of these took place on the 11th of December. In the sector on the left, the ground rose steeply from the Roer River for several hundred feet. On this thickly wooded slope there was a pocket of enemy which had not been eliminated prior to the time that the 13th took over in the area, and which constituted a threat to the flank. Company I, commanded by Captain Paul Marks was given the mission of clearing out the pocket. Attacking through the darkness at 0330, Company I encountered heavy opposition. However, by shifting the direction of attack and attacking again at 0730 Company I drove the enemy from its dug-in positions and captured 200 prisoners.

Part of the First Battalion also participated in an offensive mission when on December 23rd, Companies A and C were attached to the 121st Infantry and used by them during the following three days to assist in capturing and clearing the enemy from the town of Obermabach and the surrounding area. The Second Battalion later occupied Obermabach when the Regimental sector was widened to include the town and vicinity.

During the weeks in the line in Hurtgen Forest, the Regiment conducted extensive patrolling, raids, and repulsed numerous German forays. One German attack occurred about 0300 in the morning and was an attempt to retake the town of Bergstein. This attack was driven off with heavy losses to the enemy by the Third Battalion. One particularly successful raid was executed by a combat patrol from Company I, led by Lt. De Filipo. It passed through the German lines in the dead of night, entered a German C.P., wiped it out, and returned before the surprised enemy could recover.


The operation in the vicinity of Bergstein and Brandenberg ended on 7 February 1945, on which date the Regiment was relieved by the 16th Infantry of the First Infantry Division.

The next move was a lateral one to the left, or north, when on February 7, the 13th Infantry relieved the 414th Infantry of the 104th Infantry Division in the vicinity of

Gurzenick and Rolsdorf, Germany. The mission in the new area was to prepare plans for an attack across the Roer River to seize the city of Duren and the Corps Bridgehead east of Duren. The following day word was received that after the accomplishment of the above mission the entire Regiment would be attached to the Third Armored Division, then commanded by Major General Maurice Rose.

However, there was unexpected delay in the date of the attack, for on February 9-10, the Roer River rose an estimated 8 to 10 feet, changing the river from a shallow, slowly flowing stream that was easily waded, to a raging torrent so swift that for several days assault boats, even manned by especially selected crews, were unable to cross the river. It was believed that the sudden rise was caused by the Germans having blown the sluice gates in at least one of the large dams above the Eighth Division sector. The change in the condition of the river not only changed the date of the attack but also necessitated the development and perfection of as many means as possible that could be employed to get men and equipment to the other side of the river at the time of the attack. Also in preparation for the attack, practice river crossings were made in the vicinity of Weisweiler and Roetgen.

The general situation at the time of the atack was as follows: The Eighth Infantry Division, part of the Seventh Corps, commanded by Major General J. Lawton Collins was to attack across the Roer River with the 104th Infantry Division on the left as part of the coordinated attack by the First and Ninth Armies. The First Infantry Division on the right had the mission of protecting the right flank of the Seventh Corps. The 13th Infantry attacked at 0330 on February 23, 1945, following a 45-minute artillery and mortar preparation. The Second Battalion attacked on the right, the Third on the left. The initial assault waves crossed in power and assault boats, however, because of the number of boats knocked out by artillery and mortar fire, and because of the difficulty in getting the empty assault boats back to the friendly side after the first waves, it was possible to cross only a few men during the day. During most of the day only a single assault boat ferry operated so that throughout the daylight hours only I and K Companies and part of Company F were on the far side. The idea of using a ferry operated on a cable and utilizing the force of the current as a propelling power had been proposed by Colonel Earle L. Lerette (then Lt. Col.), Executive Officer, 13th Infantry, and under his supervision had been used in practice crossings prior to the attack. Due to the constant and accurate enemy fire and the swift current of the river the engineers were unable to construct a foot or pontoon bridge, and it was not until morning of the 24th of February


that the Corps Engineers completed a Bailey Bridge. However, throughout the night the ferry had operated and additional boats had been received so that by 0935 the three Battalions had crossed the Roer River and were attacking toward their objective.

On the afternoon of the 25th of February, the Corps objective was reached and the 13th Infantry relieved by the 121st Infantry so that final plans could be made for joining with the Third Armored Division and continuing in the attack on February 26. The victory at Duren had not been an easy one. Not only were the preparations and fighting long and hard, but also casualties were high, including among them two Battalion Commanders—Lt. Colonel Leonard S. Wilhelm, Commander of the Third Battalion was

killed while directing the crossing of his men, and Lt. Colonel (then Major) Frederick A. Dunlap, Commander of the Second Battalion, was seriously wounded shortly after crossing the river.

#### DUREN TO COLOGNE

On February 26, 1945, the 13th Infantry was attached to the Third Armored Division in the following manner: First Battalion to CCA, Second Battalion to CCB, and the Third Battalion was attached to CCR. One platoon of Canon Company was also attached to each CC. Regimental Headquarters and Service Company moved on instructions from the Third Armored Division. Anti-Tank Company remained administratively with the Eighth Infantry Division but moved with the 13th Infantry field train. Throughout

the period that the Regiment worked with the Third Armored Division, the Regimental Headquarters did not function as a tactical headquarters. Rather, each Battalion worked directly with the Combat Command to which it was attached.

The move across the rolling country between the Roer and the Rhine Rivers was a fast-moving operation. During the drive, the 13th Infantrymen rode the tanks, dismounting to storm the many towns and strong points on the Cologne Plain and to clear the way for the armor. The area was dotted with towns and small groups of buildings most of which the Germans defended with infantry, artillery, self-

propelled guns and armor. As each town or strong point was reduced a large amount of German equipment was destroyed and many prisoners taken. It is interesting to note that at no place did the "Volkstrum" or "Peoples' Army" offer any determined resistance.


The following is a resume of the action of each Battalion: The First Battalion, operating under the command of CCA, fought its way into Cologne on March 6, 1945, with Company C, commanded by Captain Frank Farnell, the first unit to reach the Rhine in the vicinity of Cologne.

This climaxed a drive which took the following of the larger towns: Buir (Feb. 27), Manheim (Mar. 1), Sindorf (Mar. 2), Ziverich (Mar. 2), Bergheim (Mar. 3), Busdorf (Mar. 5), Pulheim (Mar. 5), Orendorf (Mar. 6), northern part of Cologne (Mar. 6).

The Second Battalion commanded by Lt. Col. (then Major) Theodore Leonard operating with CCB, reached the Rhine River at Worringen and was the first unit in the First Army to reach the Rhine River. During its drive, the Second Battalion coptured the following places: Berrendorf,

Giesendorf (Feb. 26), Elsdorf (Feb. 27), Stommeln, in conjunction with the Third Battalion (Mar. 3), Roggendorf, Worringen (Mar. 4), Fuhlingen, Weiler, Wasserman, Rheinkassel (Mar. 5), Merkenich, Schriesride, Stollagsburg (Mar. 6).

The 13th Infantry's Third Battalion forced a bridgehead across the Erft River in two days of violent fighting. The Third Armored Division passed through this bridgehead and spearheaded the Seventh Corp's continuing drive. The Third Battalion, working with CCR, attacked and captured the following places: Brockendorf (Feb. 27), Paffendorf and a bridgehead across the Erft River (Feb. 27), Neiderausen (Mar. 2), Ingendorf (Mar. 3), Stommeln, in conjunction with the Second Battalion (Mar. 3).

It is felt that in no battle was the 13th Infantry's pressure of more importance in the outcome of the war than in this drive with the Third Armored Division. During the period February 27 to March 6, the drive of the Third Armored Division split the German defenses west of the Rhine and sent them reeling to the rear. The 13th Infantry soldiers were riding the tanks and attacking with a ferocity which was unusual even for them. At no time were they halted, and the aggressiveness of the Regiment won the praise of all the commanders of the Third Armored Division, the Corps Commander and the Army Commander. An Official commendation was presented the Regiment by Major General J. Lawton Collins, Commander of the U.S. Seventh Army Corps.

After Cologne had been captured, and all of the enemy west of the Rhine destroyed or captured, the 13th Infantry enjoyed a brief period of training and recreation. Enemy activity at this time consisted only of occasional artillery, mortar, or machine gun fire from the east side of the river. With the exception of three days, during which it moved to the vicinity of Dransdorf in Eighth Division reserve, the Regiment remained in the general vicinity of Cologne until March 28, when it was relieved in place by the 343rd Infantry of the 86th Infantry Division. This was the first time that the 86th Infantry Division had been in the line.

#### THE RUHR (ROSE)\* POCKET

After the relief at Cologne had been completed, the Regiment moved by motor to Biersdorf, Germany. The move of approximately 90 miles led through Bonn, Ukereth and Hackendorf,

The 13th Infantry went into line between the 18th and 26th Infantry Regiments of the First Infantry Division with the initial mission of attacking north to the Sieg River, clearing out all enemy resistance and seizing any crossings not destroyed.

The Sieg River is a natural defense line which ran generally east and west on the north flank of the First U. S. Army breakout from the Remagen bridgehead. It is dominated on the north bank by high wooded hills. The initial mission given to the Division by the Seventh Corps was to secure this high ground. In the center of the Regimental sector and straddling the river was the large town of Siegen. It is in this town that two rivers, the Ferndorf from the north, and the Weis from the Southeast join with the Sieg River east of Siegen, to form the greater Sieg River flowing west to the Rhine. Whoever held Siegen controlled also the valleys through which the tributaries flowed. Therefore, Siegen was the main objective of the Regiment. However, before the attack could be launched against Siegen, it was necessary to clear that area south of the city, and north of the 13th Infantry, a distance of eight miles.

The 13th Infantry had received orders in Cologne at 1100 on March 28, which called for them to be relieved by a Regiment of the 86th Division, mount trucks, move 90 miles to the vicinity of Siegen and attack early on the morning of March 29. By 0500 on the morning of March 29, the 13th Infantry had been relieved in Cologne, moved 90 miles and some units had already taken their first objective.

The attack to clear the area was launched by the First and Second Battalions. The attack continued steadily until the night of March 31, against resistance which consisted principally of strong points supported in most cases by armor and artillery. On March 30, the First Battalion captured the towns of Herdorf, Altenseebach, Neunkirchen, and Eisern. Also on the same day, approximately 400 enemy were taken prisoners and an estimated 200 killed or wounded. At the end of March 1945 the 13th Infantry occupied a line along the high ground south of the Sieg and Weis Rivers, running from the vicinity of Brachbach, south of Siegen and nearly to Nieder Dielfin. Since the Third Battalion had relieved the 18th Infantry, the Regiment then had three battalions on line.

The attack against Siegen was launched April 1st by the First and Third Battalions, the First Battalion attacking to the north, just west of the town, while the Third Battalion attacked directly against Siegen from the south. By early on the morning of April 2, the First Battalion had crossed the Sieg and occupied the high ground west of Siegen including a barracks area there. Originally the plan of attack had not called for the forcing of the Sieg River by the First Battalion. However, orders were received late March 31, which required the 13th Infantry to force the river with one Battalion and take an objective approximately 3,000 yards on the north side of the river. Lt. Col.

Morris J. Keesee, commanding the First Battalion, received his orders at 2300 on March 31. He immediately made his plans and before daylight the First Battalion had forced the river and was on the objective according to plan.

The Third Battalion had cleared the enemy out of Siegen and had taken the high ground to the north, including the Fischbacher Barracks. Both Battalions had fought against strong resistance and had taken large numbers of prisoners. The Second Battalion which had initially held the line along the Sieg River west of Siegen had relieved the Battalion of the 121st Infantry on the right of the Third Battalion. The attack continued on the 3rd of April with all the battalions attacking against strong points supported by artillery, self-pelled guns and/or armor.

As the attack progressed, the front of the 13th Infantry became so wide—nearly 10,000 yards—that it was impossible to prevent infiltration through the heavily wooded and hilly country. As a result, a large number of Germans managed to get back into the stone Fischbacher barracks on the high ground just north of Siegen and between the attacking Battalions and Regimental Headquarters. A defensive force composed of Headquarters and Service Company personnel was organized and commanded by the Regimental Supply Officer, Major Thomas J. Davis, to be used in the event that a German attack from the barracks broke into town. However, a task force from the Third Battalion Headquarters Company and commanded by 1st Lt. Earle R. Smedes, engaged the Germans in the barracks until the remainder of the Third Battalion was able to re-

turn to the area. On April 6, with tank destroyers attached, the Third Battalion succeeded in recapturing the barracks, taking a total of 185 prisoners in addition to the killed and wounded. It was in this fight that Captain (then 1st Lt.) George McLendon, commanding Company I, in order to stop a fanatical German attack, called for artillery fire on the building adjacent to the one he occupied.

While the Third Battalion was fighting in the barracks the First and Second Battalions were beating off repeated infantry and armored counter attacks and clearing out infiltrating groups, particularly on the exposed right flank. On one occasion, Cannon Company became involved in a small arms fight at its gun positions. In order to give Cannon Company credit for an excellent job, it should be told that despite the presence of the enemy, every fire mission requested by the forward Battalions was delivered. During the time that the fighting at Siegen was in progress, the Eighth Division passed to the control of the 18th Airborne Corps. That corps was to drive north to the Ruhr River to crush the pocket formed by the link-up of the Ninth U. S. Army and the First U. S. Army at Padderborn to the east and inclusive of the heavily industrialized Ruhr Valley. The Eighth Infantry Division was assigned the mission of driving to the north from its positions and reaching the Ruhr river with all possible speed. This was a distance of approximately 70 miles.

The Regiment attacked toward the distant Ruhr River on April 7, with the mission of destroying enemy forces and seizing important roads and communication centers in its sector. It was strengthened on that date by the attachment of Company A, a medium tank company, commanded by Captain Wright of the 740th Tank Battalion. The operation of the Eighth Infantry Division and the 13th Infantry Regiment in the Ruhr Pocket is best remembered as one of unrelenting speed and aggressive action. It was an allout effort to destroy the enemy forces, to keep him off balance and unable to prepare a fixed defensive position. Consequently, the attack was pushed all day and all night, every day and every night. During the hours of darkness tanks were driven by the light from burning buildings. It was an attack during which at times flanks were exposed as much as 12 to 15 miles. Infiltration was frequent.


The Ruhr pocket was split on the afternoon of April 14,

when the Second and Third Battalions of the 13th Infantry reached the Ruhr River. Lt. Colonel (then Major) James C. Tarkenton, Jr., commanding officer, Third Battalion, 13th Infantry, contacted the Third Battalion of the 313th Infantry of the 75th Infantry Division across the Ruhr River in the vicinity of the town of Wetter. At this time the Eighth Division was 18 miles in front of the unit on its left and 15 miles ahead of the unit on its right.

After having reached the Ruhr River which was north of the original "stop line," the 13th Infantry was ordered to attack to the north and west with the Ruhr River on the right, and to continue the destruction of all enemy forces in its sector.

The attack in the new direction was launched on the 15th of April with the Third Battalion on the right and the First Battalion on the left. CCR of the 13th Armored Division which had been attached to the 13th Infantry Regiment joined in the attack on the afternoon of the 15th on the extreme left in the 13th Infantry sector. The attack progressed rapidly until the Corps "stop-line" was reached on April 16. On the following day all of the German forces in the Ruhr Pocket surrendered. On that date the First

Battalion moved into the city of Velbert, the Second Battalion moved into Werden, and the Third Battalion into Kupeferdreh.

The 13th Infantry was in the attack throughout all the fighting in the Ruhr Pocket with the exception of April 10, and II, when it was in Division reserve and blocking on an exposed flank. In the attack, the Regiment averaged approximately 10 miles each day through hilly, wooded country which favored the defender. The Germans resisted at road blocks, strong points and towns. Almost invariably, the enemy infantry was supported by artillery, self-propelled guns, and tanks. The enemy launched numerous counterattacks and his attempts at infiltration were frequent. However, because of the speed with which the Division attacked, at no time was the German able to launch a coordinated counterattack, nor was he able to establish a defensive position which could not either be flanked or smashed without causing undue delay to the attacking force.

In the action in the Ruhr pocket, the 13th Infantry advanced over 85 miles, took over 14,000 prisoners of war, and captured the following larger towns: Siegen, Klafeld,

Kreutzal, Kromback, Olpe, Drohlshagen, Meinerzhagen, Breckerfeld, Vorde, Niedersprockhovel and Hattigen.

Following the conclusion of hostilities in the industrial Ruhr Valley, the Eighth Infantry Division and the 13th Infantry Regiment had a brief period of occupational duty. During that time military government was instituted, vital installations were guarded, roads were patrolled, and enemy stragglers rounded up by the hundreds, many of them posing as civilians. The area occupied by the 13th included the cities of Dusseldorf, Duisburg, Mettman, and Wuppertal. It was of interest to see that the large cities of Dusseldorf, and Duisburg, like Cologne, had been badly damaged by allied air attacks.

On the 24th of April a warning order was received from the Commanding General, Eighth Infantry Division, which, in effect, stated that the 13th Infantry would proceed with the Eighth Infantry Division to the vicinity of Hamburg, Germany. The Division would be part of the 18th Corps (Airborne) operating with the British Second Army. The mission of the Corps would be to protect the right flank of the British Army while that Army crossed the Elbe River, seized Hamburg and continued the attack to the northeast to cut off the Danish Peninsula. The 13th Infantry was to turn the responsibility for the area which it then occupied over to the 94th Infantry Division.

On April 26, Combat Team 13 (13th Infantry Regiment, 43rd Field Artillery Battalion, Company A of the 12th Engineer Battalion, and Company A of the Eighth Medical Battalion) moved from the vicinity of Dusseldorf to the vicinity of Bohlsen, Germany which lies a few miles to the west of Uelzen. The move by truck took the following route: Wuppertal, Dortmund, Padderborn, Braunschweig and Uelzen, a total distance of 234 miles. This move was made in one day and was extremely successful, indicative of the high state of training reached by the Combat Team at this time.

The last tactical operation of the 13th Infantry in World War II, began on the 28th of April 1945, on which date the Regiment was attached to the 82nd Airborne Division and the First Battalion relieved one Battalion of the 15th Brigade, Fifth Division, Second British Army, along the Elbe River in the vicinity of Kohlingen. The remainder of the Regiment also moved to the vicinity of Kohlingen the following day.

On April 30, the Third Battalion attached to the 505th Paratroop Regiment of the 82nd Airborne Division crossed the Elbe River in support of that Regiment in the vicinity of the town of Bleckede. Enemy resistance consisted almost exclusively of accurate high-velocity fire and numerous box mines.

While the Third Battalion was attached to the 82nd Airborne Division, they were ordered to take several objectives which they did, and when relieved had advanced several miles beyond the river.

May 2, 1945, was the last day of tactical operation for the 13th Infantry in World War II. On that date, having crossed the Elbe River during the preceding night, the Regiment, then in Eighth Division reserve, followed the 28th and 121st Infantry Regiments on their move toward the Baltic Sea. It was a rapid move, for the attacking echelons encountered no oppositions and for the 13th Infantry it was nothing more than a road march. Throughout May 2, hundreds and then thousands of German military personnel surrendered. During the night of May 2-3, the main roads south of Schwerin were jammed, not only with military personnel and vehicles, but also with civilians. Apparently all were fleeing toward the Elbe River in an attempt to cross and escape from what they thought was to be an area dominated by the Russians. It was not until May 3, however, that everyone was aware of the huge problem which confronted American Military personnel. In the 13th Infantry area alone, there were over 54,000 military prisoners in addition to tens of thousands of migratory German civilians and displaced persons from all over Europe. Slave laborers from Russia, Poland, Belgium, Holland, and France comprised the bulk of them.

In an effort to bring order out of the confusion which prevailed, prisoner of war enclosures and civilian camps were set up throughout the 13th Infantry area which lay generally between the town of Hagenow and the Elbe River to the southwest. The Third Battalion at the large airport at Hagenow operated the largest of the prisoner of war enclosures and the largest of the displaced persons camps, for there were held approximately 27,000 prisoners of war and 13,000 displaced persons. Later this displaced persons' camp served as a collecting point to which displaced persons were sent to be separated and started on the way to their own lands. The First Battalion had two prisoner of war enclosures containing a total of 22,000, in addition to several large civilian and displaced persons' camps scattered throughout their area. The Second Battalion occupied the area in the southern part of the Regimental sector and adjacent to the Elbe River. In addition to over 5,000 prisoners of war at one enclosure, there were thousands of displaced persons and migratory civilians in camps throughout the area.

During the next few weeks attention was devoted almost exclusively to the problems of operating the camps and enclosures. There were the problems of feeding, sanitation, segration and movement, in addition to the problem of screening SS and German political personnel who sought refuge by posing as ordinary prisoners of war or migratory civilians. Fortunately it soon became possible to move many of the displaced persons toward their home land, and with their departure went the bulk of the problems.

V-E (Victory Europe) day, the day on which hostilities ceased in Europe was May 8, 1945. This day found the 13th Infantry busily engaged in the operation of camps and enclosures and in patrolling the area.

After order had been brought out of the initial chaos and the areas and roads policed up, there was opportunity for some recreation. A recreation center was established by Division in the resort city of Schwerin where boating and swimming could be enjoyed. Some of the companies in the towns which they occupied found many fine riding horses. The Second Battalion, having moved to the town of Zarrintin, on the lake of the same name, not only fished and swam but also enjoyed the use of sail and motor boats.

The Regiment was relieved in the area of Hagenow and Wittenberg by the British. On June 2 the move was made to the vicinity of Hann-Munden to the south at which place the Regiment remained until June 14. On that date it left for Camp "Old Gold" located in the general vicinity of the French port of Le Havre. The move was of two days' duration and took the following general route: Cologne, Luxembourg, Reims, Compiegne, Beauvais to Camp "Old Gold" just north of the village of Yerville.

At Camp "Old Gold" preparations were made for the return voyage to the United States. In the midst of the pleasure of looking forward to returning home there was one somber note. Following the victory in Europe, a point system had been set up to serve as a basis for separation from the service. Points were given for months of service, decorations, and dependent children. While at Camp "Old Gold," all men in the 13th Infantry who had over 85 points were transferred from the Regiment to the 89th Division, while at the same time the Regiment received a comparable number of men who had low points and who had been separated from their Division, the 89th.

The men who left the 13th Infantry were the men oldest in service of the Regiment. They were the men who, by doing their jobs well under all circumstances, had made possible the success enjoyed by the Regiment. They were men of whom the 13th Infantry was rightly proud, and to whom it owed so much.

The Regiment loaded July 1st on the U. S. Navy Transport General Brooke and sailed on July 2, 1945, just two days less than a year after it had landed on the beaches of France. During that year the Regiment had a record of





which it was justly proud. Never had the 13th Infantry failed to take an objective, and never had it been forced to yield its position to the enemy. During the fighting in Europe the Regiment took over 100,000 prisoners. The 13th Infantry was also proud of the fact that throughout the war in Europe it had not had a Company, Battalion or Regimental Commander relieved of command. Although every man was proud of the record of the 13th Infantry in Europe, one could not but realize that its record had been accomplished at the cost of over 100 percent casualties.

The 13th Infantry landed at Hampton Roads, Virginia, on July 10, and proceeded from there to Camp Patrick Henry, Virginia. At Camp Patrick Henry, personnel were handled most efficiently prior to their departure for reception stations throughout the country. After having arrived at his separation center each man was given a 30-day "recuperation furlough" prior to rejoining the Eighth Infantry Division and the 13th Infantry Regiment at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri.

As soon as it had reassembled, the Regiment started intensive preparation for combat against the Japanese. However, hostilities ceased, and on November 19, 1945, with nearly all of its combat veterans discharged or transferred to other units, the 13th Infantry Regiment was deactivated after nearly 85 years of continuous service.
