


COMMANDING THE 46th FIELD ARTILLERY BRIGADE

Born in Scranton, Pa., on July 14, 1884. His early years were spent in Scranton where he attended the Scranton Public schools and graduated from the Scranton High School in 1902.

In 1902 he was appointed to the United States Military Academy at West Point, and graduated from the academy in 1906. He was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Infantry and served in this capacity until 1907. In 1907 he was transferred to the Field Artillery as a 1st Lieutenant and began his service as a Field Artillery Officer in the Philippine Islands.

Attended the Mounted Service School in Fort Riley, Kansas in 1911. From 1912 to 1914 he was on Recruiting duty at Springfield, Illinois, and on July 1, 1916 he was promoted to the rank of Captain.

As a Major with the 17th Field Artillery of the 2nd Division he served in France from December, 1917, to May, 1918. He was promoted to the rank of Lt. Colonel then to Colonel and was ordered to the United States. From July, 1918, to December, 1919, he served as Assistant Commandant and later Commandant of the Field Artillery Basic School at Camp Knox, Ky.

In 1923 he attended the Army School of the Line in Fort Leavenworth, Kans., and was a Distinguished Graduate of the school. In 1924 he graduated from the Army War College.

He served as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, of the Philippine Department from 1924 to 1927; as a Member of the Field Artillery Board, Fort Bragg, N. C., from 1923 to 1931; as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, of the Hawaiian Department, from 1931 to 1934 and He was Military Attache of the American Embassy, Rome, Italy, from September, 1940, when he was ordered back from Rome on July 7th, 1940, he was assigned to command the Artillery of the 3rd Division, Fort Lewis, Washington, but on request of the Ambassador, Rome, Italy, he was retained as Military Attache in Rome until December, 1940, when he was ordered to command the 46th Field Artillery Brigade. He was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General on April 5th, 1941, and assigned to command the 46th Field Artille

HISTORY OF THE

On February 10, 1941, the 46th Field Artillery Brigade (G.H.Q.) came into being as a military unit under the command of Colonel George H. Paine. This apparently simple statement covers much, as this was the first time in the Military History of the United States that a unit as large as a Brigade was formed completely of Colored Troops.

The 46th Field Artillery Brigade was activated on February 10, 1941, at Camp Livingston, Louisiana. The Brigade consisted of the Headquarters Battery, the 350th and 351st regiments of 155mm howitzers and 353rd regiment, 155mm guns.

The first assignment of regular army officers was made as of February 1, and shortly thereafter Colonel Paine and his staff arrived at Camp Livingston. The Camp was far from completion and the area designated for the 46th Brigade was just under way. In view of this fact the Brigade was forced to establish a temporary head-quarters in another section of the camp.

On February 20th a cadre of 440 enlisted men from the 349th Field Artillery arrived and under the 56 regular army officers these men were made the parent detachments of the three regiments and were immediately started on a schedule of "Cadre" training. The 350th F. A., set up separate offices under Colonel T. G. M. Oliphant and the 353rd under Lieutenant Colonel Orva E. Beezley; Colonel Paine was in command of the 351st in addition to commanding the Brigade. In the early part of March one of the areas (353rd F.A., area) assigned to the 46th Brigade was completed, and Colonel Paine moved his headquarters, and those of the other two regiments, to the new area. The regiments then branched out and took up separate headquarters in temporary buildings. Around April 1st the other areas were completed and the 351st F.A., and 350th F.A., then moved to their permanent quarters.

During March and April a total of one hundred and seventy-two reserve officers reported for duty with the Brigade. These officers were immediately assigned to Regiments and tent quarters. The way in which these reserve officers were treated will always be a pleasant memory. General Paine as well as the Regimental commanders did everything possible to assist each officer in getting settled.

After the reserve officers had become acquainted with each other and their surroundings, refresher courses in gunnery, tactics, signal communications, motors and administration were started. These courses lasted about two weeks and proved of great value later on when the actual training of selectees started.

During the latter part of April and early in May, 3800 selectees from Forts Benning and Bragg and Camp Shelby were received in various increments, having been inducted from their homes in the Carolinas, Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee, Kentucky and Texas.

On April 1st a Band was authorized for the 350th F.A., for use as a Brigade Band, and was activated from a cadre of four bandsmen furnished to the Brigade by the 9th Cavalry. The band has since been fully organized and increased to twenty-five bandsmen. In addition to the band the Brigade has a swing orchestra of twelve pieces. Much praise is due Warr. Off. David C. King and Stf. Sgt. Harold M. McCray for moulding the band into the organization that it is today.

On April 5, 1941, Colonel Paine was appointed Brigadier-General, and assigned to Command the Brigade.

On April 28th the Brigade began its thirteen weeks training program with simultaneous specialists' schools for both officers and enlisted men, while officer selections were made for attendance at the Command and General Staff school, the Field Artillery school, Signal Communications schools and Motors schools. During this period many enlisted men were sent to schools on other posts. Some of the schools that enlisted personnel of the Brigade attended were Signal Communications, Motor Mechanics and Cooks and Bakers.

In addition to regular training schedules and instruction in special subjects handled by individual units, the

Brigade organized and conducted a number of successful schools. These schools were staffed with instructors in appropriate subjects furnished by the Louisiana State Department of Education and included several experts on leave from the Little Rock district engineer's office. One of these schools was the Intelligence School. Intelligence personnel of Brigade, Regimental and Battalion Headquarters received instruction in the duties of artillery intelligence sections, observation, and selection of positions, map reading, etc.

Captain Robert Raymond and 2nd Lieut. Oscar W. Burford of Brigade Headquarters were in charge of the instruction and training of this personnel.

A particularly important school was the Radio School under the direction of Major Frank N. Leakey, Brigade Communication Officer, and 1st Lieut. Alvin R. Bell who has since been appointed Brigade Communications Officer. The first session of the Brigade Radio School opened on May 12, 1941, with an enrollment of sixty students. Four Sergeants from the Brigade were assigned to the Brigade Radio School as instructors. Mr. Sgt. Myers, Tech. Sgt. Smith, Stf. Sgt. Whaley, and Sgt. Bell were instructors in Code, Printing, Air Ground Panel Communication, Radio Procedure and Telegraph field nets.

In all the Brigade Communication school has turned out about 115 highly trained and efficient operators.

The Brigade Communication school has already conducted a five-week refresher course for the purpose of increasing the code speed and improving the message handling ability of the operators.

In addition to the above school, the Brigade also initiated schools in General Mechanics, Gun Mechanics, Motor Mechanics and Stenography. In connection with these schools the 46th F.A. Brigade greatly appreciates the excellent co-operation of the Louisiana State Department of Education, and the instructors furnished for their untiring efforts in making these schools a success.

During the summer months the Brigade conducted an extensive athletic program for the benefit of the men. Schedules were issued under the instructions of the Brigade Athletic Officer to give the regiments a full schedule in baseball, soft ball, volley ball and horseshoe pitching. A Brigade trophy was presented to the winning team in each activity. Recently the Brigade finished a boxing program. The interest that the men displayed in this activity was overwhelming. At each of the matches the sports arena was filled to capacity with a crowd of some 3000 spectators.

The Brigade Commander and his Staff and the Brigade Headquarters Battery were assigned to constitute the Headquarters 3rd Provisional Antitank Group during the August and September Army Maneuvers in Louisiana in 1941 and received valuable field training and experience during these maneuvers.

The 46th F.A. Brigade has its own military police force, men for this force are supplied by the Brigade Military Police School. which is under the direction of Captain C. E. F. Lewis, so far the school has graduated a total of 160 highly trained military police. Classes which are scheduled for the trainees include training in the art of self defense, the practical use of tear gas and smoke pots and instruction in the use of the .45 caliber automatic pistol. The officers and men of the Brigade are proud of the record that their military police have set.

The Brigade recently formed the new 846th Tank Destroyer Battalion. The officers and men for this battalion were taken from the Antitank batteries of the Howitzer Regiments and from the Antitank and Anti-Aircraft platoons of the Headquarters batteries in the 46th F. A. Brigade and from the 349th F. A., stationed at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. The 846th Tank Destroyer Battalion is commanded by Lt. Colonel Charles W. Glover, and is attached to this Brigade for administration and training.

In conclusion the first installment in the history of the 46th F. A. Brigade deals entirely with the organization and training. Many of us wonder what the history of our Brigade will depict when the last paragraph is written, and we all feel assured that when the time comes for the 46th F. A. Brigade to take its place in the field of battle the officers and men of the Brigade will make a record for themselves of which they may all be justly proud.









COMMANDING THE 350th FIELD ARTILLERY

Colonel T. G. M. Oliphant, commanding the 350th Field Artillery, is a regular officer of many years service. Born at Bethesda, Maryland, in the late eighties, he enlisted at Washington Barracks, District of Columbia, in 1908, and was assigned to Battery "E", 6th Field Artillery, at Fort Riley, Kansas.

In 1911 he received his commission as 2nd Lieutenant of Field Artillery at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and was assigned to the 5th Field Artillery at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He was commissioned 1st Lieutenant July 1, 1916; Captain on May 5, 1917; Major (temporary) June 30, 1918; Lieutenant Colonel (temporary) October 30, 1918. He was returned to the rank of Major on July 1, 1920; promoted to the rank of permanent Lieutenant Colonel August 15, 1935, and to full Colonel on July 1, 1940.

He has served three tours of duty in the Philippine Islands and served in France and Germany during the last war. While in the Philippines he organized and commanded the only horse-drawn regiment of Filipino Field Artillery ever mustered into the U. S. Army.

He is a graduate of the Command and General Staff School. Fort Leavenworth Kansas; the School of Fire and advanced

He is a graduate of the Command and General Staff School, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas; the School of Fire and advanced Field Artillery courses at Fort Sill, Oklahoma; and the Chemical Warfare School at Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland.

In addition to service with the 2nd, 5th, 6th, 7th, 18th, 24th, 25th, 343rd, 347th and 350th Regiments of Field Artillery, he has served on the General Staff, on duty with the Organized Reserves in New York City and Detroit, with the National Guard of New Jersey, and with the National Guard Bureau in Washington, D. C.

He was assigned to activate and organize the 350th Field Artillery at Camp Livingston, La., and on February 17th, 1941, he arrived and assumed command.

HISTORY OF THE 350th FIELD ARTILLERY



Shield: Gules, a crennelated shield or, charged with a Lorraine Cross gules. The outer shield is red for the original 350th Field Artillery organized at Camp Dix, N. J., November 2, 1917. The inner shield of gold symbolizes the reconstitution of the 350th Field Artillery at Camp Livingston, La., on December 16, 1940, and its consolidation with its older parent unit. The Lorraine Cross recalls service on the Marbach Sector (Lorraine), France, in 1918.

An angry, red-eyed Pelican proper, poised for flight, holding a 155mm HE Shell proper in his feet, on a bandeau of alternate beads gules and argent, makes up the Crest. The Pelican links this regiment with the 46th Field Artillery Brigade, of which it is a part. The 155mm Shell points out the fact that the 350th is a 155mm Howitzer Regiment.

The history of the 350th Field Artillery really begins November 2nd, 1917, when this Regiment was first organized at Camp Dix, N. J. In that first World War, it was one of the Regiments of the Field Artillery Brigade of the 92nd Division, and saw service with that unit overseas. Official War Department records refer to its service in the Marbach Sector which entitled the Regiment to carry on its colors the rainbow streamer inscribed "Lorraine." Returning to home soil, the unit was demobilized March 12, 1919.

In the growing shadow of another war, the 350th Field Artillery was ordered reconstituted December 16, 1940, but its first actual beginning occurred February 17, 1941, when its commander, Colonel T. G. M. Oliphant, gathered together at Camp Livingston, La., a group of sixteen Regular Army Officers who had been assigned to the Regiment. The parent organization was the 349th Field Artillery which had itself only recently been organized at Fort Sill, Oklahoma., from veterans of the crack 24th and 25th Infantry and well known 9th and 10th Cavalry and from volunteers who joined the Army from southwestern states, principally Oklahoma and Texas. A cadre of one hundred and fifty non-commissioned officers and privates was drawn from the 349th Field Artillery, in company with cadres for the other two Regiments of the 46th Field Artillery Brigade which was being formed at Camp Livingston. These men left Fort Sill, Okla., on February 18th and arrived at their new station February 20th, a typical Louisiana winter day of rain and mud. Colonel Oliphant and a detail of officers met them and conducted them directly to their tent area. their tent area.

"Feed 'em, that's the important thing," was the order Colonel Oliphant had given in advance of this occasion, and one he was to give at many another critical time. Plans for this had been made and cooks were whisked out of ranks at once and taken to the mess hall to assist in preparing a hot meal which was already well under way.

Housed in a temporary area, the cadre went to work on intensive group training as soon as its men had unpacked their effects and made themselves comfortable. Buildings were still going up and bull-dozers roared through the night tearing away hillsides, but spots were found on which to drill with the howitzers that came in from Camp Jackson, S. C., and other equipment which was borrowed from every available source.

The next phase in the development of the Regiment was the arrival of a group of reserve officers who found the Commanding Officer and his staff prepared for them with a "refresher course" outlined with the view of having them thoroughly prepared to undertake instruction of the recruits when these should arrive. They applied themselves diligently and followed the directions given them so well that fully matured plans for the reception of the trainees were ready before their arrival. In the meantime, the members of the cadre worked hard to prepare the tent area and draw the supplies necessary to house and feed the new men and begin their training. A few cars and ½-ton trucks had been issued and these were used to transport the beds, mattresses and kitchen equipment from the warehouses. The Colonel and his supply officer were particularly busy digging up property and devising expedients to make possible some good instruction and training of the large number of men soon to join the Regiment. Organizational equipment was short; there were no radios or fire control instruments; there was a battery of 155mm howitzers but these had to be shared with other units of the Brigade which had received none. Only four 75mm guns were available for the antitank batteries and these had no sighting equipment. An example of the expedients adopted was the purchase of 25 wooden sights with turning parts milled out of seasoned gum and marked with graduations. A great deal of equipment was borrowed and in this connection the Regiment is particularly grateful to the 93rd Engineers, the 57th Field Artillery Brigade, the 106th Cavalry and Louisiana State University for very generous assistance in its hour of need. On April 18th aband cadre arrived from the 9th Cavalry and later, Warr. Off. David C. King was assigned to form a band from this nucleus.

The first hundred were brought immediately to the mess hall of Battery "A" and given a hot breakfast. After this, groups continued to arrive every day

HISTORY OF THE 351st FIELD ARTILLERY



Crest: On a wreath of the colors (or and gules) a pelican head erased proper orbed gules. Symbolizing the State Bird of Louisiana where the 351st Field Artillery was reactivated at Camp Livingston on February 10, 1941, and taken from the badge of the 46th Field Artillery Brigade of which this regiment is a part.

Shield: Gules, a buffalo head proper jessant de Lorraine Cross. The buffalo head is used to symbolize the Indian name for colored troops. The Lorraine Cross issuing from the buffalo's mouth indicates the close connection of the "Buffalo Soldier" to the Army's excellent record and the regiment's excellent record in Lorraine (Marbache Sector) during World War I.

Scroll: A ribbon gules bearing the motto "We Can Do It" in letters or.

On the seventh of October, 1917, at Camp Meade in Maryland, during the first World War, the 351st regiment of the Field Artillery was organized.

Formed by a cadre of enlisted men from the famous 9th and 10th Cavalry and the equally famous 24th and 25th Infantry, and filled to war time strength by volunteers and men inducted through Selective Service from the Middle Atlantic States, the regiment spent its initial instruction period at its birthplace. After an arduous winter in Maryland, the regiment embarked over the submarine infested waters of the Atlantic Ocean for its final training before front line warfare. During this period in France it was attached to various French Artillery Units for instructions in the different methods of warfare which would prepare it for its baptism of fire. After completion of training the regiment went to the front where it participated in the final phase of the war that ended victoriously for the Allies. Its last phase of action, from October 30, 1918, to the Armistice on November 11, 1918, was in the Marbache Sector. For this action the Regiment is entitled to a battle streamer embroidered "Lorraine" on its standards.

After the Armistice the regiment returned to the United States and was demobilized at Camp Meade on March 3, 1919.

The regiment was dormant until October 1, 1933, when it was designated as a Regular Army Regiment on inactive status until December 16, 1940, when it was transferred to the active list and reconstituted. On the twentieth of February, 1941, the regiment was activated at Camp Livingston, Louisiana, under the command of Brigadier General George H. Paine, then Colonel, as a 155 Howitzer regiment and part of the 46th Field Artillery Brigade. It became therefore an integral part of the only Colored Field Artillery in the Regular Army. This time the regiment was formed from a cadre of enlisted men from the 349th Field Artillery, stationed at Fort Sill, who in turn had been formed by a cadre of men from the 9th and 10th Cavalry and 24th and 25th Infantry, many who came to this regiment. Again the traditions of this organization were revised from its famous predecessors. And again the regiment was filled to war time strength by members drawn by the Selective Service, this time from the Southeastern States.

Thus the Declaration of War with the Axis Powers found the regiment reformed and willing and eager to follow its appointed task from the point it left off twenty-three years ago in the Old World War, confident that it would live up to the traditions set forth and anxious to follow in the footsteps of those members of the regiment who served so valiantly and faithfully in the past.

He began his military career in September, 1909, with appointment as Captain, Paymaster, Kansas National Guard and in November, 1911, he was appointed Army Paymaster's Clerk, Pay Department, U. S. Army. He served at Fort Leavenworth, in the Philippine Islands and in Washington, D. C., where he was appointed Second Lieutenant, Quartermaster Corps, (Finance Section) in June of 1916.

He went to France as a member of General Pershing's Staff in May, 1917, and served there until May, 1920, returning home with the rank of Major. While in France he served as Base Finance Officer, opening the offices at St. Nazaire, Rotterdam and Antwerp; also as Chief Finance Officer, First Army, from its organization until February, 1919, when he was selected as Chief Finance Officer of a new S.O.S. to supply the troops on the Rhine. This organization was not completed and he was made Financial Requisition Officer, A. E. F., with station in Paris where he remained until his return home.

On arrival home, he was returned to his Regular Army Rank, promoted to Captain in July, 1920, and to Major in February, 1921. He was graduated from the School of the Line, Fort Leavenworth, in 1922; from the General Staff School in 1923; and the Army War College in 1924. That year he transferred to the Field Artillery and was graduated from the Field Artillery School in 1925. He has served in the 12th Field Artillery, the 1st Field Artillery, with the North Carolina National Guard and with the R.O.T.C. at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. He was carried on the Eligible List for both War Department General Staff and General Staff with troops. In 1937 he was made Lieutenant Colonel and in 1941 was promoted to Colonel.

HISTORY OF THE 353rd FIELD ARTILLERY

The rayonne alludes to the "all covering fire" of the 353rd Field Artillery; the pelican device, to the State of Louisiana, wherein the 353rd Field Artillery was activated.

The 353rd Field Artillery, an integral part of the 46th Field Artillery Brigade, was activated at Camp Livingston, Louisiana, on February 10, 1941, under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Orva E. Beezley. The Regimental Commander arrived at Camp Livingston on February 15th and found that there were three officers assigned to the Regiment, but no enlisted men. At that time Camp Livingston was far from completion and the area in which the Regiment was to be located was without tents or buildings. Temporary headquarters were established in another section of the camp and the work of organizing a regiment of Field Artillery was begun.

On March 20, 1941, a cadre of one hundred and twenty-four enlisted men arrived and was assigned to the Regiment. These men came from the 349th Field Artillery which had been activated at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, in the fall of 1940 from cadres drawn from the 9th and 10th Cavalry and the 24th and 25th Infantry. The cadre sent to the 353rd Field Artillery contained a proportionate share of the older soldiers who had seen service with these four colored regiments of the Regular Army at different posts of the United States and its possessions.

By March 1st, eighteen Regular Army officers had been assigned to the Regiment and thereafter the Regiment moved into its area in the camp. On March 11, 1941, the first Reserve officer reported for duty and others began coming in at the rate of three or four a day until the end of the month when the authorized officer strength of the Regiment was virtually completed. The Reserve officers were drawn from the Second, Third and Fourth Corps Areas. During this period intensive refresher courses were conducted in conjunction with the necessary work in organizing the Regiment.

The first selectees arrived on April 17th and were assigned to Battery B; and subsequently contingents of selectees arrived intermittently for a period of approximately one week until every organization in the Regiment was brought to authorized strength. These selectees were received from Replacement Centers at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, Fort Benning, Georgia, Camp Blanding, Florida and Camp Shelby, Mississippi where they had been assembled after induction into the Service. All of the southern states are represented in the Regiment, with a preponderance of selectees coming from the Carolinas, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana.

The Field Artillery Mobilization Program, which prescribes the training of all Field Artillery regiments at Unit Training Centers, was started in the Regiment on April 28, 1941. In addition to this training, the enlisted men have been attending specialists' schools conducted by the 46th Field Artillery Brigade in radio communication, motor maintenance and repair, carpentry, cooking and many other subjects. Further, each month sees a representation of both officers and men of this Regiment at such Service Schools as are located at Fort Sill, Oklahoma; Normoyle Quartermaster Depot, Texas; Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania; Fort Wayne, Michigan; Beaumont General Hospital, El Paso, Texas; Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland, and Fort Benning, Georgia.

Through such schooling as this, through continued training in camp and tactical exercises in the field, the 353rd Field Artillery—which presently comprises 65 officers and 1385 men, and is armed with twenty-four 155mm guns drawn by Diesel prime movers—is daily perfecting its combat efficiency.

HISTORY OF THE 846th TANK DESTROYER BATTALION



Crest: A pelican, or, poised for flight and grasping an antitank projectile in his claws. The pelican symbolizes the State Bird of Louisiana where this battalion was activated at Camp Livingston, on December 15, 1941, and also is taken as a symbol from the badge of the 46th Brigade from which its personnel was drawn.

Escutcheon: A shield, gules, fimbriated or, symbolical of the Field Artillery. Charge: Three Buffalo heads and forelegs, or, as a unit centered in shield symbolizing the Indian name for Colored troops (Buffalo Soldiers) facing in three directions to represent mutual protection of the three firing companies and readiness in all directions.

Scroll: The motto in letters, gules, on a pendant ribbon, or.

Motto: Meet 'em, beat 'em!

In accordance with Letter Headquarters Third Army, Lake Charles, La., dated August 15, 1941. Subject: "Organization of Provisional Antitank Battalion" the 46th Field Artillery Brigade published General Order No. 17 dated August 22, forming the 46th Provisional Antitank Battalion from the four antitank batteries with Lieutenant Colonel Charles W. Glover in command. Two days later, while still striving to organize a staff and form a Headquarters Battery, the battalion was ordered into the Louisiana maneuvers. As a result of this initial action the following letter of commendation was received by the Commanding Officer from Major General George V. Strong, Commanding General, VIII Army Corps:

- "1. I desire to commend you for the energy and initiative displayed during the Corps vs. Corps Field Maneuvers, August 25-27.
- "2. Your cooperation with the Commander of the antitank defenses of the VIII Army Corps and the combat efficiency of your newly organized command contributed very materially to the success of the Corps withdrawal during the night August 26-27.
- "3. This splendid performance of duty exemplifies true leadership on your part, and the efficiency of your battalion is particularly commendable in view of the fact that it had been organized but five days before its attachment to the VIII Army Corps."

During the remainder of the maneuver this battalion continued to provide antitank defense for the units of the Third Army with the same energy and initiative that it displayed in this initial "baptism of fire." At the termination of the field exercises the provisional unit was disbanded in October, 1941, and the various batteries reverted to their parent regiments.

War was declared on Japan December 8, 1941, and just one week later the 846th Tank Destroyer Battalion was activated pursuant to instructions contained in War Department letter dated December 3, 1941. Subject: "Organization of Tank Destroyer Battalion." Lieutenant Colonel Glover was again placed in command of the unit. Companies were activated with personnel from the 350th, 351st, and 353rd Field Artillery Regiments of the 46th Field Artillery Brigade and with forty men from the 349th Field Artillery Regiment of the 18th Field Artillery Brigade, Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

This battalion since its inception in August, 1941, has been trained with one major objective—to instill in every man the spirit of offensive action. This spirit of audacious, fire-engine tactics together with the confidence inspired by superb weapons and superior leadership will result in victory when the "Tank Busters" roll to battle.

And the sooner, the better.

















History of the 350th Field Artillery

until April 25th, by which time the Regiment was pretty well filled up. The greater part of these men came from homes in Louisiana, Mississippi and North Carolina. They were dispatched from reception centers at Camp Shelby, Miss., Fort Bragg, N. C., Camp Blanding, Florida, and Fort Benning, Ga. Officers and cadre non-commissioned officers met each contingent at the railroad station and conducted them in formation to their first meal, while the "Soldier's Qualification Cards" were examined and definite assignments to batteries made. In general, the policy was to fill up a battery at a time but individuals with particular qualifications were selected for certain units. In this way, the 1st Battalion was filled nearly to strength in a few days and was able to undertake the first week's instruction as outlined in the Mobilization Training Program. The following week, when the 2nd Battalion was fairly well filled, both Battalions began again at the beginning of the program, which was to take thirteen weeks to complete.

On May 14th, 19th, 21st, 25th and 28th, additional groups of trainees arrived and were grouped in recruit detachments which were given special training to catch them up to the first groups. This catching-up process consumed three weeks, but was well handled and at its close, the Regiment was up to full strength with 1503 enlisted men and all of them abreast of the schedule. During these first weeks ample numbers of well qualified, enthusiastic officers were available for duty in the batteries and drills went on according to the schedule, but by the middle of May eight officers had been taken away temporarily as students at service schools. From this time on, for one reason or another, there was always a shortage of officers, but those remaining for duty did excellent work in overcoming the severe handicap of lack of equipment for training. By the fifth week, the schedule was calling for plenty of gun drill, battery field exercises and firing, but the shortage of howitzers was nearly as acute as it ha

had served a very good purpose. Meanwhile, some excellent schools for specialists were started under the supervision of the Brigade commander.

A big event in the early training of the Regiment was a trip to the new artillery range near Leesville on June 30. The next two days, July 1st and 2nd, were devoted to firing service ammunition, and this was so arranged that every gun and howitzer section in the Regiment had a chance to serve the pieces during the firing of at least one problem. All personnel of the Regiment now longed for service in the field, but when the Third Army Maneuvers took place in the early autumn of 1941, the 350th, as well as the other regiments of the 46th Field Artillery Brigade, was doomed to stay at home, filling the secondary role of supplying officers and loaning equipment and vehicles to more fortunate units who were included in the maneuvering forces. A provisional antitank battalion was formed, however, and its commander was Lieut. Colonel Charles W. Glover, an officer of the 350th Field Artillery, while its units were formed from the antitank batteries of the 350th and 351st Field Artillery. This unit gave an excellent account of itself on the maneuvers.

Meanwhile, in order to keep interest alive, the Regiment missed

Meanwhile, in order to keep interest alive, the Regiment missed no chance of going out on regimental field exercises which regularly included movements under cover of darkness and simulated firing at night, under a great variety of situations and in various parts of the training area. No week went by without at least one field exercise and they were nearly always overnight exercises. This work soon seasoned the men for field service and taught them to establish command posts, lay wire and put howitzers into position, day or night, without delay or confusion, while hot meals were cooked in rear positions and brought up to the hungry soldiers just as is done in war.

Interest was kept alive during the hot August and September days by training tests in which each battery strove to achieve the honor of being the best in the regiment in such phases of the training as drill of the firing battery and signal communications.

As the first year of the life of the 350th Field Artillery draws to its close, the Regiment is firing again on the artillery range, this time including a wide variety of advanced types of firing, some of them at night, while real War has been thrust upon the Nation and the Regiment stands ready to do its part when called upon. Many of its officers have been sent away to take part in the struggle, but the equipment is now complete and the men know how to play the game of war. Colonel Oliphant and a few of the officers who worked with him to guide the unit over its early obstacles are still on hand working harder than ever and on the alert 24 hours a day for the call to arms.
