



FOREWORD




Hopkins Muster Roll, World War II, is presented with not a little trepidation. To collect suitable photographs and secure adequate data on each of the men and women of Hopkins who served in the late war has been a task fraught with more difficulty than was anticipated when the work was undertaken. In many cases the only available pictures have been all but unfit for reproduction. In some others, no photographs of any sort were to be had. While in some few more it has been impossible, following laborious effort, to secure the data, or the full data, on their military service. Some persons, unexplainably, have preferred not to appear in these pages with their pictures and military records. More than this, labor and paper shortages beyond control, in the 16 months following VJ Day, have delayed for at least six months, publication. If, therefore, the complete records of some have not been recorded, if the photos of some are found missing, and if some minor errors have crept into the book because of the human factor, the publishers ask the understanding and forebearance of all.



Ensign John D. Arnot

Ensign John D. Arnot entered service Feb. 2, 1942, at Great Lakes, Ill. He was commissioned May 30, 1943, at Notre Dame University, served at Ohio University, Seattle, Astoria, Ore. He embarked Feb. 17, 1943, at Norfolk, Va. Serving as a navigator aboard an LCI he saw action in Africa, Sicily and Italy. He fought at Bizerte, in Sicily, at Salerno, Anzio, holds the American and Europeon theater ribbons and four battle stars. His death from sclerosis and a brain tumor resulted from a spinal injury Dec. 30, 1944, at the U. S. Naval Hospital at Astoria, Ore. His widow Sarah Louise and son Douglas survive.




Pfc. Jasper W. Beardsley

Jasper Beardsley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Beardsley, entered the Army May 1, 1945, at Ft. Snelling and was assigned to cavalry at Ft. Riley, Kan. He went overseas Oct. 28, 1945, from Vancouver, Wash., was assigned to the Fifth Special Service Co. and served as a cook at a rest camp in Kyoto, Honshu, Japan. Pvt. Beardsley was killed Feb. 9, 1946, when the trolley car in which he was riding to duty left the tracks and crashed over an embankment. He is buried in an Army Cemetery at Yokohama, Honshu. Survivors are his wife and a daughter Mary Ann.



LT. DONALD BLAKE


Lt. Donald Blake entered the Army on March 15, 1943, at Fort Mason, Calif., and served at Camp Stoneman, Calif. The eldest son of Dr. and Mrs. James Blake, he attended Hopkins high school, and was graduated from St. John's University and studied three years at the University of Minnesota. He had made his home in the West since leaving college. Lt. Blake was killed Sept. 23, 1943, when his car, an army car in which he was riding, rolled over an embankment at Ft. Mason. Burial services were in California, interment was in the National Cemetery, San Francisco.





CPL. DEAN DOVENBERG

Cpl. Dean Dovenberg entered the army engineers' corps May 20, 1941, at Ft. MacArthur, San Pedro, Calif., and was trained at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., Westover Field, Chicopee Falls, Mass., and Angel Island, Calif. He was sent overseas Oct. 7, 1941, from San Francisco and fought to the bitter end on Bataan Peninsula. He was taken prisoner by the Japanese, at the fall of Corregidor, made the Death March from Bataan, was interned five months at Camp O'Donell when he succumbed to diptheria Sept. 1, 1942. His mother is Mrs. Dora Dovenberg.



Joined the Regular Navy May 5, 1943, trained at Farragut and Bremerton Navy Yards, Wash. On Oct. 9, 1943, he sailed from San Diego, Calif., aboard the aircraft carrier, Manila Bay. Participated in the battles of Leyte, Luzon, the Marshalls, Marianas, Bismarck Archipelago, New Guinea, and Philippines, earned American and Asiatic Pacific theater ribbons with four battle stars. Wounded aboard the Manila Bay in the battle of Luzon. awarded the Purple Heart and died Jan. 7, 1945, of internal wounds, burns on the arms and back, and shock. He is survived by his wife, Veronica.





T/5 John Arthur Hams

John Arthur Hams entered the Army artillery March 23, 1942, trained at Ft. Knox, Ky., shipped overseas May 30, 1942, from New York City. Serving with the 16th Engineering Bn. Hq. Co., he fought chiefly in the African theater, in the campaigns of Tunisia and the Battle of Mateur, North Africa. Cpl. Hams was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in the African campaign, and, in the battle of Tunisia, died of wounds incurred by the explosion of an anti-personnel bomb. He died at Mateur, North Africa, May 5, 1943, and was the son of Mrs. Peter Dougherty.



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PVT. WILLIS EDWIN HUTCHINSON

Pvt. Willis Edwin Hutchinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Hutchinson, entered the armed services on Dec. 30, 1943, at Hopkins, and was subsequently assigned to the infantry As a member of Co. G, 22nd infantry, he embarked July 6, 1944, from New York City for service overseas in the European theater. He was based in England for a time and later participated in action against the Nazis in France. He landed "somewhere in France" on July 30. No other details of his combat experience were learned. He was killed in action in France on August 25, 1944.



Pvt. George Lauman

Pvt. Lauman joined the Army infantry May 28, 1943, at Ft. Snelling, served at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan. and Camp Fannin, Tex., and went overseas Feb. 22, 1944, from Maryland. With the 85th division he was killed in the Italian campaign Oct. 16, 1944. In his last letter to his family he said he had just been discharged from the hospital. They assumed he had been wounded—and was being sent back into action. This had been his second hospitalization. He was in action but a few days then when he was killed. Pvt. Lauman's body lies in Italy.



S 1/c LEROY B. LEHMBECKER


LeRoy Lehmbecker enlisted in the naval aviation forces on Aug. 22, 1942, at Minneapolis. He was given his first training at the United States Naval Training Station at San Diego, Calif., then went overseas from the same station on Sept. 9, 1942. He served with the U. S. Naval Air Station Navy 128 in the South Pacific. On Feb. 13, 1944, Sailor Lehmbecker was drowned while on a rescue mission near Midway Island. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lehmbecker.





SGT. MARVIN E. LOOCK

Sgt. Marvin Loock entered the U. S. Army at Ft. Snelling on Oct. 28, 1942. He was later assigned to training centers at Camp Polk, La., Ft. Knox, Ky., Camp Barkeley, Tex., Camp Ibis, Calif. and Camp Cooke, Calif. From New York City in October of the following year he embarked for his service overseas. With the late General George S. Patton's famed Third Army, Sgt. Loock fought his way across France and into Germany and Austria. He was injured in a vehicle accident on July 13, 1945, near Reid, Austria. He died July 23, 1945, from peritonitis. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Erich A. Loock.



Sgt. "Sonny" Miller joined the Army infantry March 23, 1942. Following his induction at Ft. Snelling he trained at Camp San Luis Obispo, Calif., and then at Fort Ord, Calif. He was sent overseas with the Seventh Division from Ft. Ord, on April 13, 1943, and served in the Pacific and Aleutian theaters, being stationed at Attu, Kwajalein, the Marshall Islands and Leyte. Besides four battle stars, he was awarded the Purple Heart, Bronze Star and a Presidential Unit Citation. He died Nov. 26, 1944. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben F. Miller.





PVT. ORIEN NELSON

Pvt. Orien Nelson entered the service Nov. 11, 1944, at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., and trained at Camp Wolters, Tex. He sailed from Fort Ord, Calif., April 10, 1945, for the South Pacific as an infantry replacement, assigned to the 21st infantry, Co. E, 24th division, which took the island of Mindanao. As platoon runner on June 16, 1945, he was advancing, 25 yards behind the two leading scouts, when, conspicuous with his radio equipment, he was shot down by a Jap sniper. Pvt. Nelson is buried at the United States Armed Forces cemetery near Davao, Mindanao. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Fred A. Nelson.





1st Lt. Harold T. Novak

Lt. Novak enlisted April 11, 1942, trained in California, Arizona and Florida. He left for Europe from Georgia Jan. 1, 1944, and completed 48 missions in Italy, Germany, and France. He was a pilot flight squadron leader, wore the European theater ribbon with five battle stars, the Distinguished Flying Cross, a Presidenial Citation with two oak leaf clusters and the Air Medal with eight clusters. Over France, on Aug. 19, 1944, his B-26 got a direct hit from anti-aircraft, and fell into the English Channel. He was the son of Mrs. Mary McGivern.



Pfc. Robert D. Plehal

Pfc. Robert Plehal joined the Army infantry Sept. 4, 1943, at Camp Fannin, Tex., and received all his training there before shipping out for the wars in April, 1944, from Ft. Ord, Calif. He served with the Army Scouts of the 38th Division in the Pacific war against the Japanese. He fought at Oro Bay, Finchafen, Hollandia, Leyte, Bataan, Manila and WaWa dam. Pfc. Plehal was killed in action at Sapangbato on April 12, 1945, just four months before the war's end. The circumstances of his death have not been learned by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Plehal. He is buried on Luzon, Philippine Islands.



Lt. Douglas H. Puck

An Army Air Force navigator and photographer, Lt. Puck entered service Jan. 10, 1942. From Ft. Snelling he was sent to Tulare, then Santa Ana, Mather Field, and Mercer, all in California; then to Colorado Springs, Colo., Will Rogers Field, Okla., Hunter Field, Ga. He fought with the 20th Combat Mapping Squadron at Biak on New Guinea. He did reconnaissance flights and photographed target areas. Over New Guinea in bad weather, his flying fortress crashed into a mountainside May 22, 1944, and all personnel were lost. Lt. Puck was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman J. Puck.




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S/Sgt. Joseph L. Redpath

Sgt. Redpath joined the Army Air Corps in September, 1942, trained in radar and as a bombardier, studied at various fields in the States, before heading for the European Theater from Langley Field, Va. He fought with the 390th Bomb Group, and won the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters. He was missing as of Jan. 14, 1945. He had been flying missions as a gunner on a B-17. He was officially declared dead Jan. 15, 1946. His death occurred over Derbin, Germany, and his body was recovered and buried in the Russian zone. He is the son of Mrs. Mary L. Redpath.



S/SGT. WILLIAM H. SLOAN

Sgt. Sloan was one of the first Americans to go overseas, as a member of the National Guard. He was the second Hopkins man known to die in World War II. Sgt. Sloan was sent to Claiborne, La., with the 151st artillery. From Fort Dix in January, 1942, he left for Ireland with the 34th division. Sgt. Sloan was with the first artillery battalion to fire against the Nazis in North Africa. He was wounded Nov. 19, 1942, in North Africa, was hospitalized in Beja, and died the next day, Nov. 20, 1942, of stomach wounds. He is the son of Mrs. Jessie Sloan.







PFC. GEORGE F. STRACHOTA


George Strachota joined the Army at Ft. Snelling April 28, 1941, trained at Camp Claiborne, La., and Billings, Mont. He was sent to the South Pacific in March of 1942 from San Francisco. Overseas he served with the Americal Division, at New Guinea and Guadalcanal, and in the Solomon Islands. Wounded on Guadalcanal he was evacuated to a hospital at New Hebrides. He died 24 hours later, Nov. 8, 1942. He was awarded the Purple Heart and a Presidential Citation and is survived by his wife and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Strachota, and two brothers, Vladimir and Clarence.





SGT. CARL J. JR. ZOBEL

Sgt. Carl Zobel, Jr., joined the Army Air Forces Sept. 18, 1942, and was sent to various fields for training. He served with bomber groups in the European and African Middle Eastern theaters. He participated in the campaigns of North France, The Rhineland and Normandy and was awarded the Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Good Conduct medal and the Distinguished Unit Badge with three battle stars, and had 30 to 40 missions to his credit. He was killed when his Marauder bomber crashed in France while on a mission of low altitude bombing in Germany, Oct. 5, 1944. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Carl Zobel.



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Lt. COMM. ALICE M. ANDERSON

Entered service June 2, 1942, at Great Lakes, Ill. Sent to Naval Hospital at Seattle, Wash., then overseas in March, 1945, from San Francisco to Hawaii. Stationed with Naval Hospital No. 29 at Hawaii. Returned to U. S. in November 1945, and re-assigned to Great Lakes, then to Jacksonville, Fla. At Jacksonville Lt. Anderson taught nursing to corpsmen. She received her promotion to Lieutenant Commander in September, 1946. She is a graduate of the high school of Albert City, Ia., and studied for two years at Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill. Took her nurses' training at Swedish Hospital.

Ensign Bonnie Jean Caroline

Entered Navy nursing May 31, 1944, at Great Lakes, Ill., and served chiefly at the Naval Hospital at Corona, Calif. Ensign Caroline graduated from nurses' training at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, studied at St. Theresa's Hospital in Winona for two years before going into nursing. She was working at the Rochester Hospital at the time she decided to offer her services to Uncle Sam. Discharged in the spring of 1946 at San Diego, the former ensign liked her Corona station so well she elected to station herself there permanently. She accepted a position in a private hospital there, as a surgical nurse.





Y 1/c Priscilla J. Chadwick

Joined the Spars Oct. 10, 1943. Trained at Coast Guard headquarters, Palm Beach, Fla., was then ordered to Washington, D. C., where she remained for the duration as private secretary to a Commander in the SPAR building there. Yeoman Chadwick received her honorable discharge from the SPARS at Detroit Mich., and on returning to civilian life took up her pre-war job with the Minneapolis Star Journal as a proof reader and copy-holder.



PHM 1/c BARBARA JANE FREEMAN

Joined the WAVES in March, 1944. Sent to Hunter College, N. Y., for basic training. Later, to Bethesda Hospital, Md., Camp Pendleton, Oceanside, Calif., and San Diego. On dispensary duty, she worked with doctors keeping office records, etc. Miss Freeman received her first class rating at Camp Pendleton. Discharged August 21, 1946, at San Diego, she enjoyed some sight-seeing in the West before returning to Hopkins and civilian life late in September.





1st. Lt. Esther E. Jorgensen

Entered the Army Nurse Corps Nov. 3, 1944, at Camp Carson, Colorado. Served at Fitzsimmons General Hospital in Denver, the station hospital at Peterson Field, Colo., and at Fort Worth, Tex. Lt. Jorgensen was stationed longest at Fitzsimmons General Hospital, one of the Army's largest, as a surgical nurse. Following her discharge in April, 1946, at Ft. Worth, Tex., she returned to Hopkins, worked a short time at General Hospital before leaving Sept. 3 for six months' of post graduate work in surgery at Michael Reese Hospital in Chicago.

T/5 RUTH KOKESH

Miss Kokesh entered service as a private, worked up to T/5 by the time of discharge, Nov. 25, 1945. She enlisted Oct. 3, 1944. After basic training at Ft. Des Moines, she went to Fitzsimmons General Hospital, Denver, Colo., as a laboratory technician, remained there for the duration. Before her WAC career Miss Kokesh was employed at the Nicollet Clinic as a lab technician, and also at St. Theresa's Hospital at Waukegan, Ill.







VALERIA D. KRAUTKREMER

Joined the American Red Cross at Washington, D. C., Sept. 6, 1943, trained at Ft. Jackson, Columbia, So. Car., and embarked for the Mediterranean theater Oct. 27, 1943, from Newport News, Va. Worked with the 34th Station and the 56th Evacuation hospitals in Palermo, Sicily, Naples and Trieste, in the Rome-Arno campaigns and the Po Valley. Following her termination in January, 1946, Miss Krautkremer went to Denver as Personnel manager for Continental Airlines. She returned to Hopkins in October of 1946 for a brief visit en route to Washington, D. C., where she was to resume Red Cross duty. She was made a staff assistant and ordered to the European Theater.

Y 2/c MARJORIE MARY LAPIC

Entered the WAVES Nov. 14, 1944, discharged May 17, 1946. Was stationed at Hunter's College, N. Y., A. and M. College, Stillwater, Okla., Elizabeth City, N. C., and Norfolk, Va. Served thereafter as a clerical worker and stenographic worker, doing personnel work and secretarial work. A graduate of Hopkins high school, Marjorie before enlisting was employed at Minneapolis-Moline in the priorities department. She took a position at Rodgers Hydraulic Co., St. Louis Park, following her honorable discharge.





CAPT. BEATRICE LOFGREN

Commissioned an Army nurse Oct. 19, 1942, and sent to Stark General Hospital, Charleston, So. Car. Went overseas Jan. 5, 1943, from San Francisco. Served there with the 233rd Station Hospital, later renamed the 247th General Hospital. Served at Nadzab, New Guinea, Hollandia and Clark Field, near Manila. Holds the American Theatre, Philippine Liberation, Asiatic Pacific and Victory ribbons, and a Battle Star for the New Guinea campaign. Promoted to Captaincy in January, 1945. Discharged Feb. 6, 1946, she married on July 20, becoming Mrs. Nathaniel DeLue, and is now an instructor in medical nursing at Minneapolis General Hospital.



PHYLLIS M. MAETZOLD

Joined the WAC March 30, 1943. Sent to Ft. Des Moines, Ia., for training, then assigned to Camp Detrick, near Frederick, Md., for secretarial work in a chemical warfare headquarters. When the WAAC was absorbed into the Army, the women soldiers were at that time free to choose to re-enlist in the new corps—or become civilians. Phyllis chose the latter course, leaving service August 27, 1943. She became Mrs. Verner Olson on March 30, 1946, and is now living in Red Wing.





CADET NURSE PATRICIA MALERICH

Joined the Cadet Nurse Corps Oct. 1, 1944, at the University of Minnesota. She was already a student of nursing at the University when she enlisted in the Corps. With one more year to go before completion, she will return to the University for further study, after student nurse work at Glen Lake sanatorium, Miller Hospital, St. Paul, Minneapolis General and the University Hospital. Miss Malerich is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. A. H. Malerich.

SGT. MARY G. MALLERY

Mary Grace Mallery joined the Women's Army Corps April 9, 1943. Her last station was with the Air Transport Command in Honolulu, Hawaii, where she worked in the priorities department. Here she dispensed transportation accommodations—priorities to planes, boats and reservations. Before assignment overseas, Mary Grace was stationed at Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga., Tampa, Fla., and Fairfield Soisson Air Base, Calif. She left for Hawaii March 11, 1944. She was discharged Oct. 7, 1945, at Ft. Sheridan, Ill.







2ND LT. MAVON MARTINSON

A surgical nurse, Lt. Martinson offered her services to the Army April 7, 1945, and was subsequently stationed at Camp Carson, Colo., the Hospital at Clinton, Ia., Ft. Lewis, Wash., and the Hospital at Ft. Sill, Okla. Before assignment to duty at Camp Carson Lt. Martinson was a surgical nurse at Abbott Hospital. She also worked at the Good Samaritan and St. John's in St. Paul. She is a graduate of Bethesda Hospital, St. Paul. Discharged in the autumn of 1945, she was married in June, 1946, to Edward W. Jordan, D.V.M. She is now living at Juntsville, Ala.

CPL. DOROTHEA DODGE MEISTER

Entered the WAC in November, 1943, and received basic training at Ft. Des Moines, Ia. Later choosing the Air-WAC, she trained as a mechanic, then served at Colorado Springs, Colo., Tucson, Ariz., and Amarillo, Tex. At Amarillo, she studied the inner mysteries of the B-24 and B-29, then returned to Tucson for duty. Attached to the Second Air Force, she was never sent overseas. She was discharged Dec. 7, 1945 at Tucson. On May 21, 1946, she was married, in South Dakota, to Gerald Meister, whom she met at Tucson Army Air Base. Mr. and Mrs. Meister are now living in Hopkins.





PHM 2/c LILLIAN MORRISSETTE

Joined the WAVES Sept. 1, 1943, at Minneapolis. After training at Hunter College, N. Y., she was sent to the United States Naval Hospital at San Diego, Calif., and later to El Centro. In 1936 Miss Morrissette came to Hopkins with her sister Pauline to live with their uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Moore, at 129 Park Lane. In her Navy hospital work she specialized in x-ray work. Discharged Oct. 11, 1945, from San Diego, Calif., she returned to Hopkins, took a clerical position in the eligibility department of the Veterans' Administration in Minneapolis.



Y 1/c Pauline L. Morrissette

Joined the Navy Oct. 29, 1942, at Minneapolis. First stationed at Wold Chamberlain, she was later sent to Millageville, Ga., and Hunter College, New York City. She worked there in Public Relations. Among the celebrities who visited the WAVE center at New York were Mme. Chiang Kai-Shek, President and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt—not to say movie stars by the gross. All were "handled" by Public Relations. With a record of nearly three years' service, Pauline was discharged Oct. 9, 1945, at Great Lakes, Ill.





1st. Lt. Annette A. Nelson

Commissioned an Army nurse March 6, 1942, at Ft. Snelling, and sent to Ft. Sill, Okla. From the New York City port of embarkation, she headed overseas Oct. 20, 1942. Served with the 26th and 45th General Hospitals in England, Africa and Italy. Quartered briefly in Birmingham, she was soon sent to Oran for a month; spent ten months in Constantine, then went to Tunis and Bizerte. She saw action in the Tunisian, Naples,Foggia and Rome-Arno campaigns, holds three battle stars and the meritorious service unit citation. She spent almost two years in Bari, Italy. She landed back in the United States Nov. 1, 1945, and was released from service at Des Moines, Ia., three months later.

1st. Lt. Lucille M. Pedersen

Joined the Army Nurse Corps Dec. 8, 1942, in Minneapolis. Following her enlistment Lt. Pedersen received assignments at Lowry Field, Colo., and Buckley Field, Colo. A Hopkins High School graduate and also an alumnus of St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester, Lieutenant Pedersen is now Mrs. John Monogue, making her home in Fairmont, Minn. She took this rank Sept. 8, 1945, and with it a veteran of three years of overseas service. She received her discharge within a month of marriage, at the Sioux Falls, So. Dak. air base.







S 1/c CHARLOTTE RASMUSSEN

Entering service May, 1944, Miss Rasmussen worked in the Bronx, N. Y., WAVE headquarters and in Washington, D. C. The assistant petty officer in the commissary division, Charlotte had seven enlisted women working under her. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claus Rasmussen, Storekeeper Rasmussen's longest duty was at Washington, D. C. CAPT. HELEN E. TATARKA



SGT. MARY JANE (HAVERTY) WINNETT
















ANDERSON, CCM. CARL A.

ANDERSON, CPL. ROBERT G.





ASPLUND, S 1/c KENNETH H.





BECKMAN, M/SGT. RICHARD J.





BIGOT, EM 1/c RALPH F.



BLAKE, SGT. JEROME C.



On Aug. 6, 1944, he left New York with the 104th Infantry Div. which crossed the Rhine in Northern France, was at Cologne and the Ruhr in the Rhineland and Central Europe. Sgt. Blake received the ETO, American and Victory ribbons, and three battle stars, was discharged Oct. 1, 1945.

BLAKE, CAPT. PAUL S.

Dr. Paul Blake is the third doctor of the family who entered the Army Medical Corps. Like his brother James he went in at Camp Barkeley, Tex., from there he was ordered to Camps Edwards and Claibourne, and then to Seattle. He went to Europe with Medical Detachment 327, attached to the 84th Division (Railsplitters). In action in Northern France and in the Ardennes, and was awarded the Bronze Star. He returned to the States, was discharged in the summer of 1946.

BLAKE, MAJ. WARNER P.



He was transferred later to a Cavalry Division to await return home. Received ETO ribbon and two stars, the American and Victory ribbons, and the Presidential Unit Citation. Discharged at Camp McCoy, Jan. 20, 1946.

















BOHACH, CPL. ROBERT W.

Another artilleryman, Cpl. Bohach was sworn into the army Sept. 30, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. He learned his artillery lessons at Camp Stoneman, Calif. On Nov. 19, 1942, he left San Francisco with the 27th Division, 249th Field Artillery, for Hawaii and then on to the Pacific Theater. Saw action at Saipan, Okinawa, and the New Hebrides Islands, in some of the costliest Pacific campaigns. For this service he earned the Asiatic, American, Victory and Good Conduct ribbons, and was discharged Dec. 28, 1945, from Camp McCoy.

Bollig, GM 2/c Marvin L.

Bollig went into the Navy Aug. 23, 1945, from Hopkins. He first went out to the good ship San Diego, where most land sailors taste the sea-with salt in it. He trained to be a Naval Air Technician at Norman, Okla., then went to gunnery school at Jacksonville, Fla. Was transferred to Norfolk, Va., where he did some flying. His Navy enlistment will not expire until 1949, and in 1946 he was seeing his first foreign service.

Borey, T/4 Roger S.

M. P. Detachment No. 1 got another man shortly after May 1, 1945, when Cpl. Borey entered its ranks at Ft. Snelling. After a brief period there, he went to Jefferson Barracks, Mo., and then on to Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo. He then joined up with the M. P.'s at Fort Francis E. Warren, Wyo. He spent the remainder of his army time there, doing military police duty. Ft. Francis was also a K-9 training center. He was discharged in Cheyenne, Wyo., in November, 1945.

BORGMANN, CPL. ELROY A.

Borgmann went into the army at Ft. Snelling, Nov. 28, 1942. Ft. Custer, Mich., Camp McCoy, Wis,. and Camp Tyson, Tenn., trained him for the Quartermaster Trucking Co. On Feb. 2, 1944, he went overseas with the 82nd Airborne Division, landing in Europe and served later with the First, Third, Seventh and Ninth armies, in Normandy, Northern France, the Ardennes, the Rhineland and Central Europe. Besides ribbons, Borgmann received Meritorious Service Plaque. Was discharged Dec. 19, 1945, at Camp McCoy.

BOLTMAN, SGT. WERNER H.

The Field Artillery took Boltman sometime after he was sworn into service on April 29, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. He was ordered to Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., Nashville, Tenn., and Camp San Luis Obispo, Calif. Left San Francisco July 21, 1943, with the 53rd Field Artillery Battalion, which hit New Guinea, Hawaii, and the Philippines. Battery A was put to its test at New Guinea and on Luzon. Besides rheater ribbons, Boltman received the Bronze Arrowhead Medal. He was discharged Dec. 23, 1945, at Camp McCoy.

Leland Boyland was inducted July 11, 1941, sent to Ft. Francis E. Warren, Wyo., served at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., Camp Lee, Va., and Camp Beale, Calif., a coast-to-coast trail, in the Quartermaster Corps. On Jan. 1, 1945, he went overseas with a Headquarters Unit. Did personnel work and kept army records. Served in New Caledonia base command in the South Pacific. Received several ribbons, including American theater and defense, Asiatic-Pacific, Good Conduct and Victory. Discharged Feb. 4, 1946.













Bredeson, T/4 Eugene C.

Bredeson joined the Army Sept. 16, 1944, at Hopkins, when he reported to his draft board. Went to the Mississippi Ordnance Plant at Jackson, Miss., for training with a Chemical Laboratory Company. From Camp Beale, Calif., he went to the Central Pacific, in April, 1945, attached to the 42nd and 43rd Chemical Companies. Did photography and non-combat intelligence work. Served overseas in Hawaii. Received American and Pacific ribbons, as well as the Presidential Unit Citation. Discharged in August, 1946.

BRINGS, PFC. KEITH M.

Entered the Army on Nov. 11, 1944, at Ft. Snelling. From there he was shipped to Ft. McClellan, Ala., and Ft. Meade, Md., for Infantry training. Shipped overseas to the ETO from Boston in March, 1945. Was attached to the Third Army in the campaigns in Normandy, France, and Germany, under the command of Gen. Patton. Besides European theater ribbon, he received a Bronze Battle Star and the Presidential Unit Citation. Attended Biarritz American University in France.

BRUHN, PFC. CHARLES E.

Bruhn was sworn in as an infantryman at Ft. Snelling. He was sent to Camp Roberts for training before going overseas with the 158th Infantry Division (Bushmasters) to the South Pacific. Fought in the battles for New Guinea, the Bismarck Archipelago and Luzon. Received four battle stars with theater ribbons, as well as the Purple Heart for a shrapnel wound in the leg. Hospitalized 22 weeks at Maffin Bay, New Guinea. Discharged from Camp McCoy Jan. 6, 1946.

BRUHN, PFC. FLOYD W.

Reported at Ft. Snelling Jan. 1, 1943, and was sent to Camp Wolters, Tex., and from there to Camp Butner, No. Car. Was with the 89th Division when it left Massachusetts Jan. 19, 1944. Served with the 83rd. Mechanized Reconnaissance Troop in the European Theater, particularly in France and Germany, where the 89th was in Bingen and Eisenach, Central Germany. Received the ETO ribbon with two battle stars, the Good Conduct ribbon and a Certificate of Merit. Was discharged June 3, 1946, at Camp McCoy.

Buelow, F 1/c Arthur L.

Buelow enlisted in the Navy July 7, 1943, in Minneapolis. He was shipped to the Receiving Ship at Farragut, Idaho, for training, and from there on to Alameda, Calif., San Diego and San Pedro. On May 9, 1944, he left San Francisco. Served on the US Ships Santa Fe and the aircraft carrier Lexington. Assisted in the Philippine liberation and other Archipelago campaigns. Received the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with one battle star, and the Philippine ribbon with two stars. Buelow was discharged in August, 1946.

Reid went into active service in June, 1944, enlisting in Minneapolis. Was sent to Great Lakes boot camp for his training, and took additional Navy training at Gulfport, Miss. CARLSON, CPL. VERNON CARL



CHRISTISON, M/SGT. ROBERT S.



CLASON, S/SGT. ROBERT M.



CONDON, MOMM 1/c JOHN WM.



CUNDIFF, PVT. GEORGE H.



DAVIS, PFC. FREDERICK P.



After completing this training he sailed to the European theater on Jan. 3, 1946, from a New York port of embarkation. At the present time Sgt. Dean is on duty with the American Army of Occupation forces. He was stationed in Salzburg, Austria, for some time after the end of the war in Europe.



Sgt. Dean became a member of the Army Air Forces in February 1, 1943, at Minneapolis. He took his first training at Hondo Navigation School in Texas, and later at Jefferson Barracks, Mo. Went overseas to the Pacific theater in June, 1943, serving with the ground crew of the Seventh Air Force, under the command of Maj. Gen. W. H. Hale. Participated in the battles of Rome, River Arno, Rhineland, Ardennes, and the invasion of Southern France. Awarded the ETO ribbon with four battle stars and a Bronze Invasion Arrowhead. Discharged Oct. 13, 1945.

DEVALL, 1st. Lt. Louis Inducted in Georgia, Lt. De-Vall trained at Camp Croft, So. Car. Commissioned at Ft. Benning, Ga., in late 1942. Stationed at Camp Carson, Colo., and in Texas, Kansas, and Maryland, before embarking for England from New York City in 1943. Serving with the Ninth Army (46th Division), he left England for the Continent, and was seriously wounded in France July 11, 1944. Awarded the Purple Heart. Home on terminal leave in December, 1945, he re-enlisted and returned to Germany for occupation duty, returned again in October, 1946, following which he expected assignment to Ft. Knox, Ky.

DEROSIER, CPL. LAWRENCE

Cpl. DeRosier, an Armored man, went into the service in February, 1944, at Ft. Snelling. He took his course in the tactics of the Armored Division in battle at Ft. Knox, Ky. In Dec. 1944, he sailed to the ETO with the 16th Armored Division, which saw duty in Southern Europe and Central Europe. He was wounded in the leg April 24, 1945, after which he spent two months in a hospital in Paris. DeRosier was awarded the ETO ribbon with three bronze battle stars and the Purple Heart Medal. He was discharged Dec. 6, 1945.

DORTON, PFC. SAMUEL S.

Pfc. Dorton entered the service on Aug. 31, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. He was assigned to Army Ordnance and took his basic training at Camp Wolters, Tex. Was later stationed at Camp Bowie, Tex. He went to the South Pacific in February, 1943. His outfit was the 892nd Ordnance Heavy Auto Maintenance Co. He was awarded the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon and was honorably discharged June 28, 1944.

DREBENSTEDT, CPL. EARL

Cpl. Drebenstedt entered service Aug. 28, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. He took various forms of air force training at Marana, Ariz., Miami Beach, and Camp Patrick Henry, Va. Sailed to Pacific in November, 1944. Served with the Air Transport Command. Aided in servicing the military units in China, Burma, and India. Drebenstedt was awarded the Asiatic-Pacific Theater ribbon, the Distinguished unit badge, CBI theater citatons and the American theater ribbon. In the service he did considerable duty as an entertainer. Was honorably discharged Nov. 30, 1945.

DUDYCHA, PFC. JOE

Private Dudycha entered the US Marines, Nov. 18, 1944. He took the Marine basic at Parris Island, So. Car., and additional Marine training at Camp LeJeune, No. Car., and at Quantico, Va. Dudycha went overseas in Jan., 1946, with other Leathernecks of the Second Marine Division. Their work consisted in the repatriation of Japanese nationals to their homeland, and in some occupation duty where they relieved high point vets ready to sail for home. Dudycha was discharged in August, 1946.

















DUEMKE, SGT. RAY E.

Sgt. Duemke was inducted into the service on July 23, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. Assigned to the Ordnance branch of service, he took training at the Aberdeen Proving Grounds in Maryland, and Camp Adair, Ore. Shipped to the South Pacific in February, 1943, from a California POE. His outfit was the 517th Ordnance Co., 38th Infantry Division. He contracted malaria in New Guinea and was hospitalized for 11 months. Awarded Asiatic - Pacific ribbon for his exploits and was medically discharged on April 23, 1945.

DVORAK, CPL. RICHARD A.


Cpl. Dvorak answered his call to the Army Air Forces on Dec. 29, 1941, at Ft. Snelling. Took his first air forces training at Sheppard Field, Tex. Later he was stationed at air bases at Santa Ana and Leemore, Calif., and Seattle, Wash. Went to the Southwest Pacific on Feb. 18, 1942. Participated in campaigns at Papua, New Guinea, the East Indies, and the Battle of Bismarck Archipelago. Awarded Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with four bronze stars. Discharged on Oct. 8, 1945.

DVORAK, CAPT. ROBERT F.

Capt. Dvorak entered the United States Army on Jan. 25, 1942, at Ft. Snelling and was soon thereafter placed in the Medical Administration Corps. For training in this field he was sent to Camp Joseph T. Robinson, Ark., and to Barksdale Field. After receiving his commission he was sent to Camp Barkeley, Tex., where he worked on a hospital staff. His work included the procurement of medical supplies and equipment for the hospital. He was also at San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center. Discharged from AAF Convalescent Hospital, Miami, Fla., in Dec., 1945.

EIDAM, M/SGT. JOHN L.

Entered the army air forces Mar. 10, 1942, at Fort Snelling. Received his training at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., Mobile, Ala. and at the Lakeland, Fla., air base. From New York, on Jan. 13, 1943, he embarked for Europe where he was attached to the 12th and 15th Air forces. He served in the Mediterranean theater in the campaigns of Tunisia, Foggia, Rome, and the Arne. Received three battle stars and was discharged Oct. 30, 1945, from Camp McCoy, Wis.



An early bird, Maj. Else entered the Air Forces Dec. 30, 1940. His training followed at Love Field, Dallas, Tex., Saint Angelo and Kelly Fields, San Antonio, Mitchell Field, and Long Island, N. Y. On Jan. 10, 1942, he left San Francisco with the Fifth Air Force for the Southwest Pacific. He was the leader of a squadron. A total of 119 air missions followed in that theater. He was awarded the Air Medal with several oak leaf clusters and the Presidential citation. Maj. Else was ordered on a military aviation mission to Guatemala City, Guatemala, after the war.



Lt. Else entered from the ranks of the Naval Reserve July 15, 1942, at the Naval Air Training Station at Darthmouth, where he received training in naval ordnance. Further training followed at the Bureau of Ordnance in Wash., D. C. Lt. Else's duty had to do with new equipment, and the ordering of replacements of those destroyed or damaged in action. He was honorably discharged in Washington, Dec. 27, 1945, after more than three years of active service in the Navy.













EMPANGER, AMM 2/c John D.

Sailor Empanger began his naval career at Great Lakes boot camp, where he was sent following his entry into service Sept. 28, 1942. Following this he was ordered to the coast, to Pasco, Wash. Then on May 3, 1943, he sailed out of Norfolk Navy Yard for Trinidad, in the British West Indies, where he served at the naval air station. This was still in the American theater of operations. On Oct. 4, 1945, he was discharged from Wold-Chamberlain in Minneapolis.

ENVIL, CPL. CARL A.

Carl Envil reported at Ft. Snelling April 28, 1942. From there he went to Ft. Lewis, Wash., Camp Edwards, Mass., Camp Carrebelle, Fla., and Fort Ord, Calif., for engineer training. Was attached to the 532nd Engineer Regiment, left for the Southwest Pacific Jan. 24, 1943. He served in campaigns in New Guinea, the Southern Philippines, and Korea. Received the battle ribbons for such service and four bronze stars, the Good Conduct medal and the Presidential Unit Citation. Honorably discharged Nov. 18, 1945, from Camp McCoy, Wis.

ENVIL, PVT. CLIFFORD W.

A signal corpsman, Pvt. Envil entered that branch of the army on June 30, 1942, at the induction center at Ft. Snelling. He was sent to the foremost signal training base, Camp Crowder, Mo., for wire and signal training. Later he was transferred and was stationed for a time at Chicago. He was ready to go overseas when the army discharged its personnel over the ages cf 38 and over. Pvt. Envil was discharged April 5, 1943, from Camp Crowder, Mo.

ENVIL, CCM. MELVIN H.

Envil entered the Navy in a construction battalion of the Seabees July 8, 1942, in Minneapolis. His training began with a construction training corps at Norfolk, Va. He went first to Gulfport, Miss., and then to Port Hueneme, Calif. He served in the Pacific with the 50th Naval Construction Battalion, which was at Midway, Oahu, Hawaii, and Tinian Islands, on such important duty as the building of airstrips, etc. Envil's overseas service began March 5, 1943. He was honorably discharged Sept. 4, 1945, in Minneapolis.

Ess, C/YM ALFRED F.

Chief Yeoman Ess entered the Navy March 31, 1942, at Minneapolis. He received training for a Yeoman's rating at the U. S. Naval Station at San Diego, the Naval Communication Center at San Francisco, and lastly at Santa Cruz, Calif. He left San Francisco Oct. 7, 1942, with the U. S. N. Operating Base. He thereafter served in Auckland, New Zealand and in the South Pacific. Ess received the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon and was medically discharged Aug. 9, 1944.

EVANS, LT. (JG) WALTER R.

Lt. Evans entered the Navy July 1, 1943, at Hamline University, St. Paul, from which point he was sent to Gustavus Adolphus College at St. Peter, Minn. and Columbia University, N. Y., for further training. He also saw duty at Mare Island and the San Diego Naval School. On April 1, 1944, he left San Francisco for the South Pacific on the USS Idaho. He participated in the campaigns for Saipan, Tinian, and Palau. Lt. Evans received the American and Asiatic ribbons and two battle stars.

















EWEST, PFC. HARLAN G.

An air crewman, Pfc. Ewest was sworn in July 1, 1943, at the Ft. Snelling reception center. He went then to Kessler Field, Miss., Sheppard Field, Tex., Camp Crowder, Mo., Hammer Field, Fresno, Calif., and to Utah, for training in aerial photography. At Kearns, Utah, he embarked with an army air corps photography unit for Alaska. He saw duty with the 396th headquarters and Air Base Squadron in the Far North.

EYRE, SGT. HARQLD J.

At Minneapolis on Sept. 14, 1942, Sgt. Eyre entered the U.S. Marine Corps. He received basic training at San Diego and Camp Pendleton, Oceanside, Cailf., before leaving San Diego Feb. 9, 1943, with the Sixth Marine Division for the Pacific. He was attached to the Fourth Marine Raiders, saw action at Guadalcanal, in the Solomon Islands, the New Georgian Islands, Guam, at last reaching Japan. Besides the usual ribbons he received two battle stars and a letter of commendation. Honorably discharged from Great Lakes Dec. 10, 1945.

FANTA, PVT. JOHN

John Fanta served both as private and an aviation student after entering the service in February, 1944, at Ft. Snelling. After being placed in the Air Corps, he received his cadet training at Amarillo, Pecos, and Sheppard Field, Tex. When the pre-flight schools were closed down, the cadets, including Fanta, were sent to teletype school. Fanta was ordered to proceed to Scott Field Ill., from which point he graduated. He was then given the choice of an honorable discharge or re-enlistment in the regular army. It was not a hard decision to make. He was discharged Nov. 2, 1945, receiving an honorable cadet discharge.

FARBER, PVT. ELMER C.

When Pvt. Farber entered the army he was afflicted with an ailing stomach and a nervous condition. Shortly after his entry on Aug. 2, 1943, at Ft. Snelling, where he had been ordered into the Infantry, he became seriously ill. Soon thereafter he was bedridden. His unfortunate confinement to bed lasted the entire length of his army period. He was discharged medically from Ft. Snelling Sept. 29, 1943.

FARBER, SGT. WALTER W.

Sgt. Farber is another of the many Hopkins infantrymen sworn into the army at Ft. Snelling. He went in Feb. 28, 1943. He was sent from the Fort to Ft. Mc-Clellan, Ala., for training. He left New York July 25, 1943, with Infantry Co. K-116. Served in England, Normandy and Northern France. Won the Silver Star for the Normandy Campaign, June 21, 1944, and the Purple Heart for wounds in his right leg. Was hospitalized in England and Galesburg, as well as in Normandy, after being rescued as a prisoner of war. He was in the hands of the enemy 41 days.

FAUCHER, CPL. HAROLD N.

Frenchy Faucher joined the Marine Corps July 9, 1942, in Minneapolis. He spent some time training at San Diego, Camp Pendleton, at Oceanside, Calif., Chicago Radio School, Grove City College at Washington, D. C., and the Naval Research Laboratory at Bellevue. Left San Francisco in Feb., 1943, with a Headquarters Company of a Signal Battalion, attached to the Fifth Amphibious Corps. He was in Samoa and the Ellice Island group. Served extensively in China and Japan, received several ribbons and was discharged from Great Lakes in July, 1946.













FAUCHER, S/SGT. LOUIS G.

Like his brother Frenchy, Louis Faucher was a Marine Corpsman, with the difference that he served in the Marine Air Corps. After training at several bases including San Diego, Texas A & M College, Cherry Point, No. Car., Parris Island, So. Car., Camp Mirarmar, El Centro, Calif., and Hutchinson, Kan., he was shipped to the Central Pacific with Sqdn. 311, Marine Air Wing 31. He served as a radio operator on Douglass "Dauntless" and Curtis "Commando" planes. Was in the Marshall and Gilbert Islands, later helped fly occupation troops into Japan. Won Presidential unit citation, discharged May 3, 1946.

FINNICUM, SGT. CHARLES E.

Sgt. Finnicum's career in the army began in Oct., 1942, when he was sworn in at Ft. Snelling. He received air forces mechanic training at such fields at Randolph and Sheppard Fields, Tex., Willow Run Air Base and Wright Field. He received radar training in testing equipment at Boca Raton, Fla., just missed going overseas when at Kelly Field, Tex., when V-J Day was declared. He returned from San Francisco to Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, from which place he was honorably discharged on Jan. 28, 1946.

FISCHER, MOMM 1/c WILLIAM H.

Entered service July 12, 1943, in Minneapolis, joining the Navy's Seabees. Became a motor machinist's mate first class after training at Camp Peary, Va., Camp Endicott, R. I. and Camp Holiday, Gulfport, Miss. Sailed Feb. 27, 1944, from Gulfport, Miss., for New Guinea, spending one year at Milne Bay, five months at Basilan of the Philippine Islands, and a month at Samar. Honorably discharged at Great Lakes, July 27, 1945. Holds the Asiatic, Philippine Liberation, and American Theatre ribbons, plus two battle stars for campaigns in the Asiatic theater and the Philippines.

FOX, CAPT. EARLE E.

Coming out an officer in the Mechanized Cavalry, Capt. Fox entered the service on March 20, 1941, at Ft. Snelling. He was trained at Ft. Meade, Md., Camp Young, Calif., Camp Maxie, Tex., and Camp Shanks. Left New York with the Fourth Cavalry Reconnaisance Squadron (Mechanized) for the European Theater. Campaigns included Normandy, Northern France, the Ardennes, the Rhineland and Central Europe. Received European, African, Middle Eastern ribbons. Awarded the Silver Star, Bronze Star, and Purple Heart, with three clusters for hand, chest, ankle, and leg wounds. Discharged Nov. 28, 1945.

Fox, SGT. LOWELL S.

A sergeant with an amphibious tractor battalion, Sgt. Fox entered the military service Feb. 19, 1943, at Ft. Snelling. He was soon sent to Camp Campbell, Ky., then to Ft. Knox and then out to Ft. Ord, Calif. He left Seattle July 28, 1944, for the Pacific with the 718th Amph. Trac. Bn. Participated in the invasion of Leyte, the invasion of Okinawa, and saw service in Korea. With the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon, he received the Bronze Arrowhead and two battle stars, as well as the Philippine liberation ribbon. Discharged Jan. 8, 1946, from Camp McCoy, Wis.

FRUENDT, EM 2/c FRITZ W.

An electrician's mate in the Navy, Fritz Fruendt entered that service on Aug. 27, 1942, at Great Lakes, Ill. After graduating from the well-known boot camp, he was sent down to Guatanamo Bay, Cuba. He served on the USS Atakapa. On Nov. 11, 1944, he left Norfolk, for the Pacific theater, where he participated in the occupation of the Japanese homeland. He received the Asiatic-Pacific and American ribbons for his work in those theaters. Was discharged from Wold-Chamberlain Field on Nov. 18, 1945.

















GALVIN, CPL. JOHN P.

A Marine Air Corpsman, Cpl. Galvin joined at Minneapolis on Oct. 29, 1942. His duty carried him to the Santa Barbara Marine Corps Air Base in California, then to the Pacific Feb. 12, 1944, with Marine Air Group 12. Campaigns participated in: No. Solomons, Bismarck Archipelago and the Philippines. He wears the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon, with stars and the Navy citation. Galvin received his release Sept. 22, 1945.

GALVIN, AOM 1/c THOMAS A.

Thomas Galvin served in the Navy Air Corps, enlisting at the Navy Recruiting Station at Great Lakes in March, 1944. He was sent on to the Naval Air Technical Training Center at Norman, Okla., then to Shoemaker, Calif., where he ultimately became an Aviation Ordnance Mate. Galvin went overseas with a Navy Air Corps unit, to the Pacific theater. He remained in Hawaii for the length of his overseas stay. He was honorably discharged in the spring of 1945.

GARDNER, 1ST. LT. ROBERT H.

Bob Gardner became a member of the Army Air Forces on March 31, 1942, at Minneapolis. He trained at Santa Ana, Calif., Williams Field, Thunderbird and Luke Fields, Ariz., Pecos, Tex., Hamilton Field, Calif., Chicago, Memphis, Tenn., Mitchell Field, N. Y., Reno, Nev., Nashville, Tenn., and Miami. He was ordered to the China-Burma-India theater, via South America. He won three battle stars with ribbons, plus the Air Medal and Cluster, the coveted DFC and a Presidential Unit Citation after flying more than 500 hours over The Hump in the CBA theater. Discharged Oct. 5, 1945.

GEER, AMM 1/c ROBERT M.

Bob Geer, an operator specialist in his field, entered the Navy Air Forces on Dec. 16, 1941, from Minneapolis. He went first to the Great Lakes Naval Station, then to Dearborn, Mich., Pensacola, Fla., Clinton, Okla. and Burbank Calif., for various phases of training. Bob left Treasure Island, San Francisco, Jan. 22, 1945, for the Pacific. He saw service in New Guinea, Marcus Island, Clarke Field, Manila and Palauan during the war. He entered the service on a six year enlistment, and will be eligible for discharge in December of 1947.

GEHRKE, PVT. ERVIN R.

An Air Forces man, Ervin Gehrke entered the Army Oct. 29, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. On June 30, 1942, Technician fifth grade Gehrke was signed into the Artillery at Ft. Snelling. For his training he was sent to Ft. Sam Houston, Tex., Camp Swift and Camp Polk. He left for the European theater, from a Boston POE, on July 13, 1942, with the 95th Division. He saw service in the campaigns in Northern France, the Rhineland and Central Europe and received the ribbon for this theater. The 95th of the red nine and white Roman five patch, turned up also at Metz, the Saar and the Moselle River area. Gehrke was discharged Oct. 11, 1945, from Shelby, Miss.













GEORGE, S/SGT. HOWARD W.

S/Sgt. George was startled to find following his enlistment on Sept. 8, 1942, at Ft. Snelling, that he was scheduled to remain right there at the Fort while carving out his military career. His work consisted of interviewing inductees and classifying them. He was known as a classification expert, chosen for the work from his record. Later on he did leave Snelling, to do the same type of work with a Headquarters Detachment of the Finance Training Center at Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind. He served there until his discharge came through in January of 1946, from Ft. Benj. Harrison.

GEORGES, PFC. HAROLD V.


Another Marine Air Corpsman, Private First Class Georges enlisted for World War II at the recruiting station in Minneapolis on June 15, 1943. He was trained in Marine Corps regulations, duties and privileges at Camp Mirarmar, near the San Diego Marine Corps Base. Lt. Ginkel signed up with the armored engineers Feb. 24, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. After extensive training at Camp Forrest, Tenn., he went overseas June 1, 1944, from a Massachusetts POE with the 17th Armored Combat Engineers, Second Armored Division, bound for Europe. Received the ETO ribbon with five bronze stars for the Normandy, Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe campaigns. Previously, in Sept., 1942, he had served in the Pacific area. Lt. Ginkel also received the Bronze Star and Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Belgian Fourrogerre citation. He is on inactive duty in the Officer's Reserve.

GLUEK, EM 3/c JOHN E.

Sailor Gluek entered the services of his country by way of the Navy on July 25, 1942, after signing up in Hopkins. He took his boot camp training at Farragut, Idaho. Finishing the preliminary training there he was sometime afterward ordered to attend an electrician's mates school there. Then he went to San Diego, on Jan. 26, 1943, to be reassigned to Pacific duty. He spent a long stretch at the Pearl Harbor Submarine Base where he saw lots of service in the repairing of submarines. He was returned to the States for discharge in June of 1946.

From the Naval Reserve Sailor Glynn went into the active service of his country Oct. 21, 1942, at Minneapolis. The Great Lakes boot camp followed and then more training at the Naval Stations at San Diego, Norfolk and Treasure Island, San Francisco. He left the States Dec. 19, 1943, for an extensive tour of duty which took him to both the European and Pacific theaters. He was aboard the USS Burrows, a Destroyer Escort, and received ribbons for the several theaters in which he served. He was honorably discharged Nov. 6, 1945, from the Minneapolis Naval Air Station at Wold Chamberlain.

GNERER, PVT. LEO C.



Greenhoe enlisted in the United States Navy April 28, 1945, through Ft. Snelling. After the boot camp period, which he took at Great Lakes, he went in for additional training at Farragut, Idaho. One day in August, 1945, he found himself at Seattle awaiting shipment overseas. He was attached to an Amphibious Unit with the Seventh Fleet. He later received a Fireman First Class rating. Served at Subic Bay, the Philippines, with a land-based Naval Supply Depot. He received the ribbons for his foreign service and was discharged March 25, 1946, from Great Lakes, Ill.

GREENWALD, T/4 WILLIAM F.

Technician Fourth grade Greenwald was a member of the Combat Engineers. He entered the service Aug. 28, 1943, at Ft. HABECK, T/SGT. LLOYD S.

Sgt. Lloyd Habeck entered the army air forces on Dec. 9, 1942, at Ft. Snelling, Minn. He was sent to Chicago for training, as well as to Boise, Idaho, St. Petersburg, Fla., Salt Lake City, Utah, and Tonapah, Nev. He left West Palm Beach, Fla., Jan. 17, 1944, with the 458th Heavy Bombardment Group, for the European Theater. There he participated in the European Air Offensive and Northern France and Western Germany offensives. Received DFC, Air Medal, three clusters, and Presidential Citation, besides the ETO ribbon and three stars. He received his discharge Oct. 11, 1945.


HAGEN, PFC. DONALD F.



He left his native shores July, 1945, to go to India where he served a good stretch before being returned home for his discharge.

HASKIN, PFC. EMMETT F.

Emmett Haskin was inducted into the service on Sept. 30, 1942, at Fort Snelling, and was retained there for the entire length of his military service. A graduate pharmacist in civilian life, his professional training and experience were put to use by the army in the medical department at the Fort. He was in charge of medical supplies in the hospital, and of medical supplies scheduled for shipment overseas. He was honorably discharged May 1, 1944, at Fort Snelling.

HAYES, LT. (JG) ARTHUR J.

On July 1, 1943, Lt. Hayes entered the U.S. Naval Reserve, at Minneapolis. He received part of his training at the University of Minnesota and more of it at the Newport, R. I., Naval Base. HEINRICH, PFC. ROBERT F.



HENKE, AMM 2/c DONALD A.
















HISSAM, F 1/c PAUL J.

Hockstedler, T/5 Robert W.

Joined the U.S. Army March 23, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. From there he went to Ft. Knox, Ky., Pine Camp, N. Y., Camp Bowie, Tex., Camp Ibis, Calif., and Camp Miles Standish, Mass. Left Houston Dec. 29, 1943, with the 4th Armored Division, attached to General Patton's Third Army. They battled it out at Normandy, through France, the Rhineland, Ardennes, and the Central Europe campaigns. He won the ETO and American ribbons, five stars, a Good Conduct Medal, and the Distinguished Unit Citation. Discharged Oct. 25, 1945.

HODEK, GM 2/c KENNETH C.

Hodek entered the regular Navy in Minneapolis Aug. 28, 1942. From there he went to Great Lakes boot training camp, trained later at Solomons, Md., Little Creek, Va., the Norfolk Navy Yard, Portsmouth, Va., Philadelphia Navy Yard, Dover, N. J. He left New York in Jan., 1943, for the Southwest Pacific aboard LCT (B) 22. Landed on and helped to secure New Georgia, Rendova, Treasury Islands, and Bougainville, in the Solomons. Inducted at Ft. Snelling, July 29, 1942. Holcher was ordered first to Camp Adair, Ore., for training with the 70th Infantry Division. Campaigns participated in included New Guinea, Leyte, and Luzon, the Philippines. Sgt. Holcher came home with the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with three stars, and the Philippine Liberation ribbon with one star. He returned to the States to receive his honorable discharge at Camp McCoy, Wis., on Sept. 20, 1945.

HOLST, SGT. CARL J.

Another Air Forces member, Sgt. Holst entered that service Dec. 29, 1943, from Hopkins. His various training stations included Clearwater, Fla., Santa Monica, Calif., Kearns, Utah, Charlotte, No. Car., and Merced, Calif. Among his many duties was that of an instructor and electrical specialist and a navigator on an A-20 Havoc plane. He attended Pilot's School for a short time, but spent most of his time instructing. At length he was ordered to report to Camp McCoy, Wis., Feb. 21, 1946, for his honorable discharge.













HOLY, PVT. MARTIN

Pvt. Holy joined the United States Army and subsequently the U. S. Infantry at Ft. Snelling Sept. 30, 1942. He was ordered to a Texas camp for his Infantry basic, including infiltration, at Camp Bowie. He stayed on, becoming a permanent fixture at Camp Bowie, after he finished basic training. He spent his six months period in the army in Texas. When the army decided to release men who had reached the 38 age limit, Pvt. Holy picked up his discharge on March 15, 1943, and came home.

HORNER, PHM 2/c JACK E.



Capt. Hovander was with the Ground Forces of the Marine Air Corps. He entered the Marine Corps Oct. 4, 1942, at Quantico, Va. HRUSKA, S 1/c EDWARD J.



JAEGER, PFC. EDWARD ADOLPH



JESKE, ARM 1/c HARVEY L.










JORGENSEN, LT. (JG) DANIEL C.

KELLY, SGT. ROBERT J.




KILHMAN, RUSSELL E.




KLOSS, PFC. GERALD W.



Kosanda, Av. Cadet Francis



Kounas, Yeoman 2/c John D.



Discharged at Great Lakes June 28, 1946.













KUCHERA, CAPT. EARL A.

Capt. Kuchera liked the Army so well he re-enlisted. Joined for the first time at the Minneapolis Armory Feb. 10, 1940. With the infantry, he trained at Camp Claibourne, La., Ft. Dix, N. J., Camp Davis, N. C., Camp Haan, Calif., Ft. Benning, Ga., and Ft. Mc-Clellan, Fla. Went overseas Jan. 13, 1942, from New York and served in the ETO with the famous 34th Div. in Africa and Italy. Holds the American defense, American theater and European theater ribbons with a battle star for the Appennines. Discharged Nov. 25, 1944, at Camp McCoy, Wis. Re-enlisted in April, 1946, as a master sergeant.

KUCKLER, CPL. FORREST D.

Joined army at Ft. Snelling Feb. 9, 1942. Saw Camp Robinson, Ark., Will Rogers Field, Oklahoma City, Okla., Camp Gordon, Ga., and Indiantown Gap, Pa., before going overseas from the Gap on Feb. 23, 1945. KUHNLEY, S 1/c WESLEY A.

In service from April 20, 1945, to August 3, 1946. Joined the Navy at Minneapolis, sent to Great Lakes, then to Wright College, Chicago, from there to Del Monte Radar School in California. Went overseas from San Diego Oct. 23, 1945, served in the Pacific aboard the USS West Virginia, a battleship, also the USS Bunker Hill for three months. He was part of the famed "Magic Carpet Fleet" which did the job of getting the boys overseas on the double quick. Doffed his navy blues Aug. 3, 1946.

KUNZE, T/5 ROGER G.

A coast artilleryman with the infantry, Kunze was stationed at Camp Wallace, Tex., Fort Bliss, same state, Ft. Totten, N. Y., Flushing, L. I. N. Y., Camp Pickett, Va., Camp Stewart, Ga., and Ft. Jay, N. Y. While stationed in New York, was married. Received a medical discharge Sept. 12, 1944, at Camp Pickett, and returned to Hopkins.

LaBerge, Cpl. Cecil D.

After joining the Marine Corps Jan. 21, 1943, LaBerge eventually turned up at Bougainville, Rabaoul, on Bismarck Archipelago and in the Philippines. Serving with the aviation branch of the Marines, he trained at San Diego, Miramir, El Centro, El Toro, Santa Barbara and Mojave Border Field before crossing over from San Diego in September of 1943. Holds battle stars for Bougainville, Rabaoul, and the Bismarck Archipelago. Discharged Nov. 3, 1945, at the same point from which he went overseas.

Served with the Army cavalry and infantry from March 5, 1941, to Oct. 28, 1945, when he was discharged at Camp McCoy, Wis. Einer has practically everything in the book. LAPIC, SGT. THOMAS W.



LARKIN, CPL. JOHN M.



Joined the infantry Feb. 9, 1942, at Ft. Snelling. Stationed at Camp Forest, Tenn., and Ft. Brady, Mich. Embarked from New York City Aug. 27, 1943, with the 156th Infantry, for the European theater. Holds stars for the battle of Normandy, Northern France and the Rhineland, with both ETO and American theater ribbons. Suffered an ear injury during the air raids in England and France. Discharged Aug. 29, 1945, at Camp McCoy.


LUND, HA 1/c CARROLL J.

He left from San Diego on LSM 182 for duty in the Pacific Feb. 1, 1945. Served in the Solomon Islands, New Hebrides, the Philippines and Japan. Discharged Dec., 1945.

McAllister, 2nd Lt. Edward M.

Joined the Coast Guard Sept. 4, 1940, at Minneapolis, attached to a Marine corps unit and served at Pensacola, Fla., San Diego, Calif., Hickam Field, Honolulu, Henderson Field Manila, and Guadalcanal. With the 311th Marine Flying Squadron, he was a member of the United States Coast Guard Air Sea Rescue Unit, saw much action in the Asiatic-Pacific theater. Saw the Pearl Harbor attack and saw action on Guadalcanal, at Tarawa, the Philippine Liberation and Bougainville. Served in the European theater, fought in Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland and Central Europe campaigns. Awarded ETO ribbon with several battle stars. Was honorably discharged Dec. 12, 1945, from Camp McCoy.

Entered the armed service July 7, 1941, at Fort Snelling and assigned to the Army Dental Corps. Malerich was awarded the Pre-Pearl Harbor, American theater and Victory ribbons. Manarin, GM 2/c Vincent J.



MASON, SGT. LAWRENCE J.



MEGEATH, Pfc. GEO. WINDSOR
















MICHL, PVT. GEORGE J.

MILBERT, MOMM 2/c DONALD J.



NAGEL, T/4 CYRIL H.



NELSON, RDM 3/c NEIL B.



Went overseas on Jan. 24, 1943, from San Diego, with Co. L, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Division. Served in the Asiatic-Pacific theater and participated in the battles of Bougainville and Guam. Awarded Asiatic-Pacific and American theater ribbons, two battle stars and the Purple Heart. Wounded, he was hospitalized at Guam, New Hebrides, San Francisco and Great Lakes. Given a medical discharge Nov. 14, 1945, at Great Lakes.

OLSON, SGT. RUSSELL LEROY

Entered service Jan. 27, 1943, at Fort Snelling. Shipped overseas July 27, 1944, from Camp Shanks, N. Y., served with the Third Army, Sixth Armored Division, 94th Infantry. Participated in the Normandy and Northern France campaigns for which he received ETO and ATO ribbons, two battle stars, a Unit Citation and the Purple Heart. Shrapnel wounds hospitalized him for ten months in France, England and the states. Medically discharged Sept. 17, 1945, at Ft. Lewis, Wash.

OLSON, AM 1/c VERN L.

Entered the service June 29, 1942. Was stationed at Great Lakes, Ill., Aviation Metalsmith School, Chicago, Ill. Carrier Aircraft Service Unit 21, Norfolk, Va., Scout Observation Service Unit, Norfolk, Va. Went overseas Feb. 17, 1945, from Alameda, Calif. with an aircraft squadron aboard the carrier USS Intrepid. Served in the Asiatic-Pacific theater and participated in the Okinawa campaign, as well as the occupational operations in Japan, China, Korea and Manchuria. Awarded American and Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbons and two battle stars. Honorably discharged Jan. 13, 1946, at Great Lakes.

OLSON, SGT. WM. H.



SKOGLUND, S 2/c STUART JOHN



Stationed at Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Ark., Camp Murphy, Fla., Fort Banaca, Fla., Camp Stewart, Ga., Fort George Meade, Md., Camp Davis, No. Car., and Fort Douglas, Utah. Left the services Nov. 18, 1944, by a Sec. 10 A.R. 615-360 discharge from Fort Douglas, Utah.

















WIDEN, COMDR. WILFORD F.

Entered the service in February, 1943, at Snelling and served with Navy Medical Corps. Trained at San Diego Naval Hospital, San Bruno, Port Hueneme, Calif. Shipped overseas in March, 1944, from Port Hueneme, Calif., and served in a Naval Air Corps Unit in the Admiralty Islands and the Philippines. Was awarded the American, Pacific, and Philippine Liberation ribbons, also the Victory ribbon, Navy commendation and W I ribbon. Honorably discharged in November, 1945, at Great Lakes.

WILEY, SM 3/c HAROLD S.

Harold Wiley joined the colors May 11, 1944, at Great Lakes, going into the Regular Navy. Trained at Great Lakes, Shoemaker, Calif., Puget Sound Navy Yard and Bremerton, Wash. Went to sea Aug. 26, 1944, from San Francisco, on the Chas. J. Badber DD657. Served in the South and Central Pacific, participated in the Philippine Liberation and the battle of Okinawa. Awarded the American and Asiatic-Pacific, and Philippine Liberation ribbons. Honorably discharged Dec. 4, 1945, at Puget Sound Navy Yard.

WILLISEN, T/5 WILLARD NORMAN

Entered service Mar. 2, 1943, at Fort Snelling. Served with Parachute Infantry regiment, trained at Fort Benning, Ga. Shipped out May 16, 1944, from Camp Stoneman, Calif. Served with 11th Airborne Division in SWPTO theater and fought in the battles of New Guinea, Letye, Luzon, P. I. Participated in airborne occupation of Honshu, Japan. Awarded Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with three battle stars, Philippine Liberation ribbon, Presidential Unit Citation with one Oak Leaf Cluster, Purple Heart and Combat Medical Badge. Hospitalized three months at Manila for shrapnel wound in right leg. Honorably discharged Jan. 2, 1946, at Camp McCoy.

WINSHIP, F/O JAMES E.

Joined the colors in September, 1942, at Wold Chamberlain and served with the Army Air Force. Was stationed for his training at Foster Field, Tex., Waco, Tex., Blackland AAF, Tex., Randolph Field, Tex., and Keesler Field, Miss. Was honorably discharged on Oct. 13, 1945, at Camp McCoy.



George Winter enlisted early, on Nov. 6, 1942, at Minneapolis, going into the U.S. Naval Reserve. He was stationed at Great Lakes Naval Training Station for his boot training and stayed on at Great Lake's Naval Service School for his specialized training. George hit the water on Aug. 18, 1943, from New York City, landed in England and eventually found himself serving with U.S. Naval Base Two, Rosneath, Scotland, in the European theater of operations. He remained there for the duration and received his honorable discharge on Aug. 31, 1945, at Norfolk, Va.



Entered the service on Sept. 15, 1941, nearly three months before Pearl Harbor, at Fort Snelling, Minn., and was classified for serving in the Coast Artillery. In the United States he was stationed at Ft. Rosencrans, near the Mexican border, and at Ft. Amery. He embarked for overseas service on Oct. 15, 1945, from Bermuda and was assigned to Special Troop S. P. VIII. While overseas his duties consisted of inspection work. Cpl. Wolf was awarded the Honor Medal at Ft. Rosencrans on Oct. 30, 1945, and when his service record was taken for the Muster Roll he was still in serv-









Wolfe, Pvt. John A.

Pvt. Wolfe went into the service in November, 1942, at Fort Snelling, Minn., and was sent into the Army Engineers. He was stationed at Camp Joseph T. Robinson, Ark., and Camp Claiborne, La., for training and his military service was terminated April 28, 1943, at Camp Claiborne, when he was issued a medical discharge.

Wondra answered the call of his country on Sept. 8, 1942, at Fort Snelling and was ordered into the Navy Reserve. For his boot training he was sent to Farragut, Idaho, and he embarked for overseas service on Dec. 13, 1942, from San Francisco, and was assigned for duty to the Armed Guard. He served in the Pacific theater and was awarded the Pacific campaign ribbon. His military service was terminated Oct. 19, 1945, with an honorable discharge, issued him at Wold Chamberlain.



WYNKOOP, AM 3/c FLOYD DAVID


Entered service in January, 1943, at Fort Snelling, where he was classified for the Navy. For boot training he was ordered to Farragut, Idaho, and served later at Tacoma, Wash. Wynkoop went to sea in July, 1944, from San Francisco, on the USS Kenneth Whiting, A.V. 14. He served in the South Pacific and participated in the Okinawa, Saipan and Philippines campaigns. Was awarded three battle stars. Honorably discharged Jan. 4, 1946, at Wold Chamberlain Field.

ZAJICEK, S/SGT. CASWELL J.

Sgt. Zajicek answered the call on June 12, 1943, at Snelling, going into the Infantry. From Snelling he went to Camp Roberts, Ft. Ord, Ft. McDowell, San Francisco Bay. Left for overseas duy on Jan. 4, 1944, from San Francisco, with a Weapons Platoon of the 35th Infantry Regiment, 25th "Tropic Lightning" Division. Served in the Pacific, in the battle of Central Plains, the Philippine Liberation and the Luzon campaign. Awarded Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with one star, Philippine Liberation ribbon with one star and Combat Infantryman's Badge. Honorably discharged Jan. 25, 1946, at Camp McCoy.

ZASTROW, PFC. WALTER P.

Wally Zastrow entered the service Sept. 28, 1943, at Fort Snelling. Assigned to the Army Air Forces he trained at Sheppard Field, Kelly Field, Tex., Kearns, Utah, shipping out for overseas April 21, 1944, from Staten Island, N. Y. Served in the European theater, participating in the Normandy, Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central European campaigns. Awarded the ETO ribbon and five battle stars, the Drivers & Mechanics Badge and the Good Conduct Medal. Honorably discharged Nov. 8, 1945, at Camp McCoy, Wis.



Entered the service May 30, 1944, at Snelling, going into the Marines. Trained at San Diego, Camp Pendleton, and Oceanside, Calif. Shipped out Nov. 7, 1944, from San Francisco, with Company C, 2nd Engrs. Battalion, 2nd Marines. Served in the Pacific and participated in the Okinawa, Aguni and Iheya campaigns, as well as in the occupation of Japan. Awarded the Asiatic-Pacific and American theater ribbons and the Presidential Unit Citation. Honorably discharged at Great Lakes, Jan. 20, 1946.

















ZIPOY, MM 1/c WILLARD M.

Zipov enlisted in the armed services on Dec. 26, 1941, at Fort Snelling, just a few weeks after Pearl Harbor. He served with the Regular Navy, taking his boot training at the Naval Training Station, Great Lakes. Went to sea July 20, 1942, from San Francisco, on the USS Hughes, DD (410). Served in the Asiatic-Pacific and participated in fighting at Guadalcanal, Santa Cruz, Aleutians, Gilberts, Marshalls, New Guinea and Levte campaigns, as well as the occupation of Ominato, Japan. Awarded the American and Asiatic-Pacific and the Philippine Liberation ribbon, 11 stars and the Victory Medal. Zipoy was another of those still in service when the Muster Roll records were taken early in 1946.

ZIPOY, PFC. RICHARD M.


Dick Zipoy was another of that large contingent of Hopkins boys who answered their country's call to the colors early in the war. He went into the service on Sept. 5, 1942, at Fort Snelling, Minn. Zipoy was classified at Snelling for service in the Army. He was stationed for intensive training at Camp White, Ore., for thirteen months, and was honorably discharged on Nov. 15, 1943.

Ess, CEM JOHN A.


John A. Ess entered the service in March of 1942, putting on his uniform for his boot training at Great Lakes, Ill. He trained later at the University of Minnesota. Ess went overseas in the fall of 1943 from San Francisco and served aboard LCI 72 and the USS Adair in the Pacific. He took part in most of the major Pacific actions, and was discharged sometime after the record of his service was taken for publication in the Muster Roll.

Ess, RM 1/c Corlett J.

Corlett J. Ess went into uniform in March of 1943 and took his original boot training at Farragut, Idaho. From that point he was transferred to Northwestern University. He was ordered to sea in November, 1943, from the port of San Francisco, and served overseas with a Communications outfit, land-based, in the Marshalls, and Kwajalein. He took part in the invasion of the Marshalls, put in lots of service in the Pacific from then on to the end of hostilities, and had not been discharged when his service record was taken for publication.



Lt. Gerwe went into a midshipman school in 1942 and after being commissioned went to sea on convoy duty, landing at points in England, France, Italy, Bermuda. He was the Skipper on a YP in the Caribbean for nine months, served also on Saipan and in the Guam and Okinawa campaigns, as well as the Philippines, Formosa, Japan and Korea. Lt. Gerwe was a well-traveled Pacific officer. He was the executive officer on The Gary, headed for China a year ago and was given his honorable discharge in April of 1946.



Sgt. Kaspar was inducted into the service at Fort Snelling, Minn., on Jan. 28, 1943, and trained at Camp McCain, Fort Benning, Camp Shelby and Camp Kilmer in the states. On Oct. 15, 1944, he was shipped for overseas duty, leaving from Camp Kilmer and serving as a member of the 87th Division. He served overseas in England and Germany, and received three battle stars in the course of his infantry service. Sgt. Kaspar was given an honorable discharge Dec. 11, 1945.









NELSON, SGT. MARVIN J.

Entered the service in October, 1942, with induction at Fort Snelling. Assigned to the Army Air Forces, he was sent to Ft. Worth, Tex., which became his permanent station for the duration, except for three months at specialized training school in San Diego. An aero-engineer in a B-24 crew, Nelson had been at Fort Worth for two years when he was sent to San Diego for schooling on a B-32. He returned to Fort Worth, completed his service there and received an honorable discharge at San Antonio in February, 1946.



ROMAIN, CPL. MARTIN

Inducted in August, 1942, at Fort Snelling. Was sent to Fort Riley, Kan., Concordia, Kan., Bena, Minn. (prisoner of war camp) and Fort Sheridan, Ill. Leaving Fort Sheridan Romain was detached to serve as a military guard on railroads in Alabama, Mississippi, Tennesee, and Georgia, then sent to Holdrege, Neb., as interpreter and aide. Had six weeks' intensive training in intelligence and secret service school. He remained 17 months at his post in Holdrege, was honorably discharged in February, 1946, at Camp McCoy.

No Pictures, No Records

When the census of service men and women was taken, there were found some who served for whom no pictures were available. There were some very few who prejerred not to have their pictures printed. The following are some who served in World War II, but for whom either pictures nor detailed service records were to be had. In this connection it may be said again that many of the photos were poor snap shots and post card pictures, from which the engraver was unable to produce satisfactory plates. For this reason some of the pictures do not show the subjects to good advantage.
