President's Notes

Major General Jim Collins (Ret.), President 96[™] Infantry Division Deadeye Association



This issue of the Dispatch announces the plans for the next reunion to be held in Nashville from 30 July to 2 August. Harriet Nichols and Mary Eleanor Wood Smith have been working very hard to make the arrangements with the Holiday Inn and with Armed Forces Reunion Inc (AFRI) who is managing many of the arrangements for us. We have some really nice tours arranged and several social events that will be enjoyable. I hope many of our members will attend but I also know that health issues are a concern to many and so if you can't be with us this year there is always next year.

Memories. Remembrance. Recognition. Appreciation. Admiration. All these words come to mind right now. The Association has been working for several years to form a legal entity recognized by the IRS as an organization that can accept tax-deductible donations. I call it a foundation and we have been fortunate to have the services of one of our members, Colonel (Retired) Bruce Olson and his law office. They are sorting through all the legal requirements to establish a 501C(3) Foundation that will be dedicated to preserving the memory of the 96th. This process has taken years but I remain optimistic that it will work out.

So your Association is working on a way to preserve our history but what about you? What have you done to preserve your history? What is it that your family will inherit that documents what you have done during your time in the 96th? Is it a shoe box with a few medals, shoulder patches and a picture or two of you when you were younger? Will anyone be able to sort out what you did during your service with the 96th or any other unit? What about your official records and military service history? Are all your medals in order?

Soldiers as a rule are modest and yet our families want to know what we did during our time in the Army and even more so want to have something tangible to look at. We could follow Don Dencker's lead and write a book. Some others have created an oral history and recorded it. I suspect most are still operating out of the shoe box and that needs to change.

Get your records together in one place. Make a copy for each of your children. Get your medals and have them mounted in a shadow box. In fact buy extra copies of your medals and make up shadow boxes for all your children. This avoids arguments later on about who gets Dad's medals.

Our service in the Army is something our families are proud of and so please give them something tangible that they can look at and hold so that they can feel connected to you, so that they can feel proud that their mother or father served their country. It is long overdue, so please get your military records and medals in order. Your families will cherish them and the memories that come along with them.

Sleepless off Seattle

From the memoirs of Ken Staley, K Co., 383rd Infantry, 96th Infantry Division

Our group of infantry replacements sailed out of Seattle one evening early in January 1945 on a relatively small Navy troop ship. Most of us were recent graduates from Camp Roberts, CA, although some of the grads were sent east for a cruise to Europe. Luckily, my three best buddies from basic infantry training at Camp Roberts were on board. They were Floyd Tolleson, of Spokane, WA; Byron Stearly of Ft. Collins, CO; and Jack Swanson of Seattle, WA.

During the night the ship started pitching and rolling more and more. Next morning I went up on the deck to get some fresh air, as I wasn't feeling too good. What a sight! Enormous waves were breaking over the bow as it bobbed up and down. We were in the midst of a winter storm. A lot of other guvs had the same idea as I had, and they were 'heaving ho' over the rail. I was soon there myself. What a mess! Vomit from the u-winders was splashing the down winders. I had enough of that and went below to head (Navv speak for bathroom). It was full of men heaving into the toilets and urinals and

on the floor. After I had completely emptied my stomach, I staggered back to my bunk.

Troopship bunks aren't normal bunks, they are merely stretched canvases, stacked five high and you have someone at your side, above, and below and with someone at your feet and someone's feet at your head. It seemed no one had washed his feet in a while. Imagine what it was like when we were sailing in the tropics! Recently a friend

First 96th RRC soldier KIA in Iraq remembered

The article below is reprinted from the Fall, 2007 "Deadeye," the 96th Regional Readiness Command, Fort Douglas, Utah magazine.

A HERO IMMORTALIZED Dedicated to the Memory of Staff Sergeant Mark A. Evans Lawton

Building 3450 at 7335 Womack Street on Fort Carson, Colo., is now the Mark A. Evans Lawton Armed Forces Reserve Center. A ibbon-cutting ceremony was held n March to name the building for he first Army Reserve Soldier rom Colorado to be killed in comoat in the Global War on Terrorism. Staff Sergeant Lawton was postnumously awarded a Bronze Star vith "V" for valor, and a Purple Heart. Mrs. Sherri Lawton and heir two sons, Dustin and Tanner, Maj. Gen. Peter S. Cooke, (comnanding general 96th RRC) along vith family, friends and Soldiers vere in attendance. The Lawton Armed Forces Reserve Center was ouilt and dedicated in 2004, and vill serve the Soldiers of the 651st Regional Support Group (RSG), he 5025th Garrison Support Unit GSU) and several other reserve

Lawton's Life and Military Career
Lawton was born on August 16,
1962, in Indiana. His family later
1964 to Colorado where he

graduated from Moffat County High School in Craig. His military career began in 1983 when he enlisted in the Army as a fire support specialist. He served in Germany before leaving active duty in 1985. In 1988 Lawton joined the Marine Corps as a general equipment operator. He served in Okinawa and Operation Desert Storm. He left the Marines after seven and a half years and moved back to Colorado. Mark was employed by Kennecott as a heavy machinery operator. In 2000 Sgt. Lawton joined the Army Reserve. He served as a squad leader in A Company, 244th Engineer Battalion in Grand Junction, Colo. Mark loved being a Solider and his troops knew it. Despite not being required to mobilize, Lawton felt he had to serve with his unit and volunteered to deploy with them.

The Last Convoy

Lawton was killed on August 29, 2003 while participating in combat operations to liberate Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.



During a convoy mission north of Suaydat, from Forward Operating Base Normandy, to Forward Operating Base Pacesetter, his convoy was ambushed by insurgents with rocket-propelled grenades (RPG's) and small arms fire. Lawton was mortally wounded while riding in the passenger side of the lead vehicle. Other Soldiers injured in the attack included: Pvt. Keith Deutsch from Minnesota, Sgt. Kenneth Favorite, Pfc. Tyler McWilliams and Spc. Michael Werthington all of Colorado.

Even after the loss, Sherri continued to support the Soldiers of her husband's unit. Each day she would place small U. S. flags and yellow ribbons on the fence and gate at her home in Craig. She also sent care packages and letters to

the deployed members of A. Co. until they came home.

All but one Soldier.

American Legion Post #62

Not only has an Army Reserve Center been named after Lawton, but also an American Legion Post in his hometown of Craig, Colo. On August 22, 2006, Sherri, along with her parents and sons, traveled back from Wasola, Mo., to attend the re-dedication of the Mark Anthony Evans Lawton. American Legion Post #62. The event included a flag-lined journey which was traveled by many Soliders of A Co., 244th Eng. Bn. Grand Junction, Colo., the 96th RRC and Fort Carson, along with their heavy engineer equipment, a helicopter fly-over courtesy of the Colorado Air National Guard, high school

friends, and 60 motorcyclists from the American Legion Riders.

The hall was packed with suppor ers and emotions were high as tril ute was given to Lawton. Sher received a ceremonial boxed fla from a past Legion Departmer Commander, Neal Thomas. Durin a luncheon with Soldiers, friend and family, heartfelt stories about Lawton were shared.

With the naming of the Reserve Center at Fort Carson, and the American Legion Post 62 in Craig, Lawton's life, family, service devotion, and ultimate sacrifical will be immortalized throughout time. It has been said, there is no greater sacrifice then to give you life for your friends. The Soldier of A Co. 244th Eng. Bn. agree that Lawton was a true friend.

of mine, who had participated in some of the early battles of the south Pacific, said that the troop thips he was on didn't even have ndoor heads. They were two-by-our wood structures attached to he top sides of the ship. He said he troopships were like slave thips must have been.

Once I got to my bunk I was so cick I stayed there for three days. On the second day, I heard my name called to report to the galley for Kitchen Police duty. I told Stearly, "I don't care if they shoot me, I'm not going." Stearly was deeling good and liked to be in the ricinity of food, so he volunteered o go in my place. "Private Stearly eporting," he mumbled. "OK, Stearly, start peeling potatoes," the officer replied.

hree days later I was feeling bet-

ter and Stearly appeared at my bunk-side with a large orange, I ate it -- the most memorable orange I have ever eaten. Feeling better, I went up on the deck. The sun was shining, the seas were quieter and it was warmer. In two or three more days we were in Pearl Harbor. With our baggage, we climbed into open rail cars and were hauled up to an Army camp in the hills; that was a pleasant change from the cold, damp weather of the Seattle area. However, we were quarantined for three days and on alert for four days and then hauled back down to the docks. So much for glamorous Hawaii!! I saw Hawaii again on a vacation with my late wife, Mona, in 1974.

Recently, Herman Buffington, whom I first met on Okinawa, told me about his experience on that

stormy voyage. He said he was seasick all that first night and about 5:00 a.m. some Lieutenant came to his bunk and ordered him to report to the galley immediately for KP duty. He said, "No, I can't go. I'm dying!" A little later Lieutenant came back and ordered him to report to the galley, or he would be court-martialed. Herman again protested, but pointed out that the Lieutenant seemed to be in good shape. The Lieutenant left, and then sent guards to get him. The guards escorted Herman to the dreaded galley. As soon as they left, he found a space to hide under a large sink, although it was wet with drainage and stank. At night he sneaked back to his bunk. Then in the morning the guards came back and escorted him again to the galley. He reclaimed his hiding place. This routine continued a few days until a sailor told him



that he was going to die unless he started eating something or went to the sick bay. So he gave Herman some crackers and orange juice. They stayed down, so he had more and was soon able to perform h KP duties.

Nashville... History, Museums and Music

Nashville was founded by James Robertson and a party of Wataugans in 1779, and was originally called Fort Nashborough, the after American Revolutionary War hero Francis Nash. Nashville quickly grew because of its prime location, accessibility as a river port, and its later status as a major railroad center. In 1806, Nashville was incorporated as a city and became the county seat of Davidson County, Tennessee. In 1843, the city was named the permanent capital of the state of Tennessee.

By 1860, when the first rumblings of secession began to be heard across the South, antebellum Nashville was a very prosperous city. The city's significance as a shipping port made it a desirable prize as a means of controlling important river and railroad transportation routes. In February 1862, Nashville became the first state capital to fall to Union troops.

Though the Civil War left Nashville in dire economic straits, the city quickly rebounded. Within a few years, the city had reclaimed its important shipping and trading position and also developed a solid manufacturing base. The post-Civil War years of the late 19th century brought a newfound prosperity to Nashville.

These healthy economic times left the city with a legacy of grand classical-style buildings, which can still be seen around the downtown area. It was the advent of the Grand

Ole Opry in 1925, combined with an already-thriving publishing industry, that positioned it to become "Music City USA". In 1963, Nashville consolidated its government with Davidson County and thus became the first major city in the United States to form a metropolitan government. Since the 1970s, the city has experienced tremendous growth, particularly during the economic boom of the 1990s under the leadership of Mayor (now-Tennessee Governor) Phil Bredesen, who made urban renewal a priority, and fostered the construction or renovation of several city landmarks, including the Country Music Hall of Fame, the Nashville Public Library downtown, the Sommet Center, and LP Field.

The Sommet Center (formerly Nashville Arena and Gaylord Entertainment Center) was built as both a large concert facility and as an enticement to lure either a National Basketball Association or National Hockey League (NHL) sports franchise. This was accomplished in 1997 when Nashville was awarded an NHL expansion team which was sub-

sequently named the Nashville Predators. LP Field (formerly Adelphia Coliseum) was built after the National Football League's (NFL) Houston Oilers agreed to move to the city in 1995. The NFL debuted in Nashville in 1998 at Vanderbilt Stadium, and LP Field opened in the summer of 1999. The Oilers changed their name to the Tennessee Titans and saw a season culminate in the Music City Miracle and a close Super Bowl game.


Today the city along the Cumberland River is a crossroads of American culture, and easily the fastest-growing part of the Upper South and the territory between Atlanta and Texas. Currently, there are many plans of building multiple residential and business towers in the downtown area, including the Signature Tower. If constructed, this will be the tallest building in both Nashville and Tennessee surpassing the AT&

T Building, and will also become the tallest building in the USA outside of New York and Chicago, surpassing the Bank of America Plaza in Atlanta.



Interesting facts about Nashville

A replica of The Parthenon, the famous ancient Greek building in Athens, Greece, stands in Nashville's Centennial Park. Because of this, Nashville is known as "the Athens of the South."

New Oklahoma Memorial Dedicated




The group plans to have enough funding left over to establish a perpetual care fund to maintain the memorial. There are 4,000 names on the memorial and others from Kingfisher County can be added.
