With the World Fund it would be easier for people in different countries to buy things from one another, while the World Bank would see that nations needing to rebuild or develop their industry after the war could get loans to do so.

These proposed economic agreements spell the difference between a world caught again in panic and economic warfare, culminating in war, or a world in which the members strive for a better life thru mutual trust and cooperation, said the President.

While the President called for world economic cooperation, labor leader Sidney Hillman in London called for the immediate establishment of a new world labor organization. Hillman told the World Trade Union Congress in London that peace settlements now being made demand labor's participation.

### SENATORS CONFIRM NOMINATION OF ROOSEVELT

Senators on Monday confirmed the nomination of Colonel Elliott Roosevelt and 77 other colonels to be promoted to the rank of Brigadier General. The Senate defeated a motion by Republican Senator Bushfield of South Dakota to send Gel. Roosevelt's name back to the committee for further consideration. Senator Bushfield called the 34 year old son of President Roosevelt an "amateur compared to 9,600 other army colonels."

MANILA JAPS HAVE BACKS TO BAY

\*\*\*Feb 14-Three American divisions in Manila are pushing the furiously resisting Japanese garrison into Manila Bay. The Yanks have already crossed to the south side of the Pasig River and the only possible means of escape for the Japs would be across the Bay into Corregidor and Bataan.

General MacArthur's latest communique said Jap troops in South Manila are now being compressed into extinction. The Jap defenders have mined practically all of the city and caused the Americans to advance slowly in order to save lives as well as property.

Even if some enemy troops do succeed in crossing to Bataan or Corregidor, there is little hope for them. United States heavy bombers dropped 700 tons of bombs on Jap positions on Bataan yesterday and another 200 tons on Corregidor. American fighter planes sank 35 barges Sunday which were loaded with 2500 Jap troops off Bataan.

### SENATE LEADER SAYS RUSSIA WILL FIGHT JAPS

\*\*\*Feb 14-In Washington, Senator Elbert D. Thomas, Chairman of the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee said he expected Russia to join the Combined Chiefs of Staff and eventually cooperate with the Allies in the Japanese war.

Commenting on a story which appeared in Sunday's issue of the Washington Post, Thomas stated that the Soviet move would.

W\*\*Feb 14--On the eastern front, the First Ukraine Army drove to within 74 miles of the Saxony capital of Dresden. They captured the Bober River stronghold of Eunzlau in a 15 mile advance that cut one Borlinto-Prague highway. In southwestern Poland, the Fourth Ukraine Army toppled Bielsko, a key railroad junction 17 miles northeast of Cieszyn. These two Russian drives endangered thousands of German troops fighting in a salient far to the southeast into Slovakia.

Moscow dispatches said that the Red Army artillery was pumping shells into Frankfurt day and night, disrupting Nazi communications behind that fortress city. Red Army troops also threatened to encircle Kuestrin, which was under heavy artillery fire. New Russian gains have been made in Pomerania in northern Germany and in the Polish Corridor.

. About 115 miles south of Kleve, "Blood and Guts" Patton and his Third Army yesterday entered Prum in the Eifel Mountains, giving them control of that section of the Seigfried Line. Third Army troops are also challenging the enemy's hold on the Westwall southwest of Prum along the border between Germay and Luxembourg. Pontoon bridges were thrown across the Sure and Our Rivers at several points, and tanks and tank destroyers are streaming across. Mountainous country lies ahead of them.

The two strong points of Kleve and cessions to their possessions in the Orient Prum withstood the shock of an Allied drive last Autumn.
