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YANKS DRIVE TOWARD RHINE

FORRESTAL ON IWO JIMA

***Feb 27--Navy Secretary Forrestal observed the Iwo landings from a flag-ship and later went ashore to observe the Marine ground fighting. Afterwards, Secretary Forrestal visited Guam for a conference with Fleet Admiral Nimitz. Broadcasting from Guam Sunday, Forrestal said, "The tremendous storm of metal thrown into Iwo sharpens the necessity for continuing the output of minitions in plants at home. Only because of that rain of metal can the island be reduced at all. Because of it, our ratio of losses is far less than it otherwise would have been." Forrestal continued, "We had to land where they expected, and it had to be a frontal assault. We will be digging dead Japanese and some live ones out of caves and underground forts for many weeks to come."

The three Marine divisions on Iwo Island began a new attack for the central airfield. They captured all of one strip of the airdrome and two-thirds of another despite fierce enemy resistance. Naval gunfire and carrier as well as land-based Liberators supported the ground action. Marines on Iwo now have the first land-based heavy bomber support in the central Pacific since Tarawa.

Jap night raiders attacked Saturday night, but caused no damage to American units. Ironically, the enemy's bombs fell inside enemy territory. 2,827 doad Japs have been counted on Iwo.

***Feb 27--Four American armies on Europe's Western Front are driving hard toward the Rhine River. The American First Army has already captured Duren and a score of other German towns. With a great bridge-head across the Roer River now behind them, the First and Minth Armies are now seven miles deep into Germany and only fifteen miles from Cologne.

American troops are now five miles from the Erft River, last natural defenseive barrier short of the Rhine itself.
Slightly to the north, Ninth Army units stand ten miles from Munchen-Gladbach.
This German industrial city has a population of over 200,000. The Canadian First Army is still making progress on the extreme northern end of the front.

General Patton's Third Army has crossed the Prum River at two points within six miles of Bitburg. Farther south, Third Army armored units sent tanks across the Saar River in twin thrusts toward the Rhine. While the First and Ninth knocked out large gains, the Seventh Army was poised for another thrust. It made no biggains yesterday on the southern end of the Western Front.

offensive over Germany, more than 5,000 Allied planes of seven air commands bombed and strafed the German homeland. The biggest formation was a fleet of over 1100 American heavy bombers from England which pounded Munich, Aschaffenburg and Ulm. Fighter planes destroyed 41 enemy planes.

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HARI KIRI FOR JAPS ON CORREGIDOR

***Feb 27--Violent underground explosions have been shaking Corregidor since last Wednesday, it was reported. It is believed that trapped Japanese in Corregidors many tunnels are committing mass hari kiri in hopes of blowing up American positions. One blast buried several Americans alive, and injured others.

General MacArthur announced capture by the 1st Cavalry Division of San Isidro and Montalban east of Manila. Spearheads are nearly 18 miles east of Manila. Units of the 11th Airborne Division crossed San Juan River some 15 miles south of captured Muntinlupa.

American planes attacked from northern Luzon to Borneo. They set afire one 5,000 ton tanker off Indo-China and damaged a 7,000 ton transport off Swatow China. Yank fliers also sunk troop laden barges at various places and hit six airdromes on northern Borneo.

JAPS ADVANCE IN CHINA

***Feb 27--Japanese troops on the Chinese mainland have captured the town of Shang, west of the Canton-to-Hankow Railway, 100 miles south of Hengyang. Chinese forces claimed they killed 100 Japanese before giving up the town.

PREMIER GETS BIG FUNERAL

***Fob 27--Police in Cairo, Egypt have arrested 50 persons following the assasination of Prime Minister Maher in the Chember of Deputies last Saturday. The arrests were precautionary measures during the inquiries of the assasin. The assasin was taken shortly after the shooting.

A state funeral for Maher Sunday was followed by one of the longest funeral processions ever seen in the Eastern Hemisphere. It included detachments of the Egyptian Army and contingents of the British South African, Indian, American troops

REDS DRIVE TOWARD BALTIC

***Feb 27-Tank spearheads of the Red Army smashed to within 60 miles of the Baltic coast in a drive aimed at splitting Pomerania and isolating German troops in the Danzig area. A late Moscow communique revealed the Red Army capture of the strongpoint of Preussich-Friedland in Pomerania.

The drive is gaining through lake country seven miles west of Crojnice on the Polish frontier. Rail and highway connections between Berlin and Danzig have already been severed. Three thousand Germans were killed in this new drive while 2,000 others are reported annihilated in East Prussia.

To the south, the battle inside Breslau continued bitterly from block to block. Hitler has ordered this by-passed strongpoint defended until the last man. Soviet troops are systematically climinating the Nazi garrison in a battle that rivals Budapest for ferecity.

SKI TROOPS IN ITALY

***Feb 27-In Italy, the American 10th Mountain Division was revealed as the captors of Mount Belvedere. This was the first mention of the 10th Division, which included the 85th, 86th and 87th Mountain Regiments.

These mountain regiments trained at Camp Hale, Colorado and are skilled as ski troops as well as mountain climbers. After repulsing German counterattacks beyond Belvedere, they captured the mountain, which is 29 miles southwest of Bologna.

NY NIGHTSPOTS CLOSE AT MIDNIGHT

New York City's Mayor LaGuardia an-Sunday that Manhattan night clubs would have to close at midnight Monday in accordance with the new government curfew order. He had previously told the clubs to wait for his official announcement, which he said would be given with ample warning.

MOUNTIES TANGLE WITH DRAFT DODGERS

***Feb 27--When Canadian Royal Mounted Police and Provost Corpsmen of the Canadian Army combod the town of Drummondville, for draft dodgers and deserters a riot broke out last Saturday. The police fought a two hour battle with the deserters in the Quebec town. A possible 100 persons were injured.

Drummondville was being searched for a large number of persons who had failed to return from leaves to the Canadian Army, as well as those who didn't bother to comply with draft regulations in the first place. 25 persons were arrested on charges of interfering with the Canadian police.

YOU CAN HAVE AFTERNOON TEA IN LONDON!

Breakfast in New York and afternoon tea in London on the same day is now a post-war certainty according to the Consolidated-Vultee Aircraft Corporation of San Diego. Consolidated will build a fleet of passenger clippers for Pan-American World Airways which will carry 204 passengers at cruising speeds of 340 miles per hour. Passengers of the proposed six-engined planes will sit in air conditioned cabins and travel at an altitude of 30,000 feet to avoid storms. Wingspread of the post-war giants will be 230 feet, more than twice that of present day B-24 Liberators. Pan-American officials say the completely double deck clippers will make the New York to London run in a little over nine hours.

WLB ORDERS STRIKERS BACK TO WORK

****Feb 27-The War Labor Board has ordered nearly 14,000 Detroit Dodge workers to end the strike which started last Friday and virtually halted production of plane and tank parts. Strikers must resume work by Monday, said the WLB, or the Local United Auto Workers' Union must show cause. The local union, however, is not supported by the UAW International, which has also ordered the men to return to their work.

Dodge Company officials originally fired eight union men accused of loafing by the company. This was the union's reason for the strike. The union then charged the Dodge Company with a "speedup" program.

NEW GLIDER RECORD

***Feb 27--The Curtiss Wright Company has claimed a new non-stop distance record for one of its gliders. Flying from Karachi to Calcutta, India, the glider made the 1320 mile flight in seven hours and 45 minutes. A commando air transport towed the glider which was loaded with two tons of Christmas packages. The previous glider record was a distance of 1177 miles.



Take three mortar squads, two machine gun squads and toss in a Mess Sgt --- and what have you got? Non-combatants? Well friends, roll up that idea in your mattress of the still existing confusion and climb cover and stick it on the bottom of the duffle bag. That theory is the bunk! The weapons platoon of Co C (382nd) proved its invalidity when they went out with rifles instead of their usual weapons on a three day patrol just to see how the other half lives.
