

PATTON'S TANKS RUN OVER WORMS

PARIS, March 21 - Lt. General George Patton's Third Army today captured the important German city of Worms. A city with a population of 42,000, Worms is 16 miles north of the twin industrial cities of Manheim. Patton's forces also entered Mainz on the Rhine and passed through the city of Laiserlautern.

With the capture of Worms, Kaiserlautern and Mainz, the Third Army has sealed off all escape routes north of Worms in the Saar-Moselle-Rhine triangle.

Dispatches said the Third and Seventh Armies were racing to an imminent junction as German defenses collapsed in the face of drives from both the North and the South across the rich industrial area. The Allied controlled Luxembourg Radio said without confirmation that the two armies had already made a junction.

Front dispatches had previously placed the Seventh Army, which had broken thru Siegfried Line defenses along the northern Alsace frontier on a broad front, at less than 15 miles from a juncture with the Third Army.

In seven days, General Patton's offensive has inflicted at least 45,000 casualties on the original 80,000 Germans in the Rhine-Moselle-Saar province according to Associated Press dispatches.

GUAM, March 21-A crushing blow was dealt to the Japanese Navy Monday when after a day of destructive attacks on the enemy air force on Kyushu, the fast carrier task force of Vice Admiral Marc A. Mitscher caught the principal units of the Jap flee in its home bases in the inland sea inflicting heavy damage. In addition many Jap airplanes were destroyed.

A preliminary report from Admiral R. A. Spruance, commander of the Fifth Fleet who was present in tactical command of the fleet forces during the action listed the following damage inflicted on the enemy during two days of fighting: aircraft, 202 shot out of the air, 275 destroyed on the ground, 160 damaged in the first days attack and a large number damaged the second day; ships sunk: six small freighters ships damaged: one or two battleships, two or three aircraft carriers, two light carriers or escort carriers, two escort carriers, one heavy cruiser, one light cruiser, four destroyers, one submaring, one destroyer escort and seven freighters. A large number of naval installations were destroyed including hangars, shops. arsenals and oil storage facilities.

Despite many enemy air attacks on the task force, American aircraft losses were extremely light. None of our ships were lost. One ship was seriously damaged but was able to return to port under its own power. A few others received minor damage

but are fully operational.
Radio Tokyo: two American battleships sunk, 137 planes destroyed. Some of our raiders failed to return.

AIR ATTACKS CLIP LUFTWAFFE WINGS

LONDON, March 21 - A Royal Air Force spokesman said today that British and American air assaults on Germany's oil refineries and production facilities had been so successful that the Luftwaffe was forced to eliminate training flights because of the shortage of trainers, lubricants and fuel.

THIRTEEN AND A HALF MILLION NAZIS OUT OF CIRCULATION

LONDON, March 21 - British War Secretary Sir James Grigg said in the House of Commons today that one and a half million Germans excluding those taken by the Red Army have been captured by the Allies since the beginning of the war. From D-Day to last Monday morning a total of 1,072,790 prisoners were taken by the Allies.

Russian announcement of casualties inflicted on the Germans by the Red Army have totalled more than twelve million killed and captured with the number of prisoners unspecified.

AMERICAN POW'S FREED BY RED ARMIES

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The War Department announced today that 250 American soldiers liberated from German prison camps by Soviet armies or freed in other ways have reached the United States. Several hundred others are enroute from somewhere in the Middle East.

A Reuters dispatch from Odessa said nearly one thousand British and American prisoners of war were liberated by Russian armies and shipped for home from Odessa on a British liner.

In the meantime a Reuters dispatch from Paris said 1200 Russian war prisoners freed in Germany by the Allied advance arrived in Marseille.

NAVY IN CAMPAIGN TO DESTROY JAP FLEET

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 21 - An official Navy spokesman said today that a campaign to hunt down and destroy the Japanese fleet in its hiding places has begun. He declared the campaign started with the recent powerful carrier based air attacks on enemy bases in Japan's Inland Sea.

He said, "The Inland Sea is probably one of the major hiding places of their fleet and provides the best refuge. It won't be that very long. This is just the beginning of a campaign to hunt down their ships wherever they are holed up and to

get them."

Saying that no official reports have been received of damage inflicted on the enemy during Admiral Mitscher's attack but "we think we got some pretty good results."

Today's front page story came in on a later broadcast from Admiral Nimitz! head-quarters.

BRITISH TAKE MANDALAY

CALCUTTA, March 21 - The hard British struggle on the road to Mandalay was ended today when the British Fourteenth Army toppled Fort Dufferin and liberated the city of Mandalay. The fort was the final Jap stronghold in the city.

Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten in an order of the day announced British and Indian troops had liberated Mandalay and added "We can look forward to even greater

victories."

Mandalay, Japan's main base in Central Burma, is the second largest city in Burma and a main communications center. Heavily fortified by the enemy, it was bitterly defended by the Japs. It was estimated that 10,000 Japanese troops were killed in twelve days of the battle for the city. Mandalay which lies on the east bank of the Irrawaddy, is 360 miles from Jap-held Rangoon, Burma's largest city.

The fall of Mandalay came after a long campaign through jungles and mountains with poor communications. Proving the superior

U.S. THIRD ENTERS MAINZ

Radio Luxembourg reported without confirmation that Patton's forces have aleady made a junction with General Patch's Seventh Armies. For the past few days, the Third and Seventh Armies have been cacing to a junction as German defenses collapsed in the face of the Allied drive from the north and south of the Saar recion.

After one of the greatest armored onslaughts in history, Third Army troops are oised to deliver the kill to the German First Army, which is now virtually bottled p inside the Rhine-Saar pocket. In a ere seven days, Patton's offensive has nflicted at least 45,000 casualties on he original force of 80,000 Nazis in the hine-Moselle-Saar area.

Supplementing the ground forces, llied warplanes ranged over the western ront hanmering at retreating Germans who (Continued on page two.)

Mar 21--After a day of destructive attacks on Kyushu, Fast Carrier Task Force 58 moved northeast and on March 19 attacked principal units of the Japanese fleet in its home bases on that island. During the attack, crippling blows were inflicted on the Japanese fleet and many hundreds of enemy aircraft were destroyed or damaged.

A preliminary report from Admiral Spruance, Fifth Fleet commander, showed that during two days of fighting, Task force 58 destroyed 477 Jap aircraft, and dana od well over 100. This would bring the total figure of aircraft destroyed or damaged to more than 600. Fnemy shipping sunk included six small freighters. One and possibly two battleships, two or three aircraft carriers, two light carriers, two escort cerriers, one heavy cruiser, one light craiser, four destroyers, one submarine, one destroyer escort and seven freighters were damaged by the American planes. Our own aircraft losses were extremely light and no American ships were sunk. One ship was damaged, however, and is limping into port under its own power.

While carrier planes were smashing the Japanese ships and aircraft, others struck at Kure and Kobe, two great naval bases. Kure is Japan's greatest naval base, while Kobe is one of the Empire's most important industrial cities. The carrier based planes pounced on Kobe while it was still smouldering from 2500 tons of incendiaries dropped Last Saturday by B-29s. Tokyo radio said that the raids lasted for ten solid hours.

The broadcast said, "To the inhabitants of the Ruhr, your life depends on immediate action. Get out of the Ruhr. let out of the war." Another Allied broadcost to the foreign workers in Germany advised them not to let the Germans evacuate them inland, but to fin a place of refuce nearby and await the Allied Armies. The broadcast emphasized that the armapent industries of the Ruhr must be destroyed.

FRENCH CATHEDRALS INTACT

Mar 21-Fine Arts and Archives section of SHAFF announced today that but of 25 famous cathedrals and other historic buildings listed as part of "the cultural heritage of France", 22 of them are now in liperated areas. All but one of them are ither intact or only slightly damaged.

Rouen Cathedral, the one exception, vas badly damaged by the 1944 bombardment. ue to collaboration of Allied air forces and ground armies, the majority of these onuments escaped destruction by aerial ombines or ground operations.

REDS FOUR MILES FROM STETTIN

Mar 21-Warshal Stalin announced that the First White Russian Army has captured Altiams, a suburban bastion four miles east of Stettin. Altdamm was taken after several days of heavy fighting. The Russian seizure of this city liquidates the powerfully-fortified German bridgehead on the east bank of the Oder.

In his announcement, Stalin also told of the Russian capture of Braunsberg, 38 miles southwest of Stettin. Stalin's order-of-the-day was addressed to Marshal Alexander Vassilebsky, who is commanding the Third Army. This was the first word that the Chief of the Red Army General Staff had taken over the command vacated by the death in action of General Ivan Cherniakhovsky a few weeks ago.

250 Yank soldiers liberated from German prison camps by the Soviet Armies have already arrived in the U. S., according to the War Department. Mar 21--Allied Headquarters in Rome announced that patrols raided German lines in strength along the entire Fifth Army front yesterday, while artillery hammered enemy outposts and communications. They added. however, that there was no substantial change in positions.

CHILEAN COASTAL SHIP EXPLODES

Mar 20-61 persons were rescued while 85 are missing after the Chilean coastal passenger ship Mapocho caught fire and sank after a series of explosions. The Swedish steamship Sumarland rescued 28 of the passengers while another Chilean vessel rescued the balance. The Mapocho was a 2.652 tonner. .

ALL PHILIPPINES FALLING TO YANKS

WHY WAS JAP AMBASSADOR RECALLED FROM MOSCOW?
