SENATE PASSES REVISED GI BILL

WASHINGTON, Nov 10--The Senate Thursday passed a revised GI Bill of Rights and sent it to the House for adjustment of minor differences. It voted down a proposal which would have extended the benefits to widows of veterans who would have been entitled to them had they lived.

The main provisions of the new bill are the elimination of age restrictions on educational benefits and an increase of the subsistence allowances to \$65 a month for veterans without dependents and \$90 monthly for veterans with a family. The bill authorizes the guarantee of loans for working capital as well as for real estate and extends to ten years the time in which a veteran

extends the repayment of loans on homes American sergeant who crashed Marshal Zhu- Central Govto 40 years. The House is expected to pass the present bill.

SHANGHAI, Nov 10--Lieut General Albert C. Welemeyer, commander of the United States forces in China, acknowledged in Shanghai that they have been involved in minor skirmishes, but definitely are not provoking trouble. Chinese Communists now engaged in clashes with Central Government troops in several sectors, previously charged the Americans with halping Chiang Kai Shek forces and demanded that Wedemeyer apologize for intervention.

They also charged that American marines had raided Communist offices in Tientsin. Gen Wedemeyer said he referred this to the commander of the Third Marine Amphibious Corps, and would go to Chungking Friday to confer with Chiang. "We are not supposed to take aggressive action against any Chinese except to protect American lives or property," Wedemeyer said. ONE ORDER OF HEAVEN COMING UP

(AMS) -- Capt Frank L. Lillyman, paratroop officer in the Seventh Army Provost Marshal's office, is a man who knows what he wants. And if it seems a little screwy to other people, well, let them worry about their own dreams.

For it was out of his dreams and visions while overseas -- jotted down between his five combat operations and during his three hospitalizations -- that the captain worked out his plan for a homecoming to put "Jeekend at the Waldorf" and other Hollywood imaginings to shame.

The Pennsylvania Hotel has received a letter from the paratroop officer, out-

lining a seven-day stay in New York with his wife and small daughter.

First of all, he said, he wants a suite of rooms, which "must face east, so the sun wakes me up. (Foxholes haven't portholes.)" Furthermore, "I'll want a cup of English-made tea in bed, and three meals daily of dishes I'll list. I don't want to know the dishes in advance. But no dish shall be repeated!"

"During my stay," he warned, "no employees shall call me by my military rank whether I'm in uniform or not! The title of 'Mister' will be sweet music. I desire a maid made available for my wife -- a large, gray-haired motherly type in black dress, white apron and white cap.

"Each morning when breakfast is served in my suite, a fresh bouquet shall be delivered to my wife, a new doll or toy to my daughter. I would like also a schedule

of daily sightseeing, shopping, and theaters to be ready."

The captain wants to read the papers at breakfast, while Strauss music, including "Tales of the Vienna Woods." floats all around him. The breakfast menu is to read like this: "Orange juice (NOT canned), slicked bananas with cream, peaches with cream, cereals with cream, blackberries with cream. Light scrambled eggs (made with cream and butter), two poaced eggs, three slices of fried ham (no FAT) with an egg, sunny sides up but with pink yolk and firm white. Two medium boiled eggs with sausages, vegetable juice and fresh milk."

For lunch the paratrooper, henceforth to be known as the Appetite, wants more eggs, chicken salad, sausages, cold tongue, homemade biscuits, sliced pimentos. Dinner will be off to a "good start" with filet mignon (dripping with mushrooms), lobster, shrimp, crepe suzettes. And these desserts: "Thipped cream or custard puffs, eclairs, strawberry shortcake, nicely crushed berries and French pastry."

If he is still alive and hungry at bedtime, he wants a banana split with nuts and maraschino cherry, a honey-dew melon, smoked herrings and a big dill pickle.

Affirming his sanity and seriousness of purpose, Captain Lillyman asked just three questions: "Can you do it? What's the tariff? (I'm a captain, no general). How much notice will you need? (I'll wire you the minute I hit the States.)

The hotel's managers, dazed and amazed, weren't sure themselves whether they could do it. At last reports, they were thinking of buying a dairy and poultry farm as a starter!

SHINGTON, Mov 10--5000 combat planes eady for instant use, 400,000 officers and nlisted men, and a reserve of 1,000,000 ien are the goals of the air forces, as jeut Gen Doolittle outlined them for Conress yesterday. The veteran airman said hese figures have been approved by Gen tenry Arnold, chief of the Army Air Forces. ut have not yet been accepted by the War epartment or the joint chiefs of staff.

Doolittle contended that the next war. in 20 or more years from now, will be conjucted by "pilotless, gyro-stablized, radar controlled and radio directed projectiles tilizing atomic bombs or some more power-"ul force." He predicted that our future military plane will be able "to go to any part of the world and return to bases in imerica."

After pointing out that other nations will have the same kind of air power and may also carry atomic bombs. Gen Doolittle said that in such a world it is necessary for the nation's safety to have a single national defense department, with the air forces raised to equality with ground and sea forces.

37TH SAILS NOV. 15

ALSHINGTON, Nov 10 -- The War Department reported today the 37th Division now is scheduled to sail for home November 15.

More than 28,500 troops were scheduled to land yesterday at three East Coast ports aboard 20 transports, while at five Jest Coast ports 14 more vessels were due to debark nearly 13,000 servicemen from 1 the Pacific.

PEARL HARBOR HEARINGS TO BEGIN NOV 15

WASHINGTON, Nov 10 -- Yesterday Democrats in the Senate voted down a proposal to postpone the start of hearings on Pearl Harbor. They will be opened November 15.

President Truman has ordered all government agencies to permit personnel to volunteer information and testify before the special joint House-Senate committee investigating the Pearl Harbor disaster.

5,000 PLANES AND 400,000 MEN NEW CAR PRODUCTION SLOW

DETROIT, Nov 10--Only 19,000 new passenger cars have been turned out since VJ Day, which is but 26% of the planned production. The reasons given for the low output are wage disputes and piecemeal shipment of parts.

Meantime, a congressional committee demanded that OPA not cut dealer margins on new cars until further investigation. The action came after 500 dealers protested the OPA was soueezing them unfairly by permitting manufacturers to charge more for new cars but keeping retail prices at the 1942 level. Dealers said the long standing mark up on new cars is approximately 24%, but the OPA decision will probably cut this in half.

"DESTRUCTION ON AN UNBELIEVABLE SCALE"

LONDON, Nov 10 -- Prime Minister Attlee declared yesterday that unless new human relationships are devised between peoples "destruction on an unbelievable scale will fall upon our civilization. We have to get together with all nations to consider how we can live in peace."

Attlee spoke a few hours before ho was to board a plane for the United States for conferences with President Truman and Prime Minister King.




