## 21 BANKS SEIZED BY MacARTHUR !

TOKYO. Oct 1 -- General MacArthur today ordered United States Army troops to seize and close all banks which financed Japanese war production and acted as the economic spearhead of Japanese imperialism. Twenty-one banks were affected by the order. An Allied spokesman says the Japanese imperial family, the government, and eight great money families are suspected of laying the groundwork of all Japanese expansion through the banking institutions.

Colonel Kramer of MacArthur's economic and scientific section said the Allios expect to uncover a story of financial manipulations almost unparalleled in world history. The financiers would spearhead every Japanese expansion move. They would move into territory, completely entangle local magnates through favors, then force their oid and the expansion. In this manner the Japanese financial institutions and imperialists conlapse between the change from ship- trolled the finances of Korea, Formosa, China, Manchuria, Philippines, Malaya, Borneo, Java, and India.

# 10,000 PACIFIC VETS LEAVE JAPAN FOR U.S.

YOKOHAMA. Oct 1 -- First clearance of soldiers homoward bound from Japan has begun with three transports carrying high point men from the 43rd Infantry, 1st Cavalry, and Americal Divisions leaving Yokohama Saturday for San Francisco. There are 9797 troops aboard the three ships, and they are scheduled to arrive in nine to twelve days. Over 5000 of the vets are being carried by the USS General John Pope, the fastest of the trio. (The USS Pope will be remembered as the troopship which carried the 381st Infantry Regiment and much Special Troops from San Francisco to Honolulu in July, 1944.)

### GERMAN JEWS STILL IN PRISONS

WASHINGTON, Oct 1 -- The White House made a lengthy report which describes how displaced persons in Germany, particularly Jews, are still living in concentration camps, Allied commission in the Pacific According to the report they are being treated much as the Nazis treated them, except that the Americans don't exterminate them. President Truman has ordered Gen Eisenhower to clean up the situation and report to him as soon as possible. Eisenhower was told that policies on displaced persons adopted at Yalta and Potsdem were not being carried out by his subordinate officers.

# JAPAN BY MacARTHUR'S ORDER

TOKYO. Oct 1 -- General MacArthur has ordered abolition of Japan's traditional censorship of the press. radio, movies, mail and communications. The order is effective immediately, and gave Japan its first free press in history. Three Tokyo and two Osaka newspapers were told to resume selling which the Japanese home ministry had banned. claiming they carried interviews with the emperor which the ministry thought would have a bad effect on the Japanese people.

The Japanese war department announced that four-fifths of the empire's home army has been demobilized.

LONDON. Oct 1 -- United States Secretary Byrnes announced from London Saturday night the formation of an to direct the Japanese in carrying out of the surrender terms. The commission agreed to by Britain, Russia, and China will meet in Washington in the near future. The commission was an American proposal. Other countries which will be invited to join are France, the Philippines, Australia, New Zealand Canada, and the Netherlands. The commission will decide at the first meeting whether to hold session in Washington or Tokyo.

### JAPANESE KIDS ADOPT THE AMERICAN ARMY

TOKYO(AP) -- Like the children of Europe and Africa, the Japanese "small fry" have fallen head over heels in love with big-hearted and big-pocketed Yank soldiers, marines and sailors. Grownups may sneer openly or cast veiled looks of hatred at occupation troops from behind their mask of polite formality, but the kids themselves are seriously welcoming the invaders.

They line the streets whenever a military convoy passes, and stand for hours grinning and saluting. Whenever an American soldier jokingly throws them a return salute, they jump up and down, hysterically happy. Most of the children are clad in rags, and some are so short of clothing that loin cloths make up their entire wardrobe.

Boys and girls begin the pack-mule life early in Japan, where child labor is the rule rather than the exception. But these children show few external signs of having lived on a starvation diet. They appear helthy and lively, with clear, tanned yellow skins. They wear happy grins and their faces are lively and expressive. Life hasn't yet molded them to the bleak impassivity of their elders.

They are quite willing to forget the pest and go overboard for the "new order" the Allies are bringing. Hany of them wave their fingers in the famous V sign. They picked that up from watching the troops. Some also have broken out Allied flags. One group of youngsters about seven to eight years old modestly wave American and British flags at passing columns.

They are picking up the English language quickly, and in less than a week every Japanese child from Yokosuka to Tokyo has learned at least three words: "Hello", and "Thank you".

Each day they get more friendly, as -- one soldier puts it -- "They

learn that Americans won't eat them or kick their teeth in."

The morning we landed in Japan you could hardly see a child on the street. They would peer out of windows or peer down from balconies, then giggle and, half-frightened by their own bravery, run back into the house. Now they flood out from everywhere, play all over the streets, and you have to drive carefully to keep from wiping out the juvenile population with your wheels. They didn't beg at first. But that's changed too. No child who has gone long without sweets can withstand the miracle of American chocolate or the magic of American chewing gum. After the soldiers began half-shamefacedly tossing them out little bits of candy they caught on quickly. They have learned the technique that worked well with European kids. They hold up their fingers in the victory sign, they hold out their other hand for candy.

They are willing to work for it, too. Troops find it almost impossible to keep them away from their quarters. Children rush up at every chance to sweep for the, carry their Garands or shine their shoes.
