

### 23,000 PACIFIC VETERANS TO LAND IN SAN FRANCISCO ABOARD 19 SHIPS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct 20--Return of Pacific veterans to the U.S. reaches a new peak Friday when 22,800 are scheduled to land at San Francisco aboard nineteen ships. About 5000 arrived Thursday.

The Army announced that seven hospital ships have been assigned to carry patients from hospitals in the Pacific to San Francisco.

### PRIVATE POSING AS MAJOR MARRIES ARMY NURSE--CAUGHT ON HONEYMOON

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct 20--Private William Barrs is in trouble for posing as a much-decorated major and cashing almost a thousand dollars in worthless checks. On his spree he married an Army nurse and they were honeymooning when caught. Barrs said he thought he was Major Robert Grieg of Pensacola, Florida, because he found the major's dog tags in his pocket after being wounded on Luzon in July. He is under observation at Letterman General Hospital's psycho ward.

### SAYS LEYTE WAS TURNING POINT!

TOKYO, Oct 20--Lt Gen Barney Giles, U.S. Strategic Air Forces Commander, said that the Leyte campaign was the war's turning point and that the Air Forces had contributed most to the Jap defeat.

### WISCONSIN BADGERS MEET

One of the first and largest ASTP groups to join the 96th Division, those from the University of Wisconsin, held their reunion Thursday evening at Fatigue Junction. Over a hundred of the original Badgers who stepped off the 18-car train at Camp White were at the Junction to recall, among other things, the daily reminders they received while at Madison of what would happen to those who failed to pass in all subjects. They grinned about this, as they polished their Combat Infantry Badges and compared battle experiences.

The Wisconsin unit entered the 96th when to veteran Deadeyes at that time "ASTPs" were just another bunch of letters like "OPA" and "DDT". But before long they and about 1500 other ex-students were split up and distributed throughout the Division, wherever shortages existed. The training that followed in the next four months, and the rapid shipment overseas and into combat permitted little visiting among the men, many of whom had been in school together for as much as nine months. Thus, the reunions that are being held almost every week are often the scenes of meetings of former roommates for the first time in twenty months.

### RESERVE OFFICERS UP ONE GRADE

WASHINGTON, Oct 20--War Department announced that reserve officers who have not been promoted in two years while on active duty will be upped one grade when they go on terminal leave. The condition is that the officers must have an efficiency rating of 35 or better. If officers apply for organized reserve commissions will be recalled at the new rank in case of emergency.

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## LIBERTY SHIPS OK'D FOR TROOPS

### ONE YEAR AGO TODAY

Exactly fifty-two weeks ago today the Philippine waters were being churned up into white foam by angry antics, the Leyte Gulf was crowded with 600 ships of all types, the skies were crowded with American aircraft--and at 1000 hours, the 96th Division, "Battle Virgins", swarmed ashore on the beaches of Leyte. The initial campaign to liberate the Philippines was on.

Together with the 7th and 24th Infantry divisions and 1st Cavalry, the 96th swept inland into Leyte. Soon strange names as Dagaui, Tabontabon, Catmon Hill, and Burauen were to be etched into men's minds forever. When the end came, a new fighting division, baptized in blood and fire, stood powerfully in the Pacific. It was the latest Jap-killing outfit, and went on to make history in the last great battle of World War II on Okinawa.

Today--A plus 365--the job, well done and victory behind them, the men are beginning that best trip of all--the voyage home.

### EACH COULD CARRY 750 TO STATES

MANILA, Oct 20 (PACIFICAN)--Liberty ships capable of carrying 750 men to the States "in comparatively good living conditions" can be readied within 48 hours, according to Lt Col C.H. Davidson, superintendent of the Water Division, Port of Manila.

Colonel Davidson, in reply to a query as to the practicability of using Liberty ships for transporting troops, said yesterday that it had been done before successfully and could be done again.

"If the ships can be allocated," he said, "I can have each one ready to carry 750 troops back to the States in comparatively good living conditions within 48 hours --if I have 50 men to work on each of them."

"These are the facts," said the colonel, who was responsible for moving the 1st Cavalry and the 24th, 32nd and 41st Infantry divisions out of Brisbane under similar conditions. "And they are indisputable."

The only feature of actual discomfort for troops would be the complete lack of bunks. "Cots would present a fire hazard," said Col Davidson. In addition to this factor, said the colonel, there would be no way of securing them.

(UP)--General Joseph W. Stilwell, commander of the United States 10th Army, advocates the strongest possible measure against any "barfly commandos" who molest Japanese-American soldiers.

"The Nisei bought an awful big hunk of America with their blood," Stilwell said in an interview on Okinawa with Sgt Fred Friendly.

"You're damn right these Nisei boys have a place in the American heart, now and forever," Stilwell said. "And I say we soldiers ought to form a pickaxe club to protect Jap-Americans who fought the war with us."

## TEXAS BOMBSHELL BEATS MANSLAUGHTER RAPI!

BRIDGEPORT, CONN., Oct 20--Imogene Stevens, 38 year-old Texas bombshell who was the central figure in the sensational shooting of a 19 year-old sailor last June, has been freed of manslaughter charges.

The prosecutor told the judge that all the evidence tended to support her contention that she shot Albert Kobacs in self-defense during a scuffle with the sailor and his brother, who had called on the maid at the next-door neighbors.

## VIOLENCE IN VENEZUELA

CARACAS, Oct 20--Rebellious army leaders have overthrown the Venezuelan government and seized President Medina. The government, according to dispatches from here, toppled after a night and day of sporadic fighting.

The rebels have seized control of all Caracas and the important military center of Maracay, 30 miles east of the capital.

United Press says President Medina surrendered to the insurgents yesterday afternoon. The rebels were led by a group of young army officers who apparently were disgruntled at the two presidential candidates in the forthcoming elections.

## NAVY VOLUNTEERS TO MAN POSTWAR FLEET

WASHINGTON, Oct 20--Vice Admiral Denfeld, the Navy's personnel chief, told the Senate Military Affairs Committee Thursday that the Navy is getting enough volunteer enlistments to completely man the peacetime fleet.

He said 16,000 men are volunteering for the Navy each month and with the 23,000 regulars now on duty there may be enough for the 500,000 man fleet contemplated by next September 1.

The admiral said Navy discharges are now running 11,000 daily, with all inductees and reserves due for release by next September.

## "KILL PRISONERS" ORDERED JAPS

SHANGHAI, Oct 20--Reporters here have discovered the remains of 14 American fliers executed by Japs on Formosa last June after a perfunctory military trial. Small, white tags attached to a row of plain wooden boxes containing the ashes of the airmen revealed the Americans had been shot at the time when Japan was suing for peace.

In Tokyo, Allied headquarters have possession of written Jap army and navy orders which ordered that Allied prisoners of war be killed on the slightest provocation.

One order read: "Should any doubt arise in the connection with the treatment of prisoners, those displaying hostile feelings should be disposed of vigorously and without mercy."

## NUERNBERG TRIALS TO BEGIN NOV 20

BERLIN, Oct 20--The world's first great war criminal trial will begin in Nuernberg on November 20, it was announced today by the international military tribunal in Germany.

Massive indictments have been served on 23 of the 24 defendants. The twenty-fourth defendant is Martin Bormann, Hitler's deputy, who is still at large or possibly dead. The November date will give the Nazi leaders about 30 days to prepare their cases.

The reaction of Hitler's henchmen when they received the 24,000 word indictment ranged from calm indifference to tears.

The tears came from Walther Funk, former Nazi Economic Minister, who according to press dispatches, cried like a baby. Said Funk--through his tears--"I would like some officer appointed by the court in order to discuss my defense. I can request counsel at once can't I?"

Most of the defendants inquired about getting lawyers to defend them and were given a list of available lawyers. However, they have their own choice of counsel.

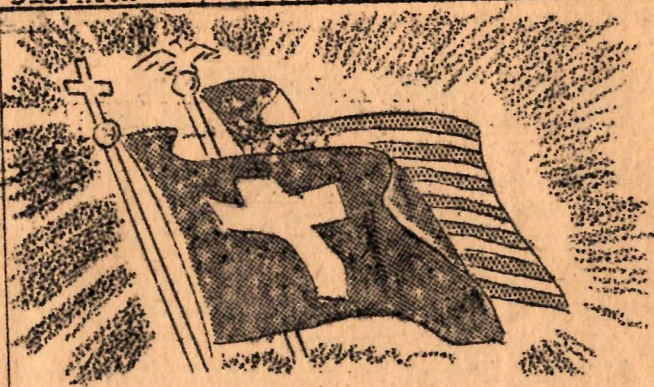

(ANS)--The Miss America beauty contest has had its difficulties from time to time, but never before anything like Alois Knapp. There have been disgruntled contestants, bad weather upsets and protests of immodesty--but never never a complaint the girls were wearing too much!

Knapp is president of the American Sunbathing Association, Inc., a national nudist society. He thinks the Miss America contestants shouldn't wear bathing suits or anything else. On the eve of the 1945 contest in Atlantic City, N.J., Knapp sent this telegram to the directors:

"Miss America," he said, "will be the girl who comes closest to matching certain dimensions and weight. But there's a lot more to women than that."

"That's why contests in which women wear nothing are the answer. Who would enter a dog or a horse in a show and wrap burlap around it? What artist would exhibit his work with drapes around it?"

In 10 years, the sun-lover predicted, bathing suits will be out for good.

"Let's hope we shall soon get rid of the monstrosity as one of the vestiges of barbarism" he said. "Let's send our bathing suits to the museum for the entertainment and wonderment of posterity."

As for the present, things are looking better all the time for nudism, he remarked.

"The shorter the bathing suits get, the briefer the curiosity about what they're hiding."

"When women stop wearing bathing suits, men won't be interested in them at all! Oh!

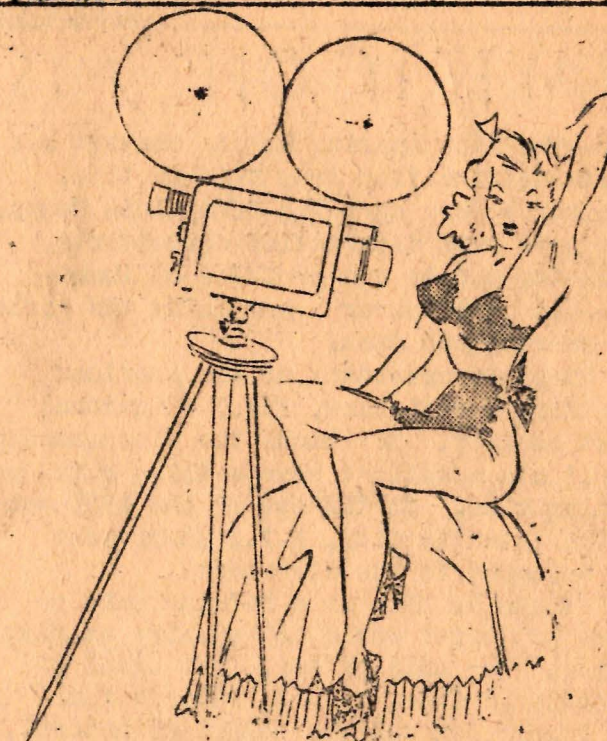

### MAC FOR MERGER

WASHINGTON, Nov 3--The Senate Military Committee today made public the testimony showing that General MacArthur favors consolidating the Army, Navy and Air Forces into a single fighting agency with one uniform.

Gen MacArthur is quoted as saying, "The experiences of this war have completely and absolutely convinced me that there should be a complete amalgamation of the various fighting forces." He added, "I believe that they should wear the same uniform; I believe there should be one family instead of three."

On Capitol Hill it was Army against Navy a whole month before the Army-Navy football game. The two Services are skirmishing before the Senate Military Committee in a spirited contest. The Navy supporters are fighting the merger proposal as though defending the goal line.

Two Admirals, Nimitz and Halsey reversed their previous stand and are now against the merger. One year ago both had testified favorably for the merger. This testimony, along with that of General MacArthur and other war chiefs, was given before a special committee of generals and admirals a year ago.

The bobby-soxers of Froebel high-school in Gary were enthralled at Frankie's crooning, but were cold to his plea to call off their race-prejudice strike. The Class rooms were nearly empty of white students again today.

The "voice" went to Gary yesterday to ask students to call off the strike in protest of what they described as bi-racial policies of principal. A seventeen-year old spokesman for the strikers said the situation had not changed a bit as a result of the crooner's pleas. The strike began on Oct 26th.

### LOS ANGELES STUDENTS STRIKE IN PROTEST AGAINST GERALD K. SMITH

Los Angeles, Nov 3--Five-hundred shouting students put on a mass demonstration protesting the Board of Education's permission to let Gerald K. Smith, former American First Leader, to speak in the school auditorium. The students, mostly from Polytechnic Highschool, left classes and marched in front of the Chamber of Commerce building. Smith held a previous meeting in the school last month, and at that meeting ten thousand pickets marched outside the building.

Nov 3--A semi-official dispatch from Tientsin in China claims that Russian troops will begin a large scale withdrawal from Manchuria on Friday and will be out of that country by the first of December. The dispatch also adds that massed forces of Chinese Communist troops are directly in the path that Chinese Troops would take to relieve the Russians.

TROUBLE STILL BREWING IN EAST INDIES

Nov 3--The Netherlands Government in the Hague officially took comments of reports that Lieut Governor Van Mook was negotiating with Dr. Soekarno, leader of the Indonesian nationalists. They don't like the idea. They said that if Van Mook actually is negotiating with Soekarno, then "he is doing so against the expressed wish and instructions of the government. In the meantime bullets were flying as British RAF planes began strafing extremist Indonesian forces in central and western Java.

SUPERFORTS COMPLETE NONSTOP FLIGHT FROM JAPAN TO WASHINGTON

Washington, Nov 3--Four super-fortresses have just completed the first nonstop flight from Japan to Washington. The first of the four planes landed at the National Airport, in the nation's capital, at 7:38 PM, Thursday, Eastern Standard Time, after taking off from Mizutani Field on Hokkaido in Japan, at 4:09 PM, Eastern Standard Time on Wednesday. The unofficial time for the sixty-five hundred mile flight was twenty-seven hours and twenty-nine minutes.
