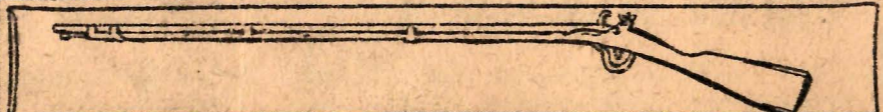
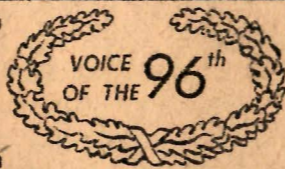

## PASSEAU HURLS ONE-HITTER

### NAVY SEIZES REFINERIES AS OIL SHORTAGE THREATENS TO DELAY DEMOBILIZATION

WASHINGTON, Oct 6--President Truman Thursday night ordered the Navy to take over and operate plants of twenty-six oil producing and refining companies after attempts at arbitration of wage demands by CIO oil workers union collapsed. In a statement Mr Truman said it was necessary to act to maintain adequate oil reserves for the needs of the armed forces, which are now engaged in the gigantic process of demobilization.

The President said some fifty refineries and related transportation and distribution facilities had been shut down. The seizure order left the next move up to the unions to whether officials would order the men back on the job. O.A. Knight, president of the union, said he would call the executive committee into session to decide as soon as the order left the White House. Slowing the pace of the country's reconversion program, now and continuing strikes gnarled traffic along the nation's broad labor front, with over a half million workers away from their jobs. Telephone operators will go off the job today in a four-hour demonstration which will cut off all communications except through dial systems. It will not, however, interfere with the broadcast of the world series baseball game.

### CUBS WIN THIRD GAME OF SERIES 3-0; ONLY 28 TIGERS FACE BRUIN HURLER

Oct 6--Facing but one more man than the regular twenty-seven and giving only one single, thirty-six year old Claude Passeau today hurled the Chicago Cubs to their second win of the 1945 World Series before another full house at Briggs Stadium. The shutout score was 3-0.

Never in any serious trouble, Passeau held the Bengals in check while his teammates scored three runs off two Tiger pitchers. In the first half of the fourth inning the Cubs touched up Overmire, starting Tiger hurler, for two runs as Lowry doubled off the left field screen, moved to third on Cavarretta's sacrifice and scored on Nicholson's bloop single. Pafko had previously walked, moved to second and scored on Hughes' single. The final run came off relief hurler Benton when Livingston doubled in the seventh, moved to third on Hughes' sacrifice and tagged up after Passeau flied out.

JAP DORY ENGAGES TRANSPORT

GULM, Oct 5--Three Japanese were killed and their motor dory sunk by gunfire yesterday in an engagement with the transport "Thurston" half way between New Guinea and the Caroline Islands.

The Navy reported the "Thurston" sighted a seemingly abandoned boat and sent a motor boat to investigate. Two Japanese attacked the American boarding party with hand grenades while a third boarded the investigating craft and forced the crew into the water.

The "Thurston" launched another motor boat and sank the Japanese craft. All the Americans were recovered without casualties.

JAP DESERTERS JOINING CHINESE COMMUNISTS

PEIPING, Oct 5--Japanese deserters are reportedly joining Chinese communists of the 80th Route Army in increasing numbers.

Gen. Takahashi, acting commander of the Japanese troops at Peiping, urged speedy demobilization of Japanese troops and warned he couldn't be responsible if it were delayed long. Takahashi said deserters are increasing daily and the morale of his men is very low.

Reportedly poorly armed 80th Route Army units are crossing north China to Manchuria and returning well armed and in greater numbers than before crossing. Crux of the issue is whether the 80th Route Army will accept the agreement to dissolve as an independent army and become integrated into the Chinese Nationalists' forces.

GLOBESTER CIRCLES WORLD

WASHINGTON, Oct 5--Inaugurating the first regular around the world passenger service by air, the Globester landed in Washington, D.C. yesterday at 9:40 Eastern Standard Time. The record making global flight was made in 6 days, 5 hours, 43 minutes.

ONCE OVER LIGHTLY

Oct 5--President Truman yesterday signed an executive order abolishing the War Production Board and replacing it with a civilian production administration. The change will be effective November.... The President's plans for the ironclad domestic control of atomic energy appeared to be bound today for early Congressional approval. Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky listed it as very high priority legislation.

\$5,300,000,000 tax reductions for individuals and corporations in 1946 were approved yesterday by the House Ways and Means Committee. The bill will remove 12,000,000 persons from the income tax rolls.... V.V.'s 1946 national encampment closed yesterday at Chicago. Joseph Stack of Pittsburgh was elected national commander. The delegates approved compulsory peacetime military training and amendments to improve the G.I. Bill of Rights.

Annamese Nationalists agreed to return the body of Licut Col Peter Dowdy of the U.S. who was shot to death in the recent disorders in Saigon, Indo-China and to release all French citizens taken as hostages.... Official surrender of Japanese troops in north China is tentatively scheduled for today at Tientsin.... Gen MacArthur yesterday ordered the Japanese government to release all political prisoners by Oct 10 and also ordered abolishment of the notorious thought-control law and police.... Army olympic games will be held in Manila Dec 21 through 31 to keep servicemen in the Pacific pepped up during the Christmas period.

In Paris yesterday Pierre Laval, premier of Vichy France, was ejected screaming from the opening session of his trial for treason after he charged he was being railroaded.... A London story says America's proposal for a general Allied peace conference gained support in diplomatic quarters last night. But one barrier remained--Russia's insistence that France and China be excluded from the basic peace drafting.

## NEVER GIVE A RAT AN EVEN BREAK

At present the slow, tedious process of cleansing the world of its poisonous life-sucking rats is under way. The traitors of the free peoples are being put away--in one way or the other.

In Europe the trials have begun, and it is now the turn of the once oppressed and beaten to judge and shake free the vile creatures from their countries. Norway has tried and condemned its quisling, Czechoslovakia is moving swiftly and trying its war criminals. France, Belgium and the other nations are balancing the scales of justice and those who let the German war machine roll into their countries are being put to death or sentenced to prison.

In Germany, itself, the American Army has cracked down and is now de-Nazifying its area, and the British dragnet has caught its rats, too. We can rest assured that the Russians are cleaning out their zone of occupation.

In Japan it is a slower and more complex affair to weed out the many war criminals--but the process is under way. Every day new horrors are brought to light of Japanese cruelty, treachery and vileness. Those boasts who put our own soldiers through the most brutal of tortures will get the easy way out--death by a firing squad or the gallows.

It is not in our nature to torture, pillage or burn, but we should definitely not grow soft. Allied justice must be meted out and since we cannot in the strict sense of the word "get even," we must see to it that it can never happen again. The American has the tendency to feel sorry, grow soft and forgive--this must not happen. The British, Australians, Chinese and Russians have not extended any glad hands but have treated the defeated Jap all over as something inferior and not to be trusted. The war had come to their door-steps--they know the score. And we who fought the battles know the score. But what of the people in the States and yes, what of us when we become civilians--will we forget and grow lax and think of those two oceans on either side of our nation? Those bodies of water are nothing but a quick hop, skip and jump for the modern space-devouring ships of the coming air age.

Since we must keep a strong foot on the neck of the war-mongers, let us forever keep it firm and strong. Always remember that the Nazi and the Jap would like a chance at revenge, and all the rats are hard to exterminate. There will always be some loose.
