21 BANKS SEIZED BY MacARTHUR !

TOKYO. Oct 1 -- General MacArthur today ordered United States Army troops to seize and close all banks which financed Japanese war production and acted as the economic spearhead of Japanese imperialism. Twenty-one banks were affected by the order. An Allied spokesman says the Japanese imperial family, the government, and eight great money families are suspected of laying the groundwork of all Japanese expansion through the banking institutions.

Colonel Kramer of MacArthur's economic and scientific section said the Allios expect to uncover a story of financial manipulations almost unparalleled in world history. The financiers would spearhead every Japanese expansion move. They would move into territory, completely entangle local magnates through favors, then force their oid and the expansion. 10,000 PACIFIC VETS LEAVE JAPAN FOR U.S.

YOKOHAMA. Oct 1 -- First clearance of soldiers homoward bound from Japan has begun with three transports carrying high point men from the 43rd Infantry, 1st Cavalry, and Americal Divisions leaving Yokohama Saturday for San Francisco. There are 9797 troops aboard the three ships, and they are scheduled to arrive in nine to twelve days. Over 5000 of the vets are being carried by the USS General John Pope, the fastest of the trio. (The USS Pope will be remembered as the troopship which carried the 381st Infantry Regiment and much Special Troops from San Francisco to Honolulu in July, 1944.)

GERMAN JEWS STILL IN PRISONS

WASHINGTON, Oct 1 -- The White House made a lengthy report which describes how displaced persons in Germany, particularly Jews, are still living in concentration camps, Allied commission in the Pacific According to the report they are being treated much as the Nazis treated them, except that the Americans don't exterminate them. President Truman has ordered Gen Eisenhower to clean up the situation and report to him as soon as possible. Eisenhower was told that policies on displaced persons adopted at Yalta and Potsdem were not being carried out by his subordinate officers.
