

ATTLEE HAILS U.S.

HOME BY JUNE

Rear Admiral W.M. Callaghan testified today that every possible ship is now in service to bring veterans home. The admiral predicted that everybody eligible to return would be back in the States by next June, but conceded that some high-point men, both in the Army and Navy, had been and would be delayed by the present schedule of shipping.

RIOT IN OAHU

HONOLULU, NOV 14. The United Press reported a riot lasting several hours between hundreds of sailors from Honolulu Naval Air Station and residents of the adjacent Danion residential district. The riot began about ten o'clock last night, and was not broken up by Honolulu police and Shore Patrols until almost one o'clock this morning. UP said the sailors charged they had been frequently way-laid, robbed and beaten by residents of that area.

PEACE DRAFT HEARINGS

Congressmen evidently are not sidestepping issues. The House Military Committee today defeated an attempt to postpone consideration of legislation for universal peace-time military training. Representative Short (R-Mo) attempted to have the hearing put off until January, but the committee rejected the motion by a 15 to 12 vote. It will resume hearings Thursday with General Eisenhower as a witness.

SOEKARNO OUSTED

The Javanese picture brightened considerably today as Sutan Sjahrira, described as a political moderate, became the leader of the Indonesian Nationalist movement. Dr. Soekarno, former president of the "Republic," has been dropped to a minor role. It is said the Dutch are likely to deal with the new leader although they had refused to discuss matters with Soekarno.

Meanwhile British-Indian troops still were fighting with Indonesian extremists for possession of the Soerabaja naval base.

WASHINGTON, NOV 13...An aura of good feeling pervaded the House of Representatives today as visiting Prime Minister Attlee addressed a joint session of Congress. Mr. Attlee was applauded vigorously as he said there is ample room for British and American trade without "any

undue rivalry between us." The leader of Britain's new government mentioned only briefly of the atomic bomb, the announced subject of his conference in Washington with President Truman.

Attlee said, "There is ample room in the world for products of great industrial nations like our own to raise the general levels throughout the world. We like to believe in an expansive economy and can see no reason why, the need being so great, there should be any undue rivalry between us."

Attlee devoted the major portion of his speech to arguments for increasing cooperation and friendship between England and United States. He also told Congress the foundations of peace must be world prosperity and good neighborliness. He declared that civilization can survive the atom only if all nations accept the Christian principle of the brotherhood of man.

The Prime Minister hailed the United States as the mightiest power on earth adding, "and yet, America is a threat to no one. We all know that she will never use her power for selfish aims or territorial aggrandizement in the future any more than she has done in the past."

Shen Hai Kwan from the Chinese Communists forces. This strategic railtown is the costal anchor of the Great Wall, and has been the objective of the Kuomintang troops seeking entry into Manchuria.

There were increased reports that Soviet troops had begun their withdrawal from Manchuria, but as yet, there has been no confirmation from Moscow or Chungking.

G.I. WIVES TO JAPAN?

YOKAHAMA, NOV 14...Lt. Gen. Robert Eichelburger said today that American authorities are studying the question of allowing wives to join service men in Japan. "I feel certain that a bit later, if there are proper accomodations, some fair solution may be arrived at," he said.

6TH ARMY TO BE DEACTIVATED

TOKYO, NOV 13...It was disclosed that the U.S. 6th Army, first in the Pacific and originally scheduled to lead the invasion of Japan, will be deactivated in January. More than 15,000 officers and enlisted men of the 6th Army have already embarked for the U.S. They began leaving Japan on October 26th. Low point men will be absorbed by the 8th Army.

Eighth Army Headquarters estimated today that all 70 point veterans and nearly all 60 pointers of the 8th Army in Japan will be enroute home by December 1st.

U.S. POLICY

WASHINGTON, (AP)..The United States Wednesday unveiled a program for decreasing Turkish authority over the Dardanelles and giving the United Nations a voice in its military use.

The program would result in greater rights for Russia in the use of the vital straits between the Mediterranean and the Black Sea, but would not give Russia all she wants. Particularly, it withholds the American approval from a Russian proposal for a Soviet military base on the Straits.

The disclosure came from Secretary of State Byrnes on the very day on which Russia's long-standing treaty of friendship and non-aggression when Turkey expired after being denounced several months ago.

Byrnes said that the United States is willing to become a member of the international combine controlling the Straits.

LITTLE THEATER
