

# DEMOBILIZATION "ORDERLY"

## NO VACATION FOR CONGRESS

### PRESIDENT'S "MUST" BILLS WAITING

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--House and Senate leaders told Congress today that it will have to keep its collective nose to the grindstone until it finishes action on President Truman's "must" legislation, even if it takes until Christmas.

The congressional leaders passed on this message today after a conference with the President at the White House. Congress had hoped to recess from Thanksgiving until the end of the year.

Senate majority leader Barkley described as "must" legislation the pending bills on full employment, government reorganization, UNRRA funds, appropriations cutbacks, a deficiency appropriation bill, the second war powers act, a proposal to unify the armed forces, and President Truman's request for a universal peacetime military training program.

### AGF COMMANDER WOULD SERVE UNDER NAVAL OFF.

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Chief of Army Ground Forces Gen Devers testified before the Senate Military Committee today on the proposed merger of the armed forces. He said he favored the plan and would be perfectly willing to serve under a naval officer, if it was desired.

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Senator Wheeler of Montana touched off criticism of the Army and Navy demobilization program in the Senate today with a suggestion that Congress should take some action to speed this up. Half a dozen senators joined Wheeler.

Earlier Major General Willard Paul, Army Chief of Personnel, had told the Senate Naval Affairs Committee that demobilization is going ahead in an "orderly fashion".

He said the biggest help Congress could give would be to refrain from pressure to speed the discharge of individuals or groups!

### 4000 AAF TWO-YEAR TRAINEES OUT

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--The Army Air Force announced today that it will discharge about 4000 Air Force trainees who have had two years of Army service and are no longer needed. The order classes as surplus and eligible for discharge all trainees who volunteered from

EM status and who have completed two years service between Sept 16, 1940, and Nov 9, 1945, and who have not volunteered to remain in service.

The present discharge score for all Air Force enlisted personnel is fifty points.



## ATLEE ADDRESSES CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Congress yesterday heard Prime Minister Attlee urge that the United States and Great Britain take the lead to found a peace based on world prosperity and friendship. Attlee told the joint session which heard him that all nations must cooperate to end the folly of war in an age where death dealing weapons know no frontiers of defense. He said that peace is especially essential in the terrible light of the atomic bomb.

The reaction of Congress, generally, was favorable to Attlee's plea for Anglo-American unity.

### ARTIFICIAL LIMB MANUFACTURERS INDICTED

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Attorney General Clark announced the indictment of 45 corporations, 34 individuals and a trade association on charges of conspiring to fix non-competitive prices for artificial limbs used by amputee cases.

The Justice Department announcement said the indictment charges anti-trust violations in the manufacture, assembly, distribution, and sale of artificial limbs in the U.S. Clark said the conspiracy deprived the Veterans Administration of the opportunity to make limbs for war veterans. He also charged it prevented various charitable institutions from making limbs for amputees free of charge and that it also impeded and discouraged the development and improvement of the utility and comfort of artificial limbs.

### AUTO DEALERS STORM AT OPA PLAN

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Auto dealers are protesting vigorously the OPA's proposal of having them absorb part or all of the price increases granted automobile manufacturers. Congress has opened fire on the plan by charging the plan is unfair to the car dealers.

## 11500 TROOPS HIT WEST COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov 15--Yesterday 11,500 troops sailed into five West Coast ports, from the Pacific. A total of 21 ships carried the servicemen.

On the nation's other coast, 7600 troops debarked from 10 transports at three East Coast ports.

### JAVA IN FULL SCALE WAR

BATAVIA, Nov 15--British warships, planes, and artillery blasted the pier of Soerabaja today in an effort to drive out the Indonesian Nationalists making a determined stand in the east Java naval base. It is the heaviest battle in Java since the Japs overran the island in '42.

The Indonesians have bounced back with unexpected strength and ferocity just when the British thought victory was near.

### "...A DEATH SENTENCE TO EUROPEAN JEWS"

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Cries of dismay from Capital Hill and a delegation of 1000 rabbis greeted President Truman's announcement that he has accepted a British proposal to create an Anglo-American committee to investigate the entire Jewish problem in Palestine. He said the new committee will revue problems presented by Palestine Arabs and Jews.

One rabbi said: "It is a death sentence to European Jews. This announcement will cause bloodshed in Palestine."

In the Holy Land, a Jewish national council has called a general strike in protest to the new British proposals for settlement of the Palestine question.

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Yesterday the labor-management conference averted a showdown on the CIO demands for endorsement of President Truman's wage price policy. Management delegates announced they would not be prepared until today to discuss the matter.



## BUICK PRODUCTION HALTS

DETROIT, Nov 15--Buick auto production has halted, but the CIO United Auto Workers have disputed General Motors statement that a work stoppage was caused by their organization. In a prepared statement, General Motors had said that a two-week work stoppage by UAW at the Midland Steel Company in Cleveland, Ohio, caused the halt in Buick output by cutting off the supply of chassis frames.

The United Auto Workers said in Cleveland that there was no strike at Midland Steel. The Union statement added that the company had discharged 200 workers because it didn't like the amount of production. Midland Steel had no comment.

## NO AGREEMENT ON CONTROL OF JAPAN

WASHINGTON, Nov 15--Secretary of State Byrnes said today that the U.S. and Russia have reached no agreement over the Soviet demands for the establishment of an Allied control council for Japan. He said that Russia wants a council similar to the one operating in Berlin in which all members have an equal voice. In such a council an objection by any one member can block an action. Byrnes said the U.S. wanted a council in which Gen MacArthur would have the deciding voice.

Byrnes, in discussing the Far Eastern policy, said the Chinese government troops to be flown into Manchuria would be transported in planes lend-leased to China and manned by Chinese crews. He also told newsmen that the U.S. and Russia have not discussed the civil strife in China. Byrnes added that the Chinese situation is a matter of great regret to Russian officials and they hope for some settlement.

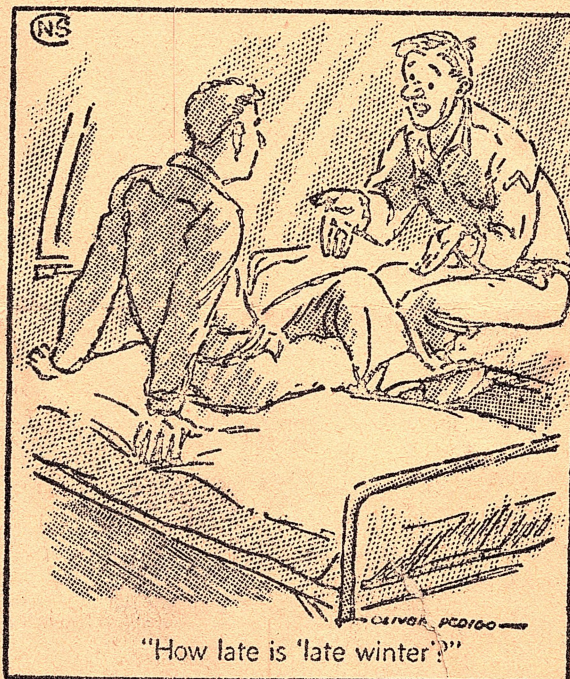
## The Book Shelf

(CNS) Among all the novels of soldiering, none has roused more lively interest than The Brick Foxhole, by Richard Brooks. Here a mild draftsman-soldier, bored by being held in a barracks in America, has a two-days' leave diversified by murder, prostitution, jealousy and fear. It is a rapid chronicle, made remarkable by the portraits of a sadist sergeant, an agreeable pansy, a wise police captain and the too-intellectual son of a department store owner, who fights because he is afraid of being afraid of fighting. An excellent story, and recommended, but one that has little to do with war.

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## WE TALK TOUGH, BUT WE ACT SOFT

(CNS)--Nearly six months have passed since Germany surrendered and hostilities ceased. It is still too early to say whether our occupation policy must be entered on the debit or credit side of history's ledger, but that it is not going according to plan is readily apparent.

The chief weakness of our occupation is that our actions so seldom conform to our avowed policy. And when it comes to a showdown, the Germans have learned that they can usually twist us around their fingers. We are very gullible and very pliable and the Germans know how to make the most of our weaknesses.

In a myriad of big and little ways we have lost face with the Germans. Six months ago they were ready to abdicate their self-appointed position as the master race to us as their superiors. But little by little we have lost the respect to which we are entitled.

It isn't too late yet to correct and overcome the errors we have made in Germany but time is running out. Soon it will be too late, and that time will come when the frustrations of our declared policy here disgust the taxpayers at home and they insist on getting out to let Europe "stew in its own juice."

Most military government officials, like most GIs, want above everything else to go home. They have little interest in their jobs from the long-term view, and consequently their approach is negative.

The Germans have taken to elbowing us off the sidewalks. In hotels where they are employed in menial capacities they have adopted a superior attitude toward their GI bosses, and generally they have begun to direct from the bottom up the American occupation of their country.

### IN RUSSIA EVEN SPORTS ARE ORGANIZED

(CNS)--The announced intention of the Soviets to "import" American-style baseball is not as unlikely as it seems. Soviet Russia is one of the most sports-minded nations in the world, and if any people besides Americans take to the thrill of a double play or a home run it will probably be the Russians.

Eighty-seven trade union benevolent sporting clubs form the central core of the Soviet's sports and physical culture organization. According to official records there are 50,000 "cells" or branches of these clubs in plants or offices throughout Russia which follow directives from a central headquarters established in Moscow. Sports and physical culture are a state function in Russia whose purpose is not to seek records but the harmonious physical development of the citizenry..

"NUTS!"

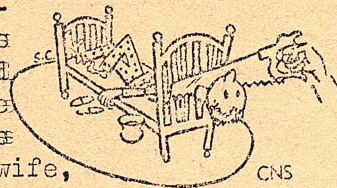

## INDIANA 4TH IN NATION

New York, Nov 15--The Indiana Hoosiers moved into the fourth slot in the nation's grid standing this week. Last Saturday, the Hoosiers had trounced Minnesota 49-0 to keep their undefeated record. They have won seven and tied one.

Still dominating the football picture is the powerful Army team in first place, with Navy moving back into the second position. Michigan and Columbia were both toppled from the elite circle. Alabama is the third ranking team in the nation, with the Hoosiers fourth. St. Mary's is in fifth place, with Penn in the sixth slot. Notre Dame is seventh, Oklahoma A&M is eighth, Ohio State is ninth, and Holy Cross has moved into the big ten by bringing up the rear.

Purdue heads the bottom ten, with Penn State twelfth, Virginia in the number 13 position and Michigan and Oklahoma both tied for fourteenth. Mississippi State is 16th, Texas is 17th, Tenn is 18th, Tulsa is 19th and Duke is 20th. The surprise is not having Columbia rated at all, especially with other schools with one defeat, too, in the top twenty.

Individual scoring leaders in the pigskin parade are Walt Trojanowski of Connecticut with 18 touchdowns for 108 points. Bill Greens in the South for Catawba has 12 touchdowns for 72 points. In the West, it's Terry Regan with 12 touchdowns for 72 points. In the Midwest, Ed Cody of Purdue and Jim Boswell of Oberlin each with 11 touchdowns for 66 points. Bob Goode leads in the Southwest having scored 60 points for Texas A&M. In the Missouri Valley, it's the Oklahoma Aggies' Bob Fenimore and Wichita's Linwood Sexton with 9 touchdowns for 54 points for each. The Big Six leader is Jack Venable of Oklahoma with 8 touchdowns for 48 points. In the Rockies, it's Elmo Carmar of Colorado St. with 6 touchdowns for 44 points and in the Southeastern it's ISU's Gene Knight with 6 touchdowns and as many conversions for 42 points. Bill Lippincott of Wash St. has six touchdowns for 36 points.
