1983 Reunion Set For August 25-27

If you have never attended a 45th Infantry Division Association reunion, this will be a great year to participate.

If you have attended reunions in the past, you already know the enjoyment of being together again with your former comrades in arms of World War II, Korea, or periods in between.

The reunion officially begins Friday morning, August 26, but the fun and fellowship starts by noon Thursday, and continues until the last person has left the Hilton Inn West in Oklahoma City Sunday.

At least one "command post" for guests will be open by Thursday noon, and unofficial parties and mini-reunions will be going on all over the Hilton Thursday night.

Registration gets underway early Friday morning, and will continue throughout the day. CP's will be open. Each major unit of the division will be represented with its own CP. However, all Thunderbirds are welcome at any command post they choose.

As usual, there will be a large registration bulletin board, where visitors may place their names and room numbers below the unit(s) they belonged to. There will also be exhibits, photos and artwork available for viewing in the registration area.

Buses will be available for tours to the 45th Infantry Division Musuem, and to Enterprise Square, a recently opened \$15 million educational and entertainment center designed to interpret the American economic system while visitors are having fun. Special discount tickets to Enterprise Square will be available at the desk for all Thunderbirds and their guests.

Friday night brings an outdoor reception in the pool area, followed by a delicious buffet dinner in the large dining room. Following the dinner, there will be dancing to live

County Military History Display Strong on 45th

A ten wing multiplex display board portraying the military history of Lincoln County has been placed in the Lincoln County Museum in Chandler, Oklahoma, and dedicated before a large group of spectators.

On hand for the dedication were many from out of state, including one four-star Marine general, formerly of Chandler.

The permanent display was developed by John Embry, of Oklahoma City, formerly of Chandler, and a prominent artilleryman of the 45th Infantry Division. Colonel Embry also serves as vice chairman of the 45th Infantry Division Museum.

The exhibit covers Chandler's military history from the time of the

settlement of Civil War veterans in the former Sac and Fox Indian tribal area to the present time. It includes the history of Lincoln County residents in the Spanish American War, on the Mexican border in 1916, and in World War I, World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. Chandler has produced an extraordinary number of key 45th Division leaders.

The four star general present for the event was Gen. Vernon E. Megee, a Marine veteran in the Pacific Theater of Operations, who headed all marine pilots at the time of his retirement.

General Megee, along with James Embry, brother of John Embry, helped to finance the exhibit.


Saturday morning's activity will open with a memorial service honoring departed Thunderbirds, followed by the annual business meeting, which will also include reports and awards.

45th Museum Brings Exhibit to Capital

"Always Forward: The 45th Infantry Division in Combat" is the title of the special exhibit in the National Guard Heritage Gallery of the National Guard Association Headquarters Building in Washington, D.C.

The exhibit was prepared by the staff of the 45th Infantry Division Museum, and was placed in the Gallery July 14.

Dedication ceremonies and a reception for the new Thunderbird exhibit were held on the afternoon of July 18, with a delegation of members and veterans of the 45th Division and Oklahoma National Guard attending.

The exhibit will remain on display in the gallery throughout the remainder of 1983.

It will cover in panel boards and display cases the history of the 45th Division, beginning with the mobilization prior to World War II, and continuing through the Korean War.

There will be uniforms of both eras on display, along with some German uniforms and arm bands.

A special display featuring the Congressional Medal of Honor Winners of the 45th Infantry Division will be a part of the exhibit.

A number of the original Bill Mauldin cartoons will be on display in the gallery.

The total display will have three exhibit cases and seven panels.

New Exhibits are Installed Outdoors

A third row of concrete pads for large outside displays has been poured at the 45th Infantry Division Musuem . A total of seven pads has been added.

Among vehicles going on the new pads will be an army ambulance and a 2½ ton truck. Others are planned.

When completed, there will be a total of more than 40 outside displays at the museum.

New identifying signs are being made for all outdoor exhibits, and will be in place by the time of the reunion.


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Pennsylvania Group Will Be Organized
