





ANOTHER FIRST FOR THE 36TH

The 36th Division piled up a whole lot of "firsts" during WW11. First troops to set foot on Fortress Europa, etc.

On August 15, 1944, the T-Patchers hit the beach in Southern France.

On Sept. 16th, just 31 days after the invasion, the 36th liberated LUXEUIL, near the Moselle River

Pfc. ERNEST BIDDULPH (Elizabeth, N.J.) spied a mamselle named Germaine standing by a tree. The weather was threatening. Ernest offered her his field jacket. Before long he found himself quite wet walking her home. She invited him in to dry his clothes and meet her family.

The courtship lasted 3 days, and after the family consent on Sept. 20th, Ernest and Germaine said "I do".

Thus, a "Jersey-Texan" set a new worlds record for being the first American GI to wed in Southern France.



Co. B, 143rd Inf

Mexia, Texas was the location for the Co. B, 143rd Unit Reunion on July 3-4 at the Natl. Guard Armory. Total of 38 T-Patchers attended. Amil and Pauline Kohutek also attended.

Ray Purcell, Mexia was elected president; Arthur Wagle, V/P, and former Assn. President, Riley Tidwell, Secty/Tres.

Serving on the entertainment committee: James McClintic, Groesbeck, Texas; Zeb Sunday of Pasadena, James Rose and Calvin Prayton. Armand Jones, a former San Antonian who migrated to Fort Worth 20 years ago, runs the most popular Spaghetti Joint in town. Armand has probably made every reunion since 1946. He served with the 155th F.A. 4½ years, and is best known (and liked) for bringing several cases of fine Vino from his restaurant to all the reunions.

The success story behind Jones entrance in the food business is legend. He was an ace announcer on WBAP-TV when he and another coworker leased an old shack and started dishing it out. It caught on, and became a mecca for local bon viants and visting celebrities. The atmosphere he created in his ITALIAN INN was right out of Naples, Rome or Sorrento.

His popular spot in the exclusive area of west Fort Worth is like a visit to Italy. In fact Armand has made two return visits to Italy and re-traced the path of the 36th, as sort of a roavin' gourmet tour with lots of pasta and vino thrown in.

The walls of his private dining room are covered with authentic posters collected in Rome and Naples. And, a photo gallery of big and little shots cover the walls of his cocktail lounge (now an open saloon with the new Texas liquor laws). Many of these glossy prints include a flock of T-Patchers who have stopped in to "break bread" with Armand and sip a little vino.

Runnin' a bunch of restaurants doesn't leave him much spare time, but he does handle campaigns for guys like Ralph Yarbrough.

Ricoverio!

When the 36th first arrived in NAPLES, October 1943, there was a guy named AL RICOVERO with the 141st. All his buddies began to think he must be a real popular Italian-American. His name showed up on buildings all over Naples.

However it wasn't long until the T-Patchers found out that Ricovero meant "BOMB SHELTER".

This brought back memories of a 36th MP named BOATRIGHT, who was more frequently called "WRONG CANOE".



The village of St. Die, in southern France, re-named their main street "TEXAS AVENUE" in honor of the 36th Texas Division which liberated them from the Nazis. T-Patchers hit the beaches at St. Raphael Aug. 15, 1944.

The above sketch of the sign was released to Walter Humphrey, then Editor of the Temple Telegram, who in turn released it to all major newspapers in Texas, October 1944.


Remember The Alamo 141st Has Great History

THE SECOND "D" DAY

By Jacques Robichon

The assault on Southern France landing made by the U. S. VI Corps was made on 15 August; a French Corps followed the Americans. Together, they made the American Seventh Army commanded by Lt. General Alexander


M. Robichon points out that for at do not at this time know if any copies of this least the third time the Corps Order directed a direct attack on the most heavily fortified position. General Dahlquist, remembering the blundering of higher headquarters at the Rapido River and at Velletri where General Walker fooled everybody by his classical attack of encirclement, slipped the division through two small beaches and captured the fortified Red Beach - from the rear.

> Well established in the book is the grim fact that the Air Arm saturated the attack area with over 1,000 lbs. of explosive for each twenty square feet and the Navy guns fired 6000 guns point-blank into the German defense for two hours - they were unable to break the defense. reviewed by Col. Those un-sung heroes of combat, is a small group of arsenal artisans who keep the implements of war in repair. Alot of T-Patchers might have taken for granted that shootin' material came from never-never land.

But 8 officers, and 150 EM's comprised the total strength of our own 736th Ordnance, and a busy bunch they were.

JAMES C. GOSSETT, 605 South Elm, New Boston, Texas 75570 was kind enough to send us the chronological events of the 736th. Wish space would permit complete details. Here's one entry: 28 Nov. 44 – "Found time bomb with 500 lbs. TNT under Command Post building, still running."



R. NEWTON SNEDEN, Roaring Brook, Rockleigh, N.J. 07547 sends in this photo of himself and the shy little Italian girl, whose packets bulge with candy. Picture was made in Naples when Newt was on a pass from Combat Re-Conditioning Camp located at Lake Areno.

This was the place, says Sneden, where 36thers were sent after being discharged from the Hospital. Lt. Col. Simpson of the 3rd Bn., 142nd was there also at the same time.

Sneden joined the Division as a replacement, July 1944, assigned to Co. K, 142nd, was wounded at Remirement and sent back to Naples. Rejoined his outfit in March and saw war's end in Austria. We'll be looking for you in Houston, Newt.




During the "Bulge" here's another one: 21 Jan. 45 – "Arms section removed cosmaline and prepared 600 rifles for emergency replacement."

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
