

Ernie Pyle



The issuance of an Ernie Pyle 16¢ stamp by the United States Postal Service, bring memories to many members of the 36th Division.

Ernie Pyle, Scripps-Howard War Correspondent had covered the North African campaign before we knew him in Italy. His book "Here Is Your War" published by Henry Holt of New York in Dec. 1943 was one of the first to reach the American homefront with eye-to-eye coverage of our war.

Pyle visited the 36th Division during the winter campaign and the San Pietro battle. He later gave wide coverage to the story about the 143rd's Capt. Henry T. Waskow.

His column syndicated Jan. 10, 1944 was probably one of his greatest. T-Patchers will confirm that. The opening line of that story starts:

"In this war I have known a lot of officers who were loved and respected by the soldiers under them. But I never crossed the trail of any man as beloved as Capt. Henry T. Waskow of Belton, Texas."

Ernie Pyle became a standby to the people at home because he wrote so descriptive of their men at the front and to the fighting troops because he wrote it as it was to them.

Ernie won the Pulitzer Prize, wrote four books; had a lot of things named after him like: a bridge in Germany, theatres in Tokyo and Albuquerque, several VFW posts. He endeared himself to the T-Patchers, and those of us who knew him feel honored for his memory to receive a stamp issue in his name. A true tribute to a real American.

NEW BOOKS

Many of you probably have a World War II library, and we'd like to suggest a couple of new ones, as reviewed by Col. Stovall:

COMBAT COMMANDER

By. Major General E. N. Harmon

It is the pleasure of the T-Patcher to bring to your attention a book that is of great value and interest to members of our Division Association.

All of it is good reading and is valuable to military history and it has a deep meaning and high value to members of the division who fought in the battles of decision in Italy. Excerpts are quoted for your information and consideration:

Page 153 "At a conference of his senior commanders General Mark Clark outlined his plan for the next operation of the Fifth Army."

"The 36th. Infantry Division would cross the Rapide River and establish a beachhead; then the 1st. Armored Division would pour across the Rapide and pound up Rt. 6 in the Liri Valley toward Rome."

"The plan was promptly rejected by every other commander at the meeting. With unaccustomed unanimity, we all pointed out that such a tactic was impossible ——."

Page 154 "The gallant 36th Infantry Division launched its calamitous three day attempt to cross the Rapide River that I was convinced from the start was doomed to fail."

These comments, dear to men of the 36th Division, are only a small sample of a well written book; one that is factual, comprehensive and informative.


The trouble in this case seems to be that the writer has used information as it came from higher commanders and has disregarded the facts as known by division officers who knew

THADDEUS JUDSON SESSIONS
Born Sept. 2, 1907, Victoria, Texas.
Died Jan. 10, 1971, Houston, Texas.
Interment Desert Memorial Park, Palm Springs,
Calif.

Jud entered the service, 1940 as a private in Co. E, 111th Engrs., commissioned from the ranks following year. Commanded Hq. & Svc. Co., was Asst. Division Engineer in Italy. Col. Sessions was decorated for heroism, and after the war was a highly successful real estate developer. Only 2 years ago, was a \$1,000 underwriter for the Gen. Walker Book.

To his many friends, "Jud" has written his own Memorial and Eulogy by his own useful, heroic life of service to his fellowman.

"He was one of the greatest soldiers and men that I have ever know," says Col. Stovall.

T. J. Jud Sessions was the epitome of the 111th. Engineer Coat-of-Arms FORTIS ET FIDELIS.

He will live forever in the hearts of his countrymen.

WICK-Mr. Wonderful

The T-Patchers were fortunate indeed to have a guy like WICK FOWLER on our team. He spent 14 months with the 36th writing great stories about our men for his newspaper, The Dallas Morning News.


Wick was a rare treat for us all. He covered every unit, ate and slept with the troops, swapped stories and filed a dispatch every day for over a year.

He joined the division at Salerno, went on to Cassino, Anzio, Rome and Northern Italy, plus Southern France invasion and Germany. His great personality and keen sense of humor was welcomed by all the 36ers.

He wrote warm and interesting stories about the exploits of our men, and in 1965 when Gov. John Connally asked for memorabilia of the war for enshrinement in the State Archives Building, Austin – Wick Fowler turned over nearly a thousand stories and momento's for posterity.

(Note: In this same building you will find microfilm copies of the official records of the 36th – totaling some 150,000 pages).

Now in semi-retirement, WICK devotes much of his time doing a little Chili cooking', writing "Star Bright" column for a new Sunday Supplement called "The Texas Star" (circ. over 1 million). 
Ike is asst. vice-president and secretary of the Dallas coporate office of EAST TEXAS MOTOR FREIGHT LINES:

COL. JOHN J. GARNER, former C.O. of 133rd F.A. Bn., fought in both wars with the 36th, died in Corsicana April 17, 1971. Was former President of the Association, suffered a heart attack before the 1969 reunion and was unable to attend the last two reunions.

FELIX J. STAUDT, 79, served with the 36th during World War I. Born and reared in Fredericksburg, moved to Waco from Dallas in 1932. Was head of the paint dept. V.A. Hospital in Waco for 27 years.

ELMER CARGILL, Houston, Texas died March 24, 1970 according to information received from daughter-in-law Mrs. James L. Cargill, 2123 Jean St., Houston, Texas 77023.

LOUIS G. GRANGER of Marathon, Texas. Served with Service Battery, 133rd Field Artillery.

Hollywood dateline Jan. 28, 1960, from a column by the late LOUELLA PARSONS, who reprinted GEORGE KARRIGAN'S letters as follows:

"I nearly fainted when I read your story of your play 'Under the Yum Yum Tree'. While I was in Italy in 1944, my squad found an old phonograph with some American records made in 1915. We played the phonograph at every stop, and in every battle in Italy.

"Now, Miss Parson's, our No. 1 Hit Record was "Under the Yum Yum Tree". I sang it constantly and also drew a picture of a tree on a board and labeled it the Yum Yum Tree.

"I carried it all over Italy and hung it on a tree or stuck it near my foxhole. As a result I was called "Yum Yum".

"So maybe you will understand now why I was so pleasantly surprised to hear that loveable name again. I hope my buddies from the 36th DIVISION also read your column."

36th Mourns Audie Murphy

Heroes are often called on to define bravery or at least to give a reason for their own heroics. Audie Murphy offered a rather believable explanation: Being so mad and disgusted with war that you do something to get it over with so that you can get home.

In Audie's war, getting it over with meant winning it. The lack of any such clear goal to shoot at in Korea and Vietnam may explain why nobody has quite matched the Texan's heroics since. Heroism needs a stronger focus than those wars have given it.

Or it may be that the Audie Murphys of Korea and Vietnam were those that Audie himself thought the true honors should go to: The men who, like him, wanted to come home the worst of all and who dared the most, only to die.

Most of the Audie Murphys do not come home. He himself was an unlikely survivor of the philosophy of singlehandedness against the enemy. Most of the others have as prosaic a view of their exploits as he did.

But however definitions of bravery may vary from man to man—or even from war to war—the crimson thread of heroism does unite the generations of lesser men in admiration of what is perhaps the highest manifestation of the human spirit.

Men may question wars but not courage. They may wonder at the motivation of the hero, but they reward the deed with respect.

So it was with Audie Murphy, whose death on the Memorial Day weekend, gave a deeper dimension to the remembrance we extend not only to the exalted courage of the few like him, but also to the quieter courage of the thousands who, like ourselves, were more ordinary men, but willing, too, to fight and die.




