

Since the history of the 36th Division is so much a part of Texas history, it's only logical that our files of World War I and II should be in this building.

The Texas State Archives and Library building is where all of our "history" is now catalogued, and preserved for the ages.

Through the diligent work of our great historical committee chairman, Col. Oran Stovall, all materials from the Camp Mabry Trophy Room have now been moved to this building. Here is where historians and scholars of the future will go to find all the information on the "Fighting 36th Division".

With the help of JOHN M. KINNEY, director of the Archives Division, Texas State Library and Archives, he has worked closely with your historical committee, members of the Adj. Gen. Dept., in getting all this material assembled and classified.

NOW, anyone who has some memorabilia to contribute can rest assured that it will be preserved, permanently. We have quite a lot of history on file there. We know there is much, much more in the hands of the troops, who someday may want it to have a 'home'.

CAMP MABRY TROPHY ROOM

In our last issue we disclosed that Building 11 of the Adj. Gen,'s Dept., would be moved, and no provisions were made for relocation of the Trophy Room. To date, many other sites have been suggested, and many have been explored by your historical committee. Latest report is that the move, scheduled for May 1972, has now been delayed til fall '72. Therefore, with this additional time, your committee will continue to seek a new place for all the "hardware" still on display at Camp Mabry. Three locations have been recommended: San Antonio, Waco and College Sta-

New Portrait of Gen. Walker To Be Unveiled at Reunion

This JULY 1972 issue of the 36th Division Association T-Patcher is dedicated to the memory of our beloved World War II commander, Maj. Gen. FRED L. WALKER whose 85th birthday will be observed June 11th.

Many of you who attended the 1969 Reunion in Fort Worth will recall that Gen. Walker, though ill at the time, sat at a table for hours, talking and visiting with the T-Patchers and autographing his book (just off the press) FROM TEXAS TO ROME with a sincere personal message to each 36ther. This was to be his last reunion with his men. Only 6 weeks later on October 11, 1969 he died in the Walter Reed Hospital, Washington.



General Walker pridefully and gallantly led the 36th (Texas) Infantry Division from Louisiana maneuvers to the bloody beach at Salerno and into Rome from September 1941 to July 1944.

His 33 months as commander of the 36th was to be the longest term of leadership of any of the division's eleven commanders during war time. (see page 8).

He wore an oak leaf cluster on his WWI Distinguished Service Cross, the Distinguished Service Medal, and the Silver Star.

A TEXAS CONVERT

Fred L. Walker was a Texan tried and true – not by birth but by adoption of the state and the men whose faith in him has never wavered. Gen Walker was a native of Columbus, Ohio and graduated from the state university there in 1911. He was a member of the Ohio State Guard for four years, and then became a second lieutenant of infantry.

WORLD WAR I HERO

With the 3rd Division in World War I, Walker demonstrated the leadership that was to prove so valuable to the 36th Division. The Distinguished Service Cross, second highest United States medal for courage, was awarded him when his battalion inflicted great losses on the Germans as they crossed the Marne.

HE TOLD IT LIKE IT WAS During WWII General Walker was to see this situation reverse at Rapido River, with the Germans inflicting great losses on the Americans. General Walker called it an impossible mission, with nothing in our favor, when he was ordered to cross the Rapido River at a stated time and place.

OAK LEAF FOR DSC

His award of the Distinguished Service Cross Oak Leaf Cluster in this war was for extraordinary heroism in the approach to and the capture of Rome. Moving with the forward echelons, the General issued orders and encouraged the men while incessant small arms, machine gun, mortar and artillery fire swept the area. Later he mounted a tank and led a charge which drove back the enemy. The citation said that "during the entire period his contempt for personal safety, his intrepid leadership and unconquerable determination to defeat the enemy and achieve his objective, inspired every man of his combat units to follow his sterling example."

The D.S.M. was awarded General Walker for extraordinary meritorious service at Salerno. He landed on the beach with the leading elements of the 36th Division and personally directed regrouping of the forces which were under heavy stress. During the first thirty-six hours of battle, he commanded all American forces in the invasion and welded the hardwon beachhead.

SILVER STAR FOR GALLANTRY

Later in the Italian campaign he was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action when he posted himself at a forward battalion observation post and although it was subjected to continuous enemy fire which killed and wounded men in the vicinity, remained there directing fire and inspiring his men until the victory was won.

SAD FAREWELL

General Walker was transferred to the States in July, 1944, to assume command of the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Ga.


General Walker retired from the Army with the rank of major general in 1946 and almost immediately went to Austin to reorganize the Texas National Guard. He was promoted to lieutenant general and stayed with the Guard for about 14 months.



Earl enlisted in Svc. Co., 141st way back in 1934 as a private. Later transfered to Hqs. 3rd Bn., 141st. Got his commission May 1941; 1st Lt. Feb. 1942. Attended a flock of schools: 3rd Army Junior officers, Special Svc. School, Camp Meade, Maryland and Motor Maintenence at Fort Benning. Did a hitch with "E" 143rd and then assigned to "F" 143rd. Then on to "G" 143rd in Jan. 1944 until wounded at Grossetti, Italy. Got a bunch of medals like Silver, Bronze star and Purple Heart with clusters and all the rest. Earl was promoted to Major Sept. 1947, retired on disability the next year.

Moved to Burnet in 1947 and opened a Boat and Motor business in 1952, and still at it, and lives in Ink's Lake, west of Burnet, with wife Rhylma. Earl always finds time to support any of the many activities during the year envolving the Association. A great **T-Patcher**.

German Prisoner Calls Texans Tough, Wild Men

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, ALGIERS, Dec. 15 (P). A tribute to the fighting abilities of Texans in Italy came Wednesday from a German prisoner who, during questioning, complained that they are too tough. This prisoner said the Germans fighting in the Mt. Maggiore sector were faced by "tough wild men from


Texas with a knowledge of field craft."

He winced as he spoke of the Texans, and said his feelings were shared by other Germans.

Among the divisions in the 5th Army line is the 36th, composed largely of Texans, which was the first American division to land on the beaches of Salerno. *

Right out of STARS AND STRIPES, Dec. 1943: Those Krauts called us "tough wild men from Texas with a knowledge of field craft" ... an understatement to say the least. They should have read-up on the 36th before they started that war.

GERMAN PRISONERS REBURY FRENCH CIVILIANS MURDERED AT DIJON

ZEB SUNDAY, our V.P. 143rd of Pasadena, Texas sends in these (never before revealed photos of German atrocities) from his personal file, all were made late August 1944 when the Division swept through Dijon in southern/central France.

Men digging in above 2 photos are captured Germans, who revealed the site of mass grave of murdered French civilians, slain by the Krauts, and hastily buried. All bodies of a dozen or more civilians were re-buried with formal funeral, shown in lower photo. War is hell.

PETE GREEN GETS HIS LONG OVERDUE STAR

A veteran of more than 30 years of duty in the Army and National Guard, Col. JOHN NORVELL 'Pete' GREEN received his star (Brevet General) in ceremonies held in Abilene on Feb. 26, 1972.

Maj. Gen. ROSS AYERS, Adj. Gen. of Texas made the presentation, . . . a mere 16 years after Green's retirement (July 31, 1956). Through an oversight, he did not receive the brevet promotion at retirement, although he was elgible.

"I discovered this a few months ago," said Gen. Ayers. "I knew his name should have been on the list, but it wasn't. I had a mutual friend contact Pete to see if he would be willing to receive it." The rest is history,


Gen. Pete Green, a native of Runnels County joined the National Guard when it was organized after WWI in 1922. He entered WWII as Captain in 1940, was S3 of the 131st, then moved rapidly to Battalion Commander 132nd F.A. in Europe. Pete Green has many awards, but none can compare with the devotion he has from all the Artillerymen who served under him.


