

Artist Captures True Likeness of Walker In Fabulous Oil Painting


This is the 3rd major project for the 36th that Col. Oran C. Stovall has taken on, and after six months work we have a fabulous new oil of our beloved Gen. Fred L. Walker.

Other projects were the huge T-Patch granite on the State Capital grounds, and the "From Texas to Rome" book which came out on schedule Sept. 1969, only weeks before the general passed away.


Using several photos of Gen. Walker's favorite pose, Stovall commissioned Mrs. Juanita Gleghorn of Durant, Okla., to render the finished oil portrait. This was in March 1972.

Months of preliminary sketches were made and studied, plus a poll to many T-Patchers who knew the general best for proper description as to coloring etc.

R. NEWTON SNEDEN, Roaring Brook, Rockleigh, N. J. 07647 sends in this item about Admiral H. Dent Hewitt who died in September. Adm. Hewitt was naval commander in the two invasions made by the 36th Division, Salerno and Southern France.

Newt quotes from a letter he once received from the Admiral regarding chain of command in amphibious operations, who said: "In the system, the Admiral was in supreme command until the troops were safely established ashore, whereupon the command devolved upon the General in our case (Walker and Dalhquist) and it became the Navy's job to 'support' the army as per the General's orders.

Thanks for this valuable part of our history, Newt. (We always admired the Navy in a way, they ate real good, and drank coffee out of china mugs instead of canteen cups).

"What You Have Always Wanted To Know About REUNIONS, But Were Afraid To Ask"

The 1972 Dallas Reunion, our 47th, will have to be recorded as one of the best...the turnout was the biggest in years! We will attempt to give a blow-by-blow account:

Thurs. Aug. 31: Early birds arrive from all-over. Mostly the V/P's in charge of CP's. Reason: it takes a little doin to set up one of these for business. President Roger and Ruby Cannon were there when we arrived at noon, in the "Queen's Suite" with a wagon load of boxes, cartons etc. (Here is where we need a good quartermaster

Zeb Sunday arrived with enough cases to open a branch liquor store (of course the 143rd is thirsty Then ole Robert Richie and wife arrive even the night before, driving in from Pensacola, Florida. The 141st headed by Tex Higginbotham brought in 3 carloads of artifacts, and were the first to open for business

Note: The early-birds that arrive on Thursday have a decided edge on the rest of us. They get out their maps and chart a plan of operation that the late comers can't understand. In fact, it is highly recommended, that if you really want to "get with it"... be an early bird, and show up on Thursday.

Earl Higginbotham, our new president promises that "special" facilities will be available to ALL who arrive a "day" early...so write that on your cuff, and plan to be in HOUSTON next Labor day week end...a little early, arrive on thursday.

Friday Sept. 1st: Registeration opened at 9AM and did a land-office business til 5 PM. All CP's were off-and-running all day, but the big event was "Social Hour" in the ballroom with all the beer you could drink. This is one of the true events where you get to "see everybody". By 10:30 the troops had then moved on to the CP's and other watering holes

Sat. Sept. 2nd: The general session started at 1:00 PM with a large attendance. Guest speaker, Dolph Brisco, democratic gubernatorial candidate did about 25 minutes, recognized all our statistics, then highlighted the problems that confront the State of Texas. He was introduced by Gen. Carl Phinney, Dallas.

The unveiling of the portrait of General Walker was a treat for all (see story elsewhere), a true likeness of our beloved leader. This project was the work of Col. Stovall who handled it from start to finish. (Our thanks, Col).

Maj. Gen. Ross Ayres told of the "Honorary" memberships now available for out-of-state T-Patchers (see story in this issue). Upon ajournment at 3:45, most everyone attended their own CP for more visitation and laughs.

The unit CP's are always the highlite of the reunion. (note to you guys who have never attended a reunion)...you are never a stranger in your own unit cp\$

A fabulous steak dinner and all trimming was served at 7PM, and it was






Earl 'Tex' Higginbotham, New Grand Marshall Starts Big Round-Up of Drop-Outs And Strays

The two characters shown below, Dudley Dropout and Sammy Stray have been causing us alot of trouble.


These critters have got to be rounded-up and "branded" with a redhot T-Patch brand (\$3.00).






