
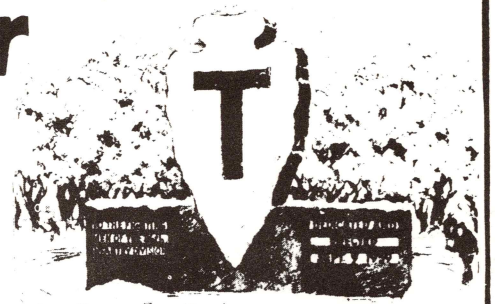

Advance Registration Helps A Lot. . .

This year the Association tried a plan of registering in advance for the reunion for the first time.

While not as many members sent in advance registrations as was hoped for, the program was nevertheless successful. For example, some 16% of those attending the Saturday night dinner registered in advance by mail.

Advance registration has a number of obvious advantages. For one thing, it reduces the amount of work and saves time at the registration desk during the reunion — and no one likes to wait. Also, this enables a more nearly accurate forecast of the number who will attend the Saturday night function, and with ever increasing costs this is a very, very important aspect. The hotel must have a firm estimate of the number who will attend the Saturday night dinner at least 24 hours in advance. This figure can be increased later, but it cannot be reduced. In other words, it's a guarantee. It is therefore easy to imagine the consternation on Saturday morning when registrations are still 175 short of the number of meals guaranteed for Saturday night.

So advance registration for the reunion is probably something that will remain with us, with more and more emphasis being placed upon it in the years to come. Next year, all members are urged to participate in this plan.

Dear Ladies:

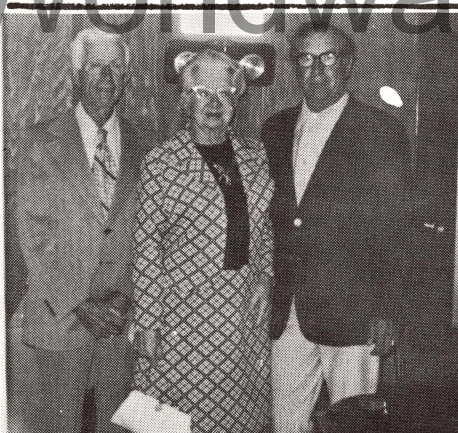

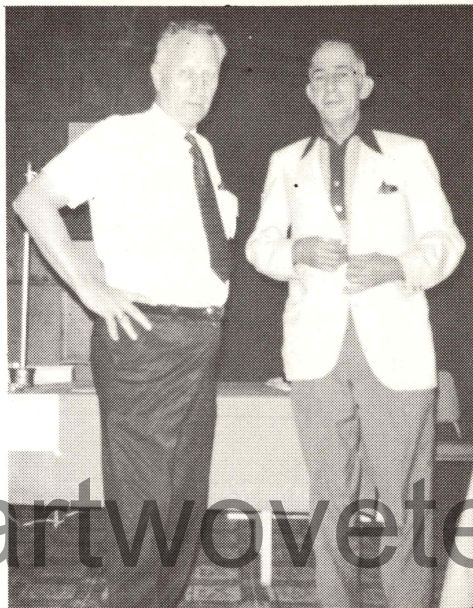

A visit to the fabled "Celestial" Suite on the two top floors of the Astroworld Hotel was like a trip to never-never land. Tours were held Friday and Sat. during the reunion.

This tour was a special bonus for the reunion delegates, and is not available to the run-of-the-mill visitor to Houston. It was a "Look, See, Don't Touch" kind of deal. So fabulous, that even Jackie and Onassis would have been slightly bug-eyed.

The suite covers the entire top of the hotel. You can only enter by key-operated "bubble" glass-enclosed elevator, and when you arrive at the top, you have really "arrived".

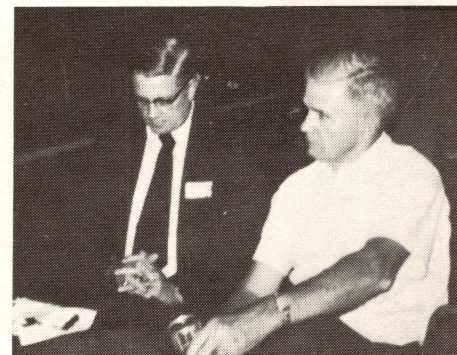
The 8th wonder of the world, the Astrodome is clearly in view (about a hoop & holler away). This suite rents for the bargain rate of \$2,500 a day. (This was established to keep out the riff-raff).

The playroom part is a miniature of the interior of the Astrodome, complete with miniature electronic score board and closed circuit TV. (Frankly, it is a far cry from an evening in a pup tent with a GI buddy).

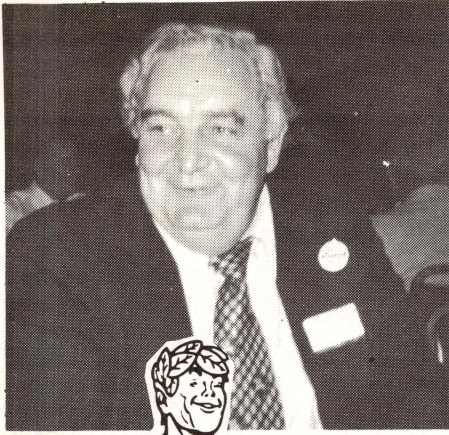
The place is alive with rare and expensive antiques, and trappings of the turn-of-the-century . . . dozens of old player pianos (one from a bawdy house in Laredo). Walls are covered with ancient colorful circus posters, all framed and encased in gold plated trim (a King's ransom, no doubt).

Conducted tours were made through the 9 (yes nine) super deluxe bedrooms. Each with a theme depicting some time out of the past, and as lavish as a Nabob's dream, plus every bathroom had enough marble in it to satisfy an oil rich Arab Shiek, (the bathtubs were reportedly said to have been hand-carved out of solid marble by a tribe of pygamies from the Amazon).

Being curious about all this opulence and splendor, I asked one of the Astroworld staff members if anyone knew how much all this cost (built in 1968) and he said \$2 million. And that's a lot of bread just for a place to entertain. And the man who did all this was the great Judge Huffhines, creator of the Astroworld complex. I assume he paid for the Celestial Suite out of 'petty cash'.

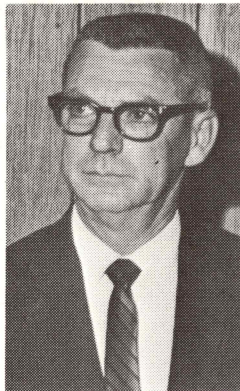

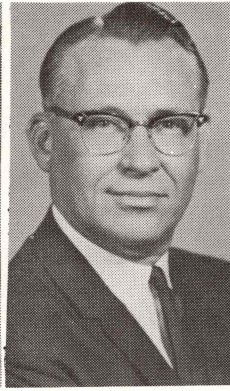

Guard, M/Sgt E-7 and his oldest son is S/Sgt. same unit. The Carter's have missed only 2 reunions since 1956; was V/P 141st in 1964-65.

FRANK ADAMSON, V/P Artillery: Joined the guard in '39 with Med. Detachment 133rd FA in San Antonio, later to Bat. D, 133rd and then 626th TD Bn. Was S/Sgt. when he left Mannheim for home. 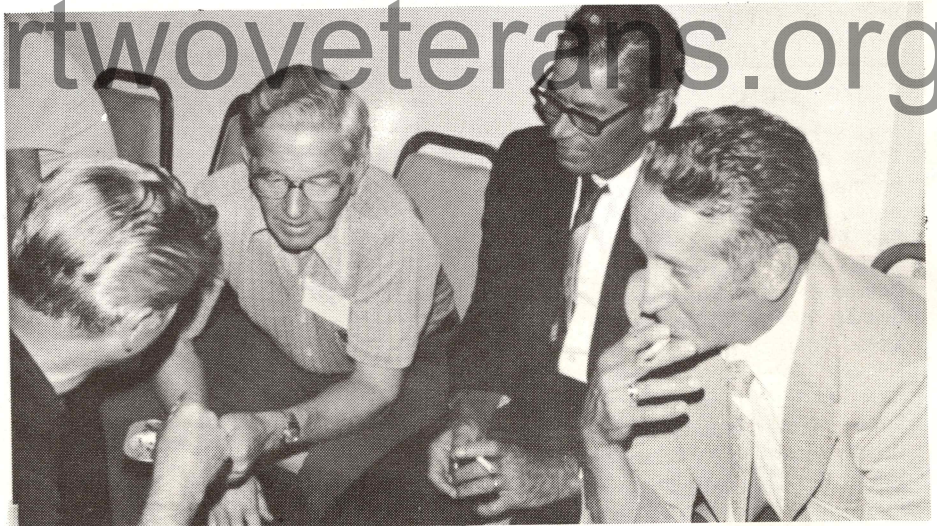

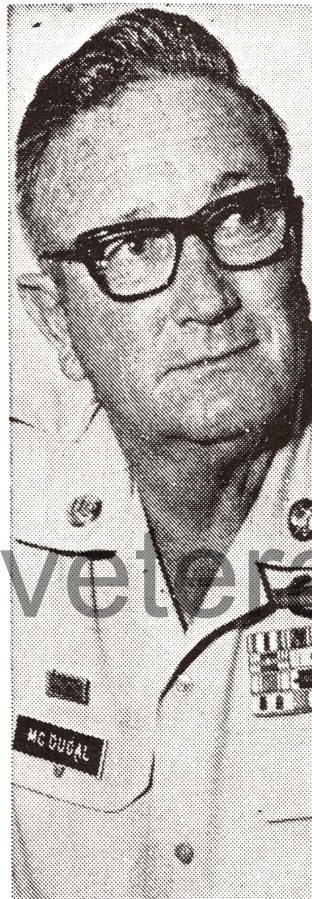

The reunion celebrated the 30th anniversary of the historic Salerno Invasion.

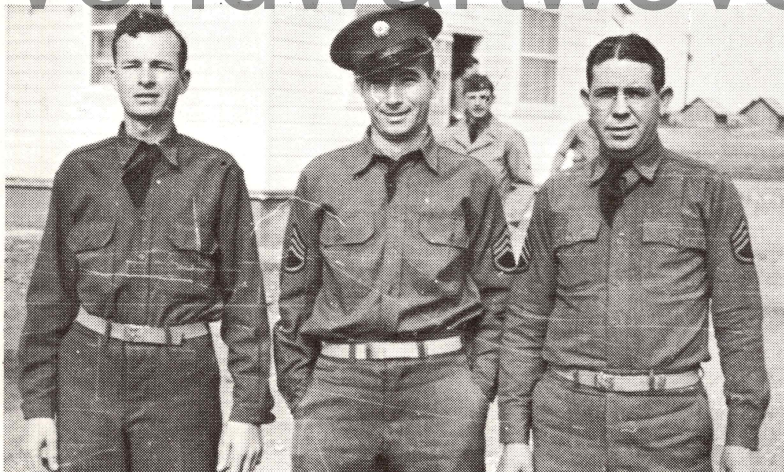
McDugal has been association secretary and treasurer three times, vice president and as executive secretary and "T-Patcher" editor from 1967 to 1970.

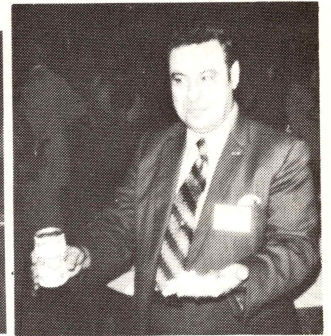
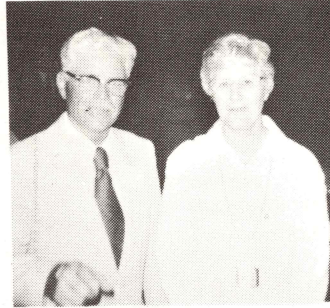

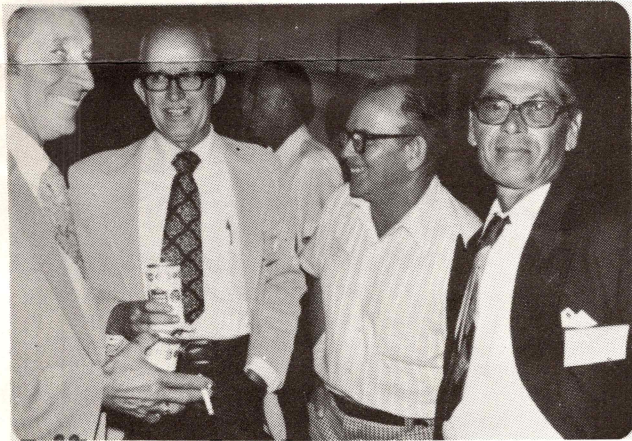

Fillmore Writes Book About 131st F.A. "Lost Battalion"

In 1946, while recuperating from four years as a prisoner of war, attorney Clyde Fillmore of Wichita Falls wrote his experiences into a book-length manuscript. Afterward, he returned to office as Wichita district attorney, and the manuscript was put away in a storage closet. A few months ago, with interest high in the accounts of returning Vietnam POWs, Fillmore was reminded of his manuscripts. Excerpts were published in the Wichita Falls Times. Response then led to the publication of the full manuscript.

The book, "Prisoner of War" (Nortex Press, Quanah, \$6.75), describes Fillmore's capture while a member of the 2nd Battalion, 131st Field Artillery, detached from the 36th Division, and his battle for survival in working on the railroad later the subject of Pierre Boulle's "Bridge Over the River Kwai". Included is a roster of known survivors of the "Lost Battalion" who, along with men from the cruiser USS Houston, were taken prisoner by the Japanese in Java in March of 1942. Fillmore is now in private practice in Wichita Falls.

"In Italy during World War II our Unit was ordered to make a night attack. Co. B 142nd Infantry 36th Division passed through the enemy lines to high ground above the city of Velletri in rear of the Germans. At dawn the men of Co. B came upon an enemy radio communication center located in a log house. wo German soldiers, unaware that American soldiers were nearby, approached from the building. The Germans were not only surprised but grateful that our soldiers had a sense of humor. They were made prisoners and the radio equipment taken into custody."

WWI Co. C. 143rd To Meet In Beaumont

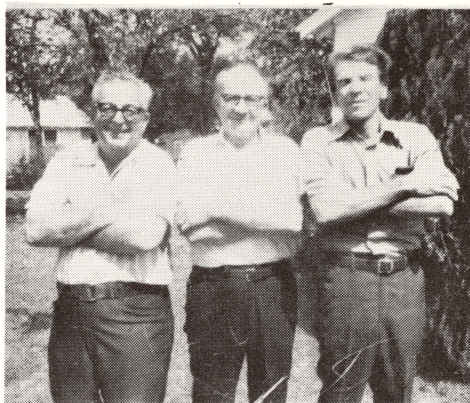

3 POW's of 143rd Hold 30th Anniversary Reunion

On Sept. 13, 1943, four days after the invasion of Salerno, on a hot muggy day in sunny Italy, at about 5 PM, the Nazi armor, artillery and infantry smashed into the ranks of the 143rd. Many were killed and countless number taken prisoner, including the men shown above.

Yes, the familiar phrase uttered by the German's, "For you der var ist ofer," still rings in these men's ears.

On Sept. 13, 1973, these same men met in West, Texas (near Waco) to talk over old times. They were liberated April 26, 1945 in Luckenweld, Germany.

Harry Zahirniak and Edmund Kudelka still live in West; William Cocek came all the way from San Matio, Calif. for the reunion. Zahirniak was host for the trio.

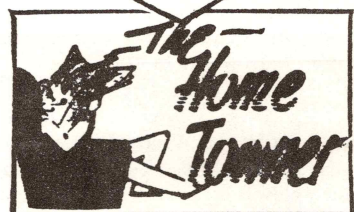

FIVE years ago tomorrow, the Texas National Guard was mobilized.

On that day, it developed, the World War II 36th Division was born . . . born out of a great tradition and heritage handed down from the Alamo through one world war.

Tomorrow, those men of the 36th who have survived, may look back with satisfaction on their heroic role in another world war . . . and all Texas may look back with pride on the achievements of our own great division.

When it returns to the United States next month, only 600 Texans will be in its ranks. The original division is almost entirely replaced.

Too much of the depletion in the division's ranks came about, not as a result of rotation, but as a result of enemy action.

Only two divisions sustained heavier losses.

* * *

So, as we remember the division on its war-time birthday tomorrow, let us remember with gratitude the men who did not return and those who did come back as casualties . . . even above, perhaps, those who came back unscathed.

They fell by the hundreds on the beaches at Salerno, in the assaults on San Pietro, in the bloody and ill-advised crossing of the Rapido river, at Cassino and Anzio . . . on the beaches and along the faster but still bloody line of march through France, Germany, Austria.

There has been some talk of a parade somewhere of the returning 36th.

As a parade, it would be fine. But the division wouldn't be our 36th as we know it.

Only a smattering of old Guardsmen who fought in the toughest theater of the war . . . in Italy . . . would be there.

They are the men who deserve a special salute on their division's mobilization birthday. Thank God for those who came back and thank God for those who gave their lives that we all might be free.

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
