
Fun Unlimited

There will be a full weekend of fun and comradship. The Reunion Committee has a fun program for us all.


To make this Bicentennial year re-union a real success, we will need each of you and I will be looking for you.

These photos were made by Alvin Amelunke, when he was an out-patient medical care in Paris, early 1945. Amelunke had been in a hospital in England, after his THIRD wound in action. He and same other officers had been sent to Paris to work as investigating officers in the black market racket, which was in high-gear. "We were still under medical care, but were able to work as much as we cared to," Alvin said.

Alvin Amelunke took this pix to show the facility that was available to all Allied troops who journeyed to Paris. This one is the Hqs. of FFI (French Forces Interior) which pronounced in French as: F-F-Eee. And, these civilian Frenchmen did one helluva job in giving the Krawts a bad time. A great story yet to be told.



Possibly no other one individual had as much influence and devotion of his men than General Walker. 



SPECIAL FEATURE: Ste. Marie Pass, 25 November 1944

A Report From George E. Lynch

The assault and seizure of the Ste. Marie Pass, leading from the Vosges Mountains into the Rhine plain, on 25 Nov. 1944 has been compared in importance with the 142 Inf. attack on Mt. Artemisio at Velletri, Italy in May 1944.
The latter received wide notice because it led to the fall of Rome to Fifth U. S. Army, whereas Ste. Marie received no attention, since it was merely a battle for one of many exits from the Vosges

into the Rhine plain.

36th Div. had reached the end of its drive from the beaches of Southern France to the foothills of the Vosges Mountains by the end of Sep. 1944 — a stunning and exhausting effort. We crossed the Moselle River at Remiremont and ground to a halt. 142nd Infantry received replacement vehicles, and weapons and about eight hundred new men and officers. Six weeks were spent generally between Tendon (S.) to Les Rouges Eaux Valley (N.) reorganizing, patrolling, and preparing for the next offensive. Rain and cold persisted in the heavily wooded and precipitous terrain.

The offensive resumed 4 Nov. 1944. At first, the going was slow, tedious and bloody. We saw our first "scorched bloody. We saw our first "scorched earth" towns. St. Die flared brightly at night. Road blocks at every conceivable spot kept engineers busy.

VI Corps assigned 36 Div. the task of seizing the high pass near Ste. Marie aux Mines and then to debouche into the Rhine plain at Selestat and Ribeauville. 142 Inf. R.C.T. was directed to seize the

Ste. Marie Pass.

The offensive moved slowly and then gathered speed as 142nd entered Wisenbach, the last town before ascending to the high Ste. Marie Pass. The Pass it-self, at two thousand feed, was simply a narrow hard-surfaced road cut into the side of the precipitous mountain whose peek rose to three thousand feet. Heavily wooded as well as precipitous, travel off the road was a matter of climbing and clambering on foot. The Pass, with timber varricades was de-fended by anti-tank guns and about one hundred infantrymen.

By this stage of our advance, it was clear that the Germans were no longer defending, just delaying our advance wherever the terrain offered an advantage. So there was no question of linear defenses. Road block and delaying along along principal arteries became the pat-

tern of German tactics.

Map study showed a dirt cart trail leading north-east out of Wisenbach, crossing a saddle of the mountain north of the Pass.

A plan was devised to have 3rd Bn.

142 Inf. divide into two forces — one element, Co. L., reinforced by a platoon of Co. B. 753rd Tank Bn., commanded by Maj. Ross Young to attack the Pass frotally up the road approach, as a diversion — the remainder of the battalion commanded by Lt. Col. A. W. Gillette mounted on trucks, to follow the dirt cart trail N.E. out of Wisenbach, going as far as possible mounted, and, after pressing the saddle to dismount and at crossing the saddle, to dismount and attack the town of Ste. Marie aux Mines

on foot. I reconnoitred the dirt cart trail toward dark 24 Nov. and satisfied myself that the trail would support our loaded $2\frac{1}{2}$ ton trucks and that the grade of th eascent was negotiable.

On the surface, trucking infantrymen right into the German lines would appear to be too risky to undertake. But, in view of the pattern of German delaying actions described about, the risk seemed justified.

At daylight next morning, men of Lt. Col. Gillette's 3rd Bn. (—) mounted their trucks and moved out of Wisenbach up the dirt trail and disappeared into the forest without incident or interruption.

The attack of Maj. Young's diversionary force against the fortified pass itself was delayed until 132nd F. A. Bn. could complete its move into firing position, after which, a generous amount of artlilery fire was laid on the fortifications while Maj. Young's force advanced up the road.
While the fortifications were still un-


der our artillery fires, the tank platoon attempted a frontal attack against the pass. With this approach denied to us, Co. L. deployed into a shallow envelopment around the north (uphill) side of the pass. After many hours of tortuous climbing, this force descended on the pass and at 1815 hrs. completed capture of the pass, with 28 prisoners and 30

enemy dead.

3rd Bn. (—) meantime had passed over the saddle, 2 miles north of the pass, had continued, mounted on trucks, toward Ste. Marie and at 1320, having dismounted, entered the town capturing a stunned German garrison of 150, with only 2 casualties. Germans were riding about, attending to their daily affairs and offered little resistance. The town was fully under control by 1800 hours.

111 Engr. Bn. cleared the obstacles from the pass by 2240, and 142nd Inf. closed into Ste. Marie during the night.

A truly remarkable action for which the 3rd Bn. 142nd Inf. (+) received the Presidential Unit Citation.



From ROTATE REVIEW, Oct. 1945: Col. George E. Lynch has been Regimental Commander of the 142nd since Oct. 1, 1943 when he took the post three weeks after the Salerno invasion (Sept. 9th). Col. Lynch is a Regular Army officer who received his commission upon graduation from West Point in 1929. Before joining the 142nd, he was with the 82nd Airborne Division during the invasion of Sicily and through that campaign. He landed in Italy at Paestum with the 82nd AB & D plus 4 and joined the 36th on Sept. 26, 1943. Major General George E. Lynch lives at 2008 Stark Ave., Columbus, GA 31906.

Camp Blanding, Flórida . . . A Warm Smile and a Cold Drink, Recalled

Camp Blanding, located near Starke, in the upper part of Florida, was a complete change of pace for all those wildmen from Texas, who had journed over a 1000 miles in convoy to a physical environment, much different than the scrub-brush of Brown County, in Central Texas. Here was a camp site large enough for 2 infantry Divisions. And, who was our next door neighbor . . . The men of 1st Division (regular army troopers and all Yankees). This had something to do with the many barroom skirmishes that took place in Starke (a boomtown) which was pretty wild.

Since Florida was a state with mixed drinks, a far cry from Texas laws, the neighboring towns became a real mecca to wet a whistle. Jacksonville, the largest was only an hour's bus ride; then there was Orlando, a beauty; and Gainesville had a lot of pretty girls and cozybars; and the culture seekers took in Daytona Beach and St. Augustine, the oldest city in America. The training was rigorious, but the weekend frolics were great hi-jinks all the way. Viva, Florida!

144th Regiment Meet In Dallas, June 26 For Annual Reunion

Members of the 144th held its biennial reunion on June 26th at the Royal Coach Motor Hotel in Dallas, according to Willie Hefner, Secretary. This was the regiment that pulled out of Camp Bowie on Dec. 9, 1941, in order to reduce the 36th to a triangular division, and to assist in protection of the west coast.

In past reunions members have come from 24 states. State flags are displayed from each state represented, in addition to that of Texas and the USA—this year it will also include that for the Confederate States, sent by Jim McDowell of Birmingham, Ala. who informed Hefner it should also be displayed. Jim has attended all past reunions.

Like its parent organization, the 36th, men from many states came to the regiment, due to losses because of cadres, formation of new outfits by the regiment, transfers to various OCS and to replacements. One group of more than 1,000 was received direct from reception centers on the east coast while it was in California, and these were given basic training. Smaller groups also received their basic training, having been sent from various reception centers in the midwest and other areas.

Some OCS and overseas replacements shipped, including 1,700 one month, served with the 36th in Italy, France and Germany, as well as many others who served in the Pacific area.

Hefner states that they also have many lost members now surviving who have not been locating themselves with him, in addition to hundreds now decreased



"There was ample air photo coverage in-depth for one thing, and we had excellent photo interpreters at division, corps, and army levels. Information thus obtained was confirmed by night patrols, ground observers, interrogation of prisoners and Italian civilians, and the constant flow of information from all units of the division to Div. Hqs."

"I shall always remember the superior efficiency and determination of the intelligence personnel at every level of

"With this confirmed 'intelligence,' more accurate than ANY ACTION EVER participated in being in Hqs. of the Corps and Army commanders, I will never understand WHY the 36th was ordered to make the Rapido River attack."


