
Men of Co. H, 142nd Present Portrait To Gene Hetmanski







Kolonel Kibbey, King of Kentucky Korn — Does It Again . . .


The talent continues to flow, as Sam F. Kibbey has just written an original satire for the Ashland Oil Arcoettes — titled "In The Year 2000 AD."



Our Life Membership campaign has been good. But, let's not stop there (keep those checks comin').



Early Bird Party Was Auxiliary Production














Jim Stokes of Florida Is Your New 142nd V/P, Wants You In Dallas


