


Jimmy Carter Meets Amil



Story of Texas Guard In June Texas Parade

TEXAS PARADE, June 1977 issue has a cover story on Texas's Weekend Army (National Guard) who have 15,789 persons in 178 companies in 117 locations in Texas, also the Air National Guard under state control with 2,998 men in 35 units in seven locations. The Texas Guard is headed-up by an ex-T-Patcher, Maj. Gen. Thomas Bishop, who was re-appointed Adjutant General in 1973, after having served previously for seven years. The story is quite controversial, but I recommend you get a copy, and judge for yourself.

36th Memorial Monument At Austin Dedicated Nov. 11, 1959



We've had several requests for us to tell our new members the facts about the T-Patch Monument that appears on our msathead. This is quite a story, but her's a condensed version.

This 11' high granite monument is located on the west side of the State Capitol grounds in Austin. It represents alot of work and effort on the part of many who worked on it. Number 1, getting the right to put it there. (It ain't easy to get something on the Capitol grounds).

After approval by the State, Col. Oran Stovall was the head honcho on this, since he is an engineer of renoun. It was dedicated on Nov. 11, 1959 at 11:30 AM, climaxing a Veteran's day parade with Governor Price Daniels delivering the dedicatorial address. This impression stone cost \$4,250.00 (1959 prices) and stands in remembrance of the heroes who gave their lives in both World Wars while wearing the world-famous T-Patch shoulder insignia of the 36th Division.

Association president, Lee Allison had invited all T-Patchers to attend this much-tobe-remembered ceremony.

If you visit Austin, make a note to stop by and see this impressive memorial. It is one of a kind, done in a manner that reflects the dedication of the men of the 36th Division.














