AWARD OF PURPLE HEART II

I -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded First Sergeant John S. Clark, 6247014, Company "F", 410th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action.

On the night of 10-11 November 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, while the relief of the 30th U. S. Infantry Regiment was being effected, First Sergeant Clark's company was proceeding through a dense wood, hostile artillery fire began to fall among the men, causing disorder and a threat of serious casualties. First Sergeant Clark, with utter disregard for his own safety, and hampered by sleet and falling snow, on his own initiative moved among his men dispersing them, leading them to places of greater security and restoring order. During the course of this action he was twice wounded but he refused to be evacuated and continued to effect the dispersion, thus preventing many casualties. II -- AWARD OF PURPLE HEART. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Purple Heart is awarded First Sergeant John S. AWARD OF SILVER STAR

ORIGINAL ORDER

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded Technician Third Grade Harold C. Streib, 37400568, Infantry, Company "H", 41th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 16 November 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France. Technician Third Grade Streib had been assigned the task of evacuating casualties for Company "H", but when his organization suffered no casualties, he volunteered to perform the same services for another company of the same regiment. Exposing himself to heavy and continuous artillery fire, Technician Third Grade Streib carried the wounded up a mountain side on his back. Twice his first aid kits and pack were shot off, but his efforts were continuous from early in the morning until late at night. When encouraged to rest he refused, redoubled his efforts and went to the aid of wounded men who were out in the open. With utter disregard for his own safety, he repeatedly exposed himself to artillery, mortar and small arms fire in order that he might give aid to these men and prepare them for evacuation. Alone he brought many men up the mountain side, and attended many more on the open field of battle. His magnificent courage was a source of inspiration to all. Entered service from St. Louis, Missouri.

Throughout the entire action Technical Sergeant Slyford's heroic action was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Port Huron, Michigan.

SECOND LIEUTENANT HENDRICK G. STONE, 01185600, Infantry, Company "H", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, LIEUTENANT STONE repeatedly exposed himself to heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire while directing our own fire on enemy installations. Evacuating all personnel to the basement of a building used for a company command post, he remained at his observation point while shrapnel bursts demolished sections of the building in which he was located. LIEUTENANT STONE, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, remained at his post until it was ascertained that all enemy activity had ceased and the machine guns and mortars that were holding up the attack had been destroyed. Residence: Pierson, Florida.

Private Stanley Zebrowski, 32918422, Infantry, Company "G", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the period 13 November to 17 November 1944, night and day, over hazardous terrain, Private Zebrowski indefatigably repaired vital communication lines between the OPL and the battalion MLR. On many occasions, this work was done under extremely dangerous conditions with heavy enemy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire constantly harassing his operations. Without regard to his own personal safety, he maintained communications, valuable information of the enemy was relayed back to his battalion and successful attacks were made against machine gun positions and pill-boxes. Private Zebrowski's heroic and persistent efforts contributed materially to the combat effectiveness of the battalion. Residence: Paterson, New Jersey.

Private First Class Gilbert A. Amendt, 17151968, Infantry, Company "G", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 29 November 1944 in the vicinity of * * * France, Private First Class Amendt, a Browning Automatic Rifleman, moved into position in an attempt to establish a firing position. Soon thereafter he was pinned down by machine gun fire from both flanks. In the face of great danger and with magnificent courage, he

crawled forward and established a position from which he brought fire on the enemy machine gun, effectively silencing it. As a result of his sound judgment and heroic action the enemy machine gun was silenced and his squad spared further casualties. Residence: Grinnell, Iowa.

FIRST LIEUTENANT GERMAIN M. DALY, OLS10229, Infantry, Headquarters, 411th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy from 22 November 1944 to 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * France. Residence: Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Wounded by Po # 77 - Dec. 21, 1944
*CAPTAIN CORNELIUS F. SCOTT, OI296100, Infantry, Company "F", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On the afternoon of 30 November, 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, CAPTAIN SCOTT's company had been ordered to attack an enemy position heavily defended by enemy small arms fire. In midafternoon CAPTAIN SCOTT was wounded in the leg and knee making it impossible for him to walk. In spite of these wounds and suffering from intense pain, he supervised the reorganization of his company and gave all of the orders for the attack. During the course of the battle, he repeatedly refused to be evacuated. He continued to order the attack for seven hours until he was finally evacuated. His unselfish actions were a great inspiration to his men and contributed materially to the success of his company's mission. Residence: Duluth, Minnesota.

Technician Fifth Grade Jacob M. Solomon, 36545838, Field Artillery Btry. "A", 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Technician Fifth Grade Solomon marched with an infantry company to an advanced position assisting in carrying a radio to aid the forward observer. Under intense and direct enemy small arms and artillery fire, with utter disregard for his personal safety, he remained at the radio enabling our own observer to relay precise information as to enemy gun emplacements. Shell bursts were so close that direct hit on the observer's position was reported. An enemy infantry platoon was harassing the position with small arms fire from an unprotected flank. Disregarding the intense and dangerous enemy fire the operator remained at his radio until the enemy artillery was forced to withdraw and then later remained with the observer so that fire might be directed at enemy tanks within 100 yards of their position. His courageous actions were in accordance with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Technician Fifth Grade (then Private First Class) William F. Haynes, 34496252, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 28 November 1944 in the vicinity of * * * , France, Technician Fifth Grade Haynes, assigned as driver and assistant radio operator to a forward observer,

Shell bursts were so close that a direct hit on the observer's position was reported. An enemy infantry unit was harassing the position with small arms fire from an unprotected flank. Disregarding the intense and dangerous enemy fire Technician Fifth Grade Haynes remained at the radio until the enemy artillery was forced to withdraw and then later remained with the observer so that fire might be directed at enemy tanks within 100 yards of their position. His courageous actions were in accordance with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Residence: Alamo, Tennessee.

Sergeant George L. Smith, Jr., 20756778, Infantry, Cannon Company, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 22 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Sergeant Smith's company was being subjected to an intense enemy mortar concentration. Shells were falling near a loaded ammunition truck, and Sergeant Smith, realizing the great danger to the entire group, took shelter near the truck, hoping for a lull in the action, so that he might move it. However, the enemy attack increased in intensity and Sergeant Smith, at great risk to his own life, ran to the truck and drove it to a safe position. Shortly thereafter a mortar shell fell in the precise spot formerly occupied by the vehicle. As a result of his heroic and unselfish action many casualties were avoided. Realizing that first aid was vitally necessary, he crawled forward amidst bursts of machine gun fire to administer necessary aid to the wounded. While bandaging a casualty, he was wounded by enemy sniper fire, but without heed to his injury and with utter disregard for his own personal safety, Technician Fifth Grade Puente continued his work until all possible aid and treatment could be given. FIRST LIEUTENANT HARRY A. RILEY, JR., O1284399, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 41th Infantry Regiment. For meritoric achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France. Residence: Morgantown, West Virginia.

Private Robert M. Johnson, 38693437, Infantry, Company "D", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. Under intense enemy mortar, artillery and machine gun fire during the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Private Johnson guided a company officer to a platoon that had been cut off by hostile enemy activity. In the process of this hazardous undertaking he was wounded by a shrapnel burst, but with outstanding courage and perseverance he refused medical aid in order that he might accomplish his task without delay. Staff Sergeant Stanley S. Panosko, 36713258, Infantry, Company "D", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * France, Staff Sergeant Panosko's platoon was being subjected to heavy and continuous enemy small arms and mortar fire. At great risk to his own life he repeatedly exposed himself to the enemy fire in order that he might aid and evacuate the wounded men of his platoon. Staff Sergeant Panosko, on his own initiative, then went forward and continuously spotted enemy targets and adjusted effective artillery fire. As a consequence of his courageous actions many fatalities among the wounded were prevented and the destruction of enemy positions was accomplished. Residence: Durand, Illinois.

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-4, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded following named individuals:

Technical Sergeant John C. Rilly, 36552617, Infantry, Company "I", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Technical Sergeant Rilly crawled 75 yards under a terrific barrage of mortar and machine gun fire so that he might give aid to a wounded man. With mortar bursts striking but a few feet from him and machine gun fire but a few inches over his head, he brought the wounded man to safety. Technical Sergeant Rilly's gallant action undoubtedly saved the life of the wounded man. Residence, Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class William F. Gleason, 36614219, Infantry, Company "K", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Private First Class Gleason and three comrades were in an open field pinned down by enemy machine gun and mortar fire. In an attempt to dash for a house about 50 yards away which offered cover, two of the men were immediately hit by the enemy fire, one of them seriously. Private First Class Gleason remained in the field while the other uninjured man crawled to a position where he could call for an aid man. Meanwhile, Private First Class Gleason, crawled through 50 yards of murderous machine gun fire to the most seriously injured man to administer first aid. The fire was so low Private First Class Gleason was unable to rise from the prone position to apply the first aid pack to the wound. He quelled the flow of blood and attempted to make the man as comfortable as possible. When the aid man arrived Private First Class Gleason carried the BAR of the injured and his own rifle to the house and helped cover the advance of his platoon. His gallant action undoubtedly saved one life and contributed materially to the success of the platoons attacked. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Private First Class Robert S. Lukov, 39213067, Infantry, Company "K", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Private First Class Lukov, on his own initiative, established and maintained communication between his company's observation post and platoon. When his radio failed he personally delivered

the messages. Four times, with machine gun and small fire striking all around him, he dashed across open terrain with vital information, each time escaping serious injury or death by the narrowest of margins. Residence: Seattle, Washington.

Private Jack Greener, 36449837, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 16 November 1944 in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Greener dashed through concentrated artillery fire to aid a wounded squad leader. A shrapnel burst struck him in the arm and back but he continued to the side of the wounded man and administered aid, until ordered to go to the aid station for treatment of his own wounds. His gallant action was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Spring Valley, Illinois.

SECOND LIEUTENANT ROBERT E. KRUGER, 01326190, Infantry, Company "I", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, LIEUTENANT KRUGER, on his own initiative, and under extremely heavy machine gun, mortar and small arms fire, crawled and ran over 50 yards to reach a wounded man to bring him back to safety. This gallant action undoubtedly saved the life of his wounded comrade. Residence: Everett, Washington.

SECOND LIEUTENANT CLAIR J. BOYLE, 0534069, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For gallantry in action. During the daylight hours of 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, LIEUTENANT BOYLE, as forward observer to a front line rifle company was pinned to the ground by intense enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire. He displayed magnificent courage in adjusting our artillery fire on enemy installations at the same time he was being fired upon by enemy artillery at a range of only 800 yards. With utter disregard for his personal safety LIEUTENANT BOYLE stayed at his post even though a direct hit was reported on his position. As a result of his superb action the enemy artillery was forced to withdraw suffering heavy casualties. Again at great danger to himself he adjusted fire on enemy tanks which were within a 100 yards of his own observation post and forced them to scatter in a complete rout, and our own column was able to continue its advance. Residence: Ogden, Utah.

Private First Class Carlyle W. Krause, 33464083, Infantry, Company "K", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, our units were making an advance under heavy mortar fire. His squad leader was wounded and at great risk to his own life, Private Krause left the protection of his foxhole and although subjected to heavy mortar and machine gun fire he went to give aid to the wounded man. Not content with this he remained with the wounded man until he himself was wounded by a shrapnel burst. Residence: Matamoras, Pennsylvania.

MAJOR ROBERT L. CROUCH, 0452351, Infantry, Headquarters, 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During the daylight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, MAJOR CROUCH, although pinned to the ground by hostile mortar and machine gun fire, formulated a mutual plan of attack involving tanks and his battalion for the reduction of an enemy strong-point which had stopped a company of his battalion. The plan formulated, MAJOR CROUCH, with magnificent courage and total disregard for his own life, crawled under direct enemy fire to his attacking company commanders to inform them of the plan of attack. This mission accomplished, MAJOR CROUCH personally led the attack against the enemy, resulting in his battalions reaching proposed objective. Residence: Dechard, Tennessee.

CAPTAIN WILLIAM R. PARKER, 01296416, Infantry, Headquarters, First Battalion, 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During the daylight hours of 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, CAPTAIN PARKER pursuing his duties as S-3, First Battalion, was pinned down by intense artillery and mortar fire. With magnificent courage and utter disregard for his personal welfare, CAPTAIN PARKER crawled to the top of a ridge in order to observe enemy installations in the draw below. Sighting enemy artillery in fixed installations he immediately relayed this information to our own artillery. The enemy piece shifted its direction of fire and opened direct fire on CAPTAIN PARKER, with shells landing less than 10 feet away. In this extreme danger CAPTAIN PARKER remained at his vantage point in order that he might continue to relay valuable information to our own artillery. By this outstanding action the enemy artillery was forced to withdraw and the First Battalion continued on its mission until it reached its objective. Residence: Virginia Beach, Virginia.

II -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to following named individuals:

Private Wilbur E. Humble, Jr., 38502537, Infantry, Company "G", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During the daylight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, the advance of our units was being held up by enemy machine gun located in a position of direct observation on our troops. Private Humble, in spite of intense small arms fire, crawled forward in an attempt to wipe out the enemy installation single-handedly. Although seriously wounded by the gun fire Private Humble continued on his mission until killed by a hail of machine gun fire. Residence: New Orleans, Louisiana. In an attempt to relieve his squad from this

Realizing his life was endangered but without heed he fearlessly continued on his mission. 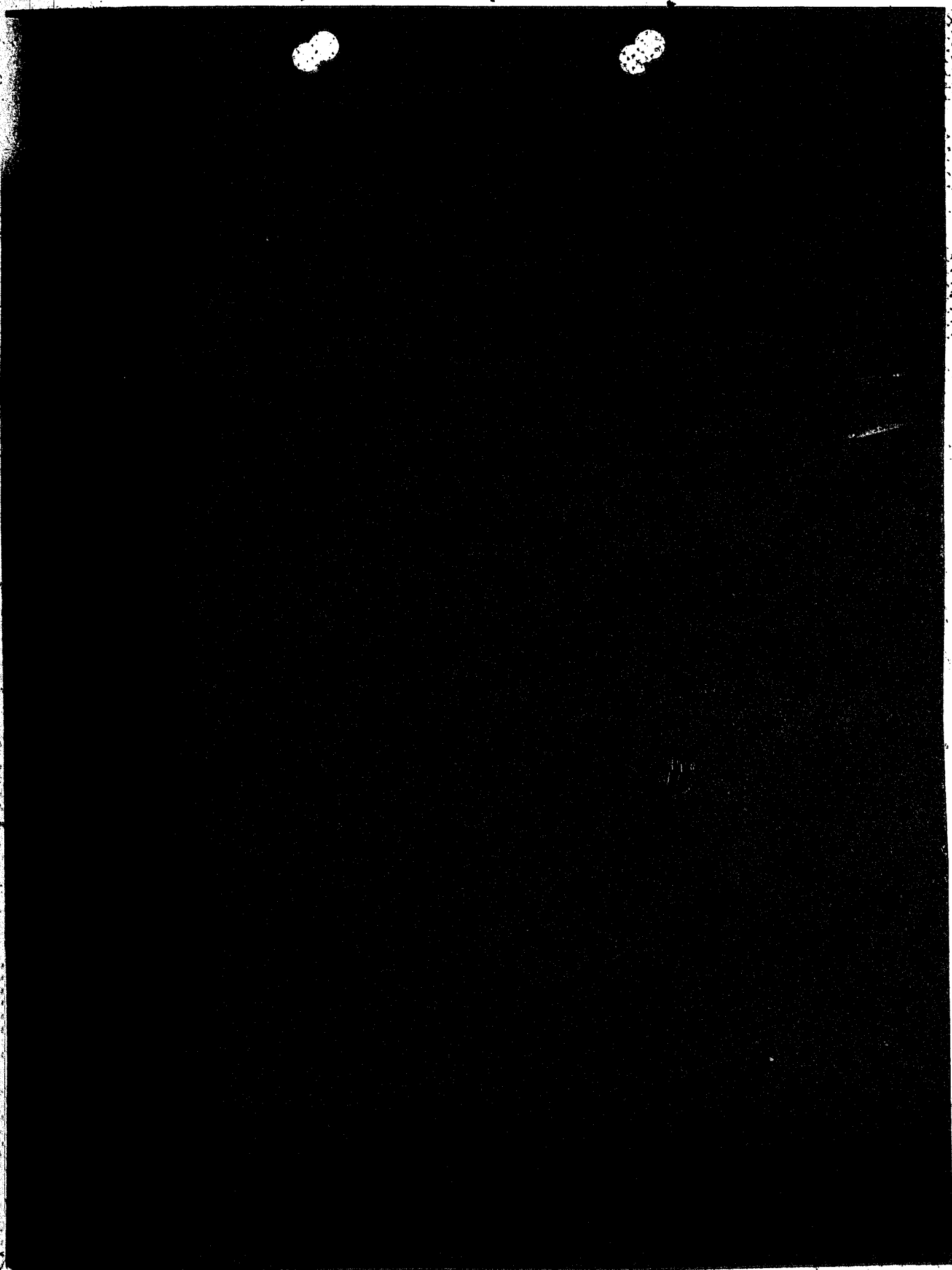

I -- AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded following named individuals:

Corporal John T. Shaefer, 6938924, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Corporal Shaefer, a medical aid man, with utter disregard of personal safety, and on his own initiative, successfully effected the speedy and skillful evacuation of the wounded, although having been wounded in the neck by enemy shrapnel fire. Despite enemy small arms and mortar fire he continued to direct litter squads to the aid of wounded comrades. His magnificent courage was an inspiration to his unit. Residence: Redwood City, California.

Staff Sergeant Morris B. Taylor, 36034815, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 25 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Taylor's platoon was strongly counter-attacked by the enemy. While under heavy enemy artillery and small arms fire he acted upon his own initiative in organizing a squad to repulse the enemy attack. With utter disregard of his safety with magnificent courage, he exposed himself to the withering enemy fire, and was subsequently wounded, but continued to command his group until the enemy counter-attack was successfully repulsed. Residence: Pink Hill, North Carolina.

LIEUTENANT COLONEL HAROLD H. MAY, 0338747, Infantry, Headquarters Third Battalion, 410th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy from 10 November 1944 to 4 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Peoria, Illinois.

CAPTAIN CHARLES H. THOMPSON, 01296451, Infantry, Company "I", 410th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Vienna, Virginia.

SECOND LIEUTENANT THEODORE B. FORD, 0547992, Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 24 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, LIEUTENANT FORD, with his platoon, was pinned to the ground by intense enemy machine gun fire. Observing the enemy's fixed installations less than 150 yards to his front, he crawled back amid a hail of machine gun fire, in order to place our own guns in firing position. Under both our own and enemy fire he again crawled forward with utter disregard for his life in order to assault the opposing machine gun nest. From a distance of 25 yards, as point in his squad, he threw hand grenades while covered by small arms fire, killing four of the enemy and capturing twelve. Residence: Monticello, Mississippi.

* Private William C. Peters, 17162170, Cavalry, 103d Reconnaissance Troop. For heroism in action. On 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Private Peters, as a member of a reconnaissance platoon which was leading a mechanized task force, on his own initiative came forward to aid in the removal of a wounded comrade. With utter disregard of

his personal safety he moved forward across open terrain, under heavy enemy mortar and sniper fire. Private Peters was seriously wounded prior to reaching his wounded comrade. His actions were an inspiration to his unit. Residence: Saint Louis, Missouri.

Technician Fifth Grade Delbert C. Kamman, 37466612, Cavalry, 103d Reconnaissance Troop. For heroism in action. During the day of 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Technician Kamman, as a member of a reconnaissance platoon which was leading a mechanized task force accompanied his platoon leader to rescue a wounded comrade. Enroute, the third member of the party was hit by enemy rifle fire from a sniper in a nearby building. On his own initiative and with magnificent courage, Technician Kamman exposed himself to enemy sniper, mortar, and artillery fire, and calmly covered his platoon leader, who was in the act of evacuating the wounded man. By his heroic action Technician Kamman greatly aided in the safe removal of this wounded man. Residence: Hamburg, Iowa.

Private First Class Kenneth L. Stansell, 34516110, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 26 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Stansell, a company aid man, was pinned down by an intense concentration of enemy mortar fire. In the first barrage he was wounded three times, but despite these wounds, he directed the men in the company as to the proper administering of first aid to his wounded comrades. Throughout the entire barrage Private Stansell carried on courageously, refusing evacuation in order that others might be aided first. Only after the last wounded man had been aided did he submit to evacuation himself. Residence: Seneca, South Carolina.

Staff Sergeant John D. Coones, 37245577, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 3 December 1944, in the vicinity * * *, France. Residence: Galen, Missouri.

Technician Fifth Grade Hyman Schatz, 36716189, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 23 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Sergeant Newton T. Townsend, 36572072, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. Technician Fourth Grade LeRoy P. Schnell, 36289079, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 25 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Plain, Wisconsin.

Sergeant Henry W. Busch, 37447860, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy from 2 December 1944 to 5 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Allison, Iowa.

Private First Class Michael J. Komosa, 36000790, Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Komosa was in position as part of a company perimeter defense when enemy tank fire struck his area. He was wounded in the leg in the first barrage and hastily administered first aid to himself. Hearing the cries of wounded comrades, despite his own injury and with utter disregard for his life, he crawled forward amid a hail of enemy fire to give first aid. Not until the last wounded man was tended did Private Komosa, unaided, walk to the next town to receive medical attention for his own injury. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Private First Class Thomas J. Simpson, 18115113, Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the twilight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Simpson, as a rifleman and a member of the company bazooka team, was pinned down by small arms fire. Without regard for his personal safety he crawled to a position exposed to enemy fire and directed bazooka fire on approaching enemy tanks. As a result of Private Simpson's magnificent courage the tank attack was stopped and his company was able to withdraw with but few casualties. Residence: Houston, Texas.

CAPTAIN CLIFFORD H. HIPPS, 01215863, Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During daylight hours of 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, CAPTAIN HIPPS' company was surrounded and pinned down by heavy enemy artillery and automatic weapons fire. With magnificent courage he exposed himself to intense enemy fire to direct a defense against a strong counter-attack, which was successfully repulsed. He then brought his whole company through encircling enemy, reorganized, and successfully completed his mission. During this action, with utter disregard for his life, he again exposed himself to enemy fire to direct anti-tank fire against enemy armor leading the counter-attack. As a result of this courageous performance, severe casualties were inflicted upon the enemy and the battalion was able to complete its mission. Residence: Columbus, Ohio.

FIRST LIEUTENANT WILLIAM J. DORATO, O1310421, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, LIEUTENANT DORATO was pinned down by intense small arms, machine gun and mortar fire. In order to determine the enemy strength, without regard for his personal safety, he crawled forward to a point of observation. Sighting an enemy machine gun nest, he assembled an assault group and advanced forward to knock it out. In the attack on the enemy strong point LIEUTENANT DORATO was wounded, but despite his injuries crawled back to a fellow officer, reporting his findings. As a result of his magnificent courage the enemy machine gun nest was ultimately destroyed. Residence: New York City, New York.

Private First Class Salvador V. Distefano, 18246925, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the period 29 to 30 November 1944, in daylight and in darkness, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Distefano, an automatic rifleman, was intermittently pinned down by intense mortar fire. Although wounded in the first barrage, he remained at his post, with utter disregard for his life, pouring fire directly into enemy positions. As a result of Private Distefano's magnificent courage, he materially assisted in repulsing an enemy counter-attack. Residence: Hammond, Louisiana.

FIRST LIEUTENANT WESLEY H. BURR, O1310398, Infantry, Headquarters, First Battalion, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, LIEUTENANT BURR, as Battalion S-2, went forward to the attacking company, under intense enemy mortar fire, to assist in establishing an observation post. While forward, during an emergency, LIEUTENANT BURR was placed in command of a company which had withdrawn for reorganization. On his own initiative, he quickly and under intense artillery and small arms fire, with utter disregard for his life, reassembled the company and led them forward to assist in the attack. Residence: Silver Creek, New York.

*Sergeant Samuel A. Oddo, 36518977, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Oddo crawled to a high point under intense artillery and small arms fire to observe the source of enemy activity. By keen observation enemy snipers were located and Sergeant Oddo assembled a squad to displace them. In the advance attack, due to the fierceness of fire, he became detached from his group, but carried on forward with utter disregard for his life. Although wounded in three places he fought his way to the objective and single-handedly wiped out all sniper resistance. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class Raymond S. Hilton, 33461483, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Company "K", 410th

Infantry Regiment was pinned down by devastating cross fire from enemy automatic weapons. Private Milton, company 4th, on his own initiative and displaying a gallant courage, crawled into a severe enemy machine gun fire to administer aid to his wounded comrades. Despite the fire coming from both sides, with utter disregard of his personal safety he successfully administered aid to several wounded comrades. Due to his heroic action several wounded men were saved and removed from the field. Residence: 10755 Junction, Michigan.

Sergeant Joseph T. McCarthy, 32673035, Infantry, Company "H", 41st Infantry Regiment, for heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 24 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant McCarthy was in charge of a machine gun squad, whose mission was to cover the withdrawal of a rifle company in exposed terrain. He, fully cognizant of the extreme danger, exposed himself under intense enemy machine gun and sniper fire, to mount his gun in a strategic position, where he fired eight belts of ammunition. This magnificent courage resulted in a mission completed and the rifle company withdrew successfully. Residence: 1117 10, New York.

Technician Fourth Grade Norman E. Kitzern, 37542499, Medical Department, Medical Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Technical Sergeant, in aid team attached to Company "H", was pinned down by concentrated enemy small arms fire. In this precarious position he heard the cries of a wounded comrade, and with utter disregard for his life, ran forward and heaved fire to administer first aid. While attending the wounded man he was shot three times by enemy sniper fire but continued his mission until the injured man was prepared for evacuation. He administered first aid in all possible ways and could be given did he succumb to execution on his own. Residence: 101, Prairie, Minnesota.

Staff Sergeant Robert E. Howell, 3447210, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 23 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Howell, on his own initiative, went two lines forward to repair the wire communications which had been blown out. About 100 yards out, three German men were hit by an enemy artillery shell, one unable to move because of wounds sustained. Despite the continuous enemy shelling, Sergeant Howell ran forward, picked up the wounded man and carried him to safety. He then brought the wounded man to a shell and Sergeant Howell returned again through enemy artillery fire and successfully repaired the communication line. Residence: Toon, Tennessee.

Private First Class Lawrence L. Schrank, 1811753, Infantry, Company "H", 41st Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 24 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private

Schrank was pinned down by intense and concentrated enemy small arms fire. In the intensity of the fire, he saw his squad leader and a squad scout wounded by enemy artillery. Crawling from his protected position for 50 yards in the face of enemy fire, he reached his wounded comrades and evacuated them, one by one, to safety. Residence: Dallas, Texas.

Private Leo J. Grogan, 33810690, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Leo J. Grogan was pinned to the ground by intense enemy artillery and small arms fire. In the process of crawling to an advantageous position of observation he was hit by shrapnel, but continued on his mission, while his company withdrew to a protected area. Private Grogan remained forward as a point, despite his injury and with utter disregard for his life, to relay vital information as to the enemy's activities. Not until all possible information was reported would he submit to evacuation for medical treatment. As a result of his magnificent courage he materially assisted in repulsing an enemy counter-attack. Residence: Chester, Pennsylvania.

Staff Sergeant Harry G. Alexander, 6148419, Infantry, Company "K", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Alexander, while on patrol to contact a company out of communication was pinned down by intense enemy artillery fire. In this action one member of the patrol was seriously wounded. Fully cognizant of the extreme danger confronting him he led his men to safety. With utter disregard for his life, Sergeant Alexander crawled forward from his protected position under intense fire, reached his wounded comrade, and brought him back to safety. Residence: Hyde Park, Massachusetts.

Private First Class Richard A. Pederson, 373 7285, Infantry, Company "K", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 3 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Pederson, in charge of a section of light machine guns, led his men gallantly and with sound judgment across fire swept terrain to a position where he could deliver fire on an enemy machine gun nest which had the second platoon of Company "K" pinned to the ground. As a result of his magnificent valor and utter disregard for his life, six of the enemy were killed in the action, and the platoon was able to advance. Residence: Wisconsin Dells, Wisconsin.

* Private First Class John D. Purdy, 16175092, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Purdy, with utter disregard for his own safety, advanced to a firing position on top of a hill, and began to fire on an enemy machine gun nest. Despite the knowledge of enemy observation on himself, Private Purdy acted with coolness during this action. Even after Private Purdy was seriously wounded

by enemy artillery fire he pointed out enemy positions to friendly troops to his rear. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Private First Class George L. Lemich, 37460319, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Lemich's company was pinned down by heavy enemy artillery and small arms fire. Private Lemich, with utter disregard for his personal safety, tried to flank the enemy position to gain an advantageous point, and was seriously wounded by machine gun fire. Despite this serious wound Private Lemich continued his efforts, by crawling, to find a firing position. Residence: Madison, Wyoming.

Private First Class Fable Maki, 36549450, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 1 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private First Class Maki was acting as a runner for the battalion commander. When wire communications were severed with the front line companies and contact was no longer possible, Private Maki on his own initiative undertook to deliver a message from the battalion commander to a front line company. To deliver this message Private Maki had to make his way through a sector which was being subjected to heavy enemy artillery fire. With utter disregard of personal safety, and failing to permit this heavy barrage to deter him, he successfully completed his mission and delivered the message. By his heroic action, he was responsible for the re-coordination of the battalion. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Staff Sergeant Charles D. Strad, 3940500, Infantry, Company "M", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 2 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Strad, with his squad, was pinned down by intense enemy small arms fire. As a result of this activity one squad member was killed and five wounded. Realizing the acuteness of the situation, with utter disregard for his life, he boldly exposed himself to enemy observation in order to reconnoiter a safe route of withdrawal. The route established, he led his squad to safety. Displaying magnificent courage, he again crawled forward under fire and evacuated his five wounded squad members to safety in order that medical aid could be administered. Residence: San Diego, California.

CAPTAIN DANIEL J. HALPIN, 04957, Infantry, Company "K", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, CAPTAIN HALPIN, commanding Company "K", was completely surrounded and under intense enemy artillery and machine gun fire. He constantly, with undaunted courage and with utter disregard for his life, exposed himself to direct fire of the enemy, so that he could reorganize and continue his mission. With one officer left in his command, he carried on magnificently in establishing contact with adjacent units. Due to his courageous work, the mission of the battalion was facilitated immeasurably. Residence: Scranton, Pennsylvania.

I -- SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended; the Silver Star is awarded following named individual:

Technical Sergeant Joseph P. Majhor, 19015321, Infantry, Company "M", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. In the dawn of 26 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Majhor was pinned down, with his platoon, by heavy artillery and small arms fire. With utter disregard for his life he skillfully crawled to a position of observation in order to determine the enemy strength. From this vantage point he discovered an enemy machine gun nest and with magnificent courage attacked it single-handedly with hand grenades, killing its crew and knocking out the gun. Private First Class Norwood W. Wilson, Jr., 13186914, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. In the dawn of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Wilson, on duty with Company "I", was pinned to the ground by intense enemy artillery, machine gun and small arms fire. Keenly recognizing a withdrawal was inevitable, Private Wilson, with utter disregard for his life, quickly organized a group of men to protect the withdrawal of the troops to a protective position. Courageously he stood his ground amid a hail of enemy fire and not until he was assured that the last man had reached safety would he submit to withdrawal. * CAPTAIN CHARLES E. FORTSON, 01299242, Infantry, Headquarters, 409th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy from 8 November 1944 to 2 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Birmingham, Michigan.

Private First Class George P. Addington, 36411294, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Reed City, Michigan.

Private First Class Thomas H. Cullen, 6713636, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Cullen, on his own initiative, went forward through unknown terrain into enemy territory in order to determine the location of the battalion command post, which had been cut off from communication with the company. Crawling over hazardous terrain in the face of enemy fire, Private Cullen, with utter disregard for his life, pushed on tirelessly until the battalion command post was located. As a result of his heroic actions, the stranded company was brought back to battalion control and saved it from possible annihilation. Residence: Syracuse, New York.

Technical Sergeant Kenneth D. Luplow, 36547192, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the day of 2 December 1944, in the village of * * *, France, Sergeant Luplow's platoon was engaging the enemy in house to house fighting. As one of his squad leaders advanced across an open gap between two houses, the squad leader was severely wounded in the leg by sniper fire. Disregarding his personal safety, Sergeant Luplow rushed into the open where the wounded squad leader lay. In spite of constant sniper fire, he rushed to his side, aided him to the protection of a shed and there applied a tourniquet to the squad leader's leg. Private First Class Edward A. Tomcavage, 36550461, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 2 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Tomcavage went forward with an officer in an effort to locate enemy snipers. While advancing across open terrain covered by enemy snipers and the target of enemy mortars, he was told by the officer to seek cover. As the officer advanced enemy snipers opened fire, hitting the officer. Without regard for his own safety Private Tomcavage advanced one hundred and fifty yards to the officer across this fire. Although under fire, he administered first aid and carried the officer to the aid station. The fire concentrated on him while he did this. Technician Fifth Grade William E. Sackett, 36160186, Infantry, Company "E", 411th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Jerome, Michigan.

Private First Class John P. Mason, Jr., 18213005, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 25 November 1944, in the village of * * *, France, Private Mason was placed on guard at his company command post. While on post the enemy staged a counter-attack and his post was assaulted. In the ensuing action he was seriously wounded by a grenade. Despite the pain he did not cry out, but continued on the alert until relieved an hour later. By his coolness under fire he materially aided in breaking up the counter-attack. Residence: Newellton, Louisiana.

Sergeant James G. Smith, 16050683, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the period of 25 and 26 November 1944, in the village of * * *, France, Sergeant Smith manned an enemy machine gun when our troops ran low in ammunition and automatic weapons. With only a limited amount of ammunition, he successfully broke up an enemy counter-attack by holding his fire until the enemy forces were within fifty yards of his position. His action, in the face of superior forces, accounted for three enemy killed and materially aided in breaking up an aggressive enemy counter-attack. Residence: Union Grove, Wisconsin.

Private First Class Louis R. Foley, 31355643, Infantry, Cannon Company, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Foley, acting as a radio operator, on his own initiative, crawled forward under intense enemy fire in order to attain a more advantageous position for observation of the enemy. During the daylight hours of 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Corporal Coleman, Code Clerk, was working at his assigned task when subjected to a concentrated enemy artillery barrage. With undaunted courage, he remained at his post until forced to the street, when shrapnel demolished sections of the building in which he was located. Quickly observing the necessity of additional help for the over-burdened aid men, with utter disregard for his life, he braved the shrapnel ridden streets to assist in the evacuation of the wounded. During the twilight hours of 26 November 1944 in the vicinity of * * * *, France, LIEUTENANT MARSHALL, with his company, was pinned to the ground by intense enemy mortar fire. At the time of the barrage he was in the rear of the column, but when the intense fire started, he calmly walked the entire length of the column, and intelligently dispersed his men to positions of safety. Not until he was assured that all men were properly dug in did he seek cover himself. His coolness and alacrity of judgment was an inspiration to all. Residence: Reynolds, Georgia.

SECOND LIEUTENANT ROGER L. LOVING, 0548220, Infantry, Cannon Company, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, LIEUTENANT LOVING, an observer for cannon fire, was able to direct fire on enemy mortars which were employed only two hundred yards from our infantry. Because of this close proximity to our lines it was imperative that these mortars be destroyed. He established an observation post in a vantage point close to the enemy position. So close was the enemy that in shifting deflection of his guns he brought several rounds down upon himself, one round hitting the position. Because of his deep devotion to duty he continued to fire from this post until the enemy was completely destroyed. On the following night he repeated this heroic act under similar conditions and was wounded by enemy fire. Even when wounded he refused evacuation and continued his

During the night of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Fitze, on his own initiative went forward through unknown terrain, into enemy territory in order to determine the location of the battalion command post, which had been cut off from communication with the company. Crawling over hazardous terrain, in the face of enemy sniper fire, Sergeant Fitze, with utter disregard for his life pushed on tirelessly until the battalion command post was located. As a result of his heroic efforts, the stranded company was brought back to battalion control and saved from possible annihilation. Residence: Owatonna, Minnesota.

Sergeant Oscar E. Anderson, 37275861, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 25 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Anderson, on his own initiative, and with utter disregard for his life, dashed into an open field amid a hail of enemy bullets to aid a wounded comrade. When all possible aid had been administered he personally carried the casualty back to the aid station, harrassed all the way by sniper fire. Residence: Duluth, Minnesota.

SECOND LIEUTENANT JOSEPH W. WALKER, JR., 01059691, Infantry, Company "M", 411th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Pine Bluff, Arkansas.

Technician Fifth Grade Joseph W. Sterner, 17146402, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 26 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Denver, Colorado.

Private Morris D. Samolovich, 36953881, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 1 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, his company ran into heavy enemy artillery and mortar concentrations. Shortly after the order was given to dig in, the enemy again laid down artillery and mortar fire. One shell landed at the edge of a comrade's foxhole, covering him with dirt and rocks. Realizing that vital communication lines would be severed by the severity of the concentration, despite warnings of the impending danger that would ensue, Technician Herreid crawled forward along the line, repairing breaks as he progressed. Although twice forced to take cover by the intensity of the concentration, he pushed on with undaunted courage and utter disregard for his life. As a result of Technician Herreid's magnificent valor and untiring efforts, communication was maintained, materially assisting the success of the Regiment in the attack. SECOND LIEUTENANT CHARLES A. NICKERSON, JR., 01180281, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 362nd Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. During the twilight hours of 2 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, LIEUTENANT NICKERSON and his operator were accompanying the 411th Infantry. Seeking observation, they found a vantage point which soon came under hostile artillery fire. The dispatch case and clothing of LIEUTENANT NICKERSON were torn by shell fragments. Realizing it was imperative to locate the source of the enemy fire, with utter disregard for his life, he remained in position until he placed probable sites of artillery pieces. Not being able to contact his battalion by radio, he established contact with the battalion liaison plane and directed its attention to these areas. Private Bernard J. Lyles, 36548846, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Wyandotte, Michigan.

Technician Fourth Grade Russel N. Gunderson, 17159303, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Hurbank, South Dakota.

Sergeant Stanley Rutkowski, 36626137, Infantry, Company "M", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. His devotion to duty in the face of heavy enemy fire inspired his men with confidence and materially assisted the accomplishment of the mission, which was that of covering a nearby company's withdrawal from an extremely hazardous position. Private First Class Ralph C. Buska, 37562633, Infantry, Company "C", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Buska, while advancing as a member of the point in an attacking company, became subjected to intense small arms and automatic weapons fire. Having sought protection from the barrage, he observed one member of the squad floundering in a stream, evidently the victim of sniper fire. He removed his excess clothing, donned house slippers and crept stealthily through many enemy installations, not once being detected. By his fearlessness and during course he obtained information for subsequent operation that were of extreme tactical importance. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Private First Class Francis W. Shedd, 34546603, Infantry, Company "G", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the twilight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Shedd, was in charge of a machine gun designated to give protecting fire to advancing troops. Realizing his position was not satisfactory, with utter disregard for his life, Private Shedd crawled to a vantage point in direct observation of the enemy. As the point approached, enemy machine guns opened fire forcing him to withdraw. With undaunted courage, he single-handedly raked the enemy with fire and simultaneously gave directions for mortar barrage, disrupting their activity and forcing them to fall back in utter confusion. Residence: Orlando, Florida.

Private First Class Edward C. Adamczyk, 36549112, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 41th Infantry Regiment. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 25 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF SILVER STAR II

I -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded following named individuals:

Staff Sergeant Joseph M. Haroch, 6907833 (then Sergeant), Infantry, Company "A", 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 22 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Haroch's platoon was being held up by a strongly defended enemy machine gun nest. Ignoring bursts of fire all around him, Sergeant Haroch crawled forward and attempted to throw grenades into the opening of the machine gun dugout. Momentarily driven back by enemy grenades, without hesitation, he again attacked the enemy position and fired a BAR into the embrasure. His courageous action forced five of the enemy to surrender and the rest was eliminated, thus allowing his platoon to continue its advance. Residence: Bayonne, New Jersey.

SECOND LIEUTENANT THOMAS W. JONES, 0537860, Infantry, Cannon Company, 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During the attack on the town of * * *, France, on the night of 30 November 1944, LIEUTENANT JONES was attached to Company "I" as forward observer. The Company was brought to a halt by heavy enemy fire from both flanks and from the center. The enemy poured a tremendous volume of machine gun, small arms and mortar fire into the beleaguered company. With the Company facing almost certain annihilation, LIEUTENANT JONES, on his own initiative and with great gallantry, crawled forward through the enemy fire to a point overlooking the enemy positions, in order to effectively direct fire on them. Upon reaching this position, LIEUTENANT JONES, with utter disregard of his life, ordered Company "I" to throw a protective curtain of fire between him and the enemy. After locating the enemy positions in the darkness, he continued to direct fire upon them throughout the night. Due to his outstanding valor, and magnificent courage the danger of the Company being annihilated was eliminated and heavy casualties were inflicted upon the enemy. His gallant action and self-sacrifice was an inspiration to the entire regiment. Residence: Washington, D. C.

First Sergeant John A. Lovold, 6861608, Infantry, Company , 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 27 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Sergeant Lovold was in charge of the unloading of an ammunition vehicle when enemy artillery began to drop in the area. An artillery burst hit the vehicle, setting it on fire, and .30 calibre ammunition began to explode. Without hesitation, Sergeant Lovold left a position of comparative security, seized a fire extinguisher, and approaching within ten feet of the vehicle, began to extinguish the blaze which threatened to explode 81mm mortar shells. His gallant action, in the face of almost certain death or injury, undoubtedly prevented many casualties among the men in the area. Residence: Redfield, South Dakota.

CAPTAIN CURTIS C. NEELY, 01296408, Infantry, Company "C", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During an attack near * * * , France, on 29 November 1944, CAPTAIN NEELY'S company came under intense enemy mortar, machine gun and small arms fire. During this onslaught a fellow officer was severely wounded by enemy fire. With utter disregard for his own safety he dashed forward through a hail of enemy bullets to rescue the wounded officer. Because of excellent enemy observation on him, an enemy barrage pinned him down. Undaunted, he skillfully called for the artillery to fire smoke shells to screen his movements from enemy observation. The smoke screen did not prove to be effective and in the meantime the wounded officer was hit again. With magnificent courage CAPTAIN NEELY gallantly crawled forward and was successful in evacuating the wounded officer to safety. Later in the day CAPTAIN NEELY again displayed his exceptional courage by carrying a machine gun on his back and placing it in a position in which an enemy machine gun was knocked out of action. As a result of CAPTAIN NEELY'S gallant action a life was saved and the Company was able to take its objective on schedule. Residence: Monroe, Michigan.

Private First Class Huston B. Cox, 34464873, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Private Cox crawled twenty-five yards under heavy machine gun fire to administer aid to a wounded comrade. The fire was so low that he had to remain in a prone position to administer aid, but he completed the task and then assisted the wounded man to safety. Again he went back through the same intense fire to give aid to another man who was seriously wounded. A short time later, upon learning that a comrade had been wounded and was trapped in a building, he ran and crawled over the same area, drawing heavy machine gun, mortar and sniper fire, and administered aid. Private Cox's gallant and completely unselfish actions were an inspiration to the entire unit. Residence: Lumberton, North Carolina.

First Sergeant William T. Hollis, 36550358 (then Technical Sergeant), Infantry, Company "D", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During the night of 26 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * * , France, Sergeant Hollis, traveling with a convoy carrying rations and ammunition,

was attacked by enemy patrols. On his own initiative, Sergeant Hollis took command of the convoy and with utter disregard for his life, killed three of the enemy, rallied the group and proceeded with the convoy. Repeatedly, he was held up by intricate road blocks, but heedless of enemy fire which was constantly threatening his life, he removed the road blocks so that the convoy could get through. At times the enemy was so close that he was subjected to enemy grenade fire, but he refused to be stopped. Ignoring the grenades and small arms fire he used an axe to destroy the enemy road blocks, leaving himself exposed and without defense against the enemy fire. His coolness under fire and courageous devotion to duty was in accordance with the highest standards of the military service. Residence: Lapeer, Michigan.

During the daylight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Technician Field, medical aid man attached to Company "C", was accompanying the front line attacking companies when they were subjected to an intense concentration of enemy machine gun and small arms fire. Observing a wounded comrade in need of immediate medical attention, he crawled from cover with utter disregard for his life, to administer first aid. As he advanced about 25 yards, amid a hail of enemy fire, he suffered wounds from enemy machine guns. Despite his wounds, and with magnificent courage, he pushed forward toward the injured man. Just as he reached his comrade's side, a hail of machine gun fire raked the area where he was located, mortally wounding him. SECOND LIEUTENANT ARNOLD E. SIMON, 0541603, Infantry, Company "A", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During the daylight hours of 2 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, LIEUTENANT SIMON, on his own initiative and with a magnificent display of courage, skillfully crawled forward into enemy territory in order to detect the location of enemy sniper fire. Throughout the day sniper fire had been harrassing his troops, slowing their advance. With utter disregard for his life, along with a member of his platoon, he advanced across an open field in full view of enemy observers and under intermittent mortar fire. Half way across the open terrain he cautioned his companion to seek cover, while he personally reconnoitered the route. His skill in the tactical approach was unsurpassed, and he located the source of enemy fire. On his return trip he was spotted by enemy observers and struck down by a hail of fire, falling mortally wounded. As a result of his magnificent courage, the Company was able to ascertain the enemy strongpoint. Throughout this

Sergeant Allen then returned to his platoon and organized them for an assault on the enemy strongpoint. With utter disregard for his life he led his platoon forward, knowing that no communications were available to contact support in the rear. (When pinned down by strong enemy fire, he placed his men in comparative safety.) Then, showing great devotion to duty, he fearlessly exposed himself to enemy fire in order that the source of fire could be ascertained. While carrying out this valiant task Sergeant Allen was killed by the intense enemy fire. Throughout this action his conduct was in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Private First Class Dominic J. DeNicola, 36712627, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 4 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private DeNicola, on his own initiative, went forward with one other man to sweep a road clear of mines which was to be used as a supply route. He moved forward under intense enemy mortar and sniper fire with utter disregard for his life. Prior to reaching their objective, his comrade was wounded by a mortar shell but he continued on with undaunted courage. Having only forty rounds of ammunition, Sergeant Majewski allowed the enemy to come within 50 yards of his position before opening fire. At least three of the enemy were killed, and the counter-attack broken up. Sergeant Majewski's coolness under fire and good judgment reflected credit on the military service. Technical Sergeant Raymond F. Sima, 36714392, Infantry, Company "H", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 11 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Brun.'s company came under a heavy barrage of enemy artillery and mortar fire. During the initial stage of this action, five men of the company were wounded. Necessitating immediate action, Private Brun., with undaunted courage and utter disregard for his life, left his covered position, crawled to the aid of the men, and administered the necessary first aid. As a result of this magnificent valor, the lives of five men were saved. Residence: La Grange, Texas.

Staff Sergeant Steve A. Novak, 36359619, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Novak accompanied an advance element into the enemy line. In this forward position the enemy encircled our forces and concentrated small arms and artillery fire on our men, wounding several. Sergeant Novak, without regard to his personal safety, exposed himself to intense fire to bring the wounded to the safety of a house. Realizing the precarious position they were in, he returned through the encircling enemy to the rear, and brought much needed transportation to the wounded. Again he returned through the enemy lines, evacuating the wounded to the rear. Because of his courageous efforts, all casualties were given prompt medical care. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Sergeant Joseph F. LeBeau, 36549556, Infantry, Company "I", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant LeBeau's company was subjected to such heavy enemy artillery and small arms fire that a withdrawal was imperative. On his own initiative, and with utter disregard for his own safety, he chose to remain behind and see if any of our troops were wounded. Under constant enemy observation, he courageously checked the area. Finding a seriously wounded comrade, through a hail of enemy fire, Sergeant LeBeau carried his wounded comrade to safety. His heroic action saved the life of the soldier and was an inspiration to the men in his company. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Staff Sergeant Howard W. Bishop, 37550637, Infantry, Company "F", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the twilight hours of 26 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant

Bishop observed two men in his squad drop to the ground on a nearby hill, the victims of enemy sniper fire. He administered first aid immediately and seeing it physically impossible to evacuate both men at once, he took them one at a time down the precarious slope until he reached a point of safety. Sergeant Bishop performed these deeds of magnificent valor with utter disregard for his own life. Residence: St. Paul, Minnesota.

Private Irmn A. Campbell, 16105884, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 16 November 1944 and the daylight hours of 17 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Campbell, medical aid man attached to Company "H", worked valiantly and tirelessly in administering first aid to the wounded. In one instance he observed three aid men shot down by enemy sniper fire, while attempting to give aid to the wounded. With utter disregard for his life and fully cognizant of the impending danger, he dashed forward under intense fire, reached the men and administered medical aid. As a result of Private Campbell's outstanding valor the lives of several men were undoubtedly saved. Residence: Saginaw, Michigan.

Private First Class Clyde F. Himmal, 36669574, Infantry, Headquarters, First Battalion, 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 24 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Himmal, in company with his battalion commander and S-2, was pinned down by intense enemy machine gun and automatic weapons fire. Sensing the precarious position of all personnel, Private Himmal, with utter disregard for his life, secured a rifle and single-handedly attacked the machine gun nest wiping them out. After this courageous mission was accomplished he firmly stood his ground silencing all enemy sniper fire. Private First Class Arthur R. Couture, 36553780, Infantry, Company "C", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 24 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Couture, a machine gunner, was supporting an attack on the enemy, when intense hostile machine gun fire opened up, pinning our troops down. The ferociousness of the enemy's attack necessitated an immediate withdrawal of our forces. Without regard to his personal welfare he courageously remained at his gun and single-handedly held off the enemy until our troops reached safety. Only after the last man had withdrawn did he leave his exposed position and carry his gun to the rear. His heroic actions while under strong enemy fire, enabled our men to seek necessary cover, and undoubtedly saved many lives. Residence: Bay City, Michigan.

Private First Class James G. Alexander, 32549276, Infantry, Company "R", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the twilight hours of 3 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Alexander and his Company Commander, were creasing open terrain in an effort to

contact another company. As they approached this company, an enemy patrol opened fire, forcing them to hit the ground. Fully cognizant of the danger and with utter disregard for his own safety, Private Alexander, with magnificent courage, opened fire, killing one man and forcing the retreat of an enemy patrol. Sergeant Van Mor Lu Perron, 36411917, Infantry, Company "B", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Lu Perron was pinned to the ground by intense enemy artillery and mortar fire. Observing a comrade wounded by enemy fire, he dashed boldly in the face of the enemy to rescue him. Reaching the spot he found the injured man pinned to the ground by a fallen log. He removed the log and courageously dragged the casualty to safety. After this valorous mission was completed he returned to his area and led them into a position on a hill whereby they could place direct fire on the enemy. As a result of Sergeant Lu Perron's magnificent courage, the enemy was prevented from advancing on the right flank and our troops successfully advanced to their objective. Private First Class Earl J. Gardner, Jr., 34812025, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the twilight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, a patrol was moving through a thickly wooded area, under intense machine gun and rifle fire. On investigating an intricate road block, a member of the patrol stepped on a shoe mine, inflicting lacerations of the body. Private Gardner was immediately called, and in administering first aid, stepped on a anti-personnel mine, seriously wounding himself. With the loss of his foot, an eye and other lacerations of the body, Private Gardner directed the platoon leader as to the proper administering of first aid to his wounded comrade. During the daylight hours of 24 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Howard, medical aid man attached to Company "F", was pinned down by intense enemy mortar and artillery fire. Observing a fallen comrade nearby, he dashed through a hail of enemy fire, with utter disregard for his life, to give first aid. While giving aid he was struck by shrapnel but continued on with undaunted courage despite his wounds, after all possible aid had been administered he carried the injured man over a mile to the Battalion aid station. AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded following named individuals:

CAPTAIN JOHN A. MOORE, JR., O363114, Chemical Warfare Service, Third Chemical Battalion, motorized. For gallantry in action. During the daylight hours of 26 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, CAPTAIN MOORE'S company was providing mortar support for the Second Battalion of the 409th Infantry Regiment. On a forced march, a strongly fortified enemy road block was encountered by the group. Fully cognizant of the precarious position, CAPTAIN MOORE quickly advanced to the front of the column in order to ascertain the enemies strength. In full view of enemy observers, he courageously sped forward amid a hail of hostile fire emanating from concealed implacements less than 50 yards away. In the confusion of battle, friendly tanks approaching the area, opened fire to the south. Realizing the troops upon which the tanks were firing to be our own, with utter disregard for his life and displaying magnificent courage, he dashed up and down the row of tanks, between cross fire, shouting and banging on the sides in order that they would cease firing. This bold mission accomplished, he, with the aid of two soldiers, fearlessly set forth to destroy the enemy strongpoint. Under protective fire, he valiantly raced across 40 yards of open terrain, attacked the emplacement single-handedly, forcing the enemy to surrender. He then advanced to within 10 yards of an enemy hold house, but was forced back by intense machine pistol fire. Two other soldiers in the meanwhile were cut down by hostile fire as they attempted the same route of approach. Skillfully maneuvering into another route of advance, he again single-handedly attacked the house with only two rounds of ammunition left. As a result of his aggressive action the enemy were completely taken by surprise and forced to surrender. Throughout this entire action, CAPTAIN MOORE'S magnificent courage reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

LIEUTENANT COLONEL CHARLES L. McMACKIN, O383322, Infantry, Headquarters First Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 23 November 1944, in the * * *, France, COLONEL McMACKIN displayed superb leadership and coolness under fire, while directing the attack of his battalion, and a dangerous river crossing was successfully accomplished. COLONEL McMACKIN personally and energetically supervised and directed the attack. For over six hours he was under constant sniper fire which harassed and endangered his life. MAJOR SEYMOUR B. SATTERWHITE, O301720, Infantry, Headquarters, 411th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. During daylight hours of 25 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, MAJOR SATTERWHITE, as Regimental S-3, executed a superb plan of attack, involving two battalions in order that two villages might be captured simultaneously. Over extremely mountainous terrain and under trying physical conditions he kept pace with the troops in order to ascertain the outcome of the plan. Enemy machine gun and mortar fire endangered and harassed him, but ignoring the danger to his life, he energetically and personally supervised the execution of the plan of attack. Despite bullets striking all around him, his leadership was superb and his judgment cool. Four times he fearlessly crossed fire-swept terrain so that he might execute his plan. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to following named individual:

Staff Sergeant Adolph A. Lucchesi, 36716475, Infantry, Company "C", 410th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. While advancing over hilly and densely wooded terrain in the vicinity of * * *, France, during the daylight hours on 21 November 1944, the platoon of which Sergeant Lucchesi was a member, was pinned down by heavy enemy machine gun fire. Sergeant Lucchesi, whose squad was in support, realized that the only effective method of silencing this enemy position was by a flanking movement. In order to make this flanking movement, his squad had to cross an open field which was covered by withering fire from two enemy machine gun emplacements. Rather than expose his squad to murderous fire, he led them to the edge of the woods, and with great gallantry advanced across the open field alone. With utter disregard for his life, he successfully carried on his work, though constantly under heavy enemy mortar fire. On numerous occasions, the closeness of the enemy subjected him to small arms fire, but this did not deter him. The communication line was repeatedly shot out by enemy mortar fire. Due to his great devotion to duty, and coolness under fire, rapid communications were always available between the front line observers and the fire direction center. Had it not been for his excellent ability and fearlessness in the face of enemy fire, our infantry's attack on its objective would have been greatly impeded. Residence: Chicago, Illinois.

Corporal Gay Gennett, 33762838, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 383d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. During an attack by our infantry on 2 December 1944, Corporal Gennett was in charge of a wire team, whose mission was to install a line from * * *, France to an infantry regiment other than their regularly assigned combat team. Corporal Gennett, constantly exposed to heavy enemy small arms and mortar fire, courageously led and directed his team in the installing of this vital communication line. Several times during the day the line was shot out by enemy mortar fire, but each time, Corporal Gennett, with utter disregard for his life, assisted in the repair of the break. His heroic actions enabled his battalion to effectively carry out its mission of direct support to the Infantry. Residence: Geistown, Pennsylvania.

Private Gordon R. Bishop, 6246019, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Bishop, with one other man, on his own initiative, crawled forward into enemy held territory to locate a missing squad from Company "A". Fully cognizant of the impending danger and with utter disregard for his life, he skillfully maneuvered his way across a half mile of open terrain in full view of the enemy. Under the constant threat of mortar and automatic weapons fire, he pushed relentlessly on until he reached his objective. This brilliant operation made it possible for the lost squad to return safely to company control. Private Bishop's display of magnificent valor reflected the highest traditions of the military service and served as an inspiring example of courage to all. Residence: Merino, Colorado.

I -- AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded following named individuals:

Staff Sergeant Elmer Balko, 36548765, Infantry, Company "M", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 23 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Balko, with a ration carrying party, was subjected to an intense enemy artillery barrage. In the devastating concentration, four members of the party were severely wounded. Sergeant Balko, only observing the necessity of administering first aid immediately, dashed fearlessly to the side of the men. With utter disregard for his life he efficiently and calmly attended each man despite the withering fire that blasted the area. He personally evacuated each of the men to safety after all possible aid had been given. Assured that these men were safe he reorganized the party, picked up the vitally needed rations, and led the detail to protection. As a result of Sergeant Balko's display of outstanding courage, professional medical attention was administered promptly to the injured men, and rations for the attacking troops were saved. Residence: Northville, Michigan.

Private First Class John A. Corey, 36827400, Infantry, Company "K", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Corey, on his own initiative skillfully crawled to an observation point in direct view of the enemy in order to ascertain their impending movements. While maneuvering into position he was subjected to enemy artillery and sniper fire, but continued on his mission with undaunted courage and utter disregard for his life. He reached his vantage point successfully and was able to relay vital information back to his company commander which enabled our troops to place accurate fire into enemy positions, completely disrupting their proposed plans. As a result of Private Corey's outstanding valor under these harrowing conditions the company was able to reach their objective expeditiously. Residence: Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin.

Sergeant William T. McGregor, 18073379, (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 12 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant McGregor advancing with his squad was subjected to intense and accurate enemy machine gun fire. Observing his squad leader hit by enemy bullets, he quickly took command of the squad and maneuvered them out of enemy range. Reaching a protected area he immediately reorganized the squad and led them skillfully forward to an advantageous position of observation. When he was assured all guns were in their proper places he gave the order to open fire, resulting in the complete destruction of the hostile machine gun nest. As a result of Sergeant McGregor's rapidity of judgment and brilliant operative ability under fire the company was able to push forward, reaching its objective successfully. Residence: Abilene, Texas.

Private First Class Robert A. Anderson, 16106087, Infantry, Company "L", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Anderson, on his own initiative crawled forward, with utter disregard for his life, to contact the enemy and ascertain their strength. He encountered the enemy on his advance forward killing one and wounding one other. Not certain he had reached the center of their defenses he pushed farther on oblivious of harassing sniper fire. In a subsequent activity he again met hostile forces capturing two of them. His mission accomplished he skillfully withdrew to his own lines with vital and valuable information as to the location of enemy strongpoints. As a result of Private Anderson's outstanding valor and brilliant maneuverability in hostile territory the company was able to advance toward its objective successfully. Residence: Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Private First Class Conrad A. Herrmann, 32963711, Infantry, Company "E", 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 24 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Herrmann was advancing toward enemy lines as a patrol member when subjected to intense enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire. Observing a wounded comrade abandoning a vehicle, he courageously dashed forward amid a hail of devastating enemy fire to assist the wounded man. With utter disregard for his life he quickly rendered aid while bullets raked the entire area where he stood. Having given all possible attention to his comrade, he placed him carefully in the vehicle, turned it around in the face of the enemy and rushed the wounded man to the battalion aid station. As a result of Private Herrmann's display of outstanding valor the life of one man was saved and a vehicle was retrieved from the easy grasp of the approaching enemy forces. Residence: Glendale, New York.

Corporal John J. Iota, 37400510, Field Artillery, Battery "B", 384th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 14 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, intense mortar fire began falling in the area near Corporal Iota. Seeing a mortar shell explode

near a fellow soldier on the adjoining road, Corporal Lotz with utter disregard for his life, dashed over the enemy observed terrain to the wounded men. Unable to give adequate aid, he courageously carried the wounded man over a hundred yards of dangerous terrain to a safer position. Then, with unswerving determination he again ran through hostile fire to secure medical aid. As a result of his magnificent valor, the life of a wounded comrade was saved. Residence: Saint Louis, Missouri.

Technical Sergeant Douglas A. Driver, 34575160, Inf ntry, Company "K", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the twilight hours of 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Driver, with his platoon, occupied the village of * * * to protect the right flank of his company. He, with five men, remained behind while the balance of the platoon advanced to protect the flank. He received word that the enemy was occupying a house strategically located in town and definitely threatening their position. Sergeant Driver skillfully deployed his men as a covering force while he crawled to the house to ascertain whether or not the enemy lurked inside. With utter disregard for his life he openly exposed himself to their observation calling for them to surrender. Not heeding his shouts, he crawled to within 30 feet of the house and fired an anti-tank grenade directly through the door. As a result of Sergeant Driver's magnificent valor one of the enemy was killed, 10 were captured and the impending danger to his platoon was removed. Residence: Thomaston, Georgia.

Technician Fifth Grade Raymond P. Nyffeler, 37476435, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Technician Nyffeler, medical aid man attached to Company "K", was subjected to an intense enemy mortar and artillery barrage. Observing two seriously wounded men in the immediate area, he fearlessly dashed from his protected position to administer aid. In the process of attending the men he was the victim of shrapnel, suffering painful wounds. Despite these wounds, he continued on magnificently with utter disregard for his life. He evacuated both men after all possible aid had been administered and then courageously kept up with his company all day in order to give medical assistance wherever necessary. Residence: Columbus, Nebraska.

Private First Class Ned O. Wiedbrauk, 36413070, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 30 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Wiedbrauk, medical aid man attached to Company "G", observed his company pinned down by intense small arms and mortar fire. Heeding the cries of the wounded he fearlessly dashed from cover to give all aid possible. Cognizant of the fact that the other company aid men had been wounded he redoubled his efforts to give prompt attention to all within his control. Working under constant sniper fire he continued his work courageously, completely oblivious of the withering fire raking his position. As a result of his outstanding valor and coolness under fire at least twelve wounded men were given efficient treatment. After all possible aid had been rendered he supervised the evacuation of all the wounded men and not until he was assured that professional attention had been rendered did he return to his post. Residence: Curran, Michigan.

Staff Sergeant Louis R. Murphy, 36547522, Field Artillery, Battery "C", 382d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 16 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Sergeant Murphy, while in the forward observation post was informed that the wire communications to the infantry were out and radio contact could not be maintained. Believing the interference to be attributed to the low trees, he carried the radio to open terrain while under intense enemy mortar and machine gun fire. Hoodless of the devastating fire that raked his position he coolly remained at his post with utter disregard for his life. With contact established, he relayed vital information back to his fire direction center enabling them to concentrate accurate fire on enemy strongpoints. As a result of Sergeant Murphy's outstanding valor vital information was relayed and the infantry was materially assisted in the successful advance to their objective. Residence: Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class Robert C. Colby, 35557965, Infantry, Company "C", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 1 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, when his platoon precariously cut off from the rest of the company, Private Colby, with utter disregard for his life, courageously slipped through the heavily occupied enemy lines to find the company. Running and crawling over the dense brush, he successfully infiltrated through the heavily enemy infested woods. Finding his company, Private Colby, unhesitatingly led them through the fire-swept woods to his platoon. As a result of his intrepidity, his company gained its objective with outstanding success. Residence: Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Private First Class Levi G. Williams, 37568602, Infantry, Company "K", 410th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the daylight hours of 29 November 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Williams occupied a position outside a school building, formerly an enemy observation post, as enemy artillery blasted the area in his immediate vicinity. Oblivious of the devastating fire he courageously remained at his post, with utter disregard for his life, while others were ordered to places of safety. Armed only with an automatic weapon he observed a hostile group preparing to storm the building. Private Williams opened fire directly into the oncoming group scattering them in all directions and forcing a temporary withdrawal. He continued firing until relief arrived, assisting materially in holding off the enemy counter-attack. As a result of Private Williams' outstanding valor the building was held and an enemy counter-attack repulsed. Residence: Sisseton, North Dakota.

Private First Class Robert A. Bowen, 35058801, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 411th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. During the night of 17 December 1944, in the vicinity of * * *, France, Private Bowen, with his battalion commander advanced into a town to ascertain if another battalion had accomplished their mission of occupying the area. Arriving at the outskirts of the town he learned that it was occupied by the enemy.
