When an assault boat was struck by an enemy shell and sunk during the assault crossing of the Saar River near Ayl, Germany, Sergeant Harrison, a squad leader, observed that one of the crew members had been wounded and was struggling in the water. Despite the prevalence of heavy enemy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire, he fearlessly plunged into the icy water, swam to the wounded soldier and towed him to the shore. Sergeant Harrison's gallant action on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Annapolis, Maryland.

Technician Fourth Grade Aaron C Saunders 38275433, Company B, **Armored Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 24 February 1945. Technician Fourth Grade Saunders, a bridge carpenter, was placed in charge of an engineer boat transporting infantry over the Saar River near Ayl, Germany. On a return trip, his boat was struck by an enemy shell and, being unable to swim, he clung to debris until he drifted to shore. Despite his lengthy exposure to the icy water and intense enemy fire, he searched for and found a disabled boat which he repaired and used until the crossing operations were completed. Technician Fourth Grade Saunders' gallant action on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Shawnee, Oklahoma.

Technician Fourth Grade Carl A Gimmartino 31198029, Headquarters Battery, **Armored Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 28 February 1945. During an attack upon Balenger, Germany, Technician Fourth Grade Gimmartino, a tank driver, observed infantrymen enter several buildings just previous to an intense enemy artillery and mortar barrage which set the buildings on fire. Despite the continual hostile barrage, he dismounted from his tank, ran to the first building and rescued three wounded soldiers. He then entered the second building and evacuated two more wounded men to safety. Technician Fourth Grade Gimmartino's gallant action on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Corporal Alton W Howes 31216647, Armored, Company B, **Tank Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 19 March 1945. When their tank was struck by anti-tank fire near Weilerbach, Germany, necessitating the evacuation of the tank commander by two other members of the crew, Corporal Howes and the tank driver voluntarily resumed combat operations. Corporal Howes, a cannonner, assumed charge and alternately operating the tank cannon and turret machine gun despite heavy enemy fire, they quickly overran an enemy anti-tank gun position, enabling a column following to speedily continue its advance. 

Private First Class Caulfield's courageous and intrepid devotion to duty reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Worcester, Massachusetts.



During a breakdown of wire communications in the vicinity of Landau, Germany, Private First Class Senk, a mortar platoon radio operator, voluntarily undertook the task of relaying fire orders from a forward observation point to the mortar position by radio. Despite intense enemy artillery fire during which he received a mortal wound, he continued to relay fire orders until his death. Private First Class Senk's supreme devotion to duty reflects the highest credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States.] Entered the military service from Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania. (Nearest of kin: Mr. George J Senk Father), 318 Darlington Road, Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania).

2. By direction of the President and under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to:

^{3d} CAPTAIN WILLIAM L REED 01726983, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 101st Airborne Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 19 March 1945. Captain Reed, battalion surgeon, upon observing a friendly tank receive a direct hit by an enemy artillery shell in the vicinity of St. Wendel, Germany, rushed to the burning vehicle and mounting the driver's seat, backed the tank 200 yards to a defiladed position where he safely evacuated three wounded crew members. Captain Reed's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Kittanning, Pennsylvania.

^{1st} CAPTAIN ELI M LONCHAR 01287552, Infantry, Company A, 101st Airborne Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 1 March 1945. During the attack on Irch, Germany, Captain Lonchar, Company Commander, advanced his tank column so rapidly that supporting units had been left behind. Under intense enemy artillery, direct anti-tank and small arms fire, he dismounted, and, at great risk to himself, went forward to reconnoiter enemy positions. From his observations, he replanned the attack, reformed his team, and, without waiting for the supporting units, led an assault upon the town to successfully conclude the operations. Captain Lonchar's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

^{1st} CAPTAIN MARINUS VAN KLEEF JR 0114170, Cavalry, 101st Airborne Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 21 March 1945. Captain Van Kleef, a combat team commander, advanced under intense enemy artillery and small arms fire making a personal reconnaissance in the vicinity of Albersweiler, Germany. As a result of information obtained, he successfully directed the destruction of anti-tank and artillery positions and the capture of the town. This action facilitated the capture of Landau, Germany and the complete collapse of resistance in the area. Captain Van Kleef's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Virginia.

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General Orders No. 66, Hq. 10th Armored Div, 12 May 1945, continued.

FIRST LIEUTENANT JAMES J FLOOD 01017425, Cavalry, Troop C, ^{90th} Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron (Mechanized), United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 30 March 1945. In an attack upon Michenthal, Germany, the armored car in which Lieutenant Flood, Platoon Leader, was riding received a direct hit by an enemy anti-tank shell and burst into flames. Despite exploding all arms and high explosive ammunition within the blazing vehicle and continual hostile fire, he climbed into the vehicle and extricated two wounded men. After removing them to a place of safety, he returned and led a successful dismounted attack upon the town. Lieutenant Flood's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from New York, New York.

Technical Sergeant Louis J Cerruti 32967096, Company B, ^{30th} Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 1 April 1945. After failure of a previous attempt to rescue four wounded men lying in a field exposed to enemy fire in the vicinity of Bruschal, Germany, Technical Sergeant Cerruti, a platoon sergeant, and a comrade successfully performed the rescue mission. Despite the prevalence of direct enemy artillery and small arms fire, they drove 300 yards over the field in an unarmored vehicle to reach the wounded men and then evacuated them to safety. Sergeant Cerruti's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from New York, New York.

Staff Sergeant John M Caveny 36006382, Armored, Company D, ^{11th} Tank Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in France on 17 November 1944. Staff Sergeant Caveny, a tank platoon sergeant, led his tank platoon in a night attack against Kelembourg, France. Despite continual intense enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire, he boldly advanced through unrecognitized enemy territory and entered the town. After disrupting enemy communications, destroying installations and inflicting heavy casualties, he received orders to withdraw and by drawing the attention and fire of the enemy to his own tank, he successfully covered the withdrawal of his platoon. Staff Sergeant Caveny's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Plainview, Illinois.

Sergeant Vincent V Giacinto 3127329, Troop E, ^{90th} Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron (Mechanized), United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 21 March 1945. When the lead tank of an armored column advancing toward St. Martin, Germany was disabled by panzerfaust fire, Sergeant Giacinto, a tank commander, placed his tank at the head of the column. Boldly maneuvering his vehicle in the face of intense enemy artillery and small arms fire, he destroyed two anti-tank guns, three machine gun nests and two panzerfaust teams, enabling the column to speedily advance to its objective. Sergeant Giacinto's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Bridgeport, Connecticut.

Sergeant Carl H Holden 15059595, Company B, ^{30th} Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action in Germany on 1 April 1945. After failure of a previous attempt to rescue four wounded men lying in a field exposed to enemy fire in the vicinity of Bruschal, Germany, Sergeant Holden, a squad leader, and a comrade successfully performed the rescue mission. Despite the prevalence of direct enemy artillery and small arms fire, they drove 300 yards over the field in an unarmored vehicle to reach the wounded men and then evacuated them to safety. Sergeant Holden's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from West Lebanon, Indiana.

FIRST LIEUTENANT PATRICK J TROY 01160955, Field Artillery, Reconnaissance Company, ^{796th} Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 2 March 1945. While traveling on the road between Irsch and Zern, Germany, an armored column was suddenly halted by a barrage of enemy artillery fire pre-directed at a certain area of the road. Lieutenant Troy, a reconnaissance platoon commander, dismounted from his vehicle, ran up to the leading vehicle and succeeded in getting the column under way before the enemy gunners could adjust their fire. He remained there directing traffic until all vehicles had passed the danger point. Lieutenant Troy's exemplary conduct on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Newark, New Jersey.

FIRST LIEUTENANT JOHN R WALBRIDGE 01053411, Coast Artillery Corps, ^{796th} Anti-Aircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion (Self-Propelled), United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 24 February 1945. Lieutenant Walbridge, Battery Executive Officer, was conducting a firing mission when the enemy suddenly directed artillery and small arms fire upon his position. Observing that one of his men had been wounded during the barrage, he went to the aid of the injured soldier and, placing him upon his back, crawled with him to a place of safety. Lieutenant Walbridge's exemplary conduct on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Babylon, New York.

Technical Sergeant Henry Czarnecki 6829492, Company B, ^{20th} Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 22 March 1945. In the vicinity of Rupersweiler, Germany, Technical Sergeant Czarnecki's platoon was suddenly subjected to fierce enemy small arms and machine gun fire from dug-in positions in wooded areas on both sides of a road. Caught on open ground and unable to advance, the platoon was in danger of becoming disorganized. Ordering his men to take cover in a small ditch along the road, Technical Sergeant Czarnecki braving the enemy fire, located friendly tanks nearby and directing their fire, destroyed the hostile positions. His exemplary conduct on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Dearborn, Michigan.

Staff Sergeant Adam J Laksh 33052473, Company B, ^{55th} Armored Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 22 February 1945. During the assault crossing of the Sear River near Ayl, Germany, Sergeant Laksh, a platoon sergeant, constantly exposed himself to intense enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire for a period of ten hours while directing infantrymen to boats making the crossing. Through his daring example he repeatedly encouraged them to advance, and in addition, he made three hazardous trips to reach an artillery observer's position to report the possible artillery targets he had noted. Staff Sergeant Laksh's exemplary conduct on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Sergeant Michael C Majerowski 36540924, ^{215th} Armored Company C, ^{215th} Tank Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 9 March 1945. During an engagement with the enemy in the vicinity of Isaal, Germany, a friendly tank-doser

was disabled. That night it was decided to dismantle its guns to prevent their use by the enemy who were infiltrating into the area. Sergeant Majerowski's exemplary conduct on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Detroit, Michigan.

Sergeant Thomas B Fowler 34438316, Troop C, **Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron (Mechanized), United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany on 22 November 1944. During the night of 22 November 1944, Sergeant Fowler, a section leader, constantly exposed himself to heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire while laying a communication wire between infantry outposts and a command post in the vicinity of Buschdorf, Germany, and while repairing six separate breaks caused by mortar fire. On 4 December 1944 in the vicinity of Diekirch, Germany, he again exposed himself to heavy enemy fire while placing anti-personnel mines along a 1600 yard front on the Sune River as protection against infiltrating German patrols. Sergeant Fowler's exemplary conduct on these occasions reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Alexander, North Carolina.

Technical Sergeant Julius J Pfannenstiel 37232704, Headquarters Company, ^{6/57} Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Irsch, Germany during the period 24 February to 26 February 1945. Upon assuming command of his mortar platoon when its leader was killed, Technical Sergeant Pfannenstiel, platoon sergeant, successfully directed and led his men over difficult mountainous terrain under heavy enemy fire. Technical Sergeant Pfannenstiel's exemplary conduct on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Hays, Kansas.

Staff Sergeant Brown, a tank commander, dismounted from his tank during an intense enemy artillery barrage to rush to the aid of a wounded comrade and carry him to a place of safety. His exemplary conduct on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Woodfield, Ohio.

Sergeant Wallace R Hardy 34476734, Company A, ^{10/74} Armored Medical Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Hochweiler, Germany on 1 March 1945.

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When terrain conditions precluded the use of an ambulance, Sergeant Hardy, section leader, employed a half-track to evacuate a number of casualties from the scene of an intense enemy shelling. Sergeant Oliver F Bryan 19010231, Armored, Company B, ^{117th} Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Pellingen, Germany on 27 February 1945. During the advance of a task force, Sergeant Bryan dismounted from his tank under heavy enemy artillery fire to attach a tow cable to a disabled tank, enabling the crippled vehicle to be removed from the path of advance. Sergeant DiCarlo, in charge of a tank dozer, voluntarily removed numerous disabled

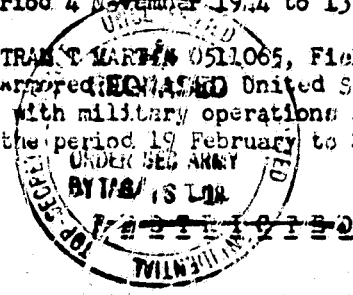

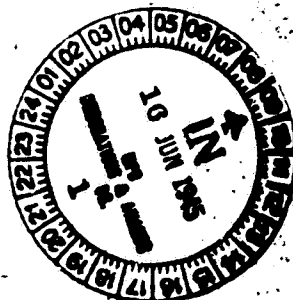

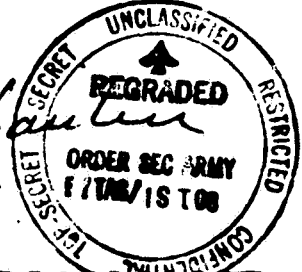

After treating and effecting the evacuation of a number of casualties, Captain Tillotson, battalion surgeon, crawled 200 yards under intense enemy fire to two isolated wounded men whom he evacuated to safety. Captain Tillotson's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Ohio.

CAPTAIN JACK T PRIOR O376629, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 20th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Ehrang, Germany on 6 and 7 March 1945. During a river crossing assault, Captain Prior, battalion surgeon, constantly exposed himself to intense enemy fire for 36 hours while supervising and directing the administration of first aid and the evacuation of casualties from the river bank. Captain Prior's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from St. Albans, Vermont.

FIRST LIEUTENANT THOMAS A SMITH O1168923, Field Artillery, Company B, 609th Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Crailsheim, Germany on 10 April 1945. After driving back the enemy from a disabled tank destroyer and rescuing its wounded crew members, Lieutenant Smith, platoon leader, ably directed his platoon in the repulsing of two strong hostile attacks, causing the enemy to suffer severe losses. Lieutenant Smith's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Atkinson, North Carolina.

Staff Sergeant Belak's gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Irvin, Pennsylvania.

Staff Sergeant William J Hamilton 31016844, Company B, ^{609th} Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Grailsheim, Germany on 8 April 1945. Staff Sergeant Hamilton, platoon leader, aggressively advanced his tank destroyer against enemy forces superior in number, effectively breaking up an impending enemy attack. His gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from East Boston, Massachusetts.
