Corporal Merton E Sweetland 6872466, Troop D, 90th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron (Mechanized), United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Schlut, Germany on 20 April 1945. Braving intense enemy small arms fire, Corporal Sweetland, scout corporal, courageously advanced over dangerously exposed terrain in a valiant attempt to secure medical aid for a wounded comrade. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Buffalo, New York.

Technician Fifth Grade Karl W Kneeland 11061810, Company B, 21st Tank Battalion, United States Army for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Waldbillig, Luxenburg on 21 December 1944. Braving intense enemy fire, Technician Fifth Grade Kneeland, tank driver, retrieved a disabled tank from a dangerously exposed position. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Amherst, Massachusetts.

Technician Fifth Grade Peter Sunder 33083807, Company A, 21st Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Tuckishrule, Germany on 18 March 1945. Braving intense enemy fire, Technician Fifth Grade Sunder, bow gunner, although himself wounded, courageously evacuated four wounded soldiers. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Marticooke, Pennsylvania.

Technician Fifth Grade David H Whitter 37323843, Company C, 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Siebilegger, Germany on 20 March 1945. When his company became separated from an advancing column, Technician Fifth Grade Whitter, under fire, personally reconnoitered a route over which he led his company to successfully rejoin the main body. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from St. Paul, Minnesota.

Technician Fifth Grade Andie Wyatt 34476134, Company A, 21st Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Balringen, Germany on 27 February 1945. When a half-track, disabled by enemy fire, blocked a road, Technician Fifth Grade Wyatt, driver, courageously removed the damaged vehicle permitting an armored column to continue its advance. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Decatur, Mississippi.

Private First Class Robert E Brady 39719084, Company C, 3d Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Kirschmauer, France on 17 November 1944. Braving intense enemy fire, Private First Class Brady, bow gunner, courageously assisted evacuation several casualties. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Burbank, California.

Private First Class Louis D Del Guidice 36903433, Company A, 21st Tank Battalion United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Trier, Germany on 3 March 1945. Braving intense enemy fire, Private First Class Del Guidice, camouflage engineer courageously evacuated three wounded comrades from a blazing tank. His exemplary conduct

great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

Private First Class James Maria 32893350, Company C, 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Zeitgerhofen, Germany on 22 April 1945. Observing enemy tank personnel in the act of camouflaging their vehicle, Private First Class Maria courageously advanced upon the enemy position and captured the entire 8 man crew. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Pittsburg, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class Joseph H Garvin 36540916, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 21st Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Ober Miesheim, Germany on 3 April 1945. When a mortar half-track became the target of intense enemy artillery and mortar fire, Private First Class Garvin, assistant mortar gunner, assisted his squad leader in bravely returning the fire, inflicting heavy casualties upon the hostile forces. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Detroit, Michigan.

Private First Class Anthony J Gonzales 39052753, Company B, 3d Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Trier, Germany on 7 March 1945. Braving intense enemy fire, Private First Class Gonzales, gunner, courageously engaged advancing hostile troops with machine gun fire, inflicting many casualties and repelling the attack. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Hayward, California.

Private First Class Carl D Hollis 33900252, Co D, 21st Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States At Trier, Germany on 3 March 1945. Braving intense enemy fire, Private First Class Hollis, bow gunner, although wounded, courageously laid a communication wire between an observation post and a gun position. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Cumberland, Maryland.

Private First Class Eugene S Jacobs 32938456, Medical Detachment, 61st Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Töttingen, Germany on 21 November 1944. Braving intense enemy fire, Private First Class Jacobs, aid man, courageously advanced over dangerously exposed terrain administering to the wounded, continuing his valiant efforts until he too was severely wounded. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Lyons, New York.

Private First Class Theodore S Kuchta 33843590, Company C, 3d Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Trier, Germany on 1 March 1945. When his tank was disabled by enemy bazooka fire, Private First Class Kuchta, bow

gunner, with the assistance of a comrade dismounted from his vehicle and neutralized an enemy bazooka team. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Baltimore, Maryland.

Private First Class Paul McVey 37321342, Company C, 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Ochsen, Germany on 26 February 1945. Braving intense hostile small arms fire, Private First Class McVey, rifleman, left a position of comparative safety to successfully evacuate a wounded officer. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Morton, Minnesota.



I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR - By direction of the President and under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to:

SECOND LIEUTENANT RICHARD D DRAIN 0514703, Field Artillery, Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 423d Armored Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Westerheim, Germany on 21 April 1945. When the forward elements of a combat team were subjected to fierce enemy anti-tank fire, Second Lieutenant Drain, artillery forward observer, courageously advanced through dangerously exposed territory to direct effective fire upon the hostile positions. His gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Washington, D. C.

SECOND LIEUTENANT RICHARD E MORGAN 02006620, Army of the United States, Company D, 3d Tank Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Hardilly, Belgium on 18 January 1945. Braving intense enemy fire, Second Lieutenant Morgan, (then Staff Sergeant, serving as platoon sergeant), courageously led his platoon against bitter enemy resistance to successfully capture an enemy held town. His gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Lakeport, New Hampshire.

CHIEF WARRANT OFFICER THOMAS J BURKE #2119968, Army of the United States, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Combat Command A, 10th Armored Division, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Traisheim, Germany on 9 April 1945. Braving intense enemy ground and aerial fire, Chief Warrant Officer Burke, motor transportation officer, courageously supervised the unloading of airborne supplies and the evacuation of wounded personnel, continuing his valiant efforts until completely exhausted and injured by enemy mortar fire. His gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Bakersfield, California.

Staff Sergeant Walter Sheehan 6151848, Company D, 21st Tank Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Holzberg, Germany on 2 April 1945. Braving intense enemy small arms and bazooka fire, Staff Sergeant Sheehan, tank commander, courageously laid a communications wire to an observation post, enabling a forward observer to direct effective fire upon strongly defended hostile positions. His gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Natick, Massachusetts.

Staff Sergeant Willard J Stauch 36611772, Medical Detachment, 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Zerf, Germany on 27 February 1945. Staff Sergeant Stauch, aid man, voluntarily transported vitally-needed medical supplies to besieged forward units over a route swept with enemy artillery fire. His gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Sunbury, Ohio.

Sergeant John Majarian 31037811, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Kickheim, Germany on 21 March 1945. When a number of infantrymen were left behind during a hasty withdrawal, Sergeant Majarian, chief of section, advanced through intense enemy fire to successfully lead the endangered men to safety. His gallant achievement reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Rockland, Massachusetts.

FIRST LIEUTENANT WILLIAM J TEHAN JR 01012854, Cavalry, Troop A, 90th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, (Mechanized), United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Grubinger, Germany on 21 April 1945. When a column was ambushed by a strong enemy force, First Lieutenant Tehan, executive officer, courageously deployed the column and directed effective fire upon the opposing hostile forces. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from New York, New York.

Master Sergeant James W Bear 18152090, Headquarters 10th Armored Division, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Ayl, Germany on 24 February 1945. When a command post sustained direct artillery hits, Master Sergeant Bear, chief clerk, courageously reorganized the enlisted men of division headquarters and directed the rapid evacuation of the wounded. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Lafayette, Louisiana.

Sergeant Kenneth M Cogswell 36407800, Company B, 3d Tank Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Neckar River Valley, Germany on 8 April 1945. When a tank force was halted by enemy anti-tank fire, Sergeant Cogswell, tank commander, courageously engaged the enemy with tank gun fire, inflicting heavy casualties and neutralizing the hostile positions. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Greenville, Michigan.

Braving intense enemy fire, First Lieutenant Huttner, liaison officer, courageously directed the removal of a disabled tank which blocked the main road, enabling a tank force to continue its advance. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from New York.

Staff Sergeant George J. Domers 33052953, Troop A, 90th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, (Mechanized), United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Blaust Messerhofe, Germany on 22 April 1945. Braving intense enemy fire, Staff Sergeant Domers, platoon sergeant, skillfully directed his men in neutralizing a dug-in enemy force. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Technician Fourth Grade Billie R. Paine 14217594, Service Company, 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Fillatreff, Germany on 6 April 1945. Braving intense enemy fire, Technician Fourth Grade Paine, driver gallantly retrieved an ambulance from an exposed position permitting the evacuation of the wounded to the rear. His exemplary conduct reflects great credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Texas.

III. CLASS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President and under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Corporal Joseph A. DiGiacomo, 33781633, Battery C, 796th Anti Aircraft Artillery Battalion, Weapons Battalion (Self Propelled), United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Buschdorf, Germany on 29 November 1944. Braving intense enemy artillery fire, Corporal DiGiacomo, squad leader, courageously circulated among his men to determine if they were adequately protected from artillery fire and was mortally wounded while performing this inspiring act. His supreme devotion to duty reflects the highest credit upon himself and the military forces of the United States. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Nearest of kin: Mrs. Giustino DiGiacomo, Father, 404 North 34th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Technical Sergeant Walter H Stevens 6786766, Company B, 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Borg, Germany on 24 November 1944. Although wounded during the action, Technical Sergeant Stevens, platoon sergeant, courageously led a raid through withering enemy machine gun fire to successfully neutralize two strongly defended pill boxes. I. AWARD OF SILVER STAR, POSTHUMOUS

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and in accordance with the authority contained in Circular No. 6, Hq Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded posthumously to the following Officer and Enlisted Man:

Second Lieutenant HADLEY NEFF, 01183141, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, * * * Armored Field Artillery Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. Lieutenant NEFF, while serving as forward artillery observer with the * * * Tank Battalion near * * * voluntarily left the tank company which was then in reserve, and moved forward under intense mortar and small arms fire to occupy an observation post. The heroic action of Lieutenant NEFF assisted greatly in bringing artillery fire on opposing forces which had halted the assault company. While establishing communication facilities in the vicinity of the observation post, Lieutenant NEFF was struck by enemy mortar fire and died shortly thereafter. The complete devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety displayed by Lieutenant NEFF exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States. Lieutenant NEFF entered the military service from New York.

Sergeant EDWIN J. FRALEY, 6657517, Infantry, Company B, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1 January 1945, Sergeant FRALEY participated in the attack at * * *. When his platoon was pinned down by intense, direct machine gun fire, Sergeant FRALEY, disregarding the intense fire, advanced over open terrain to destroy the machine gun which was holding up the attack. Sergeant FRALEY was killed while making this attack. The bravery with which Sergeant FRALEY unhesitatingly sacrificed his life was an inspiration to his men, and his conduct was in accordance with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Sergeant FRALEY entered the military service from Kentucky.

Captain ROBERT L. AMENO, 01011664, Cavalry, Company B, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy near * * * and * * *. On 30 December 1944, Captain AMENO led his company to the north of * * * while engaging the enemy under intense fire. With utter disregard to his personal safety, Captain AMENO engaged and destroyed two German Mark IV tanks and one machine gun nest. In further aggressive action, his command tank ran into an enemy mine field which disabled his tank. Being under intense artillery and anti-tank fire, Captain AMENO abandoned his tank and attacked a machine gun position approximately thirty yards to his immediate front, destroying the position and killing the enemy gun crew. To this final attack Captain AMENO gave his life. By his complete devotion to duty, total disregard of personal safety and continuous and magnificent courage, Captain AMENO was an inspiration to his men and his conduct was in accordance with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Captain AMENO entered the military service from New York.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR, (Missing in Action)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and in accordance with the authority contained in Circular No. 6, Hq Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded to the following Officer missing in action:

Captain LAWRENCE W. MINNICK, 01011933, Infantry, Company C, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31 December 1944, Captain MINNICK, commanding Company C, * * * Tank Battalion, was given the mission of supporting the infantry in the attack on * * *. When the tanks of his command became bogged down in a stream crossing, Captain MINNICK entered the town accompanied by two other tanks, giving vital support to the attack, which was successful, and permitting the extrication of the disabled vehicles. On 1 January 1945, after the enemy had re-entered * * *, Captain MINNICK again entered the town leading his company. When the infantry support was retarded, Captain MINNICK dismounted from his tank and personally led the infantry forward. The disregard of personal safety, continuous and inspiring courage of Captain MINNICK under heavy artillery, mortar and small arms fire materially assisted in the capture of * * *, and was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Captain MINNICK entered the military service from Pennsylvania.

III. AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and in accordance with the authority contained in Circular No. 6, Hq Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded to the following Officers and Enlisted Men:

Colonel WESLEY W. YALE, 014969, Cavalry, * * *, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action near * * * in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31 December 1944, Colonel YALE, commanding * * *, went forward under heavy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire to personally lead the attack, which had lost direction. The success of the attack and taking of the assigned objective was directly due to Colonel YALE'S personal leadership. The devotion to duty, complete disregard of personal safety, and the gallantry displayed by Colonel YALE reflect the greatest credit upon himself and the United States Army. Colonel YALE entered the military service from New York.

Lieutenant Colonel JOE AHEE, 022215, Cavalry, Headquarters, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. During the period 12 January 1945 to 17 January 1945, Lieutenant Colonel AHEE served as battalion commander in action in and near * * * and * * *. Throughout the operation he persistently exposed himself to enemy fire with complete disregard for his own safety in order to be present at critical points and direct the movement of his battalion. Near * * *, when radio communication became defective, he moved his command tank to a position in front of the leading elements of his command and while under intense mortar fire, coordinated the attack which resulted in the seizure of * * *. While in this position, he was attacked by two enemy tanks, a self-propelled antiaircraft gun and an American half-track manned by enemy personnel, but despite the fire-fight in which these vehicles were destroyed, Lieutenant Colonel AHEE retained control of the movement of his battalion. In the vicinity of * * *, where an enemy roadblock was encountered, Lieutenant Colonel AHEE personally directed the maneuver by means of which the roadblock was successfully by-passed. By his courage, leadership, initiative and disregard of personal safety, Lieutenant Colonel AHEE'S battalion was successful in the completion of its mission. His conduct and actions exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States. Lieutenant Colonel AHEE entered the military service from Arizona.

Lieutenant Colonel RAY F. SAGASER, 0321192, Cavalry, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. From 30 December 1944 to 4 January 1945 Lieutenant Colonel SAGASER, commanding the * * * Tank Battalion, held the town of * * * for two days and nights under intensive shell fire. Lieutenant Colonel SAGASER'S personal leadership, courage and tenacity under intense fire and during many counterattacks was an inspiration to the officers and men of his battalion. When the attack on his right came abreast of him he pressed forward to the ultimate capture of his objective. His complete devotion to duty and continuous and inspiring courage were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Lieutenant Colonel SAGASER entered the military service from Arizona.

Captain LONNIE L. GOOLSBY, 01012903, Infantry, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action against an armed enemy of the United States near * * *, from 31 December 1944 to 1 January 1945. Captain GOOLSBY personally led the first tank into * * *, displaying extreme coolness and complete disregard for his own safety as he advanced up a corridor which was the only avenue of approach. During the night Captain GOOLSBY, under intense mortar, artillery and sniper fire assisted in organizing the defense of the town and joined in repelling two enemy counter-attacks. During the morning of 1 January 1945, Captain GOOLSBY, with complete disregard for his own safety, led his company in repelling a German tank attack in which four enemy tanks were destroyed. During this attack Captain GOOLSBY'S tank was struck by enemy antitank weapons and was set on fire. Disregarding his own safety and displaying indomitable courage he returned twice to the flaming tank to rescue two wounded crew members. In the attack launched during the afternoon of 1 January 1945, Captain GOOLSBY mounted another tank and again led his company forward to the attack. This tank was also hit by antitank fire, blowing Captain GOOLSBY completely out of the turret. After being evacuated to the first aid station, he insisted upon returning to his company. The personal bravery, leadership and outstanding courage displayed by Captain GOOLSBY inspired his men to courageously advance to the objective and reflect the greatest credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. Captain GOOLSBY entered the military service from Mississippi.

Major PATRICK H. TANSEY, JR., 023915, Infantry, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action near * * * and * * *, in connection with military operations against an armed enemy from 30 December 1944 to 5 January 1945. During this period Major TANSEY, as executive officer of the battalion, was called forward to assume command after the Battalion Commander was injured. While under intense artillery, mortar and machine gun fire he reorganized the battalion, which was out of control. By further personal direction, in an exposed position on a ridge, which was covered by heavy small arms and mortar fire, a successful coordinated attack on the town of * * * was launched. On 3 January 1945, during an attack on * * *, when tanks and infantry became temporarily out of control and were firing on each other, Major TANSEY, in full view of enemy snipers and machine guns personally reorganized the attack. Climbing on a tank under a barrage of artillery and mortar fire he calmly gave radio instructions to other tanks. By his remarkable leadership, fearless devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety, Major TANSEY contributed greatly to the capture of * * * and * * *. His actions and leadership exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States. Major TANSEY entered the military service from Washington, D. C.

Captain ELMORE K. FABRICK, 0367236, Infantry, Company B, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in the vicinity of * * *, on 1 January 1945. Captain FABRICK, while commanding his company in an attack on the city, exposed himself to enemy small

arms, machine gun, mortar and artillery fire to personally lead his men and direct their fire. While others were forced to seek safety in shell holes and buildings, with utter disregard to his own safety, Captain FABRICK continuously circulated among his company and traversed open streets under continuous enemy fire, encouraging and directing his men forward until the city was in our hands. He repeated the same cool leadership in the advance toward * * *. Captain FABRICK'S conduct was an inspiration to his command and a credit to the military service of the United States. Captain FABRICK entered the military service from Illinois.

Captain JOHN F. MEGGESIN, 01013197, Infantry, Company B, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action near * * *, in connection with military operations against an armed enemy, from 30 December 1944 to 5 January 1945. During this period, Captain MEGGESIN, commanding Company B, * * * Tank Battalion, displayed cool leadership, unflinching courage and outstanding bravery while defending the town of * * *. Observing a column of enemy vehicles approaching in counter-attack, he immediately brought the fire of his entire company against the leading enemy tanks causing numerous casualties. During the attack on * * *, of the same day, the enemy destroyed two tanks commanded by Captain MEGGESIN, and with complete disregard of his personal safety, he immediately mounted a third tank and continued to lead his company to the final objective. Subsequently on the same day, under intense mortar, machine gun and sniper fire, Captain MEGGESIN again displayed deep devotion to duty by rescuing two wounded men who were helplessly stranded on a ridge. The courage, leadership and initiative of Captain MEGGESIN reflects great credit on himself and the military service of the United States. Captain MEGGESIN entered the military service from Illinois.

Second Lieutenant WILLIAM J. KIEFER, 01181654, Field Artillery, Battery C, * * * Armored Field Artillery Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in * * *. On 31 December 1944, Lieutenant KIEFER served as an artillery forward observer with the * * * Tank Battalion. While engaged in a forward observation mission, the tank which Lieutenant KIEFER commanded was struck by antitank fire. The crew immediately evacuated the tank to escape the danger of possible fire, but with outstanding courage and utter disregard of personal safety, Lieutenant KIEFER remained with the stricken vehicle and, under intense enemy fire, quickly adjusted artillery fire on the antitank guns, effectively silencing them. The fearless devotion to duty and the gallant display of heroism on the part of Lieutenant KIEFER reflects great credit on himself and the military service of the United States. Lieutenant KIEFER entered the military service from Illinois.

Major ROBERT B. KNIGHT, 01013991, Infantry, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1 January 1945, Major KNIGHT, while serving as S-3 of his battalion, near * * *, saw his battalion

bogged down in swampy terrain and receiving direct enemy fire from the rear. Without hesitation, Major KNIGHT moved his tank from defilade, engaged and destroyed the enemy tank. His timely action prevented the destruction of tanks of his unit. On 2 January 1945, Major KNIGHT moved his light tank across open terrain under direct artillery fire in order to contact and move the battalion trains forward, thus effectively supplying his unit. The initiative, devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety displayed by Major KNIGHT was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Major KNIGHT entered the military service from Florida.

Private First Class MUIR L. BAILEY, 35638994, Infantry, Company B, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1 January 1945, while serving as a rifleman for his company near * * *, he aided in repulsing a counter-attack. Artillery fire was called for but it fell short of its intended target and on his platoon. Private BAILEY, realizing the situation, leaped from his foxhole, ran approximately 250 yards through the shell fire and heavy crossfire of enemy machine guns, to notify the Company Commander to have the fire lifted. Private STEM, while serving as an aid man with Company A, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, was called upon continuously to render medical aid to the wounded. He moved among the wounded affording first aid and assisting in their removal to evacuation vehicles. By his complete devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety, under intense mortar and artillery fire, he rendered aid to the wounded, thereby saving lives which might have been lost. His conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Private STEM entered the military service from California.

First Lieutenant GALLIO J. MARZANO, 0357776, Medical Administrative Corps, Medical Detachment, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy, from 31 December 1944 to 3 January 1945, near * * *. During this period Lieutenant MARZANO while serving as assistant battalion surgeon conducted himself on the field of battle with conspicuous bravery. On 31 December 1944, Lieutenant MARZANO moved under artillery fire to a tank that had been hit where he removed the dead and wounded and administered first aid. On 1 January 1945, the battalion suffered numerous casualties in boggy terrain. Evacuation vehicles being unable to reach the wounded, Lieutenant MARZANO organized available tanks under heavy artillery and small arms fire and moved the men to safety. His devotion to duty, courage and disregard for personal safety were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Lieutenant MARZANO entered the military service from Panama Canal Zone.

On 31 December 1944, Lieutenant RYSNIK, while serving as Platoon Leader in the attack on * * *, * * *, noticed that his company commander's tank had been hit by 155mm artillery. With complete disregard for personal safety, he promptly left his tank, and under tremendous artillery fire, crossed open terrain on foot to his company commander's tank and rendered first aid to the wounded men. After assisting the men to foxholes, he promptly took command of the company and proceeded on toward the objective. This gallant display of heroism on the part of Lieutenant RYSNIK reflects great credit on himself and the military service of the United States. Lieutenant RYSNIK entered military service from New Hampshire.

First Lieutenant JOHN DIXON, 01018211, Infantry, Company C, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31 December 1944 and 1 January 1945, Lieutenant DIXON, while serving as Company Maintenance Officer for his unit, near * * *, * * *, removed disabled vehicles from the battlefield under observed enemy fire. The actions of Lieutenant DIXON enabled vehicles to be rapidly repaired to continue the attack and also permitted wounded personnel to be removed from the vehicles. On 7 January 1945 and 8 January 1945, Lieutenant DIXON, while serving as Company Commander, crawled through a mine field covered by mortar and artillery fire to direct the fire of his tanks against enemy emplacements and counter-attacks until supporting infantry could withdraw. His fearless devotion to duty and utter disregard of personal safety was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Lieutenant DIXON entered the military service from Pennsylvania.

Private EVERETT F. HIGGINS, 32193835, Infantry, Company C, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31 December 1944, Private HIGGINS assumed command of his squad after his squad leader and assistant squad leader had become mortally wounded near * * *, * * *. With utter disregard for his personal safety, while under direct machine gun, mortar and artillery fire, Private HIGGINS advanced with rifle and hand grenades, killing several of the enemy. His leadership, courage and initiative inspired his squad to press forward in accomplishing their mission. Staff Sergeant JAMES F. KESNER, 6860469, Infantry, Company C, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31

December 1944, Staff Sergeant KESNER commanded a light machine gun squad during the attack on * * *, * * *. Subsequent to the capture of * * *, and while his squad was pinned down by heavy artillery and machine gun fire, Staff Sergeant KESNER again moved forward to aid his wounded assistant squad leader and dragged him to a place of safety. By his leadership, devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety, Staff Sergeant KESNER materially assisted in the capture of * * * and in giving aid to the wounded. His actions exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States. Staff Sergeant KESNER entered military service from Kansas.

Private WARREN W. NORTHRUP, 37523639, Medical Detachment, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 30 December 1944, Private NORTHRUP was attached to Company B, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, as an aid man, near * * *. With his battalion pinned down on the exposed slope of a prominent hill under intense artillery, mortar and machine gun fire, Private NORTHRUP, with complete disregard of his personal safety, rendered aid to the wounded. While rendering aid to Staff Sergeant LAVOID J. CALVIN, who had been wounded by mortar fire, Private NORTHRUP, was himself wounded by a machine gun. The fearless devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety by Private NORTHRUP was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Private First Class WILLIAM F. OGILVIE, 19133491, Company C, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. On 31 December 1944, near * * *, Private OGILVIE, while serving as a rifleman, moved forward over open and rolling terrain under enemy observation and destroyed an enemy machine gun and captured the entire crew of thirteen men. During the night, while Company A, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, to which he was attached, was suffering heavy casualties from artillery, mortar and machine gun fire. Private GOTTI displayed unflinching courage in the performance of his duties. With complete disregard for his personal safety, and with deep devotion to duty, he moved with speed and assurance through the company area rendering medical aid to the wounded and transported them to the rear areas. The conduct of Private GOTTI during this action reflects great credit on himself and the military service of the United States. Private GOTTI entered the military service from California.

Private First Class JAMES E. MATHEWS, 35422903, Medical Detachment, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in * * *. During the night of 31 December 1944, Private MATHews' company was suffering heavy casualties from artillery, mortar and machine gun fire. With complete disregard for his personal safety, and with deep devotion to duty, he completely ignored the heavy barrage of shell fire that was falling around him, and moved with speed and assurance through the company area, rendering medical aid to the wounded, and assisting in the evacuation of the dead and wounded to rear areas. The fearless devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety by Private MATHews was responsible for saving the lives of many wounded and an inspiring example to others. His conduct was in accordance with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Private MATHews entered the military service from Ohio.

Sergeant ARTHUR A. FREDRICK, 36406277, Company C, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 7 January 1945, Sergeant FREDRICK was serving as tank commander near * * *. His tank became disabled by land mines and was immediately fired upon by intense anti-tank, mortar and machine gun fire. With outstanding courage and a magnificent display of fortitude, Sergeant FREDRICK remained with his damaged vehicle and continued to direct fire against the enemy, destroying one tank. With utter disregard for personal safety he continued this gallant display of heroism until seriously wounded. His fearless devotion to duty, leadership and initiative were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Sergeant FREDRICK entered the military service from Wisconsin.

On 30 December 1944, while Company B, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, to which he was attached, was advancing toward * * *, Private DISLER observed that two tanks to his right front had been hit by enemy shell fire and were burning. With utter disregard of personal safety and with unflinching courage, he immediately moved through intense artillery fire toward the blazing tanks. Upon reaching them, he evacuated two members of the tank crews, rendered first aid and assisted the wounded men to the aid station. The disregard of personal safety and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Private DISLER was in accordance with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Private DISLER entered the military service from Massachusetts.

Technician Fifth Grade CONSTANT J. BRUEY, JR., 32590327, Medical Detachment, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army (then Private). For gallantry in action near * * *, in connection with military operations against an armed enemy of the United States. On 30 December 1944, while Company B, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, to which he was attached, was advancing toward * * *, Technician Fifth Grade BRUEY observed that two tanks to his right front had been hit by enemy shell fire and were burning. With utter disregard of personal safety and with unflinching courage, he immediately moved through intense artillery fire toward the blazing tanks. Upon reaching them, he evacuated two members of the tank crews, rendered first aid and assisted the wounded men to the aid station. The disregard of personal safety and loyal devotion to duty displayed by Technician Fifth Grade BRUEY was in accordance with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Technician Fifth Grade BRUEY entered the military service from New Jersey.

After his tank was disabled by enemy shell fire, Lieutenant TALCOTT immediately assumed command of another tank, and with a crew of ten men, pressed the attack to a position behind enemy lines until his second tank received a direct hit from anti-tank fire. Although seriously wounded, he displayed extraordinary heroism and fortitude when he rescued six men from this burning tank and guided them to cover behind enemy lines. Lieutenant TALCOTT displayed unusual leadership and keen tactical knowledge by leading his men safely back after crawling four hours through enemy lines. Although seriously wounded, his first thought was for the welfare of his men. His unflinching courage, heroism and outstanding leadership reflect great credit to himself and the armed forces of the United States. Lieutenant TALCOTT entered the military service from Nevada.

Second Lieutenant VIRGIL H. TREBERG, 01178373, Field Artillery, Battery B, * * * Armored Field Artillery Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For outstanding bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31 December 1944, while serving as forward observer for his unit, Second Lieutenant TREBERG accompanied Company C, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, in an attack near * * *. He was driving a 1/4-ton truck carrying a radio for communication with his artillery battalion. During the attack, while passing through a woods under heavy mortar and machine gun fire, his progress was impeded by enemy road blocks. By aggressive reconnaissance, he found a way around the blocks, and relocated the road with little loss of time. He then hastened forward to reach the leading elements of the infantry company which had emerged from the woods and were receiving heavy enemy fire. In an effort to reach a position from which to obtain observation, Second Lieutenant TREBERG raced from the woods toward the top of the ridge. About 200 yards from the woods his vehicle struck a mine. Second Lieutenant TREBERG was killed. His fearless devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Second Lieutenant TREBERG entered the military service from Minnesota.

First Lieutenant WILLIAM C. DEE, JR., 01289556, Infantry, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For bravery in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 30 December 1944 near * * * Lieutenant DEE dismounted from his vehicle in full view of the enemy observers and under direct enemy artillery fire to assist evacuation of wounded men in a nearby damaged vehicle. His fearless devotion to duty and disregard of personal safety exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States. Lieutenant DEE entered the military service from New York.

Sergeant JOHN B. ROBINSON, 36406041, Infantry, Company B, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 30 December 1944, Sergeant ROBINSON while serving as a tank commander of his unit near * * * helped three tanks of his company to escape a trap set by a number of enemy tanks. After destroying two enemy vehicles Sergeant ROBINSON helped evacuate members of a disabled tank of his company, also administering first aid to one of the crew members. By his courage, leadership and initiative, he contributed to the saving of many lives. He was fatally wounded in a later action. His conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Sergeant ROBINSON entered the military service from Michigan.

Private First Class HARRY C. STENERSON, 39319435, Infantry, Company B, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 2 January 1945, while serving as tank gun leader near * * *, First Lieutenant THEODORE T. SIMKIN, 01015946, a platoon leader, was seriously wounded. Private STENERSON dismounted from his tank while under intense artillery fire and helped place Lieutenant SIMKIN on the rear deck of the tank and evacuate him to location where first aid could be administered. By his disregard of personal safety, he contributed to the saving of First Lieutenant SIMKIN'S life. He was fatally wounded in a later action. His conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Private First Class STENERSON entered the military service from Oregon.

Private First Class HUBERT J. CAREY, 12186811, Infantry, Company B, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 30 December 1944, while serving as bow gunner for his unit near * * *, a tank of his platoon was disabled by enemy fire, killing one man and wounding four others. After the injured men were placed in a farm building, Private CAREY dismounted from his tank and proceeded through artillery fire on foot to the medical aid station for help. On his return he was pinned down by intense artillery fire. By his complete devotion to duty, courage and disregard of personal safety, Private CAREY contributed to the saving of several lives. He was fatally wounded in a later action. His conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Private CAREY entered the military service from New York.

Sergeant CLIFFORD B. MILLER, 37236167, Infantry, Company C, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1 January 1945, Sergeant MILLER, while serving as tank commander for his unit near * * *, observed that the attached infantry was suffering numerous casualties from two German mortars. Sergeant MILLER volunteered to move forward from a defiladed position to fire upon the enemy mortars. It was necessary to move across open terrain, which was known to be covered by anti-tank guns 1,000 yards to his front. Sergeant MILLER directed his crew in such a manner as to destroy the enemy mortars and at the same time so maneuvered his tank in such a manner that tank and crew returned safely to a defiladed position. By his courage, leadership and initiative, he contributed to saving the lives of many men. His conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Sergeant MILLER entered the military service from Oklahoma.

Private First Class RALPH W. D. HANEY, 37086117, Company C, * * * Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For bravery in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31 December 1944, near * * *, while pinned down by direct enemy machine gun fire, Private HANEY located an enemy sniper who was holding up the attack. With complete disregard to the enemy fire and in full view of the sniper, Private HANEY moved forward and killed him thus enabling his platoon to continue the attack. His conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Private HANEY entered the military service from Nebraska.

For bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 2 January 1945, while serving as a tank gunner for his unit near * * *, First Lieutenant THEODORE T. SIMKIN, 01015946, a platoon leader, was seriously wounded. Corporal RICKARD dismounted from his tank and while under intense artillery fire helped place Lieutenant SIMKIN on the rear deck of his tank and evacuated him to a location where first aid could be given. He then joined the command tank of * * * under heavy artillery fire and, with his wide experience, offered valuable advice and suggestions on the employment of artillery. Again, on 16 January 1945, Colonel WILLIAMS joined the command tank of Colonel YALE where he was under intense artillery concentrations on five separate occasions. He continued to advise the Combat Commander in the employment of artillery, which materially assisted in the final capture of the objective. To comply with an order of the Division Commander to rejoin him, and in order not to interfere with the operations of the command tank which he occupied, Colonel WILLIAMS voluntarily dismounted and walked through heavy artillery fire to accomplish his mission. His total disregard of personal safety and complete devotion to duty are a credit to himself and the armed services of the United States. Colonel WILLIAMS entered the military service from Kentucky.

Brigadier General WILLARD A. HOLBROOK, JR., 012177, United States Army, * * *, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For heroic conduct in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1 January 1945, under intense artillery and mortar fire in the vicinity of * * * and * * *, at darkness, General HOLBROOK, commanding * * *, 11th Armored Division, personally conducted a reorganization of his position and gave order to an extremely confused situation. Through his tactical knowledge and personal leadership, the position was held. Subsequently on the 13th of January 1945, General HOLBROOK'S energetic action resulted in the domination of * * *. He reorganized his command and his aggressive conduct resulted in the capture of * * * on the 15th of January 1945, enabling him to seize the final objective of the Division on the 16th of January 1945. General HOLBROOK'S conduct exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States. General HOLBROOK entered the military service from Wisconsin.

Technician Fourth Grade ROY A. MINNERLY, 32590653, Infantry, Company B, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army, (then Technician Fifth Grade). For bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 2 January 1945, Technician Fourth Grade MINNERLY, while serving as a tank driver for his unit near * * *, placed Lieutenant THOMAS W. WILLIAMSON, who was severely injured by artillery fire, on top of his tank and administered first aid. Technician Fourth Grade MINNERLY continued to administer first aid under intense artillery fire as the tank was being evacuated. By his disregard of personal safety, he contributed to saving the life of Lieutenant WILLIAMSON. His conduct was in accordance with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Technician Fourth Grade Minnerly entered the military service from New Jersey.

Private First Class GEORGE JACENKO, 37320723, Infantry, Company C, * * * Tank Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army. For bravery in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 31 December 1945, while serving as tank gun leader for his unit near * * *, a tank of his platoon became mired in the mud. Private First Class JACENKO dismounted from his own tank and exposed himself to heavy artillery fire to tow the mired vehicle

from the mud. By his complete devotion to duty, courage and disregard of personal safety, he contributed to saving the mired tank and the crew members. His conduct was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Private First Class JACENKO entered the military service from Minnesota.

BILBO, JR., 019477, Field Artillery, Headquarters ***, 11th Armored Division, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an armed enemy from 23 December 1944 to 18 January 1945.
