Silver Star

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43. WD 1918), a Silver Star is awarded posthy ously by the Commanding General, 11th Alphorne Division, to the following mamed enlisted man:

Private First Class Ralph W. Mesnard, 15294114, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands on 14 Feb. ruary 1945. Private First Class Mesnard volunteered as a member of a patrol assigned the hazardous mission of penetrating seven miles behind the enemy lines to rescue approximately forty american civillians held by the enomy in the town (2 Calatagan. As the patrol neared its objective, it encountered a road block manned by enemy soldiers. The vanguard of the patrol came under a withering hail of fire. The constant intense cross fire from the enemy positions pinned the unit down. at this point, Private First Class Mesnard, with utter disregard for his personal safety, manned his machine gun andopened fire on the enemy. Although he was wounded by enemy fire, this brave soldier continued to your a deadly fire into the entity positions. Private First Class Researd's courageous action neutralized the enemy's fire sufficiently to enable the troops to effect a regrouping. This soldier then remained forward, covering the withdrawal, until he was mortally wounded. Private First Class Mesnard's dauntless, daring courage and sealous devotion to duty in the face of overwhelming odds exemplify the highest traditions of the United States army. Sergeant Michael J. Bernstein, 32119021, Field Artillery, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands on 2 and 3 February 1945. Sergeant Bernstein was in charge of a guard outpost that was attacked at night by an enemy patrol. During the insuing oction one man on the outpost was killed and two others seriously wounded. Fergeant Bernstein administered first and to the wounded men and placed them under cover in a defiladed position. This courageous soldier then manned a machine gun and held the enemy off until reinforcements arrived. The courage under fire and devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Bernstein reflect the highest credit on himself and the military service. Home address: Mrs. Blanche B. Private First Class Charles E. Dunn, 33550961, Field artillory, United States army. For gallantry in action on Inson, Philippine Tslands on 24 March 1945. During an engagement with the enemy, Frivate First Class Dunn charged forward in the face of intense hostile fire and singlehandedly attacked an enemy machine gun position. As he rushed forward, his sub-machine gun was hit by enemy fire and knocked from his hands. Undaunted, this intrepid soldier courageously continued to press the attack, and succeeded in destroying the enemy machine gun with hand grenades. Private First Class Dunn then retrieved his weapon and opened fire on a second enemy gun emplacement. The deadly fire which this soldier poured into the enemy position enabled his comrades to effect a speedy capture of the emplacement. Private First Class Dunn's great courage and keen determination to class with and destroy the enemy exemplify the finest traditions of the United States Army. Home address: Mrs. Goldie E. Major CONWAY D. KEELING, 0385638, Infantry, United States Army. gallantry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands on 7 March 1945. Major KEBLING, companding a mixed force consisting of army troops and guerrillas, was assigned the mission of destroying two enemy maval guns, which were harassing our forces and hindering mayal operations in the surrounding area. Ine hostile gun emplacements were strongly defended by a large force occupying well entrenched positions and armed with rifles, machine guns and nortars. The initial attack on 6 karch 1945, although strongly supported by artillery fire, failed to penetrate the enemy defenses. Personally leading the second attack on the following day, Pajor KJELING, with utter disregard for his Personal safety, repeatedly moved across the front in full view of the enemy and skillfully cooring d the advance of the forward elements. On numerous occasions during the attack, this courageous officer singlehandedly charged enemy positions and destroyed them with hand gremakes. Inspired by his heroic example, the troops pressed forward vigorously, overran the defenses, captured the navel guns, and routed the enemy from the area. With utter disregard for his personal safety, this brave soldier moved forward over the open terrain to the aid of the wounded officer. Under heavy enemy fire, he administered first aid and evacuated the officer to a position of safety. Staff Sergeant Lane's daring courage and high sense of loyalty reflect great on himself and are in keeping with the linest traditions of the military service. Home address: "Trs. Private First Class Robert E. Ryan, 35450032, Field artillory, United States army. For gallantry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands on 2 February 1945. Finding telephone lines cut, he then proceeded in darkness through heavy small arms fire to surmon aid for the wounded man. During this action, Private First Class Ryan was wounded by rifle fire and was forced back to his post, where he administered first aid to the wounded. Private First Class Ryan's courage under fire and devotion to duty reflect the highest credit on himself and the military service. II, Bull. 3, WD 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 11th Airborne Division, to the following named enlisted men for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on Luzon. Philippine Islands from 31 Januar. 1945 to 3 February 1945. As members of a pathfinder group, these men landed with the initial areault wave at Nasugbu, Lucon, Philippine Islands on 31 January 1945 and immediately moved forward ahead of the advancing infantry. On several occasions this group was forced to take a circuitous route of march in order to bypass strong enemy forces blocking its advance. Upon reaching Tagaytay Ridge, 18 miles inland, this group organized a force of one hundred and fifty guerrillas; and secured and held the entire ridge vicinity, which was used as a parachute drop zone, for a period of two days. The daring courage and zealous devotion to duty displayed by these soldiers made possible the successful accomplishment of this hazardous mission, thus contributing materially to the outstanding success achieved by a combined airborne-ground operation, which resulted in the shattering of the enemy defense line on Taraytay Ridge and paved the way for a rapid advance on Manila from the south. Exposing thenselves to the intense small arms fire the enemy directed at the vehicle, these soldiers began to repair the vehicle. Their work was rendered doubly hazardous due to the fact that the tank lay astride an unexploded two hundred pound bomb, emplaced as a land mine. After working steadily for one hour under these adverse conditions, the crew succeeded in repairing the damage and the tank was able to continue on with its mission. The great courage and zealous devotion to duty displayed by these soldiers are worthy of the highest praise.

Section I

Silver Star

Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bull. 43, WD 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 12th Airborne Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Private First Class Charles E. Cox, 38654827, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Luson, Philippine Islands on 4 May 1945. Private First Class Cox, while acting as lead scout for his platoon, came upon an enemy artillery emplacement. After signaling his platoon to halt, Private First Class Cox on his own initiative, moved forward until he had reached a point thirty yards from the emplacement where he was discovered by the enemy and fired upon. With complete disregard for his personal safety, this intrepid soldier singlehandedly attacked the position and succeeded in killing several of the enemy and routing the remainder. Private First Class Cox's courage and keen determination to close with and destroy the enemy set an inspiring example for his unit and exemplify the finest traditions of the military service. Technician Fourth Grade Richard M. House, 33502675, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands on 8 February 1945. When communication with adjacent units was disrupted by enemy activity, Technician Fourth Grade House volunteered to move forward with his radio to an advanced position and re-establish contact with a friendly company. While crossing a fireswept area this courageous soldier was seriously wounded. Disregarding his personal safety he remained alone in an exposed position under constant enemy fire for a reriod of four hours and maintained radio communication with the friendly company until the enemy was driven from the area. The valiant courage displayed by Technician Fourth Grade House was an inspiration to his comrades and contributed materially to the success of the unit's attack. Home address: Mrs. Hazel A. Staff Sergeant Charles R. Moles, 33533554, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Luson, Philippine Islands on 20 April 1945. During an attack against the enemy, scouts of the squad led by Staff

Sergeant Moles discovered a cave into which one of the enemy was seen to escape. After deploying his squad to cover the position, Staff Sergeant Moles moved forward alone across the fireswept terrain and attacked the enemy held cave with hand grenades. As a result of his couragnous assault eighteen enemy soldiers were driven from the save and were annihilated while attempting to escape. The dauntiers appropriate and keen determination to close with and destroy the enemy displayed by Staff Sergeant Moles exemplify the finest traditions of the military scavice. Technician Fifth Grado Kenneth D. Shiffert, 33617030. Infantry, United States army. For gallantry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands on 21 February 1945. During operations against the enemy, Technician Fifth Grade Shiffert, from a forward position saw an artillery liaison plane crash in an area closely adjacent to enemy held territory. With utter disregard for his own safety, Technician Fifth Grade Shiffert left his sheltered position and moved forward one hundred yards over fireswept terrain to rescue the pilot. Under concentrated sniper and machine gun fire, this intrepid soldier carried the wounded pilot to safety. Such a display of courage and loyalty exemplifies the finest military traditions. SECOND LIEUTENANT FIOYD T. ZOBEL (then Technical Sergeent), 02023690. Infantry (Parachutist), United States Army. For gallentry in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands on 11 March 1945. During an attack against the enemy, SECOND LIEUTENANT ZOBEL discovered three men of his platoon, two wounded and one killed, pinned down in open terrain by enemy sniper fire. SECOND LIEUTENANT ZOBEL set up a line of covering fire with machine gun and rifles, and with complete disregard for his own safety, crawled forward under fire to the Position of the wounded men and assisted them back to a point of safety where they could receive medical aid. This intrepid officer then returned and removed the body of his dead comrade to a secure area. During this action, the covering fire set up by SECOND LIEUTENANT ZOBEL materially aided the advance of an adjacent platoon. OAPTAIN JENKINS, who had been separated from his organization to perform other duties, rejoined the battalion and immediately recognized its critical situation. Taking the initiative, and with utter disregard for his personal safety, this gallant officer exposed himself to concentrated enemy fire to reorganize the scattered units of the battalion.
