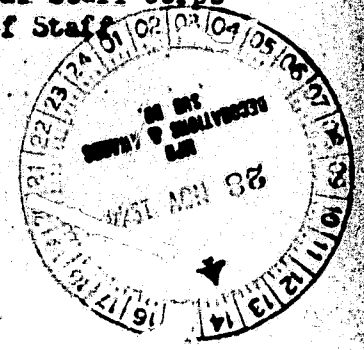
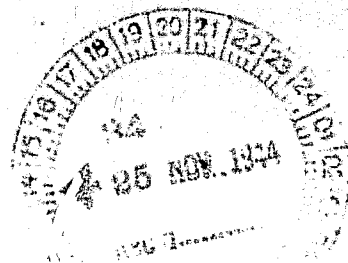

SECTION I -- POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

JOSEPH F. GRIFFITHS, 01302814, First Lieutenant, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 28 August 1944 in France. Assigned the mission of establishing a vital road block, Company A advanced to a point 400 yards from its objective and there was delayed by heavy automatic weapons fire and six enemy tanks. While the company organized a temporary defensive position, approximately 400 hostile soldiers attempted to occupy a hill on the unit's left flank. Lieutenant Griffiths, weapons platoon leader, immediately moved to an exposed position from which he could observe the enemy maneuvers and there directed accurate mortar fire on the hostile troops. When a group of the enemy gained the near slope of the hill, he seized a light machine gun and fired three belts of ammunition into their midst. Lieutenant Griffiths' skill and daring were instrumental in repelling the savage attack and saving the company positions. He was killed in action in a later engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Vivian M. Griffiths (Wife), 12 Beaverdale, Mount Carmel, Pennsylvania.

SECTION II -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

JAMES D. EVANS, 01294639, Captain, 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion, for gallantry in action on 19 August 1944 in France. Captain Evans led his reconnaissance Company forward to spearhead an attack against well-fortified enemy positions. Warned by French civilians that a hostile force occupied a nearby crossroads position, he personally scouted the area and located five enemy soldiers and an antitank gun at the road junction. He swiftly stopped his column in a covered position and led one combat squad in an assault against the enemy. Moving ahead of his attacking elements, he assumed an exposed position from which he could observe and direct tank destroyer fire on the hostile emplacement. He adjusted fire on an enemy antitank gun and an ammunition truck, destroying them both. During the intense fighting Captain Evans lay in the open beside one of the tank destroyers and, although he was wounded in the hands by fire from an antitank gun, remained dauntlessly in position until friendly infantry troops moved up to engage the enemy. Entered the Service from Sand Point, Idaho.

ALBERT G. KUDZIA, 01306287, First Lieutenant, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 21 August 1944 in France. As leader of the 1st Platoon of Company A, Lieutenant Kudzia was assigned the mission of leading an attack against an enemy headquarters well protected by soldiers in strong defensive

positions. He was leading his platoon forward when the enemy suddenly opened fire with rifles and mortars. Moving swiftly, he led one squad around the left flank of the hostile force, spotted the enemy concealed behind a clump of bushes and killed one of them with accurate fire from his carbine. The enemy immediately directed heavy machine gun fire at the squad. After locating the gun emplacement, Lieutenant Rudzia exposed himself to the hostile fire to hurl hand grenades into the position, silencing the machine gun. On the following morning, he led his platoon as a combat patrol against the headquarters group and captured 45 prisoners and many valuable maps and documents. Entered the Service from Malanzoo, Mich

LINLEY W. GERRINGER, 01168246, First Lieutenant, 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion, for gallantry in action on 12 September 1944 in France. Lieutenant Gerringer, platoon leader in the Reconnaissance Company, was leading his men forward in an attack when sudden enemy small arms and mortar fire stopped the platoon's advance. After an attempt to by-pass the strong point had failed, Lieutenant Gerringer crawled forward to a position from which he could observe the hostile force. Although the increased intensity of enemy fire forced him to withdraw to a place of cover, he soon returned to his exposed position and called for artillery support. Ignoring the heavy concentration of mortar fire directed at him, he adjusted effective artillery shelling on the enemy emplacements. He was painfully wounded by a hurtling shell fragment but, mastering the pain of his wound, maintained his position until he had neutralized the hostile fire and forced the enemy to withdraw. Entered the Service from Greensboro, North Carolina.

PHILIP A. RAFFERTY, 01181416, Second Lieutenant, 133d Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 21 June 1944 in Italy. Lieutenant Rafferty was attached to the 3d Battalion, 143d Infantry Regiment, as forward observer for his artillery battalion. He was ordered to leave his position with the reserve company of the battalion and join one of the two leading companies which had been subjected to a savage enemy counterattack. Lieutenant Rafferty led his section forward through incessant artillery, mortar and small arms fire toward the hill on which the company was fighting. Although he could have taken cover at the base of the hill, he pressed on to the top and established his observation post in an exposed position from which he could observe and direct fire on enemy targets. Heavy hostile shellfire was blasting the surrounding area, and there had been no time for digging fighting holes. When three enemy tanks charged his position, Lieutenant Rafferty calmly adjusted effective artillery fire on them, disabling two. He then shifted his fire to hostile infantrymen moving forward in the attack and inflicted heavy casualties on them. When the enemy reorganized for another assault, he courageously maintained his hazardous position and continued directing fire on them, contributing materially to the repulse of the attack. Entered the Service from Chicago, Illinois.

PAUL M. LIS, 33167852, Technical Sergeant, Company K, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 18 August 1944 in France. Sergeant Lis led his platoon as a combat patrol to clean up enemy resistance in a valley. While attacking a well defended enemy headquarters, the platoon was subjected to heavy machine gun and rifle fire. Cognizant of the necessity for immediate action, Sergeant Lis led a squad around the left flank of the position where he spotted the hostile machine gun. Taking careful aim, he fired a rifle grenade into the emplacement, knocking out the gun. Then, leading the squad in an assault, he killed two of the enemy and, with the aid of his men, captured three prisoners. His quick thinking and courage resulted in the destruction of the hostile strong point and enabled his platoon to continue its advance. Entered the Service from Reading, Pa.

ROBERT E. MC KEE, 34208780, Staff Sergeant, Company B, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 30 September 1944 in France. Sergeant McKee was leader of a five-man patrol sent forward to investigate two houses which were thought to be occupied by the enemy. In order to reach one of the buildings it was necessary to cross a clearing 200 yards long. While two of the patrol members remained in position to cover the advance, Sergeant McKee led his other two toward the house across terrain open and swept by hostile machine gun fire. They reached the building, killed two hostile soldiers and forced two others to flee, then returned the hostile fire so that their comrades could cross the clearing and rejoin them. These soldiers were killed before they could reach the house. When the enemy launched an assault, Sergeant McKee held his position as long as possible, then, as the hostile soldiers rushed the house from two sides, he and his companions were forced to withdraw into the woods. Although he was the target for heavy fire which killed another of his comrades, he succeeded in reaching the friendly lines with his valuable report on the enemy's disposition. Entered the Service from Jacksonville, Florida.

HERMAN W. VOLTNER, 32787921, Staff Sergeant, Company K, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 17 August 1944 in France. Sergeant Voltner, a squad leader, was assigned the task of defending the left flank of a road block which was protecting an important bridge. Moving under cover of dense woods, a large hostile force approached to within 100 yards of the road block and launched a savage assault. Aware that a swift, aggressive action might rout the enemy, Sergeant Voltner ordered his squad to apply its maximum fire power and boldly led the advance in the face of point blank small arms and mortar fire. During the intense fighting which ensued, he spotted an enemy officer in a concealed position near some of his comrades. He fired a burst from his sub-machine gun which killed the officer. When he located a group of enemy soldiers who were harassing his men, he opened fire again and wounded several of them. Under his forceful leadership the squad overwhelmed the hostile force, so that when he called to them and demanded their surrender, the disorganized enemy had no alternative. Approximately 80 prisoners were captured and four enemy soldiers killed. Entered the Service from New York, New York.

JOHN YBARBO, 38026352, Staff Sergeant, Company K, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 17 August 1944 in France. While the 2d Platoon of Company A was assaulting a well-organized enemy strong point, the attackers were pinned to the ground by heavy hostile small arms, mortar and artillery fire. Sergeant Ybarbo was assigned the mission of leading his squad to the rear of the enemy position in order to relieve the pressure on the remainder of the platoon. He skillfully maneuvered the men to the left rear of the strong point and there built up a line of fire. When he realized that his squad's fire power was insufficient to dislodge the well-entrenched enemy, Sergeant Ybarbo swiftly organized his men and led a bold and determined assault. Using his bayonet, rifle and grenades in the intense fighting which followed, he alone killed three of the hostile soldiers, wounded two and captured six prisoners. Although he was painfully wounded, Sergeant Ybarbo directed his men in overcoming the resistance, thereby enabling his platoon to continue its advance and achieve its objective. Entered the Service from Victoria, Texas.

PAUL J. TURPIN, 20805035, Sergeant, Company L, 142d Infantry Regiment. Entered the Service from Stephenville, Texas.

STEPHEN F. STEPHONAC, 33437663, Private First Class, Company L, 142d Infantry Regiment. Entered the Service from Washington, Pennsylvania.

For gallantry in action on 30 September 1944 in France. After Company L had seized and occupied the western slope of an important hill, these men proceeded to investigate the immediate vicinity of their position, patrolling 300 yards to the front to assure their platoon's security. During the reconnaissance they observed enemy activity in the valley below them and located an artillery battery, an occupied bivouac area, a motor pool and a truck column. Although they were subjected to a heavy barrage from the hostile artillery, these men found an artillery radio operator and remained in the impact area to relay information and direct effective fire on the enemy targets. Their accurate artillery shelling scored hits on all three gun positions, inflicted heavy casualties on troops in the bivouac area, damaged many of the vehicles and completely disorganized the hostile force.

EZRA R. ROBINSON, 35277392, Corporal, Company H, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 29 August 1944 in France. When Corporal Robinson, mortar gunner, put his weapon into action against enemy transports, he immediately became the target for heavy fire from two hostile tanks. Ignoring the dangers to which he was exposed, he courageously remained in position and continued blasting the enemy force with his accurate mortar fire. When the incessant tank fire inflicted several casualties near him, he was told to leave his mortar and take cover. But, contemptuous of personal safety, Corporal Robinson continued firing until the enemy was forced to withdraw. His skill and daring resulted in heavy casualties to enemy personnel, the destruction of a truck and an antiaircraft gun and irreparable damage to other vehicles. Entered the Service from Zanesville, Ohio.

JOHN E. LOGAN, 33440163, Private, Company G, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 31 August 1944 in France. During an attack against strong enemy positions, Private Logan was first scout of the leading squad in the 3d Platoon. While crossing an open field, the platoon suddenly became the target for heavy enemy fire directed from a cluster of houses. Immediately cognizant of this serious threat to the safety of his comrades, Private Logan ran 75 yards across open, fire-swept terrain toward the nearest enemy position, firing his rifle as he advanced. He killed two of the enemy soldiers and forced the remaining eight to surrender. His quick-thinking and daring enabled the other platoons of the company to advance and clear the entire sector of enemy resistance, inflicting heavy casualties on the hostile troops. Entered the Service from Mount Lebanon, Pennsylvania.

While preparing to return to their bivouac area, they heard the cries of infantrymen who had been wounded in an uncleared minefield. In spite of heavy enemy shell fire which blasted the terrain, the above named soldiers unhesitatingly made their way into the mined area and, with the assistance of their comrades, carried the wounded men to safety, secured medical aid and assisted in their evacuation. The above named soldiers have been reported missing in action from a subsequent engagement.

Aware that without the radio the accuracy of the fire missions would be greatly impaired, he braved the heavy small arms fire to move the instrument to a covered position where it was of inestimable value in furnishing effective artillery support. Entered the Service from Corsicana, Texas.

ROBERT T. KEEBLE, 20815395, Private, Battery A, 133d Field Artillery Battalion, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 15 August 1944 in France. SECTION I -- POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

FRANCIS C. MC CANN, 01287035, First Lieutenant, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 22 and 28 September 1944 in France. While Company C was occupying a defensive position at a strategic road net, a large enemy force launched a savage attack. Without waiting for orders, Lieutenant McCann boldly moved his platoon through a densely wooded area to the enemy's flank. He led the assault against the hostile troops in the face of heavy fire and directed his men in repelling the enemy attackers before they could reach his company's position. Five days later, when his platoon was attempting to cross a road during an attack, the enemy suddenly opened fire with machine guns concealed in the woods. Lieutenant McCann worked his way forward, beyond his platoon, to locate the gun positions. He found the machine guns but, before he could return to his platoon, was killed by the hostile fire. Next of kin: Mrs. Charles B. McCann (Mother), 10 West Street, Houlton, Maine.

MAURICE W. HOWARD, 36190529, Staff Sergeant, Company K, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 1 January 1944 in Italy. While moving toward new defensive positions, the leading squads of Company K were subjected to heavy enemy mortar and machine gun fire. After Sergeant Howard, leader of the 2d squad, had directed his men to a place affording cover from the barrage, he was informed that one of his men had been seriously wounded and was lying in an exposed position. Immediately leaving his place of safety, he ran through the incessant hostile fire to the spot where his comrade lay. Although Sergeant Howard was wounded in both arms, he mastered the pain of his wounds and removed his comrade from the battlefield. He was killed in action in a later engagement. Next of kin: Mr. Fred B. Howard (Father), RFD #4, Ionia, Michigan.

SECTION II -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

ORRIN O. MC DANIELS, 0403714, Captain, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 27 September 1944 in France. As executive officer of the 1st Battalion, Captain McDaniels was moving with the battalion command post on an approach march. After the leading rifle companies had successfully crossed a strategic highway, the following units were suddenly subjected to enemy machine gun fire from both flanks. The intense fire threatened to disorganize the heavy weapons company and Headquarters Company, so Captain McDaniels swiftly withdrew these

units, supervised their reorganization and placed the remaining rifle company in support, in order that the group might rejoin the two leading rifle companies. Although he suffered a painful leg wound, Captain McDaniels continued directing the movements of the units by radio. He removed those elements of the battalion from the valley which were subjected to a heavy artillery barrage and maintained control until the battalion was reassembled. Entered the Service from Tulsa, Oklahoma.

CHARLES W. GARNHAM, 01305262, First Lieutenant, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 3 October 1944 in France. When Lieutenant Garnham assumed command of Company F, the organization had been seriously weakened by numerous casualties. Assigned the mission of following Company E in an attack against enemy positions in a heavily wooded area, Lieutenant Garnham moved his company into position. The assault began, and the leading elements were subjected to artillery and mortar shelling and machine gun fire. Lieutenant Garnham advanced fearlessly through the heavy barrage, leading his men forward in the attack. Although he suffered three wounds in his leg during the fighting, he valiantly continued the assault and led his company in smashing the enemy resistance and achieve the objective. Entered the Service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

JOSEPH M. DENAS, 01173585, First Lieutenant, 133d Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 29 August 1944 in France. While the 3d Battalion, 143d Infantry Regiment, was defending the west slope of a hill, Lieutenant Denas, artillery liaison officer, was charged with coordinating the artillery fire directed against the enemy attackers. He was on duty at the battalion command post when he spotted a column of tracked vehicles, infantry and artillery approaching the command post and the rear of the battalion positions. Although darkness obscured observation, Lieutenant Denas used maps to direct artillery fire on the enemy column. For two hours, until daybreak, he stood by his radio, working in an exposed position constantly subjected to direct small arms and artillery fire. During this period friendly troops located only 100 yards from his position were captured and the enemy penetrated to within 25 yards of his post but he remained determinedly with his radio and, as the enemy pushed forward, brought an artillery concentration within the perilously close distance of 50 yards from his position. Largely as a result of his courageous and skillful performance, the enemy was prevented from over-running the rear of the battalion positions and was driven back with heavy casualties. Entered the Service from South Fork, Pennsylvania.

WILLIAM P. LYNCH, 35327187, Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Detachment, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 14 June 1944 in Italy. When, in the initial stages of an attack, the assault platoons of Company K were subjected to heavy enemy machine gun fire, a rifleman was wounded and lay in an exposed position, unable to move. Tec 5 Lynch unhesitatingly left his place of comparative safety and started toward his injured comrade. While he was advancing across open terrain under enemy observation, the increased tempo of hostile fire forced him to take cover. However, aware of the importance of furnishing immediate first aid treatment, he immediately arose again and continued forward, braving small arms fire directed from positions to his front and flank, until he reached the wounded man. After administering swift and effective first aid, he assisted his patient to a place of safety from which he was evacuated. A later examination revealed that, had it not been for Tec 5 Lynch's prompt treatment, the soldier would have bled to death. Entered the Service from Toledo, Ohio.

CHARLES MARTIN, 35794910, Private First Class, Company D, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 26 August 1944 in France. Private First Class Martin's heavy machine gun squad advanced in close support of a rifle platoon moving forward in the attack. When enemy tanks and riflemen suddenly opened fire, the rifle platoon built up a defensive line around the machine gun. Private First Class Martin assisted his comrades in putting the gun into action and furnishing an ample supply of ammunition for it, and then he exposed himself to aimed rifle fire in order to reach a position from which he could return the enemy fire. Using rifle grenades and his carbine, he inflicted several casualties on the hostile force. An enemy tank charged the friendly troops, but he remained staunchly in position and fired rifle grenades at it, contributing materially to its final destruction. Entered the Service from Cincinnati, Ohio.

WILLIAM KEENER, 38036425, Private First Class, Company A, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 26 August 1944 in France. Private First Class Keener was a wireman in the 60mm mortar section of Company A. When a savage enemy infantry and tank attack threatened his company's newly won position, he realized the need for a communications wire between the mortar positions and the observation post so that accurate mortar fire could be directed on the hostile troops. His platoon leader warned him not to attempt the hazardous mission, but Private First Class Keener courageously started to string wire across the flat, open field which separated the mortars from the observation post. The terrain offered no cover or concealment from the sweeping machine gun fire, but he pressed forward until he was struck down by bursts of machine gun fire. He was unable to complete his mission because of severe back and shoulder wounds. Entered the Service from Merkel, Texas.

DEWEY GALLOWAY, 34592921, Private First Class, Company B, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 16 August 1944 in France. Private First Class Galloway was advancing with the leading platoon of his company when the enemy suddenly opened fire from well entrenched positions. Heavy machine pistol fire cut away the gas mask from his back; but he dauntlessly helped to quiet the machine pistol which had protected the entrance to an enemy dugout housing eight hostile soldiers. With this danger eliminated, he assaulted the position with fixed bayonet and, upon entering the dugout, subdued the enemy and forced them to surrender. As a result of his daring and aggressiveness, a hostile strong point was eliminated and the company was able to continue its advance. Entered the Service from Lake Toxaway, South Carolina.

JOSEPH JANOWITZ, 12058617, Private First Class, Company H, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 24 September 1944 in France. Private First Class Janowitz, gunner in a heavy machine gun squad, was riding on a weapons carrier with his squad when an enemy machine gun suddenly opened fire, inflicting several casualties on the friendly troops. Private First Class Janowitz and his companions sought cover in a ditch by the side of the road and were pinned down by rapid bursts of fire which discouraged the slightest movement. Aware of the necessity for immediate action, Private First Class Janowitz left the ditch alone, removed a machine gun from the weapons carrier and put it into action against the enemy. Without assistance he returned the hostile fire, silenced the enemy gun and enabled his companions to retrieve their weapons and continue the attack. Entered the Service from New York, New York.

R E S T R I C T E D

WILLIAM B. SMILEY, 34893321, Private, Company K, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 20 September 1944 in France. As gunner in a light machine gun section, Private Smiley was advancing with Company K in an attack against an important hostile stronghold. When a sudden enemy flank assault threatened to disorganize the company, the 1st Platoon, on the company's right flank, established a hasty defense in an attempt to repel the counterattack. Aware of the need for increased fire power, Private Smiley seized his machine gun, worked his way alone over 100 yards of exposed terrain swept by heavy enemy fire and put his gun into action on line with the 1st Platoon. He directed accurate fire on the hostile force and maintained his hazardous position without assistance until the attackers were forced to withdraw. By his skill and aggressiveness he contributed materially to the repulse of the assault and personally killed at least ten enemy soldiers. Entered the Service from Belmont, N. C.

SECTION III -- AWARD OF OAK LEAF CLUSTER


Under the provisions of Army regulations 600-45, an Oak Leaf Cluster in lieu of a second Silver Star is awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

JAMES E. SEELEY, 35276657, Technical Sergeant, Company B, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 27 and 28 September 1944 in France. During Company B's attack over wooded, hilly terrain, Sergeant Seeley was assigned the task of leading the assault platoon. When the enemy suddenly opened fire with artillery and small arms, inflicting several casualties on the attackers, Sergeant Seeley moved among his men and issued clear, concise orders which prevented confusion and disorganization. A group of hostile soldiers assaulted the company from the rear, and Sergeant Seeley was ordered to smash the resistance. In spite of the heavy shelling and small arms fire, he fearlessly led his men against the enemy, maintaining excellent control within the platoon, and directed them in repelling the hostile force, inflicting several casualties and capturing six prisoners. With this threat eliminated, he again led his platoon forward in the attack, overcame minor resistance, achieved his objective and organized a defensive position. When the enemy launched a counterattack, Sergeant Seeley directed the fire of his men and completely routed the attackers. While performing these deeds, he was seriously wounded by the hostile fire. Entered the Service from Peninsula, Ohio.

SECTION I — POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

PAUL R. NAIL, 20804657, Staff Sergeant, Company B, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 29 September 1944 in France. As leader of a section of machine guns in Company B, Sergeant Nail was assigned the mission of supporting an assault platoon in an attack against strong enemy defenses. When the company was suddenly subjected to heavy small arms, mortar and artillery fire, one of the platoons was pinned to the ground. Immediately cognizant of this threat to the safety of his comrades, Sergeant Nail led his gun crews through the hostile barrage into a position from which accurate machine gun fire could be directed on the enemy. The guns were swiftly put into action and rendered effective support to the assault elements, enabling them to continue their advance and attain their objective. During this action Sergeant Nail was killed by the hostile fire. Next of kin: Mrs. Annabelle Nail (mother), route #1, Ovalo, Texas.

ROBERT J. DE KING, 36637328, Sergeant, Company C, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 16 August 1944 in France. Sergeant DeKing, assistant squad leader, was assigned the mission of manning an outpost position on the company's right flank. He established an observation post from which he could watch three enemy self-propelled weapons at the other end of a long open field. When the enemy suddenly opened fire on the observation post with heavy, direct artillery shelling, the men with Sergeant DeKing fled from the exposed position and sought cover from the barrage. Sergeant DeKing remained at the observation post alone, courageously braving the shellfire to protect his company's flank. After an hour of incessant shelling, the barrage decreased in intensity, but Sergeant DeKing was wounded by the last shell explosion. He died in a hospital two days later. Next of kin: Mrs. Matilda DeKing (mother), 228 Aurora Avenue, Aurora, Illinois.

CLARENCE C. PETERSON, 37436805, Technician Fifth Grade, Company B, 753d Tank Battalion, for gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. While supporting the 141st Infantry Regiment in an attack, Tec 5 Peterson's tank was destroyed by hostile tank fire, the tank commander and assistant driver were killed and the gunner seriously wounded. Contemptuous of personal safety, Tec 5 Peterson remained with the injured gunner and, while artillery shells crashed around him, administered first aid. When the enemy counterattacked and the infantry troops withdrew, he carried the injured soldier under incessant small

arms and artillery fire to an aid station, then returned to his unit and reported for duty. Tec 5 Peterson was killed in a later engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Ester C. Peterson (mother), RFD #2, Lockridge, Iowa.

ERNEST M. GRAHAM, 34098434, Private, Medical Detachment, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 26 August 1944 in France. While Company C was advancing through a densely wooded area, the enemy suddenly opened fire with small arms and artillery. Without waiting for the shelling to stop, Private Graham, a litter bearer, advanced over the shell-torn terrain to assist his wounded comrades. While administering treatment to an injured soldier, he himself was painfully wounded, but he steadfastly refused to accept aid and continued working with the casualties. Contemptuous of personal safety and comfort, he moved from one exposed position to another, treating and comforting the wounded, until, after an hour and a half of incessant shelling, the barrage was lifted and all the casualties were evacuated. Private Graham was killed in action in a subsequent engagement. Next of kin: Miss Francis Luther (Aunt), 757 Anderson Street, Macon, Georgia.

SECTION II -- POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF OAK LEAF CLUSTER

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, an Oak Leaf Cluster in lieu of a second Silver Star is posthumously awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

FRANCIS D. CROME, 35791371, Technical Sergeant (then Staff Sergeant), Company A, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 28 August 1944 in France. While his platoon occupied a temporary defensive position preparatory to continuing an attack against an enemy stronghold, Sergeant Crome led a patrol forward in order to locate hostile gun and tank positions. After advancing a short distance, he spotted an enemy tank moving over a slight knoll just ahead of him and only 75 yards beyond the company outpost he had left. He immediately ran back to the outpost, secured a bazooka and opened fire on the tank. Then, with a comrade, he ran forward directly toward the charging tank in order to shorten the range and increase his accuracy. After reaching a position only 35 yards from the tank, he and his companion alternately ran across the open, flat terrain, exposing themselves to the heavy enemy fire, to face the onrushing tank and delay its advance. Although his every movement was subject to enemy observation, he ran forward three times to fire on the tank and forced it to withdraw before it could attack the company. Technical Sergeant Crome was killed in a subsequent engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Sylvia Crome (mother), RFD #1, Lewisburg, Ohio.

WYLL DENHAM, 20819054, Sergeant, Battery C, 132d Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 15 September 1944 in France. Before the men of Battery C could dig either gun pits or foxholes, the enemy registered a heavy concentration of artillery fire on their new position. The ammunition, powder and camouflage nets of the 3d gun section were set afire, and the men were exposed to the explosions of their own ammunition. Immediately cognizant of the situation, Sergeant Denham, the section chief, left his place of comparative safety and braved the enemy shelling and exploding ammunition to fight the fire. With no thoughts only for the safety of his men, he remained in the shelled area until, with the assistance of his cannoneer, he had extinguished the blaze. His quick thinking and fearlessness saved his howitzer from a wreck and prevented possible loss of life, but Sergeant Denham died of wounds received in performing this deed. Next of kin: Mrs. Beaulah Denham (Wife), 206 Spring Street, Waverford, Texas.

SECTION III — AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

JAMES L. VEILE, 36448295, Staff Sergeant (then Sergeant), Company F, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 21 June 1944 in Italy. During an attack against strong enemy defenses, Sergeant Veile, acting platoon sergeant, was advancing with his men when his attention was attracted by a noise to his left. With two soldiers from his platoon he moved in the direction of the sound. After advancing a few yards he and his companions were suddenly subjected to heavy fire from five enemy machine pistols. Instead of seeking cover for himself, Sergeant Veile crawled forward toward the enemy emplacement and directed his two men into firing positions. Then, after hurling hand grenades, he and his comrades leapt to their feet and, in the face of direct machine pistol fire, assaulted the position and bayoneted the enemy soldiers. Sergeant Veile destroyed the hostile emplacement and returned to the company command post with two prisoners. Entered the Service from Quincy, Illinois.

THELBERT R. WINGATE, 20814619, Staff Sergeant, Battery C, 132d Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 15 September 1944 in France. When a heavy enemy artillery concentration was registered on the gun positions of Battery C, eight men were wounded by the shell explosions. Without waiting for a lull in the shelling, Sergeant Wingate, with two companions, left his place of safety and braved the artillery fire to aid the injured soldiers. While shells crashed around them, they carried one of the men to a position of cover. They immediately returned for another casualty; and, while in the process of moving him, Sergeant Wingate was seriously wounded by artillery shell fragments. Mastering the pain of his wounds, he continued assisting his comrades in evacuating the casualty. After carrying the man to a place of safety, he collapsed from loss of blood and shock. Entered the Service from Bonham, Texas.

ROBERT W. CROISANT, 36124213, Sergeant, Company A, 753d Tank Battalion, for gallantry in action on 15 August 1944 in France. During the assault landing operation on D-day in the invasion of Southern France, Sergeant Croisant's amphibious tank was disabled and immobilized by the enemy artillery fire which blasted the area. Rather than evacuate his crew, he chose to support the infantry troops as they landed on the beach. Although he was severely wounded about the face and neck, he calmly commanded his tank and knocked out an enemy machine gun nest which had been harassing the friendly troops. When a shell became lodged in the muzzle of his gun, Sergeant Croisant immediately dismounted and, in the face of artillery and machine gun fire, rammed the round free. By his valor and determination, he supported the infantry and contributed materially to the success of the operation. Entered the Service from Willmette, Illinois.

WILLIAM J. JOHNSON, 38051032, Technician Fifth Grade, Battery A, 135d Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 29 August 1944 in France. Tec 5 Johnson was a radio operator for the forward observer party attached to Company C of the 143d Infantry Regiment. When an enemy force attacked the company defenses, the outposts withdrew to more advantageous positions. Tec 5 Johnson had been conducting a fire mission at the forward observer's post and immediately moved to a position from which he could direct fire on the enemy and delay their advance. The accurate fire from his carbine disorganized the center group of hostile soldiers and forced them to withdraw. He then moved to the left flank

and began harassing the enemy in this sector. When his ammunition was exhausted, he remained in his exposed position and hurled hand grenades until the hostile force was routed. His courageous deeds resulted in two enemy dead, one wounded, and two prisoners; and, by repelling the attack, he prevented a possible disaster to the company command post. Entered the Service from Texas City, Texas.

THEODORE H. ANDREWS, 0365318, major, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 29 August 1944 in France. When the entire 3d Battalion was engaged in a savage fight with strong enemy troops, only the normal command post administrative section remained to protect the battalion command post. As the numerically superior enemy pushed forward, the command post position became perilous. Major Andrews, battalion commander, displayed outstanding leadership and courage when he quickly placed every available man in advantageous positions where the maximum use of weapons and ammunition was assured. Fearlessly exposing himself to the heavy enemy artillery and tank fire, he moved among the men, encouraging them by his intrepid example. During the course of the intense fighting, enemy tanks penetrated to within 200 yards of the command post, but Major Andrews' brilliant leadership prevented the hostile force from overrunning the position and contributed materially to the capture of a large number of prisoners. Entered the Service from Caldwell, Texas.

SECTION V — RESCINDING OF AWARD

OK So much of General Orders Number 340, cs, this Headquarters, as posthumously awards a Silver Star to CHESTERFIELD BALLARD, 34621656, Private, Medical Detachment, 143d Infantry Regiment, is rescinded, this being erroneous duplication of previous award.

COMMENDATION FOR EXCEPTIONALLY MERITORIOUS CONDUCT

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-55, each of the following named individuals is commended for exceptionally meritorious conduct.

GAULDEN M. WATKINS, 017292, Lieutenant Colonel, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 15 June 1944 in Italy. During the pursuit of the enemy army to the north of Rome, a large hostile force, supported by artillery, moved into position on high, commanding ground. Lieutenant Colonel Watkins, commanding the 2d Battalion, led his men in an assault against the enemy. He encouraged the assault elements by his example of courage and pressed forward through rain and darkness, driving across rugged terrain in the face of heavy enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire. As a result of his brilliant leadership the battalion forced the enemy troops from their positions, captured many prisoners, and enabled the regiment to continue its advance to the north. Entered the United States Military Academy from Nevada.

RUFUS J. CLEGHORN, 0411677, Captain, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 16 and 22 September 1944 in France. While making a route reconnaissance to insure the rapid installation of communications, Captain Cleghorn, Headquarters Commandant, was attacked by an enemy force then engaged in an intense fire fight with one of the front line companies. Retaining his calm judgement, he opened fire with his machine gun, delaying the enemy and enabling the assault company to improve its position. Although his driver was wounded, Captain Cleghorn courageously continued firing until his supply of ammunition was exhausted. On another occasion, while operating with the leading assault elements, he threatened a group of enemy soldiers with hand grenades and took six prisoners. Entered the Service from Waco, Texas.

GERALD W. EVANS, 01165012, Captain (then First Lieutenant), 155th Field Artillery Battalion, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 18 November 1943 to 17 March 1944 in Italy. When the commander of Headquarters Battery was hospitalized, Lieutenant Evans, battalion survey officer, immediately assumed command. Although continuous artillery shelling, inclement weather, disrupted communications and heavy casualties had lowered morale and efficiency, Lieutenant Evans accepted his new duties with enthusiasm and determination. He personally reconnoitered a new area and moved the battery to it, salvaged damaged equipment and restored and maintained wire communications. He took his turn at wire repair and the switchboard, frequently working for 20 hours a day, and, by his own example of tireless intrepidity, inspired members of his command to redouble their efforts and perform each new task efficiently and uncomplainingly. Entered the Service from Missoula, Montana.

SAMUEL P. ARMITAGE, 01175924, First Lieutenant, 131st Field Artillery Battalion, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 9 September 1943 to 30 June 1944 in Italy. During this period Lieutenant Armitage, battalion munitions officer, performed his important duties with calm efficiency and indefatigable

determination in spite of adverse conditions of weather and terrain and the almost constant threat of enemy fire. Although it was frequently necessary to hand-carry ammunition to the front line troops, he overcame the difficulties of muddy roads, artillery shelling and attacks by enemy aircraft and assured his battalion of a continuous supply of ammunition. Entered the Service from Lynn, Massachusetts.

WALTER A. WACHOWIAK, 01314855, First Lieutenant, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 15 August 1944 in France. While awaiting orders to attack an enemy defense, Lieutenant Wachowiak, on his own initiative, established an observation post on commanding ground overlooking the hostile positions. From this vantage point he located the source of enemy machine gun fire directed from a hill near his company's position. After carefully observing the machine gun bursts, he called for sniper fire and killed two of the enemy. Then, with the aid of a platoon sergeant, he delivered a large volume of mortar fire on the enemy position, disorganizing the hostile force. His aggressive action enabled other elements to surround the enemy and capture 274 prisoners. Entered the Service from Stevens Point, Wisconsin.

FRANK A. STUMB, 01683516, Second Lieutenant, 111th Medical Battalion, (then 143d Infantry Regiment), for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 15 August to 15 September 1944 in France. As medical administrative officer for the 2d Battalion Aid Station, Lieutenant Stumb distinguished himself on D-day in the invasion of Southern France by his ability to organize the litter bearers into a highly coordinated, effective unit. During the rapid pursuit of the enemy army to the north, his problems were increased by the extended communication and supply lines, the uncertainty of moves and the wide deployment of forces, but he consistently displayed keen judgement and superior ability in mastering the unpredictable situations. On one occasion, when casualties were heavy and the evacuation system working smoothly, he offered his services in administering first aid to the wounded and exhibited unusual skill in this respect. Entered the Service from Nashville, Tennessee.

ROBERT L. BARTON, 02055221, Second Lieutenant, 111th Medical Battalion (then 143d Infantry Regiment), for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 9 September 1943 to 15 September 1944 in Italy and France. As supply sergeant for the regimental medical detachment until 9 September 1944 and then as medical administrative officer, Lieutenant Barton consistently distinguished himself by his driving initiative and keen foresight. During the savage fighting in the Italian winter campaign he braved heavy enemy shell fire to organize litter squads when the evacuation of wounded was seriously threatened. He was among the first to rush badly needed combat suits to front line aid men during the cold, wet days of the mountain operations. When, in the advance on Rome and the pursuit of the enemy in France, the extended supply lines added to his problems, Lieutenant Barton, by skillful manipulation, always maintained an ample amount of supplies on hand. Entered the Service from West, Texas.

BOB G. GAHAGAN, W-2109908, Chief Warrant Officer, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 15 August to 17 September 1944 in France. During this period, when the supply problem was increased by the transportation shortage, Warrant Officer Gahagan, assistant regimental S-4, displayed excellent judgement and superior ability in supplying units of the 143d Infantry Regiment. During the rapid pursuit of the enemy army from the beaches of Southern France to the North, he maintained a regimental supply point in the immediate vicinity of the battalions. In spite of adverse weather conditions and the constant threat of enemy fire, he insured the regimental units a maximum of vital supplies.

although he employed a minimum of vehicles in furnishing them. Entered the Service from Houston, Texas.

RAYMOND H. ZEPF, W-2105278, Chief Warrant Officer, Infantry Band, 36th Infantry Division, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 1 January to 5 June 1944 in Italy. When Warrant Officer Zepp assumed command of the 36th Infantry Band, his organization was composed of two 26 piece bands which were inadequate to fill the great demand of the troops for musical entertainment. Employing his extensive knowledge of the techniques of all types of musical organizations, he created, within the original framework of his two bands, a symphonic stringed orchestra, six small orchestras, three large dance orchestras, many church ensembles, a 56 piece concert band, and a special marching band for divisional and regimental reviews. While the Division was in combat he took his bandmen to forward areas near the front lines and entertained the troops. Displaying unusual ingenuity and a boundless enthusiasm, he contributed materially to the high morale of the officers and men by furnishing pleasurable release and relaxation in his musical entertainments. Entered the Service from Hanover, Pa.

THOMAS O. WOOLDRIDGE, 38037325, Technical Sergeant, Company L, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 15 to 29 August 1944 in France. On D-day Sergeant Wooldridge, platoon sergeant, landed on the beaches of Southern France and, courageously exposing himself to enemy fire, led his men into battle. On 28 August, when the First Sergeant of Company L was wounded and evacuated, he assumed his duties and distinguished himself by the fearless and efficient manner in which he conducted himself. On one occasion, when Company L met savage enemy resistance, Sergeant Wooldridge advanced to the most forward elements of the company to determine the situation, then had wire communications established between the command post and the advance positions. During the course of the fighting, enemy artillery and tanks shelled the command post almost incessantly, but Sergeant Wooldridge remained to act as liaison between infantry and artillery. Ignoring the heavy shelling, he skillfully directed artillery and mortar fire on the enemy attackers, inflicting numerous casualties and destroying such valuable equipment. Entered the Service from Royce City, Texas.

PAUL J. LINK, 38120958, Staff Sergeant, Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 141st Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 9 September 1943 to 25 June 1944 in Italy. Sergeant Link landed with the 1st Battalion on D-day in the invasion of Italy and distinguished himself by his calm, efficient performance of duty under constant dangers and difficulties during the trying days that followed. After assuming the duties of operations sergeant for his battalion, he worked tirelessly carrying food and ammunition to the front line troops over precipitous mountain trails frequently blasted by enemy artillery fire. In spite of adverse weather conditions and the almost constant threat of enemy fire, he was of immeasurable assistance to the battalion S-3 and contributed materially to the high morale of the men working with him. Entered the Service from Ll. Paso, Texas.

WILLIAM J. CHAMBERS, 37666079, Staff Sergeant, Company I, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 17 August 1944 in France. After an initial attempt to establish a road block north of a recently captured town had failed, Sergeant Chambers led his squad forward in a second attempt. Darkness prevented his seeing for more than a yard to his front, but he heard hostile soldiers on either side of the road near his objective. Moving about cautiously, he found one of the enemy and forced him to surrender. When a second soldier

challenged him, he fell to the ground and narrowly escaped injury from a hand grenade which exploded at his side. Aware of the necessity for continuing forward to complete his mission, he began searching the ground to his front and flanks to locate the enemy. A thorough investigation of the area showed that the main body of the enemy had withdrawn, and Sergeant Chambers again led his squad toward its objective. Entered the Service from Webster City, Iowa.

ROLAND C. HENRY, 20805973, Technician Fifth Grade, Headquarters Company, 3d Battalion, 143d Infantry Regiment. Entered the Service from Itasca, Texas.

WILLIAM E. COLLIER, 33471795, Private First Class, Headquarters Company, 3d Battalion, 143d Infantry Regiment. Entered the Service from Philadelphia, Pa.


For exceptionally meritorious conduct on 28 August 1944 in France. The above named soldiers were members of a small force sent out to block the enemy's route of retreat to the north. When a $\frac{1}{4}$ ton vehicle became the target for direct enemy small arms and tank fire, the driver was forced to leave it and seek cover. Realizing the importance of the vehicle for the maintenance of supply and evacuation of the wounded, the above named soldiers ran across 50 yards of fire-swept terrain to recover the jeep. When they reached it, they bravely jumped in and drove it to a place of safety, preventing its destruction by the enemy.

CLAUDE R. DAVIS, JR., 37229379, Private First Class, Company I, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 27 September 1944 in France. Private First Class Davis was a member of a seven-man patrol ordered to investigate houses near a strategic road junction. As the patrol approached its objective, the enemy opened fire with artillery, rifles and machine guns; and Private First Class Davis received a painful leg wound. He succeeded in crawling to a covered position behind one of the houses where his patrol leader administered first aid. Rather than endanger the lives of his comrades, he insisted that the patrol members leave him alone and seek safety for themselves. Later, when an aid man reached him, he refused to take a drug, explaining that he wanted to retain all faculties so that he would not be a burden to the other men of the patrol. Entered the Service from Kansas City, Missouri.

BARNEY B. JONES, 20818647, Technician Fifth Grade, 736th Ordnance (L) Company, for heroism on 15 and 16 August 1944 in France. When, in the invasion of Southern France, a landing craft was hit squarely by a radio-controlled bomb from an enemy plane, the ship exploded, then grounded on a sand bar 50 yards from shore. Ignoring the dangers of exploding ammunition and burning oil, Tec 5 Jones jumped into the water and made his way to the survivors. Working indefatigable under constant strain, he carried the injured men out of the water to a place of safety on the shore. After making several of the hazardous, exhausting trips to the burning ship, he assisted in administering first aid to the wounded and in evacuating them to the aid station. Entered the Service from Paris, Texas.



SECTION I -- POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

ROCHEL J. OATLEY, 15302111, Private, Headquarters Company, 3d Battalion, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 13 September 1944 in France. During an attack on an enemy strong point in a small town, Private Oatley, armed only with a sub-machine gun, drove 15 enemy soldiers from dug-in positions on a hill and pursued them over 200 yards of open ground into the town. When the enemy, now approximately 50 in number, stopped to hitch horses to a light artillery piece, Private Oatley frustrated their attempt and again forced them to flee. Two friendly tanks approached, and he preceded them on foot through the town, signalling them at each corner and examining all likely points of ambush. Braving hostile mortar and small arms fire, he continued dauntlessly forward, advancing cautiously along the streets ahead of the tanks, until the town was completely cleared. Private Oatley was killed in action in a later engagement. Next of kin: Mr. Samuel J. Oatley (Father), 734 Chesbrough, Toledo, Ohio.

SECTION II -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR, PRISONER OF WAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named individual, a prisoner of war, for gallantry in action.

DAVID A. NEWCOMER, 013240, Colonel, U. S. Army, for gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. Colonel Newcomer, a War Department observer, was accompanying three platoons of the 111th Engineer Combat Battalion in establishing a defense line within a recently captured town when superior enemy troops launched a savage counter-attack. As soon as the first shots were fired, Colonel Newcomer assisted several men in setting up a .50 caliber machine gun in a position which commanded both entrances to the town. Although the intensity of the attack forced the engineer platoon to withdraw to more favorable positions outside the town, Colonel Newcomer courageously remained with the soldiers manning the machine gun and directed them in covering the withdrawal of the platoons. Displaying unusual intrepidity and calmness in the face of almost certain death or capture by the enemy, he refused to seek a place of safety for himself and in spite of a painful wound received during this action, continued delaying the advance of the attackers until the enemy completely surrounded his position and took him prisoner. Next of kin: Unknown.

SECTION III -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

PARKHURST C. HOUGH, 01288056, Captain, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. Captain Hough, commander of Company F, was protecting the front and right flank of his battalion, which occupied flat, open ground overlooking an enemy-held town. When the enemy, launching a series of counterattacks, Captain Hough spotted a hostile platoon moving around the battalion right flank. He personally led one of his own platoons, supported by two tanks, against the enemy and, overrunning several strong points, wiped out the German group with heavy blasts of fire. After completing this action without casualties to his own platoon and with 52 of the enemy killed, wounded or captured, he left his men to guard the prisoners and led three other squads against a second hostile platoon which he had located in the vicinity. Driving the enemy into a wooded draw, he blasted them with fire from his mortars and tanks, inflicting heavy casualties. He returned to his own company area in time to lead his unit in breaking up another savage counterattack, thereby preventing the enemy from cutting an important battalion supply route. Entered the Service from Fredericktown, Missouri.

DORDE PICKLESIMER, 35267295, Staff Sergeant, Company D, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 31 May 1944 in Italy. In support of the 1st Platoon of Company C in an attack against an enemy strong point, Sergeant Picklesimer led his machine gun section to within 50 yards of the objective, then was halted by a heavy barrage of hostile fire. The rifle platoon was forced to withdraw 150 yards for reorganization, and Sergeant Picklesimer ordered his men to remain in their perilous position and fire continually to cover the platoon's withdrawal. When the enemy rushed the machine guns, he hurled hand grenades and directed small arms and machine gun fire into their midst, driving them back. In order to maintain control within his section he moved continually from one gun to the other, encouraging the men and controlling their fire. After the riflemen had effected a successful withdrawal, he remained in position to cover his machine gun crews who followed the rifle platoon to the rear. When every man had left the area, he rejoined his section and, after reorganizing, attacked again with the infantry and took the objective. Entered the Service from Pikesville, Ky.

BOBBY G. CARR, 20809027, Staff Sergeant, Company I, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 28 August 1944 in France. Sergeant Carr occupied an outpost on the forward slope of a hill 200 yards beyond his platoon's position. While at this vantage point he spotted an enemy train, a convoy of trucks and a large concentration of troops making preparations for a mass movement 2000 yards away. Ignoring the heavy artillery barrage and small arms fire with which, to cover their movement, the enemy raked the area, Sergeant Carr remained determinedly in his exposed position and calmly directed effective artillery fire on the enemy. His accurate fire orders resulted in many direct hits which destroyed numerous trucks and inflicted widespread casualties. Two hours later, when another concentration of troops appeared in a nearby area, Sergeant Carr realized the need for a communication line between his outpost and the mortar positions at the base of the hill. Working without assistance, he ran a reel of wire from the mortars to his position, then skillfully directed their fire on the hostile force, again inflicting heavy casualties. Entered the Service from Belton, Texas.

R E S T R I C T E D

JOSEPH A. STAMATO, 33140762, Private First Class, Company I, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 29 August 1944 in France. As automatic rifleman in the 3d Platoon of Company I, Private First Class Stamato was covering the right flank of his platoon position when the enemy launched a savage counterattack. Although hostile soldiers were infiltrating through the friendly lines and were raking the area with machine gun, rifle and grenade fire, he remained steadfastly in position and continued firing until his automatic rifle jammed. Aware of the necessity for maintaining the fire power of his platoon, Private First Class Stamato crossed an open field to secure a rifle, then began running back toward his original position. Even when a bullet struck the automatic rifle belt which he was wearing, he disdained stopping for cover and continued forward until he was wounded in the throat by grenade fragments. In spite of the pain of his wound he made his way back to his position and again opened fire on the enemy, killing two of the hostile soldiers and wounding another. Displaying unusual fortitude and determination, he refused evacuation until the enemy threat to his company had been eliminated. Entered the Service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

GEORGE E. HILL, 36287507, Private First Class, Company K, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 28 August 1944 in France. During an attack against enemy positions, Company K was stopped 200 yards short of its objective by heavy automatic weapons and tank fire. When patrols were sent forward to discover the gun and tank positions, an enemy tank suddenly appeared over a knoll in front. Aware of the danger to his comrades, Private First Class Hill, a bazookaman occupying an outpost position, covered the members of one patrol with his accurate fire, enabling them to reach the safety of his own position. Then, in order to shorten the range to the tank, he left his place of cover and, with the patrol leader, advanced 30 yards over open terrain toward the tank. Fearless exposing himself to enemy observation and fire, Private First Class Hill scored two direct hits on the tank with his bazooka and drove it back before it could bring fire on the company. By his courageous and aggressive action he prevented casualties within his unit and enabled the patrol to continue on its mission. Entered the Service from River Rouge, Michigan.

CLEIL R. HENDERSON, 20804408, Private, Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 17 September 1944 in France. As driver for the battalion executive officer, Private Henderson was assigned the task of leading the battalion motor column as it advanced behind the forward elements of the organization. While moving through a densely wooded area, the motor column was suddenly attacked from the left flank by enemy soldiers. Private Henderson immediately stepped his vehicle and, fearlessly exposing himself to hostile machine pistol and rifle fire, manned the machine gun mounted on his jeep. In spite of the vigor of the enemy action, he remained in position and, unassisted, drove back the attackers. He killed three, wounded three, and completely disorganized the remainder, successfully repelling the assault. Entered the Service from Brownwood, Texas.

SECTION IV — CORRECTED AWARD OF OAA LEAF CLUSTER

So much of Section II, General Orders Number 352, as this Headquarters, as awards a Silver Star to ROBERT L. COLLIER, 36754183, Staff Sergeant, Company A, 141st Infantry Regiment, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor.



✓ "ROBERT L. COLLIER, 36734183, Staff Sergeant, Company A, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 31 May and 1 June 1944 in Italy. When a strong enemy force launched a determined attack against his platoon's position, Sergeant Collier, in the absence of his platoon leader and platoon sergeant, quickly adjusted the unit's defenses and opened fire on the attacking force. During the course of the assault, he continually exposed himself to heavy mortar and automatic weapons fire in order to move from squad to squad, maintaining organization within the platoon and encouraging the men to hold their positions against the savage thrusts. After two hours of bitter fighting, the order was given to withdraw from the untenable position. Sergeant Collier skillfully maneuvered the platoon, one squad at a time, to a place of safety. He himself covered the withdrawal of the last squad with effective fire from his sub-machine gun, waiting until the last man had retired before seeking cover for himself. Entered the Service from Libertyville, Illinois."

SECTION I -- POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

SERGEANT J. VASCHAK, 37704872, Private First Class, Company a, 146th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 17 August 1944 in France. While his platoon was guarding the left flank of a road block to prevent the enemy from destroying an important bridge, Private First Class Vaschak occupied an outpost position. When a company of enemy troops, in attempting to reach the bridge, attacked the road block, Private First Class Vaschak leapt from his fighting hole and heaved heavy small arms fire as he advanced on an enemy automatic rifle position. He moved over 60 yards of exposed terrain, firing his rifle as he ran, and succeeded in killing the automatic rifleman. With the harassing fire from that hostile weapon eliminated, the platoon was able to maneuver into a draw and thus force the enemy to surrender. Private First Class Vaschak was later killed by an enemy hand grenade. Next of kin: Mrs. J. J. Vaschak (Wife), 119 South Jackson Street, Denver, Colorado.

SECTION II -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR, PRISONER OF WAR

JOHN J. BEATY, 36035764, Staff Sergeant, Headquarters & Service Company, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. When a numerically superior enemy attacked a recently captured town, friendly troops were forced to withdraw and establish better defensive positions on the outskirts. After Sergeant Beaty had left the village, he discovered that five men had remained behind to man and protect a .50 calibre machine gun, covering the withdrawal of their comrades. Aware that they would soon be over-powered by the crushing enemy forces, he determined to assist them in effecting their own withdrawal and immediately began the hazardous return trip to the town. With thoughts only for the safety of his comrades, he crawled forward under an all arms fire, over terrain where cover and concealment were negligible. When he reached the town, the hostile troops had arrived and he was completely surrounded by enemy foot soldiers and tanks. From this engagement Sergeant Beaty was reported a prisoner of war. Next of kin: Mrs. Lula L. Beaty (Mother), Box 1544, Bladenwater, Texas.

JAMES D. RUDD, JR, 0934008, First Lieutenant, 93d Armored Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. When Lieutenant Rudd, liaison pilot and observer, was informed that a column of enemy tanks and personnel carriers was advancing toward the rear of the 36th Infantry Division, he immediately took off from the airfield and flew over the head of the column. Adjusting fire on the leading tanks, he succeeded in dispersing the entire force, driving it from the road. Although antiaircraft guns opened fire on him, he kept adjusting fire on each vehicle, destroying one tank and a half-track personnel carrier and disabling two other tanks. During this action, which lasted two hours, Lieutenant Rudd was the only observer engaging this column, and no friendly forces were in contact with it at the time. Displaying unusual skill and courage, he flew back into the cone of antiaircraft fire tank after tank, wreaking heavy damage on the enemy forces. Entered the Service from Kansas City, Missouri.

FREDERICK D. CROWL, 35791574, Staff Sergeant, Company A, 115th Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 15 August 1944 in France. Sergeant Crowl was guide for the leading platoon in the battalion's advance against one of the first towns encountered in the invasion of Southern France. As the platoon advanced cautiously down a narrow street under cover of darkness, the sound of an approaching enemy tank halted the column and the order to take cover was given. The tank directed sweeping machine gun fire straight down the street, and a squad of enemy infantrymen following the tank began hurling hand grenades. While his comrades sought cover from the heavy fire, Sergeant Crowl, aware that his company commander and platoon leader were already wounded and the entire company threatened, seized a bazooka and advanced 50 yards in the face of point blank antitank and machine gun fire to a position 20 yards from the tank. He scored two direct hits on the tank, setting it on fire and killing the driver. He then assisted his platoon sergeant in evacuating the men from the area in which the blazing tank would explode. Entered the Service from Lewisburg, Ohio.

EARL H. SMITH, 38036410, Private First Class, Company B, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 15 August 1944 in France. Private First Class Smith was advancing with the leading platoon of his company when he and his comrades encountered heavy fire from an enemy force occupying a well-entrenched dugout. He moved cautiously toward the enemy emplacements and silenced a machine pistol which was covering the position. Then, contemptuous of personal danger, he jumped into the dugout with his bayonet fixed and subdued eight enemy soldiers who had delayed the advance of his company. Because of his daring act the organization was able to move forward and continue its attack. Entered the Service from Dallas, Texas.

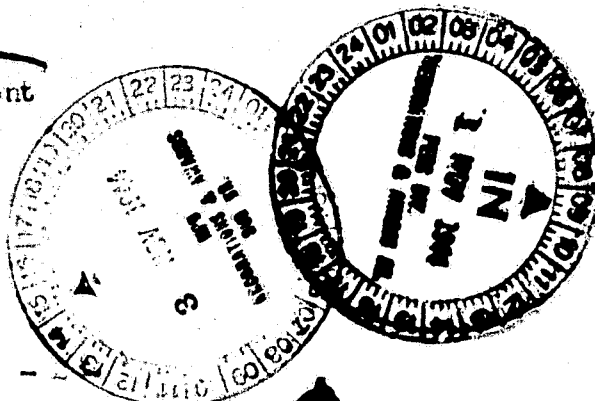

SECTION I -- CITATION OF UNIT

The Military Police Platoon, 36th Infantry Division, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in supporting the combat units of the division during the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. As the troops massed around Velletri in preparation for an attack against that stubbornly defended enemy stronghold, personnel of the Military Police Platoon worked day and night, frequently under artillery and sniper fire, guiding units to their new areas and providing traffic control in the division sector. During the savage fighting which followed, the platoon established a prisoner of war collecting point and skillfully handled the large number of enemy soldiers captured in the attack. The swift advance toward Rome, through the Eternal City and to the north necessitated frequent displacements of the prisoner of war stockades, but, in spite of limited personnel, the platoon processed over 5000 prisoners taken during the operation. Although the difficulty of traffic control over the long networks of roads forced members of the platoon to remain on duty for 24 hour periods without relief, they worked indefatigably posting and guarding the roads, and they prevented all traffic jams which would have tied up the forward movement of troops and supplies.

The 736th Ordnance (Lm) Company, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in supporting the combat units of the Division during the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. SECTION I -- CITATION OF UNIT

The 36th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop (MCC), for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. During the attack on Velletri, the 36th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop greatly facilitated the downfall of this last major enemy stronghold blocking the road to Rome by establishing and maintaining contact with units separated from their adjacent units and by making motorized reconnaissances. During this phase of the operations the troop filled a gap in the line and, although lacking proper equipment and extensive infantry training, attacked with the infantry troops, distinguishing itself by the important advances made. After the downfall of Velletri the troop moved toward Rome and led the Division's motorized column through the Eternal City. Continuing on to pursue the demoralized enemy forces to the north, the 36th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop sped up Highway #1, braving artillery, mortar and small arms fire to make hazardous forward reconnaissances and to maintain contact between adjacent units. The troop did not hesitate in its relentless advance until it was relieved on the high ground commanding the approaches to Pisa.

SECTION I — CITATION OF UNIT

The 36th Signal Company, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in supporting the combat units of the Division during the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. Braving hostile artillery, mortar and sniper fire and bombing and strafing attacks by enemy aircraft, personnel of the 36th Signal Company moved into the Anzio beachhead area and, advancing with the Infantry troops, established a network of communications within the Division and between Division and higher headquarters. SECTION I — CITATION OF UNIT

The 111th medical Battalion, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in supporting the combat units of the Division during the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Fisa. In spite of enemy shell fire, bombing and strafing attacks by enemy aircraft, sniper fire, and long, hazardous evacuation routes, the 111th medical battalion succeeded in effecting prompt treatment and speedy evacuation of the heavy casualties sustained during the attack against the savagely defended enemy stronghold of Velletri. Advancing within two miles of the most forward patrols, the 1st Platoon of the Clearing Station moved into Rome on 5 June and established the first friendly medical installation in the Eternal City. As the infantry regiments swept across the Tiber River, driving the demoralized enemy north of Rome, the medical battalion was confronted with the difficulty of frequent speedy forward displacements and the problem of long hauls to the evacuation hospitals in the rear. In spite of these difficulties and the dangers of combat conditions which constantly confronted the officers and men of the 111th Medical Battalion, the battalion personnel distinguished itself by the high quality of the work accomplished.

Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 36th Infantry Division Artillery, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. During the attack on the stubbornly defended stronghold of Velletri, Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 36th Infantry Division Artillery coordinated the fires of the artillery battalions, successfully completing the delicate mission of blasting enemy positions in Velletri without endangering friendly troops above and below the city. 

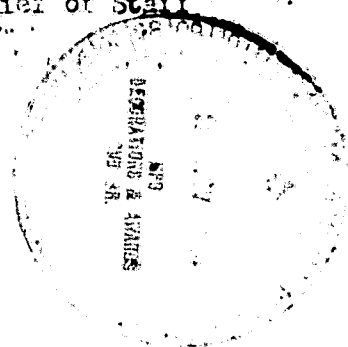

The 155th Field Artillery Battalion, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944, in the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through some to the hills overlooking Pisa. In spite of counterbattery fire from hostile artillery and bombing and strafing attacks from enemy aircraft, the 155th Field Artillery Battalion executed its fire missions effectively and with dispatch, successfully supporting friendly troops in their attack against the enemy stronghold of Velletri. After the downfall of this last major obstacle blocking the road to Rome, the attacking forces drove relentlessly forward, moved through the Eternal City and, without hesitating or relaxing their tightening grip on the demoralized enemy, pressed on to the north. 

The 133d Field Artillery Battalion, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 10 June 1944, in the monumental 34-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. Supporting the 143d Infantry Regiment in the attack on Velletri, the 133d Field Artillery Battalion directed heavy fire on numerous enemy targets and softened the stubborn defenses for the infantry assault. After Velletri fell, the battalion pressed on the Rome, moved through the ancient city and continued the attack to the north. 

The 132d Field Artillery Battalion, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. By blasting enemy positions in Velletri and in the mountain fastnesses near the town with effective shellfire, the 132d Field Artillery Battalion softened hostile defenses for the infantry attack on the last major stronghold blocking the approaches to Rome. After Velletri fell, the battalion followed the infantry over mountainous terrain to Rome, moved through the hostile city, and pressed the attack to the north. The 131st Field Artillery Battalion, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 13 June 1944 in the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. 

The 11th Engineer Combat Battalion, for exceptional performance from 26 September to 26 June 1944, in the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. Exposing themselves to heavy enemy artillery and small arms fire, the officers and men of the 11th Engineer Combat Battalion worked skillfully and indefatigably filling shell craters and removing debris from the important supply routes leading to the infantry troops attacking Velletri. The 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptional performance from 26 May to 26 June 1944 in the monumental 29-day push from the Anzio beachhead area through Rome to the hills overlooking Pisa. Struggling over difficult terrain infested with enemy snipers, the 143d Infantry Regiment drove from the Anzio beachhead area toward Velletri and attacked enemy mountain defenses near the town. After clearing the last major stronghold which blocked the road to Rome, the Regiment pressed its advantage and swept forward in the spectacular advance on the Eternal City. Moving straight through the ancient capital in a motorized column, the Regiment continued on to establish a beachhead across the Tiber River. Although the officers and men of the Regiment were tired by the ceaseless cycle of forward movements and attacks, morale was high and each new enemy counterattack was repelled with heavy losses to the hostile troops. The Regiment did not stop until it was relieved, after a 240 mile advance, on the high ground commanding the approaches to Pisa. 

He landed early in the morning of the invasion day and immediately established two beach dumps from which all units of the task force were supplied until an Army ASP was established six days after the landing. In spite of limited personnel and almost continuous artillery shelling and bombing and strafing attacks from enemy aircraft, Captain Becker supervised the segregating, stacking and handling of the ammunition in both dumps so efficiently that an adequate supply of ammunition was assured to all troops involved in the operation. Entered the Service from Ingram, Texas.

WILLIAM F. FISCHER, 0424656, Captain, 141st Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 9 September 1943 to 20 June 1944 in Italy. During this period Captain Fischer, regimental personnel officer, demonstrated his great technical proficiency by the meticulous accuracy with which he handled the records of approximately 2800 battle casualties. In spite of adverse weather conditions and frequent shelling from enemy artillery, he constantly bolstered the morale of his men and maintained a high degree of administrative training in the section. SECTION I — POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

LYLE W. CROOK, O1280445, First Lieutenant, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 28 August 1944 in France. Lieutenant Crook, ordered to clear a town of enemy troops, led his company to the north edge of the village where he and his men encountered heavy enemy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire. When he had halted the advance and directed his men to the most advantageous positions, he determined to contact the company on his left flank in order to coordinate his future movements. Rather than ask one of his men to undertake the hazardous mission, he made the trip himself, moving over open ground covered by direct machine gun and sniper fire. When he reached a point only a few yards from the company, he was killed by fire from an enemy sniper. Although he did not reach his objective, his movement was observed and his company's position located thereby facilitating coordination between the two units. Next of kin: Mrs. Lyle W. Crook (Wife), Zwolle, Louisiana.

ZYGARUNT BACKUS, 16062658, Private First Class, Company A, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 1 June 1944 in Italy. Private First Class Backus' squad was ordered to clear an enemy minefield which was delaying the advance of the infantry troops and tanks. Private First Class Backus moved forward in daylight toward the minefield, braving heavy hostile fire, until he was pinned down by the mortar shelling and sweeping small arms fire. Waiting until dusk, he again advanced toward his objective, reached the minefield and, still the target for enemy machine guns and mortars, began removing the mines. Although the slightest misstep would have meant instant death, he worked calmly and cautiously and succeeded in clearing a gap through the field. Private First Class Backus was killed in action in a later engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Stella Backus (mother), 3523 Boyer Road, #2D, #7, Jackson, Michigan.

SECTION II — CORRECTED POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

So much of General Orders Number 34, cs, this Headquarters, as posthumously awards a Silver Star to Captain SELSEL R. HAMMONSON, O-54116, 141st Infantry Regiment, is rescinded, and the following substituted therefor:

"Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

"SELSER R. HARMANSON, 0354116, Captain, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 21 January 1944 in Italy. The 141st Infantry was ordered to cross a strategic river and attack the enemy. This attack was initiated under heavy enemy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire which continued throughout the operation. Captain Harmanson, evidencing complete disregard for his own safety, displayed outstanding courage. Advancing in the face of overwhelming enemy fire, he valiantly directed his company in the preparation for the assault crossing. While so doing he met his death. His magnificent courage and devotion to duty in the face of vastly superior odds served as an outstanding example and inspiration to all who witnessed this action. Next of kin: Mr. Selsor R. Harmanson, Sr., (Father), Wharton, Texas."

SECTION III — AWARD OF SILVER STAR, MISSING IN ACTION

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals, missing in action, for gallantry.

JOHN DODD, 36325129, Technician Fifth Grade, Company A, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion. Next of kin: Mrs. Levenia Dodd (Mother), 341 East Godfrey Avenue, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

JOHN A. YANIS, 12067349, Private First Class, Company A, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion. Next of kin: Mrs. Helen Mason (Sister), Inwood, West Virginia.

For gallantry in action on 25 August 1944 in France. When Company A was ordered to defend a recently captured town, the above named soldiers were assigned to issue ammunition from a dump in the village. On the afternoon of 25 August an attack by a superior enemy force made the position in the village untenable. On their own initiative, these men manned and directed accurate fire with a .50 caliber machine gun in order to protect the withdrawal of the company, thus delaying the overwhelming enemy forces until the greater portion of the company had withdrawn to more favorable positions outside the town. Steadfastly, contemptuous of personal danger, the above named soldiers continued their effective fire until their position was completely surrounded by enemy foot troops and tanks. From this engagement they were reported missing in action.

SECTION IV — AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

GAULDEN M. WATKINS, 017292, Lieutenant Colonel, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 15 August 1944 in France. After landing in the invasion of Southern France, Lieutenant Colonel Watkins, commanding the 2d Battalion, 143d Infantry Regiment, was leading his organization along the shore toward an enemy strong point when one of his assault companies was stopped by a formidable road block. Although the block was strengthened by road barriers and covered by rifle machine gun and mortar fire, Lieutenant Colonel Watkins, in order to prevent a delay in the advance of his battalion, moved forward and assumed personal command of the situation. Twice he fearlessly exposed himself to the hostile fire while making a reconnaissance to determine routes by which the company could attack and destroy the road block. After devising a plan, he skillfully directed its execution, then continued to expose himself in order to encourage the troops

Under his command. While advancing with the unit, he received eight machine gun bullet wounds in the chest. By his superior knowledge of military tactics and his daring aggressiveness in the face of danger, he was directly responsible for the successful attack and reduction of the road block. Entered the United States Military Academy from California.

SECTION V -- AWARD OF OAK LEAF CLUSTER

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, an Oak Leaf Cluster in lieu of a third Silver Star, is awarded to the following named individual, for gallantry in action.

EDWARD M. BARR, 13175470, Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Detachment, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 13 June 1944 in Italy. As Company C attacked a strongly fortified position, the enemy resisted with artillery, mortar and sniper fire, inflicting numerous casualties on the attackers. Because his platoon had sustained comparatively few casualties, Tec 5 Barr, an aid man, went to help the wounded of other platoons. While he worked to alleviate pain and save lives, he was wounded in the chest and stomach by aimed fire from an enemy sniper. Realizing that he would have to crawl 50 yards for first aid and that there were many other wounded men who depended on him for help, he ignored his own pain and continued to care for the injured soldiers until he was unable to proceed further and had to be evacuated. Although it was difficult for him to talk, he gave advice to others so that they could complete the work he had begun. Entered the Service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

They crawled forward to the barbed wire, but, with only 12 men left, were ordered back to former positions. On his own initiative Private First Class Brewer stayed behind with two wounded men, bandaged their wounds and guarded them. Thoughtless of personal safety, he waited there until dark, then brought them back to his unit. Entered the Service from Mount Clemens, Michigan.

By his tireless and effective efforts he contributed materially in keeping the animals of the troop in good health. Entered the Service from Ft. Allen, Pennsylvania.

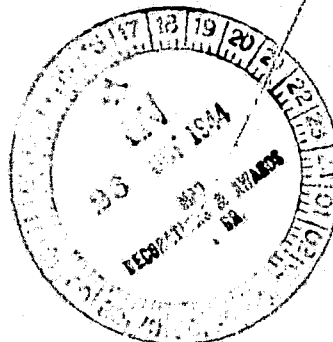

SECTION I — AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL, MISSING IN ACTION

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Soldier's medal is awarded to the following named individual, missing in action, for heroism.

JOHN J. BEATY, 38035764, Staff Sergeant, Headquarters & Service Company, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion, for heroism on 15 August 1944 in France. In the invasion of Southern France a large landing craft approaching the coast was struck squarely by an enemy glider bomb. The seriously damaged vessel, loaded with heavy artillery, ammunition and personnel, drifted ashore in flames and the ammunition began to explode. Although the personnel of the Headquarters & Service Company had been moved inland from the beach to escape the hurtling shell fragments, Sergeant Beaty and some comrades returned to the shore near the burning ship and began rescue work. Aware of the desperate plight of the men who had been forced to abandon the craft by leaping overboard into the water, the rescue party worked indefatigably until midnight, swimming alongside the ship and dragging the men ashore. As the injured men were brought to the beach they were carried to a place of safety and given first aid treatment. Sergeant Beaty and his comrades did not cease their unselfish and hazardous work until they had saved 75 men from drowning and had treated another 15 for burns, wounds and shock. Sergeant Beaty was subsequently reported missing in action in another engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Lula L. Beaty (mother), Box 1344, Gladewater, Texas.

For heroism on 15 August 1944 in France. In the invasion of Southern France, a large landing craft approaching the coast was struck squarely by an enemy glider bomb. The seriously damaged vessel, loaded with heavy artillery, ammunition and personnel, drifted ashore in flames and the ammunition began to explode. Although the above named individuals had been moved inland from the beach to escape the hurtling shell fragments, they returned to the shore near the burning ship and began rescue work. Aware of the desperate plight of the men who had been forced to abandon the craft by leaping overboard into the water, they worked indefatigably until midnight, swimming alongside the ship and dragging the men ashore. As the injured men were brought to the beach they were carried to a place of safety and given first aid treatment. The above named individuals did not cease their unselfish and hazardous work until they had saved 75 men from drowning and had

treated another 15 for burns, wounds and shock.

SECTION II -- COMMENDATION FOR EXCEPTIONALLY MERITORIOUS CONDUCT

When it was necessary to ship pack troops by boat to a recently established beachhead, Major Whitfield, acting as Transport Quartermaster for the move, devised a method of shipping which eliminated the usual confusion of loading animals onto the landing craft. In subsequent action with the Special Service Force, he repeatedly exposed himself to small arms and artillery fire in order to direct the movements of the pack train. Because of his outstanding leadership the force was able to use the animals in packing arms, ammunition and food in the approach march and in supplying military equipment to the force after engaging the enemy. Entered the Service from Florence, Mississippi.

GUY WRAY, JR, 37666232, Private First Class, Antitank Company, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 28 May 1944 in Italy. In addition to acting as liaison between the 2d Platoon of the Antitank Company and the 2d Battalion, Private First Class Wray was also used as a runner between two front line companies. He frequently braved the hazards of mortar and small arms fire to carry important information to the two companies and, upon returning to his platoon would report the exact locations of the front line units. By maintaining contact with the forward elements, Private First Class Wray enabled the antitank platoon to direct effective supporting fire and to move forward much more rapidly than would otherwise have been possible. Entered the Service from Lenox, Iowa.

BERT L. NEWTON, 35702552, Private First Class, Company B, 143d Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 9 June 1944 in Italy. As Company B moved into a supposedly secure position, the soldiers were surprised by heavy fire from automatic weapons. Although Private First Class Newton lost contact with his squad leader, he led his automatic rifle team to an advantageous position from which he directed effective fire on the enemy target. By his correct estimate of the situation and skillful maneuver Private First Class Newton materially assisted his company in defeating the enemy and accomplishing its mission. Entered the Service from Bardstown, Kentucky.

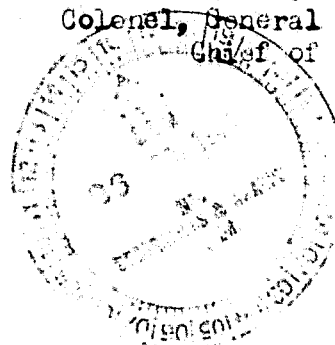

SECTION I -- POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

RICHARD BOEHM, 37450781, Corporal, Headquarters Company, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 30 August 1944 in France. Corporal Boehm was riding in the lead jeep of a motorized patrol assigned the mission of making a night reconnaissance of an enemy-held route. He halted the patrol 25 yards from a shattered bridge and moved forward alone to scout the area. When he returned to report the condition of the bridge and the stream, he heard a muffled voice in the vicinity of the bridge and was told that an enemy force had been observed nearby. In spite of these indications of danger, Corporal Boehm courageously returned to the bridge alone in order to determine the size and location of the enemy. As he moved through the darkness he was suddenly subjected to the cross-fire of hostile machine guns and was wounded in the left leg. In spite of intense pain, he returned the enemy fire and pointed out hostile gun positions to his comrades. Corporal Boehm was killed in the ensuing fight. Next of kin: Mrs. Ida Boehm (mother), 895 2d Street South, St. James, Minnesota.

LEE R. PINKSTON, 34884505, Private, Company F, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 28 May 1944 in Italy. During an attack against strong, well-concealed enemy positions, most of the 3d Platoon was subjected to machine gun fire from a house to the immediate front. To secure a better firing position, Private Pinkston, a bazooka man, crawled 30 yards under the incessant fire. Taking careful aim, he fired four direct hits into the small slots in the house forcing the machine gun crew to abandon the weapon and flee in terror from the building. As they attempted to escape across an open field, he seized his rifle and killed or wounded all six of the enemy soldiers. Private Pinkston was mortally wounded in a subsequent engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Millie Pinkston (mother), Route #3, McEwen, Tennessee.

OK. "EDWARD E. JACKS, 01318549, First Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant), 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 30 January 1944 in Italy. Lieutenant Jacks was leader of one of the two assault platoons of Company G, in an attack against an enemy stronghold. When the unit was caught in the cross-fire of hostile machine guns, he swiftly deployed his platoon and built up a strong base of effective fire. After forcing the enemy to withdraw, he quickly reorganized his men and again led them forward. In his advance on the objective he encountered a fortified position, quickly surrounded it with his platoon members and succeeded in capturing 16 prisoners. At dusk he took an intermediate objective and defended it during the night. Early on the following morning he resumed the attack and continued forward until he reached a group of houses which sheltered a strong enemy force. He ignored the heavy fire directed from the buildings, led his platoon in surrounding them, and demanded the surrender of the hostile troops. When 11 of the enemy surrendered, Lieutenant Jacks deployed his platoon and personally searched the houses, capturing another prisoner. He then skillfully organized and defended the position. Lieutenant Jacks was killed in action in a subsequent engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Dorothy F. Jacks (Wife), 125½ North Main Street, Elkhart, Indiana."

So much of General Orders Number 86, cs, this Headquarters, as Posthumously awards a Bronze Star Medal to J. C. JONES, 38037012, Staff Sergeant (then Private) Company B, 142d Infantry Regiment, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor.

OK. "Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

"J. C. JONES, 38037012, Staff Sergeant (then Private), Company B, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 9 September 1943 in Italy. After landing on a strategic beachhead in the invasion of Italy, Private Jones collected a group of approximately 50 men from various units which had become confused and disorganized by the incessant artillery, mortar and small arms fire sweeping the beach. He skillfully organized the soldiers into a single unit and led them toward the objective which he had noted on a map prior to the landing. When he and his companions became the target for surprise fire from a hidden machine gun nest, he directed the men to take cover while two soldiers crept forward and knocked out the emplacement. Displaying unusual qualities of leadership and aggressiveness, he proceeded again toward the objective, moving forward until attacked by seven enemy tanks. He swiftly placed his men in a covered position behind a stone wall until the tanks had passed, then led them to the objective so expertly that not a single casualty was sustained. Private Jones was killed in action in a subsequent engagement. Next of kin: Mrs. Dell Jones (mother), Route #2, Sanger, Texas."

SECTION III -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

ROY W. BIEGALSKI, 01305530, First Lieutenant, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 1 June 1944 in Italy. During an attack against a savagely defended enemy stronghold, Lieutenant Biegalski, antitank platoon leader, was left behind with ten men as guard for the battalion ammunition dump. As the friendly troops moved forward in the assault, numerous pockets of enemy infantrymen and parachutists, desperate in their desire to escape from the trap in which they were caught, were bypassed in the darkness. When a large group of hostile soldiers,

attempting to return to their own lines, stumbled upon the isolated battalion dump, they opened fire from two sides with machine guns and machine pistols. Although his companions were pinned to the ground by the hostile fire, Lieutenant Biegalski, determining the exact location of the enemy by the muzzle-blast of their weapons, gathered a handful of grenades and moved to their flank. Exposing himself to the sweeping fire, he hurled his grenades, one after another, into the hostile positions, killing one soldier and wounding another. Completely surprised by this daring act, the enemy started to withdraw. Leading his men in pursuit, Lieutenant Biegalski cornered the force in a draw and captured eight of them. Entered the Service from Chicago, Illinois.

JAMES E. SEWELL, 20802556, Sergeant, Company C, 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion, for gallantry in action on 24 August 1944 in France. Sergeant Sewell, commander of an M-10 tank destroyer, was ordered to withdraw with the infantry troops and supporting tanks from a position almost surrounded by the enemy. Before the withdrawal could be effected, the enemy launched a savage counterattack and Sergeant Sewell's M-10 was hit by an enemy shell. He and the other crew members left the tank destroyer, but, when it did not burst into flames, Sergeant Sewell returned alone, braving incessant small arms and artillery fire to reach it. Although he was the last man to leave the hazardous position, he succeeded in bringing the M-10 back to his unit. By his daring action he saved an exceedingly valuable weapon from destruction or capture by the enemy. Entered the Service from Dale, Texas.

ALFRED J. SAK, 36644526, Private First Class, Company D, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 31 May 1944 in Italy. During a savage enemy counterattack, Private First Class Sak moved his machine gun into an exposed position on line with the infantrymen and delivered effective fire on the advancing enemy. While other members of his squad were securing additional ammunition, he remained alone at the gun and fired five belts of ammunition, killing and wounding a large number of the attackers and dispersing the remainder of the force. In spite of this, an enemy sergeant succeeded in placing a machine gun squad only 10 yards from his position. Instantly cognizant of this threat to the safety of his comrades, Private First Class Sak, although unable to direct machine gun fire on the squad, seized a pistol and killed the sergeant and one other soldier, forcing the other three squad members to surrender. Entered the Service from Chicago, Ill

JOHN P. SABATINELLI, 36808601, Private First Class, Company D, 143d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 31 May 1944 in Italy. When all other troops in the area were forced to withdraw from positions rendered untenable by deadly hostile fire, Private First Class Sabatinelli, a gunner in a machine gun squad, remained determinedly with his weapon. Although he was the target for sweeping machine gun fire and hand grenades, he maintained his position directly in the face of the charging foe and continued to deliver rapid, accurate bursts of machine gun fire into their midst. By holding his post in spite of the tremendous odds, he killed 11 enemy soldiers and forced the remainder to withdraw in confusion after a violent fire fight which lasted for 30 minutes. Entered the Service from Wauwatosa, Wisconsin.

JAMES I. BEALE III, 13156524, Private, Headquarters Company, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 30 August 1944 in France. Private Beale was riding in the lead jeep of a motorized patrol assigned the mission of making a night reconnaissance of an enemy-held route. A hostile force attacked the patrol, and direct fire from six machine guns forced the patrol members to seek cover. Contemptuous of personal safety, Private Beale opened fire with a .50

calibre machine gun and, by making himself the target for enemy weapons, enabled his comrades to reach less exposed positions. When a heavy concentration of enemy fire wounded him in the face and forced him to leave the machine gun, he immediately took up a position at the side of the road and resumed the fight, firing his rifle until it was torn from his hands by machine gun bullets. Entered the Service from Franklin, Virginia.

SECTION IV -- CORRECTED AWARD OF SILVER STAR

OK. "Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

JOSEPH G. FELBER, 016984, Lieutenant Colonel, 753d Tank Battalion, for gallantry in action on 2 February 1944 in Italy. Lieutenant Colonel Felber was in conference with the commanding officer of the engineer battalion attached to the 753d Tank Battalion. They were discussing plans for a forthcoming attack on an enemy occupied town when the command post area was suddenly subjected to a concentrated artillery barrage. All personnel immediately took cover. After the third or fourth shell had landed, an engineer officer crawled to Lieutenant Colonel Felber's slit trench and told him that the commanding officer of the engineer battalion had been severely wounded and was lying on the ground to the rear of the command post tent. Lieutenant Colonel Felber immediately left the safety of his trench and proceeded under the incessant enemy shell fire to the aid of the wounded officer. Although he was wounded in the face by a hurtling shell fragment, he continued dauntlessly forward until he reached the side of his injured comrade. While shells blasted the terrain near him, he assisted his fellow officer to a place of safety where first aid was administered. Entered the United States Military Academy from New York.

LORIN F. KALL, 36236422, Corporal, Antitank Company, 142d Infantry Regiment. Next of kin: Mrs. ~~Marjorie~~ Kalm (Mother), 2216 Carney Avenue, Marinette, Wisc.
 ALFRED C. LIVENHAGEN, 36236296, Private, First Class, Antitank Company, 142d Infantry Regiment. Next of kin: Mrs. Louis Pellum (Mother), 1642g Nebraska Street, Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

For exceptionally meritorious conduct on 4 and 5 December 1943 in Italy. These men were among a group of twenty detailed to carry direly needed rations and medical supplies up a mountain to the 2d Battalion. Following an unpioneered trail they made their way through darkness toward their objective. Near the top of the mountain they were caught in an artillery barrage. The shelling killed and wounded many men, but the carrying detail reorganized and went ahead under the continued artillery, mortar and small arms fire. Reaching the summit of the hill, they forced their way through dense underbrush to complete thirteen hours of painful progress and deliver the all-important supplies. The above named enlisted men have subsequently been reported missing in action.

SECTION II - COMMENDATION FOR EXCEPTIONALLY MERITORIOUS CONDUCT

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-55, each of the following named individuals is commended for exceptionally meritorious conduct.

JOHN M. STAFFORD, 0414553, Captain, Headquarters 36th Infantry Division, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 9 September 1943 to 25 June 1944 in Italy. Captain Stafford, Assistant Staff Judge Advocate, landed in the invasion of Italy and, during the adverse conditions of the winter campaign, distinguished himself by his cheerful and competent performance of duty. During this period he has personally prosecuted 77 general court-martial cases and 156 special court-martial cases. His careful preparation of cases has assured justice for all the men being tried, and has materially assisted the Commanding General in maintaining a high degree of discipline in the division. He has tirelessly and cheerfully performed his duties, under adverse conditions and frequently under artillery fire and aerial bombardment, but always in a superior manner. Entered the Service from San Antonio, Texas.

JAMES E. EVANS, 01294639, Captain (then First Lieutenant), 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 1 to 11 September 1944.

CLARENCE W. DOWNS, 01288024, Captain, 556th Tank Destroyer Battalion, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 1 to 11 September 1943 in North Africa and Italy. In addition to his duties as company commander of the Reconnaissance Company of his battalion, Captain Downs served as transport quartermaster for the loading of a ship in the preparation for the invasion of Italy. So skillfully did he load the boat that the consequent debarkation could be effected in a minimum of time, and so efficient was his handling of the assignment that several vehicles not included in the original plan were brought on board. Because of his superior supervision, the final debarkation was accomplished without a single mishap to personnel or equipment. Entered the Service from Philadelphia, Pa.

REYNOLDS D. RODGERS, 01289125, First Lieutenant, 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 1 to 11 September 1943 in North Africa and Italy. In addition to his duties as executive officer of the Reconnaissance Company of his battalion, Lieutenant Rodgers served as transport quartermaster for the loading of a ship in the preparation for the invasion of Italy. So skillfully did he load the boat that the consequent debarkation could be effected in a minimum of time, and so efficient was his handling of the assignment that several vehicles not included in the original plan were brought on board. Because of his superior supervision, the final debarkation was accomplished without a single mishap to personnel or equipment. Entered the Service from Erie, Pennsylvania.

WILLIAM P. SCHUMPERT, 01582114, First Lieutenant, 36th Quartermaster Company, 36th Infantry Division, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 20 May to 8 June 1944 in Italy. Lieutenant Schumpert distinguished himself in commanding elements of the rear echelon of the 36th Provisional Pack Troop and in shipping animals and men to a strategic beachhead. When shipping plans were changed after the animals had been trucked to the port of debarkation, Lieutenant Schumpert, displaying unusual resourcefulness and initiative, located areas near the port and arranged for the care of the animals until shipping space was made available. In spite of numerous transportation difficulties, he carried out all orders and delivered the animals to the beachhead. Entered the Service from Portales, New Mexico.

CLIFFORD J. WATERS, 38052676, Staff Sergeant, Headquarters Company, 36th Infantry Division, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 9 September 1943 to 8 July 1944 in Italy. During ten months of combat Sergeant Waters maintained a high standard of efficiency in the maintenance section of the 36th Infantry Division Transportation Platoon. He skillfully supervised the training and work of mechanics and drivers in the Division Forward Echelon, and he personally evacuated disabled vehicles from the battlefield under heavy shell fire. All vehicles were maintained at a standard that rendered them immediately available, and he contrib-

uted materially to the efficiency and mobility of the division headquarters.
Entered the Service from Houston, Texas.

HORACE S. LYNCH, 34384864, Sergeant (then Private First Class), Company F, 143rd Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 21 January 1944 in Italy. During the action on the banks of a strategic river, members of Company F were attempting to launch an assault boat in order to cross the stream and attack hostile positions on the opposite side. Because of confusion due to darkness, smoke and artillery and machine gun fire, two of the soldiers were thrown into the icy waters of the river with all their bulky equipment. The men struggled vainly against the swift currents and would have drowned but for the quick thinking and decisive action of Sergeant Lynch. Braving a heavy barrage of mortar fire which blasted the bank, he secured a rope and used it to pull his comrades from the water. Entered the Service from Simpsonville, South Carolina.

ANTHONY GELORMINO, 31040359, Sergeant, Service Company, 143rd Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 30 May 1944 in Italy. When it was essential to locate the 56th Provisional Pack Troop and guide it to the division sector, Sergeant Gelormino volunteered for the hazardous mission. Starting out at dusk, he trailed the troop for six miles, following it through darkness across a mountain. Because the regular trails were subjected to artillery and sniper fire, he was forced to move over unfamiliar terrain. In spite of the hostile fire and the rugged, mountainous terrain, he and a companion succeeded in locating the troop in a minimum of time, successfully completing the mission. Entered the Service from Torrington, Connecticut.

BERNIS G. FULLEN, 38051670, Technician Fifth Grade, Company B, 111th Engineer Combat Battalion, for exceptionally meritorious conduct from 27 to 29 May 1944 in Italy. Ordered to operate an angledozer in improving a mule trail for use by thirty ton tanks, Tec 5 Fullen worked tirelessly with his companions to clear the trail and construct a passable road. The trail ran over mountainous terrain which included flat open areas, rock structures and heavy underbrush, and the task was rendered doubly difficult by constant enemy artillery and mortar shelling and sniper fire. With his companions, he worked on two men shifts, twenty-four hours a day, always ignoring personal comfort and security in order to get the job done. He performed his duties skillfully and courageously until he became ill and was forced to stop working. Entered the Service from Shelbyville, Texas.

THOMAS RUDITIS, 36451592, Private First Class, Company B, 142nd Infantry Regiment, for exceptionally meritorious conduct on 3 June 1944 in Italy. Private First Class Ruditis was an automatic rifleman in the 3d squad of the 1st Platoon. When his unit seized a group of buildings on open, dominating ground, he and a companion were ordered to guard the rear of the position against counterattack from the woods below the house. Spotting hostile troops approaching through trees and underbrush, he opened fire, killed the officer in command and forced the enemy to halt. Having thwarted the surprise attack, he and his companion continued to deliver effective bursts of automatic rifle fire into the midst of the attackers. In spite of answering rifle and machine gun fire which swept their exposed position, they continued to man the weapon until ordered to withdraw to an alternate platoon position. Entered the Service from Stult Ste Marie, Michigan.

GEORGE W. DRURY, 33550412, Private, Personnel Center #9, PBS. Entered the Service from Bowie, Maryland.

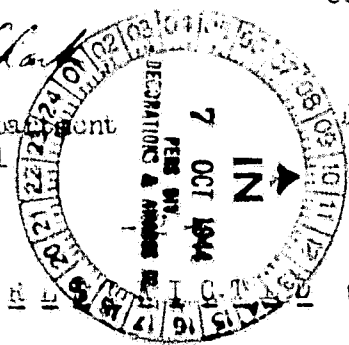

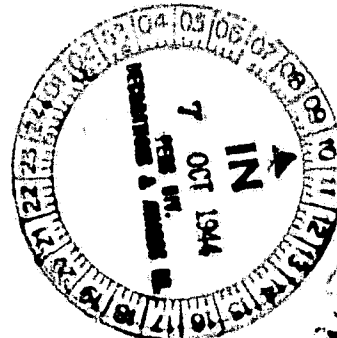

SECTION I -- POSTHUMOUS AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is posthumously awarded to the following named individual for gallantry in action.

ROBERT CHAMBERS, 17087757, Private First Class, Company F, 141st Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 23 May 1944 in Italy. When his platoon sustained several casualties during a heavy enemy artillery and mortar barrage, Private First Class Chambers unhesitatingly braved the deadly fire to aid his comrades. While shells exploded around him, he made three trips into the center of the area of impact and carried the wounded to a place of comparative safety from which they were evacuated. By his heroism and selflessness he saved the lives of several of his comrades. Private First Class Chambers was killed in a subsequent engagement. His gallant action reflects great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. Next of kin: Mrs. Robert Chambers (Wife), 410 9th Street, Glenwood Springs, Colorado.

SECTION II -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, a Silver Star is awarded to each of the following named individuals for gallantry in action.

CLIFFORD J. CLYBURN, 0415773, Major, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 7 July 1944 in Italy. The 1st Battalion attacked an enemy force and advanced so rapidly through the surprised and disorganized troops that small groups were bypassed in the dense woods. Major Clyburn, regimental S-2, with two enlisted men, was following the battalion along a narrow trail in order to examine the enemy dead and the captured equipment. Suddenly he spotted a hostile soldier crouching in the underbrush, and he motioned for the man to come out. Six soldiers came forward and surrendered. Aware that more of the enemy might have been left in the area, he had the prisoners lie face down in the trail and proceeded on a systematic search of the area. Another enemy group was discovered and, after a brief fire fight, eight more prisoners were taken. Although he located another group on one side of the trail, he did not have enough men to guard the prisoners and so he reported the information to the 2d Battalion. He then ordered one of the enlisted men to march the prisoners to the rear while he and the other man continued on the mission. Entered the Service from Abilene, Texas.

PHILIP G. PADGETT, 0482455, Captain, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 1 June 1944 in Italy. On the afternoon of 1 June 1944 the 2d Battalion was subjected to a heavy barrage of artillery and mortar fire. Instead

of waiting for the casualties to be brought to his aid station, Captain Fadgett, the battalion medical officer, proceeded immediately to the Company G positions which were in the center of the impact area. While shells crashed around him, he directed the aid men of his section to places of safety while he exposed himself to render aid to the wounded. Working calmly under the terrific shell fire, he saved the lives of two soldiers by administering blood plasma and treated ten or twelve wounded men in the area. He not only saved the lives of the soldiers, but he also contributed materially to the high morale of the unit by assuring the men of prompt medical attention under the most hazardous conditions. Entered the Service from Kings Mountain, North Carolina.

DAVID O. GORGOL, 01295478, First Lieutenant, 142d Infantry Regiment, for gallantry in action on 4 June 1944 in Italy. While the 142d Infantry Regiment was advancing in a motorized column toward an enemy stronghold, Lieutenant Gorgol, liaison officer between the regimental and division headquarters, was given an urgent message at Division to deliver to the regimental commander. The regimental commander was at the head of the column, however, and concentrated sniper fire had split the column in two. Lieutenant Gorgol was halted and warned of the snipers who flanked the highway. Aware of the urgency of his mission, he left his vehicle and proceeded alone toward the commanding officer's position. When he spotted a group of 25 enemy soldiers crossing a field toward the highway, he quickly moved to a wall near the enemy force and opened fire on them. He had killed three of the soldiers when his rifle jammed. He skillfully remedied the stoppage and began firing again, but the enemy spotted his position and directed heavy fire on him. He remained dauntlessly in position and continued firing until he was wounded and forced to be evacuated. Entered the Service from Binghamton, New York.

Although outnumbered, they engaged the hostile force with fire and forced it to abandon the weapon and run away. The patrol hastened to the next hill and saw an enemy truck speeding down the highway 500 yards away. They opened fire and put the truck out of action. Now under fire, they went to the road and captured three enemy soldiers. At this point they were attacked by six of the enemy, but they quickly killed one, wounded another, and routed the rest. While the enemy fired on them with machine guns and rifles, the patrol gathered their prisoners. They were attacked from three sides by a large force. Fighting fiercely, the above named individuals drove off this force after inflicting four or five casualties. Still under a terrific hail of fire and with their ammunition almost exhausted, they skillfully made their way back through fields and woods to rejoin their company with
