JOHN D. HUGHEY, (39288089) Sergeant, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 186th Infantry, for heroism near Rockhampton, Queensland on September 11, 1942. While engaged in practice river crossings, an improvised raft which was being propelled across the river, suddenly capsized, throwing its occupants into the swift current. Sergeant Hughey, without thought for his personal safety, dived into the river and swam to the aid of the struggling men. He located a drowning soldier beneath the surface of the water, and with the help of other soldiers succeeded in bringing him to shore. The courage and decisive action displayed by Sergeant Hughey on this occasion reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Private Holloway, who was on the bank, immediately dived into the swiftly flowing river to the aid of the drowning men. With the help of other soldiers he secured a man beneath the surface of the water, and succeeded in bringing him to shore. The courage and complete disregard of personal safety shown by Private Holloway is worthy of the highest praise.

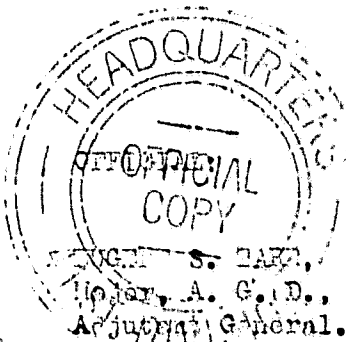
AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR

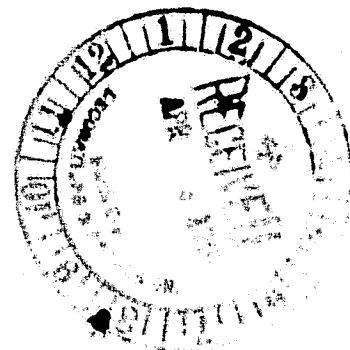
COMMENDATION

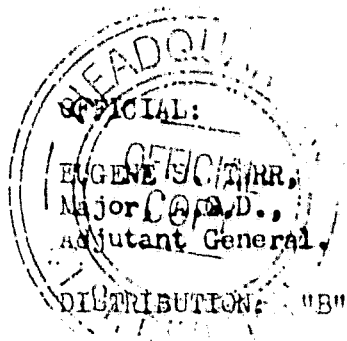

Upon seeing numerous fellow soldiers struggling in the river, Private Sax, who was a member of the crew of a nearby launch, immediately dived into the water and with complete disregard of his personal safety, went to the aid of the drowning men. He succeeded in pulling one man to the surface and aided in placing him in the launch. He then returned to rescue another man, and held him above the surface of the water until taken by a soldier in a small dingy. MICHAEL E. VAGENOS, (20343537), Private First Class, Company "E", 162nd Infantry, for heroism displayed near Rockhampton, Queensland, Australia, on September 21, 1942. While engaged in special training, a fellow soldier swimming in the water was overcome with cramps, went under and did not come up. Private Vagenos, who was some distance away, without regard for personal safety, swam to the spot where his fellow soldier was last seen, located him under water, brought the man to the surface and assisted in placing him in a boat which had arrived. His courage, quick thinking and prompt action saved the life of an enlisted man.

While engaged in special training, a boat carrying military personnel suddenly capsized, throwing all occupants, fully clothed and carrying full field equipment, into deep water. Upon seeing numerous fellow soldiers struggling in the river, Private Guy, who was a member of the crew of a near-by launch, without regard for personal safety, paddled a small dingy to two men who were in deep water, and assisted and encouraged them to hang on to the frail craft without overturning it. Private Guy also received a third enlisted man, who was brought over to the dingy through the water, and aided the crew of a launch lift to its deck the three men he had brought in. His courage, quick thinking and deliberate action saved the lives of two enlisted men and contributed to the saving of the life of a third man.

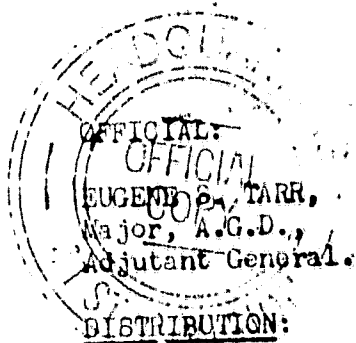

When an airplane of the R.A.A.F. crashed and burst into flames near him, Sergeant Boardman ran to the blazing wreckage and, with great risk of personal safety entered the flaming area, dragged the pilot's body toward the edge of the fire until he was personally overcome. 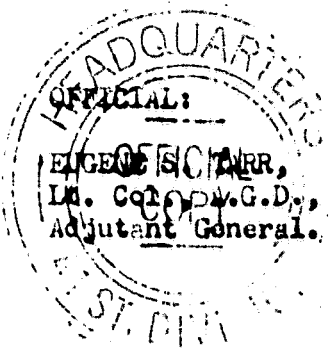

Sergeant CLUFF L. TIPPETS, (19065394), Cavalry, United States Army. UNIT CITATION

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9396 (Section I, Bulletin 22, WD, 1943, and Section IV, Circular No. 333, WD, 1943) the following unit is cited by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division:

First Battalion, 162nd Infantry Regiment is cited for outstanding performance of duty against the enemy near Salamaua, New Guinea, from 29 June to 12 September 1943. On 29 and 30 June, 1943, this battalion landed at Nassau Bay, New Guinea, in one of the first amphibious operations by American Forces in the Southwest Pacific Area, on a beach held by the enemy and during a severe storm which destroyed 90% of the landing craft able to reach the beach. Moving inland through deep swamps, crossing swift rivers, cutting its way through dense jungle, over steep ridges, carrying by hand all weapons, ammunition and food, assisted by only a limited number of natives, this battalion was in contact with the enemy for 74 consecutive days without rest or relief. All operations after the initial landing were far inland. Living conditions were most severe due to constant rain, mud, absence of any shelter, tenacious enemy and mountainous terrain. The supply of rations, ammunition and equipment was meager. For five weeks all personnel lived on rations dropped by airplane, for days at a time on half rations. Individual cooking was necessary throughout the period. Malaria and battle casualties greatly depleted their ranks, but at no time was there a let up in morale or in determination to destroy the enemy. Each officer and enlisted man was called upon to give his utmost of courage and stamina. The battalion killed 584 Japanese during this period, while suffering casualties of 11 officers and 176 enlisted men. Cutting the Japanese supply line near Mubo, exerting constant pressure on his flank, the valiant and sustained efforts of this battalion were in large part instrumental in breaking enemy resistance and forcing his withdrawal from Salamaua on 12 September 1943. The First Battalion, 162nd Infantry Regiment has established a worthy combat record, in keeping with the high traditions of the United States Army.

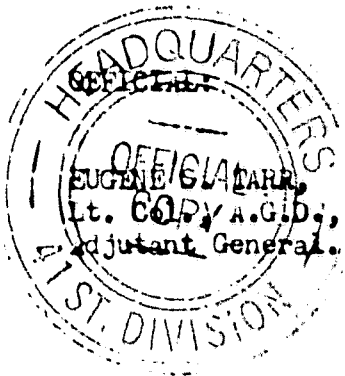

I. AWARD POSTHUMOUS OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is posthumously awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following named enlisted man:

Staff Sergeant RAYMOND M. SIMMONS, (20933645), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Biak Island on 8 June 1944. When a battalion came under heavy mortar fire and it was necessary to contact the observation post so that fire could be directed on the enemy positions Staff Sergeant Simmons, carrying an SCR-300 radio, voluntarily dashed across an open expanse of ground to the observation post. It was not possible for him to obtain any protection while operating his radio, but with total disregard for his safety, he stayed by his radio and furnished the vitally needed communication that proved so valuable in silencing the enemy mortars. While still under fire maintaining communication, Staff Sergeant Simmons was killed by a direct hit from a mortar shell. Next of kin: Mr. Virgil Simmons, (father), Bay City, Oregon.

II. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following named officer:

First Lieutenant LEON F. ALLER JR., (O-888412), Medical Administrative Corps, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Mokmer Drome, Biak Island on 5 June 1944. During a surprise attack, regimental units moved out leaving Lieutenant Aller and a small group of men to treat and evacuate the casualties of the combat team. Lieutenant Aller was the first man to lead his group in treating the numerous casualties exposed to enemy observation and fire. Despite the fact that one of the aid men assisting him was severely wounded, Lieutenant Aller continued to move the wounded to cover from enemy fire and give them first aid treatment. He then supervised the loading of casualties on jeeps and ambulances and led the loaded vehicles through enemy infested territory to a portable hospital. Lieutenant Aller then took one ambulance and a driver and went forward to evacuate other seriously wounded personnel. The return trip was made in complete darkness through an enemy infested area. 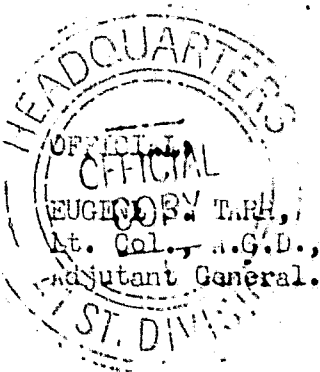

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9396, (Section I, Bulletin 22, WD, 1943), and Section IV, Circular No. 333, WD, 1943, the following unit is cited by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division:

The Second Engineer Special Brigade Support Battery (Provisional) is cited for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy at Biak Island, Netherlands East Indies, from 27 May to 14 June 1944. This unit rendered outstanding support to the Task Force which captured Biak Island. During the advance toward Mokmer Airdrome the overland route of supply was cut on several occasions by enemy activity. Landing Vehicles, Tracked, of this battery provided the only means of supplying organizations with food, ammunition and medical supplies, and made many landings under fire to accomplish their mission. On return trips casualties were evacuated from the beach to landing craft standing off shore. When enemy fire became so intense as to prevent supply of the forces by daylight, Landing Vehicles, Tracked, ran throughout the nights despite the danger of uncharted coral reefs. The rigor of their services is demonstrated by the fact that by 12 June only seven Landing Vehicles, Tracked, remained out of fifty four which had begun the operation, due to enemy action and navigational difficulties. The tireless and gallant efforts of all members of this unit made possible the capture of Mokmer Airdrome. The lives of many casualties were saved due to prompt evacuation by Landing Vehicles, Tracked. Acts of gallantry and heroism were numerous but difficult to single out of the uniformly high standard of achievement set by all personnel of the unit.

I. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following enlisted man:

First Sergeant WILLARD F. McDONALD, (39600746), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Parai Jetty, Biak Island on 8 June 1944. When a call was made for litter bearers to evacuate wounded under extremely hazardous conditions, First Sergeant McDonald immediately volunteered for the task. He took charge of a small group of other volunteer litter bearers and made plans for evacuating the dead and wounded. Exposing himself to deadly enemy rifle fire, he made four trips evacuating casualties. His display of leadership and courage was an inspiration to the men under him and resulted in the evacuation of all wounded and dead. His actions saved many lives on this day. II. AWARD OF THE SOLDIER'S MEDAL.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 2 July 1926 (Bulletin 8, WD, 1926), a Soldier's Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following enlisted man:

Corporal MATTHEW R. TRUMMER, (36039787), Corps of Military Police, United States Army. For heroism at Bosnek, Biak Island, on 5 October 1944. Corporal Trummer, upon hearing an explosion and seeing another soldier enveloped in flames, irregardless of his own personal safety, and being clad only in shorts, picked up a blanket and wrapped it around the soldier and rolled him away from the burning area surrounding the gasoline drums. There was great danger of the gasoline exploding at any moment and Corporal Trummer, by his quick thinking and heroic action, saved the soldier from being burned alive. Staff Sergeant LLOYD R. ALMOS, (39376368), Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Iodi Pocket, Biak Island on 11 July 1944. Due to a shortage of medical personnel, Staff Sergeant Almos, normally in charge of the aid station, volunteered to lead a litter bearing squad to evacuate two wounded men beyond the perimeter. Just as the wounded men were reached an enemy machine gun fired into the squad, mortally wounding one of the litter bearers. Staff Sergeant Almos left cover and crawled to the wounded man to give him first aid. When this casualty died Staff Sergeant Almos calmed his litter squad and directed them in the completion of the original mission. Home address: Mrs. John Almos, (mother), 4823 William Street, Detroit, Michigan.

Captain KIETH W. FERGUSON, (0888429), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on Wakde Island, Netherlands East Indies on 18 May 1944. When his company commander had been killed and his company pinned down by enemy fire, Captain Ferguson immediately assumed command and reorganized the unit. He personally directed a tank attack against enemy strong points, and aggressively led his company in clearing out the enemy. Throughout the action, although he was exposed to intense fire, he disregarded cover in order to accomplish his mission more effectively. Forty five pillboxes were reduced in this action and two hundred and forty Japanese killed, due in large part to the heroic leadership of Captain Ferguson. Private First Class DONALD E. FORTUNE, (35038043), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island, Netherlands East Indies on 23 September 1944. Private First Class Fortune, a Browning Automatic Rifleman, alone covered the withdrawal of his patrol from a position made untenable by enemy machine gun fire. Although emplaced in a precarious position and subject to heavy fire, he continued firing until the patrol had withdrawn with a wounded man. His bravery under fire saved the lives of his fellow soldiers. Home address: Mr. Clarence Fortune, (father), Dresden, Ohio.

Staff Sergeant FRANK H. MOORE, (20928718), Medical Department, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the Southwest Pacific Area from 22 April to 20 July 1944. Home address: Mrs. Marybelle Moore, (wife), 1132 Second Street, Whitefish, Montana.

Staff Sergeant HAROLD SINGER, (36301038), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 16 June 1944. During an attack upon an enemy strong point atop a ridge, Staff Sergeant Singer's platoon sustained several casualties. Disregarding the heavy machine gun and rifle fire, he organized a party to evacuate the wounded and with the help of two other men carried the most seriously wounded man across an open area to a concealed position. 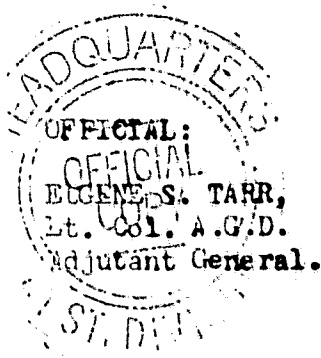

Private First Class Miller performed his duties as scout in an outstanding manner. He participated in a number of reconnaissances and skirmishes and many times his keen observation saved his squad or patrol from ambush. On one occasion as first scout with a patrol, he contacted a considerable force of Japanese who fired on him, one shot grazing his forehead. The enemy force thus alerted placed a heavy concentration of fire on his position. In withdrawing, he killed two of the enemy, and his escape momentarily cut off, he warned the patrol of the danger and ultimately reached safety. He obtained information of such value as to materially affect future operations in that area. Private First Class Miller, through his courageousness, aggressiveness, and resourcefulness in the face of the enemy contributed a great deal to the success of his company. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at New Guinea, Dutch New Guinea, and Biak Island from 22 April to 17 August 1944. Home address: Ethna V. Technician Grade V Malanca refused aid for himself until the other man had been adequately cared for. The courage, and devotion to duty of Technician Grade V Malanca on this occasion saved the life of a soldier and reflects great credit to himself and the military service. 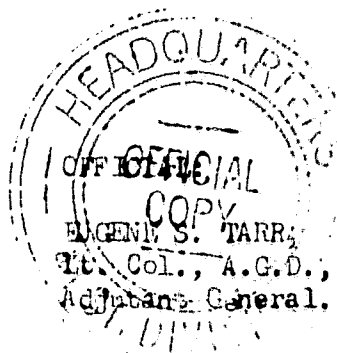

AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following named enlisted men:

Private LEONARD E. HUDSON, (34089258), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Humboldt Bay, Dutch New Guinea on 23 April 1944. An attack on a beachhead by enemy aircraft started large fires in the supply area and caused ammunition to explode. Private Hudson who was on the beach detailed as a guard, voluntarily joined in aiding the wounded trapped in an exploding ammunition and bomb dump area. He assisted as litter bearer, making several trips through the dangerous area, with shrapnel and debris flying about. He assisted in carrying two seriously wounded to safety. The performance of Private Hudson on this occasion is worthy of the highest praise. Home address: Mrs. Anna Hudson, (mother), Route 5, Carrollton, Georgia.

Private First Class CHARLES J. SCHOENING, (36737224), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Toem Village, Dutch New Guinea on 27 May 1944. Late in the evening, the enemy suddenly attacked Private First Class Schoening's company's defensive perimeter, using rifles, bayonets and hand grenades. Private First Class Schoening was immediately struck by grenade fragments causing severe wounds about his face. In spite of his injuries, he fought until his ammunition supply was exhausted, then contacted his company's command post by means of a sound powered telephone, and maintained the only channel of communications in that sector. When his unit withdrew to a second line of defense for more ammunition, he chose to remain by the telephone. Private First Class Schoening remained there while his position was surrounded and over run by the enemy, supplying his commanding officer with firing data and directions for movement of reinforcements then making their way toward his position and the edge of the perimeter. When reinforcements had strengthened the line and the enemy had been repulsed, Private First Class Schoening went to the rear for medical treatment of his wounds. I. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following officer.

Captain NICHOLAS W. HATFIELD, (0332719), Medical Corps, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Biak Island on 7 June 1944. Although himself painfully and seriously wounded during a barrage of enemy artillery and mortar fire, Captain Hatfield, a Medical Officer in command of a Collecting Platoon, refused to be evacuated until he had personally treated the casualties brought to him by personnel of his platoon. This required four hours, during which time he was continually exposed to intermittent enemy fire. When the last casualty had been treated and evacuated, Captain Hatfield was carried to the beach evacuation point. Due to limited facilities for evacuating wounded to hospitals in the rear, Captain Hatfield again refused to be evacuated until the evacuation of the other wounded had been completed. This necessitated another delay of thirty-six hours. His outstanding devotion to duty probably saved the lives of many wounded. II. AWARD OF THE SOLDIER'S MEDAL.

Technician Grade V ELMER BROWN, (20925975), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For heroism at Humboldt Bay, Dutch New Guinea on 18 May 1944. Technician Grade V Brown and another soldier, who were operating D-8 bulldozers in a burning ammunition dump, voluntarily commenced construction of a firebreak between gasoline dumps and LST slots being loaded for an operation. Realizing the effects of the impending catastrophe, and motivated by a desire to save vitally needed military equipment and supplies, they drove their tractors over the burned area containing unexploded shells. Technician Grade V Brown and his companion labored for five hours through constant explosions of shells and barrels of high octane gasoline. After five hours, the heat became so intense that it was practically impossible to continue the work and by this time the fire was within approximately 100 yards of twenty tons of TNT. The operators completely ignored this danger and successfully completed the fire break. They had barely completed their work when the twenty tons of TNT exploded. As a result of their work the contents of the loading slots were saved and loading for the contemplated operation was not delayed. Home address: Mrs. Maxine Brown, (Wife), Route 1, Boise, Idaho.

Technician Grade V HARRY L. STEWARD, (39677423), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For heroism at Humboldt Bay, Dutch New Guinea on 18 May 1944. Realizing the effects of the impending catastrophe, and motivated by a desire to save vitally needed military equipment and supplies, they drove their tractors over the burned area containing unexploded shells.

Technician Grade V Wesard and his companion labored for five hours through constant explosions of shells and barrels of high octane gasoline. After five hours, the heat became so intense that it was practically impossible to continue the work and by this time the fire was within approximately 100 yards of twentytons of TNT. The operators completely ignored this danger and successfully completed the fire break. They had barely completed their work when the twenty tons of TNT exploded. Having observed the action, and with full realization of the danger involved, he moved forward with another officer covering the litter squad with his carbine. He partially neutralized the fire of the enemy and drew so much toward himself, that the litter squad was able to safely reach the wounded man and return him to safety. By direction of the President, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal awarded to Staff Sergeant FRANK R GEHRMAN, (39300993), by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division, as published on page 2, Section II, General Orders Number 36, Headquarters 41st Infantry Division, dated 9 July 1944, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to him by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944). The citation is as follows:

Staff Sergeant FRANK R GEHRMAN, (39300993), Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 7 June 1944. Staff Sergeant Gehrman, section sergeant of a medical detachment, on being informed by telephone that a unit of plasma was needed at another aid station to save the life of a seriously wounded man, volunteered to deliver the plasma. The route of travel was over open terrain for a distance of about five hundred yards under heavy enemy fire. Litter squads had previously attempted to cross the area but were forced to return because of the intensity of fire. Twelve casualties had collected in Staff Sergeant Gehrman's station, who could not be evacuated. Staff Sergeant Gehrman decided to reconnoiter a route of evacuation for his station, evacuate the seriously wounded man, and deliver the plasma to the other station. He gathered a litter squad, a seriously wounded casualty, and the plasma and proceeded over the five hundred yard route, arriving safely with his party and the plasma after being pinned down three times by heavy fire in the process. I. AWARD OF THE OAK LEAF CLUSTER (SILVER STAR).

By direction of the President, in addition to the Silver Star awarded to Technician Grade V LESLIE O WINKLER by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division, as published on page 2, Section I, General Orders Number 55, Headquarters 41st Infantry Division, dated 9 August 1944, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to him by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918). The citation is as follows:

Technician Grade V LESLIE O WINKLER, (39137458), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Biak Island on 28 May 1944. Technician Grade V Winkler, during a withdrawal, drove his D-7 bulldozer through a heavy barrage of mortar, machine gun, and rifle fire over the same route followed by tanks and provided mobile cover for about six riflemen. His bulldozer did not have an armored cab and he was exposed to the full view of the enemy. At one point when the fire became extremely heavy, Technician Grade V Winkler climbed down from his open seat and, using the bulldozer as a screen, pointed out the direction of an enemy machine gun, thus allowing one of the tanks to place fire on it. The terrain was such that the enemy could observe easily and fire on all movements of soldiers and equipment passing through the area. Technician Grade V Winkler displayed exceptional courage in safeguarding his equipment and protecting his fellow soldiers. Home address: Mrs. Clark White, (Aunt), 601 N. II. AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order Number 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following officers and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant BRUCE B BRECHTBILL, (0888340), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 11 June 1944. First Lieutenant Brechtbill, without regard for personal safety, moved forward under heavy mortar and machine gun fire to a position about two hundred yards in front of the assault company in order to direct mortar fire on two enemy bunkers holding up an attack. His fearless action and superior direction of fire neutralized the bunkers and also silenced six heavy guns that were firing from the ridge on an airdrome below. Although two of his party were wounded, First Lieutenant Brechtbill remained alone in his exposed position until the mission was completed. Home address: Mrs. Bruce B. Captain HARLEY M CHATTERTON JR, (0907737), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island from 20 July to 27 August 1944. Staff Sergeant ALVIN M HOFFMAN, (35601162), Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 29 May 1944. Staff Sergeant Hoffman's medical unit was in support of an infantry battalion during operations on Biak Island. He successfully directed the evacuation of many seriously wounded men while under direct mortar fire. The battalion was established in a perimeter formation with the Japanese located nearby on high ground. The enemy suddenly opened with heavy accurate mortar fire, inflicting many casualties. Staff Sergeant Hoffman led his section of litter bearers to the scene and began to evacuate the wounded when a second barrage of equal intensity commenced. Disregarding personal safety, he continued evacuation of the wounded. There were no casualties in his party although numerous mortar hits were scored in the area. Home address: Mr. William F. Hoffman, (Father), Stevensville, Montana.

Technical Sergeant RAYMOND E. KLIEVER, (20933824), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 21 May 1944. Technical Sergeant Kliever exposed himself to heavy enemy mortar fire in going forward to rescue a soldier who had been severely wounded and was helpless, one of his legs having been blown almost off. The wounded man was also in danger of being hit again, for the enemy had ranged in on the place where he was lying. Technical Sergeant Kliever picked up the wounded man and carried him on his back to a place of safety. Again the same day, Technical Sergeant Kliever volunteered to accompany a battalion commander as personal security in an attempt to locate another unit. While on the mission, he, with the party, reconnoitered a route to move a company to rejoin its battalion. The reconnaissance was through enemy dominated territory and was extremely hazardous to any movement. Home address: Mr. George Kliever, (Father), 1002 Stump Street, Dallas, Oregon.

Captain JAMES F ROGERS, (0401939), Dental Corps, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Aitape, New Guinea, Toem, Dutch New Guinea, and Wakde and Biak Islands from 22 April to 20 July 1944. Home address: Mrs. Loretta E. C. Rogers, (Wife), 916 South Jay Street, Tacoma, Washington.

Private RALPH SEIBER, (20933526), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 2 and 5 June 1944. On 2 June, Private Seiber was driving a D-2 tractor and trailer hauling supplies to forward area. The Japanese counterattacked and the impetus of their attack carried them almost to the motor transport road at the point where Private Seiber was located. The enemy opened fire on him but Private Seiber remained with his vehicle. He set his tractor at maximum speed and ran the gauntlet of heavy fire, protected only partially by the motor of his tractor. On the night of 5 June, Private Seiber was in a foxhole under heavy flat trajectory mountain gun fire when a call came for a tractor and trailer to haul mortar ammunition so that counter-battery fire could be delivered. Although the area was still being shelled, Private Seiber volunteered and hauled ammunition for two hours. Operation of the tractor made him extremely vulnerable as the noise of the engine was likely to draw enemy fire. Home address: Mr. Lewis Seiber, (Father), Brooks-Scanlon Camp No. 1, Bend, Oregon.

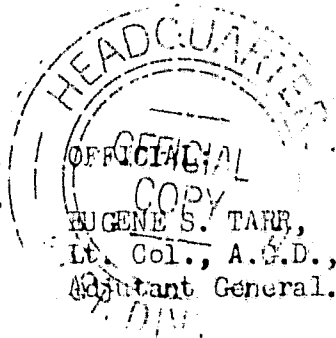

I. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 13, D, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following officers and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant WESS A. CANDOLLA, (02034502), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Aitape, New Guinea on 28 April 1944. First Lieutenant Candolla led his platoon ten miles inland from the coast on a patrol to set up an ambush. About one mile from their starting point, his scouts spotted a group of the enemy. First Lieutenant Candolla took a few men and destroyed the enemy and moved on with his patrol. The patrol arrived at its destination and set up the ambush. The following morning, their perimeter was attacked by two hundred of the enemy. First Lieutenant Candolla directed his men in the repulse of a bayonet attack supported by heavy small arms fire. Ammunition and supplies became low and it was apparent that a withdrawal would be necessary. First Lieutenant Candolla again exposed himself to enemy fire by going from one position to another to inform their occupants of the proposed withdrawal. First Lieutenant Candolla was the last man to leave the perimeter, making certain no wounded or sick were left behind. Home address: Mrs. J. Kardina (sister), 2101 Queen's Highway, Shreveport, Louisiana.

Corporal FRANK P. FEIFAR, (36301448), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Wakde Island on 18 May 1944. During an attack on enemy positions, Corporal Feifar's company was pinned down by heavy flanking enemy fire. Disregarding the hazards involved Corporal Feifar crawled forward and located the source of the fire, which was a machine gun emplaced in a shell hole on higher ground than occupied by friendly troops. He moved forward in the face of the fire until within grenade range. After throwing several grenades he commenced firing his rifle and charged into the position, killing four Japanese who were manning the gun. Home address: Mr. William A. Feifar, (father), Route 1, New Carlisle, Indiana.

Staff Sergeant ALFRED PORTER, (30156434), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Biak Island on 13 July 1944. Staff Sergeant Porter led his squad on a patrol with the mission of clearing an area of the enemy and securing the advance of his company. The patrol had nearly completed its mission when fired on by heavy automatic weapon and sniper fire. Staff Sergeant Porter located the source of the fire which came from two emplacements, a grass hut and a coral fortification, and deployed his men. After a short skirmish during which two of his men were put out of action, he withdrew his patrol, taking the casualties to safety. He directed his men to hold their fire while he reconnoitered the situation. Realizing

the hazards involved, he charged the enemy, spraying the fire of his sub-machine gun into the hut and throwing two grenades into the coral position, killing four enemy who had been holding up his patrol's progress. He then led his patrol to a successful conclusion of its mission. Home address: Mrs. Carmelita Porter, (mother), 601 McBride Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

Brigadier General EDWIN A. ZUNDEL, (03792), United States Army. For gallantry in action near Ildi, Biak Island on 29 May 1944. Heavy enemy fire had caused an infantry battalion to withdraw thus exposing two artillery battalions to considerable danger. Upon being notified of this, Brigadier General Zundel, Commanding General of Division Artillery, immediately went forward under enemy fire to confer with his battalion commanders and obtain first hand information as to the safety of his troops. At the time of his arrival one of the artillery battalions was receiving heavy fire, and infantry positions were being hard pressed by the enemy from a line two hundred and fifty yards away. After issuing orders for effective artillery support, and observing its execution, Brigadier General Zundel returned to his command post encountering additional enemy fire. His calm leadership under fire was a great contribution to the successful completion of the mission. Home address: Mrs. Eleanor L. Zundel, (wife), 1921 East Main Street, Humboldt, Tennessee.

II. AWARD OF THE SOLDIER'S MEDAL.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 2 July 1926 (Bulletin 8, D, 1926), a Soldier's Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant WILLIAM T. ALLISON, (20929737), Infantry, United States Army. For heroism near Serra Village, Dutch New Guinea on 1 May 1944. Staff Sergeant Allison's platoon was making a tactical amphibious landing during operations in this area. The landing was made on a treacherous beach in a six foot surf. There was a cross current along the beach caused by a sand bar twenty five yards off shore which had swept out holes at intervals. The landing craft hit the sand bar and the coxswain, unaware of the hole immediately to his front, dropped the ramp. Eleven men were in the water before the boat team leader could halt them. One man was immediately swept beneath the boat and drowned. Staff Sergeant Allison stripped off his equipment, dived into the water to rescue a soldier who could not swim and was being swept beneath the boat. He separated the soldier from the jam of men, tore off his equipment and dragged him to safety. Then, although he was exhausted, he went back into the water to assist others who could not reach the beach. He assisted in rendering artificial respiration until all were revived. Technician Grade V CLARENCE T. BUST, (39376437), Medical Department, United States Army. For heroism near Serra Village, Dutch New Guinea on 1 May 1944. For heroism near Serra Village, Dutch New Guinea on 1 May 1944. Technician Grade V Bust's platoon was making a tactical amphibious landing during operations in this area. The landing was made on a treacherous beach in a six foot surf. There was a cross current along the beach caused by a sand bar twenty five yards off shore which had swept out holes at intervals. The landing craft hit the sand bar and the coxswain, unaware of the hole immediately to his front, dropped the ramp. Eleven men were in the water before the boat team leader could halt them. One man was immediately swept beneath the boat and drowned. Technician Grade V Bust stripped off his equipment, dived into the water to rescue a soldier who could not swim and was being swept beneath the boat. One man was immediately swept beneath the boat and drowned. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 7 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is posthumously awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following named enlisted man:

Private JEROME L. GROSSHANDLER, (32983738), Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Wick Island on 21 June 1944. When an officer was wounded, Private Grosshandler, an aid man, exposed himself to accurate sniper fire to render treatment. As he finished, he saw another man who had been hit by a sniper, fall about twenty five yards away. Disregarding the danger, he rushed to the wounded man, whose position he knew was exposed to the sniper. As he reached the man, the sniper again opened fire hitting him in the stomach, a wound which a short time later proved fatal. Private Grosshandler's gallant performance made a deep impression upon his fellow soldiers. Next of kin: Mrs. Lora Grosshandler, (mother), 652 Southern Boulevard, Bronx, New York.

IV. AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 7 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Technical Sergeant DAVID L. BICKLE, (20932883), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Wick Island on 2 June 1944. A patrol of men from Technical Sergeant Bickle's platoon were acting as point in the advance of their battalion. Technical Sergeant Bickle was following closely with the remainder of his platoon when the point moved into the field of fire of hidden enemy machine gun positions which caused a few casualties and pinned the balance of the patrol to the ground. To withdraw these men, it was necessary to divert the enemy fire to another target or knock out the position. Technical Sergeant Bickle moved forward to the flank of the point, and fired his Carbine from an exposed position, knowing he had little chance of hitting the enemy gunners. He accomplished his purpose of providing a target which diverted enough of the fire to enable the point to withdraw with the casualties. Home address: Mrs. S. I. Sergeant ROCCO G. CAPIRDI, (39231515), Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations

against the enemy at Eiak Island from 7 July to 9 August 1944. Home address: Mrs. Livera Capirci, (mother), 935 Mary Street, Utica, New York.

Technician Grade V MERLYN R. HOWARD, (2075792), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Eiak Island on 2 June 1944. Technician Grade V Howard was one of a group of four men stationed at a listening post near their recreational watering point, with instructions to withdraw to their platoon perimeter should a superior force of the enemy be sighted. Technician Grade V Howard had just detached himself from the party and moved to a better point for observation when a force of Japanese of about thirty five made a bayonet attack supported by machine gun fire from their flanks. One member of the patrol was bayoneted to death, two withdrew and Technician Grade V Howard alone stood his ground and fired round after round into the advancing enemy. He killed seven and wounded others. Among these killed was the officer in charge of the attacking patrol. The enemy were disorganized and withdrew. Technician Grade V Howard, instead of withdrawing by a comparatively safe route, singlehandedly stopped and repulsed an attack which probably would have inflicted many casualties among the men of his unit. Warrant Officer Junior Grade FRED S. KANE, (W2107049), United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Mischhafen, New Guinea from 18 June to 25 August 1944. Home address: Mrs. Fred S. Kane, (wife), 1304 East 42nd Street, Seattle, Washington.

Corporal EARL E. McNAIR, (39123801), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Eiak Island on 8 and 9 August 1944. Corporal McNair, a member of an intelligence and reconnaissance platoon, was on a three day patrol and in charge of charting their route. The first day, the patrol encountered a group of well-armed Japanese and Corporal McNair took a leading part in the attack in which most of the enemy were killed. The following day, the patrol was ambushed when near its objective. Two men were wounded and trapped with three other men including Corporal McNair on a narrow ledge. The men had the radio with them which was the only means of communications the patrol had. The men were continually under fire, and in the ensuing withdrawal and evacuation of the wounded, the radio was left behind. Corporal McNair volunteered to attempt to regain the radio and crawled towards the coral ledge on his stomach, with the enemy concentrating their fire on him. He gained possession of the radio and slowly crawled back to the lines, the enemy redoubling their efforts to stop him with a heavy concentration of fire. Corporal McNair, then charted all terrain features and positions on his map. His accuracy in charting the area contributed much toward the success of an air strike on the following day. Home address: Mrs. Pearl McNair, (mother), Beatty, Oregon.

Staff Sergeant AMFUR R. MORRIS, (39285091), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Eiak Island on 14 June 1944. During a movement of his organization in attacking enemy positions, Staff Sergeant Morris' platoon advanced approximately one hundred yards and met enemy fire which halted them momentarily. Staff Sergeant Morris led his squad forward under heavy enemy fire to drive into the enemy positions. Several men of the platoon were wounded and their advance halted by a terrific enemy barrage. Staff Sergeant Morris' squad was pinned down and an enemy flanking movement threatened to cut off his squad from the rest of the platoon. By quick, precise commands, he directed the fire of his squad, killing six of the enemy, three of which he personally accounted for, and repulsed the attack. He observed the enemy preparing to counterattack and when the assault came, held his position. On receiving orders to withdraw his squad, Staff Sergeant Morris and his men

acted as rear guard for the platoon, then he in turn covered the withdrawal of his squad. In so doing, he was seriously wounded in the chest but with determination and courage, he continued to cover the withdrawal until it was completed. Home address: Mrs. Josephine M. Luchterhand, (mother), Box 496, Diablo Heights, Canal Zone, Panama.

Staff Sergeant WILLIAM P. MUCHMORE, (39603116), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Toem, Dutch New Guinea on 27 May 1944. Staff Sergeant Muchmore was with a platoon which was given the mission of moving out from their perimeter to wipe out enemy resistance that was covering a trail and stream crossing. The platoon advanced approximately five hundred yards when fire contact was made with the enemy. After a heavy skirmish the enemy withdrew down the trail. The platoon pushed on another hundred yards, again contacted the Japanese and this time were pinned to the ground. One squad was sent to outflank the enemy, but they were met with heavy fire and one was killed. His body had fallen over a log and many attempts made to recover it failed because of heavy sniper fire. Staff Sergeant Muchmore left his secure position and crawled to the log where his comrade had fallen. He pulled the body over the fallen area and brought it to a place of safety. He later returned to the same place and killed two snipers which enabled the platoon to move forward to accomplish its mission. Home address: Mrs. Virginia Muchmore, (mother), 625 E. 3rd Street, Missoula, Montana.

Private First Class JOHN B. OSBORN, (36453958), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 2 July 1944. Private First Class Osborn's company was occupying a position on its battalion flank which was threatened by an enemy emplacement in a coral cave reinforced by logs. After two days of attempting to drive the enemy out of the position, it was decided to employ flame throwers. To operate the flame thrower against the position was extremely hazardous since the operator would be exposed to direct fire. Volunteers were called for and Private First Class Osborn, a machine gunner, offered to attempt the job. After appraising the situation, he decided to bring the flame thrower into action on the emplacement from an exposed spot less than five yards from the enemy. Without hesitation, he moved forward under cover of rifle fire to this position, in full view of the enemy and put his flame thrower into action. Five Japanese emerged from cover, four of them burning, and were killed by the riflemen. Home address: Mrs. Susan Osborn, (mother), Star Route, Hubbard Lake, Michigan.

Sergeant HOWARD G. RANSOM, (16012254), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 31 May 1944. When his platoon was pinned down by enemy fire, Private First Class Ransom, an assistant squad leader, on his own initiative advanced toward the enemy. The enemy fire increased in intensity, but nevertheless he continued his advance with no regard for personal safety. At a point about twenty feet up the side of a steep cliff he was wounded in the face by a grenade fragment. From his position he was able to observe the enemy, and despite his wound he remained there, firing his rifle into the enemy positions. He covered the evacuation of a wounded man, then descended from his position and rejoined his unit and pointed out enemy emplacements, enabling heavy fire to be placed on them. This courageous performance of Private First Class Ransom resulted in the complete destruction of enemy positions and the accomplishment of the unit's mission. Home address: Mr. W. L. Sergeant LUIS E. RAYNOE, (34031155), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 11 June 1944. Sergeant Raynoe's battalion was attacking a ridge north of Mokmer Airfield. As the assault company started its drive along the ridge, it was pinned down by enemy fire from another ridge.

Corporal Raynor, an agent and instrument Corporal for an 81mm mortar platoon, volunteered to go forward as a member of the observation group for the 81mm mortars to the assault company that was pinned down. In order to get observation, the party had to move to a point about two hundred yards ahead of the assault company. All their movements were in view of the enemy and they drew heavy fire. Corporal Raynor laid all the wire and assisted in directing mortar fire. Although under continuous heavy fire, he remained at the observation post without regard for personal safety until the mission was completed. Home address: Mrs. J. E. Private First Class ELMER L. St. COEUR, (38563421), Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Aitape and Toom, Dutch New Guinea and Biak Island from 22 April to 16 July 1944. Home address: Mrs. Rosia S. St. Coeur, (mother), Route 1, Ripley, Oklahoma.

Lieutenant Colonel ROBERT STERLING, (G333695), Medical Corps, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak and Owi Islands, Schouten Island Group from 28 May to 20 August 1944. Home address: Mrs. Robert Sterling, (wife) 1129 Louisiana Street, Lawrence, Kansas.

Private First Class ALBERT E. WALICZEK, (36642049), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Tementoe River, Dutch New Guinea on 18 May 1944. When his patrol had been pinned down by a Japanese ambush, Private Waliczek crawled forward to retrieve an automatic rifle, when the gunner had been killed. Although he was subjected to small arms fire with every movement he secured the weapon, and maneuvered into a position where he could bring fire on the enemy. His fire forced the enemy to take cover and enabled the other members of the patrol to close in and dispose of the resistance. Private Waliczek's action made possible the success of the patrol in completing its mission and undoubtedly prevented many casualties. V. AWARD OF THE OAK LEAF CLUSTER (BRONZE STAR MEDAL).

By direction of the President, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal awarded to Captain WILLIS V. HINES, (0414751), by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division, as published on page 1, Section I, General Orders number 33, Headquarters 41st Infantry Division, dated 6 July 1944, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to him by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division, under the provisions of Executive Order number 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944). The citation is as follows:

Captain WILLIS V. HINES, (0414751), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 28 May 1944. Captain Hines personally organized and accompanied a convoy of LVT's in order to transport badly needed medical supplies, ammunition, and water to a besieged battalion. When the convoy came under heavy mortar and mountain gun fire, Captain Hines persuaded the personnel of his LVT to make the landing, although the rest of the convoy had turned back. He supervised the unloading of supplies and evacuation of casualties, making many trips back and forth until the requirements of the battalion were filled. His courageous action under fire enabled many casualties to be transported to a place where medical attention could be given, saving many lives. 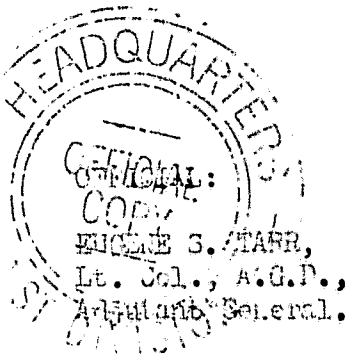

I. AWARD POSTHUMOUS OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is posthumously awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division, to the following onlisted men:

Private JOHN A ADAMS, (39679177), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Wake Island on 18 May 1944. Private Adams, an ammunition carrier for a light machine gun section, volunteered to assist a reserve squad in relieving two platoons which had been advancing up a narrow coral airplane dispersal strip bounded on either side by revetments. The squad leader led the advance, with Private Adams assisting in scouting the area. As the two men rounded the edge of a revetment, they were met by enemy machine gun fire, slightly wounding both and cutting them off from the squad. From their location, however, they observed seventeen of the enemy in an open position manning three machine guns. Private Adams and the squad leader attacked the emplacement from the rear, and, using rifles and grenades, killed every man holding the position. In an attempt to return to the squad, Private Adams and the squad leader were killed by enemy machine gun cross fire. Private Adams' courageous performance on this occasion is worthy of the highest praise. Next of kin: Mr. F. D. Adams, (brother), Ladysmith, Wisconsin.

Private First Class AUGUST LEONARD, (39679152), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Biak Island on 29 June 1944. Private First Class Leonard's platoon was subjected to a prolonged counterattack during which his squad ran low on ammunition. To repulse the attack, a resupply was needed immediately. Private First Class Leonard, who was acting as squad leader, left his position and worked his way to the unit ammunition dump, passing through an area under severe sniper fire. Returning by the same route with as many grenades and bandoleers of ammunition as he could carry, he was shot in the back by a sniper. Though mortally wounded, he dashed forward and reached his squad with the vitally needed ammunition. He then collapsed and died of his wound. As a result of this heroic performance, Private First Class Leonard's squad successfully assisted in the complete rout of the enemy. Next of kin: Mrs. Thelma Rodriguez, (sister), 424 West Sixth South, Salt Lake City, Utah.

II. AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant FRANK W ALDRICH, (39165142), Medical Department, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Biak Island on 26 May 1944. Staff Sergeant Aldrich constantly exposed himself to heavy enemy fire for a period of nine hours while directing the evacuation of casualties, organizing litter parties and leading them to wounded outside their battalion perimeter, and administering medical treatment and plasma. He ranged throughout the battalion's position, never taking cover when it interfered with his giving treatment to a wounded soldier. The courageous and intrepid manner in which he went about his work inspired those about him and many left places of comparative security to help him. The performance of Staff

Sergeant Aldrich which resulted in expeditious handling of casualties so that none were subjected to further danger or impeded operations, was an important factor in the execution of a battalion movement in a critical situation. Home address: Mr. William W. Aldrich, (father), 3755 Rossmead Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

Technical Sergeant RAY J GIBNEY, (39301080), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action near Tor River, Dutch New Guinea on 20 May 1944. A Japanese attack having materialized on his platoon's perimeter on the evening of 19 May, Technical Sergeant Gibney directed the light machine gun section of his company to remain silent throughout the night so as not to disclose their positions to the enemy. At daylight, the Japanese were caught charging down one of the fire lanes with fixed bayonets. Twenty two of them were killed and the soldier manning the gun was wounded by shrapnel. Technical Sergeant Gibney, observing the situation of the wounded gunner, made his way with a box of ammunition through a hail of enemy fire which was covering their position. He tore the logs away from the gun pit, and assisted the wounded man to the rear. He then carried forward another box of ammunition, receiving heavy automatic fire on his return. Although the area was traversed by machine guns, he made a trip with ammunition to another squad and was wounded enroute. Throughout the attack he controlled the fire of his section. The leadership and fortitude of Technical Sergeant Gibney were responsible for the successful repulse of the enemy. Home address: Mrs. J. W. Gibney, (wife), Route 1, Marshfield, Oregon.

Private First Class PAUL E HUNTER, (36034500), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Wakde Island on 18 May 1944. During an assault on enemy positions, Private First Class Hunter's company was pinned down by heavy machine gun fire. Without hesitation, he advanced, crawling over fallen trees and wreckage that was strewn about the area, drawing increased fire as he moved, until within grenade range. He threw several grenades toward the position, but resistance continued. He then charged the position, firing his Browning Automatic Rifle. On reaching the position, he fired directly into it, killing four of the enemy and destroying the machine gun. Home address: Mrs. Alberta L. Hunter, (mother), 6431 South Stewart Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

Sergeant ROBERT O WILSON, (39228105), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action at Biak Island on 26 June 1944. Sergeant Wilson's squad was leading the movement of his company along a ridge with the mission of containing and holding the enemy while an attack developed from another direction. During the advance, the lead scout spotted a pill box at the instant it opened fire, and he fell wounded in a fire lane. Disregarding personal safety, Sergeant Wilson moved into the open and dragged the wounded scout to cover. He then ordered his automatic riflemen to open fire on the enemy and rushed the pill box from the blind side, throwing two grenades into it. The enemy were forced to abandon their position and Sergeant Wilson's company was able to proceed in its mission. Home address: Mrs. Grace B. III. AWARD POSTHUMOUS OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is posthumously awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following officers:

First Lieutenant HOWARD B JENSON, (02034540), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 27 June 1944. First Lieutenant Jenson led a reinforced patrol into an area known as Ibdri Pocket which was being fiercely defended by the Japanese. The enemy hold area was a series of coral ridges covered with scrub trees honeycombed with caves and crevices. The enemy possessed the advantage of observation and position. The patrol moved a short distance into the area which had been previously reconnoitered, encountering no resistance, then withdrew slightly for a mortar barrage. Following the barrage, the patrol moved into the area without opposition, and, as they began to withdraw, after gaining all possible information, they were fired upon by a hidden machine gun which killed two men and wounded another. In an attempt to locate the source of the gun fire, First Lieutenant Jenson made a personal reconnaissance of the area and was killed by the gun he was attempting

to find. Its position was located however, and was eventually put out of action. Next of kin: Mrs. Willma Bratke, (sister), P.O. Box 65, Green River, Wyoming.

Second Lieutenant SHELBY W TEEBERS, (02035164), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 27 June 1944. On this date, Second Lieutenant Teebers' battalion was extended along a ridge running east and west on Biak Island. His platoon had been held down for the greater portion of the day by heavy enemy fire coming from another ridge about thirty five yards distant which commanded the entire area. His platoon was detailed to guard a flank of the battalion and towards evening suffered a severe counterattack from the enemy who were occupying the reverse slope of the ridge. He called to the command post for mortar fire, and crawled to the crest of the ridge to direct it. He was subjected to heavy fire, but remained at his post until the counterattack was broken. When his mission was nearly completed, he was struck by shrapnel and died of wounds enroute to the hospital. His outstanding performance was an important factor in preventing an enemy break through, and was an inspiration to the officers and men with whom he worked. IV. AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order No. 9419, 4 February 1944 (Sec. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 41st Infantry Division to the following officers and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant ROBERT K BENTLEY, (0439274), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 28 May 1944. First Lieutenant Bentley's battalion was without means of wire or radio communications and approaches to its position were covered by the enemy. First Lieutenant Bentley, battalion communications officer, decided on a course of action to get wire communications to his battalion commander. To accomplish this, it was necessary for him to cover a three hundred and fifty yard fire swept stretch of road and beach. After proceeding for approximately one hundred yards, he encountered heavy machine gun fire. Without hesitation, he ran to a cliff that dropped twenty feet to a beach below. While climbing down, he slipped and fell about ten feet, suffering a fractured rib, but continued another two hundred yards along the beach. In the rear area, he secured an LVT and gave instructions to lay wire by water. Anticipating the probable impossibility of landing near the command post, he reconnoitered a route at the cliff base which was in defilade from the machine gun fire. He then reported his activities to his commander. The route he followed in his return was later used by a reserve company in rejoining the battalion after having been cut off for more than three hours. Home address: Mrs. Robert K. Master Sergeant CHARLES R BRANDT, (37405858), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Cape Gloucester, New Britain, and Owi Island, Schouten Island Group, from 27 December 1943 to 19 August 1944. Home address: Mrs. Ida Mae Brandt (wife), 3022 Big Bend Boulevard, Maplewood, Missouri.

First Sergeant ROBERT I. BROWN, (20930733), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Toem, Dutch New Guinea, on 27 May 1944. An enemy force attacked the bivouac area of First Sergeant Brown's unit in an attempt to break through to beach installations. The first warning of the attack came from exploding booby traps, long bursts of machine gun fire, and mortar fire directed into the command post area. Realizing that the command post was in danger of being overrun unless a hasty secondary defense was maintained against the infiltrating Japanese, he moved about in the darkness, exposing himself to the danger of enemy fire, and that of friendly troops. He gathered communications personnel and formed them in a position to defend the command post and communications installations. His performance assisted in reducing the confusion and in killing every Japanese that penetrated the forward defenses. Home address: Mrs. Mable E. Technical Sergeant WILLIAM A BROWN, (20933539), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 28 May 1944. Technical Sergeant Brown's heavy weapons platoon, which was in support of the leading company in his unit's advance on Mokmer Airdrome, was ambushed by Japanese. The leading company was pinned down by heavy fire and the enemy infiltrated around its flanks. When the Japanese charged his platoon, he quickly organized his squads and placed his guns into position to beat them off. He was badly wounded in the arm early in the skirmish, but remained with the platoon directing the action until he was no longer physically able to do so when seriously wounded in the leg and side by mortar shrapnel. Home address: Mrs Rachel Tucker, (mother), Box 108, Greensburg, Kansas.

Master Sergeant JOHN L FURT, (32131510), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island from 2 to 15 August 1944. Home address: Mrs. Laura Burt, (mother), 18 Division Street, Silver Creek, New York.

Major RICHARD P DAVIDSON, (0350040), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island from 9 to 15 August 1944. Home address: Mrs. Ludie J. Davidson, (wife), Greensboro, Alabama.

Technical Sergeant WILLARD E DE ROUSSE, (39378819), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island from 2 to 15 August 1944. Home address Mr. William E. De Rousse, (father), Route 13, Kirkwood, Missouri.

Captain RICHARD S DONOVAN, (01687210), Medical Corps, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Humboldt Bay, Dutch New Guinea, and Biak Island from 23 April to 20 June 1944. Home address: Mr. F. C. Donovan, (father), 5451 Second Boulevard, Detroit, Michigan.

Technical Sergeant JAMES R GLEASON, (20940318), Medical Department, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island from 27 May to 8 August 1944. Home address: Mrs. Elizabeth A. Gleason, (mother), 765 Hayes Street, Seattle, Washington

Technical Sergeant VICTOR D HOPSTEIN, (32766699), Corps of Engineers, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Owi Island, Schouten Island Group, from 5 to 20 June 1944. Home address: Mrs. Gertrude D. Hopstein, (mother), 217 West Colvin Street, Syracuse, New York.

Corporal THOMAS G HUTCHISON, (33276431), Ordnance Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 17 August 1944. Corporal Hutchison, in the course of his duties, approached an abandoned Japanese warehouse. Upon nearing the warehouse, he heard a noise within and on investigation, was confronted by a Japanese armed with a bayonet. Corporal Hutchison was unarmed and alone at the time, but without hesitation, he disarmed the enemy and brought him to his company area in his vehicle. Home address: Mrs. Emma Hutchison, (mother), Box 252, Cheswick, Pennsylvania.

Private First Class EDWARD KARKOSKI, (36301427), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 19 June 1944. Private First Class Karkoski was assigned as scout for a patrol on reconnaissance. Enemy fire was encountered by the patrol, wounding eight men, and one so seriously that he could not move. Private First Class Karkoski took charge of the rear guard when the patrol was ordered to withdraw and threw grenades until seven of the wounded reached safety. Then, disregarding the enemy fire, he administered first aid to the seriously wounded man and carried him thirty yards over a coral ridge which was almost impassable to a man traveling alone. The performance of Private First Class Karkoski on this occasion was an inspiration to the men of the patrol and probably saved a comrade's life. Captain PAUL L. KLIEVER, (0397318), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 28 May 1944. Captain Kliever's battalion, in its attack on Mokmer Air-drome, in the morning of this date, encountered considerable resistance. As the situation developed, a fierce fire fight broke out all along the front and flanks of the forward elements and the reserve company was cut off from the battalion. Captain Kliever took charge of the situation on a flank where the enemy had broken through. He moved another company into position on the flank and, as no reserve company was available, organized a mine detection platoon and a portion of the battalion headquarters company into fighting units and placed them to cover the rear. Captain Kliever was personally responsible for the organization of this effective defensive position. Home address: Mrs. Paul L. Kliever, (wife), 418 Clay Street, Dallas, Oregon.

Staff Sergeant CALVIN E MC ALISTER, (30933275), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 16 June 1944. At dusk, Staff Sergeant McAlister, a mortar observer, established an observation post in front of the forward elements of friendly troops at the edge of a timber line. It was impossible to dig any type of shelter due to the jagged coral. During the night the enemy crawled to within twenty feet of his post. Although aware that telephone conversation would further endanger his already critical situation, he continued to direct mortar fire through out the night. His post was under constant fire during this period and at dawn, he found that the enemy had crawled in around him. He killed two and drove the remainder away with grenade and rifle fire. Staff Sergeant McAlister's performance enabled observed fire to be placed on the enemy and had he withdrawn to safety, the possibility of an enemy break through would have been almost certain. Technical Sergeant EARL A MILLS, (20929747), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 28 June 1944. Technical Sergeant Mills, acting as platoon leader, advanced with his unit along a ridge parallel to their objective. He halted his platoon on the ridge and commenced organizing to support the balance of the company in its assault on the objective. The Company Commander arrived at Technical Sergeant Mills' position and was immediately wounded, preventing him from taking active control of the situation. In the absence of an officer, Technical Sergeant Mills assumed command of the advance elements and maneuvered his fire power so as to obtain maximum results, personally supervised and assisted in evacuation of wounded and maintained his position until relieved by the executive officer. Home address: Mr. Andrew E. Mills, (father), Route #11, Box 246B, Tacoma, Washington.

Lieutenant Colonel (then Major) GARLYN MUNKRES, (0362097), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Biak Island on 19 June 1944. Major Munkres and six men departed in the forenoon on a reconnaissance. The party worked its way for three hours through a series of coral ridges and depressions covered with dense underbrush. Coming upon a faint trail, they followed it until it joined a well traveled Japanese supply route where they could observe the enemy working around a supply dump. One Japanese started toward the party and it was necessary to kill him. The shots aroused the enemy and Colonel Munkres' route of return was cut off. Since it was impractical to fight a numerically superior force, he led his patrol behind the enemy lines and by-passed their positions. The party spent the night near the enemy position and got an early start for the command post the next day. Upon his return, he and his party were exhausted from lack of food and water, and in need of medical attention for the many coral cuts on legs and hands. Lieutenant Colonel Munkres sketched the route he used and placed two of his companies in advantageous positions along the supply route. In the accomplishment of this mission, he secured information that caused over a hundred of the enemy to be driven from their sheltered positions and annihilated.
