AWARDS OF THE SILVER STAR (POSTHUMOUSLY)

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class FRANK BANASHLEY (38001425), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Damortis, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 24 January 1945. Private Banashley's company was attempting to dislodge the entrenched enemy from a hill by a direct assault but heavy fire from enemy machine guns, rifles and knee-mortars forced our troops to seek more tenable positions. During this movement one of the men was wounded and assumed dead. Unable to investigate due to the enemy heavy fire the troops formed lines and dug in for the night. At dusk a faint cry was heard coming from the direction of the outermost line which created many conjectures as to whether it was the actual cry of the wounded man or a Jap ruse. Private Banashley and four others, certain that it was the cry of the wounded man, voluntarily worked their way and, guided by the sounds, ran and crawled until they reached him. In spite of the continued sniper fire which dominated the area and the perilous situation, the searching party succeeded in bringing the wounded man back to safety before darkness set in. This spirited and gallant action by Private Banashley in behalf of a fallen comrade, at great risk to his own life, was an inspiration to all who saw him and is exemplary of the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Johnson Banashley (father), Whiteriver, Arizona.

Private NICHOLAS C. CORDELL (37090273), Field Artillery, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of San Jacinto, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 10 January 1945. The leading wave of an infantry company was pinned down in an open rice field by well-directed fire from several Jap 75-mm guns. It was necessary to destroy the guns in order to allow the infantry to advance. Private Cordell, a member of a forward observer party, realizing the need of radio communications with fire direction, set up his radio in a forward observation post. Exposing himself without regard for his own safety, he successfully established radio communications. During all this time he worked under extreme pressure and heavy enemy artillery fire directed at the observation post. Several rounds burst along the path which he was pursuing and one round, which burst only ten feet away, killed him. Private Cordell's act of heroism was unquestionably instrumental in the success of the advancing infantry, and the radio communications established by him enabled the officer with him to silence one enemy gun by our artillery fire. Private First Class JOHN K. JUDY (38000615), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy near Damortis, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 17 January 1945. When Private Judy's company neared the crest of the first ridge in attacking enemy hill positions, intense fire forced them to take cover. At this time Private Judy spotted several enemy positions. Of his own volition, and knowing that friendly fire could not cover his moves, Private Judy moved forward up the hill. He succeeded in gaining a position from where

he killed an enemy sniper with his rifle. He then moved farther on and killed another. At this point an enemy knee-mortar shell seriously wounded him which resulted in his death. Private Judy's gallantry and great daring to break up an enemy strong point contributed immensely to the morale of all who saw him and so inspired their efforts that they successfully obtained the commanding ground of the ridge. Private First Class BERTRAND G. KRAUS (16050312), Medical Department, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Damortis, Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 12-24 January 1945. During this period Private Kraus never failed to aid a wounded man and always responded willingly to the call of a medic regardless of the intensity of enemy fire. On one occasion when our attack on the well-entrenched enemy was stopped by heavy fire from the enemy's excellent positions, forcing our troops to move to other positions, several of our men were wounded and one was lying in an exposed area to the enemy. Private Kraus successfully completed administering first aid to three men and then cautiously crawled and worked his way to the lonely man under direct fire. While he was in the act of opening his aid kit a burst of enemy machinegun fire killed him instantly. His complete devotion to duty and his utter disregard for his own life and safety when a soldier needed first aid were great morale factors among the men. The manner in which Private Kraus met his death inspired the men to greater efforts, and his conduct in performing his work was outstanding and in keeping with the highest military traditions. Technical Sergeant CLAUDE VARNELL (38000679), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy near Damortis, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 19 January 1945. The deadly enemy sniper, grenade and mortar fire, coupled with the exhausting heat of the day forced Sergeant Varnell's platoon to alter its position. While the platoon was in the process of moving, Sergeant Varnell, though severely wounded in the arm, remained and bravely directed the movement of his men to safety when he was killed by an enemy mortar shell. Sergeant Varnell's undaunted courage and devotion to duty with no regard for his own welfare or safety were exemplary of the highest military traditions and an inspiration to his comrades. AWARDS OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Private First Class ROBERT F. ANDERSON, (31361347), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Rosario, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 18 January 1945. During a fire fight against a battery of enemy field artillery, Private Anderson, radio operator on duty, was wounded by shrapnel from an artillery shell which exploded in the Battalion Command Post. The explosion also damaged his radio. Private Anderson promptly applied first aid to himself and then proceeded to energetically repair the radio which was vitally needed in the light of the information that communication lines to the rifle companies had been shot out during the fire fight. In repairing the radio, Private Anderson exposed himself to enemy fire and demonstrated great personal courage and devotion to duty. Technician Grade III JAMES M. DETORO, (20129411), Medical Department, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Bigte, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 9 April 1945. In the midst of a battalion engagement against the enemy, Sergeant Detoro made repeated trips by ambulance jeep along the Metropolitan Road to evacuate casualties. The road was constantly under a heavy enemy artillery barrage. Sergeant Detoro, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, demonstrated exemplary courage and coolness under fire in evacuating casualties safely and expeditiously. Lieutenant Colonel WILLIAM H. NAYLOR, (0265997), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Fort Stotsenburg, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 13 March 1945. When two companies were unable to establish liaison with each other ascribable to difficulty of observation, Colonel Naylor, Executive Officer of the Regiment, after viewing both positions from high ground in the vicinity, set out personally to establish the necessary liaison. Fearlessly passing through known enemy territory, accompanied by his body guard, he had advanced about one hundred yards when three Japs hiding in a trench attempted to intercept him. Through quick action and fierce determination the three Japs were instantly killed. He then proceeded with his mission and established the needed liaison which resulted in the companies giving mutual support. Colonel Naylor's courage and conscientious efforts to assist were exemplary and were an inspiration to the men and officers of the organizations. Home address: Mrs. Irene L. Private First Class FRANCIS J. POROWSKI, (20129571), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Fort Stotsenburg, Luzon, Philippine Army on 13 March 1945. On a mission to establish liaison between two companies, Private Porowski accompanied the Regimental Executive Officer over enemy held territory. After proceeding about 100 yards through difficult and enemy infested terrain, three Japs were encountered lying in wait to ambush anyone attempting to pass. One Jap raised up to fire at the Regimental Executive Officer, vigilant Private Porowski promptly killed him. The two additional Japs in the trench were quickly and determinedly killed and the party continued on its way to accomplish its task. The heroic automatic response to danger of Private Porowski, his personal courage and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and to the military service. First Lieutenant CHARLES A. WELDT JR., (01295968), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 14 January 1945. Given the mission of seizing and securing a ridge which was held in force by the enemy from well concealed and fortified positions, Lieutenant Weldt personally led his platoon in a bayonet attack up the side of the ridge. Supported by protective fire which was responsible for a major destruction of the enemy force, the superior leadership displayed by Lieutenant Weldt resulted in the complete annihilation of the enemy force and secured the positions of his battalion. The exemplary courage and devotion to duty of Lieutenant Weldt reflect great credit upon himself and to the military service. AWARDS OF THE SILVER STAR

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Technician Grade V HENRY CLARK (38016719), Medical Department, U. S. Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy near Rabon, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 11-12 January 1945. The enemy was occupying all ridges adjacent to the Regimental Command Post and the aid station which afforded them perfect observation and a commanding field of fire. The Regimental Command Post and aid station were situated on the reverse slope of a ridge next to rice paddy fields when the enemy opened up with an intense artillery barrage. A shell burst in the regimental area killed one man and wounded three. Corporal Clark, a driver, immediately left his foxhole and assisted in carrying a seriously wounded man to the aid station. After first aid was administered he unhesitatingly drove his Jeep to evacuate two seriously wounded men. Driving in absolute darkness across a rough rice paddy field and three miles over a shell pitted road under constant shell fire, he succeeded in evacuating the wounded without further injury to the men or damage to the vehicle. Corporal Clark demonstrated great courage, coolness and a high degree of skill in driving, and at extreme risk of life succeeded in safely evacuating two seriously wounded men. First Lieutenant PAUL COTELLESA (O-452997), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy on the Damertis-Rosario Road, Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 14 January 1945. The infantry assault battalion pushed along the road with the objective of capturing enemy artillery guns that had been shelling our troops, and to furnish cover for a demolition party to blow up enemy ammunition and equipment. Before reaching the objective the assault troops encountered heavy enemy artillery fire from well-entrenched positions, firing point-blank into the faces of our troops, which necessitated our troops to be moved to more tenable positions. Lieutenant Cotellessa was in command of the company in the movement action during which time he displayed outstanding devotion to duty and great courage. Enemy artillery followed the moving troops and inflicted heavy casualties, but Lieutenant Cotellessa remained supervising and personally assisting in the evacuation of the last wounded man. With utter disregard for his own personal safety, he personally helped to carry out several wounded men after the last friendly troops had cleared the area. Lieutenant Cotellessa's action resulted in clearing all the wounded from enemy territory and was an inspiration to the men working with him. Sergeant RALPH DUDE (38000396), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Rabon, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 11 January 1945. Enemy infantry and artillery observers were entrenched on a high ridge to the front of our lines. Our troops started to dig in for the night when suddenly a heavy concentration of enemy artillery opened up on them and caused many casualties. The men were immediately ordered to

move to the reverse slope of the hill but two severely wounded men were unable to do so. Sergeant Dude voluntarily returned under the heavy fire and, supporting each man under each arm, succeeded in leading the two men back to safety. While dressing the wounds of the men he sent one man for litters but due to the intensity of the fire only one litter party arrived. Sergeant Dude, seeing that no further help would arrive before darkness immediately improvised a litter and with the aid of two men carried the other wounded man over steep ridges and deep ravines approximately fifteen hundred yards to an aid station. Sergeant Dude's voluntary action in the face of heavy and accurate enemy fire, without regard for his own life, aided in no small measure to saving the lives of the two wounded men. Private First Class JOE DUTCHOVER (38010729), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Damortis, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 20 January 1945. Blue Ridge was high, steep, without covered approaches and commanded the surrounding terrain for a distance of five hundred yards. The enemy was entrenched on this ridge with strongly-fortified positions. All our attempts to take the ridge were foiled mainly due to enemy machinegun, rifle and grenade fire. With determined efforts Private Dutchover's company succeeded in knocking out four of five strongest positions, but the remaining one still held up the company's advance. Private Dutchover and five other men were assigned the task of destroying this position but in the attempt all were wounded except Private Dutchover. Alone, and with firm determination, Private Dutchover crawled to within several feet of the position and threw four grenades into it, then rushed forward and sprayed it with his Tommy gun, killing all the occupants. Though he himself was wounded by a grenade in this encounter, the heroic action of Private Dutchover in the face of withering fire eliminated the last enemy position and enabled his company to advance. Neutralization of this position undoubtedly saved many casualties and this gallant action, without regard for his own life by Private Dutchover is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Staff Sergeant GUADALUPE L. LOPEZ (38001020), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action in the Damortis-Rosario area, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 14 January 1945. The infantry assault troops pushed along the road with the objective of capturing enemy artillery guns that had been shelling our troops, and to furnish cover for a demolition party to blow up enemy ammunition. Before reaching the objective the assault troops encountered heavy enemy artillery fire from well-entrenched positions, firing point-blank into the faces of our troops, forcing our men to seek more tenable positions. Sergeant Lopez remained in the rear guard during the movement and helped carry out the wounded. Voluntarily he returned and assisted in carrying out the remainder of the men while under intense enemy fire until all wounded were evacuated. The fearless actions of Sergeant Lopez undoubtedly resulted in saving some of the men's lives and his gallant conduct was an inspiration to the men working with him. Home address: Mr. Ignacio S. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class RICHARD C. VINCENT (39525405), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the Danortis-Rosario area, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 14 January 1945. The infantry assault troops pushed along the road with the objective of capturing enemy artillery guns that had been shelling our troops, and to furnish cover for a demolition party to blow up enemy ammunition and equipment. Before reaching the objective the assault troops encountered heavy enemy artillery fire from well-entrenched positions, firing point-blank into the faces of our troops, forcing them to seek more tenable positions. Private Vincent remained in the rear guard during the movement and helped carry out the wounded. Voluntarily he returned and assisted in carrying out the remainder of the wounded while under intense enemy fire until all wounded were evacuated. Again he returned to take away a radio to prevent it from falling into enemy hands. The fearless actions of Private Vincent undoubtedly resulted in saving many of the men's lives and his gallant conduct was an inspiration to the men working with him. Private Vincent was killed three days later in gallantly performing his duties in an attack on Hill 500. Next of kin: Mr. Virgil Lee Vincent (father), Meridian, Idaho.

Private First Class THOMAS WHALEY (20455369), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy near Amlang, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 25 January 1945. Private Whaley's squad was situated with an infantry company on the forward slope of a hill facing the objective when, after a jump-off, the troops were pinned down by heavy Jap machinegun, mortar and rifle fire. An immediate attempt was made to move the troops to safer positions and all available covering fire was needed against the enemy. Private Whaley continually delivered effective fire from his machinegun and when his squad was later ordered to move, he remained with his gun until all troops were moved with a minimum of casualties. His action was taken entirely upon his own initiative and without regard for his own safety. Private Whaley not only contributed to the successful movement of the troops but also inflicted many casualties on the enemy and aided in a large measure to the successful completion of the battalion's mission in a subsequent attack. On the very spot Sergeant Luthenauer assisted in dressing the wound and administering blood plasma to the wounded man. Sergeant DEAN W. INGRAM, (6928784), Chemical Warfare Service, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during period 9 January 1945 to 20 January 1945. Sergeant Ingram, while assisting in a reconnaissance mission in the vicinity of Hill #565 came under enemy artillery and small arms fire. Notwithstanding the terrific intensity of the enemy action and the seemingly impossibility of continuing with the reconnaissance, Sergeant Ingram, with firm determination and exemplary courage kept onward until his mission was accomplished. Sergeant Ingram's actions and devotion to duty reflect outstanding credit to himself and to the military service. Home address: Mr. Dan. Chaplain JOHN J. FLYNN, (Captain), (0497584), Corps of Chaplains, United States Army. During an enemy shelling of the Artillery Command Post at about 0330, the second round made a direct hit on the far wall of the remains of a church building, the Command Post site, causing damage and casualties. Simultaneously, a very large number of huge blocks of stones were knocked off the wall on the outside falling upon a nearby tent and its occupants. One Chaplain in the tent was instantly killed. When another occupant succeeded in extricating himself from the debris and ran outside to obtain help for his associates, Chaplain Flynn, another occupant, stayed there and at once set about frantically pulling away debris and stones to uncover the buried Chaplain in the hope that he still lived. Chaplain Flynn continued in spite of further shelling and the danger to his personal safety until assistance arrived. First Lieutenant MACDONALD LOWE, (01184101), Field Artillery, United States Army. When the first enemy artillery shell landed in the area selected for an air-strip, a large fragment hit an Enlisted Man in the leg right at the knee, all but amputating it. Lt. Lowe, who was nearby, rushed over to the man and applied a tourniquet while another pilot brought morphine from his kit which was promptly administered. Lieutenant Lowe assisted in the removal of the wounded man into a fox hole and remained with him throughout the night amid the spasmodic enemy shelling to comfort him and tend to the tourniquet. There is no doubt that Lieutenant Lowe's prompt action, exemplary courage and fidelity saved the life of a soldier. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Private First Class CARLOS T. MORRIS (38000654), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Damortis, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 24 January 1945. The enemy was well emplaced in the high ground to the front of Private Morris' company and delivered heavy fire on the troops causing many casualties. Private Morris, of his own volition and with utter disregard for his own safety, crawled a distance of twenty-five yards to a fallen comrade, under direct enemy fire. Captain RICHARD T. REHM (O-411275), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Damertis, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 25 January 1945. In this area the terrain was extremely rough, comprising of sharp gullies and high ridge lines running parallel to the coastline. The enemy was well entrenched in these natural obstacles being afforded excellent observation facilities and commanded all approaches. Captain Rehm advanced with his company toward the ridges when suddenly an enemy machine gun opened fire from a concealed position wounding three men. Two men were helpless and bleeding profusely while the remainder of the company sought cover. Captain Rehm, realizing the plight of the wounded men, without regard for his own safety, dashed forward to the wounded men and succeeded in stopping their excessive bleeding thereby eliminating the danger of their bleeding to death. He remained with them in the exposed area and supervised their evacuation when litter bearers arrived. The action of Captain Rehm in the face of heavy odds undoubtedly saved the lives of two men and served to bolster the spirits and determination of his men to greater success in subsequent operations. Private First Class WILLIAM G. RESCHKE JR. (37528269), Infantry, United States Army. At dusk a faint cry was heard coming from the direction of the outermost line which created many conjectures as to whether it was the actual cry of the wounded man or a Jap ruse. Private Reschke and four others, certain that it was the cry of the wounded man, voluntarily worked their way and, guided by the sounds, ran and crawled until they reached him. Despite the continued sniper fire which dominated the area and the perilous situation, the searching party succeeded in bringing the wounded man back to safety before darkness set in. This spirited and gallant action by Private Reschke in behalf of a fallen comrade, at great risk to his own life, was an inspiration to all who saw him and is exemplary of the highest traditions of the military service. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Second Lieutenant JOHN M. FEENEY (O-2007273) (then Technical Sergeant), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy from 9 January 1945 to 20 January 1945, in the Lingayen Gulf and Rosario sectors, Luzon, Philippine Islands. Lieutenant Feeney acted in the capacity of Assistant S-3 in the battalion direction center, a position normally filled by a captain, working tirelessly through periods of enemy artillery fire and night infiltration attacks and assisting in the coordination of fires of our own artillery batteries against the enemy. On a later date in the Rosario sector as a relief forward observer with the infantry, Lieutenant Feeney again assumed the duties of an officer and directed supporting fires for the infantry in spite of heavy sniper, mortar and enemy artillery fire around his observation posts. Lieutenant Feeney's superior performance of duty and his steady courage under enemy fire were an inspiration to the men under him and contributed materially to the success of the operation. Staff Sergeant HERBERT M. HEEBER (31042922), Field Artillery, United States Army. Sergeant Heeber, a wire sergeant, with complete disregard for his personal safety, voluntarily led a group of men from his section through intense artillery and small arms fire to a forward observation post which had been isolated by the enemy and all means of communication cut. Lieutenant Lewis volunteered to serve as an artillery forward observer with an infantry assault company, thereby relieving the regular officer observer. When the infantry was held up by three enemy artillery guns firing at close range, Lieutenant Lewis crawled to an exposed position on a hill under heavy enemy small arms fire, located the enemy guns and, by adjusting our artillery fire on them, caused their complete destruction, thus enabling the infantry to continue their advance. By his act, Lieutenant Lewis demonstrated fearlessness, great courage and a firm determination to maintain the speedy and successful progress of the operation. Captain DEMER F. PARKER (O-355654), Medical Corps, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in New Georgia, Solomon Islands from 1 July 1943 to 5 October 1943, and at Luzon, Philippine Islands from 9 January 1945 to 15 February 1945. While under an enemy bombing attack, Captain Parker, with no other instruments than a carpenter's saw, and with complete disregard for his own safety, successfully performed an amputation on a Navy officer whose leg was shattered by a bomb. On another occasion during the Luzon operation an American pilot parachuted to earth from a burning plane and landed in unfriendly territory infested with snipers and raiding parties, and sustained a compound fracture of the leg. Captain Parker, again without regard for his personal safety, led a searching party over virtually impassable terrain and found the injured pilot who was suffering from shock and the loss of blood. Captain Parker immediately administered blood plasma, set the pilot's leg and supervised in his evacuation. Captain Parker's unwavering courage and a high sense of duty were directly responsible for saving the life of the pilot, and his knowledge of surgery, his constant study of tropical diseases have been responsible for the low sick rate of the troops with him. AWARDS OF THE SILVER STAR

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant FRANK E. SARNS (O-2035378), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy on the Damortis-Rosario Road, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 14 January 1945. The infantry assault battalion pushed along the road with the objective of capturing enemy artillery guns that had been shelling our troops, and to furnish cover for a demolition party to blow up enemy ammunition and equipment. Before reaching the objective the assault troops encountered heavy enemy artillery fire from well-entrenched positions, firing point blank into the faces of our troops, causing them to move to more tenable positions. Lieutenant Sarns was the rear guard commander during the movement, remained supervising and personally assisting in the evacuation of the wounded to the last man. The outstanding leadership and fearless actions of Lieutenant Sarns undoubtedly resulted in saving many lives and his gallant conduct was an inspiration to the men working with him. Private First Class DENVER D. SHEDDY (18053403), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the Damortis-Rosario area, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 24 January 1945. Private Sheddy's company was attempting to dislodge the entrenched enemy from a hill by a direct assault but heavy fire from enemy machine guns, rifles and .81mm-mortars forced our troops to seek more tenable positions. During this movement one of the men was wounded and assumed dead. Unable to investigate due to the enemy heavy fire the troops formed lines and dug in for the night. At dusk a faint cry was heard coming from the direction of the outermost line which created many conjectures as to whether it was the actual cry of the wounded man or a Jap ruse. Private Sheddy and four others, certain that it was the cry of the wounded man, voluntarily worked their way and, guided by the sounds, ran and crawled until they reached him. In spite of the continued sniper fire which dominated the area and the perilous situation, the searching party succeeded in bringing the wounded man back to safety before darkness set in. This spirited and gallant action by Private Sheddy in behalf of a fallen comrade, at great risk to his own life, was an inspiration to all who saw him and is exemplary of the highest traditions of the military service. Sergeant WALTER O. SHULTS (38005328), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy between Bani and Damortis, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 19 January 1945. The approaches to the ridges were extremely rough consisting of small sharp ridges and ravines and the enemy was able to observe all movements below. One of our squads succeeded in reaching the crest of the ridge when the enemy stopped their advance with

deadly machinegun, rifle and grenade fire. Sergeant Shults, assistant squad leader, upon being ordered to move his men to safer positions, supervised the movement and volunteered to remain and deliver covering fire. Paying no heed to the intense fire directed at him from two sides, he returned fire with his rifle and threw grenades killing at least two Japs. There is no question that Sergeant Shults drew most of the enemy fire which allowed the troops to escape with light casualties, and his gallantry in this action and voluntary devotion to duty reflect the highest standards of military service. Private First Class ROBERT S. SKELTON (33434557), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in the Damortis-Rosario area, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 24 January 1945. Private Skelton's company was attempting to dislodge the entrenched enemy from a hill by a direct assault but heavy fire from enemy machine guns, rifles and knee-mortars forced our troops to seek more tenable positions. During this movement one of the men was wounded and assumed dead. Unable to investigate due to the enemy heavy fire the troops formed lines and dug in for the night. At dusk a faint cry was heard coming from the direction of the outermost line which created many conjectures as to whether it was the actual cry of the wounded man or a Jap ruse. Private Skelton and four others, certain that it was the cry of the wounded man, voluntarily worked their way and, guided by the sounds, ran and crawled until they reached him. In spite of the continued sniper fire which dominated the area and the perilous situation, the searching party succeeded in bringing the wounded man back to safety before darkness set in. The enemy was well prepared to defend this area from nearby hills and placed heavy artillery fire on our troops, causing many casualties. Despite the continued enemy fire, Sergeant Voreb and two other men left their slit trenches and crawled fifty yards to assist a seriously wounded comrade who was in critical condition due to the loss of a great deal of blood. On the very spot Sergeant Voreb assisted in dressing the wound and administering blood plasma to the wounded man. Sergeant Voreb's disregard for his own safety in attempting to save the life of a seriously wounded man is exemplary of the highest standards of the military service. In company of other volunteers, Lieutenant Huber made his way to the foremost position in the line atop a razor-back ridge and assisted in the successful evacuation of many seriously wounded soldiers. The area in which the casualties were lying was under artillery and small arms fire and could be reached only over treacherous and unfamiliar trails. His expert supervision and assistance in this action undoubtedly saved the lives of several soldiers and contributed much to morale of the troops. 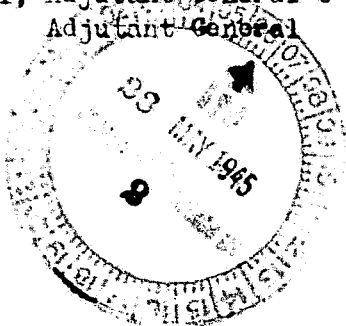

SECTION I

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted man:

Private First Class NORMAN J. FLORI (39135803), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy at Aitape, New Guinea, on 17 September 1944. Private Flori was advancing with a patrol up the beach toward Suain Plantation when a Jap light machinegun opened up on them. The Japs, three in number, were under cover and well dug in while the patrol was exposed in the open and were forced to hit the ground. Private Flori, the first scout, being nearest to the Jap position waited until the Jap machinegun stopped firing. When it did he leaped to his feet and fired several rounds from his rifle into the Jap position, then dropped to the ground when the machinegun opened up again. From a prone position Private Flori threw a grenade into the position and, immediately after it exploded, rushed forward without regard for his safety and killed two Japs who were dazed but ready to defend themselves. He then captured the Jap machinegun as the third Jap fled into the jungle. By his aggressive and heroic action, Private Flori undoubtedly saved his platoon from many casualties, and set an example of courage that instilled in the rest of the platoon the will to press forward and close with the enemy. Captain WILLIAM C. FISHER (O-466280), Medical Corps, United States Army. Captain Fisher, Battalion Surgeon, with the aid of another man, left the cover and protection of the aid station dug-out in order to administer emergency first aid to the wounded and further assisted in removing them under cover for further treatment. Though himself wounded in the knee by an artillery fragment, Captain Fisher refused to be given medical treatment until all the wounded had been taken care of. Due to Captain Fisher's outstanding courage under enemy artillery fire in performing a heroic act above and beyond the call of duty, the lives of several severely wounded men were saved. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

Captain CHARLES B. DANNER (O-398166), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Bigte Pass, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 7 April 1945. Captain Danner, in command of an infantry company, was given the mission of spearheading an advance on a drive to seize important high ground overlooking the Eigte Pass. Through his excellent planning and reconnaissance, he enabled the entire battalion to penetrate the enemy's forward positions under cover of darkness. After repeated attempts to scale the enemy-held cliffs, Captain Danner succeeded in leading the badly fatigued troops to secure an important hill. The enemy, supported by artillery, attacked his positions three times with a fanatic determination, but Captain Danner's personal leadership in restoring his portion of the perimeter enabled the entire battalion to hold its gains. The leadership, initiative and devotion to duty displayed by Captain Danner were an inspiration to all the officers and men in the battalion, and were to a large extent responsible for the successful completion of the mission. Sergeant WILLIAM H. HOPPS (39575314), Infantry, United States Army. From these positions the enemy was able to pin down the infantry with grenades, rifles and machine guns. Sergeant Hopps, without orders, volunteered with five others to rout the enemy from these positions. The party reached the enemy positions, killed eight Japs and captured two light machine guns. Due to the brave and voluntary action of Sergeant Hopps and the other five men, the infantry battalion was able to successfully reorganize its perimeter and evacuate the wounded. Private First Class KRIS S. JOHNSON (39209351), Infantry, United States Army. From these positions the enemy was able to pin down the infantry with grenades, rifles and machine guns. Private Johnson, without orders, volunteered with five others to rout the enemy from these positions. The party reached the enemy positions, killed eight Japs and captured two light machine guns. Due to the brave and voluntary action of Private Johnson

Sergeant LYNN L. LARSON (37447406)(then Private First Class), Infantry, United States Army. A superior enemy force attacked Sergeant Larson's company during which time a knee-mortar shell knocked out a machine gun manned by Sergeant Larson. His machine gun being of no further use, Sergeant Larson perilously exposed himself to heavy enemy fire throughout the attack and assisted in keeping the one remaining machine gun supplied with ammunition. The destruction of the enemy force was to a large extent due to Sergeant Larson's bravery, courage and keen devotion to duty. Home address: Mrs. Marion K. Corporal ADELBERT S. LOTT (39912705), Infantry, United States Army. Again Corporal Lott returned with a medical man to recover another wounded man during which time he himself was wounded in the neck by a sniper's bullet. Disregarding his wound he suggested a plan of advance back to the motor pool to recover the remaining dead and wounded, and personally assisted in their evacuation. In this performance Corporal Lott's coolness of mind and intrepidity were a great inspiration to all members of the mission. By placing the lives of his wounded comrade above his own, Sergeant Lott's gallant action and devotion above and beyond the call of duty are exemplary of the highest standards of the military service. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officer and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant JOHN J. ADKINS (O-1167296), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands, from 11 January 1945 to 31 January 1945. Although assigned and serving with distinction through two previous operations as Senior Liaison Pilot of the battalion, Lieutenant Adkins accepted and performed in an outstanding manner an emergency assignment as field artillery liaison officer with an infantry battalion because of the shortage of officers. Under exceptionally hazardous and arduous actions of the infantry battalion, and while acting in this assignment usually performed by a field artillery officer of higher rank, Lieutenant Adkins was instrumental in observing and coordinating field artillery support so effectively that he was in a large measure responsible for the close and effective support of the infantry by his artillery unit. Throughout the actions he was in the forefront of combat, supervising his observer parties with a high degree of skill and efficiency. Upon relief of this assignment, Lieutenant Adkins immediately resumed his mission as Air Liaison Pilot and continued to execute fire and reconnaissance missions, flying at low altitudes over enemy lines and exposing himself to enemy ground fire. Lieutenant Adkins' conduct both as a ground and air liaison officer was of a character to inspire his associates and furnished an outstanding example of courage and fortitude to his men. Home address: Mr. B.E. Adkins (father), Norfolk, Nebraska.

Private First Class CARL R. BLANCHARD (38195146), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Noemfoor Islands from 2 July 1944 to 20 August 1944, and at Luzon, Philippine Islands from 11 January 1945 to 27 January 1945. During these periods Private Blanchard acted as battery recorder, an assignment which often required duty throughout the day and night. On numerous occasions he successfully conducted fire missions in the inevitable absence of the battery executive. In one particular instance when our position was attacked by an enemy raiding party, Private Blanchard, though seriously wounded in both arms and legs, in great pain and unable to move, refused medical attention and directed aid men to other wounded comrades some distance away. Private Blanchard's cheerfulness, competence and tireless devotion to duty contributed largely to the rapid and accurate delivery of fire on enemy positions. Technician Grade IV THOMAS H. COOK JR. (34506230), (then Technician Grade V), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Rabon, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 16 January 1945. Sergeant Cook assumed the duties normally requiring two trained personnel, when a member of the section was evacuated on the first day of the operation, and performed them in an out-

standing manner. In spite of the strenuous and tiring duties during daylight and nightly guard duty, Sergeant Cook maintained a spirit of cheerfulness, competence and tireless devotion to duty that reflected itself on the high morale of the section. On one occasion when the battalion position was being subjected to intense and accurate artillery fire, he voluntarily left the safety of his dugout and crawled into an exposed position on a ridge beyond the perimeter to obtain instrument readings on the flash of enemy guns, entirely disregarding his own safety while heavy shells were falling in and around the area. Staff Sergeant CARL P. HINKLEMAN (39380212), Field Artillery, United States Army. On one occasion when the infantry company was under strength, Private Holian manned a post on the OPLR as a rifleman for seven consecutive nights. In another instance he continued to lay telephone wire in the midst of an enemy mortar barrage with shells falling within fifty yards of him. Private Holian's cheerful attitude, loyalty, courage and devotion to duty are exemplary of the highest traditions of the military service. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Private PETER HMI APITO (32910395), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Rabon, Damortis, Rosario, Luzon, Philippine Islands from 19 January 1945 to 7 February 1945. As a member of an artillery forward observer party attached to an infantry regiment during the attack on Hill 600, Private Apito exposed himself to enemy sniper fire. With complete disregard for his own safety he remained with his duty which enabled the artillery barrage totaling approximately eleven hundred rounds in support of the infantry company to bring successful results in the capture of the hill. At all times during the fighting in this area Private Apito displayed a spirit of willingness, loyalty, and courage in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Technician Grade V EDWARD R. BUYS (39920985), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Rabon, Damortis, Rosario, Luzon, Philippine Islands from 11 January 1945 to 7 February 1945. Corporal Buys, as a member of an artillery forward observer party attached to an infantry regiment during an attack on enemy positions, on three different occasions, exhibited courage and bravery in an exceptional manner. He set up and operated a radio on open ground while under attack from the enemy. On these occasions other men in his vicinity were driven to cover by enemy mortar, artillery and rifle fire. The cool and efficient way in which Corporal Buys remained with his duty enabled artillery fire mission to be thoroughly completed. Sergeant CLINTON C. O'NEIL (34208484), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands, during the period of 11 January 1945 to 23 January 1945, and 26 January 1945 to 29 January 1945. The enemy was well-emplaced in the high ridge lines with well-camouflaged caves and fox-holes which afforded them excellent observation as well as gun positions. Throughout those periods, enemy fire from small arms, machine guns, mortars and artillery was constant. Sergeant O'Neil supervised the radio and wire communications which were continuous between the supporting artillery and the most forward elements of the infantry. He frequently volunteered to take a position on the perimeter defense during night although tired from working all day long on wire lines. Sergeant O'Neil's continued attention to small details of wire and radio communications, his performance of duty under fire, his diligence and resourcefulness, contributed much to the success of the artillery support of the infantry. The enemy was well-emplaced in the high ridge lines with well-camouflaged caves and foxholes which afforded them excellent observation as well as gun positions. Throughout these periods, enemy fire from small arms, machine guns, mortars and artillery was constant. As radio operator, Private Parker not only did more than his share of moving equipment forward but also volunteered to go out and repair wire lines. Frequently he volunteered to take a position on the perimeter defense although tired from working all day long. On many occasions he performed his duty with utter disregard for his own safety, and in one instance set up a radio station on a hill outside the perimeter to make assurance of radio communications. Private Parker's services were marked by fidelity and outstanding rendition as to clearly distinguish him above enlisted men of like grade and experience. Home address: Mrs. Nan V. Master Sergeant NORMAN W. SAUKERSON (20747857), Field Artillery, United States Army. Sergeant Saukerson performed his duties as battalion operations sergeant in an outstanding manner and demonstrated leadership and devotion to duty which were an inspiration to all who served with him. By his diligent supervision of the fire direction personnel under him, and by his superior knowledge of fire direction technique, Sergeant Saukerson contributed substantially to the speedy and accurate firing data which resulted in accurate fire being placed on enemy installations at all times. During many night and day missions, many of which were harassing, counter-battery, and close support missions, Sergeant Saukerson coolly supervised these fire missions unhesitatingly even while under fire from heavy enemy field guns. Technician Grade V JOHN M. STIANCHE (33168327), Field Artillery, United States Army. The enemy was emplaced in high ridges, in caves and foxholes which were well-camouflaged, and throughout these periods delivered constant fire from small arms, machine guns, mortars, and artillery. He performed his duties diligently and frequently took a position in the perimeter defense. Without regard for his own safety he aided in setting up an observation post in the outermost line and remained on guard for two successive nights. Corporal Stianche's services were rendered with outstanding fidelity and resourcefulness so that he clearly stood out above men of like grade and experience. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Private First Class REUBEN W. ANDERSON (37552929), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy near Rosario, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 25 January 1945. Private Anderson, one of two Leading Scouts of an Infantry Company, went out with a patrol to seize an important position, the occupation of which would serve as a point of excellent observation on enemy supply lines and heavy gun positions. Private Anderson's outstanding record of patrolling and observing is marked by his immediate participation in fording streams, swamps, and cutting his way through thick, knife-like tall grass in order to efficiently and effectively seek out a route of approach to the objective. Through Private Anderson's untiring efforts and amazing skill, his Company was enabled to apply the element of surprise on the Japs and drive them from the objective with a minimum of casualties to our forces. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Staff Sergeant JAMES F. CAREW JR., (20202698), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy at Hill 355, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 14 January 1945. While attacking Hill #355, against determined, stubborn enemy resistance, Sergeant Carew fearlessly led his squad through intense enemy machine gun, mortar and sniper fire for a distance of approximately two hundred yards. Sergeant Carew, without regard for his personal safety, boldly crawled forward and attacked an enemy machine gun with grenades and rifle fire. He succeeded in silencing this gun which had been pouring frontal fire on our attacking platoon. Sergeant Carew steadfastly remained at the enemy position and maintained rifle fire on a supporting enemy machine gun until ordered to withdraw. 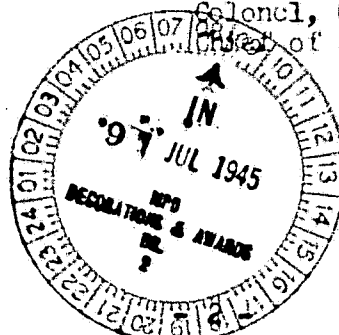

Private ROY P. HALEY, (36986762), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Baloc, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 13 May 1945. Private Haley, manning a machine gun position on the forward slope of a hill, was caught in a fierce enemy counter-attack, made under cover of darkness and concealment of high grass from the base and side of a hill. The enemy came within five feet of Private Haley's fox hole throwing hand grenades into the hole and forcing him to leap out. As he leaped from the hole, he was wounded by enemy shrapnel, but with disregard for his wounds opened fire and succeeded in killing fifteen Japs. 

Under the provisions of Section IV Circular No. 333, War Department, 1943, the 103d Regimental Combat Team, is cited for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy on Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 7 May 1945 to 17 May 1945.

During this period, the 103d Regimental Combat Team, consisting of the 103d Infantry Regiment, 152d Field Artillery Battalion, Company "A", 118th Engineer Battalion, Company "A", 118th Medical Battalion, Second Platoon of Company "A" 82d (4.2) Chemical Mortar Battalion, and the First Portable Surgical Hospital, in a wide envelopment of the Shushin Fortress with the important Ipo Dam as its objective, struck hard, swiftly, and fearlessly to fight its way to a singular victory and crush a superior force of well dug in, well armed and well supplied Japanese.

The entire operation was accomplished in a superior manner because it was carefully planned and skillfully executed. Troops moved rapidly at night to secure high ground, covered long distances under extreme conditions of heavy fighting, heat, mud, rain and fatigue, enveloped a force of approximately 4500 Japs, killed over 1000 of them, and captured its objective intact--all in the short period of ten days while suffering less than fifty killed and wounded. The coordination, simplicity, and smoothness of operation between and within all components of the Regimental Combat Team were as nearly perfect as warfare ever permits. The absolute determination of every officer and man of the 103d Regimental Combat Team in overcoming extreme natural, physical, and enemy obstacles was heroic, and caused this short campaign to be one of the outstanding actions in the entire Philippine campaign.

Technician Grade IV CHRISTY S. GUGLIUZZA (32730647), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands from 10 January 1945 to 30 January, 1945. Sergeant Gugliuzza, a radio operator for his Battalion Commander, excelled in the performance of his duty during this entire period. No matter what acute situation the forward command group encountered, Sergeant Gugliuzza kept his radio communications in operation. He also excelled in his alertness by keeping his Battalion Commander informed of all radio messages accurately. On many occasions at great risk of his life, he continued operating his radio through enemy artillery, mortar and intense machine-gun fire without flinching in order to maintain the vitally important communications. Due to Sergeant Gugliuzza's incessant efforts, his cool and collected nature under fire and his splendid performance of duty, his Battalion Commander was enabled to control his units in operation during the entire campaign. Private First Class EARL C. HUBER (37570709), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Ipo Dam, Luzon, Philippine Islands from 7 May 1945 to 18 May 1945. During this period Private Huber led a squad in the absence of the assigned Squad Leader. He attained a brilliant record of not losing a single man from his squad. One day he was leading his squad in an area which was a part of the Regimental objective, deep in enemy territory, and encountered a number of Japs concealed in a pillbox. Private Huber immediately maneuvered his men with such tactical skill that they were able to destroy the pillbox and its occupants with hand grenades and rifle fire. The enemy counted were five killed and one wounded taken prisoner. Private Huber displayed amazing courage, excellent initiative and great skill in leading men during this period which set him aside as an exceptional soldier. When the enemy delivered light and heavy machinogun fire on Private Celani and the members of his company, Private Celani displayed unusual initiative. He rose from his slit trench even while machinogun bullets kicked up dust at his feet, and took it upon himself to pass from one slit trench to another encouraging his comrades to remain on the alert in their positions. By this display of exceptional courage in the face of deadly enemy fire at great risk to his life, Private Celani definitely helped preserve good discipline among all troops in his company and earned himself their admiration. In the vicinity of Bosoboso, friendly patrols discovered an enemy motor park. Immediately, Lieutenant Murray, Transportation Officer, was given the mission of securing all vehicles and returning them to the Regimental S-4. With a security guard of approximately 15 men including mechanics and drivers, Lieutenant Murray went forward to the motor park to supervise the removal of the enemy vehicles which numbered approximately twenty-five. SECTION I

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918 (Bulletin 43, WD, 1918), a Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named enlisted men:

Private First Class MICHAEL MORGOL, (6713387), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy at Hill 860, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 15 May 1945. When the Company of which Private Morgol was a member was assaulting Hill #860, it met with heavy enemy resistance. While under hostile machine gun, sniper, and artillery fire from the flanks and the rear, Private Morgol, with indomitable fighting spirit and grim determination, assaulted several enemy positions and was able to put out of action an enemy 20 mm dual purpose gun. When the enemy made a desperate attempt to retake the 20 mm gun, Private Morgol continued to place effective fire on the Japs. During this action, Private Morgol received a wound which resulted in his death. Private Morgol's great personal courage, tenacity, and outstanding devotion to duty were an inspiration to the men about him and are in accord with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Next of kin: Mrs. Julia Morgol, (mother), 75 East 3 Street, New York, New York.

Staff Sergeant JOHN S. JUSTUS, (36339260), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 24 January 1945. When the left flank of the line against enemy positions on Hill 355 was pinned down by heavy enemy fire, Sergeant Justus, Squad Leader, with utter disregard for his own safety exposed himself to enemy fire in order to point out enemy positions to the supporting tank. Radio communications with the tanks were disrupted and the tanks were in such a position that they could not observe the source of enemy fire. While talking to the tank crew, Sergeant Justus was killed by an enemy mortar shell. Sergeant Justus' valor was responsible for the liquidation of the enemy positions by the tanks. Sergeant Justus' great personal courage, grim determination and outstanding devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Next of kin: Mrs. Sophie Justus, (mother), 207-29th Avenue, Bellwood, Illinois.

objective, the vehicle on which Sergeant Drake was riding was ambushed and brought under heavy enemy rifle and automatic weapons fire. The intensity of the fire necessitated the stopping of the truck. The troops quickly dismounted and deployed. In the confusion, the machine guns and mortars of the platoon were left aboard the truck. As the platoon had dire need for the weapons, Sergeant Drake, without regard for his own safety, braved the hail of enemy fire, jumped on the truck and tossed off the weapons which were promptly put in effective action against the enemy resulting in the complete destruction of the hostile force. Sergeant Drake's exemplary courage, quick thinking and valiant action were an inspiration to the men about him. Technician Grade V MICHAEL L. LAJOIE, (20143260), Cavalry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 9 January. During the landing operations on Lingayen Gulf, Corporal Lajoie, driving an Armored Car aboard an L.S.M. observed that a halftrack vehicle was stalled, blocking the ramp of the landing craft thus preventing other vehicles from disembarking. While under extremely heavy enemy artillery fire and in crowded driving conditions, Corporal Lajoie, without hesitation maneuvered his car and pushed the heavy halftrack onto the beach. Then when an enemy shell hit the rear of his car, forcing the rest of the crew to quickly dismount, Corporal Lajoie remained with the vehicle, maneuvering it out of the way of the ramp thus clearing the way for other cars. Corporal Lajoie's coolness under fire and courageous action enabled other vehicles aboard ship to disembark and get out of range of the enemy artillery fire and undoubtedly saved many lives. Private First Class ROBERT . ROTH, (36804193), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 12 May 1945. Private Roth, moving with a patrol to a forward position through a stream bed bordered by thick brush encountered fire from an enemy ambush. The patrol dispersed quickly and in scrambling over the stream bank toward a knoll, a machine gun was dropped. Without regard for his own life, Private Roth ran back, picked up the gun and set it up on the forward slope of the knoll firing at the enemy until the rest of the group were able to get through to the other side of the hill. Only when all were safely out, and the enemy fire had diminished due to his steady and effective fire, did Private Roth cease firing and rejoin his group with the gun. Private Roth's outstanding courage, expert manipulation of fire and fidelity undoubtedly was responsible for the safety and escape of many of his comrades. 

AWARDS OF THE BRONZE STAR

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 5, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

First Lieutenant JACK (NMN) BUCHANAN, (O-464378), Ordnance, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 9 January to 27 May 1945. Lieutenant Buchanan, in charge of an Ordnance Detachment, landed at Luzon with the assault waves. Immediately after landing, he and his detachment commenced to recover tracked and wheeled vehicles which had drowned out in deep water. In the face of enemy artillery and mortar fire, Lieutenant Buchanan effected minor repairs of disabled vehicles and supervised the recovery and de-water proofing of vehicles which were desperately needed at that time. By maintaining close control over salvage and evacuation operations, he lessened the number of vehicles deadlined and the number of days necessary to repair others. Despite continual enemy fire, poor roads, and terrain obstacles, he kept in close contact with salvage and repair operations and effected punctual repairs necessary to keep our mobile equipment in operating condition. Lieutenant Buchanan's ingenuity and above superior performance of duty reflect great credit to himself and to the military service. First Lieutenant WILLIAM W. BURTON, (O-1312513), Infantry, United States Army. Lieutenant Burton, a Mortar Platoon Leader, was assigned the mission of firing a concentration on enemy positions, using heavy shell fuse delay. He reconnoitered for a position forward of the Battalion's front line and finally found one which provided a slight defilade, but which was insufficient to conceal smoke caused by firing. Enemy artillery was registered in the vicinity of Lieutenant Burton's position, making it imperative that he fire his concentration as quickly as possible. By wrapping his mortar tubes with sandbags and soaking them with water while firing, he was able to fire 425 rounds at the enemy before counter-battery fire forced him to abandon his position. Again on 12 May, Lieutenant Burton was given the mission of firing 500 rounds of 81mm heavy shells at the same target. By piling filled sandbags around the mortar tubes and using five powder increments instead of four, which is the maximum amount which can be used for accuracy with this type of shell, he was able to accomplish his mission before the enemy could zero in on his position. AWARDS OF THE BRONZE STAR

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Private First Class CLAUDE N. AGEE (39698046), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 1 March 1945 to 15 May 1945. As Acting First Scout during this period, Private Agee assisted and personally led patrols on many hazardous missions. On one occasion, when the Chinou Line was broken, he was instrumental in successfully patrolling the entire area of the line. On another occasion he went out with a patrol with the mission of retrieving three bodies of friendly troops. As a result of his intelligent scouting and skilful maneuvering, the mission was accomplished with no casualties incurred on the members of the patrol. During the Ipo Dam operation, Private Agee assumed command of a squad and led it in a most satisfactory manner until he fell a victim to serious enemy rifle and artillery wounds. Private Agee's aggressive action, his initiative and skill in patrolling in and around enemy territory are exemplary of the high standards of an infantry soldier in action. Home address: Mrs. Anna P. Agee (mother), 329 Polk Avenue, Lebanon, Missouri.

Staff Sergeant HENRY C. BROWN (35580798), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 8 March 1945 to 20 March 1945. Sergeant Brown, a squad and patrol leader, voluntarily led patrols for his Battalion which resulted in obtaining invaluable information of many routes used by the enemy. He scrutinized Jap trails with such meticulousness that the direction in which the enemy moved was always known. In one particular instance Sergeant Brown led a reconnaissance patrol to determine enemy positions and activities, and seek a route for the movement of his battalion's supplies. Because of his excellent leadership the mission was accomplished very satisfactorily. In all his patrols, often deep in enemy territory containing enemy observation posts, Sergeant Brown attained the remarkable record of not losing one single man. Due to Sergeant Brown's skilful and superior leadership, vital strategic information with a high degree of accuracy was obtained from the enemy which proved most essential in subsequent operations against the enemy. Private First Class MARVIE A. DUNN SR. (38405188), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 7-21 May 1945. Private Dunn was a member of a Communications Platoon and served in the capacity of wireman. During the course of the operations it became necessary to lay wire under the most hazardous conditions involving heavy enemy artillery and small arms fire. As a result of the operations against

the enemy the strength of the wire section became greatly reduced, and the bulk of the work fell on Private Dunn. Nevertheless, Private Dunn, with a minimum amount of protection, set out each morning at daybreak to repair wire lines which were disrupted by enemy action during the night. In spite of being frequently fired upon by enemy snipers, Private Dunn realized the importance of his task and managed to restore and maintain communications. Private Dunn's steadfastness of purpose, his unwavering efforts and great courage aided materially in the successful progress of the operations. Warrant Officer (Junior Grade) GLEN G. GOODALL (W-2129640), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 17 January 1945. The Service Company of which Warrant Officer Goodall is a member, was subjected to an infiltration attack by an estimated force of twenty Japs. Because a portion of the organization had moved in after dark, there was not a well-defined perimeter set up and the Japs came into the area, inflicting one casualty and destroying some property. Warrant Officer Goodall, realizing the plight of his unit, left his foxhole and dashed through enemy small arms and knee-mortar fire for a distance of one mile to a nearby tactical unit. Here he obtained an infantry rifle platoon which he guided to a strategic position from which it could render the small detachment greater protection. Warrant Officer Goodall's voluntary action, his quick thinking and initiative were directly accountable for the safety of his battalion and a great inspiration to all the members in it. First Lieutenant RICHARD H. GRAVES (O-2043082), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 7-21 May 1945. During the recent operations, Lieutenant Graves was Communications Officer in an Infantry Battalion. During all this period he and his men laid over thirty miles of wire over rugged terrain and through enemy sniper fire. As a result of the hazardous conditions under which his men worked, the strength of the wire section became greatly reduced. Nevertheless, Lieutenant Graves personally joined his small group and assisted in laying wire and operating the battalion radio. He often worked to the point of exhaustion, working nights as well as days in order to maintain vital communications. Lieutenant Graves' excellent leadership, outstanding ability and untiring efforts aided considerably toward the success of his battalion's missions. Corporal Harbison, in charge of civilian carrying parties, was responsible for the steady flow of supplies to his Battalion's forward position and the immediate evacuation of wounded personnel. He daily guided the carrying parties forward over trails made almost impassable by heavy rains, and subject to intense enemy artillery fire. On occasions when his party was fired upon by hostile snipers, the coolness and initiative displayed by Corporal Harbison, prevented panic among the civilians and the abandonment of supplies along the trail. Corporal Harbison's outstanding courage and exceptional devotion to duty contributed in a large measure to the successful accomplishment of his battalion's mission in the capture of Ipo Dam. Technical Sergeant WILLIS L. LAKEMAN, (20145365), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Iro Tan, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 7 May 1945. A platoon of riflemen, commanded by Sergeant Lakeman in the absence of the platoon leader, were advancing to secure Hill 1000 in an approach march formation when his scouts sighted a Jap bivouac area containing approximately twenty Japs. Sergeant Lakeman made a quick estimate of the situation, and quickly moved two of his squads to the rear of the area to set up an ambush and killing zone, and with another squad he advanced from the front, succeeding in ambushing the Japs and causing their complete annihilation. The alertness, initiative, and leadership shown by Sergeant Lakeman in this action reflect great credit to himself and to the military service. Private ROBERT R. PAQUETTE, (31C20248), Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of Baloc, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 13 May 1945. Private Paquette, manning a machine gun position on the forward slope of a hill, was caught in a fierce enemy counter-attack made under cover of darkness and concealment of high grass from the base and side of the hill. The enemy came within five feet of Private Paquette's fox hole throwing hand grenades into the hole and forcing him to leap out. As he leaped from the fox hole he was wounded by enemy shrapnel, but with disregard for his wound, opened fire and succeeded in killing fifteen Japs. The courage and coolness under fire displayed by Private Paquette contributed in a great measure to the destruction of the enemy attack. Master Sergeant PHILIP D. GOOCH (20143655), Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Aitape, New Guinea and at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 30 June 1944 to 11 May 1945. Home address: Mr. Ira Gooch (father), R.F.D., West Gorham, Maine.

First Lieutenant HENRY A. MOLTE JR. (O-1288602), Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 15 February 1945 to 7 May 1945. Home address: Mrs. Erna P. Omon (mother), 12131 Elm-dale, Detroit 5, Michigan.

Corporal RUSSELL G. STORRS (31042762), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 13 May 1945. Corporal Storrs, a wireman in a Field Artillery Battery, was on the battery perimeter during the night. The enemy attacked the perimeter employing small arms fire. Effective fire from friendly observation posts drove the enemy off. At this time it was discovered that wire communications with the Battalion Fire Direction Center were disrupted and it was necessary to have them restored with the least possible delay. Corporal Storrs, with complete disregard for his personal safety, set out alone and succeeded in repairing the line. Through Corporal Storrs' great efforts, his battalion was rendered invaluable assistance in maintaining its mission of artillery support at a time when the infantry needed it most urgently. First Lieutenant WILLIAM F. STRAIGHT (O-1184158), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the Ipo Dam area, Luzon, Philippine Islands on 16 May 1945. Lieutenant Straight was assigned as an artillery forward observer with the M4ay Forces in their recent operation in the Ipo Dam area. He was attached to infantry troops who had the mission of seizing and securing a Jap position on a hill in the final objective area. The hill was held by an estimated enemy force of approximately one company. After adjusting artillery fire on the enemy position, Lieutenant Straight called for smoke shells to cover the advance of friendly troops. As soon as the smoke cleared the enemy countered with artillery fire causing shells to drop on friendly troops.

Lieutenant Straight quickly changed his position defiladed from the enemy fire to continue adjusting fire when suddenly his new position became subjected to intense sniper fire. Ignoring this fire, he remained in his position for four hours adjusting fire, and when friendly troops had withdrawn, he registered effective artillery fire and smoke-screened the objective hill, allowing our troops to seize and secure the enemy position. Lieutenant Straight's courage, initiative and conduct under constant exposure to enemy fire were exemplary of outstanding heroism. Captain RINER E. DEGLOW (O-1169921), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands during the period 9 January 1945 to 16 February 1945. In addition to Captain Deglow's normal duties of obtaining, evaluating and passing on all enemy information, he functioned as Assistant S-3 during this entire period. Captain Deglow made repeated reconnaissance trips and made many accurate studies of impact markings of enemy artillery shells. Inasmuch as sound plotting was extremely unreliable, Captain Deglow practiced visual observation which proved most feasible in accurately locating enemy artillery pieces. As a direct result of his studies, approximately twenty enemy field guns were silenced by our artillery, and his work was repeatedly carried out under enemy fire. On another occasion in the absence of the survey officer, Captain Deglow took charge of survey operations for his battalion, which work he performed in a most efficient manner. Captain Deglow's excellent performance of his manifold duties contributed immensely to the success of his combat team. Home address: Mr. Oscar L. AWARDS OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order #9419, 4 February 1944 (Sect. II, Bulletin 3, WD, 1944), a Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Commanding General, 43d Infantry Division, to the following named officers and enlisted men:

Master Sergeant WILBUR O. ALLEN, (20140463), Field Artillery, United States Army. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 9 January 1945. Home address: Mrs. Lillian Allen, (mother), Savage Street, Bangor, Maine.

Corporal JOSEPH P. COLEMAN, (20153453), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 13 May 1945. Corporal Coleman served as a wire and telephone operator with a forward observer party attached to an Infantry Company in the occupation of a formidable point in the Ipo Dam Operation. Twice on 13 May, the telephone lines were broken under the intense enemy artillery and mortar fire placed within the area. Corporal Coleman, without regard for his personal safety, unhesitatingly and voluntarily risked the security of his foxhole to check the lines and proceeded to locate and repair the trouble. Corporal Coleman's heroic action reestablished the communication lines which enabled the forward observer to adjust fire on the enemy installations resulting in the silencing of the hostile guns. Corporal ALEXANDER H. KAGAN, (31038966), Field Artillery, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 31 January 1945. Corporal Kagan volunteered to serve with a Liaison Section and distinguished himself in the performance of his duties in a superior manner. Without regard for his personal safety, Corporal Kagan, daringly maintained communications by laying wire through an area in plain view of, and intense fire from, the enemy. In one particular instance, when the hostile fire disrupted the telephone line between his Section and the Forward Observer Party with the front line assault units, Corporal Kagan, without orders, bravely sought the break in the line, located and repaired it thereby establishing vital communications. While on this mission Corporal Kagan spotted a Jap sniper who was harassing the wire party. Immediately, Corporal Kagan brought fire to bear and instantly killed the enemy. Corporal Kagan's great personal courage, efficiency, and devotion to duty contributed immeasurably to the success of the operation. Home address: Katherine Kenyon, (sister), Pawtucket, Rhode Island.

First Lieutenant ELWOOD K. LAFLIN, (02043101), Infantry, United States Army. Corporal McKown served as a wire and telephone operator with a forward observer party attached to an Infantry Company in the occupation of a formidable point in the Iwo Dam Operation. Twice on 13 May, the telephone lines were broken under the intense enemy artillery and mortar fire placed within the area. Corporal McKown, without regard for his personal safety, unhesitatingly and voluntarily left the security of his foxhole to check the lines and proceeded to locate and repair the trouble. Corporal McKown's heroic action reestablished the communication lines which enabled the forward observer to adjust fire on the enemy installations resulting in the silencing of the hostile guns. Sergeant Tozzo, of his own volition, bravely left the security of his foxhole under hostile fire and effected the necessary relocation of the vital radio and telephone equipment. This heroic and courageous act enabled the artillery observer to bring down fire on the enemy and resulted in disorganizing and delaying the enemy counter-attack. Sergeant Tozzo's great personal fortitude, initiative, and devotion to duty are a distinct credit to himself and to the military service.
