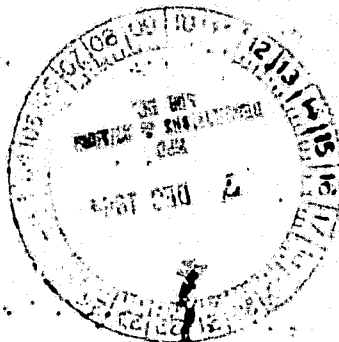

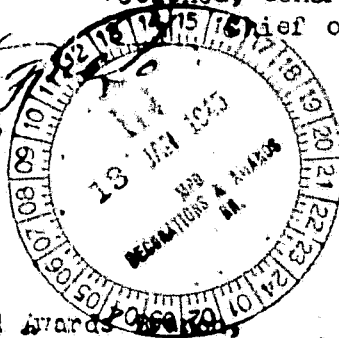

I - AWARD OF MERITORIOUS SERVICE UNIT PLAQUE - Pursuant to provisions of Section I, Circular Number 345, War Department, 23 August 1944, and letter, Headquarters European Theater of Operations, United States Army, AG 200.6 OpGA, dated 14 October 1944, subject, "Award of the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque", the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque is awarded to the 4th Medical Battalion for superior performance and outstanding devotion to duty in the performance of exceptionally difficult tasks for the period 1 January 1944 - 30 June 1944. All officers and men assigned to the 4th Medical Battalion are entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Unit Insignia for so long as they are assigned to said organization.

CITATION

During the period 1 January 1944 - 30 June 1944, the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION, with skill and enthusiasm, accomplished successfully not less than three operations of major importance and complexity.

Early in the period, this division was processed medically for overseas movement with a very minimum of distraction from general shipping preparations. The details involved, and the close attention demanded in such processing, can be best appreciated by those who have been involved in such procedure.

Following arrival in England intensive technical study continued, but the battalion contemporaneously engaged in rigorous training in techniques peculiar to ship-to-shore assault landings. On the occasion of the final landing exercise, German surface craft attacked certain of the vessels carrying personnel of the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION, inflicting damage and casualties. This marked the initial violent contact of this division with the enemy and, indicative of the esprit of the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION, the first decorations for performance against the enemy were won by five enlisted men of the organization for their demonstration of skill and courage on this occasion.

Throughout the period, procedures had been taken to assure procurement of all requisite medical supplies for the minutely planned assault on the enemy-held French coast. As the division moved into its marshalling area, preparatory to the long awaited invasion, not a single essential item of equipment was lacking to any medical unit of this command. This condition could be achieved only by most conscientious and tireless attention to duty.

On 6 June 1944, landing with the assault division on Utah Beach, Normandy, the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION gave striking demonstration of the spirit and skill derived from the cumulative result of months of careful preparation, sound training and high innate personal qualities in all ranks. Supporting this division in its fight to land and capture of the Port of Cherbourg, the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION Clearing Company treated casualties totaling * * * * an average of * * * * per day.

During the period 1 January 1944 - 30 June 1944, the high standard of discipline of the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION was manifest in the appearance of the personnel, their installations and equipment; in the remarkably low venereal disease rate and number of court martial offenses. Meeting each of the numerous, exacting and vitally important demands made of it in a manner uniformly superior, the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION deservedly has gained the admiration of all elements of this command.

CITATION

From 1 July 1944 to 31 December 1944, the 4th Infantry Division took conspicuous part in combat operations of lasting consequence. The division spearheaded the breakthrough at St. Lo on 25 July; withstood the German counter-attack at Mortain; was the first American unit to enter the City of Paris; pursued the enemy across France and Belgium and was the first Allied unit to reach German soil. It fought through the Hurtgen Forest and, as the period closed, withstood in the Luxembourg area, with conspicuous success, the vicious German counter-offensive.

In each of these operations a price was paid. To the men who paid that price and, in virtually equal degree, to those who stood ready to pay, the skilled and humane services of the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION will be remembered always with gratitude and admiration.

Instances of courageous service by personnel of the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION are many. Bombing of the immediate area of the Clearing Station caused no lessening in the care of the many wounded on hand; repeated and rapid movement, on one occasion of 132 miles in a day, lessened in no degree the zealousness of all ranks in their critical duties. That the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION has won a greater number of decorations for heroism and valor in the face of the enemy than any service unit of this command bespeaks the quality of its personnel. The absence of accustomed facilities in the way of covered buildings, electric light and conveniences served only as a challenge successfully overcome. In appearance of personnel and maintenance of equipment could be seen rigid standards, cheerfully met.

During this period a total of * * * * casualties were treated by the battalion, of which * * * * were received in the thirty day period of the Hurtgen Forest operation. In this same period there were no trials by court-martial or cases of venereal disease within the command. Those figures demonstrate beyond doubt the sound discipline, professional skill and high sense of duty which mark all ranks of the 4TH MEDICAL BATTALION and have earned for it a place of deep affection and regard. Its performance adds a brilliant chapter to a service rich in tradition.

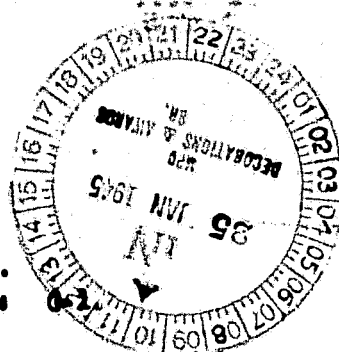

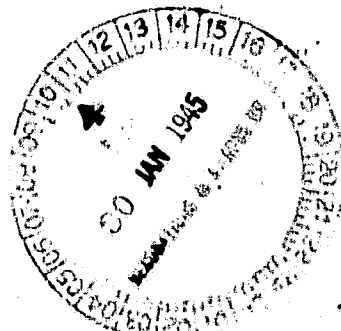

I - AWARD OF MERITORIOUS SERVICE UNIT PLAQUE - Pursuant to provisions of Section I, Circular Number 345, War Department, 23 August 1944, and letter, Headquarters European Theater of Operations, United States Army, AG 200.6 OpGA, dated 14 October 1944, subject, "Award of the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque", the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque is awarded to the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company for superior performance and outstanding devotion to duty in the performance of exceptionally difficult tasks for the period 1 January 1944 - 30 June 1944. All officers and men assigned to the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company are entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Unit Insignia for so long as they are assigned to said organization.

CITATION

At the opening of the period 1 January - 30 June 1944, the 4th Infantry Division was preparing for movement overseas. To the exacting operation required to ready the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company for movement, this company had the added responsibility of facilitating preparation of all ordnance materiel of the division. Recognizing the diversity of ordnance materiel organic in an infantry division, the encompassing nature of the responsibility is apparent. It bespeaks the exacting standards and sound practices of the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company that this division completed all necessary ordnance procedures with uniformly satisfactory results.

Upon arrival in England, it was necessary to reequip the division with ordnance items not preshipped, including all vehicles and artillery pieces. This operation was conducted under the added burden of remote locations, in many instances, of supply depots. The 4th Infantry Division having been designated to land in the assault in the long planned invasion of the continent, intense supply activity remained a continuing responsibility of the company, as special equipment and vehicles designed primarily to support this assault were added, at intervals, to the division. Of necessity, it became the responsibility of the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company to instruct units in the use and maintenance of much of this special equipment.

Rigorous training in the technique peculiar to ship-to-shore assault operations was intensified. During one of these invasion exercises the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company was in a convoy attacked by German surface craft. The disciplined reaction of this company on occasion of its first contact with the enemy demonstrated its readiness for the long awaited assault on the continent.

To implement the division in this critical, initial mission, great care was taken to assure satisfactory waterproofing of vehicles, artillery pieces, self-propelled guns and, in some cases, small arms. The successful operation of both vehicles and weapons in the assault landing, made while seas ran high, is attributable in large measure to the careful planning and thorough attention given this most important phase by the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company.

At H-Hour on 6 June 1944, the assault on Utah Beach, Normandy, France, was made by this division. The 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company, as the first ordnance unit ashore on this beach, bore full responsibility for the maintenance not only of this division but of other assault units. One full infantry battalion of another division, having lost all small arms and individual weapons during its landing, was reequipped on D-Day plus 2 by the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company. During the drive on Cherbourg, the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company evacuated in excess of 250 pieces of enemy equipment and five tons of enemy ammunition.

Throughout the period, 1 January - 30 June 1944, no man of the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company was absent without leave, and the markedly low number of court-martial and venereal disease cases in the command is clear indication of the discipline and sense of responsibility which marked all ranks. The accomplishments, during the period 1 January - 30 June 1944, of the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company, reflect credit upon officers and men and have earned them the deserved admiration of this command.

II - AWARD OF A STAR TO THE MERITORIOUS SERVICE UNIT PLAQUE - Pursuant to provisions of Section I, Circular Number 345, War Department, 23 August 1944, and letter, Headquarters European Theater of Operations, United States Army, AG 200.6 OpGA, dated 14 October 1944, subject, "Award of the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque", a star to the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque is awarded to the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company for superior performance and outstanding devotion to duty in the performance of exceptionally difficult tasks for the period 1 July 1944 - 31 December 1944. All officers and men assigned to the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company are entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Unit Insignia for so long as they are assigned to said organization.

CITATION

In the period 1 July - 31 December 1944, the 4th Infantry Division established an outstanding combat record, taking part in numerous critical operations, including the breakthrough at St Lo in July; the smashing of a German counterattack at Mortain and subsequent American drive to Paris in August; the pursuit across France and Belgium, culminating with our penetration into Germany at the Schnee Eifel in September; the grim fight in the Hurtgen Forest in November and repulse of the German drive on the city of Luxembourg in December. Combat of this character exacts great toll of ordnance materiel and could have been sustained only by outstanding performance of duty on the part of the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance

Company. At no time was the drive of this division stayed for want of prompt, skilled action by this company.

Pursuit of the enemy during part of this period moved at such fast pace that skilled planning and careful attention to its detailed execution was essential if ordnance equipment was to be maintained at the level demanded by the continuing operation. During the periods of rapid movement, the company established contact parties which visited the various units of the division, enabling maintenance operations to be accomplished in remarkably quick time. The 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company adopted the policy of making complete second echelon checks of all vehicles received from depots and detailed inspection of all other ordnance equipment so received before issue to units. This reduced substantially maintenance demands on the using units, although increasing markedly the volume of work borne by the company.

The 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company was not deterred as the period drew to a close, by the developing bad weather. This unfavorable condition served only as a challenge, successfully met. During the engagement in the Hurtgen Forest, fought in miserable weather, company wreckers travelled mined roads to return equipment for repair and mechanics moved forward to artillery positions. During this month-long battle there was not a single piece of artillery on dead-line; more than 500 vehicles were repaired or rebuilt and returned to the units.

Following the battle of the Hurtgen Forest and arrival in Luxembourg, ordnance materiel in great quantity was earmarked for repair. The German counterattack forced postponement of this program and the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company was alerted and ready to meet the developing German assault. Realizing that advance depots were in imminent danger of capture, a truck convoy moved into the threatened area north of the sector of this division and obtained quantities of vitally necessary items. This was accomplished while units defending that same sector were in process of withdrawal, and was characteristic of the keen appreciation by this company of the importance it played in the maintenance of this division as a fighting unit.

Illustrating further the conscientious attention to duty which marked all ranks, the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company, during the period 1 July - 31 December 1944, showed remarkably low number of men AWOL or involved in court-martial proceedings, and no venereal disease. The record of the 704th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company during the period 1 July - 31 December 1944, is one in which each officer and man may take great pride and which all elements of this command acknowledge with satisfaction.

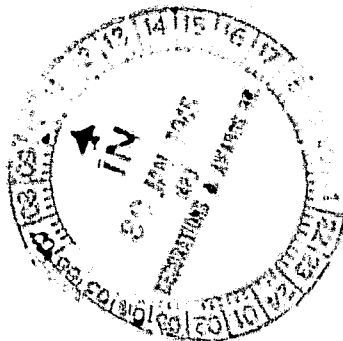

I - AWARD OF MERITORIOUS SERVICE UNIT PLAQUE - Pursuant to provisions of Section I, Circular Number 345, War Department, 23 August 1944, and letter, Headquarters European Theater of Operations, United States Army, AG 200.6 OpGd, dated 14 October 1944, subject, "Award of the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque", the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque is awarded to the 4th Quartermaster Company for superior performance and outstanding devotion to duty in the performance of exceptionally difficult tasks for the period 1 January 1944 - 30 June 1944. All officers and men assigned to the 4th Quartermaster Company are entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Unit Insignia for so long as they are assigned to said organization.

CITATION

The opening of the period 1 January 1944 - 30 June 1944, saw the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY engaged in the difficult process of readying itself for movement overseas. In addition to the many details inherent in such operation, it was the exacting responsibility of this company to make the numerous boxes and shipping crates required by the entire division. That the movement of the division was completed well within the scheduled time, and the absence of damage from faulty crating, reveals the attention to detail and workmanlike execution of this operation.

On arrival in England, the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY undertook the equipping of this division for its assault on the continent. To the normal complications in supply operations of this size, the company was under the added handicap of drawing from scattered and distant supply points and depots. Numerous items of special issue, designed to facilitate the assault landing, were procured and no unit of this division was lacking in any necessary item of Quartermaster Supply when, following long preparation, they moved to their assault crafts.

Concurrent with this supply activity, the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY participated in exercises designed to perfect the technique peculiar to ship-to-shore assault landings. During the course of one such exercise the convoy, of which the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY was a part, was attacked by German surface craft. The conduct of all personnel of the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY during this first violent contact with the enemy earned the commendation of the Naval Flotilla Commander. Two enlisted men of the company were awarded the Soldier's Medal for heroic action.

At H-Hour on D-Day, 6 June 1944, this division assaulted the enemy-held Normandy coast. The 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY maintained the fighting elements of this division during the beachhead operation with conspicuous success. In the first critical days, under enemy artillery and sniper fire, and over an inadequate road net, the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY aggressively pushed forward the necessary ammunition, fuel, food and other supplies.

The drive of this division on Cherbourg was slowed at no time for want of Quartermaster supplies. The performance of the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY during this initial combat culminated a record which, in conjunction with the outstanding discipline and health standards maintained by the company, has earned the appreciation of all elements of this command. It is one in which each officer and man of the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY rightfully may take pride.

All officers and men assigned to the 4th Quartermaster Company are entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Unit Insignia for so long as they are assigned to said organization.

CITATION

In the period 1 July 1944 - 31 December 1944, the 4th Infantry Division established a noteworthy battle record, which included the breakthrough at St Lo in July; entry into Paris and the drive through Franco in August; the pursuit across Belgium and penetration into Germany at the Schnee Eifel; the bitter fight in the Hurtgen Forest and, in December, the successful defense of the City of Luxembourg. This sustained combat imposed maximum demands continuously on the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY and the accomplishments of this division throughout the period reflects the thoroughness and skill with which the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY met these demands. The forward progress of this division was slowed on no occasion by reason of failure of the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY.

In the drive through Franco and Belgium into Germany, supply was the critical problem. Supply lines extended many times their normal length and drivers of the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY were on the road for periods of ten days without relief. Gasoline, rations, fuel, clothing and equipment, although runs of over 300 miles in a day were necessary, always were available to this division insofar as the supply of these items was within the control of the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY. The work accomplished by the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY may be measured by the daily turnover of in excess of 100 tons of all classes of supply.

In addition to this mandatory activity, the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY voluntarily undertook additional services, organizing and operating a typewriter and a stove and field range repair section and a division shower point. In these activities may be seen the determination of the officers and men of this company to serve this division to the maximum. Men from the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY joined the infantry in the line during the German offensive in December, 1944, and there performed with the same devotion which marked their activity in less spectacular assignments throughout the period.

In maintenance of discipline and health, the 4TH QUARTERMASTER COMPANY further reflects the intention of all ranks that their full energy be directed in those channels which best assure maintenance of supply and service to all elements of this command. Their accomplishments in the period 1 July 1944 - 31 December 1944, have earned the recognition and commendation of this command.



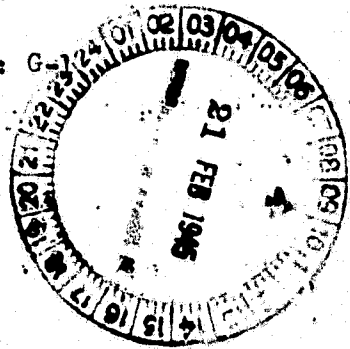
