I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to:

Private First Class John A. Anderson, 18233278, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Eferding, Austria, on 4 May 1945. Approaching an intersection in an enemy-occupied town, Private Anderson saw four Germans setting up an anti-tank gun in a courtyard. Parking his vehicle under cover, he and a fellow soldier proceeded into the yard. Exposing themselves and disregarding the danger, they fired on the gun crew. A sniper across the street opened fire on them. In the ensuing duel, Private Anderson silenced the sniper, his companion killed four gun crew members and an officer, and the vital intersection was cleared of all enemy opposition. By capturing the enemy position, Private Anderson and his comrade enabled the platoon to establish positions on the main thoroughfare, smash four truckloads of enemy reinforcements, take the town, and pave the way for the capture of the regimental objective the following day. His dauntless, aggressive conduct reflects the highest credit upon Private Anderson and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Private First Class Walter J. Carey, Jr., 42100232, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at St. Inzing, Austria, on 4 May 1945. Left to guard a wounded soldier, Private Carey and a companion waited in an enemy-occupied town for the arrival of an ambulance. Spotting a suspicious looking man in civilian clothes, Private Carey stopped and searched him: Finding a Wehrmacht passbook and pistol, he took him prisoner. When rifle fire was heard nearby, Private Carey left his companion, flanked the enemy positions in low shrubbery and, despite great danger to himself, emptied one clip at the shrubbery. Three Germans came out to surrender, reporting that Private Carey's bullets had killed three others, while four fled. Hearing more shots, Private Carey hurried to the aid of his friends. Private Carey's aggressive actions in protecting a wounded comrade and disregard for personal safety in the performance of duty reflect the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Private First Class Thomas M. Carroll, 36703834, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Sandbach, Germany, on 2 May 1945. The Anti-tank Company, 260th Infantry, suffered several serious casualties when its convoy was ambushed on the road to Sandbach. Private Carroll, a Company Cannoneer, endangered his life by moving through intense enemy fire to a truck containing blood plasma needed to save the lives of two wounded comrades. Going to and from the truck, Private Carroll was thrown to the ground three times by the concussion of mortar bursts and wounded in the leg by shell fragments. Undaunted, laboriously crawling to the wounded men despite his painful wound, Private Carroll returned and administered the

plasma to the two soldiers. Then, refusing first aid, he dragged himself through the heavy fire to assist more wounded men to safety. Private Carroll's heroic disregard of personal safety and his intense concern for his fellow soldiers reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Private First Class Eugene J. Dooley, 36742201, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Treffurt, Germany, on 4 April 1945. When the Intelligence and Reconnaissance platoon was pinned down by heavy enemy fire, Private Dooley, a Scout and Observer, detected a flanking movement by six enemy soldiers and moved out on his own initiative to neutralize it. He dashed 300 yards through a hail of small arms fire and met three of the Germans head-on, killing one and capturing the other two. He was then wounded in the shoulder by sniper fire, and his M-3 sub-machine gun had only three remaining rounds. Undaunted, Private Dooley moved in on three other Germans in the face of firing sub-machine guns and induced their surrender. By turning in the five prisoners and breaking up the flank movement Private Dooley contributed greatly to the successful advance of his platoon. His cool aggressiveness, heroism, and exceptional military skill reflect the highest credit upon Private Dooley and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

First Lieutenant George F. La Maine, 01042860, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For gallantry in action at Kapfelberg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. When Company "A" was pinned down near a railroad embankment by intense artillery, mortar, and sniper fire, Lieutenant La Maine, the Company Commander, made a personal reconnaissance and prepared to advance his unit. Leading the company over the embankment onto a flat, open field, Lieutenant La Maine was met with a heavy concentration of sniper fire. As the men automatically hit the ground, Lieutenant La Maine, aware only that he must prevent a stalemate and get his company out of the open area, stood upright in the face of the fire. Brandishing his rifle, he turned to his men, shouted to them to follow him, and began to fire as he advanced toward the enemy. Inspired by his example, his men arose, built up a marching fire before them, and forced the enemy to retreat. Lieutenant La Maine's stirring display of gallantry and intense spirit reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Washington.

Private First Class Walter Lopazanski, 42100428, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Treffurt, Germany, on 4 April 1945. When the I and K Platoon of the 260th Infantry entered Treffurt and observed entrenched enemy forces, the men dismounted, opened fire, and advanced into the first line of houses. Observing that the enemy had set up a machine gun in a box car at the bottom of a hill to deliver flanking fire, Private Lopazanski and two companions advanced toward the hostile installation. When one hundred yards from the machine-gun nest, they were pinned down by its fire. Advancing alone in the face of intense fire, Private Lopazanski crept close to the enemy position and tossed a hand grenade. The resulting blast seriously wounded two of the enemy and caused the surrender of two more. His heroism and disregard for personal safety in the face of great danger reflect the greatest credit upon Private Lopazanski and the military service. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Private First Class John M. Toups, 19204403, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Lauterhofen, Germany, on 21 April 1945. Riding in the lead jeep of the I and R Platoon, Private Toups and his driver were met by concentrated enemy machine-gun, automatic weapons, and rifle fire as they entered the town of Lauterhofen. With extreme daring and bravery, Private Toups dismounted, rushed forward and made a lone frontal assault on an enemy machine-gun position. Twisting and dodging, firing his sub-machine gun from the hip as he ran, he crossed an open bridge that was covered by enemy fire and killed the hostile machine gunner. Occupying the German position, Private Toups turned his gun on other hostile positions. Observing two enemy soldiers setting up a heavy machine gun some distance away, he directed his fire toward them and killed both men. His extreme heroism, daring, and courage in the face of enemy fire enabled his platoon to cross the bridge safely and reflect the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from California.

II - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Captain Albert F. Baretich, 01299839, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Regensburg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. After leading Company "B" across the Danube River in assault boats, Captain Baretich was forced to move his company at night through the Second Battalion lines to continue the attack. Despite the darkness and confusion of battle, he accomplished the task with a minimum of difficulty and quickly reorganized his unit. Pushing forward, the Company encountered enemy artillery, mortar, small arms, panzerfaust, and 40mm anti-aircraft fire. Unmindful of personal danger, Captain Baretich led his men forward through the enemy barrage in a successful attack that inflicted severe casualties on the Germans. Then, realizing that an adjoining company had advanced, leaving its flank exposed to enemy counterattack, Captain Baretich and his company once more forged ahead through fierce enemy fire to protect the open flank. His aggressive tactics and unexcelled leadership that enabled his battalion to advance on Regensburg the following day without opposition reflect great credit upon Captain Baretich and the military service. Entered military service from Missouri.

Technical Sergeant Ellsworth L. Cunningham, 31422851, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

First Lieutenant William J. Eddy, 01060756, (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Volunteering to lead a patrol to determine the strength, location, and disposition of a large attacking German force, Lieutenant Eddy had proceeded about 200 yards

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when he and his men were pinned down by snipers. Crawling out of range of the fire, he advanced under cover of roadside fences. Deliberately braving concentrated small arms, sniper, and machine-gun fire, he raced across an open area to a shed on high ground only fifty yards from the enemy lines. Despite a barrage of 38mm and machine-gun fire he remained in position to observe the enemy. Estimating the enemy's strength at seventy-five infantrymen and one machine-gun squad, he and his men returned along the same hazardous route, still under heavy shell-fire, to report his information. The valorous exploit, that enabled friendly artillery to inflict severe casualties on the enemy positions, reflects great credit upon Lieutenant Eddy and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Second Lieutenant Thomas W. Fairchild (then Sergeant), 02026215, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Neumarkt, Germany, on 20 to 22 April 1945. On 20 April 1945, Sergeant Fairchild, a Forward Observer, crossed an open field which was being fired upon by enemy artillery. Despite casualties among our troops and damage to his vehicle, he continued to remain exposed to enemy fire in an effort to find artillery targets and direct fire upon the enemy positions. During the evening he was again subjected to enemy fire while reconnoitering for defensive fires. The next day Sergeant Fairchild exposed himself to enemy artillery and small arms in a Neumarkt street in order to operate his radio effectively; and, on the following day, he crossed an open area under enemy observation and fire to reach a satisfactory OP. Throughout this period his courage and initiative were outstanding and reflect great credit upon Sergeant Fairchild and the military service. Entered military service from Mississippi.

First Lieutenant Alfred W. Fisher, 02049584, Medical Administrative Corps, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

First Lieutenant James E. Garretson, 01895115, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France and Germany from 5 March 1945 to 9 April 1945. Entered military service from Washington.

Technical Sergeant Hubert F. Harmon, 34478506, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 10 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Mississippi.

Technician Fourth Grade Mike R. Hellock (then Private First Class), 15335846, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Volunteering as a member of a patrol to determine the strength, location, and disposition of a

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large attacking German force, Private Hellock had proceeded about 200 yards when he and his companions were pinned down by snipers. Crawling out of range of the fire, he advanced under cover of roadside fences. Deliberately braving concentrated small arms, sniper, and machine gun fire, he raced across an open area to a shed on high ground only 50 yards from the enemy lines. Despite a barrage of 88mm and machine gun fire he remained in position to observe the enemy. Estimating the enemy's strength at 75 infantrymen and one machine gun squad, he and his companions returned along the same hazardous route, disregarding heavy shell-fire, to report the information. The valorous exploit that enabled friendly artillery to inflict severe casualties on the enemy, reflects great credit upon Private Hellock and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Captain Frank R. Jackson, 01286294, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Arkansas.

First Lieutenant Frank M. Macek, 01181679, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 18 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Arizona.

Sergeant Paul E. McClure, 15373598, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Indiana.

First Lieutenant Robert B. McCorkle, 01180606, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Felsburg, Germany. On the night of 18 March 1945, Lieutenant McCorkle, at his post as Battery Executive, had been warned of an enemy patrol in his area. Despite the possibility of attack from this patrol, it was imperative that the Battery carry out all fire missions received. Suddenly, in the midst of a mission, the enemy patrol commenced firing on the cannoneers. Instinctively the men took to cover, but Lieutenant McCorkle, disregarding his own safety, rushed to the men and rallied them. Inspired by his courageous action and calm demeanor, the men unhesitatingly returned to their posts and completed the firing mission. Lieutenant McCorkle's unfaltering action, courage, and leadership reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Technician Fourth Grade Audie E. Mize, 34706872, Infantry 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Volunteering as a member of a patrol to determine the strength, location, and disposition of a large attacking German force, Technician Mize had proceeded about 200 yards when he and his companions were pinned down by snipers. Crawling out of range of the fire, he advanced under cover of roadside fences. Deliberately braving concentrated small arms, sniper, and machine gun fire, he raced across an open area to a shed on high ground only 50 yards from the enemy lines. Despite a barrage of 88mm and machine gun fire

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remained in position to observe the enemy. Estimating the enemy's strength of 75 infantrymen and one machine gun squad, he and his companions returned along the same hazardous route, disregarding heavy shell-fire, to report the information. The valorous exploit that enabled friendly artillery to inflict severe casualties on the enemy, reflects great credit upon Technician Nize and the military service. Entered military service from Alabama.

Staff Sergeant Gordon S. Nelson, 39005377, Medical Department, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from California.

Technician Fourth Grade Jesse Parr, 17013418, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Volunteering as a member of a patrol to determine the strength, location, and disposition of a large attacking German force, Technician Parr had proceeded about 200 yards when he and his companions were pinned down by snipers. Crawling out of range of the fire, he advanced under cover of roadside fences. Deliberately braving concentrated small arms, sniper, and machine-gun fire he raced across an open area to a shed on high ground only fifty yards from the enemy lines. Despite a barrage of 88mm and machine-gun fire he remained in position to observe the enemy. Estimating the enemy's strength at seventy-five infantrymen and one machine-gun squad, he and his companions returned along the same hazardous route, disregarding heavy shell fire to report the information. The valorous exploit, that enabled friendly artillery to inflict severe casualties on the enemy, reflects great credit upon Technician Parr and the military service. Entered military service from Oregon.

Master Sergeant Larkin A. Poe, 6921213, Infantry (Armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 1 January 1945 to 6 May 1945. Entered military service from Georgia.

Sergeant Richard B. Reynolds, 39281815, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Volunteering as a member of a patrol to determine the strength, location, and disposition of a large attacking German force, Sergeant Reynolds had proceeded about 200 yards when he and his companions were pinned down by snipers. Crawling out of range of the fire, he advanced under cover of roadside fences. Deliberately braving concentrated small arms, sniper, and machine-gun fire, he raced across an open area to a shed on high ground only fifty yards from the enemy lines. Despite a barrage of 88mm and machine-gun fire he remained in position to observe the enemy. Estimating the enemy's strength at seventy-five infantrymen and one machine-gun squad, he and his companions returned along the same hazardous route, disregarding heavy shell-fire, to report the information. The valorous exploit, that enabled friendly artillery to inflict severe casualties on the enemy, reflects great credit upon Sergeant Reynolds and the military service. Entered military service from California.

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Technician Fourth Grade Glenn R. Roseman, 33511856, Medical Department, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Kapfelberg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. When the First Battalion sustained several serious casualties while attacking across the Danub River, Technician Roseman, a Company "A" aid man, crawled forward, despite the danger to himself from close-range sniper fire, and began to administer aid to the wounded. When the aid men of an adjoining company were called away to care for casualties on a flank, Technician Roseman dashed across a railroad embankment covered by hostile, grazing small arms fire and proceeded to work on that company's patients. After caring for all the wounded in sight without thought for his own safety, Technician Roseman voluntarily made his way to the rear, located litter bearers, and led them to his wounded comrades. His heroic performance of tasks beyond his normal duties reflects great credit upon Technician Roseman and the military service. Entered military service from Maryland.

Private First Class Jack Schober, 36258356, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in St. Inzing, Austria, on 4 May 1945. Left to guard a wounded soldier, Private Schober and a companion waited in an enemy-occupied town for the arrival of an ambulance. Spotting a civilian wearing military boots, Private Schober demanded his identification papers, discovered he was a German Officer, and took him prisoner. While his companion had gone to investigate nearby rifle fire, Private Schober and the wounded man were attacked from an enemy position down the street. Fearlessly exposing himself, Private Schober fired back vigorously and killed two Germans who attempted to flee. The two remaining soldiers quickly surrendered. As he crossed the street his companion returned with three other prisoners. Private Schober's aggressive action in preventing an attack on his wounded comrade reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Second Lieutenant Bernard Sparrowk (then Technical Sergeant), 02028842, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Maine.

Private First Class Earl M. Spiro, 36725322, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Sandbach, Germany, on 2 May 1945. The Anti-tank Company, 260th Infantry, suffered several serious casualties when its convoy was ambushed on the road to Sandbach. Private Spiro, a Cannoneer, moving over open ground through mortar, machine gun, and sniper fire, fearlessly went to the aid of a fallen comrade. Disregarding the heavy fire, Private Spiro began removing the wounded man from the field of fire and was about to reach safety when he was struck and seriously wounded by an enemy burst. His courage in exposing himself at the risk of his own life to save a wounded man and divert hostile fire from his comrades reflects great credit upon Private Spiro and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

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Captain Raymond E. Trinter, 0469957, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Ohio.

Staff Sergeant August J. Van Daele, 35899586, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Treuf, Germany, on 20 April 1945. When the Second Platoon of Company "C" was confronted by a company of enemy soldiers and several tanks directing 75mm fire upon it, Sergeant Van Daele, a squad leader, formed a patrol and successfully attacked the enemy rifle positions to relieve his Company from a flanking fire. In a heavily wooded sector Sergeant Van Daele and his patrol met and killed three enemy riflemen. Then, moving up to another enemy machine gun position, he and his men killed two more Germans. While returning to the platoon, the patrol killed another rifleman sighted in an open field. His quick-thinking action, excellent grasp of the tactical problems involved, and expert supervision of the patrol reflect great credit upon Sergeant Van Daele and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.


Technician Fifth Grade Ivon D. Wilson, Jr., 39856236, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States from 7 to 19 March 1945. On 7 March 1945 Technician Wilson, a Service Company driver, volunteered to transport vital ammunition to front line troops. For twelve days thereafter he repeatedly braved enemy fire of all types to deliver badly-needed munitions. His large truck, loaded with high-explosive shells, presented a conspicuous target for hostile mortar, machine-gun, and small arms fire. Nevertheless, Technician Wilson adequately supplied forward elements at all times, constantly driving his vehicle over open terrain and under direct enemy observation. Technician Wilson's high degree of courage and prolonged assumption of an extremely hazardous duty aided materially his Battalion's tactical operations and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Arizona.

Second Lieutenant William C. Wilson (then Technical Sergeant), 02015822, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Louisiana.

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I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to

Staff Sergeant James U. Angle, 35593394, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For gallantry in action in Langensalza, Germany, on 5-6 April 1945. Sergeant Angle, acting Platoon Leader, aggressively led his unit toward the outskirts of Langensalza where enemy infantry armed with machine guns, rifles, panzerfausts, and 20mm anti-aircraft were solidly entrenched. At the fore of his platoon he conducted the rout of the enemy from foxholes, cleared the first row of houses, and captured eighty German soldiers. Moving on, the platoon came to a heavily-fortified road block beneath a railroad underpass. Under heavy enemy machine-gun and sniper fire and subjected to bombing and strafing by hostile planes Sergeant Angle, repeatedly exposing himself to enemy observation, killed two Germans and boldly directed his platoon's operations against superior forces. His gallant action disorganized the German defenses and provided a safe entrance into town for the Infantry. Repeatedly he led his platoon deep into enemy territory to reconnoiter enemy positions, disrupt their defenses, and inflict heavy casualties. The bravery and utter disregard for his personal safety displayed by Sergeant Angle reflect the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Captain Albert F. Baretich, 01299839, Infantry, 260th Infantry For gallantry in action at Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. When the Third Battalion of the 261st Infantry was surrounded by superior forces in the town of Struth, Captain Baretich, Company "L" Commander, made a quick reconnaissance and set about to relieve the pressure on the beleaguered battalion. Captain Baretich led his men forward over 1100 yards of open terrain, subjected to intense machine gun and 88mm fire. By his aggressiveness, boldness, and disregard for deadly fire, Captain Baretich rallied his men and led them into a direct attack which confused and routed the enemy. He silenced one 88mm gun and captured another. So concerted was the attack led by Captain Baretich that Company "L" threw the enemy far enough to the rear to secure its objective in town and help relieve the trapped Battalion. His courage, determined action, and brave leadership reflect the greatest credit upon Captain Baretich and the military service. Entered military service from Missouri.

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(GO No. 55, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 6 July 1945, cont'd)

Captain Warren P. Davis, 0379339, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Stoppach, Germany, on 20 April 1945. When Company "A" was attacked in its billet during the night by enemy patrols, the Germans were driven off by the superb defense set up by Captain Davis, Company Commander. The next morning an enemy tank attacked the CP and blasted it with shell fire. Displaying admirable coolness in directing the defense, Captain Davis organized two bazooka teams and rallied his men to eventually knock out the tank. Immediately, under cover of a heavy artillery barrage the village was attacked by nine enemy tanks and 250 SS and Panzer infantrymen. Captain Davis again showed uncanny ability in bolstering the defense by obtaining first hand information under fire and by personally selecting advantageous mortar positions to thwart the hostile attacks. Through the deployment of his troops and his inspiring example of courageous conduct he enabled his company to successfully defend its position and inflict heavy losses upon the enemy, causing their rout. His outstanding courage, initiative, and inspiring leadership reflect the greatest credit upon Captain Davis and the military service. Entered military service from Maryland.

Private First Class James M. Harrigan, Sr., 33752794, Infantry 261st Infantry. For gallantry in action at Scharding, Austria, on 3 May 1945. When Company "A" was assigned the mission of establishing a bridgehead across the Inns River, the Company Commander, realizing the enemy was aware of the contemplated attack and appreciating the hazards involved, asked for volunteers. Private Harrigan, acting squad leader, immediately volunteered for the dangerous assignment of leading a small assault group and persuade his squad to accompany him. Rushing down the river bank in search of a boat, Private Harrigan was able to locate a flimsy civilian canoe, the only craft available. In broad daylight and in imminent danger of attack from the heavily entrenched enemy on the opposite shore, they pushed out into the swiftly flowing river with the frail craft. Reaching the opposite bank, they quickly deployed in a perimeter defense to cover the company as it later crossed without casualties. His heroism and outstanding courage reflect the greatest credit upon Private Harrigan and the military service. Entered military service from Washington D.C.

Captain Alonzo L. Nugent, Jr., 01296735, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Saarlautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. When Company "E" jumped off in an attack to occupy a heavily fortified hill, Captain Nugent, Company Commander, and a small headquarters group found themselves in a position to make an attack upon the main pill box in the area. Creeping close to the hostile installation, and, in full view of the enemy, Captain Nugent stood up and hurled two grenades into the observation apertures. Then, moving towards a second pill box, despite extremely heavy enemy fire, he, together with two of his men, captured the second installation and its occupants. Using the pill box as a center of defense, he reorganized his company, set up machine-gun positions, and posted his riflemen as security against any counter-attack by the enemy. His inspirational leadership and unflinching heroism in the face of extreme danger reflect the greatest credit upon Captain Nugent and the military service. Entered military service from Louisiana.

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(GO No. 55, Hq 65th Inf/Div, APO 200, 6 July 1945, cont'd)

Private First Class Vincent J. Schirripa, 42038044, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Fraulautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. After guiding two assault teams forward to attack a number of pill boxes, Private Schirripa, a Company "F" Assistant Squad Leader, led one team through a Schu-mine field to within 20 yards of one of the concrete emplacements. When the pole charges placed in the pill box embrasures failed to go off, Private Schirripa, exposed to heavy enemy machine gun and artillery fire, dashed across an open area, secured a flame thrower, and ignited the pole charge, silencing the enemy machine gun within. Quickly reorganizing his squad, he led it in demolishing a second pill box. Anticipating a counter-attack, Private Schirripa left his cover, rushed out into an exposed area, and picked up an abandoned BAR. When the German attack came his devastating fire routed the enemy and was instrumental in driving off two more attempted penetrations. Later he volunteered to travel and return over 1800 yards of open, exposed terrain, under constant enemy fire, to contact the rest of the company. His extreme heroism and bravery in the face of great danger reflect the greatest credit upon Private Schirripa and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

II- AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Soldier's Medal is awarded to:

Technician Fifth Grade Eugene B. Spade, 35172634, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy of the United States at Waisenkirchen, Austria, on 4 May 1945. When a parked tank at the First Battalion CP accidentally caught fire, other nearby vehicles were placed in imminent danger from the roaring flames and exploding ammunition. Technician Spade, realizing the importance of his truck, loaded with CP equipment and left near the flaming tank, disregarded the warnings of his platoon sergeant and raced to the vehicle through bursting 90mm shells and .50 caliber cartridges exploding from the terrific heat in the tank. After driving his truck from the blaze, he returned to the danger area for another vehicle, loaded with 57mm rounds, and moved it to cover. He then went back a third time to save a jeep from destruction, calmly driving it away from the tank. Technician Spade's bravery and instant action in the face of great danger and his intense devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant Daniel Avrunin, 01184450, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 9 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Michigan.

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(CO 55, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 6 July 1945, cont'd)

Staff Sergeant Harold R. Baack, 6932116, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from California.

Private First Class George W. Clapp, 31425006, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, on 16 March 1945. Engaged in adjusting fire on enemy positions a short distance from their OP, Private Clapp and a lieutenant found themselves shelled by their own artillery. After a round had knocked out wire communication, Private Clapp calmly succeeded in getting his radio into operation, effectively controlled the fire, and succeeded in destroying the enemy position. When an enemy mortar barrage again cut communication, Private Clapp had to cross an open area under observed mortar fire to repair the line. Fired on by a sniper, he pulled the broken wire to a covered spot and restored communication, which enabled the enemy mortars to be silenced. The intensity of the fire around him forced him to stay in his position until dark. Private Clapp's devotion to duty, at the risk of his life, reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Private Paul E. Fenlon, 16186550, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Sandbach, Germany, on 2 May 1945. The Anti-tank Company was ambushed by enemy fire while proceeding on a road to Sandbach, and forced to disperse. During the initial fire and the ensuing attack, casualties were sustained. Private Fenlon, a Company Cannoneer, moving over open ground through mortar, machine gun, and sniper fire, administered first aid to the wounded men, comforted and encouraged them, and assisted in moving them to positions of safety. Then, seeing a comrade lying in an area exposed to the enemy barrage he went to his aid and dragged the wounded man sixty yards to the safety of a draw. In so doing, he was severely wounded in the back by shell fragments. His courageous action and solicitude for his fellow soldiers reflect great credit upon Private Fenlon and the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Technician Fifth Grade Irving Green, 42055335, Medical Department, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kastl, Germany, on 21 April 1945. When the Intelligence and Reconnaissance Platoon was ambushed by a German force and caught in a cross fire of machine guns and rifles, Technician Green, a surgical technician, went to the assistance of a soldier who had been shot in the back and was lying exposed in an open field. From a prone position he administered first aid under intense grazing fire and carried him to safety. He then ran 75 yards under enemy fire to his jeep and secured blood plasma. As Technician Green was preparing the plasma for injection, a sniper's bullet broke the bottle and injured his hand. Despite the wound, Technician Green heroically continued to treat the soldier and later returned to the rear under enemy fire to arrange for evacuation. His outstanding courage, initiative, and solicitude for his fallen comrades reflect great credit upon Technician Green and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

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(GO No. 55, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 6 July 1945, cont'd)

First Sergeant Fritz M. Hargrove, 37238957, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 7 April 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Missouri.

Second Lieutenant Thomas C. Harris (then Technical Sergeant), 02026217, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Fraulautern, Germany, on 6 March 1945. Assigned to lead his anti-tank platoon into a defensive sector to be deployed as riflemen, Sergeant Harris, the Platoon Sergeant, personally directed and encouraged his men, then unfamiliar with rifle platoon tactics and under fire for the first time. Despite intermittent artillery and mortar fire and the proximity of three well-placed enemy pillboxes, Sergeant Harris led the men into position, gave them clear instructions, and by his calm example insured their high morale. When one platoon member was killed by machine gun fire, Sergeant Harris, assisted by two comrades, ignored the bursting mortar shells, and evacuated the dead soldier. His superb leadership and outstanding valor united the platoon and reflect great credit upon Sergeant Harris and the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

First Lieutenant Walter F. Hart, 01180528, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Kansas.

First Sergeant Oliver M. Henson, 6959810, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 12 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

Technical Sergeant Granville C. Jackson, 15014218, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eferding, Austria, on 4 May 1945. Assigned the mission of clearing SS troops from a portion of Eferding, Sergeant Jackson, a Platoon Sergeant of Company "B", deployed his men in squad column and moved in with caution. When the platoon reached the edge of town, it was fired on from enemy positions in houses. Sergeant Jackson quickly deployed his men for street fighting. Under his energetic and expert leadership the platoon launched an attack that succeeded in clearing twenty houses, killing three SS men, wounding numerous others, and taking 27 prisoners. While Sergeant Jackson was leaping over a wall to attack three cornered SS men during the latter part of the action, he was shot through the chest and seriously wounded. His able leadership and fearless disregard for personal danger reflect great credit upon Sergeant Jackson and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Second Lieutenant Pedro W. Kageorge, 0552411, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 16 March 1945. From his OJ in a house

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located about 75 yards from enemy lines Lieutenant Kageorge was ordered to fire a series of artillery barrages simulating an attack. When enemy mortar fire destroyed wire communications with his guns Lieutenant Kageorge was unable to control the fire that began falling on his own position. While his radio operator was trying to contact fire direction center, Lieutenant Kageorge coolly began to adjust friendly mortar fire on the enemy using another undamaged line, although shell fragments shattered the windows and a direct hit destroyed the adjacent room. When radio communication was finally established, Lieutenant Kageorge successfully directed a barrage to eliminate the enemy position. His calm, efficient application to duty reflects great credit upon Lieutenant Kageorge and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Staff Sergeant Rudolph E. Konkol, 16154409, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Sandbach, Germany on 2 May 1945. The Anti-tank Company was ambushed by enemy fire while proceeding on a road to Sandbach, and forced to disperse. During the initial fire and the ensuing attack, casualties were sustained. Sergeant Konkol, a Company Squad Leader, moving over open ground through the mortar, machine gun, and sniper fire, administered first aid to the wounded men, comforted and encouraged them, and assisted in moving them to positions of safety. While carrying a wounded comrade from the direct path of enemy fire, Sergeant Konkol was struck by a burst of machine gun fire and seriously wounded. His courageous action and solicitude for his fellow soldiers reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

Second Lieutenant (then Technical Sergeant), Paul E. Lafferty 02028832, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Ohio.

First Lieutenant Walter K. LaFond, 01177498, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Melbach, Germany, on 18-19 March 1945. Although warned by an MP officer at the Saar River that the road over which he planned to travel was heavily mined, Lieutenant LaFond, realizing that his communication would be the only contact between Artillery and Infantry units during an attack, carried out his mission of laying 23 1/2 miles of wire over unreconnoitered enemy ground. Ferrying his vehicles across the river, he carefully picked his way in complete darkness over the mined trail, flanked by dense woods, exercising continual control over his men. Menaced by enemy pillboxes, he laid the vital communication line, undiscovered by German personnel manning the fortifications. Due to his bravery, disregard of danger, and full realization of the importance of his mission, close Artillery support was assured to the Infantry, and last-minute battle changes were quickly relayed to all units. Lieutenant LaFond's extreme devotion to duty and his personal heroism reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

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(GC No. 55, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 6 July 1945, cont'd)

Captain Arthur J. O'Leary, 01180652, Field Artillery, 720th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Kirchburg, Austria, on 5 May 1945. When his unit hastily occupied a position to aid advancing infantry that was pinned down, Captain O'Leary, "C" Battery Commander, proceeded forward to obtain better observation of the enemy and, in doing so, saw a German soldier dash into a distant house. Without hesitation he pursued the German, cornered 18 armed enemy in the building, and made them surrender. Because of this bold and aggressive action by Captain O'Leary an advantageous observation post was established and effective artillery fires brought upon enemy forces hindering our advance. His cool judgment, decisiveness, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Captain O'Leary and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Staff Sergeant Laurence B. Perry, 34399093, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 10 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Alabama.

Captain Edmund E. Reuter, 01166165, Field Artillery, 720th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Mersig, Germany, on 16 March 1945. On a mission to convey vital information to an adjacent divisional artillery CP whose exact location was unknown, Captain Reuter, a Liaison Officer, contacted front line infantrymen and learned the radio frequency of the organization he sought. Unable to make contact, he judged the foe to be distance and advanced ten miles through complete blackout to a high point where he communicated with the CP, located it, and delivered the message. In return he was given map coordinates of vital enemy artillery positions to be delivered to the 65th Division Artillery. With an attack due to break before he returned Captain Reuter made a quick map reconnaissance and, disregarding the darkness and his ignorance of the terrain, moved to a hill just inside enemy territory. The resulting radio contact brought down artillery to neutralize the enemy gun positions. His initiative and outstanding courage reflect great credit upon Captain Reuter and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Corporal John P. Schneider, 12058994, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kreuzberg, Germany, on 4 April 1945. While his unit was halted and a maintenance crew was working to right an overturned vehicle, several enemy planes appeared. One plane circled the unit and came in on a strafing run. Immediately all personnel sought cover with the exception of Corporal Schneider. Corporal Schneider, manning the machine gun, which was the only anti-aircraft weapon available, remained at his post until the plane came within range, and then opened fire. As the plane passed overhead, smoke, caused by Corporal Schneider's fire, was trailing from its motor. A moment later it crashed in flames in a nearby field, killing the pilot. The bravery, calmness, and cool judgment exhibited by Corporal Schneider reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

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(GO No. 55, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 6 July 1945, cont'd)

First Lieutenant Roy W. Standridge, 01181770, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Franklauren, Germany, 10 to 17 March 1945. Serving as an Artillery Forward Observer, Lieutenant Standridge on one occasion took up an exposed position fifty yards from the enemy and under sniper machine-gun, and grenade fire in order to more effectively direct artillery concentrations. His accurate direction resulted in the destruction of a communication trench and high wall which shielded enemy movements. On another occasion the enemy, desperately trying to check the devastating artillery barrage which Lieutenant Standridge was directing, began dropping mortar shells on all buildings affording observation of their positions. Suddenly a mortar shell crashed through the roof of his OP and the concussion threw him to the floor. Quickly recovering, he continued to adjust fire and succeeded in destroying an enemy machine-gun 300 yards away. The determined execution of a hazardous mission and the extreme devotion to duty displayed by Lieutenant Standridge reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Major (then Captain) John E. Tilton, 0406839, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Corporal Gene Trubiano, 42052057, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Sandbach, Germany, on 2 May 1945. The Anti-tank Company was ambushed by enemy fire while proceeding on a road to Sandbach, and forced to disperse. During the initial fire and the ensuing attack, casualties were sustained. Corporal Trubiano, a Company Gunner, moving over open ground through mortar, machine gun, and sniper fire, administered first aid to the wounded men, comforted and encouraged them, and assisted in moving them to positions of safety. While heroically exposing himself to enemy fire to divert it from wounded men, Corporal Trubiano was struck in the back by shell fragments and seriously wounded. His courageous action and solicitude for his fellow soldiers reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Staff Sergeant Raymond L. Vissat, 13101570, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Lieutenant Colonel Elmer H. Walker, 019898, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Georgia.

Captain John S. Weaver, 0291416, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kappelberg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. When his boat was grounded on

a sandbar and subjected to machine gun fire during the Danube River crossing, Captain Weever, Artillery Liaison Officer, by his coolness and exemplary conduct, led his men in relaunching the vessel and successfully crossed the river. Then, realizing the need for communication, Captain Weever ingeniously utilized a commercial cable for his line and established the only contact with the opposite bank. When it was discovered that a Forward Observer Section was missing, Captain Weever, in addition to his liaison duties, assumed the duties of a forward observer himself. By his brilliant fire plans and accurate sensing, obtained at great personal risk, he quickly neutralized the enemy opposition and enabled Infantry elements to reach their primary objectives in comparative safety. Captain Weever's intense devotion to duty and his complete disregard of personal danger reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

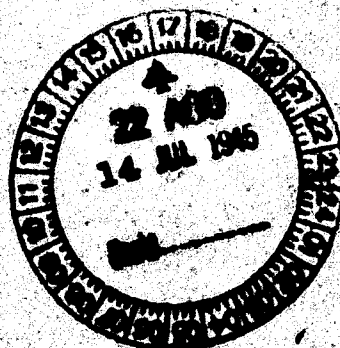
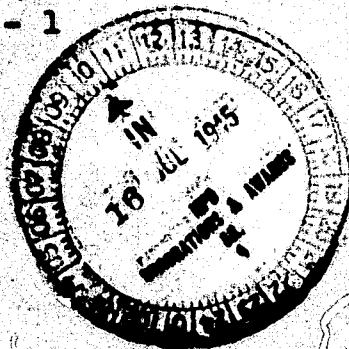

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR (POSTHUMOUSLY)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded posthumously to:

Private Stanley I. Sclarenc, 33940640, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Treuf, Germany, on 20 April 1945. When the Second Platoon of Company "C", establishing a position for a base of fire, was pinned down by the surprise attack of three enemy tanks which subjected the area to an intense barrage of 75mm shells, Private Sclarenc, acting Assistant BAR Man, moved to the aid of a wounded comrade who was lying in an exposed spot about 25 yards to the front. As the intense tank-gun fire burst all about him, Private Sclarenc, with undiminished courage, left his covered position and crawled slowly over to the wounded man. During his arduous progress a shell burst nearby and killed Private Sclarenc instantly. His outstanding courage under the most hazardous conditions and his unselfish devotion to the safety of one of his comrades, even to the sacrifice of his own life, reflect the greatest credit upon Private Sclarenc and the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

II - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to:

Technician Fifth Grade Joseph A. McCallister, Jr., 18059624, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Lauterhofen, Germany, on 22 April 1945. When the Intelligence and Reconnaissance Platoon was pinned down by intense machine gun, sniper, and burp-gun fire, Technician McCallister, a jeep driver, courageously moved forward to eliminate, singlehandedly, sniper positions that were holding up the convoy's advance. He crept up to a sniper armed with a rifle and grenades, and shot him through the head. Suddenly another sniper opened fire. Technician McCallister stealthily ran to the rear of the enemy and killed him. Then, advancing upon an enemy burp-gunner, in a boxcar, he wounded the German and routed him from his

position. Technician McCallister's efforts permitted his unit to set up a machine gun near a bridge to cover the crossing of his platoon. His demonstrated daring, skill, and extreme courage, facing the enemy alone, reflect the greatest credit upon Technician McCallister and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Corporal Ivan Moreman, 36672411, Medical Department, 259th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Saarlautern, Germany, from 18 to 19 March 1945. During a heavy enemy artillery barrage, which had scored a direct hit on the Second Battalion Aid Station, Corporal Moreman successfully led a litter team through the intense fire which had previously forced another team to return to cover. Evacuating a wounded man through 500 yards of exposed, contested terrain he returned to a Schu-mine field and rescued another casualty. That evening he went back alone to the Schu-mine area and spent five hours locating wounded men, then guided litter teams through the danger-infested field to bring in thirty casualties. He returned for a rest period the next morning, but when he learned there were more wounded in the area, he immediately continued to evacuate casualties throughout the entire day. His extreme heroism and persistent exposure to great hazards in his unalterable determination to save the lives of his comrades reflect the greatest credit upon Corporal Moreman and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

Major Harry W. Schaefer, 040577, Field Artillery, 368th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, from 7 March 1945 to 18 March 1945. During this period Major Schaefer, Battalion S-3, demonstrated outstanding ability in the handling and direction of the guns of his unit. In an organization augmented by the addition of weapons approximating two field artillery battalions, Major Schaefer created two fire-direction centers to provide for flexibility of fire, speed of operations, and adequate coverage of a wide sector. The effectiveness of the fire of the Battalion on many occasions proved the foresightedness and wisdom of his system of twin fire-direction centers. Due largely to Major Schaefer's planning and accomplishment the Battalion was able to fire twice its normal amount of missions. His devotion to duty and efforts for the improvement of his unit reflect great credit upon Major Schaefer and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

IV - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Captain John Blatsos, 01171460, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Saarlautern, Germany, 7 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. During this period Captain Blatsos, Liaison Officer, capably performed his duty of maintaining liaison between artillery and infantry over the central portion of the bridgehead at Saarlautern. Although his route was covered by observed machine-gun fire, Captain Blatsos daily returned to his Command Post for instructions and to inform his commander of the situation. He visited the observation posts of the forward observers, all of which were in the immediate presence of the enemy. Under the guidance of Captain Blatsos his young officers became efficient and courageous artillery observers. His personal conduct, his continuous display of courage, and careful guidance of those he taught reflect great credit upon Captain Blatsos and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

First Lieutenant Martin W. Buzan, 0328520, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria, from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Arizona.

Private First Class Theo B. Callison, 37728199, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 12 March 1945. A member of a four man patrol riding in two jeeps Private Callison, I and R Platoon Driver, displayed extraordinary coolness under fire when the scouting party was exposed to a heavy mortar barrage. With shells landing ten yards from the patrol's vehicles it was necessary to get the jeeps under cover. When his vehicle had pulled into a safe position, Private Callison, manning his .30 caliber machine gun, covered all hostile emplacements with continuous fire until the second jeep moved to a defilade position. With the enemy pinned down the patrol was able to continue on its mission, which resulted in the discovery of vital tactical information. The calmness and aggressiveness shown by Private Callison under fire reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Kansas.

Second Lieutenant James C. Coleman, 0549666, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Virginia.

First Lieutenant William H. Connelly, 0514384, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States

~~near ^{FRAU} ~~Schalding~~, Germany, on 18 March 1945. When the CP of Company "E", 260th Infantry, was subjected to an intense barrage of high velocity shell fire, Lieutenant Connelly, an attached Artillery Forward Observer, was engaged in observing and adjusting friendly artillery from the top floor of a partially wrecked building. Locating a German self-propelled gun, he directed fire upon it. The enemy countered with a fierce mortar barrage on his OP that wounded one of the men in the building. Despite the intense fire that was slowly reducing the building to rubble, Lieutenant Connelly continued to adjust artillery fire on the enemy positions. He succeeded in adjusting accurate fire that knocked out the enemy self-propelled gun with two direct hits and eliminated the threat to the OP. His outstanding ability and courage under fire reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Connelly and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.~~ *Refer to Go 76, Aug 23, 1945*

Private First Class Richard J. DeLanders, 11007621, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

First Sergeant John L. Dunne, 37189113, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Minnesota.

Technician Fourth Grade James W. Gambill, 34306638, Medical Department, 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Schalding, Germany, on 2-3 May 1945. Creeping forward within 100 yards of enemy positions that had disabled the lead tank of a column injuring one member of the crew and several infantrymen riding atop the vehicle, Technician Gambill, a Company "C" aid man, and a companion administered first aid and supervised the evacuation of the casualties. Shortly thereafter Technician Gambill and his companion advanced under close enemy observation and in line with hostile machine-gun fire to treat and evacuate another group of casualties. The next day the lead tank of an armored column was again struck by a Panzerfaust, killing two men and seriously wounding the rest of the crew. Unflinchingly, Technician Gambill moved up to render first aid to the casualties. His heroism under fire and disregard for personal safety were instrumental in saving the lives of many of his wounded comrades and reflect great credit upon Technician Gambill and the military service. Entered military service from North Carolina.

Second Lieutenant (then First Sergeant) Lewis L. Leavell, Jr., 02028804, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

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First Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant) Harold B. Lindsay, 0551025, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 17 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Kentucky.

Technician Third Grade Ernest Low, 32612555, Interrogation of Prisoner of War Team No. 194, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Private First Class Raymond W. Mann, 38356726, Medical Department, 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Schalading, Germany, on 2-3 May 1945. Creeping forward within 100 yards of enemy positions that had disabled the lead tank of a column, injuring one member of the crew and several infantrymen riding atop the vehicle, Private Mann, a Company "C" aid man, and a companion administered first aid and supervised the evacuation of the casualties. Shortly thereafter Private Mann and his companion advanced under close enemy observation and in line with hostile machine-gun fire to treat and evacuate another group of casualties. The next day the lead tank of an armored column was again struck by a Panzerfaust, killing two men and seriously wounding the rest of the crew. Unflinchingly, Private Mann moved up to administer first aid to the casualties. His heroism under fire and disregard for personal safety were instrumental in saving the lives of his wounded comrades and reflect great credit upon Private Mann and the military service. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Captain James C. McGuire, 0405833, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria, from 6 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Missouri.

Technician Fifth Grade Thomas J. McMahon, Jr., 32549172, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany on 12 March 1945. A member of a four man patrol riding in two jeeps, Technician McMahon, I and R Platoon Radio Operator, displayed extraordinary coolness under fire when the scouting party was exposed to a heavy mortar barrage. With shells landing ten yards from the patrol's vehicles it was necessary to get the jeeps under cover. As one pulled off the road to a defilade position, Technician McMahon, manning the .50 calibre machine gun on his jeep, covered all possible hostile emplacements with continuous fire until the second jeep moved out of the danger area. With the enemy pinned down the patrol was able to continue on its mission, which resulted in the discovery of vital tactical information. The calmness and aggressiveness shown by Technician McMahon under fire reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

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Second Lieutenant (then Technical Sergeant) Elmer F. Miller, 02026162, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Doerna, Germany, on 7 April 1945. To repulse an enemy counterattack Sergeant Miller, Platoon Leader of Company "I", quickly selected two strategic firing positions and personally led a squad to each position. His second squad was able to rout twelve Germans from houses with a few minutes sustained fire and intercepted an SS Officer bringing up bazooka teams. Despite the small-arms fire falling around him, Sergeant Miller seized a BAR and fired at enemy soldiers crossing a field and then continued back and forth between his squads, controlling them and pointing out targets as they appeared. After a successful defense Sergeant Miller directed his men in clearing half the town. His skill in disposing his men and his ability to maintain close control over their maneuvers reflect great credit upon Sergeant Miller and the military service. Entered military service from Minnesota.

Second Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant) John A. Moorhead, 02028863, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France and Germany from 6 March 1945 to 12 April 1945. Entered military service from Kentucky.

Second Lieutenant (then Technical Sergeant) James A. Meunster, 02028838, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Iowa.

Staff Sergeant Donald P. Muse, 18114270, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Grosselfingen, Germany, on 26 April 1945. Proceeding forward in attack formation, Sergeant Muse's platoon was suddenly pinned down by enemy machine-gun fire in open terrain. Although he was in an exposed area under direct enemy observation and heavy fire, Sergeant Muse, the acting Platoon Leader, crawled to a radio-telephone operator and reported the situation to the Company Commander. On the order to withdraw his men from under fire, Sergeant Muse signalled them back by squads, one squad being employed to supply a diverting fire while the next squad withdrew. His coolness under fire, exemplary courage, and good judgment enabled Sergeant Muse to evacuate his men without a casualty and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Captain William M. North, Jr., 0409123, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Regensburg, Germany, on 27 April 1945. Undertaking and carrying out the mission of crossing the Danube River in assault boats, Captain North, with coolness and courage, continued to direct his men in driving a deep wedge into the enemy lines. He organized and inspired his scattered platoons and, encountering intense enemy small-arms, bazooka, and mortar fire

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he dashed from one group to another, unmindful of his own safety, rendering encouragement and aid. His daring maneuvers and aggressive attacks drove the enemy back and accomplished his mission with a loss of only one man killed and six wounded, while an estimated 150 of the enemy were killed and an additional 100 were captured during the operation. His tactical ability and determined leadership reflect great credit upon Captain North and the military service. Entered military service from Nebraska.

First Lieutenant Richard M. Oestreich, 01534833, Medical Administrative Corps, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 4 May, 1945. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

First Lieutenant David E. Ott, 026522, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Prattling, Germany, on 26 April 1945. When Company "K" of the 260th Infantry was pinned down by concentrated small arms and automatic-weapons fire while entering the town of Prattling, Lieutenant Ott, an attached Artillery Forward Observer, instantly established radio communications with the artillery. Due to his exceedingly accurate fire direction the opposition was silenced with three shell bursts and the Company continued on its mission. Later he proceeded the most forward elements of the Battalion by 1,000 yards and from a high ridge, under hostile observation, directed artillery fire that accounted for 150 enemy casualties and the surrender of a platoon of German infantry. His bravery, fearlessness and extreme skill in directing artillery fire reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Ott and the military service. Entered military service from Louisiana.

Technician Fifth Grade Joseph H. Ross, 36837481, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 7 March 1945. Vital communication lines strung along a road between the Battalion and Regimental CP's were constantly severed by heavy 80mm mortar and machine gun fire. Technician Ross, a wire crew chief, proceeded to check the lines until he found an irreparable break. Then he led his crew in the laying of two new sections of wire on the hazardous route. Shortly after, when the wires were destroyed again, Technician Ross returned to the broken lines and traversed a mine-sown field under machine gun and mortar fire in order to pick up the broken ends. Assisted by his men, he completed the splices and re-established communications. His outstanding courage, leadership, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Technician Ross and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Corporal William H. Thompson, 39216009, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, from 8 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. During this period Corporal Thompson, a Wire Corporal, demonstrated a high degree of leadership and personal courage in his work repairing lines between Fire Direction Center and liaison officers with the

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Infantry Battalions. Whenever the numerous lines entering his switching central were blown out by the constant enemy shell fire, Corporal Thomson led his men out, day or night, in spite of heavy small-arms, mortar, and artillery fire, to repair lines and assure prompt transmission of fire orders. Through his efforts communications were maintained which aided materially in the accomplishment of the Battalion's mission. His tireless devotion to duty and his efficiency reflect great credit upon Corporal Thompson and the military service. Entered military service from Washington.

Captain (then First Lieutenant) John J. Valentine, 01322385, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Technician Third Grade Robert Willner, 31182623, Interrogation of Prisoner of War Team Number 150, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Rhode Island.

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to:

First Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant) Tommy V. McGannon, 0551C08, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Lauterhofen, Germany, 20-21 April 1945. Observing a large group of enemy soldiers preparing a defensive position, Lieutenant McGannon moved his patrol forward to attack when he found his five jeeps confronted with two enemy medium tanks to his left front, crews dismounted. Quickly deciding on a bold approach, Lieutenant McGannon, in the leading vehicle, ordered the patrol forward against the tanks with all guns firing. His tactics confused the tank crews and they abandoned the tanks, which Lieutenant McGannon destroyed to prevent recapture. After witnessing the action against the tanks, the original German force withdrew. The following day, Lieutenant McGannon and his patrol captured 24 German soldiers and set fire to five houses harboring the enemy. Later that day he evacuated wounded men under fire. His courage, resourcefulness, and bold aggressiveness reflect the greatest credit upon Lieutenant McGannon and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Private First Class Richard A. Resig, 33767752, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Kastl, Germany, on 21 April 1945. When the I & R Platoon, of which they were members, was ambushed by an enemy force Private Resig and a companion proceeded to attack one of the harassing machine guns, each from a different direction. Reaching a firing point, they shot and killed one of the machine gunners; whereupon the enemy dismounted their weapon and ran to the crest of a hill to set up and resume firing. When one enemy soldier returned for his rifle they shot and killed him. Rushing on up the hill, the boldness and speed with which Private Resig and his companion attacked bewildered the enemy and did not permit the German soldiers time to resume firing, with the result that the remaining enemy gun crew surrendered and the ambushed patrol was able to withdraw. The courageous and unhesitating action of Private Resig reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from

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Sergeant (then Corporal) Lawrence W. Thielen, 36294270, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Treffurt, Germany, on 4 April 1945. When three jeeps on a reconnaissance and route-marking mission were halted by heavy enemy machine-gun and sniper fire, Corporal Thielen moved forward under supporting fire to attack the entrenched positions. Creeping within twenty yards of a sniper, he traded fire with the German and killed him with one shot. Then, as two enemy machine gunners dismantled their weapon to move to a better defensive position, Corporal Thielen stealthily followed them. When they paused to set up their gun he killed both of them with rifle fire. Returning to the jeeps, he encountered an enemy motorcyclist, heavily armed, travelling down the road. Aided by a comrade, he caught the German in a deadly cross-fire and killed him. Because of his action the platoon was able to continue its mission unmolested. His aggressiveness and extreme bravery under fire reflect the greatest credit upon Corporal Thielen and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Technician Fourth Grade Emile V. Willemain, 31416226, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Kestl, Germany, on 2 April 1945. When the I & R Platoon, of which they were members, was ambushed by an enemy force Technician Willemain and a companion proceeded to attack one of the harassing machine guns, each from a different direction. Reaching a firing point, they shot and killed one of the machine gunners; whereupon the enemy dismounted their weapon and ran to the crest of a hill to set up and resume firing. When one enemy soldier returned for his rifle they shot and killed him. Rushing on up the hill, the boldness and speed with which Technician Willemain and his companion attacked bewildered the enemy and did not permit the German soldiers time to resume firing, with the result that the remaining enemy gun crew surrendered and the ambushed patrol was able to withdraw. The courageous and unhesitating action of Technician Willemain reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

II - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER POSTHUMOUSLY)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded Posthumously to:

First Lieutenant Fred L. Bumgarner, 02042834, Field Artillery, 65th Division Artillery. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Ittersdorf, Germany, on 16 March 1945. When Division Artillery was in position near Ittersdorf, Germany, Lieutenant Bumgarner, Division Artillery Communication Officer, supervised the laying and checking of communication lines between Headquarters and the Battalions. While engaged in this mission, he was constantly exposed to enemy fire but, disregarding the danger involved, continued to direct the checking and repairing of wires. In the course of his mission it

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was necessary that he traverse a heavily mined area. As he progressed through the mined locality the vehicle in which he was riding suddenly struck a land mine, and Lieutenant Bumgarner was instantly killed. His bravery under fire and staunch determination to complete a hazardous mission at the cost of his life reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Bumgarner and the military service. Entered military service from North Carolina.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUSLY)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 5, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Master Sergeant Oscar N. Morton, 6248004, Field Artillery, 65th Division Artillery. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Ittersdorf, Germany, on 16 March 1945. When Division Artillery was in position near Ittersdorf, Germany, Sergeant Morton, Division Artillery Communication Chief, layed and checked communication lines between headquarters and the Battalions. While engaged in this mission, he was constantly exposed to enemy fire but, disregarding the danger involved, continued checking and repairing wires. In the course of his mission it was necessary that he traverse a heavily mined area. As he progressed through the mined locality the vehicle in which he was riding suddenly struck a land mine, and Sergeant Morton was instantly killed. His bravery under fire and staunch determination to complete a hazardous mission at the cost of his life reflect great credit upon Sergeant Morton and the military service. Entered military service from New Mexico.

IV - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class Moyes, Barney, 39827615, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Dingelstadt, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Proceeding along a road without escort on a mission to contact elements of an Armored Division, Private Barney, a Jeep Driver of the I & R Platoon, and two companions were ambushed by an enemy force armed with rifles and automatic weapons. All three men were seriously wounded while dismounting from the vehicle. Private Barney, his cheek penetrated by a bullet, and his companions managed to crawl to a nearby ditch. There, with the aid of a rifle, a sub-machine gun, and a captured light machine-gun, they were able to pin down the Germans, despite the concentrated enemy fire that covered the area. Preventing the destruction of their vehicle and repulsing the enemy for a full hour, Private Barney and his comrades were finally relieved by an MP patrol and evacuated. His determination, fierce resistance, and indomitable courage in spite of his wound reflect great credit upon Private Barney and the military service. Entered military service from Idaho.

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Captain John T. Batts, 0386840, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Kentucky.

Captain Ernest L. Bell, 01283008, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Alabama.

First Lieutenant Bernhard S. Blumenthal, 01182067, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 5 April 1945 to 6 May 1945. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Staff Sergeant Carl J. Brothers, 38337166, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, on 14 March 1945. Leading a combat patrol deep into hostile territory, Sergeant Brothers was engaged in feeling out enemy strength and locating installations when he and his men were trapped by enemy artillery, mortar, and small arms fire. Through sheer courage and intrepidity Sergeant Brothers succeeded in evacuating the patrol from its hazardous position. Discovering that one man was missing, Sergeant Brothers alone braved the continuous fire and returned to the danger spot. Finding the missing man, who had sustained a severe shoulder wound and was suffering from shock, Sergeant Brothers, without regard for his own safety, carried his comrade back to the patrol's starting point, from which the wounded man was evacuated. His heroism and selfless devotion to his men reflect great credit upon Sergeant Brothers and the military service. Entered military service from Louisiana.

Second Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant) John J. Cappilla, Jr., 02026212, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Corporal Frederick F. Dartnell, 52574694, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Dintelstadt, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Proceeding along a road without escort on a mission to contact elements of an Armored Division, Corporal Dartnell, Reconnaissance NCO of the I & R Platoon, and two companions were ambushed by an enemy force armed with rifles and automatic weapons. All three men were seriously wounded while dismounting from the vehicle. Corporal Dartnell, shot through both legs, and his companions managed to crawl to a nearby ditch. There, with the aid of a rifle, a sub-machine gun, and a captured light machine gun, they were able to pin down the Germans, despite the concentrated fire that covered the area. Preventing the destruction of their

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vehicle and repulsing the enemy for a full hour, Corporal Dartnell and his comrades were finally relieved by an MP patrol and evacuated. His determination, fierce resistance, and indomitable courage in spite of his wound reflect great credit upon Corporal Dartnell and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

First Lieutenant Edward J. Delaney, 01043514, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Grasselfingen, Germany, on 26 April 1945. Taking command of Company "B" when the Company Commander was wounded, Lieutenant Delaney displayed initiative and outstanding ability in the performance of his duties. While two of his platoons were attacking near Grasselfingen, they were suddenly pinned down on an open ridge providing little cover, by heavy small arms and machine-gun fire from enemy positions 200 yards away. Seeing the urgent need for a rapid maneuver, Lieutenant Delaney fearlessly exposed himself to the fire and rallied his platoons in a marching fire that killed four Germans, wounded five, and resulted in the capture of seventeen. His exceptional bravery and leadership reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Delaney and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Staff Sergeant David Eisenberg, 42049527, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Second Lieutenant Paul F. Fagan, (then Staff Sergeant), 02026, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 4 May 1945. Entered military service from Ohio.

Private First Class Russell D. Fister, 36967984, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Fraulautern, Germany, from 6 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. With Company "C" in direct contact with the enemy, Private Fister made daily trips in his jeep during this period to pick up supplies from a supply point two miles to the rear. The enemy, quick to realize the importance of the trip, hurled mortar fire at the vehicles, set up machine guns along the route approximately 600 yards distant, and zeroed in on a bridge over which the driver had to pass. Private Fister, fully realizing the risk involved, showed no fear and coolly and rapidly completed the daily trips through heavy fire both day and night in order to bring up vital supplies. His outstanding courage and dependability reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Private First Class James C. French, 34736921, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, from 8 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. During this period Private French exhibited a continually high type of courage and aggressiveness on his night combat and reconnaissance patrol missions. Under hazardous circumstances, which included exposure to direct enemy mortar, machine-gun, artillery, and sniper fire, and encounters with enemy ambushes, Private French was outstanding in his readiness to meet the enemy and carry out his assigned mission.

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The patrols of which Private French was a member were always able to overpower or outmaneuver the enemy, and thereby obtain vital data on enemy strongpoints, pillbox locations, mortar positions, and minefields, which contributed to the successful attacks that penetrated the Siegfried Line. His close cooperation with his comrades, initiative, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Private French and the military service. Entered military service from Tennessee.

First Lieutenant George K. Hoblitzelle, (then Second Lieutenant 0514397, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, from 7 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. During this period Lieutenant Hoblitzelle, and Artillery Forward Observer, working with the most advanced elements of the infantry, displayed extreme courage and initiative in the performance of his duties. Establishing his OP's, he was subjected to small-arms fire as he travelled between his several observation points. On one occasion when his OP was subjected to direct fire he remained at his post supplying artillery data, completely disregarding his personal safety, and successfully silenced the enemy mortars. Lieutenant Hoblitzelle's courage and determination inspired the others about him to outstanding achievement. His courage, skill as an Artillery Observer, and high devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Hoblitzelle and the military service. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Captain Harold O. Karim, 0469003, Medical Corps, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Sergeant Robert J. B. Mahon, Jr., 13120389, Inf, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Dingelstadt, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Proceeding along a road without escort on a mission to contact elements of an Armored Division, Sergeant Mahon, Reconnaissance NCO of the I and R Platoon, and two companions were ambushed by an enemy force armed with rifles and automatic weapons. All three men were seriously wounded while dismounting from the vehicle. Sergeant Mahon, his hip penetrated by a bullet, and his companions managed to crawl to a nearby ditch. There, with the aid of a rifle, a sub-machine gun, and a captured light machine gun, they were able to pin down the enemy, despite the concentrated fire that covered the area. Preventing the destruction of their vehicle and repulsing the enemy for a full hour, Sergeant Mahon and his comrades were finally relieved by an MP patrol and evacuated. His determination, fierce resistance, and indomitable courage in spite of his wound reflect great credit upon Sergeant Mahon and the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

First Lieutenant Mathew S. Mathews, Jr., 01183123, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Nieder Gebraching, Germany, on 25 April 1945. When the advance of Company "E", 260th Infantry was halted by enemy entrenchments and artillery fire, Lieutenant Mathews, a Forward

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Observer and Liaison Officer, acted with skill and judgment in placing artillery fire that forced the enemy to withdraw its forces. In spite of an 88mm shell which exploded a short distance away, momentarily dazing him, he coolly directed fire which knocked out the gun. Lieutenant Mathews in clear view of the enemy directed fire missions by radio-telephone, skillfully placing white phosphorous and high explosive shells with such destructive effect that the enemy fled from the relentless creeping barrage. His initiative, leadership and outstanding courage under fire reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Mathews and the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

~~NY~~ Sergeant Ray W. Ogden, 16054102, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, from 6 March 1945 to 17 March 1945. During this period, as Communications Sergeant of Company "F", Sergeant Ogden frequently exposed himself to severe enemy machine-gun and mortar fire, while establishing and supervising communications between the Command Post and the front line platoons. While re-laying a section of wire cut by enemy artillery, Sergeant Ogden was severely wounded by a mortar fragment on 17 March and was hospitalized. By his disregard for his own safety and his exceptional devotion to duty he effectively maintained communication at all times and enabled his company to drive the enemy from long-held defensive positions. His valuable contribution to his organization's success reflects great credit upon Sergeant Ogden and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Technician Fifth Grade Elmer W. Osborn, 39290157, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Saarlautern, Germany, from 7 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. During this period Technician Osborn, Ammunition Driver with Headquarters Company, volunteered to transport loads of sensitive ammunition to front line positions. Making frequent trips, Technician Osborn drove his 2 1/2 ton vehicle through rubble-blocked streets, under direct observation of the enemy, running a gauntlet of enemy mortar, machine-gun, and small arms fire. Through his courage and skill he was able to complete many missions although his large vehicle presented a conspicuous target for the enemy. His untiring efforts enabled the maintenance of the required amount of ammunition at all times and greatly benefited the progress of front line troops. His courage, skill, and pursuit of duty under danger reflect great credit upon Technician Osborn and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Private First Class Raoul R. Poirier, 31284712, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 20 March 1945. Engaged in attacking strongly entrenched enemy positions, Private Poirier, a member of a rifle squad of Company "F", saw his squad leader hit by machine-gun fire. Leaving his cov-

cred position, he deliberately exposed himself to heavy enemy mortar, machine-gun, and small arms fire. Crawling within twenty yards of the enemy, he reached his comrade's side; then, heedless of his own peril, and despite intense enemy fire, he carefully carried the wounded squad leader to shelter and administered first aid. Although he himself was wounded while rescuing the injured man, Private Poirier's actions enabled his comrade to be evacuated to an aid station. His outstanding courage and disregard for his own safety reflect great credit upon Private Poirier and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Private First Class Louis Rogerson, 42049939, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Technician Fifth Grade Dale E. Rothacher, 35926697, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Fraulautern, Germany, from 6 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. During this period Technician Rothacher, Company "C" driver, exhibited aggressive determination in the continued execution of a hazardous mission. While his company was in direct contact with the enemy it was necessary that the supply point be maintained some distance behind the lines. The enemy, realizing the importance of moving supplies to forward elements of the company, kept the intervening distance from the front to the rear supply area under constant fire and observation. Technician Rothacher, driving a jeep through this contested area day or night, exposed to enemy machine-gun and mortar fire, greatly aided in maintaining an unhindered flow of supplies to the front line riflemen of his unit. His courage, calmness under fire, and high devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Technician Rothacher and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Private First Class Serapio Serenil, 38671009, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Fraulautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. While repairing a communication line over open ground, Private Serenil was subjected to enemy artillery, mortar, and machine-gun fire that had earlier wounded several men and damaged their vehicles. While splicing in wire to replace a blown-out section, he was hit twice in the right arm by shell fragments, but he completed his job before returning for aid. After receiving treatment he relieved the switchboard operator although he only had the use of one arm. The lines he helped to install proved vital not only in coordinating infantry actions, but in calling for artillery fire when other means had failed. His bravery and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Private Serenil and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Second Lieutenant William S. Smith, 0558066, Infantry, 260th Infantry. During this period Lieutenant Smith, Company "B" Weapons Platoon Leader, distinguished himself by his courageous leadership of supply patrols, bringing up ammunition, food, and water to various platoons under the constant enemy barrages. For 16 consecutive nights Lieutenant Smith, under steady mortar, artillery, and small arms fire, led his men forward with the supplies, without sustaining a single casualty and losing any of the equipment. With marked intrepidity and sound judgment Lieutenant Smith made a lone reconnaissance each day to insure a new and secure route for his patrol that night. On one occasion Lieutenant Smith led a patrol through heavy fire to evacuate three casualties from a forward OP. His outstanding initiative, effective leadership, and unswerving courage under fire reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Smith and the military service. Entered military service from Louisiana.

First Lieutenant George W. Thompson, Jr., 026062, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Linz, Austria, on 5 May 1945. While Battery "B" was in convoy proceeding toward Linz, with the purpose of occupying it, enemy artillery shells started to fall at the head of the column. Unhesitatingly, Lieutenant Thompson, Executive Officer, swung the Battery off the road into hasty positions and opened counterfire on the hostile forces within two and one-half minutes after leaving the road. As reported by observers, this fire was accurately placed. During this operation Lieutenant Thompson exercised excellent control over his unit and demonstrated great speed and efficiency. The keen judgment, skill, and leadership shown by Lieutenant Thompson reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Alabama.

Second Lieutenant Roswell C. Ware, (then Staff Sergeant), 02026176, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from New Jersey.

V - AWARD OF AIR MEDAL (2ND OAK LEAF CLUSTER)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Air Medal and Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster previously awarded, a 2nd Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

On a routine reconnaissance mission north of Struth Lieutenant Wendt, an Artillery Liaison Pilot, and his observer saw a concentration of German vehicles and infantry gathering to attack two companies of 8th Armored Division tanks. His observer immediately

From their plane Lieutenant Plantz and his pilot then directed four tanks in maneuvering cross country to attack the enemy from the rear. Because of this move the enemy concentration was broken up, six large vehicles burned, and the infantry put to flight. In spite of small arms fire hitting the plane and the danger of flying deep into enemy territory, Lieutenant Plantz accomplished the mission with great success. I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR (POSTHUMOUSLY)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is posthumously awarded to:

Sergeant Fausto J. Satriale, 32642141, Infantry (Armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For gallantry in action at Weis, Germany, on 24 January 1945. When one of the assault guns of his section was stalled in full view of the enemy Sergeant Satriale, Tank Commander of an Assault Gun Platoon, knowing the stalled tank's gun was inoperative, unhesitatingly ordered his own tank into an exposed position to draw enemy fire. The enemy fire of all descriptions, including rocket, artillery, and mortar, was concentrated upon Sergeant Satriale and his tank, allowing the disabled tank to withdraw. Exposing himself through the open turret hatch to locate the source of the enemy barrage, Sergeant Satriale was instantly killed when an enemy mortar shell landed and exploded on the tank. His initiative, striking courage, and heroic devotion to duty reflect the greatest credit upon Sergeant Satriale and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

II - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to:

First Lieutenant James L. Brummer (then Second Lieutenant), 01058738, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For gallantry in action in Linz, Austria, on 5 May 1945. Advancing with the forward elements of the I & R Platoon, Lieutenant Brummer, Regimental Liaison Officer, was exposed to enemy small-arms fire as he reached a bridge across the Traun River in Linz. With complete disregard for his personal safety, Lieutenant Brummer ran across the bridge toward the enemy, followed by three enlisted men. Reaching the opposite side, he observed an enemy force preparing the bridge for demolition. He surprised the Germans with his swift action and captured them. Surmising that enemy holding forces would be situated in the nearby woods, Lieutenant Brummer, accompanied by an enlisted man, advanced toward them under fire. Aggressively combing the woods, he captured 75 Germans, then returned to the bridge and neutralized the explosive charges. His unflinching heroism, calmness under fire, and inspiring leadership reflect the greatest credit upon Lieutenant Brummer and the military service. Entered military service from Minnesota.

First Lieutenant Stanton P. Kunzi, 01019315, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Egellingen, Germany, on 3 May 1945. Given the mission of reconnoitering the Regimental front along the Inns River, Lieutenant Kunzi, Company "A" Executive Officer led a ten-man patrol on a series of daring exploits. Boldly moving through enemy territory, Lieutenant Kunzi and his men surrounded and forced the surrender of a town and its garrison, seized a German vehicle and, proceeding with speed, attacked a roadblock defended by superior numbers. They routed fifteen defenders after inflicting casualties. With the patrol, Lieutenant Kunzi then moved into Suben, Austria, captured six SS-men, disarmed forty guards to liberate 700 Allied prisoners of war, and, after establishing a CP in the city, collected vast amount of German ordnance material. After being subjected to artillery fire and strafed by a hostile plane, he directed a search of the surrounding area. Lieutenant Kunzi then returned across the Inns River with his prisoners and selected future crossing sites. His aggressiveness, outstanding initiative and courageous leadership reflect the greatest credit upon Lieutenant Kunzi and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Captain Clayton D. Aukerman, Jr., 0417589, Field Artillery, 368th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 4 March 1945 to 6 May 1945. Entered military service from Illinois.

Sergeant Eben B. Chabot, 32356231, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Linz, Austria, on 5 May 1945. Sergeant Chabot, a Squad Leader of the I and R Platoon, accompanied the forward reconnaissance elements preceding the Infantry with a mission of securing a railroad bridge across the Traun River in Linz. Reaching the bridge, he took cover from the enemy small arms fire, originating from the opposite side. However, seeing a Lieutenant dash across the bridge toward the enemy, Sergeant Chabot voluntarily left his cover and followed the officer, despite the danger of the mined structure being blown up at any time. Surprising the numerically superior enemy force, they took the Germans prisoner. Sergeant Chabot then followed the Lieutenant into the nearby woods and aided in capturing 75 prisoners. Returning to the bridge, he proceeded to cut demolition wires. His extraordinary bravery and voluntary participation in a mission of grave danger reflect great credit upon Sergeant Chabot and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Major Wendell C. Compton, 0340285, Ordnance Department, 765th Ordnance Light Maintenance Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 9 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Indiana.

Captain Hector D. Ellis, 01306395, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Major Samson D. Entin, 0416459, Medical Corps, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Illinois.

Warrant Officer Junior Grade William H. Free, W-2129532, USA, 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 21 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Sergeant James E. Friel, 31445416, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Linz, Austria, on 5 May 1945. Sergeant Friel, Squad Leader of the I & R Platoon, accompanied the forward reconnaissance elements preceding the Infantry with a mission of securing a railroad bridge across the Traun River in Linz. Reaching the bridge, exposed to enemy small-arms fire, he observed that it was prepared for demolition. Realizing the imminent possibility of the bridge being blown up, he voluntarily started to cross in full view of the enemy and, stopping at the middle of the span, proceeded to tear out the demolition wires with his hands. Moving from the middle of the bridge to the far end, he removed demolition charges despite the fact that the enemy was heavily entrenched nearby. He then went on to help clear out enemy forces in the vicinity. His unflinching bravery and voluntary execution of an extremely hazardous mission reflect great credit upon Sergeant Friel and the military service. Entered military service from Rhode Island.

Master Sergeant Robert L. Green, 6388131, Infantry (Armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 22 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Georgia.

First Lieutenant John C. Hamil (then Second Lieutenant), 0524063, Infantry, Cannon Company 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. Ordered to assist the Third Battalion Commander in repulsing an enemy counterattack, Lieutenant Hamil and his forward observer crew evaded heavy enemy fire from self-propelled guns, machine guns, and mortars that covered the route and reported to the trapped Battalion. When a snapped radio aerial interrupted communications between an OP and the gun positions, Lieutenant Hamil quickly located another and reestablished the vital communications. Under heavy bombardment Lieutenant Hamil directed cannon fire on three separate waves of enemy tanks, knocking out one self-propelled gun with a direct hit, crippling another, and throwing back all three attacks. During the action intense enemy fire made the OP positions untenable and forced changes of location, but the mission was nevertheless accomplished without interruption. His initiative, courage, and disregard for his own safety reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Hamil and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Second Lieutenant Wayne M. Hamilton (then Technical Sergeant), 02028828, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

Warrant Officer Junior Grade Paul R. Harris, W-2128026, USA, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Maryland.

Private Lester F. Henry, 34777308, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. When a platoon of the Anti-Tank Company was sent to Struth to help neutralize an enemy attack, Private Henry, a gunner, quickly brought effective fire on enemy tanks and self-propelled guns. It was necessary to place his gun in a new position in full view of the tanks, and the exposed location immediately drew heavy fire from the enemy. Despite the hazard Private Henry continued to fire on the tanks until his gun was jammed by a broken firing case. During the action Private Henry's gun shield was twice pierced by fragments from the enemy's accurate fire, but his bold action and accurate fire forced the enemy tanks to seek cover and impaired their effectiveness. His courage under fire and loyal determination reflect great credit upon Private Henry and the military service. Entered military service from North Carolina.

Captain Ralph B. Loeper, 0317901, Infantry, 269th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 15 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

First Lieutenant Donald H. Melaney, (then Second Lieutenant), 0557093, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Neumarkt, Germany, on 20 April 1945. Assigned the mission of going forward to support Company "K" with Cannon Company fire, Lieutenant Melaney, a Forward Observer, moved for 800 yards across an open field under heavy enemy white phosphorus and artillery fire and continued to expose himself in order to analyze the situation, locate proper targets, plan defensive fires, and adjust fire on targets. In the ensuing action Lieutenant Melaney kept his unit fully informed of the tactical situation and delivered accurate fire on the enemy. His determination and unflinching courage under fire reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Melaney and the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Staff Sergeant Joseph S. Mickalonis, 32660276, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Scharding, Austria, on 3 May 1945. When Company "A" crossed the Inns River in its mission of establishing a bridgehead at Scharding, it found itself without rations and less than the basic load of ammunition, due to the rapidly moving situation. Aware of the crisis, Sergeant Mickalonis, Supply Sergeant, volunteered to get the vital supplies to his unit. On his own initiative he commandeered several civilian canoes and with the assistance of four former Russian soldiers loaded the frail craft with ammunition and rations. Although unable to swim, he made repeated trips across the swift current, exposed to enemy fire. Working far into the night in the rain and cold, he supplied his company with a full day's rations and an additional basic load of ammunition. The high courage, initiative, and complete disregard for personal safety displayed by Sergeant Mickalonis reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

First Sergeant Robert J. Moss, 20947379, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 17 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Idaho.

Second Lieutenant Isham P. Nelson, 0529858, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kapfelberg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. When a crossing of the Danube River was made by Company "C", 261st Infantry, in the face of heavy sniper and automatic weapons fire, Lieutenant Nelson, a Reconnaissance Officer acting as an Artillery Forward Observer, directed with coolness and decision the operations of his section which were so vital in the ensuing action. In spite of the fact that the section of three men, loaded down with their cumbersome equipment, was the special target of the enemy, who directed intense fire upon it, radio communication was quickly established under the able leadership of Lieutenant Nelson. Repeatedly exposing himself, Lieutenant Nelson successfully directed fire upon the enemy positions and in one case neutralized a counterattack. His cool courage, capable leadership, and unswerving devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Nelson and the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Technician Fourth Grade Harry Pappalardo, (then Private), 52642836, Infantry (Armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Weis, Germany, on 24 January 1945. Entering the town of Weis, the Assault Gun Platoon was exposed to flares and subjected to an intense barrage by enemy weapons. Noticing his Platoon Leader dismounted and having difficulty in leading the tanks into town, Private Pappalardo, a tank driver, ordered his assistant to take over and, dismounting from his tank in the face of withering artillery, small-arms, and mortar fire, assisted his platoon leader in the hazardous task. Through Private Pappalardo's efforts the tanks were led to a sheltered firing position in the town without damage to any of the vehicles. Private Pappalardo's conspicuous heroism, outstanding initiative, and devotion to duty were an inspiration to his platoon and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

First Sergeant Robert A. Reich, 37052397, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Missouri.

Staff Sergeant Norman H. Schatz, 36383144, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 10 March 1945 to 9 May 1945. Entered military service from Illinois.

Technical Sergeant James D. Stanley, (then Sergeant), 33629048, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Virginia.

Technician Fifth Grade Kenneth H. Stewart, 31391911, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Private First Class Carl A. Swartz, 42092901, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. When the jeep in which he was travelling was hit by an artillery shell, injuring three men, Private Swartz, a Platoon Messenger, though momentarily dazed by the explosion, went about to render immediate medical attention to the wounded men. Under intense enemy mortar and artillery fire, he carried the three men to cover in a nearby ditch where he administered first aid. Summoning medical aid men to care for his comrades, Private Swartz seized the machine gun from the jeep, selected a firing position, and directed supporting fire for the rifle troops who were attacking the enemy under fierce fire. His solicitude for his comrades, outstanding courage under enemy fire, and disregard for personal safety reflect great credit upon Private Swartz and the military service. Entered military service from New York.



For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Linz, Austria, on 5 May 1945. Private Willstatter, a scout of the I and R Platoon, accompanied the reconnaissance elements preceding the Infantry on a mission of securing the railroad bridge across the Traun River in Linz. Reaching the bridge, he encountered enemy small-arms fire originating from the opposite side. Seeing an officer and an enlisted man leave cover and dash across the bridge toward the enemy, Private Willstatter jumped up and followed them, despite the danger of the heavily-mined structure being blown up at any time. Surprising the numerically superior enemy force, they took the Germans prisoner. Private Willstatter then entered the nearby woods under fire, and with the other two men succeeded in capturing seventy-five hostile soldiers. With the officer, he continued to clear the woods until they were safe. His extreme heroism and voluntary participation in a mission of great danger reflect great credit upon Private Willstatter and the military service. Entered military service from Minnesota.

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to

Lieutenant Colonel Stafford A. Cooper, 0408719, OAC-AA, 546th Anti-Aircraft Artillery AW Battalion (Mbl). For gallantry in action at Scharding, Austria, on 2 May 1945. Colonel Cooper, Commanding the 546th Anti-Aircraft Artillery AW Battalion (Mbl), accompanied the first assault wave of the Third Battalion, 261st Infantry, as it crossed the Inn River. When the advance of the infantry was impeded by a high wall, Colonel Cooper boldly advanced forward of the troops on a personal reconnaissance of the area to seek an exit away from the river. He broke into a hospital which was affording the enemy excellent observation and disconnected all lines to the switchboard so that no calls could be transmitted to the German garrison. Then, in order to prevent occupants of the building from leaving, Colonel Cooper personally guarded the door until the arrival of friendly troops. His outstanding leadership, foresightedness, and complete disregard for his own safety reflect the greatest credit upon Colonel Cooper and the military service. Entered military service from Louisiana.

First Lieutenant Fred C. Grieco, 01013939, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For gallantry in action at Weis, Germany, on 24 January 1945. While leading his Platoon in an attack against enemy pill boxes, armored vehicles, and fortifications of the Siegfried Line, Lieutenant Grieco, Platoon Leader of the Assault Gun Platoon, abandoned the safety of his turret and mounted the back deck of his tank to man the 50 caliber M. A. gun when his unit came under heavy enemy small-arms and automatic weapons fire. In full observation of the enemy he directed streams of fire into enemy positions to designate targets for the rest of the platoon. Wounded by shell fragments and once knocked down by concussion, Lieutenant Grieco himself set fire to several enemy vehicles and continued to lead his platoon until the enemy positions had been neutralized and the hostile tanks destroyed or driven off. Not until the completion of his mission did he consent to having his wound treated. His inspiring aggressiveness and heroic disregard for his personal safety reflect the greatest credit upon Lieutenant Grieco and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

II - AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Soldier's Medal is awarded to:

Sergeant Robert W. Garrett, 36521053, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy in Quierschied, Germany on 21 March 1945. When a building containing the Company "E" ammunition supply caught fire at night, it was impossible, because of the rapidly spreading conflagration, to remove any of the mortar shells, hand and rifle grenades, and rifle ammunition. The men quartered in the burning structure and in adjoining buildings were awakened and evacuated to a safe area, but it was discovered that three of them were still missing. Without hesitation, Sergeant Garrett rushed into a burning building with shells exploding about him and checked each room. Unsuccessful in his search, he continued into an adjacent house and there located the missing men. Rousing them, he sent them to join the Company and continued to check until certain that both buildings were vacated. His extraordinary heroism, which was instrumental in saving the lives of three of his companions, reflects great credit upon Sergeant Garrett and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Private First Class Jess Lewis, 35244877, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy in Linz, Austria, on 17 May 1945. Private Lewis, one of a group of men who had decided to swim across the Danube River, was among the first to reach the opposite shore. Looking back, he discovered that Private First Class Cleon J. Pidgeon was having difficulty in the middle of the river. Quickly realizing the desperate plight of his companion, Private Lewis secured a large board and, dragging it after him, swam out to the drowning man. Placing the board under the arms of the exhausted man, Private Lewis succeeded in pushing him through the swift current to the bank, where he was revived. The quick thinking and heroic action of Private Lewis reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUSLY)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Private Harry A. Chapanian, 31223072, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Passau, Germany, on 2 May 1945. On a four-man reconnaissance patrol to seek information regarding tank obstacles and enemy anti-tank positions, Private Chapanian, a rifleman of Company "F", and his companions, after getting the information, discovered and killed four enemy snipers on the return trip. When his patrol leader was wounded by a sniper, Private Chapanian moved him to safety in a nearby building and took command of the patrol. While leading his men back, he killed another German sniper but was himself wounded in the leg. Continuing in spite of the pain, he encountered two Germans armed with a machine pistol and a Panzerfaust and immediately shot and wounded

one of them. In the ensuing heavy fire dual another patrol member was wounded and Private Chapanian was killed while maneuvering for position; but the remaining member of the patrol gained the objective and relayed the reconnaissance information to the commander of the armored elements. His outstanding initiative courage under intense enemy fire, and self-sacrifice reflect great credit upon Private Chapanian and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

IV - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (2ND OAK LEAF CLUSTER)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal and the Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster previously awarded, a Second Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

First Lieutenant Robert S. Lard, 0533560, Field Artillery, 808th Tank Destroyer Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Langensalza, Germany, on 5 April 1945. When his platoon was assigned a mission to support a night attack on the town of Langensalza, Lieutenant Lard, a Platoon Leader of Company "C", went forward in a jeep to reconnoiter and was subjected to sniper and small-arms fire. Lieutenant Lard returned to initiate the attack and, mounting the lead tank destroyer, advanced under considerable small-arms and Panzerfaust fire from the buildings ahead. Locating the largest concentration of fire which was holding up the attack Lieutenant Lard maneuvered his destroyer forward, and, at point blank range, directed devastating fire upon the enemy position, which promptly caused the surrender of 40 Germans. His initiative, leadership, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Lard and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

V - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

Colonel Julian H. George, 08421, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Bad Abbach and Pocking, Germany, on 29 April 1945 and 4 May 1945. Ordered to seize and hold a restraining line south of the Danube River, Colonel George skillfully deployed and coordinated his command in a manner that forestalled the escape of an entire German battalion, which was forced to surrender. On 4 May 1945 Colonel George, realizing the urgency of continuing pursuit of the enemy, successfully crossed the Inn River with his entire command before any other Infantry Regiment had completed its scheduled passage over the single available bridge. Always at the head of his Regiment throughout the Division's headlong advance through Germany and Austria, Colonel George unerringly anticipated and surmounted all difficulties. His able coordination of his command and sterling leadership, reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

VI - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 20 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant Charles L. Babcock, 0556956, Infantry, 257th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Neumarkt, Germany, 20 April 1945. While Lieutenant Babcock was crossing an open field with his platoon a heavy enemy artillery barrage opened up and inflicted several casualties. Some of his men, undergoing their first shelling, became confused and panicky. Disdaining personal cover, Lieutenant Babcock raced back 100 yards through flying shell fragments to reassure and direct the men. Then, still under heavy fire he picked his way back and forth across the field, assisting the aid men with wounded, and insuring that his command was properly deployed and under cover before returning to report the situation. The next day Lieutenant Babcock personally discovered and directed the removal of a seriously-ill American prisoner in a Neumarkt hospital and liberated eight American PW's hiding in a house. He then captured the civilian leader of resistance in Neumarkt and later exposed himself to rifle fire while searching for survivors in two blasted tanks. His superb qualities of leadership, initiative and aggressiveness reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Babcock and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Lieutenant Colonel Henry S. Beeler, 0286503, Corps of Engineers, 206th Engineer Combat Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Lohstadt, Germany, on 26 April 1945. Given the mission of constructing a trestle bridge across the Danube River, Colonel Beeler, Commanding Officer of the 206th Engineer Combat Battalion, not only directed the construction of the bridge in record time, but did it in the face of enemy resistance that forced a change of site on two separate occasions. Colonel Beeler's personal reconnaissance, under enemy fire, procured invaluable information for a favorable bridge site. Ten hours and fifteen minutes after construction was started tanks and trucks were rolling across the river. In the assault phase after the construction Colonel Beeler's men rendered vital assistance. His personal leadership, initiative, and aggressiveness immeasurably expedited and assisted the 55th Infantry Division's Danube River crossing and reflect great credit upon Colonel Beeler and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Major Robert S. Cockroft, 0423515, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 22 March 1945 to 28 April 1945. Entered military service from Tennessee.

Sergeant Robert L. Dumas, 38342291, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 15 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

Chief Warrant Officer LaVoyce Hammer, W-2119378, USA, 565th Signal Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

First Lieutenant Vincent R. Haviza (then Second Lieutenant), 01326447, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Lahr, Germany, on 22 April 1945. Attacking across a long open ridge, Lieutenant Haviza and his platoon were brought under accurate artillery, mortar, and small-arms fire. Their advance was halted, but with characteristic coolness and quick thinking, Lieutenant Haviza moved his men over the ridge and set up a temporary outpost, then went to arrange for medical aid and the evacuation of the wounded. Later, when his platoon lost communication with the rest of the company, it was surrounded and attacked by a large German force. Lieutenant Haviza organized a patrol to contact the company, but it was driven back five times by the volume of the enemy fire. Changing his tactics, he launched a fierce attack and succeeded in breaking through to safety. His courage under fire and outstanding leadership reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Haviza and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Staff Sergeant Laverne L. Hedgecock, 7087191, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 29 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Georgia.

Private First Class Robert L. Lesh, 15134584, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Fraulautern, Germany, on 18 and 19 March 1945. When a lineman was needed to accompany front-line troops and lay communication lines along the route of advance, Private Lesh volunteered for the task. Throughout the mission he was constantly exposed to enemy small-arms, mortar, and artillery fire, but he worked steadily and fearlessly throughout the night to keep his lines in operation. At one time, he was alone in the forward area when a company fell back to reorganize. After he had returned to the CP, Private Lesh guided aid men in locating wounded men, retracing his way to the front with them, under the same heavy fire. His selflessness and courage under fire reflect great credit upon Private Lesh and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

First Lieutenant Robert E. Long, 0549650, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Neumarkt, Germany, from 20 April 1945 to 22 April 1945. Leading the Mortar Platoon of Company "M" in support of the attack on Neumarkt, Lieutenant Long moved out in front to select firing positions and cover the advance of the rifle companies. His men were suddenly brought under enemy artillery fire, suffering five casualties.

Promptly, Lieutenant Long retaliated with mortar fire, bombarding all possible enemy OPs. Seeing the flash of binoculars from a church steeple, he concentrated fire on it and successfully reduced enemy firing efficiency. His accuracy was confirmed when, capturing the town, Lieutenant Long prepared to use the steeple for his own OP and discovered the bodies of two German soldiers killed by his mortar fire. From this new OP Lieutenant Long then continued to direct fire on the enemy installations. His outstanding leadership and alertness reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Long and the military service. Entered military service from Iowa.

Private First Class Abner J. Meinema, 39216039, Corps of Military Police, Military Police Platoon, 65th Infantry Division. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Washington.

Sergeant Alfred G. Mueller, 32960147, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Pfeffenhofen, Germany, on 21 April 1945. When his patrol was ambushed in a valley by machine gun fire from both flanks, Sergeant Mueller, a Squad Leader of Company "M", immediately brought his mounted machine gun into action. His vicious fire covered his withdrawal to a relatively protected position behind a hill. Quickly reassembling his machine gun on a ground tripod mount, he set it up in position beside his jeep in full view of the enemy. Despite heavy enemy machine-gun and rifle fire from three sides, Sergeant Mueller held his ground and, bravely laying down a blanket of sustained fire until he was hit in the shoulder by an enemy bullet, enabled other patrol members to withdraw. His exemplary courage under fire and his exercise of initiative and perseverance reflect great credit upon Sergeant Mueller and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Private First Class John W. O'Neil, 20517979, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. When his battalion was attacked by a strong enemy force in Struth, Private O'Neil, a Machine Gunner of Company "M", under a withering hail of automatic weapon and small-arms fire, displaced his machine gun to help repel the attack. Seeing friendly riflemen pinned down nearby, Private O'Neil, carrying his machine gun, advanced unhesitatingly in the face of fire until he was able to give direct support to the troops and cover their actions. When all the riflemen had withdrawn, Private O'Neil backed slowly toward the edge of town, still harassed by fierce return fire, until he reached a new defense line. Setting up his gun, he again offered direct support to the troops. His initiative and utter disregard for his own safety reflect great credit upon Private O'Neil and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Staff Sergeant Gustave A. Schaub, Jr., 38536918, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Struth, Germany, on 7 April 1945. During a fierce enemy counterattack

Sergeant Schaub, a Company "M" Machine-gun Section Leader, after establishing a road block on the edge of town, observed riflemen of Company "L" battling against superior numbers. Courageously making his way to the Company "L" Commander across 200 yards of open, fire-covered terrain, he volunteered the services of his machine-gun section. Upon request of the Company Commander he displaced his section to the right flank of Company "L" and, despite the intense enemy fire, proceeded to give much-needed supporting fire to the hard-pressed riflemen. The enemy attack was turned back and the aggressive, fearless action of Sergeant Schaub was of material assistance in the repulse. His bravery, initiative, and leadership reflect great credit upon Sergeant Schaub and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Staff Sergeant Henry L. Simpson, 38C20986, Infantry (armored), 74th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France and Germany from 16 February 1945 to 30 April 1945. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Second Lieutenant Donald A. Smith (then Technical Sergeant), 02028841, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Colorado.

Technical Sergeant Gustave Springer, 12143425, Signal Corps, 565th Signal Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Second Lieutenant George B. Strickland (then Technical Sergeant), 02015820, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kapfelberg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. After an assault crossing of the Danube River the weapons platoon of Company "B", led by Sergeant Strickland, was held up by intense enemy machine-gun fire. Deploying his platoon in a flanking movement, Sergeant Strickland succeeded in destroying the enemy machine-gun position and re-joined the Company. When the Company was halted by sniper fire, he exposed himself to enemy fire and observation to bring up his machine guns and direct supporting fire on the enemy's positions. Then with the Company again pinned down by heavy enemy machine-gun and sniper fire, Sergeant Strickland dashed across an open area in full observation of the foe, summoned his mortar section, and returned over the same area to go into position. The mortars were set up, and their accurate fire neutralized the enemy positions, enabling the Company to continue. The initiative, leadership, and courage displayed by Sergeant Strickland reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from North Carolina.

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R E S T R I C T E D

Second Lieutenant Harold W. Weaver, (then First Sergeant), 22015821, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Hildenbrandhausen, Germany, on 4 April 1945. While leading the infantry element of a combined Tank Destroyer-Infantry Unit Sergeant Weaver, ~~of~~ Company "C", riding in the point vehicle as a scout, was met by Panzerfaust fire. Dismounting, he moved forward to determine enemy resistance and received heavy small-arms and bazooka fire. After making a quick reconnaissance he organized the attack, deploying the Tank Destroyer unit on a flanking movement while he set up a base of fire. Moving his men forward into position he directed a steady stream of fire toward the enemy position that caused the enemy to retreat with the loss of four killed and nine captured. Sergeant Weaver reorganized his unit, moved on to Hildenbrandhausen, driving out the defending Germans there, and set up defensive positions. His exemplary leadership, bravery under fire, and cool judgment reflect great credit upon Sergeant Weaver and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Private First Class Verdun R. Wilson, 31415347, Corps of Military Police, Military Police Platoon, 65th Infantry Division. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Treffurt, Germany, on 4 April 1945 and 5 April 1945. When a military police jeep escort and guide for a convoy of engineer trucks carrying Bailey Bridge equipment was requested by G-3, Private Wilson volunteered for the mission. The 30-mile round trip over a winding, one-way dirt road through the hills involved the hazard of driving blackout in pitch darkness. Private Wilson had not previously been over the route and was forced to travel alone because no other Military Police personnel were available at the time. As a result of his successful accomplishment of the mission, the Werra River was bridged on schedule and the Division Command Post, transportation, and support troops crossed the following day. His willingness, outstanding initiative, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Private Wilson and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.



I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to:

First Sergeant Ellis W. Blanchard, 36054442, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For gallantry in action near Gross-Gerau, Germany, on 24 March 1945. During an attack against enemy positions Sergeant Blanchard was severely wounded in the back and arm when the tank in which he was serving as a gunner was hit by panzerfaust fire. Without regard for his own safety, under fire, and despite his injuries, he went to the aid of his Company Commander, who was also seriously wounded, dragged him to cover, and administered first aid. He then crept up on a foxhole and captured a German soldier who was menacing the positions of the tank crewmen, now dismounted from the flanking tank. His grim determination, heroism in saving the life of his Company Commander, and loyal devotion to duty, reflect the greatest credit upon Sergeant Blanchard and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Private First Class William J. Crowley, Jr., 36841720, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action near Lauterhofen, Germany, on 21 April 1945. Private Crowley, a Company "M" Driver, was driving the lead vehicle of a ten-jeep patrol that was ambushed in a narrow valley. Caught in an intense crossfire by enemy machine-gun and rifle fire, his jeep was immediately disabled and all its occupants, excepting Private Crowley, took cover. Despite the entreaties of his comrades to withdraw to safety, he fearlessly braved the intense enemy concentration and fired at hostile positions with the machine gun mounted on his vehicle. Painfully wounded in the hip and despite considerable loss of blood, he continued to harass the enemy. Rapidly growing weaker, he sought to lift the machine gun from its mount and carry it to the depression where his companions were under cover. His unflinching bravery enabled the second vehicle in the patrol column to reach safety. His extraordinary heroism at the risk of his life reflects the greatest credit upon Private Crowley and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

II - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

Captain Robert L. Kaiser, 01165882, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 10 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

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(GO No. 60, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 19 July 1945, cont'd)

First Lieutenant Mathew S. Mathews, Jr., 011831231, FA, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Regensburg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. Immediately after the assault crossing of the Danube River by a rifle company to which he was attached, Lieutenant Mathews, an Artillery Forward Observer, was pinned down by intense machine-gun and artillery fire. Realizing the importance of artillery in consolidating the bridgehead in a minimum of time, Lieutenant Mathews, disregarding the danger, exposed himself to the enemy fire and worked his way forward until he had gained an advantageous observation post. Although forward of the leading Infantry elements and subjected to hostile fire, he directed and adjusted friendly artillery on enemy positions, knocking out an 88mm battery and then eliminating several machine-gun nests. His courageous actions and unswerving persuasion of his mission reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Mathews and the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant Emanuel Adler, 01583644, Quartermaster Corps, 65th Quartermaster Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from California.

Captain Harold G. Armstrong, 01594004, Quartermaster Corps, 65th Quartermaster Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Michigan.

Major Kenneth R. Brown, 0217823, Field Artillery, 720th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 8 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Iowa.

First Lieutenant Norman D. Cobb, Jr., 01014140, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Neumarkt, Germany, on 21 April 1945. When the riflemen of the 259th Infantry had been forced to take cover from heavy enemy fire, Lieutenant Cobb, a Company "A" Platoon Leader, continued to attack until his tank was destroyed by a German anti-tank gun. Although wounded in both legs, he dismounted, located the anti-tank gun, and fired his pistol at the crew with complete disregard for his own safety. Still exposing himself, he ran to another tank of his platoon to warn the crew of the menacing German gun. As he reached the tank, it too was destroyed by enemy fire. His strength gone, Lieutenant Cobb contacted the Infantry commander and gave him the location of the enemy positions before he permitted himself to be evacuated. His fortitude and selfless courage reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Cobb and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Sergeant Leniar C. Covey, 38020385, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Neumarkt, Germany, on 21 April 1945. When his tank was destroyed by enemy fire during the attack upon Neumarkt, Sergeant Covey, tank commander, helped evacuate a comrade who had been wounded and was exposed to machine gun fire. Sergeant Covey, disregarding the danger, assisted the soldier from the demolished tank and accompanied him through the enemy fire to a covered position. Then, until evacuation to an aid station was possible, Sergeant Covey remained in the danger area to administer first aid and comfort the wounded man. Sergeant Covey's valorous conduct under fire and his disregard of personal safety to aid another soldier reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Private Donald W. Elsen, 36844451, Signal Corps, 565th Signal Company. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Furstenzell, Germany, on 3 May 1945. Among the first troops to occupy Furstenzell, Private Elsen noticed a German Red Cross Van leaving a hospital. With a companion, he stopped the van to investigate. Told that it contained evacuated German casualties with amputated limbs, Private Elsen opened the rear door and discovered nine able-bodied soldiers in the vehicle. A further search disclosed hidden small arms, ammunition, and food. While the Germans were marched to a PW enclosure, Private Elsen, observing that an enemy soldier was missing, caused the hospital to be searched. When the man was discovered and attempted to escape, enroute to the enclosure, Private Elsen was forced to shoot him. His alertness and quick thinking reflect great credit upon Private Elsen and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

Private First Class Lanny L. Hayes, 34284430, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 22 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Tennessee.

Staff Sergeant Carl R. Henry, 20213203, Signal Corps, 565th Signal Company. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Kapfelberg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. As the regiment to which his four-man Signal Radio Team was attached prepared to cross the Danube River, Sergeant Henry moved his radio vehicle into Kapfelberg to maintain communication for the Regiment with other divisional units. When an artillery shell landed near his vehicle, killing a member of his radio team, Sergeant Henry, disregarding the danger, succeeded in moving the radio set into a house. While the town was still under heavy fire, Sergeant Henry personally delivered a high-priority message, traversing streets which had been repeatedly hit by German shells. Despite illness and high fever, he remained with his team all night, refusing to seek medical attention. His bravery and unselfish leadership reflect great credit upon Sergeant Henry and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Staff Sergeant Arthur W. Hindenlang, 32642966, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Germany, and Austria from 10 February 1945 to 6 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

First Sergeant Charles A. Hulpa, 6890776, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 3 April 1945 to 5 May 1945. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Technician Fifth Grade Wells E. Jackson, 39409959, Quartermaster Corps, 65th Quartermaster Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from California.

Second Lieutenant Ole I. Kjos (then Staff Sergeant), 02028875, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 19 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Minnesota.

Technician Fifth Grade Christ J. Kondos, 37309336, Infantry, (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 22 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Minnesota.

Second Lieutenant William P. Lytton (then Staff Sergeant), 02026219, Field Artillery, 720th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Kansas.

Private First Class Raymond J. McDermott, 31413772, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States Abbach, Germany, on 26 April 1945. When the ammunition supply of front-line riflemen was critically low during the Danube River bridgehead operations Private McDermott, a Company "A" Ammunition Bearer, volunteered to assist the A and P Platoon in effecting a re-supply. Under intense enemy small-arms and machine-gun fire Private McDermott, disregarding his own safety, made three trips over the 800-yard route and successfully relieved the acute shortage. Returning from his last trip, he noticed several wounded men lying on the battlefield. Enlisting the aid of another soldier, he went to the rescue of the casualties and carried them back to the medical aid station at the bank of the river. His courage and initiative in the face of fire reflect great credit upon Private McDermott and the military service. Entered military service from Connecticut.

First Lieutenant Jesse R. Milam, Jr., 01014080, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 22 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

Captain Greer J. Pruitt, 01171858, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Mississippi.

Second Lieutenant Donald S. Rich, (then Technical Sergeant), 02028640, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Utah.

Technical Sergeant Lewis K. Rogers, Jr., 35229680, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kapfelberg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. When the attached medical aid man was wounded during the heavily contested crossing of the Danube River Sergeant Rogers, a Company "F" Platoon Sergeant, immediately assumed the responsibility of administering first aid to the injured. Hearing a call for help from the river, he unhesitatingly plunged into the swift current, pulled a wounded man to shore, and administered first aid. Learning that his platoon could not cross the river for three-quarters of an hour, he took the wounded man to the aid station in his jeep, informed the medical men of the situation at the river, and returned to reorganize and lead his platoon across the Danube. His initiative and selfless devotion to his men reflect great credit upon Sergeant Rogers and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Private First Class Leon L. Russell, 32472304, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 22 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Captain Samuel B. Shoults, 01167219, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Major Lewis V. Smith, 0260521, Field Artillery, Headquarters 65th Division Artillery. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Erkshausen, Seifertshausen, Dankarode, and Eltmansee, Germany, on 2 April 1945. Major Smith, serving as both Division Artillery S-1 and S-4, left Ersrode to reconnoiter over unknown routes for a new CP location. Finding the bridges enroute blown out, he set out for Braac, where he found a bridge intact, and crossed. Learning that the town of Erkshausen had not yet been entered by the Americans, he proceeded there, made a search for enemy soldiers, and called for the town's surrender. He went on to take over the town of Seifertshausen. At Dankarode, despite the presence of SS Troops, he entered and boldly forced the surrender of the enemy soldiers. When he was able to proceed again, after placing the prisoners under guard, he entered Eltmansee and procured billets for a 65th Division Artillery CP. His audacity and disregard for personal danger reflect great credit upon Major Smith and the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Technical Sergeant John S. Summers, Jr., 38053207, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France and Germany from 26 December 1944, to 12 April 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

Technical Sergeant Paul J. Wagner, 32110612, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 22 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Private John H. Wirth, 42050127, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Fraulautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. Advancing courageously through intense enemy artillery and machine-gun fire to the forward elements of an attacking Infantry company, Private Wirth, a member of a Forward Observer Section, carried heavy radio equipment and worked unceasingly in establishing and maintaining communications without regard for his own safety. During the attack Private Wirth continued to lay wire, repair broken lines, and, when the aid man had been wounded, assumed the task of administering first aid and comfort to all the wounded. After dark, Private Wirth singlehandedly captured two German snipers who had harassed the company all during the day. His tireless efforts, initiative, and outstanding devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

IV - AWARD OF AIR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Air Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant Carl H. Loveland, 0931280, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight near Sievering, Austria, on 8 May 1945. Assigned the mission of searching enemy-held ground for advancing Russian elements, Lieutenant Loveland, a Liaison Pilot, realized that his light, unarmed plane would draw enemy fire. Nevertheless Lieutenant Loveland and his Observer decided to probe deep into enemy territory seeking the Russian Allies. After courageously crossing the entire area held by the German Army, the two officers discovered advance Russian elements; and, fully cognizant that the Russians might easily mistake their observation plane for an enemy aircraft, they landed and received an enthusiastic greeting from their foreign comrades. Once more they braved enemy fire to return to their home base, where they immediately relayed information. During the flight enemy small arms fire put five holes in the plane. Lieutenant Loveland's courageous action and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from California.

V - AWARD OF AIR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Air Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant Jack G. Neupert, 0534271, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight near Sievering, Austria, on 8 May 1945. Assigned the mission of searching enemy-held ground for advancing Russian elements, Lieutenant Neupert, an Artillery Air Observer, realized that his light, unarmed plane would draw enemy fire. Nevertheless Lieutenant Neupert and his pilot decided to probe deep into enemy territory seeking the Russian Allies. After courageously crossing the entire area held by the German Army, the two officers discovered advance Russian elements; and, fully cognizant that the Russians might easily mistake their

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

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to:

Technician Fourth Grade Layton W. Nichols, 38063791, Medical Department, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action at Saarlautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. While evacuating several casualties from the front lines to the aid station, a distance of 500 yards under heavy enemy mortar and small arms fire, Technician Nichols and two comrades were forced to take cover from the fire of an enemy burp gunner covering a street which they had to cross. Deciding that the casualty's life depended on immediate treatment, the men, led by Technician Nichols, started to cross the street despite the enemy fire. The enemy gunner opened fire again as the group was halfway across. Technician Nichols reached the safety of a building and his comrades, having set the litter down in the street, joined him. Realizing the wounded soldier's critical condition, Technician Nichols voluntarily crawled back into the street alone and, despite the enemy soldier's continued fire, dragged the litter and the casualty the remainder of the distance to the position of safety, from which the wounded man was evacuated to the aid station. Technician Nichols' courage and willing risk of his own life to save that of a comrade reflect the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

II - AWARD OF MERITORIOUS SERVICE UNIT PLAQUE

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque is awarded to:

The 765th Ordnance (Light Maintenance) Company, 65th Infantry Division. For superior performance of duty in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria, from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. During this period the 765th Ordnance (LM) Company performed all of its duties in a superior manner despite the exceedingly difficult conditions caused by rapid and almost continuous movement of the 65th Infantry Division. From 18 March 1945 to 7 May 1945 the Division travelled a distance of approximately 600 miles. The task of maintaining, evacuating, and supplying ordnance material during such a rapid and extended advance was extraordinarily arduous and would have taxed the capacities of a larger organization. However, through the enthusiastic and loyal devotion to duty of all the personnel of the Company, all obstacles were overcome and the Division was always able to move forward with weapons and motors functioning properly. During the two month period the Automotive Platoon received and completed approximately 1800 jobs, installed 423 major assemblies, performed 760 recovery and evacuation jobs (including 11 Flying Fortress Bombers). The Armament Platoon received and completed 2,160 jobs which included 1800 small arms, 280 instruments, and 80 artillery pieces; and, in addition, recovered and evacuated or repaired for replacement 10,668 jobs.

The Supply Platoon received and processed approximately 3,400 requisitions and resupplied 7,444 major items, which included 200 vehicles. To complete the large volume of work confronting the Company it was necessary for all the men of the unit to devote extra effort to their respective duties. This they did, willingly, and often at considerable personal discomfort due to extended work periods without adequate rest. Throughout the period the morale, discipline, and manner of performance of the members of the Company attained a superior level, contributed substantially to the success of the 65th Infantry Division, and reflect great credit upon the 765th Ordnance (LM) Company and the military service.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK LEAF CLUSTER)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

First Lieutenant Thomas J. O'Connor, 01016969, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Passau, Germany, on 2 May 1945. On a reconnaissance mission Lieutenant O'Connor, Commanding Officer of Company "C", learned from civilians along the route that two 88mm anti-tank gun positions were set up 400 yards ahead of his group of three tanks. Upon his instruction one of the civilians went forward and asked the German commander to surrender but was refused. Lieutenant O'Connor then went forward on his own initiative, unarmed and disregarding personal safety, and persuaded the German commander to surrender his guns and his men. By his bold action the column of three tanks was able to continue on its mission unimpeded. His outstanding aggressiveness and striking courage reflect great credit upon Lieutenant O'Connor and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

IV - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class August J. Baart, 32254664, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 21 March 1945 to 6 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

First Lieutenant Francis W. Burke, 01182336, Field Artillery, 368th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Schwebda, Germany, on 7 April 1945. On a mission to deliver confidential ammunition reports to higher headquarters, Lieutenant Burke, Ammunition Train Commander, was fired upon by an enemy machine gun. Although both he and his driver were hit and wounded, he succeeded in gaining control of the vehicle and continued his course. In spite of his wounds, Lieutenant Burke, encountering another vehicle that was under machine-gun fire, led the men to safety. When he insisted on remaining in the vicinity to furnish a tank destroyer battalion with complete information as to locations and installations of the enemy machine guns. His heroic leadership, courage under fire, and disregard for his own safety reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Burke and the military service. Entered military service from Minnesota.

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(GO No. 61, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 20 July 1945, cont'd)

Private First Class Ben W. Burnett, 34361888, Medical Department, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. A member of a three-man aid team, Private Burnett, a Litter Bearer, assisted in twice evacuating wounded soldiers from the front lines through 500 yards of exposed terrain subjected to heavy enemy mortar and small-arms fire. On a subsequent trip, carrying a litter patient, he and his companions took refuge behind a building, knowing their route was covered by an enemy burp gun. Despite the continued enemy fire they attempted to carry the wounded man to a position of safety but was forced to set down the litter and seek cover because of the severe hostile fire. When the casualty was subsequently removed from the danger zone, Private Burnett and a companion carried him into a sheltering building while exposed to violent machine-pistol fire. His courage and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Private Burnett and the military service. Entered military service from Tennessee.

Second Lieutenant Maurice L. Clouser, 0551765, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Fraulautern, Germany, from 7 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. Frequently traversing roads exposed to enemy observation and machine-gun fire, Lieutenant Clouser, an artillery forward observer, at times laid his own telephone lines and chose his observation sites without regard for his personal safety, but with superior observation as his most important consideration. Despite the constant shelling from enemy artillery, mortar, and small-arms fire, he remained unfalteringly at his post, relaying fire instructions and accurate sensings that contributed greatly to the success of his Battalion's operations. By his disregard for his own safety, his devotion to duty, and the excellence of his technical knowledge and skill Lieutenant Clouser reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Private First Class Samuel Cohen, 32642995, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Butzdorf, Germany, on 26 January 1945. When his tank, which was part of a task force attacking the town of Butzdorf, was disabled, Private Cohen, Bow Gunner, dismounted and proceeded to move into town with the Infantry. Assigned the mission of escorting nine enemy prisoners back to friendly terrain, Private Cohen used the captured Germans to carry a wounded American soldier back to the Infantry aid station. Unaided, he courageously led his detail 500 yards over an exposed route and through an enemy anti-personnel mine field to safely evacuate the wounded man. His bravery and leadership reflect great credit upon Private Cohen and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Colonel Robert E. M. Des Islets, 016405, Corps of Engineers, 1126 Engineer Combat Group. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Neuhaus, Germany, from 2 to 4 May 1945. When enemy demolition teams halted the advance of the 65th Infantry Division by blowing up an important bridge crossing the Inn River, Colonel Des Islets, Commanding Officer of the 1126th Engineer Combat Group, realized the importance of the span and moved forward through the enemy fire covering the approach to ascertain the damage and the supplies needed to rectify it. Disregarding the danger, he deliberately made his calculations before with drawing. Then he drove over sixty miles to an Engineer unit to inform them of the situation and the needed equipment. Because of his initiative and decisive action the assault crossing equipment and a Bailey Bridge were soon transported to the selected site. Colonel Des Islets again demonstrated his sound judgment

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by constructing the Bailey Bridge over an almost impossible site and enabled the Division to advance into Austria. His technical knowledge, ingenuity, and skill reflect great credit upon Colonel Des Islets and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

*First Lieutenant Harry J. Dickman, 01182551, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, from 4 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. Remaining at his observation post from before daylight until after dark every day, Lieutenant Dickman, an Artillery Forward Observer serving with Company "A", 260th Infantry, directed effective artillery fire upon enemy pillboxes, fortified houses, trenches, and vehicles. Due to his thorough and precise reconnoitering and plotting of Siegfried Line defenses he was able to direct fire successfully upon unseen targets with accurate, destructive results. During the Saarlautern breakthrough it was Lieutenant Dickman's previously plotted charts of target areas that aided the artillery in repulsing a counterattack. His intimate knowledge of enemy installations, his familiarity with the capabilities of his guns and his unrelenting efficiency in the performance of his tasks reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Dickman and the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Captain Robert C. Doyle (then First Lieutenant), 01294804, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

First Lieutenant John L. Grimmeison, 026764, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, from 7 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. Serving during this period as Artillery Forward Observer with the 260th Infantry, Lieutenant Grimmeison travelled almost daily over open roads covered by observed enemy fire and personally laid telephone wire without thought for his own safety. Taking positions less than 100 yards from the enemy, he disdained protection or cover to station himself at a point where he could best fulfill his mission. He remained at his post along with leading infantry units despite the mortar and artillery shells constantly falling around him. His devotion to duty and his able coordination of Infantry and Artillery reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Grimmeison and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Captain Thomas E. Hammill, 01165505, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Regensburg, Germany, on 23 April 1945. Denied the opportunity to make a prior reconnaissance, Captain Hammill preceded a column which was advancing on Regensburg to move into new positions in support of an attack. Probing through unknown territory for routes across fields, along roads, and by river banks, he ranged far ahead of the convoy's tanks, despite the knowledge that enemy forces were in the area. In disregard of his own safety, his aggressive activities took him into the immediate vicinity of enemy fire, but he completed his mission speedily and successfully and enabled his and another organization to reach their objective. His outstanding services to his organization

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and his unflinching contribution to its success reflect great credit upon Captain Hamill and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Captain Harry H. Haucke, 01165625, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Saarlautern, Germany, from 7 March 1945 to 19 March 1945. While furnishing direct support to Infantry units at Saarlautern during this period the 868th Field Artillery Battalion formed its Fire Direction Center into two separate groups to facilitate fire missions. Captain Haucke, assistant S-2, denying himself sleep and rest, efficiently controlled one group and maintained complete records for both Centers. Due to his untiring efforts and exceptional knowledge of artillery tactics, the normal gun batteries of the Battalion, augmented by a British twenty-five pound gun battery and a regimental cannon company, were efficiently used to place fire upon the enemy. Throughout this period, despite incessant enemy shelling, he remained constantly in position directing fire. His complete devotion to duty and calm control of his men reflect great credit upon Captain Haucke and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Sergeant Cecil G. Hudson, 34131102, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Butzdorf, Germany, on 25 January 1945. During a Tank-Infantry attack the tank commanded by Sergeant Hudson, a Company "C" Section Leader, was disabled by enemy fire. Realizing that his tank was a ready target for deliberately adjusted fire, Sergeant Hudson nevertheless remained in the partially demolished armored vehicle and directed supporting fire from his 75mm gun and two machine guns. His fire covered Infantry committed in the attack on Butzdorf, and was instrumental in killing approximately 75 enemy and causing the surrender of 100. Then, when all ammunition had been expended, and another burst had penetrated his tank, he led the crew to safety through a mine field and over open terrain subjected to machine-gun and mortar fire. Sergeant Hudson's initiative and fearless devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Mississippi.

Technical Sergeant Francis McCready, 32513888, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

First Lieutenant Boyd B. McLeod, 0446848, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Pocking, Germany, on 2 and 3 May 1945. Leading his platoon into Pocking, approximately twenty miles in advance of an Infantry Regiment, Lieutenant McLeod learned that there were four to five hundred armed Hungarian troops in the town, plus a large enemy airfield. Working carefully and calmly, Lieutenant McLeod disarmed the force, contacted various enemy officers, and through them arranged for the unconditional surrender of approximately 5000 enemy troops without firing a shot. At noon of the following day he was able to turn over to a Corps representative all the disarmed Hungarians, 300 German troops, and the intact airfield with several undamaged enemy planes. His skillful and courageous leadership saved valuable time and many lives and reflects great credit upon Lieutenant McLeod and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

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(GO No. 61, Hq 65th Inf Div, APO 200, 20 July 1945, cont'd)

Private First Class John P. McPhail (then Private), 36864896, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Passau, Germany, on 2 May 1945. While reconnoitering near Passau, Private McPhail's platoon suddenly found itself in a zone of enemy mortar fire. An Infantry anti-tank company which was pinned down in the vicinity called for a machine-gun, and Private McPhail went forward with the weapon of his jeep. As he reached the position, a mortar shell burst a few yards away. Private McPhail escaped injury, but six anti-tankmen were hit. Because the first aid man had previously been killed Private McPhail quickly put two of the wounded into his jeep, rushed them to the aid station, and made four additional trips through the heavy mortar barrage to evacuate the others. His prompt, courageous action aided the recovery of these men and reflects great credit upon Private McPhail and the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Technician Fifth Grade Leo F. Muzeroll, 31373482, Medical Department, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Saarlautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. A member of a three-man aid team, Technician Muzeroll, a Medical Technician, assisted in twice evacuating wounded soldiers from the front lines through 500 yards of exposed terrain subjected to heavy enemy mortar and small-arms fire. On a subsequent trip, carrying a litter patient, he and his companions too, refuge behind a building, knowing their route was covered by an enemy burp gun. Despite the continued enemy fire they attempted to carry the wounded man to a position of safety, but were forced to set down the litter and seek cover because of the severe hostile fire. When the casualty was subsequently removed from the danger zone, Technician Muzeroll and a companion carried him into a sheltering building while exposed to violent machine pistol fire. His courage and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Technician Muzeroll and the military service. Entered military service from New Hampshire.

Captain George M. Nelson, 0402881, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Illinois.

First Lieutenant Jack G. Neupert (then Second Lieutenant), 0534271, Field Artillery, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Fremmersdorf, Germany, on 12 March 1945. Setting up his OP in a church steeple to direct artillery fire in covering a patrol crossing the Saar River, Lieutenant Neupert immediately drew enemy mortar and artillery fire upon his prominent position. The OP received several direct hits, forcing the other personnel in the OP to seek cover, but Lieutenant Neupert, with utter disregard for his own safety, remained at his post and continued to direct artillery fire in support of the infantry. His coolness under fire, devotion to duty, and accurate direction in calling for fire insured the successful conclusion of the patrol's mission. His heroic action won the admiration and respect of his men and reflects great credit upon Lieutenant Neupert and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Sergeant Charles S. Norton, 13126652, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at St. Thomas, Austria, on 4 May 1945. Reporting to his platoon leader

the approach of enemy troops armed with machine guns, bazookas, and small arms, Sergeant Norton immediately volunteered to take his machine-gun bantam forward and open fire on the column. He and his driver approached within fifty yards of the Germans, who had taken cover in a ditch. After firing a full belt of ammunition the driver took the vehicle back to cover while Sergeant Norton reloaded. Returning to the original position he continued to fire on the Germans in the ditches, drove past them, then stopped and fired into a house. Twenty-six enemy soldiers were taken from the house and seven SS men were found dead in the ditch. Sergeant Norton's exemplary courage and high devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

First Lieutenant Robert K. Prescott, 01181736, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France and Germany from 8 March 1945 to 12 April 1945. Entered military service from Minnesota.

First Lieutenant Doyle D. Ream, 01180678, Field Artillery, 868th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Felsburg, Germany, on 8 March 1945. When Lieutenant Ream, Battery Executive Officer, and his unit occupied positions recently evacuated by another battery, they were exposed to constant enemy artillery fire. Displaying considerable foresight, Lieutenant Ream concentrated on improving field fortifications and heightening the morale of his men. When the enemy shelled his positions heavily, Lieutenant Ream, under the intense fire, rallied his men and returned fire skillfully and effectively. Despite a direct hit on one of its fortifications, the Battery casualties were held to a minimum because of the betterment of the protective installations which Lieutenant Ream had instituted. His leadership, foresight, and calmness under fire reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Ream and the military service. Entered military service from South Dakota.



I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Silver Star is awarded to:

Private First Class Carol D. Durall, 39216366, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For gallantry in action in Eferding, Austria, on 5 May 1945. While engaged in clearing enemy houses in Eferding, Private Durall, an Intelligence and Reconnaissance Platoon Driver, heard a hostile truck approaching a road intersection that commanded the main approaches to the town. Moving rapidly to within sight of the crossing, he saw a truck loaded with enemy reinforcements and opened fire upon it with a captured machine pistol, killing six and forcing the remainder to disperse and seek cover. After crossing the street, he crept to within ten yards of one group of enemy soldiers and threw a hand grenade into their midst, killing three more and forcing the remainder of the Germans to retreat. His courageous action and exemplary initiative, which enabled his squad to gain control of the intersection, reflect the greatest credit upon Private Durall and the military service. Entered military service from Washington.

II - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Technician Fourth Grade Francis O. Brazzill, 35017604, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Weiten, Germany, on 20 February 1945. After persistently volunteering to join Company "B" in combat, Technician Brazzill was assigned as a tank commander and was given the mission of protecting the flank of a force attacking Weiten. As the attack progressed the leading tank was fired on by a hidden anti-tank gun. Picking up the flash, Technician Brazzill destroyed the gun with one high-explosive shell. Shortly afterward, the accompanying Infantry was pinned down by machine-gun fire, but Technician Brazzill immediately destroyed the enemy weapon with bursts from his own mounted machine gun. When twenty-five enemy troops attempted to halt the American advance, Technician Brazzill's machine gun routed the enemy. Technician Brazzill's alertness and aggressive action, which aided in the capture of Weiten in less than two hours, reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Second Lieutenant William J. Bridges, (then Sergeant), 02026151, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Alabama.

Second Lieutenant David G. Burton, O1060027, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Wadgassen, Germany, on 15 March 1945. Carefully avoiding enemy observation, Lieutenant Burton, Platoon Leader of Company "K", was leading his reconnaissance patrol through a small ravine when he stepped on an anti-personnel mine, the explosion sending fragments into his back and legs. Their location thus disclosed to the enemy, the men were pinned down by machine-gun fire. Lieutenant Burton, although seriously wounded, halted the other members of the patrol and calmly ordered them to seek cover. Finding a more sheltered route, he continued, despite the pain of his wounds, to lead his men for three-quarters of a mile to the Saar River. Finally forced by the pain to seek medical attention, he first deployed his men into position and gave them instructions to accomplish the assigned mission, then returned alone, meeting an aid man a mile away. His fortitude and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Burton and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Sergeant Floyd T. Cody, 37479505, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Technician Fifth Grade William L. Cohen, 42054601, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Private First Class John T. DiLenola, 42026948, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 17 March 1945. Under continuous heavy mortar fire Private DiLenola capably led his men in establishing and maintaining communication lines between the Regimental CP and the Second Battalion CP across a Saar River bridge. Preparing for a Regimental attack, Private DiLenola and his crew went with little sleep or food, incessantly repairing breaks in the wire caused by the heavy shelling. While troops were crossing the bridge, one of the vital lines was knocked out. Despite the hazards of machine-gun fire and shell fragments, Private DiLenola pushed forward and discovered large gaps in the wire. Realizing the danger of attempting repairs under the heavy fire, Private DiLenola directed the laying of a new line. His exemplary valor and dependable judgment reflect great credit upon Private DiLenola and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Technician Fifth Grade John C. Fayal, 39133223, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Borg, Germany, on 19 February 1945. Technician Fayal, a Company "B" tank mechanic, was driven back and forced to seek cover from heavy enemy fire while attempting to reach and repair two disabled tanks during an intense Tank-Infantry battle. Although fully cognizant of the danger, he realized the importance of repairing the vehicles and once more braved the hostile fire. Moving to the armored vehicles, he worked calmly and efficiently for two hours, disregarding the danger, to mend broken tracks on the two tanks. During this time Infantry-Tank engagements were being fought within 500 yards of his position. Due to his courageous action and fearless devotion to duty two vital tanks were restored to action at a critical time. Technician Fayal's performance reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Staff Sergeant Bub Calloway, 38089337, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

Technician Fifth Grade Harold W. Hatley, 35879848, Field Artillery, 65th Division Artillery. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in St. Florian, Austria, on 6 May 1945. While driving through St. Florian in search of a new Division Artillery Command Post, Technician Hatley, driver for an Artillery Liaison Officer, realized that American troops had not yet occupied the town. Seeing a group of enemy personnel loading a truck, he moved in quickly and captured the men. Upon questioning, he learned of a large number of hostile troops nearby. Driving his vehicle to the house where the enemy was stationed, he saw them standing in ranks for reveille; and, disregarding the danger, he drove into their midst. By his outstanding courage and forceful commands, he accomplished their surrender. Then, with his accompanying officer guarding the men, he searched each one. Due to his disregard of personal safety and instant action over 100 enemy were captured, and a vast quantity of arms and ammunition was taken. His fearless act and exemplary initiative reflect great credit upon Technician Hatley and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Major James L. Jones, Jr., 0358870, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Missouri.

Technician Fifth Grade Edward A. Kelly, 12085546, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Borg, Germany, on 19 February 1945. Technician Kelly, a Company "B" tank mechanic, was driven back and forced to seek cover from heavy enemy fire while attempting to reach and repair two disabled tanks during an intense Tank-Infantry battle. Although fully cognizant of the danger, he realized the importance of repairing the vehicles and once more braved the hostile fire. Moving to the armored vehicles, he worked calmly and efficiently for two hours, disregarding the danger, to mend broken tracks on the two tanks. During this time Infantry-Tank engagements were being fought within 500 yards of his position. Due to his courageous action and fearless devotion to duty two vital tanks were restored to action at a critical time. Technician Kelly's performance reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Captain John K. Kirn, 01171628, Field Artillery, 867th Field Artillery Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Beratzhausen, Germany, on 23 April 1945. When the Second Battalion OF near Beratzhausen came under heavy, sustained time-fire from enemy artillery, the personnel were pinned down in position. Seeing that a Captain had been wounded in the leg by a burst, Captain Kirn rushed to his assistance despite the barrage and at the risk of his own life. With another officer, he aided the wounded captain into a quarter-ton truck to take him back for aid. With complete disregard for the constant enemy shells bursting around him Captain Kirn was able to remove the casualty to the rear for badly needed medical attention. His heroism and selfless audacity reflect great credit upon Captain Kirn and the military service. Entered military service from New Hampshire.

Technician Fifth Grade Henry Leintz, 37310493, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Orscholtz, Germany, from 17 January 1945 to 25 January 1945. Driving his truck an average of nineteen hours daily to make deliveries, Technician Leintz supplied all needs of his company during operations near Orscholtz. In addition to trips for all water, rations, and gasoline consumed by the company each day, he made nightly trips to supply dumps despite the difficulties of blackout driving, icy roads, and zero temperatures. Due to the extreme cold and snow, enemy air attacks artillery fire, and dangerous roads, the accomplishment of this feat demonstrated outstanding courage, physical stamina, and devotion to duty. Technician Lintz's tireless efforts enabled his company to maintain constant pressure against the enemy and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from North Dakota.

Captain Robert H. Lister, 01288251, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New Mexico.

Sergeant Bernard Miller, 32299106, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Nohn, Germany, on 10 March 1945. When a barrage of enemy artillery fire fell near his section's positions, sending the men to cover, Sergeant Miller, a Car Commander, noticed a soldier, not in his section, wounded by shell fragments and unhesitatingly went to his aid. First leading his own men to safety, Sergeant Miller then called for one volunteer and made his way calmly through the barrage of fire to where the injured man lay. He remained with the casualty, administering first aid, until the rain of enemy explosives had ceased and the man could be evacuated. His courage under intense fire and solicitude for a fallen comrade reflect great credit upon Sergeant Miller and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

First Lieutenant Duane E. Noyes, 0463867, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria, from 5 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Iowa.

Sergeant Billy J. Peterson, 15106163, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 12 March 1945. An intense enemy artillery concentration bracketed in on the house from which Sergeant Peterson, a Company "K" Assistant Squad Leader, was planning to leave on a six-man patrol. Enemy shell fragments struck one of the men, seriously wounding him and causing the loss of much blood. Sergeant Peterson, fully cognizant of the danger, but realizing the need for immediate medical treatment for the man, dashed out into the midst of the terrific hostile barrage and ran to the Company Command Post to summon aid. Enemy machine-gun and sniper fire, as well as the artillery bursts, followed his course across the open terrain, constantly threatening his life. Due to his fearlessness and deliberate exposure to enemy fire the wounded soldier was soon evacuated to safety. Sergeant Peterson's heroic action to save the life of a comrade reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Technician Fourth Grade Ernest J. Pocolak, (then Technician Fifth Grade), 20722261, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Nebraska.

First Lieutenant J. W. Robbins, 01013697, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Pattershofen, Germany, on 22 April 1945. Commanding a tank attack on Pattershofen, Lieutenant Robbins, Platoon Leader of Company "B", observed that his supported infantry was pinned down by automatic weapons fire from woods on a flank. He immediately ordered his tank gunner to fire on the position. When a round became wedged in the tube, Lieutenant Robbins called for the fire of the tank behind, dismounted from his own tank and, in the midst of enemy small-arms and mortar fire worked for five minutes to free the jammed round from the tube. When he succeeded in clearing the gun, he returned with his tank into the action, destroying the enemy gun position, and enabled the attack to continue. His exemplary courage and quick thinking reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Robbins and the military service. Entered military service from Mississippi.

Private First Class Edward S. Rompola, 13004176, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. Serving as machine gunner attached to a rifle squad, Private Rompola was pinned down with his comrades by enemy machine-gun and mortar fire. Observing a break in a wall separating him from the enemy, Private Rompola, without regard for his own safety, crawled with his machine gun approximately 50 yards over an open area. Climbing over a rubble pile that marked the break in the wall, he exposed himself to constant enemy observation, but from this vantage point brought his heavy machine-gun fire to bear on the enemy, enabling his squad to move forward and renew the attack. His fearlessness and audacity reflect great credit upon Private Rompola and the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Private Melvin J. Sheeler, 33573983, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Saarlautern, Germany, on 18 March 1945. When his platoon leader's tank was knocked out by enemy fire during an attack, Private Sheeler, a Company "C" driver, drove his own tank over a mine field without any cover and under direct enemy observation to go to the wounded man's aid. Reaching the vicinity of the platoon leader, Private Sheeler and his tank commander dismounted and approached the position, but the intense enemy fire wounded the tank commander and prevented further advance. Unable to continue, Private Sheeler assisted the wounded commander to his tank and drove him back to safety, again braving the mine fields and enemy fire. Although his attempted rescue of the platoon leader was unsuccessful Private Sheeler saved the life of his tank commander and by his valorous action reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Second Lieutenant Robert H. Stahl, (then Technical Sergeant), 02026231, Infantry, 260th Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Missouri.

First Lieutenant Russell W. Wade, O10144, Infantry (armored), 748th Tank Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Pattershofen, Kastl, and Hohenfels, Germany, from 22 to 24 April 1945. During the 65th Infantry Division's drive to the Danube River, Lieutenant Wade, Liaison Officer of the 748th Tank Battalion, constantly endangered his life to direct more efficiently the advance of two tank platoons attached to the 260th Infantry. Although riding in an unarmored jeep, Lieutenant Wade covered territory in advance of tanks, feeling out enemy positions. Enemy shell fragments or small-arms fire repeatedly struck his jeep, but, undeterred by this danger, Lieutenant Wade carried on his duties. Although in constant danger of enemy ambush, he traversed unknown roads repeatedly to coordinate the tank-infantry assault against the enemy. His undaunted courage in facing enemy fire and his calm voluntary assumption of many dangers reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Wade and the military service. Entered military service from Rhode Island.

Private First Class Harry W. Walker, 37626332, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Missouri.

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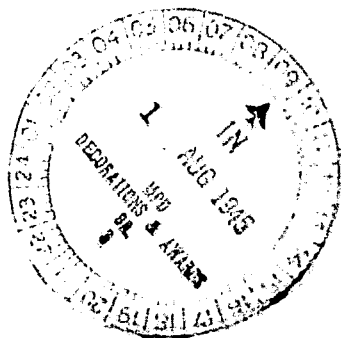

After the crossing he discovered and cut an enemy telephone wire, then prepared to withdraw after an enemy patrol had been encountered and fired upon. A prearranged signal by the American patrol at the river bank failed to produce boats for the return trip, and the men were threatened with isolation on the enemy side of the river. Technician Carrigan, however, volunteered to swim to the opposite bank, braving the strong, cold current, to secure help. He successfully made the crossing, and a few minutes later the remaining members of the patrol were picked up. His presence of mind, outstanding courage, and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Technician Carrigan and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Private First Class James V. Clifton, 35082855, Quartermaster Corps, 65th Quartermaster Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Kentucky.

Warrant Officer Junior Grade Thomas J. Fetherolf, W2120736, AUS, 869th Field Artillery Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 10 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Indiana.

Sergeant William W. Finch, Jr., 18219697, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Nohn, Germany on 7 March 1945. Volunteering for the first night patrol to cross the Saar River although he had had no sleep for 36 hours, Sergeant Finch took the position of point man. Entering enemy-held territory, the patrol approached within twenty feet of an old castle and encountered three Germans. Holding fire until the patrol leader began shooting, Sergeant Finch helped kill one enemy soldier, wound a second, and cause the third to seek cover. Since the enemy was in control of the high ground beyond, the patrol leader ordered his men to withdraw, while Sergeant Finch personally covered their movements. His courage and alertness enabled the patrol to return without a casualty and reflect great credit upon Sergeant Finch and the military service. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Staff Sergeant Lloyd F. Gemoll, 36224799, Field Artillery, 65th Division Artillery. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany and Austria from 17 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

Master Sergeant Charles Gojmerac, 6932384, Cavalry, 65th Reconnaissance Troop. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Pocking, Germany, on 3 May 1945. He had taken two of the armored cars damaged by enemy 88mm fire and made one good vehicle; the third he had rushed to Ordnance for certain parts and repaired it, while the fourth was being repaired. The jeep was also ready to roll by the time the Troop set out to cross the Inn River with all the line platoons at full vehicular strength. Sergeant Gojmerac's energy, resourcefulness, and organizing ability reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

I - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUSLY)

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Private First Class Robert E. Ziesemer, 36364748, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Wallerfangen, Saarlautern, and Struth, Germany, from 7 March 1945 to 7 April 1945. Private Ziesemer, a Company "D" driver, distinguished himself by his voluntary assumption of extremely hazardous missions during this period. On 7 March, when a company position was under constant enemy fire and badly in need of supplies and food, Private Ziesemer voluntarily braved the heavy enemy barrage to carry rations and ammunition over open terrain to the men. Again, on 17 March, when a platoon was caught in an open area by intense enemy artillery near a bridge in Saarlautern, Private Ziesemer assumed the responsibility of shuttling the men across the open bridge, repeatedly braving the hostile fire. On 7 April at Struth, Germany, he once more offered his service and drove machine-gunner into an enemy-held town to secure high ground in the town. While moving through the town, a direct 75mm shell burst fatally wounded Private Ziesemer. His heroic actions and repeated braving of intense enemy fire reflect great credit upon Private Ziesemer and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

II - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third United States Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class William J. Alexander, 35244362, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Wallerfangen and Struth, Germany, on 7 March and 7 April 1945. Private Alexander, a Company "D" driver distinguished himself by his bravery under fire upon two occasions. On 7 March 1945, during operations at Wallerfangen, Private Alexander manned a .30 caliber machine-gun placed in a partially demolished building, and although fierce enemy fire, which wounded seven comrades, fell in a direct concentration on the house, Private Alexander remained at his post. Directing withering fire upon the enemy he pinned them down and enabled artillery observers to locate and lay fire upon the German positions. He then moved to a better firing position and covered the attack of rifle elements. On 7 April, during the enemy counter attack on Struth, the jeep which he was driving was struck by enemy shell fire, wounding three occupants. Private Alexander, with great presence of mind, removed the mounted machine-gun from his demolished jeep and opened fire upon the hostile troops, enabling his company to attack. His devotion to duty and coolness under enemy fire reflect great credit upon Private Alexander and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Private First Class William G. Morgan, 35833002, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Batzhausen, Germany, on 25 April 1945. After forcing ambushing German soldiers into nearby woods by fire from his mounted machine-gun, Private Morgan, a Third Battalion Intelligence Section Driver, accompanying a patrol near Batzhausen, moved his jeep through the heavy fire to a position of defilade, from which he effectively employed his automatic weapon. Then, disregarding the intense enemy fire from small arms, as well as a mortar barrage, Private Morgan drove the Battalion Intelligence Officer to the organizational CP, where a tactical withdrawal was immediately ordered. Returning three times through the enemy holocaust, Private Morgan braved flying mortar fragments, one of which shattered his windshield, to relay the information and to withdraw patrol members. Through his gallant efforts and disregard for his own safety, a successful withdrawal was effected. Private Morgan's cool courage under enemy fire and his heroic actions reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Private First Class Edward J. O'Brien, 31398249, Medical Department, Special Troops, 65th Infantry Division. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Nohm, Germany, on 10 March 1945. When a heavy barrage of enemy 83mm shells was directed upon a hunting lodge used as an observation post, Private O'Brien, an aid man, ran through the intense fire to the side of a comrade who had been hit by fragments. Crossing over 300 yards of open terrain under direct enemy artillery fire he discovered that the man had been instantly killed. He then returned over the dangerous territory to administer aid to another soldier who had been hit previously. Improvising a litter, Private O'Brien, with the aid of three companions, carried the injured man three miles to the rear. His outstanding courage under fire, resourcefulness and disregard for danger reflect great credit upon Private O'Brien and the military service. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

Corporal Melvin A. Reid, 36244652, Infantry, 251st Infantry. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 20 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

Major William E. Roby, Jr., 0365742, Field Artillery, Headquarters 65th Infantry Division. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Ittersdorf and Saarlautern, Germany, from 5 to 7 March 1945. Assigned the mission of relieving the units of the 25 Infantry Division by units of the 65th Infantry Division, Major Roby, Air-ground Liaison Officer, successfully accomplished this task. Although compelled to work in complete blackout, Major Roby, by his efforts and careful coordination and utmost secrecy, successfully moved all troops and vehicles into the range of enemy fire despite a last minute change in plans. His outstanding skill, initiative, and superior leadership reflect great credit upon Major Roby and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Private First Class Leo B. Shafer, 36411898, Infantry, 261st Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Regensburg, Germany, on 27 April 1945. When taking cover from an enemy ambush during a reconnaissance mission near Regensburg, Private Shafer discovered hostile positions and ran directly into their fire in a lone assault. Disconcerted by his ferocious actions, the enemy retreated, leaving one man prisoner. Then, upon seeing twenty-five Germans running across an open field, Private Shafer, under cover of a machine-gun, pursued them, firing his rifle as he went. After wounding one of the soldiers, Private Shafer forced the remainder to surrender. Later, under cover of his comrades' weapons, he proceeded to flush hostile troops from a nearby house. Entering the house, he captured five more Germans, and disarmed them. His aggressiveness, courageous efforts and complete disregard of personal safety reflect great credit upon Private Shafer and the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Staff Sergeant Richard W. Shugart, 14168448, Signal Corps, 565th Signal Company. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Alabama.

Major George G. Spiess, 0243495, Signal Corps, 565th Signal Company. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kapfelburg, Germany, on 26 April 1945. Finding that the task of bridging the Danube River with communications had been abandoned as impossible at the time, Major Spiess, 65th Infantry Division Signal Officer, upon his own initiative, picked up an assortment of signal men and went ahead to accomplish the mission successfully, thereby aiding our forces immeasurably. In spite of the heavy enemy artillery fire falling upon the river, Major Spiess proceeded to locate a civilian rowboat and, with five men, rowed across the river and succeeded in bringing a field-wire line across on the first attempt. His outstanding courage under enemy fire, tenacity of purpose, and sterling leadership reflect great credit upon Major Spiess and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Technician Fourth Grade Fred R. Varney, 31373779, Medical Department, 365th Medical Battalion. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 7 May 1945. Entered military service from New Hampshire.

Chief Warrant Officer Wilford E. Walters, W2126680, USA, Headquarters 65th Infantry Division. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 5 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Entered military service from Colorado.

First Lieutenant Robert T. Ward, 0374964, Infantry, Headquarters 65th Infantry Division. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 6 March 1945 to 9 May 1945. Entered military service from Missouri.



Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third U. S. Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Meritorious Service Unit Placque is awarded to:

The 365th Medical Battalion, 65th Infantry Division. For superior performance of duty in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 18 March 1945 to 8 May 1945. Throughout this period the 365th Medical Battalion performed its duties in a superior manner despite the unusual conditions brought about by the rapid and almost continuous movement of the 65th Infantry Division. In this two month period approximately 600 miles of territory were covered necessitating continuous liaison between the most forward units, the intermediate medical echelons, and the clearing company in order to insure prompt and efficient medical service to the individual soldier. The process of treatment and evacuation of casualties as carried on by the 365th Medical Battalion was so successful that the death rate among admissions to the Clearing Company was held at .0008 per cent. In addition to caring for the casualties, an unending flow of medical supplies was kept moving to the forward units, despite the most trying conditions. Through the combined efforts of every officer and enlisted man in the Battalion no soldier in the 65th Infantry Division ever suffered for lack of medical care or equipment. During this period Collecting Company "A" treated and/or evacuated 692 patients and Collecting Company "C" treated and/or evacuated 683 patients. For this same period the Clearing Company cared for a total of 2,500 men. The morale and discipline among the men of the 365th Medical Battalion was continually maintained at a superior level and their manner of performance contributed substantially to the success of the 65th Infantry Division. This record of service, achieved through the untiring efforts and outstanding devotion to duty of all its personnel, reflects great credit upon the 365th Medical Battalion in the military service.

II - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third U. S. Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant David A. Hutto, Jr., 01118231, Corps of Engineers, 265th Engineer (C) Battalion. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Lohbach, Germany, on 25 April 1945. While a reconnaissance party of which Lieutenant Hutto was a member was engaged in reconnoitering the sites to be used for the 65th Infantry Division assault crossing of the Danube River two enemy patrols were encountered. During the ensuing conflict Lieutenant Hutto was instrumental in capturing fifteen enemy soldiers and routing the remainder. After disposing of the prisoners Lieutenant Hutto proceeded to the river bank and, despite the presence of the enemy, continued his mission. He deliberately exposed himself to the enemy's view, fixing their fire in order to determine their strong points and in-

stallations. Successfully completing his reconnaissance he returned to the 260th Infantry Regiment CP and led a group of officers back to the river in order to point out suitable launching sites and approaches to be used in the river crossings. As a result of his careful reconnaissance and his personal instructions to the Infantry officers the entire Regiment successfully crossed the river the following day without casualty. Lieutenant Hutto's courage, aggressiveness, and outstanding leadership reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from North Carolina.

Major James R. Bratton, 0461913, Medical Corps, 365th Medical Battalion. For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Kappelberg, Germany, from 24 April 1945 to 27 April 1945. During this period the 65th Infantry Division successfully crossed the Danube River, but not without the loss of many casualties. However, because of Major Bratton's presence at the crossing site, despite heavy enemy fire, and his unceasing efforts and sound judgment, medical service of the highest order was provided and the mortality rate was kept at an extremely low level. Throughout the operations Major Bratton displayed a high degree of military and professional competence in correlating and supervising the complexities of second echelon medical service. His able leadership, ability and devotion to duty are in keeping with the high traditions of the Medical Corps and reflect great credit upon Major Bratton and the military service. Entered military service from South Carolina.

Captain Willard E. Ferrall, 01285313, Infantry, Headquarters 65th Infantry Division. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Mainz, Germany, on 29 March 1945. When the 65th Infantry Division was crossing the Rhine River at Mainz orders were received attaching the 261st Infantry Regiment to the 6th Armored Division. The 261st Infantry had already crossed the river and contact by radio or telephone was impossible. Captain Ferrall was assigned the mission of contacting the Commanding Officer of the 261st Infantry with the utmost speed. Although the few available bridges and roads were jammed with traffic, the route to be taken was unmarked, much of the area to be traversed was infested with by-passed pockets of enemy troops and blackout driving was necessary. Captain Ferrall, displaying superior skill, initiative and aggressiveness, overcame all these difficulties, located the March Command Post of the Regiment and delivered the message to the Commanding Officer, thereby enabling the Regiment to proceed on its new mission without delay. His courage and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Captain Ferrall and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

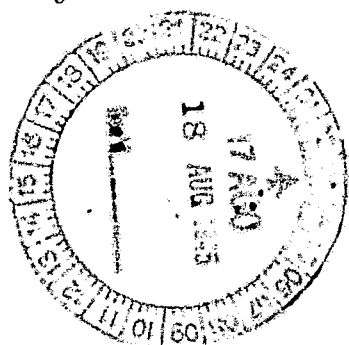

Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and Circular Number 6, Headquarters Third U. S. Army, 26 April 1944, as supplemented, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Technician Fourth Grade Clarence C. Chrastil, 20721229, Infantry, 65th Infantry Division Band. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 6 May 1945. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Technician Fifth Grade George L. Cluzel, 19105085, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 16 March 1945 to 9 May 1945. During this period Technician Cluzel, the Second Battalion Commander's driver, repeatedly distinguished himself by his unusual courage and complete disregard for personal safety. Through his gallant efforts, several jeeps, abandoned because of heavy enemy fire, were recovered by Technician Cluzel, although this necessitated exposing himself completely to fierce enemy fire. Repeatedly he drove reconnaissance and other missions deep into enemy lines, and his quick thinking and initiative aided materially in the successful completion of these patrols. Technician Cluzel, ever concerned with the well-being of his comrades, assumed a guard post near a company CP upon one occasion, and his foresight resulted in the capture of an enemy patrol searching the vicinity. His continual bravery and selfless devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Technician Cluzel and the military service. Entered military service from Washington.

First Lieutenant Roy H. Davenport, Jr., 0550210, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at Beratzhausen, Germany, on 23 April 1945. When the Second Battalion was deploying to attack enemy artillery positions, from which they were receiving heavy fire, Lieutenant Davenport, Battalion S-2, realized the importance of the immediate capture of Beratzhausen. Racing his jeep over a road covered by enemy artillery fire, Lieutenant Davenport entered the enemy-held town, from which hostile troops were directing harassing small arms fire upon him, and succeeded in reaching the Burgomeister, whom he convinced of the advantage of immediate capitulation. He then led his troops forward to occupy the town and continue the pursuit of the enemy. Through his daring act an enemy detachment was apprehended and his unit was able to press the attack upon the enemy rear guard. His bravery, aggressiveness, and complete devotion to duty reflect great credit upon Lieutenant Davenport and the military service. Entered military service from South Carolina.

Captain Fred F. McAlpine, 01297027, Infantry, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with operations against an enemy of the United States at Langensalza, Germany, on 5 April 1945. During the attack on Langensalza Captain McAlpine was in command of a machine-gun section which was supporting tank destroyers spearheading the assault. Upon reaching a road block the group was met by intense enemy small arms and panzerfaust fire, coming from nearby buildings. The intensity of the fire temporarily pinned down the machine-gun crews, but Captain McAlpine courageously assaulted several enemy positions hurling phosphorous grenades and relieved the men sufficiently to permit them to move. By skillful deployment of the forces at his disposal and by clever maneuvering of the tank destroyers he made possible the capture of the town and 1000 German soldiers. His courage, leadership, and ability reflect great credit upon Captain McAlpine and the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Technician Fifth Grade Harold W. Patterson, 33270099, Infantry, 65th Infantry Division Band. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Eastern France, Germany, and Austria from 7 March 1945 to 6 May 1945. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Captain Seth D. Revere, 0500484, Medical Corps, 259th Infantry. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Langensalza, Germany, on 5 April 1945. When our forces entered the city of Langensalza after bitter fighting, Captain Revere, Battalion Surgeon, ran the gauntlet of enemy automatic weapons, small arms, and machine-gun fire, to reach the built-up area and set up an aid station. Time and again, Captain Revere led the litter jeep in search of the wounded, who had been carried to the cover and safety of houses. Despite the difficulty of locating the casualties he succeeded in evacuating all our seriously wounded in a minimum of time and administering treatment to the others, thus saving many lives. His tireless efforts, outstanding aggressiveness and bravery in the face of fire reflect great credit upon Captain Revere and the military service. Entered military service from New Jersey.

First Lieutenant James C. Totman, 01180074, Field Artillery, 65th Division Artillery. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Linz, Austria, on 6 May 1945. While driving through St. Florian in search of a new Division Artillery Command Post, Lieutenant Totman, Artillery Liaison Officer, realized that American troops had not yet occupied the town. Seeing a group of enemy personnel loading a truck, he moved in quickly and captured the men. Upon questioning he learned of a large number of hostile troops nearby. Directing his driver to proceed to the building where the enemy was stationed, he saw them standing in ranks for reveille. Disregarding the danger, he drove into their midst. By his outstanding courage and aggressive manner he accomplished their surrender. Then he guarded the men while his driver searched and disarmed each one. Due to his disregard of personal safety and instant action, over 100 enemy were captured.

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I. SILVER STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star Medal was awarded to:

Private First Class JOHN E JACKSON, JR, (Army Serial Number 34659003), Company G, 262d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 January 1945 in Brittany, France. While a member of a reconnaissance patrol, moving into St Nizac, France, an enemy patrol was observed approaching their right flank. After successfully pinning the enemy down on their right flank with machine gun fire an enemy machine gun opened fire on their left flank threatening their position. Private First Class JACKSON, exposing himself to enemy fire moved in and silenced the enemy machine gun with hand grenades, thus preventing the enemy from surrounding the rest of the squad. His fearless action and devotion to duty contributed greatly in relieving a serious situation. His actions were an inspiration to all. Entered the military service from Columbia, South Carolina.

Captain ABRAHAM ST JOHN, 1st Cavalry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 4 August 1944 in Brittany, France. After his lead tank was disabled by an enemy antitank gun, Captain ST JOHN gave protective cover for, and evacuated every member to safety. He reconnoitered for a by-pass and on foot led his tanks forward in the face of fire from enemy snipers and automatic weapons 100 yards away. Captain ST JOHN coordinated the attack with the infantry and personally led the attack in the face of a veritable inferno of fire from enemy mortars, artillery, grenades, automatic weapons and small arms. Captain ST JOHN flatly ignored the enemy and refused to take cover. This attack overran the enemy forward positions. About half a squad of infantry joined the tanks and with this support Captain ST JOHN led the tanks into the town of Chateauneuf. While in Chateauneuf, Captain ST JOHN controlled the fire of the lead tank in silencing an enemy position in a hundred yard fire duel. During the entire action, Captain ST JOHN was openly exposed to all types of enemy fire with no consideration for his personal safety. He led an attack that might have failed had it not been for his courage and determination. His complete disregard for his personal safety and devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Burlington, Vermont.

First Lieutenant SELLERS STOUGH, JR, 0549427 (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 14 January 1945 in Lorient Sector, France. When his combat patrol was pinned down by fire from two enemy machine guns, rifle and mortar fire, he maneuvered his men under fire back to a nearby blockhouse where telephone communications were set up. From the blockhouse he called for cannon fire and with utter disregard for his personal safety he moved partially out of the blockhouse to observe the cannon fire. Lieutenant STOUGH adjusted the cannon fire and neutralized the two enemy machine guns. Shortly thereafter he observed an enemy patrol trying to cut off his retreat and he quickly shifted the cannon fire on the enemy patrol which was forced to withdraw. Under the cover of cannon fire volley he had his men withdraw in small groups to safety without casualties. Lieutenant STOUGH brought up the rear. His confidence and leadership was an inspiration to all. His complete disregard for personal safety and devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Birmingham, Alabama.

Private First Class **GEORGE KOSTOPOULOS** (Army Serial Number 36902991), Company A, 262d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 January 1945 in Brittany, France. Private First Class KOSTOPOULOS was the radio operator on a combat patrol. After infiltrating the enemy lines, the patrol engaged in a fire fight with five enemy machine guns and riflemen and was under sporadic artillery fire. Although wounded early in the fire fight, Private First Class KOSTOPOULOS with exemplary devotion to duty refused to withdraw. He continued to operate the radio set sending fire missions through to the artillery until he lapsed into semi-consciousness. Later, he was removed to safety. His courage and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all members of his organization. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

Staff Sergeant **FRED C POULNOT** (Army Serial Number 6968048), Company I, 263d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy on 11 January 1945 in Brittany, France. While in his company's position was subjected to enemy sniper fire which harassed their activity and limited observation, Staff Sergeant POULNOT and his First Scout voluntarily set out to locate the enemy snipers. While reconnoitering a route toward a suspected sniper position they were suddenly fired upon and changed the original route in an effort to outflank the sniper fire. In doing so the enemy was surprised in a dugout and shouted a warning presumably intended for other enemy troops along the line. Staff Sergeant POULNOT and his scout fired simultaneously upon hearing the warning shout and killed one German. In this action the scout was wounded by a hand grenade. They returned to their own lines by separate routes and Staff Sergeant POULNOT killed one other enemy soldier while returning. Staff Sergeant POULNOT then organized a squad and led it to the scene of action where fire was directed upon the enemy. This action silenced all enemy activity from that location. His courage, fearlessness, and devotion to duty eliminated a potential hazard to his men and organization and was an inspiration to all members of his regiment. Entered the military service from Lexington, Georgia.

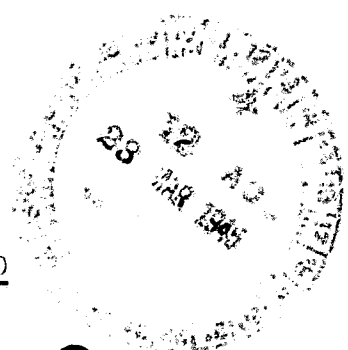

I. SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, a Silver Star was awarded to:

Staff Sergeant JAMES O GIBSON (Army Serial Number 35700222), Company A, 262d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action in connection with military operations against the enemy on 10 January 1945 in Brittany, France. Sergeant GIBSON was leading a thirteen-man group, part of a larger reconnaissance patrol, five hundred yards from his own front lines into the woods when five enemy machine guns and enemy riflemen opened fire on the group. Sergeant GIBSON was wounded severely in the right shoulder almost immediately but he continued to direct activities of his men and fire at the enemy. He succeeded in knocking out one of the machine guns. Two other members of the group, the assistant leader and the radio operator, also were wounded. Realizing that the enemy power was superior to that of the small group of men, he succeeded in withdrawing the group to safety. Sergeant GIBSON carried the wounded radio operator while leading his group back to his own lines. His devotion to duty set an example for all members of his organization and his courageous leadership was an inspiration to all. Entered the military service from Louisville, Kentucky.

Sergeant JOE C ROYBAL (Army Serial Number 6276926), Company I, 264th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy on 2 February 1945 in Brittany, France. When his company was being heavily shelled by enemy mortars and 88mm guns which could not be observed from the ground, Sergeant ROYBAL with complete disregard for personal safety climbed a tree near his position 500 yards from the enemy front line in an attempt to gain observation of the enemy gun locations. From his position he succeeded in detecting one 88mm gun and directed cannon company fire with such skill and accuracy upon it that the second volley neutralized the gun and killed two of the crew members. During the time he was in the tree, mortar and 88mm shells were bursting on the ground and in the air in his immediate vicinity making his position extremely dangerous. His fearless action and devotion to duty were an inspiration to all members of his company and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the entire military service. Entered the military service from Denver, Colorado.
