By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

GEORGE C. KUNERT, 36 812 293, Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "F", 15th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. On 2-3 January 1945, near Bennwhir, France, during a midnight attack on formidable enemy positions on the snow-covered slopes of a steep hill, Sergeant Kunert crawled one hundred thirty-five yards through fire which had helted his company to knock out a machine gun. Continuing his relembless and sinclehanded assault, he inched uphill through deep snow, under incessant blasts of automatic and rifle fire, to destroy two more machine gun positions with fragmentation and phosphorous granades, then assaulted a fourth machine gun and forced the surrender of its erew. Crawling four hundred yards, Sergeant Kunert annihilated four gun positions, killed two and captured seventeen Germans. Entered military service from Watertown, Wisocnsin.

JOSEPH G. LITTLE, 34 895 648, Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, laist Infantry Regiment, for entraordinary heroism in action an 12 December 1944, near Kientsheim, France. An observation post manned by Frivate First Class Little and three comrades was surrounded by more than forty-highly-trained German officer candidates and subjected to intense small asse fire. For more than two hours the four men held their position against repeated assaults during which they killed at least fifteen of the attackers. Even after the enemy had descended their surrender and two of their number had been killed, Private First Class Little and his remaining comrade continued the successful defense of their position. By their courageous and determined action they enabled friendly troops to counterstack and regain their former positions. Entered military service from Clifton, North Carolina.

SAMUEL D. MURRAY, 34 922 723, Private, Infantry, Headquarters Company, laist Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 12 December 1964, near Kientsheim, France. An observation rost manned by Private Marray and three comrades was surrounded by more than forty highly-trained German efficer candidates and subjected to intense small arms fire. For more than two hours the four man held their position against repeated assaults during which they killed at least fifteen of the attackers. Even after the entity had demanded their surrender and two of their number had been killed, Private Marray and his remaining comrade continued the successful defense of their

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position. By their courageous and determined action they enabled friendly troops to counterattack and regain their former positions. Entered military service from Kingsport, Tennessee.

EMIL PRAEGER, 36 730 929, Sergeant, Infantry, Company "L", 15th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 1530 hours on 27 December 1944, during the grim house-to-house battle for control of Sigolsheim, France, Sergeant Praeger dashed fifty yards down a street deluged by enemy automatic fire to assault two strongholds which had halted his platoon. Charging alone into the first enemy-held house, he engaged two machine pistolmen with his carbine, drove them from room to room and, in a five-minute fight, wounded them and forced them to surrender. Although painfully wounded in the shoulder, he assaulted the second house single-handed, silenced its machine gun and killed the two man crew. Entered military service from Chicago, Illinois.





I — AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the previsions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commandor to the following named individuals:

EDWARD J. DZIEKIEWICZ, 33 365 151, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Headquarters and Service Company, 2332d Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 26 March 1945, near Morsch, Germany. During the assault crossing of the Rhine River, Technician Fifth Grade Daiekiewicz repeatedly exposed himself to intense enemy fire in order to repair telephone lines damaged by a concentrated enemy artillery barrage. Although painfully wounded in the neck by shrapnel, he voluntarily returned to his hazardous duty after he had received medical treatment. His heroic conduct played a vital part in effecting the successful transportation of the Infantry across the river. Entered military service from Sharpsburg, Pennsylvania.

BUCENE G. FRAGALE, 33 178 147, Technician Fourth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 2833d Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 26 March 1945, during the Rhine River crossing. Tuchnician Fourth Grade Fragale operated a heavy ponteon raft which was observed by the enemy and brought under heavy fire. After successfully reaching the far shore the raft broke locae and began to drift downstream. Ignering the danger to his life, Technician Fourth Grade Fragale plugged two shrapnel holes in the gas tank with his fingers, refilled the tank with gas, and started the motor. By his quick witted and courageous action he saved the raft for future use and prevented serious damage to an important pontoon bridge. Entered military service from Fhiladelphia, Fennsylvania.

ALEXANDER FRENCH, 32 534 401, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 2831st Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 26 March 1945, near Ibercheim, Germany. During an assault crossing of the Rhine River Technician Fifth Grade French, without waiting for orders, took over the operation of an assault boat in which the operator and the bow man had become casualties during the initial phase of the action. Under intense morter and machine gun firs, he made six crossings of the river. By his courage and tenacity he contributed materially to the success of the assault. Entered military service from New York, New York.

DANIEL A. MESBITT, Ol 109 554, First Lieutenant, Corpe of Engineers, 2832d Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 26 March 1945, near Morech, Germany. Charged with the responsibility of maintaining Engineer communications during the crossing of the Rhine River, Lieutenant Nesbitt

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repeatedly exposed himself to intense enemy artillery and mortar fire in order to repair and maintain his unit's lines of communication. His heroic conduct was in large measure responsible for the successful execution of this vital operation. Entered military service from Jordan, New York.

ROBERT L. STRENGE, 36 295 523, Private First Class, Coast Artillery. Corps, Battery "B", 838th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion (Mobile), for gallantry in action on 19 March 1945, in the vicinity of Hornbach, Germany. During a heavy enemy artillery barrage, Private First. Class Strenge's chief of section was mortally wounded by shrapmel. With utter disregard for his safety, Private First Class Strenge left the security of his foxhole and rushed to the aid of the wounded man. After assisting in moving the injured soldier to a covered position, he then ran two hundred myards to an aid station and returned with proper medical assistance. Entered military service from Superior, Wisconsin.

I — AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the esident, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the Following named individual:

HENRY H. COBB, JR., O 514 383, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, Battery "B", 42d Field Artillery Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action from 10 Nevember to 12 Nevember 1944, in the Hurtgen Forest, Germany. Lieutenant Cobb, forward observer for a field artillery unit, displayed remarkable courage and competence, and was largely responsible for averting disaster to elements of friendly infantry which had become surrounded. On four distinct occasions, he faced either direct tank fire from points as near as seventy-five yards, or intense hostile artillery, mortar, and small arms fire, in order to direct effective artillery fire against the attacking enemy. One direct hit demolished a duguet from which he was operating. Later, a heavy artillery near miss buried him, momentarily, in debris. Undaunted by these perilous circumstances, he pursued his mission until he had suncessfully repulsed every asseult and on one occasion annihilated an entire enemy force of approximately seventy-five sen. Entered military service from Birmingham, Alabama.

II - AWARD OF THE SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Soldier's Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

EDECND G. Sr. LAURENT, 31 059 599, Technician Third Grade, Infantry, Headquarters Seventh Army, for heroism no involving actual conflict with the enemy on 31 January 1945, in Luneville, France. When he discovered a fire which was spreading rapidly through a building housing numerous government vehicles, Technician Third Grade St. Laurent, demonstrating outstanding courage and presence of mind, spread the alarm, then dashed into the bisming building and drove out several United States Army vehicles. His prespt estimas were directly responsible for saving much valuable government property. Entered military service from Boston, Massachusetts.

JOHN SARACINI, 20 329 565, Staff Sergeant (then Sergeant), Corps of Military Police, '363d Military Police Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 27 April 1943, near Bella, Tunisia, North Africa. Sergeant Saraceni directed and participated in the rescue of a group

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of his comrades who were pinned under an overturned truck in a creek bed, twenty-five feet below the road. Disregarding the danger involved in working in gasoline-covered water, and under a half-submerged truck, by his prompt action and presence of mind Staff Sergeant Saraeeni succeeded in removing approximately twelve men without further mishap. Entered military service from Easton, Pennsylvania.

III- AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

WILLIAM KEEN, 36 653 673, Corporal, Corps of Engineers, Company "A", 2832d Engineer Combat Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 26 March 1945, near Morsch, Germany: During the crossing of the Rhine River, Corporal Keen was second in command of a squad of men detailed to construct and operate light assault rafts on the river. Despite heavy enemy shell fire which inflicted numerous casualties, Corporal Keen, displaying outstanding tenacity and courage, remained in the area and launched one of the first light assault rafts. Throughout the remainder of the day he maintained the flow of vital supplies to the far shore, thereby contributing in large measure to the success of the operation. Entered military service from Chicago, Illinois.

FREDERICK C. WOODS, C.368 221, Captain, Corps of Engineers, 2832d Engineer Compat Batterion, for heroic achievement in action on 23 March 1945, near Frank nthal, Germany. Assigned the difficult task of making a daylight reconnaise are of the Rhine River to find a suitable site for the assault crossing, Captain Woods gained all the information he could from the Infantry outposts. Not satisfied with this, he donned civilian clothes and proceeded to make a reconnaissance of the river bank under direct observation of the enemy. He spent one hour reconnoitering, gaining such valuable information that sites for the cable crossings and areas for launching assault boats were charted several days before "H" hour thus allowing operations to start with a minimum loss of time and casualties. Captain Woods! courage and ingenuity reflect the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Clarksburg, West Virginia.



AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commands, to the following named individuals:

DONALD DAVIES, 39 140 506, Private, Infantry, Company "F", 12th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 30 July 1944, in the vicinity of Hamby, France. As a member of a three man patrol, Private Davies advanced far beyond his company lines in an effort to determine enemy strength and disposition. The patrol was suddenly surrounded by an enemy force of superior strength. The enemy promptly closed in, captured the trio, and marched them to a nearby barn. A German officer, addressing the leader of the patrol, demanded that he divulge the location and strength of the attacking American unit. The leader refused to comply, whereupon the C man officer shot and killed him. A second member of the patrol was then questioned in a similar manner. He too refused to respond to the German's demands and suffered a similar fate. The German officer then turned to Private Davies and demanded that he give the desired information. He refused and was shot in the leg. Upon further questioning he maintained his silence and the officer shot him in the arm. Despite intense pain, he continued his heroic silence until he was subsequently rescued by his company. Private Davies' willingness to undergo severe torture and face imminent death rather than betray his fellow soldiers is in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Oakland, California.

AMOS S. JOHNSON, Ol 999 797, First Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, Company "L", 8th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 10-11 February 1945, near Hermispand, Germany. Lieutenant Johnson, still recuperating from a recent illness, led a patrol through heavy enemy fire and unfamiliar terrain to deliver rations to a completely surrounded company and reestablished communications. He then evacuated casualties and priseners by the same hasardous route. At approximately midnight of the same day he made a second round trip, during which he eluded an enemy group attempting to ambush his patrol. He later contacted the isolated company for a third time and skillfully guided it in a withdrawal through enemy lines to a position of safety. His valorous conduct reflects the finest traditions of the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Blanchardville, Wisconsin.

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
DOYLE C. STRICKLAND, Ol 303 967, First Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, Company "H", Eth Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 10 June 1944, in the vicinity of Ecausseville, France. The rifle company supported by Lieutenant Strickland's heavy machine gun platoon became ambushed by a large ener force, whose small arms fire was supplemented by heavy artillery and martar concentrations. Heavy casualties in both units resulted, and left Lieutenant Strickland with only seven men and two machine guns in his platoon. He reorganized his men under this intense fire and so effectively coordinated fire from his two remaining machine guns that the volume of enemy fire was substantially reduced, thus enabling friendly troops to reorganize their position. He personally took over a machine gun when its crew became casualties, provided flank protection and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy. In an ensuing movement to locate enemy positions, Lieutenant Strickland engaged an enemy group in a fire fight at one hundred yards. He killed ten Germans and then rushed forward, capturing the remaining five. Lieutenant Strickland's extractionary leadership and gallantry are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from McKinney, Texas.

JOHN C. SWEARINGEN, O 414 428, Captain, Infantry, Headquarters 2d Battalion, 8th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 18-19 January 1945, in the vicinity of Battendorf, Luxembourg. When his battalion was threatened by severed communications and enemy infantry who had infiltrated, Captain Swearingen led a patrol of volunteers to restore wire lines and engage the Germans. Coming upon a hostile machine gun lest, Captain Swearingen crawled forward and threw a hand grenade directly into the position, destroying the gun and its crew. He then restored wire communication which enabled his commanding officer to control his troops during a critical phase of the operation. Captain Swearingen's extraordinary heroism is in keeping with the highest traditions of the service. Entered military service from Georgia.





I -- AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named i dividuals:

WILLIAM R. DEZARN, 02 010 605, Second Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant), Infantry, Company "A", 7th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 1500 hours on 3 November 1944, near Jacques, France, Sergeant Dezarn led'two decimated platoons in three assaults on formidable hill positions, ringed by machine guns and fronted by a minefield. Advancing alone to within fifty yards of the enemy line, he detonated eleven mines, drawing bursts of machine gun fire after each explosion; then directed a rain of artillery and mortar shells on the German positions. Singlehandly assaulting and destroying a machine gun and its three-man crew with grenades at fifteen yards, Sergeant Dezarn endeavored to lead his men through the breach, but was crippled by enemy shell fire. Entered military service from London, Kentucky.

DISALVO, 31 260 789, Staff Sergeant (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "G", 143d Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 18 December 1944, in the vicinity of Mittelwihr, France. When his squad was pinned down in an open field by heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire, Sergeant DiSalvo rose to his knees and turned his rifle on the machine gun position, drawing the hostile fire to himself and enabling his comrades to withdraw fifty yards to the shelter of a ditch. Then, although he was the target for rapid bursts of machine gun fire, he crawled forward and outflanked the emplacement. From an exposed position he hurled three hand grenades into the strongpoint, destroying the manhine gun and killing three Germans. His intrepid and aggressive action eliminated a serious threat to his comrades and enabled them to continue the attack. Entered military service from Fitchburg, Massachusetts.

JAMES R. HUDSPETH, 14 012 366, Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "D", 756th Tank Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 26 January 1945, near Houssen, France. Sergeant Hudspeth drove his tank forward through furious machine gun and basooka fire to smash strong German positions. Fighting without support on bare, open ground, his head and shoulders exposed over the open turret, he fired seven thousand rounds of machine gun ammunition and directed 37 millimeter fire at three hundred Germans emplaced behind a levee. His ammunition spent, he reloaded from an immobilised tank and returned through artillery fire to renew the attack. Though painfully wounded in the

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head, he fought for snother hour, killing seventy of the enemy and shattering their defenses. Entered military service from Columbus, Georgia.

VICTOR M. MORRIS, Ol 298 274, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Commanding Officer, Company "C" (then Commanding Officer, Company "A"), 7th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At OO15 hours on 5 February 1945, during a tank-infantry attack on Vogelsheim, France, Lieutenant Morris indomitably urged his men forward through two impact areas of artillery and tank fire. Although wounded four times by shell fragments, he rushed from man to man for ten minutes, with shells exploding twenty yards away, to load his decimated company on tanks and then order the tank force to renew its advance. Under artillery and sniper fire, bleeding from his four wounds, he led his assault platoons in storming a town, killing eight and capturing ten of the enemy. En'ered military service from West Hurley, New York.

II - AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

JOHN E. DAHLQUIST, 07 120, Major General, United States Army, Commanding 36th Infantry Division, for gallantry in action on 28 October 1944, in the vicinity of Biffontaine, France. After three attacks by Company "G", 141st Infantry Regiment had been halted by intense enemy machine gun and mortar fire, General Dahlquist arrived in the area as the company was preparing for another assault. Personally assuming command of a platoon assigned the mission of destroying two German machine gun positions, General Dahlquist ordered one light and one medium tank to support the small group. Then, advancing with the assault squad, he led his men aggressively forward, through intense machine gun, mortar and artillery fire, to within seventy-five yards of the gun emplacement. Under his skillful leadership and personal direction the men killed the members of one gun crew and captured the other hostile group. General Dahlquist's gallant action, performed at great personal risk, was a great inspiration to the men of Company "G", 141st Infantry Regiment and enabled the unit to penetrate the German defenses. Entered military service from Minnesota.

CHARLES E. CASEY, Ol 102 660, First Lieutenant, Corps of Engineers, Company "F", 344th Engineer Regiment (GS), for gall/antry in action on 28 August 1944, in the vicinity of Loriol, France. When his men were halted by heavy mortar and automatic weapons fire, Lieutenant Casey, who was serving as platoon commander of the advance guard, though himself wounded, promptly deployed his platoon to cover. With utter disregard for his own safety, he reconnectered the enemy position to obtain complete information for the supporting tank commander, and then led two squads of his platoon to outflank the enemy. Not until after the position had been eliminated and his wounded cared for, did he seek first aid for his wounds. Lieutenant Casey's heroic and selfless action was an inspiration to his men and reflected the finest tradition of the service. Entered military service from Bristol, Connecticut.

HCYT W. HOLBROOK, 14 108 178, Frivate First Class, Corps of Engineers, Company "A", 2831st Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 26 Farch 1945, in Germany. Frigate First Class Holbrook was a member of an infantry, assault-boat crew engaged in an assault crossing of the Rhine River. After completing his assigned trips he again braved heavy hostile fire to race his boat out to midstream and rescue two infantrymen whose boat had been destroyed by enomy fire and who were drifting downstream into enemy waters. The outstanding courage he displayed reflects credit on himself and the service. Entered military service from Fledmont, Alabama.

JOHN B. FATTERSON, Ol O31 672, First Lieutenant, Cavalry, Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Office of Strategic Services, Buropean Theater of Operations United States Army (Forward) (then of G-2 Strategic Service Section, Headquarters Seventh Army), for gallantry in action on 11 February 1945, near Blies-Ebersing, France. Lieutenant Patterson crossed the Blies River into enemy territory for the purpose of infiltrating an agent on an intelligence mission. Hearing enemy fire being directed on the area of infiltration after he had returned to the American lines, he returned fire to divert the enemy's attention. Shortly, he proceeded to where cries had been reverted and, on the other side of the river, he saw the agent dragging himself to the bank. This point was under direct enemy observation and fire, the opposite side was mined, and the river current was strong. Despite these obstacles, Lieutenant Patterson, aided by another officer, dragged a boat

along the bank where they managed to cross, disembarked, passed through a minefield to the agent, and carried him back to the boat. Still under enemy observation, the two officers floated on down the stream and crossed back to the American lines with the agent. Entered military service from Newark, California.

AUBREY E. THOMAS, 37 313 246, Private First Class, Corps of Engineers, 6638th Engineer Mine Clearance Company (Armored) (Provisional), for gallantry in action from 24 March 1945 to 30 March 1945, near Kaiserslautern, Germany. Private First Class Thomas displayed exceptional courage and ingenuity and rendered invaluable service by employing his ten-ton wrecker in dragging a sories of wrecked railway cars from a blocked railroad tunnel and in removing projectiles from giant artillery shells that were also in the tunnel. Disregarding the ever present danger from enormous quantities of sensitized explosives, he labored tirelessly in the tunnel to accomplish his hazardous task with a high degree of efficiency and ingenuity consistent with the best traditions of the service. JOSE E. TURRIETA, 38 352 031, Private, Infantry, Company "E", 141st Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 16 March 1945, in Hagenau, France. When a German machine gun, firing down the length of a street, delayed the assault on an enemy-held house in Hagenau, Private Turrieta volunteered to deliver covering fire while his squad crossed the road. After all his comrades had crossed safely, he started to rejoin the squad. Hulfway across the street he was subjected to rapid bursts of machine gun fire and, though in full view of the enemy, stopped to return the hostile fire with his rifle. Although mortally wounded by machine gun bullets, he valiantly continued firing until he had silenced the gun. Then, despite intense pain, he crawled across the street and, from a window of a house, fired at enemy soldiers in the area until he died of his wounds. His intrepid and heroic action enabled his platoon to seize its objective. Next of Kin: Mr. Ambrosio Turrieta (Father), Grants, New Mexico.

ROBERT E. TUCKER, Ol9 938, Lieutenant Colonel (then Major), Infantry, Headquarters 1st Battalion, 254th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. On 23 January 1445, in the vicinity of Benwihr, France, the 1st Battalion attacked a strongly defended enemy-held hill, under the command of Colonel Tucker. As the battalion was moving up under heavy artillery, mortar, machine gun and rifle fire the center company encountered an anti-personnel minefield and was pinned down. Colonel Tucker, realizing the hopelessness of further advance acted quickly. With dauntless courage, he moved through anti-personnel minefields under intense enemy fire, from one company to another, organizing and bringing the battalion under his personal control. Through his cool, calm and deliberate action, Colonel Tucker was successful in recognizing his battalion and continuing the attack which resulted in the capture and occupation of the strongly fortified hill. 



AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS

By direction of the Fresident, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

GLEN McGUIRE, 38 036 578, Staff Sergeant, Field Artillery, Company "C", 636th Tank Destroyer Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 27 and 28 November 1944, in the vicinity of La Chipal, France. While Sergeant McGuire's two N-10 tank destroyers were parked beside a house occupied by friendly troops, the enemy opened fire with machine guns, 20 millimeter guns and bazookas, destroying one tank destroyer and setting the other on fire. Acting on his own initiative, Sergeant McGuire fired the gun in the burning M-10 until the breech froze. Then, from the second story of the burning house, he adjusted artillery fire on the enemy, braving 20 millimeter and machine gun fire to remain in position until the flames and smoke forced him away. By his outstanding heroism, he stopped a direct assault against the house and enabled his comrades to reach friendly lines. Sergeant McGuire was killed in action during a subsequent engagement. Next of Kin: Mrs. Doris Strozier (Sister), 322% 2d Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

MARIO POMFONIO, 42 097 185, Frivate, Infantry, Company "E", 7th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 30 January 1945, in Wihren-Plaine, France. Then sixty Germans threatened to overrun his Battalion OP, Private Pomponio, a reinforcement without previous combat experience, vaulted onto a six foot wall and, while exposed to blasts of automatic fire, killed a four-man make the gun orew at fifteen yards range with M-1 rifle fire. Then, charging into the core of the hostile position, he killed a second machine gun orew and captured ten Germans in a fierce firefight. His intrepid, single-handed assault broke the enemy counterattack. Private Pemponio was killed in a subsequent action. Next of Kin: Mrs. Anna Pomponio (Mother), 24 De Land Park B, Fairport, New York.

CHARLES H. SINCLAIR, 37 621 114, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "L", 143d Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 15 March 1945, in the vicinity of Mietesheim, France. Then the assault elements of his company were halted in an open field by grazing crossfire from three enemy machine guns, Private First Class Sinclair voluntarily crawled forward alone in an attempt to destroy the weapons. Although machine gun bullets hit within inches of him, he continued forward and hurled a grenade into the wirst emplacement, killing two Germans and forcing eight to surrender. The , in spite of heavy fire, he destroyed the second machine gun position, killing three

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Germans and capturing six. As he started towards the third machine gun position, he became the target for an enemy self-propelled gun and was killed by its fire. His valiant and heroic actions enabled his unit to continue the attack and seizo its objective with little delay and a minimum of casualties. Next of Kin: Mrs. Julie Lee Sinclair (Mother), 319 Willow Street, Hannibal, Missouri.

MALCCIM G. SMITH, JR., Ol 326 670, First Lieutenant, Infantry, 143d Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 15 March 1945, in Bitschoffen, France. When grazing crossfire from three machine guns halted the first assault on Bitschoffen, Lieutenant Smith remained in an exposed position to cover the withdrawal of his men. The second attempt to enter the town was frustrated by enemy hand grenades, mine explosions and machine gun fire, and Lieutenant Smith again remained behind so make certain his men reached safety. Then, leading what was left of his plateon in a third attack, he braved heavy machine gun and mortar fire to reach the edge of the town. After clearing the first house and capturing three prisoners, he assaulted a second building and personally captured two more of the enemy. As he started toward the next house, he was killed by sniper fire. His heroic and aggressive leadership contributed greatly to the capture of this important town. Next of Kin: Mr. Malcolm G. Smith (Father), 1329 Sixth Avenue, Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania.

CLIFTCN C. THOMAS, 20 731 151, Frivate, Infantry, Company "B", 7th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary hereism in action. At 0100 hours on 23 January 1945, near Colmar, France, when his company was halted by blasts of automatic fire and threatened with annihilation by a Mark VI tank which approached to attack its exposed flank, Private Thomas volunteered to stave off the tank assault singlehanded. Running seventy-five yards through heavy fire, without cover or concealment, he engaged the tank from an exposed position. Under fire from three machine guns, with only seconds to accomplish his mission, he fired two granades and forced the tank to withdraw. During this action Frivate Thomas was killed by enemy machine gun fire. Next of Kin: Yrs. Loal Collier (Mother), 62 North 7th avenue, Glondale, Arizona.

I -- AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

DONALD C. ONG, 35 650 03k, Technical Savgeant (then Staff Sergeant), Infantry, Company "E", 30th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 18 August 1944, at Brignoles, France. Sergeant Ong. crawled twenty yards through withering firs to assault a German force which had halted his company. Fighting at twenty yard range, seriously wounded in the foot by one of his own grenades, Sergeant Ong hurled twenty—three hand grenades at the enemy foxholes killing five, wounding seven and capturing thirty of the enemy. Despite his painful wound, he then crawled and ran one hundred and sixty yards through fire to direct mortar concentrations which demolished an additional seventy—five Germans. Entered military service from Charleston, West Virginia,

JOHN E. SMITH, 10 039 622, Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "E", . 15th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 1030 hours on 26 October 1944, near Hourgonce, France, Sergeant Smith charged forward alone across thirty yards of bare, open ground to engage an enemy flak-wagon with his carbine at twenty-five yards range. Despite 105 millimeter, tank, flak-wagon and machine gun fire, and although painfully wounded in the shoulder, he fought for fifteen minutes, killing three Germans and forcing abandonment of the flak-wagon. Crawling fifty yards through intense fire, he directed tank destroyer fire on a Mark IV tank, knocking it out, then led his men in a bayonet charge to selse the contested valley. Entered military service from Houston, Mississippi.

I — AWARD OF THE DISMINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

TORSTEN E. HENDERSON, 39 574 722, Private, Infantry, Company "H", 30th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary hereism in action. At 0400 hours on 20 April 1945, during the battle for Nuremberg, Germany, Private Henderson brawed the fury of a German counterattack by a reinforced company armed with Panze fausts and automatic weapons. Firing his machine gun from an open doorway, he killed Germans at thirty yards. Then seizing a M-1 rifle he manned an exposed window position for over an hour, ignoring withering automatic fire and the crash of rockets against the house wall. Killing six and wounding six Germans, this intrepid soldier beat off wave after wave of counterattack and saved his platoon from destruction. Entered military service from Sar Fernando, California,

II - AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

CHARLES M. BERNUTH, 01 030 783, Captain, Cavalry, Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Office of Strategic Services, European Theater of Operations United States Army (Forward) (them of G-2, States dervice Section, Headquarters Seventh Army), for gallantry in action on 11 February 1945, near Blies-Ebersing, France. Captain Bernuth crossed the Blies River into enemy territory for the purpose of infiltrating an agent on an intelligence mission. Hearing enemy fire being directed on the area of infiltration after he had returned to the American lines, he returned fire to divert the enemy's attention. Shortly, he proceeded to where ories had been reported and, on the other side of the river; he saw the agent dragging himself to the bank. This point was under direct enemy observation and fire, the opposite side was mined, and the river current was strong. Despite these obstacles, Captain Bernuth, aided by another officer, dragged a boat along the bank where they managed to cross, disembarked, passed through a minefield to the agent, and carried him back to the boat. Still under enemy observation, the two officers floated on down the stream and crossed back to the American lines with the agent. Entered military service from Somerville, New Jersey.

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III- ANARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual for meritorious service in direct support of combat operations:

EDWARD R. McCARTHY, K 100 021, Lieutenant Colonel, Coast and Geodetic Survey (Corps of Engineers), Headquarters 2755th Engineer Combat Battalion, from 6 January 1945 to 8 May 1945, in France and Germany. Entered military service from Key West, Florida.

IV - AWARD OF THE PURPLE HEART. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Purple Heart is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual for wounds received as a result of enemy action:

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

EDWARD B. TORB', 33 429 037, Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 180th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 18 April 1945, at Nurember, Germany. When enemy rifle, machine gun and bazooka fire impeded the advance of his squad, Sergeant Torba led an aggressive assault upon fanatically defended buildings. Although wounded in the leg by a sniper, he ontinued firing his submachine gun and advancing until struck in the hip by rifle fire. Knocked to his knees, he nevertheless recovered and moved forward until killed while directing his squad along a covered route. Sergeant Torba's determination and heroic actions proved inspirational to his men and reflected the finest traditions of military service. Next of Kin: Mrs. Arna Torba (Mother), RD 1, Box 1540, Latrobe, Pennsylvania.

II - AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

D. C. BYERS, Ol 692 574, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, 141st Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 12 and 13 December 1944, near Kaysersberg, France. While taking a combat patrol into hostile territory, Lieutenant Byers assaulted a machine gun position, killing two Germans, then led an attack against a pillbox in which four more of the enemy were killed and five prisoners were taken. After killing the two guards of a German supply dump, he took his men to a point approximately fifteen hundred yards behind the enemy lines where he could observe hostile dispositions in an important town. On the following morning, Lieutenant Byers directed his eighteen men in holding back a company of the enemy until his pillbox position was surrounded. He then led them in fighting their way back to the company area. As a result of his outstanding leadership and aggressiveness, approximately twenty-five Germans were killed and five prisoners were taken. Entered military service from Chickamaugua, Georgia.

III- AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

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LESLIE E. BUZARD, 39 173 954, Technician Fourth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 2755th Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 26 March 1945, near Mannheim, Germany. Although all other personnel had been driven to cover by intense artillery and mortar fire, Technician Fourth Grade Buzard and a small group strove to launch their utility boat during the assault crossing of the Rhine River, until point blank fire from 88 millimeter guns wounded one of them and forced them to withdraw. Returning to the boat with two comrades, Technician Fourth Grade Buzard dragged the boat to comparative shelter from the enemy fire and succeeded in launching it. By utter disregard for his own safety, he launched the only boat powerful enough to drag across the river the vital maneuver cables required for the operation of all the other river-crossing craft. His actions made possible the accomplishment of his platoon's mission. Entered military service from Cashmere, "ashington.

WILLIAM H. CAVE, O 268 173, Captain, Medical Corps. 2d Auxiliary Surgical Group (Detachment), for gallantry in action on 9-10 April 1945, at Crailsheim, Germany. Captain Cave volunteered to fly into enemy territory, where he skillfully directed anesthesia and post-operative, surgical therapy under hostile fire for a force that was isolated and surrounded by the enemy. Engaged in an extremely dangerous mission, ne performed his duties untiringly, with exceptional professional judgment and in superb, exemplary fashion, above and beyond the call of duty. Entered military service from Mississippi.

I -- AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

EDWARD J. AMAITIS, Ol 173 850, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, 991st Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 19 March 1945, near Ensheim, Germany. Lieutenant Amaitis, displaying determination and great personal courage, approached the enemy's position under heavy small arms, mortar and artillery fire. Although he was rendered unconscious and blown into an anti-tank ditch by a bursting shell which killed two men twenty feet from him, he recovered consciousness, obtained the assistance of a tank, entered the enumy's position and remained there, still under fire, until his reconnaissance had been completed. Entered military service from New York, New York.

PAUL B. SCHOENEBERGER, O 445 030, Captain, Nedical Corps, Medical Detachment, 151st Ordnance Battalion, for gallantry in action on 19 April 1945, at Bamberg, Germany. Captain Schooneberger volunteered his services to administer aid to numerous casualties resulting from explosion of several carloads of enemy explosives which had been detonated by a time bomb. Working for over two hours under constant danger of flying debris from subsequent explosions. he rendered first aid and directed evacuation of the casualties. Captain Schooneberger's action minimised the effect of grave injuries and saved many lives. Entered military service from Perham, Minnesota.

II - AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronse Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named ... individuals:

LEO J. BONNEAU, 37 157 804, Sergoant, Corps of Engineers, Company "C". 2833d Engineer Combat Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 26 March 1945, near Frankenthal, Germany. While commanding a platoon of sterm boat operators during the prossing of the Rhine River, Sergeant Bonneau exposed himself to concentrated enemy fire on the boat assembly area in order to assist in caring for the wounded. Later, although wounded, he remained with his men. reorganised thum and directed the infantrymen to the boats. Serguant Boringau's aggressive leadership and courage were a major contribution to the successful completion of the mission assigned his plateon. Entered military service from Concordia, Kansas:

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ROGER L. STELTZNER, O 423 268, Captain, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "A", 838th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion, Mobile, for heroic achievement in action on 30 April 1945, in the vicinity of Aichach, Germany. Captain Steltzner became separated from his searching party and encountered two German officers and four enlisted men. When he ordered them to surrender one of the officers opened fire wounding him in the leg. Captain Steltzner then threw a hand grenade into the party, wounding one man and opuned fire with his carbine, killing another. The four remaining Germans then surrendered. Entered military service from St. Paul, Minnesota.

CHARLES J. VITELIC, Ol 055 493, First Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant), Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "A", 838th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalian, Mobile, for heroic achievement in action on 25-26 March 1945, in the vicinity of Worms, Germany. During the assault phase of the Rhine River crossing, and after three attempts had failed due to heavy enemy artillery fire, Lieutenant Vitelle finally succeeded in getting his guns into position on the bank of the river and successfully carried out the special mission assigned him. Entered military service from Richwood, "est Virginia.

JAMES C. ELLING, 6 254 675, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "A", 15th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. On 30 March 1945, near Gross Heubach, Germany, when his company was halted on an open plain by blistering automatic and rifle fire, Private First Class Elling dashed forward alone in a reckloss assault on the entire enemy force. Sprinting ninety-five yards into the hallstorm of enemy bullets, he knocked out a machine gun and its four-man crew with EAR fire, then charged into a nest of snipers and yanked nine cowering Germans from their foxholes. Finally, he crawled forty yards to strike a German strongpoint, killing or capturing a total of twenty-six enemy infantrymen. Entered military service from Fredonia, Kansas.

BELERE R. REISINGER, 33 871 962, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "E", 15th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. On 26 October 1944, near La Bourgonce, France, when his company was halted on a thinly wooded hill by powerful concentrations of tank, tank destroyer, and artillery fire, Private First Class Reisinger dashed forward alone with his barooka and a single rocket. Advancing ninety yards across woods and meadows, menaced by tree bursts, and under constant machine gun and eniper fire, he destroyed the tank with a single rocket at ten yards range, capturing ite, five-man arew. His intropial action pierced the cordon of enemy armor and inspired his company to autick and overrun the enemy position. Entered military service from Wrightavalle, Ponasylvania.

I -- A'ARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-DERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President. under the provisions of anny Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as emended, the Distinguished-Service Gross is awarded by the samy Commander to the following named individuals:

· CHARLES E. HOKE: 38 677 658, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "F", 143d Infantry Ragiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 16 March 1945, in the vicinity of Letenhe'm, France. "hen Company "3", 143d Infantry Regiment was halted in ar oven field by low, grazing crossfire from four enemy machine guns, Private First Class Hooker was assigned the mission of leading two commades back to reestablish contact between it and his own company. Before reaching the company position, he assaulted two of the machine gun emplacements, throwing han I greates and firing his sub-machine gun. Surviving artillary, mortar and small arms fire, he silended both schine guns and killed nine Germans. After contacting Company "G", he secured two additional men and led his small grown in attacking the two remaining gun positions. Although he was the target for heavy machine un fire, he pressed his assault skillfully, killing one gum er, capturing six crew members, and silencing both guns. By this scries of bold and aggressive actions, Private First Class Hooker destroyed four German machine gun nests and enabled the company to continue its advance. Entered military service from Raymondville, Texas.

KERVIT H. SHLVIT, OL 296 270, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company MCM, 143d Infantry Rogiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 22 March 1945, in the vicinity of Dorrenbach, Jermany. When his platoon was pinned down by heavy muchine gum, rifla and nubelwerfer fire from several well-camouflaged strongpoints in the Siegfried Line, Lieutenant Selvig began crayling along toward one of the pillboxes. Fravely exposing himself to the hostile fire, he hurled first a fragmentation granade and then a phosphorous granade into the aperture of the fortification. Then, signalling for his plateen to follow him, he rushed the strongpoint and captured five Germans. Upon locating a second pillbox, he again crawled forward and, moved to within ten wards of the posttion firing his carbine as he advanced. Rushing inside, he captured eleven German officers. With these two strongpoints cleared, he led his platoon .. forward in a bold and aggressive action that pleared five more pillboxes, captured an enemy aid station and took ninety German's prisoner. Entered military mervice from Chicago, Illinois.

BLAWR'S. 'ARD, Ol 663 477, First Lieutenant, Infantry, 143d Infantry. Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on the hights of 2 and 3 February. 1945, in the vicinity of Herlisheim, France. Having lod a reconnaiseance

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patrol on the preceding night to determine the enemy strength and disposition around an important bridge site, Lieutenant "ard was assigned the mission of seising the bridge with his plateon. He led eight men across the bridge in the face of intense enemy machine gun fire. On the far bank he fired rifle grenades against the machine gun position, silencing the weapon and killing its crew. Then, attacking an enemy-held building, he led his plateon in killing six of the enemy and capturing thirty. When a group of six Germans attempted to blow up the bridge, he opened fire with his carbine and captured them all. His intropid and gallant actions were responsible for securing the important bridge. Entered military service from Ivanhoe, Texas.

II - ATARD OF THE BROKES STATE SDAL. By direction of the President, under the previsions of Army Tegulations 200-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronzo Star Medal is averded by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

JOHN F. STAMBROUCH, 38 464 064, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, 6638th Engineer Mine Clearance Company (Armored) (Provisional), for gallantry in action on 22-23 December 1944, near Bitche, France. Technician Fifth Grade Stanbrough demonstrated outstanding courage and devotion to duty by repairing a disabled tankdozer in the face of constant danger from enemy artillery, rocket and mortar fire, which was falling in his immediate vicinity. Dismissing all thoughts of his own safety, he remained steadfast under the barrage and courageously completed his task of saving vital and costly tankdoser equipment. His conduct under fire was consistent with the highest traditions of the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Tulsa, Oklahoma.

ARTHUR C. S'EENEY, 35 737 370, Private First Class, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 2831st Engineer Combat Battalion, for gallantry in action on 26 Narch 1945, near Rhein Durkheim, Germany. During an assault crossing of the Rhine River, Private First Class Sweeney, bowman of a storm boat, under heavy enemy fire when his motor died out during his first return trip, attempted to start the motor, but did not succeed for the boat was overturned by the explosion of a shell landing nearby. Nevertheless, determined to save the boat, his grabbed the bow line and swam to shore, slowly tugging the boat in after him. His extreordinary gallantry under fire reflects the finest traditions of the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Glen Rogers, West Virginia.

II - BATTLE HONORS - CITATION OF UNIT. By direction of the President, under the previsions of Section IV, Circular No. 383, War Department, 1943, the following named organisation is cited for estatanding performance of duty in action:

THE 3D BATTALION, 442d RECENTAL COMBAT TEAM is cited for outstanding accomplishment in combat during the period 27 October to 30 October 1944, near Biffontaine, France. On 27 October the 3d Battalion, 442d Regimental Combat Team was committed to battle after one-and-a-half days in a divisional reserve. One of the battalions of another unit which had been advancing deep into enemy territory beyond the town of Biffontaine was suddenly surrounded by the enemy, and separated from all friendly units by an enemy force estimated at seven hundred men. The mission of the 3d Battalion was to attack abreast with the 100th Battalion and four other battalions and relieve the entrapped unit. The mission was more difficult than it first appeared for the enemy had

reoccupied the thickly wooded hills situated within the two and one-half miles separating the "lost battalion" from our front lines. For four days the Battalion fought the stubborn enemy who was determined to stop all attempts to rescue the besieged battalion. Several readblocks skillfully reinforced by machine guns had to be destroyed while under heavy artillery fire. On 29 Cotober the Battalion encountered a well defended hill where the enemy, one hundred strong, held well dug-in positions on the hill and would not be dislodged. After repeated Frontal assaults had failed to drive the enemy from the hill, Companies "I" and "K" then leading the attack, fixed bayonets and charged up the slope, shouting at the enemy and firing from their hips, while the enemy fired pointblank into their ranks. In spite of the effective enemy fire the determined men pressed the assault and closed in with the enemy. Mearing the enemy machine on and machine pistol positions, some of the men charged the gun emplacements with their Thompson sub-machine guns or BARs killing or seriously wounding the enemy gun crew, but themselves sprawling dead over the enemy positions they had just neutralized. Completely unnerved by the vicious bayonet charge, the enemy fled in confusion after making a desperate stand. Though seriously depleted in man-power, the Battalion hurled back two determined enemy counterattacks, and after reducing a heavily mined roadblock, finally, established contact with the besieged battalion. The intrepidity, fearless courage, and complete disregard for personal safety displayed by the officers and enlisted men of the 3d Battalion, 442d Regimental Combat Team, exemplify the finest traditions of the Armed Forces of the United States.

Cook, 38 171 969, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "K", 30th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 26 March 1945, near Lampertheim, Germany. When his boat assault team was temporarily halted by a formidable enemy force, Private First Class Cook braved blasts of flak, automatic and rifle fire to attack the foe singlehanded. Although a sniper!s bullet smashed through his mouth and cheek, this indomitable soldier continued his advance alone through intense fire for two hundred yards, duelled and

silenced the flak gun, killed six and wounded three Germans with BAR fire. His face streaming blood, he fought without pause until twenty-two of the enemy surrendered, and his team was enabled to renew its advance and seize its objective. Entered military service from New Orleans, Louisiana.

EDWARD W. CCPELAND, 36 414 697, Technician Third Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 15 March 1945, at Offwiller, France. Technician Third Grade Copeland, Medical Aid lan, saw three men lying severely wounded in a concealed minefield. Knowing that entering the field meant almost certain death, he unhesitatingly went to help them. Before he reached the men he was severely injured by a mine explosion which severed part of his foot, but he crawled to each of the men and administered first aid. He then remained at an advanced collecting point and tended to the injured men there until they were sent to the rear. Only then did he permit himself to be evacuated. His actions reflect the highest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Grand Rapids, Michigan.

ED'ARD R. CROWSOF, O 553 668, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "K" 274th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. On 4 March 1945, during the attack on Stiring-Wendel, France, Lieutenant Crownon assumed command of Company "K" when his Company Commander was wounded. Under heavy" enemy artillary and mortar fire, he moved erect among his men shouting and . encouraging them to follow him in a charge against enemy-held houses. Inappired by his leadership, the men charged and overwhelmed the enemy positions. Lieutenant Crowson was wounded by an enemy sniper, but he continued to lead the attack until late in the evening. Ordered to be evacuated, he refused, staying with his company until he had it reorganized and ready to continue the attack. Entered military service from Fayetteville, North Carolina.

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CECIL D. "ALSTON, Ol Ol7 342, First Lieutenant, Cavalry, Company "A", 23d Tank Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 19 March 1945, in the vicinity of Munchweiler, Germany. After his tank had been disabled, Lieutenant "alsten set out on foot to locate the remainder of his platoon. Tithout food or rest for three days and nights, and near exhaustion, he was captured by three of the enemy. Regaining his strength, he took a rifle from one of his captors, overcame all three, took them prisoner and then located his other tanks. Lieutenant 'alsten stood guard all night and encouraged his nervous and shaken men. He later succeeded in evacuating his wounded assistant driver. The extraordinary heroism and unstinting devotion to duty which he displayed during this action reflects the finest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Menard, Texas.

MARCO ZAGH!, 32 974 621, Private First Class, Medical Department, Pedical Detachment, 398th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 9 January 1945, in the vicinity of Rimling, France. During an attack, hostile fire inflicted numerous casualties upon our forces and the movement of our armor over the only available evacuation route drew enemy fire of such intensity that drivers of medical vehicles were not ordered to 30 forward to collect the wounded. Although volunteers had not been solicited, Frivate First Class Zagha asked permission to evacuate ten seriously wounded men from an advanced collecting point, and in so doing made four consecutive trips over a road under direct enemy observation and tank fire. Private First Class Zagha's gallart action, performed at great risk to his own life, was instrumental in saving the lives of ten cricically wounded comrades and exemplified the highest traditions of the Medical Department. Entered military service from Brooklyn, New York.

CHARLES W. HUTTHREW, JR., 33 246 472, Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "F", 12th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 30 July 1944, in the vicinity of Hamby, France. "As a member of a three-man patrol, Sergeant Humphrey advanced far beyond his company lines in an effort to determine enemy strength and dispositions. The patrol suddenly found itself surrounded by an enemy force of superior strength. The enemy promptly closed in, captured the tric and marched them to a nearby barn. A German officer, aduressing the leader of the patrol, demanded that he divulge the location and strength of the attacking American unit. The leader refused to comply. whereupon the German officer shot and killed him. He then turned to Sergeant Humphrey and demanded that he provide the desired information, assuring him that he would share the fate of his leader if he refused. Sergeant Humphrey flatly refused to answer and he, too, paid the supreme sacrifice for his heroic action. Sergeant Humphrey's willingness to accept death rather than betray his righting conrades is in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service. Next of Kin: Madeline Watt (Sister), 1212 - 14th Avenue, Altoona, Pennsylvania.

EVERETT W. WORLEY, 6 882 218, Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "F", 12th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 30 July 1944, in the vicinity of Hamby, France. A three-man patrol led by Sergeant Worley advanced far beyond friendly lines in an effort to determine enemy strength and disposition. The patrol suddenly found itself surrounded by an enemy force of superior strength. Sergeant Worley became wounded by a hostile grenade, and the three men were taken captive and marched to a nearby barn. A German officer approached Sergeant Worley and demanded that he divulge the location and strength of the attacking American unit. Despite his wound and the officer's threat of death if he refused, Sergeant Worley steadfastly maintained his milence. The German officer thereupon shot and killed him. Sergeant Worley's heroic self-sacrifice in behalf of his fighting comrades is in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service. Next of Kin: Wrs. Elsina Worley (Nother), Damascus, Virginia.

II - AVARD OF THE BROVES STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the proper Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

HAUSER, Ol 036 186, First Lieutenant, Chemical Warfare Service, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 13 November 1944, near Bertrichamps, France. A heavy enemy artillery barrage landed in the gun position of the second platoon of Company "C", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, scering a direct hit on the ammunition.dump. A large fire was started followed by a heavy explosion which threw shell fragments and debris over the adjacent main supply route. Although shells continued to explode, Lieutenant Hauser, with complete disregard for his personal safety, guided the men to a safe area and then assisted in the removal of four barrels and four standards, thereby enabling the platoon to resume its firing mission in support of the attacking infantry. Entered military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

SAM EFMOR, JR., 0 389 170, Lieutenant Colonel, Chemical Warfare Service; 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 13 November 1944, at Bertrichamps, France. Then artillery scored a direct hit on a nearby ammunition dump, Colonel Efnor guided his men to safety, completely disregarding his severely lacerated hand. Refusing first aid treatment, he directed and assisted in the removal of debria from the road. Colonel Efnor's leadership and devotion to duty enabled amoulances and supply vehicles to continue their missions and the mortar platoon to resume supporting fire. Entered military service from Cuba, Illinois.

A ARD OF THE DIST CUISHED SERVICE CROSS

By direction of the Fresident, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

ELBERT L. BIAS, Ol 306 694, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "K", 180th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 19-20 April 1945, at Murnberg, Germany. Then fanatic enemy troops pinned down the leading elements of his company, Lieutenant Bias stood on a friendly tank and directed it in neutralizing the enemy fire. A panzerfaust struck near him, wounding him in the face and hand, and wounding several of his key personnel. Despite his painful wounds, Lieutenant Bias reorganized his command and continued the attack. He crossed a street under deadly small arms fire to contact a dying platoon leader and secure information which he used in quickly neutralizing the enemy fire. Repeatedly exposing himself to encourage the advance of his company, Lieutenant Bias inspired his company to overcome bitter resistance. Entered military service from Washington, D. C.

RATMOND A. HUFFT, O 345 Ol8, Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, 1st Battalion, 20th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 25-27 March 1945, mean Bensheim, Germany. Twenty-five hours prior to H-Hour, Colonel Hufft crossed the Rhine River and, working amid enemy patrols, reconnoitered a suitable limiting heach for his battalion. When enemy machine gun and flak fire opposed the crossing of his battalion, Colonel Hufft remained exposed to interest fire to speed the movement of his troops to their assembly areas. In the Edvance which followed, he personally participated in firefights and led small units in assaults upon enemy pockets of resistance. His aggressive and heroic conduct inspired his battalion to seize all — its objectives, with heavy loss to the enemy. Entered military service from New Orleans, Louisianna.

HENRY S. JORDAN, 02 055 162, Captain (then First Lieutenant), Infantry, Company II, 180th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 28 March 1945, near Blensbach, Germany. Amid enemy Panterfaust and bazooka fire, Captain Jordan directed the fire of supporting tanks upon enemy emplacements guarding a roadblock. He braved intense small arms fire to contact one of his platoons and then led it in a frontal assault, over open terrain, on the enemy position. At the head of his men, he charged two machine gun nests; and destroyed them with accurate fire from his sub-machine gun. Fersonally killing twelve of the enemy, Captain Jordan then led his company in clearing a stubbornly defended town and taking seventy prisoners. Captain Jordan's heroic performance reflects high credit upon the armed forces. Entered military service from Tahlequah, Oklahoma.

GEORGE W. POSCHNER, O 523 320, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "D", 179th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 8 January 1945, near Kohlhutte, France. Lieutenant Poschner, heavy weapons platoon leader, moved forward and manned a heavy machine gun, delivering rapid and accurate fire on the enemy and inflicting numerous casualties. All available ammunition expended, Lieutenant Poschner le. I his fox-hole, picked up a light machine gun, slung the belt over his shoulder and continued toward the enemy gun, firing the machine gun as he moved forward. He continued his fire until he was seriously wounded through the head by an enemy bullet, but he in turn had killed or wounded an estimated twenty Germans. Entered military service from Youngstown, Ohio.

CLAUDE R. SALDERS, O. 328 754, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company. "F", 180th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 18 March 1945, near Biesengen, Germany. Armed with a bazocka, Lieutenant Sanders proceeded: to within fifty yards of an 83 millimeter gun and knocked it out with one round, killing three members of the crew. Rejoining his platoon, he then led an assault upon a pillbox and, with hand grenades, seized the pillbox, killing its four occupants. The enemy then launched a fierce counterattack, severely wounding Lieutenant Sanders and killing or wounding all of his men. Alone, Lieutenant Sanders held off the determined chemy force until reinforcements arrived. His hero am and courage saved the pillbox for his company, and reflect the high traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Kansas City, Missouri.

Hearing cries for help, Private First Class Bradley, the company aid man, ran across the minefield to three seriously wounded men. After administering first aid to these casualties, he started to aid another soldier. Moving across the mined area, he exploded a mine and was very severely wounded, Despite intense pain, he continued to crawl forward toward his wounded comrade and, upon reaching him, calmly administered first aid. Then, as he crawled back across the minefield for a litter squad to evacuate the wounded, he exploded another mine and was killed instantly. His valiant and hereic action, which cost him his Life, was responsible for saving the lives of four wounded men. Next of kin: Mr. C. M. Bradley (Father), Route #3, Hickory Flat, Mississippi.

meer Combat Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 20 January 1945, near Baerenthal, France. An enemy patrol infiltrated the company's positions, taking two men whose machine gun'had jammed and another man sleeping in his fox-hole. Sergeant Ehlers, hearing the commotion and sensing the danger, with utter disregard for his own safety, darted from his fox-hole, barefooted, to alert the company. In the ensuing action, nine bullets entered his body, but he reached the platoon CP, warned the occupants and turned to aid those captured, but collapsed and died. His selfless courage and utter disregard for personal safety reflect the finest traditions of the military service.
