AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

**WILLIAM P. CADIEUX**, 32 716 981, Staff Sergeant, Infantry, 47th Armored Infantry Battalion, 5th Armored Division, for extraordinary heroism in action on 9 April 1945, near Wassel, Germany. Assisted by another man and with complete disregard for his personal safety, Sergeant Cadieux exposed himself to artillery, mortar, machine gun, sniper and rocket launcher fire to advance across a canal by using the remnants of a demolished bridge and swimming the remainder of the way when the bridge collapsed, to attack entrenched enemy positions on the far bank, clearing out six entrenched positions and returning with a total of twenty-four prisoners. The extraordinary heroism and courageous actions of Sergeant Cadieux reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Brooklyn, New York.

**CLARENCE FIRESTONE**, 33 766 856, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "B", 7th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 0530 hours on 15 March 1945, when his company was halted on the fringes of the Siegfried Line near Erchingen, Germany, by fire from two Mark IV tanks, Private First Class Firestone advanced in a lone assault on the enemy armor. Carrying his bazooka, he crawled and ran one hundred and twenty-five yards through withering tank and machine gun fire, ignoring bullets which struck his entrenching tool. Fifty yards from the first tank, he set it afire with a single rocket, killing two Germans, forcing the second tank to withdraw, and enabling his company to resume its advance. Entered military service from Somerset, Pennsylvania.

**RAYMOND GRODEN**, 42 045 177, Staff Sergeant (then Private First Class), Infantry, Company "C", 30th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 0930 hours on 2 December 1944, near Kegenheim, France, Sergeant Groden charged a formidable roadblock, defended by three machine guns, and, at fifteen yards range, knocked out two guns and killed three of the enemy with M-1 rifle fire. Assaulting an enemy CP he advanced through blistering automatic fire, which pierced his raincoat, entrenching tool cover and bandolier, to kill four Germans. Shattering another machine gun position and capturing four mortars, Sergeant Groden and his fellow scout killed twelve of the enemy, captured two, disintegrated all hostile resistance and seized the Battalion objective. Entered military service from Brooklyn, New York.

MERL C. LINDSLEY, O2 055 121, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Commanding Officer, Antitank Company, 15th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 0630 hours on 18 April 1945, during the battle for Nurnberg, Germany, Lieutenant Lindsley killed an SS man in hand-to-hand combat, then led his Company in the assault through blistering fire, wiping out enemy patrols. Receiving a painful leg wound as he dashed back for tank support, he carried a casualty one hundred yards through automatic and sniper fire; from an exposed position directed tank fire which demolished two formidable enemy groups, and, fighting on for three hours, though bleeding heavily, half-crippled and in intense pain, personally killed eleven and caused the death or capture of sixty more Germans. Entered military service from Morrowville, Kansas.

HENRY H. WARNER, O2 007 166, Second Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant), Infantry, Company "C", 56th Armored Infantry Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 4 February 1945, in the vicinity of Colmar, France. While his Company was preparing the move across the Thur River to attack the woods of Bois de Colmar, a heavy concentration of small arms fire on the bridge held up the attack. Lieutenant Warner, realizing the dangers involved and the almost certainty of being hit in attempting to neutralize this enemy small arms fire, set up a light machine gun on the stone railing of the bridge and opened fire on the enemy when an enemy mortar shell landed directly to his rear, wounding both him and his assistant. Despite his painful wound, he ordered his comrades to withdraw, then continued to fire into the enemy positions until his ammunition supply had been expended. Entered military service from Buchannon, West Virginia.

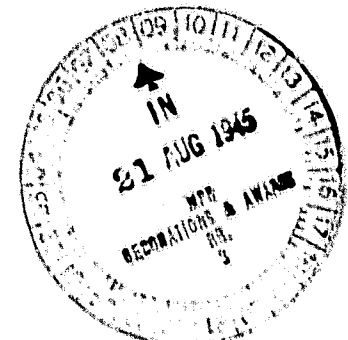

I -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

WALTER HARBALA, 36 549 261, Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 411th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 21 April 1945, near Kirchheim, Germany. Elements of the 411th Infantry Regiment were subjected to direct artillery, mortar, and automatic weapons fire at a range of five hundred yards from concealed positions. A soldier, severely injured by a shellburst, lay exposed to enemy fire. Realizing his action meant almost certain death, Technician Fifth Grade Harbala ran to the aid of the wounded man. As he reached the wounded man, Technician Fifth Grade Harbala was struck by a shell which severed both of his legs. Despite his mortal wound, he dragged himself to the wounded man's side, administered morphine, and died as he attempted to give the man further aid. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Next of kin: Mrs. Tiflis Harbala (Mother), 5631 Charles Street, Detroit, Michigan.

II - AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

RAY J. BROWN, 35 583 150, Sergeant, Infantry, Company "D", 413th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 23 February 1945, in Germany. When his battalion was held up by heavy machine gun activity, Sergeant Brown moved forward fifty-five yards across open ground under intense shell fire. He temporarily silenced the enemy machine gun by throwing a well-aimed hand grenade. After he had withdrawn to his lines, the hostile gun opened fire. Again Sergeant Brown made his way forward to within fifteen yards of the emplacement. From a position on the flank he jammed his carbine into the enemy dugout. He then charged the position and as the gun crew with his empty carbine. He forced the surrender of four fully armed enemy soldiers in a hand-to-hand struggle. His outstanding bravery made it possible for the Battalion to continue its attack. Entered military service from Hammond, Indiana.

BUELL M. DUNCAN, O1 321 894, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "K", 30th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 0600 hours on 16 December 1944 in Kayserberg, France, Lieutenant Duncan held off a

tank-infantry counterattack until his building was blasted by shellfire, his section decimated and his guns damaged or destroyed. Wounded in the leg, he attacked a full platoon of German infantry with a damaged light machine gun, killing four and wounding four. When the enemy attempted to envelop his company, he halted them with fire and simultaneously stopped a tank-supported counterattack. Firing five boxes of ammunition, he braved fierce and continuous fire to prevent his company from being cut off, fighting until a second wound stopped him. Entered military service from Lucas, Kentucky.

FRANK E. HAMBELTON, 37 542 675, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "I", 15th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. On 4 April 1945, near Bieneck, Germany, when his company was halted by heavy sniper fire from camouflaged hill positions, Private First Class Hamblenton voluntarily left cover and crawled one hundred and fifty yards through blistering fire in a one-man assault on the enemy force. Dashing forward, he fired his carbine from the hip, shot a sniper out of a tree at fifteen yards range, wounded four Germans in their foxholes, and with his last bullet killed the non-commissioned officer in charge. Deliberately inserting an empty magazine in his weapon, Private First Class Hamblenton brandished it and bluffed the ten remaining Germans into surrender. Entered military service from Georgetown, Colorado.

MARVIN EVERETT PEARCY, O2 054 003, Captain, Infantry, Company "H", 41st Armored Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 13-14 April 1945, in the vicinity of Magdeburg, Germany. Captain Pearcy displayed superb determination and leadership in the action that helped secure the northern half of the perilous bridgehead. When enemy counterattacks in overwhelming numbers isolated Captain Pearcy and forty of his men, he, through great initiative and professional skill, organized the men into small groups and either led them to safety himself or through his expert instruction assisted in their escape. Captain Pearcy, in accomplishing this daring feat, personally charged an enemy machine gun nest and sixty dug-in infantrymen, bluffing the Germans into surrendering by the masterful way he carried out the ruse. Entered military service from Washington.

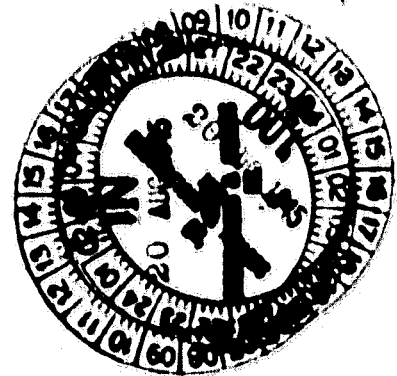

✓ ANTHONY DIANA, 13 110 309, Corporal, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "A", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for gallantry in action on 4 February 1945, at Rohrwiler, France. During an enemy counterattack, Corporal Diana distinguished himself by his coolness and courage. On one occasion when communications had failed, he volunteered to deliver messages. In full view of enemy tanks, he succeeded several times in running through a hail of machine gun and artillery fire to complete his task. His repeated fearless accomplishments under heavy artillery bombardment and small arms fire prevented enemy counterattacks and did much for the success of his unit in rendering aid when it was most needed. Entered military service from Swissvok, Pennsylvania.

✓ WILLIAM DUFF, 01 691 602, Second Lieutenant, Army of the United States, Office of Strategic Services, Washington, D. C., (then G-2, Strategic Services Section, Headquarters 45th Infantry Division) for gallantry in action on 11 November 1944, near Raon l'Etape, France. Lieutenant Duff personally led a team of agents into enemy-occupied territory for the purpose of obtaining urgent intelligence for the troops of the Division. Although he was aware that the area was heavily mined and guarded by the enemy, he proceeded to lead the team with utter disregard for his personal safety. While making his way through the field, Lieutenant Duff stepped on a shu-mine and was severely wounded. Despite his injury, he succeeded in extricating all of the agents and returned them to friendly lines. Entered military service from Washington, D. C.

✓ MELWOOD GUTHRIE, 33 225 548, Staff Sergeant, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "A", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for gallantry in action on 10 February 1945, at Rohrwiler, France. When an artillery hit started a fire in an ammunition dump, Sergeant Guthrie left cover and began smothering the burning and exploding shells with dirt. He assumed command of his platoon when his lieutenant was wounded, dispersed the men and resumed his dangerous fire-fighting. Leaving his task shortly before the dump exploded, he administered aid to the injured and then led his men in controlling new fires. His initiative and energy saved much valuable material and enabled the platoon to displace the remaining mortars and ammunition to a new site. Entered military service from Portsmouth, Virginia.

I -- AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

PETER C. SCHUELLER, 37 168 599, Sergeant, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "D", 436th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion, for gallantry in action on 18 March 1945, near Ensheim, Germany. Sergeant Schueller exposed himself to intense enemy artillery fire in the immediate vicinity of his position in order to dispose of a 170 millimeter dud that had landed only a short distance away. Carrying the shell in his arms, he dropped it over an embankment, fifty feet away and eliminated its threat to the lives of his section. His courageous action reflects great credit upon the armed forces. Entered military service from Detroit Lakes, Minnesota.

JOHN C. SHAFFNER, 37 440 628, Corporal (then Private), Chemical Warfare Service, Company "D", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for gallantry in action on 7 December 1944, near Osthelm, France. During an enemy counterattack, the forward observer called for a heavy concentration upon enemy personnel forming for the attack. Corporal Shaffner, with full knowledge of the danger from the persistent enemy shelling, volunteered to man a gun in response to the call from the forward observer. Rushing to a mortar, Corporal Shaffner began to fire the mortar, and succeeded in breaking up the enemy attack. In attempting to complete the mission requested, Corporal Shaffner continued to fire the mortar until a defective shell exploded in the barrel, severely wounding him. Entered military service from Mount Pleasant, Iowa.

II - BATTLE HONORS - CITATION OF UNIT. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Section IV, Circular No. 333, War Department, 1943, the following named organization is cited for outstanding performance of duty in action:

THE 100TH BATTALION, 442D REGIMENTAL TEAM is cited for outstanding accomplishment in combat during the period 15 October 1944 to 30 October 1944, near Bruyeres, Biffontaine, and in the Foret Domaniale de Champ, France. During a series of actions that played a telling part in the 442d Regimental Team's operation which spearheaded a divisional attack on the Seventh Army front, this unit displayed extraordinary courage, endurance and soldierly skill. Jumping off in the attack on the morning of 15 October 1944, the 100th Battalion fought an almost continuous four-day firefight in freezing and rainy weather, through jungle-like forests, to wrest the strongly fortified hill "A", dominating Bruyeres, from a fanatically resisting enemy. When, during the course of the attack, the progress of an assault company was delayed by a strongpoint consisting of fifty enemy riflemen and an SF gun, a second company of the battalion swept in on the enemy force from the flank and completely routed it. To attack hill "A" proper, the battalion was forced to cross one hundred and

fifty yards of open terrain covered by seven enemy machine guns and heavy automatic weapon fire. Following an artillery barrage, limited because a draw lay between the two high hills, the battalion, with one company acting as a base of fire, launched a frontal attack. Covered by friendly fire, waves of platoon after platoon zig-zagged across the open field into a hail of hostile fire. So skillfully coordinated was the attack that the strongly fortified hostile positions were completely overrun, numerous casualties were inflicted on the enemy, and the capture of the town was assured. During the three day operation, beginning on 21 October 1944, that resulted in the capture of Riffontaine, the 100th Battalion fought two miles into enemy territory as a self-contained task force. On the third day of the attack, the battalion launched an assault to capture the isolated town. In the first surprise onslaught the battalion captured large quantities of supplies and ammunition which it turned against the enemy. Counterattacking enemy troops and tanks approached and fired pointblank into their positions. Shouting defiance in the face of demands for surrender, the men of the 100th Battalion fired their rifles and threw captured hand grenades at the enemy tanks. Bitter fighting at close range resulted in the capture of the entire town. During this action the battalion captured forty prisoners, killed or wounded forty of the enemy and destroyed or captured large quantities of ammunition and enemy materiel. On 27 October 1944, the 100th Battalion was again committed to the attack. Going to the rescue of the "lost battalion", 141st Infantry Regiment, it fought without respite for four days against a fanatical enemy that was determined to keep the "lost battalion" isolated and force its surrender. Impelled by the urgency of its mission, the battalion fought forward, risking encirclement as slower moving units left its flanks exposed. Fighting yard by yard through a minefield the battalion was stopped by an enemy strongpoint on the high ground which he had made the key to his defense. As the terrain precluded a flanking movement, the battalion was forced to the only alternative of a frontal attack against a strongly entrenched enemy. Attacking in waves of squads and platoons, and firing from the hip as they closed in to grenade range, the valiant men of the 100th Battalion reduced the enemy defense lines within a few hours. Between fifty and sixty enemy dead were found at their automatic weapon emplacements and dugouts. On the fourth day, although exhausted and reduced through casualties to about half its normal strength, the battalion fought doggedly forward against strong enemy small arms and mortar fire until it contacted the isolated unit. The extraordinary heroism, daring determination and esprit du corps displayed by the men of the 100th Battalion during these actions live as an inspiration and add glory to the highest traditions of the Armed Forces of the United States.

I -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-41, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

RICE E. CRAIN, 39 466 456, Sergeant, Infantry, Company "K", 275th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 22-23 February 1945, in the Pfaffenwald Forest, France. During an attack, his company was pinned down by a heavy enemy artillery barrage and small arms fire. When two approaching enemy tanks seriously threatened the company's right flank, Sergeant Crain, under direct enemy fire, moved to a vantage point from which he fearlessly fired two well placed bazooka shells and forced the tanks to withdraw. On the following day, when his company was harrassed by sniper fire, he heroically exposed himself to observe enemy fire and personally eliminated eleven snipers. When he had almost completely wiped out the harrassing element, Sergeant Crain was mortally wounded by the fire of one of the few survivors of his heroic attack. Next of kin: Mr. Richard E. Crain (Father), Box 213, Salmon, Idaho.

ANTHONY J. NAGEM, 39 299 851, Corporal, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 5th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 24 March 1945, in the vicinity of Lingenfeld, Germany. Although twice wounded, Corporal Nagem continued to administer first aid in the face of enemy rifle and machine gun fire until he was mortally wounded. By his bravery and determination Corporal Nagem was responsible for saving the lives of many wounded soldiers. His extraordinary heroism exemplifies the splendid achievements of the Medical Department. Next of kin: Mrs. Julia Nagem (Mother), 1702 K Street, San Diego, California.

ELBERT TAPLEY, 20 407 203, Corporal, Infantry, Company "C", 30th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action. At 0930 hours on 2 December 1944, near Kogenheim, France, Corporal Tapley advanced ahead of his battalion and charged a formidable enemy strongpoint, killing two machine pistolmen and disintegrating the enemy position. Fearlessly assaulting an enemy CP, he killed four Germans although blistering automatic fire tore through his trouser legs. Shattering another machine gun position and capturing four 120 millimeter mortars, Corporal Tapley and his fellow scout killed twelve and captured two of the enemy, broke the backbone of the German defensive position and seized the battalion objective. Corporal Tapley was killed in a subsequent action. Next of kin: Mr. Morris Elbert Tapley (Father), Route #1, Collins, Georgia.



The unhesitating bravery of Corporal DiGiovanni resulted in saving the life of the wounded man. Entered military service from New York, New York.

SHERMAN R. ROSE, 6 952 583, First Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, 526th Engineer Light Ponton Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 12 April 1945, at Les Grand's Dalles, France. With great courage and initiative, Sergeant Rose entered a heavily mined enemy area and administered first aid to a seriously wounded fellow soldier. Completely disregarding his own safety, he evacuated the injured man to a hospital. His actions were inspirational to those with whom he served. 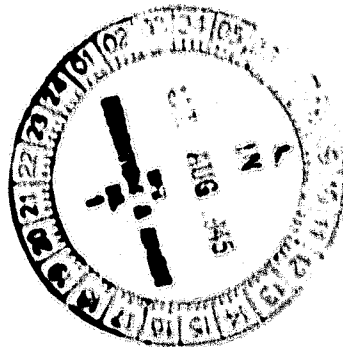

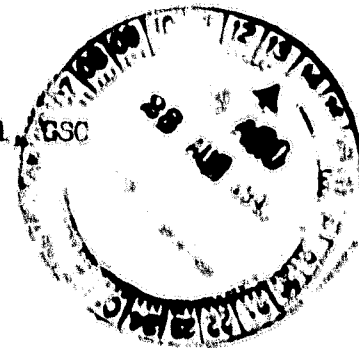

**CHARLES T. BAGLEY**, 39 176 009, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, 344th Engineer Regiment (GS), for gallantry in action on 24 August 1944, in the vicinity of St. Gervais, France. Technician Fifth Grade Bagley, demolition man for his platoon, asked for and obtained permission to remain behind alone, while the other forces withdrew, to completely destroy a bridge. He successfully completed his task in the face of an approaching enemy tank unit. His heroic action and devotion to duty were inspirational to his comrades and reflect the highest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Spokane, Washington.

**ALFRED H. CRENSHAW**, 01 035 006, Captain, Chemical Warfare Service, 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for gallantry in action on 7 December 1944, at Ostein, France. He then volunteered to personally act as forward observer and, from the top floor of a shelled building, directed mortar concentrations on an enemy tank and assaulting infantry. **JACK DRIESES**, 32 262 174, Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 69th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 18 April 1945, near Meinfeld, Germany. As an aid man, Technician Fifth Grade Drieses administered first aid to wounded personnel while subjected to heavy machine gun and rifle fire. He displayed tireless efforts under the most hazardous conditions while courageously assisting the wounded to safety. By his gallantry and unfaltering devotion to duty, he reflected great credit upon himself and the Medical Department. Entered military service from Jamaica, Long Island, New York.

**THOMAS J. FLANIGAN, JR.**, 15 116 901, Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 342d Armored Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 10 April 1945, near Ziegenbach, Germany. A tank, of which Technician Fifth Grade Flanigan was bow gunner, was parked near a building used as an observation post. When the driver attempted to re-start the motor, three panzerfausts struck and ignited the tank. Technician Fifth Grade Flanigan, who was inside the building at the time, heard the explosion and dashed

JOHN C. O'QUIN, OI 179 562, Captain, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 283d Field Artillery Battalion, for gallantry in action on 12 April 1945, near Unter Oberndorf, Germany. Captain O'Quin was hit on the left ear and right arm by fragments from a German 88 millimeter shell. Despite these injuries, he remained at his post and kept traffic moving. He refused medical care until he had completed his mission. The gallantry in action, devotion to duty and courage displayed by Captain O'Quin reflect the highest traditions of the armed forces. 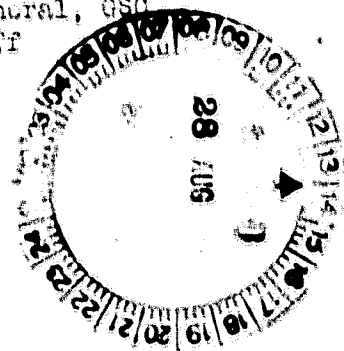

As the first vehicles crossed the completed bridge, he was wounded by shrapnel. ROBERT E. STRACK, 35 544 601, Technician Fifth Grade, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "A", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for gallantry in action on 7-8 December 1944, near Osthelm, France. During the height of an enemy counterattack, it became necessary to evacuate wounded over a shell-strewn road, under direct enemy observation, and to bring in supplies of radio batteries and other equipment needed to maintain contact with friendly units. Volunteering for the job, Technician Fifth Grade Strack loaded three wounded men into his jeep and ran the gauntlet of enemy fire. When he arrived at the Battalion CP, he discovered that enemy shrapnel had hit his vehicle in eight places and punctured one tire. On his return trip, a shell exploded near the front of the vehicle, ruining the radiator, windshield, and two tires. Technician Fifth Grade Strack made several more round trips through an intensive fire that virtually destroyed four of his vehicles. His skill, devotion to duty, and courage reflects great honor both upon him and the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Fort Wayne, Indiana,

I - AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

ROLLAND H. GUSTAFSON, 16 146 664, Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Company "A", 66th Armored Infantry Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 8 December 1944, in the vicinity of Singling, France. While engaged in an attack, his company's right flank met heavy enemy machine gun fire from a pillbox and one man was seriously wounded. Because of the fire, it was impossible to bring the injured soldier to a place of safety but Technician Fifth Grade Gustafson started to crawl toward him. When but a few yards from his goal, the machine gun opened fire, hitting him in the legs. Despite his severe pain, Technician Fifth Grade Gustafson again started to crawl toward the wounded man. Members of the pinned down platoon attempted to stop him by force and warnings but he said, "that's my job", and continued. At this moment the enemy machine gun again opened fire, striking him in the head and ending his life. His heroic devotion to duty remains a lasting inspiration to his comrades. GEORGE N. HARRISON, 32 366 869, Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "L", 242d Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 25 January 1945, near Kaltenhouse, France. Sergeant Harrison was in a small woods with several members of his platoon who were attempting to reach a house across an open field. When three of the men were wounded by enemy snipers and were unable to withdraw with the rest of the platoon, Sergeant Harrison gave his rifle to a BAR man whose weapon would not work and crawled out unarmed in the face of enemy fire to assist the wounded. After aiding one man to safety, he was attempting to move another when a sniper killed him and the wounded man. Sergeant Harrison's heroic sacrifice for his comrades was in keeping with the highest ideals of the service. Next of Kin: Mrs. Elinor H. Doll (Sister), 2323 South Broad Street, Trenton, New Jersey.

I -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

OMAR R. BILLETT, O1 267 464, Captain, Infantry, Company "B", 20th Armored Infantry Battalion, 10th Armored Division, for extraordinary heroism in action on 5 March 1945, at Ehrang, Germany. When his combat team which was assaulting the Kyll River was pinned down by lethal enemy machine gun fire, Captain Billett, with utter disregard for personal safety, crossed the river on a blown bridge, crawled to close range of the position and with hand grenades, knocked out two guns, thereby permitting his team to continue its assault with a minimum of casualties. His outstanding demonstration of bravery, intrepidity and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the service. Next of Kin: Mrs. E. R. Billett (Mother), 325 Elm Street, Council Grove, Kansas.

DON G. HACKMAN, 6 291 244, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "D", 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 20 December 1944, near Bastogne, Belgium. During an engagement with strong enemy forces, Private First Class Hackman's platoon was subjected to a heavy volume of enemy fire. Disregarding the enemy automatic weapons activity, he left his covered position and started across the road, firing his M-1 rifle as he advanced. He fired with such speed and accuracy that he killed two enemy automatic riflemen and wounded two others. He then attacked a machine gun with a grenade and, although wounded, he shot two men who were attempting to escape. Private First Class Hackman again started forward, still firing, but was mortally wounded by a concealed enemy gun. His aggressiveness and courage exemplified the highest ideals of the military service. Next of Kin: Mrs. Florence Hall (Mother), 2051 South Ogden Street, Denver Colorado.

II - AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

RAY A. OLARDY, O 439 388, Captain, Field Artillery, Battery "C", 217th Field Artillery Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 26 April 1945, near Gutenzell, Germany. When his Battery and nearby Battalion installations were subjected to heavy fire from enemy positions within three

hundred yards, Captain Clardy led thirty of his men in an attack on the enemy, forcing them to withdraw. Climbing to the turret of a supporting tank, he pursued the enemy and personally accounted for nine dead, including the commanding officer, and completely disorganized the opposing forces. Captain Clardy's extraordinary heroism and swift action against a numerically superior enemy, destroyed their effectiveness and ended a threat to the main supply route of an Infantry Regiment and an Armored Division. Entered military service from Jonesboro, Arkansas.

HERMAN ERDMAN, 32 019 220, Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "E", 71st Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 1 January 1945, near Moronville Farms, France. Discovering an enemy force of five companies about to attack his Company CP, Sergeant Erdman immediately engaged them, singlehandedly. He ran over exposed terrain, jumped into a hole twenty-five yards from the enemy columns, and opened fire with rifle and grenades so effectively that he diverted the attack toward his own platoon. Although wounded in the neck, Sergeant Erdman directed artillery and mortar fire with such devastating accuracy that the attack was completely broken. The fighting spirit displayed by Sergeant Erdman and his extraordinary courage are in keeping with the Army's finest traditions. Entered military service from Brooklyn, New York.

KENNETH L. SMITHSON, 34 490 776, Sergeant, Infantry, Company "E", 7th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 25 January 1945, near Osthelm, France. Sergeant Smithson, light-machine gun squad leader, dashed fifty yards through withering automatic fire to support his temporarily halted company. Under furious crossfire, with grenades exploding fifteen yards away and ripping his clothing, he destroyed a machine gun with a hand grenade, crawled twenty yards to a shallow ditch and silenced two more machine guns with sub-machine gun fire. Voluntarily covering his company's withdrawal, he fought valiantly for over an hour in his isolated, exposed and perilous position, killing an estimated eight of the enemy. Entered military service from Bristol, Tennessee.

**WILLIE D. HARDEN**, 38 367 389, Sergeant, Quartermaster Corps, 4054th Quartermaster Service Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 5 March 1945, near Cassulone, France. Sergeant Harden was one of several who were seated in a tent at a gasoline dump, when a heating stove exploded, hurling one of the men, oil-drenched and flaming, into a corner. Disregarding the danger of remaining in the flaming tent, Sergeant Harden and another soldier rushed to the aid of their comrade who was vainly struggling to beat out the flames which enveloped him. Overcoming the frenzied resistance of the stricken man, they smothered the flames with mackinaws and prevented any injuries more serious than second degree burns. CLARENCE J. BLAUT, 32 390 467, Technician Fifth Grade, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "C", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, at Anzio, Italy. Technician Fifth Grade Blaut volunteered to deliver ammunition to an area under constant enemy observation and shell fire. He was forced to withdraw several times but eventually drove through enemy fire and made the delivery. His willingness, devotion to duty and determination reflected credit upon himself and his organization. Entered military service from Carlstadt, New Jersey.

CHARLES W. DYER, O 385 695, Captain, Chaplains Corps, 1144th Engineer Combat Group, for heroic achievement in action on 27 April 1945, in Wislingen, Germany. Unarmed and with the aid of four enlisted men, Chaplain Dyer quelled a street fight between Russian displaced persons and German civilians armed with clubs, knives, rubber truncheons, axes and ropes. He separated and disarmed the belligerents, directed the Germans into their homes, collected the Russians into a group, and held three alleged SS Troopers under guard until Military Police arrived. Entered military service from Croton.

Although it was considered suicidal to supply platoon positions except under the cover of darkness, Technician Fifth Grade Hill volunteered to deliver vitally needed ammunition. With another volunteer, he maneuvered a jeep and trailer over a narrow trail to the gun positions while enemy mortar and small arms fire landed nearby. His service was of immeasurable assistance to his organization and reflected the highest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Birmingham, Alabama.

**FREDERICK D. KNAPP**, O 108 285, Lieutenant Colonel, Coast Artillery Corps, Headquarters, 141st Antiaircraft Artillery Gun Battalion (Mobile), for heroic achievement in action on 9 March 1945, near Rheinberg, Germany. Colonel Knapp, upon learning that one of his Battery Commanders was in a dangerous position without transportation, went forward with complete disregard for his own safety. He proceeded on foot for two hundred yards through intense artillery fire, located the Battery Commander who had been wounded and brought him to safety. By his intrepid direction, heroic leadership and conspicuous gallantry, he set an example of heroism that was inspirational to his troops. Entered military service from Charleston, West Virginia.

**ARTHUR W. PIERCE**, 34 426 779, Sergeant, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "C", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 11 April 1945, at Heilbronn, Germany. During an intense enemy artillery barrage, Sergeant Pierce remained at his gun position to administer first aid to a member of his squad. After evacuating the injured man to safety, he returned alone to the emplacement, repaired and displaced the mortar and removed the ammunition. Entered military service from Fulton, Mississippi.

**WILLIAM L. TRAPNELL**, OI 037 341, First Lieutenant, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "C", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 25 October 1944, in Mortagne, France. Acting as Forward Observer, Lieutenant Trapnell was pinned down with three other men when an infantry platoon behind them withdrew during a determined enemy counterattack. Using small arms fire and a Thompson automatic, he covered the withdrawal of the other three who then covered him. He immediately brought 4.2" mortar fire on the enemy and dispersed them. His coolness and good judgment reflected the highest credit on both himself and his organization. Entered military service from Portal, Georgia.

BRISBY, 39 847 100, Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Service Battery, 77th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action from 6 April 1945 to 10 April 1945, near Crailsheim, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade Brisby continually succeeded in transporting supplies to his battalion over a route often cut by enemy troops and subjected to intense artillery and small arms fire. His courage and determination in accomplishing an exceptionally difficult mission were in accord with the finest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Gila Bend, Arizona.

ED L. CAYLOR, 01 040 676, First Lieutenant, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "A", 436th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 21 April 1945, in the vicinity of Unt Rot, Germany. Lieutenant Caylor was moving his platoon headquarters to Sulzbach, Germany, in a jeep and a two-and-one-half ton truck with trailer. When they reached the vicinity of Unt Rot, Germany, they were pinned down by German artillery, mortar and small arms fire and were forced to abandon the truck and trailer. Realizing it was necessary to have his platoon headquarters in Sulzbach that evening, and that there was valuable radio equipment in the trailer, Lieutenant Caylor returned with two volunteers. Still subjected to intense artillery fire, they managed to move truck and trailer to safety, although all three were slightly wounded by shrapnel. His courage and extreme devotion to duty were a credit to the armed forces. Entered military service from Montecello, Kentucky.

AUBREY McDONALD, 18 040 294, Sergeant, Transportation Corps, 831st Amphibian Truck Company, TC, for heroic achievement in action on 26 March 1945, in Germany. While in charge of DUKW traffic on the east bank of the Rhine River, during the initial assault crossing, Sergeant McDonald rescued the crew of an amphibian tank that sank in midstream. His superior service reflected credit on himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Waco, Texas.

EDWARD R. ROSENER, 37 389 575, Technician Fourth Grade, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "C", 835th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion (Mobile), for heroic achievement in action on 24 April 1945, near Pleinfeld, Germany. Technician Fourth Grade Rosener, by military occupation a cook, entered a building where he knew an SS officer was waiting to ambush him.

Displaying skill and courage he killed the hostile officer. By his aggressive action he exemplified the finest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Festus, Missouri.

JAMES E. SPIKER, 33 765 696, Technician Fifth Grade, Transportation Corps, 831st Amphibian Truck Company, for heroic achievement in action on 6 April 1945, near Marjos, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade Spiker halted his jeep one hundred yards from a twelve man enemy ambush, dismounted and, by his accurate firing, caused the enemy to fire wildly. He then acted in such a manner so as to save the jeep, the Battalion Adjutant and himself by withdrawing for reinforcements. Entered military service from Wilmington, Delaware.

NORMAN A. MAHOSKY, 33 240 921, Sergeant, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "C", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 9 April 1945, at Frankenbach, Germany. When an explosion of a mortar injured seven men and ignited forty rounds of ammunition, Sergeant Mahosky carried water, a bucketful at a time, until the fire was completely extinguished. His bravery saved many lives and valuable ammunition. Entered military service from Shamokin, Pennsylvania.

WILLIAM A. WOFFORD, 38 477 680, Sergeant, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "AU", 829th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion (Mobile), for heroic achievement in action on 26 March 1945, near Worms, Germany. As chief of a gun section, Sergeant Wofford, with complete disregard for his safety, reorganized his section under intense mortar fire. He then crawled two hundred and fifty yards under constant fire to his platoon command post to report the reorganization completed. His outstanding heroism and calmness are in accord with the finest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Athens, Texas.

CALVIN L. SMITH, 20 424 539, Technical Sergeant (then Corporal), Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 932d Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 16 March 1944, in Italy. Although subjected to heavy enemy artillery fire, Sergeant Smith fearlessly left his place of comparative safety to re-establish vital wire communication. On two occasions when he was pinned down by a heavy enemy artillery concentration he promptly continued to service and relay damaged sections of the wire. His fearless courage and heroic actions reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Starkville, Mississippi.

II - AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

LEON HUNTER, 32 047 120, Staff Sergeant, Cavalry, 101st Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized, for heroic achievement in action on 14 March 1945, near Wehrden, Germany. During an attack on a heavily fortified enemy position, Sergeant Hunter's platoon was caught in heavy crossfire. His quick, decisive action enabled him to reorganize his platoon and neutralize the enemy position. Later, he supervised the evacuation of a small number of wounded men before he permitted himself to be evacuated. His splendid leadership and devotion to duty were inspirational to his unit. Entered military service from Libson, New York.

JOSEPH E. LEAMING, 42 083 315, Private First Class, Ordnance Department, 137th Ordnance Heavy Maintenance Company (FA), for heroic achievement in action on 7 April 1945, in Germany. Private First Class Leaming was largely responsible for saving approximately twenty carloads of gasoline and eighteen cars of rations that had been ignited by tracer bullets from an enemy machine gun. With gasoline containers exploding and his clothing afire, he unloaded the rations and helped control the raging blaze. Entered military service from Camden, New Jersey.



RALPH H. VAN SLYKE, 18 162 731, Technician Fifth Grade, Cavalry, Troop "E", 101st Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron Mechanized, for heroic achievement in action on 13 April 1945, at Buchheim, Germany. During contact with enemy tanks, it was necessary to abandon a half-track of which Technician Fifth Grade Van Slyke was the driver. It was later learned that valuable fire-control instruments had been left in the vehicle. Technician Fifth Grade Van Slyke went forward and returned with the instruments even though two German tanks were firing at the half-track. His courage and ability made it possible to put the enemy out of action. Entered military service from Fort Gibson, Oklahoma.

AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

EARL R. BAUMGARDNER, 35 326 081, Technical Sergeant, Field Artillery, Service Battery, 69th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 18 April 1945, near Meinfeld, Germany. Sergeant Baumgardner distinguished himself by courageous action in the face of cross fire from enemy machine guns and rifle fire. His quick organization of service personnel into Infantry squads, extricating personnel from a trap, and advancing into enemy held territory reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Bowling Green, Ohio.

ALFRED J. GABRIELSKY, 32 056 647, Master Sergeant (then First Sergeant), Quartermaster Corps, Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 147th Quartermaster Battalion (M) DUKV, for heroic achievement in action on 26 March 1945, at the Rhine River, Germany. Disregarding heavy enemy artillery fire, Sergeant Gabrielsky, in the company of two officers, reconnoitered the prospective location of communication lines and successfully laid the lines. The courageous accomplishment of Sergeant Gabrielsky proved a decisive factor in speeding vital supplies across the Rhine River. Entered military service from Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

CHARLES E. JONES, 16 070 586, Sergeant, Quartermaster Corps, 3041st Quartermaster Graves Registration Company, for heroic achievement in action on 13 June 1944, near the Normandy Coast. Sergeant Jones rescued his wounded platoon leader from the flooded cabin of a sinking LCT off the coast of Normandy. Although injured himself, he removed his life preserver and placed it on the lieutenant whose wounds prevented the use of his limbs. He also assisted other casualties to safety. Sergeant Jones' unselfish devotion to duty was in keeping with the highest traditions of the Army. Entered military service from Chicago, Illinois.

EUGENE J. MICHAUD, 31 238 670, Technician Fifth Grade (then Private First Class), Field Artillery, Battery "A", 932d Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 29 May 1944, near Artona, Italy. Technician Fifth Grade Michaud, in charge of a wire detail, distinguished himself by outstanding devotion to duty while repairing severed communication lines. He exposed himself to an intense enemy artillery concentration which destroyed five vehicles and inflicted heavy casualties among personnel. After taking cover during the initial rounds, he left his place of refuge, and, with utter

Lieutenant Montilla, leading a combat patrol, succeeded in gaining positions approximately four hundred yards from an enemy machine gun nest. Leaving his patrol deployed, he boldly advanced across open terrain and captured the enemy position. While engaged in the destruction of the position, he received heavy small arms and mortar fire from the left flank and the front. In order to free his patrol from danger, Lieutenant Montilla crawled back to it and organized a withdrawal which avoided unnecessary casualties. Lieutenant Montilla accomplished his mission, and brought back valuable information about the enemy. Entered military service from Santurce, Puerto Rico.



Technician Third Grade Fenberg voluntarily accompanied an advanced infantry patrol as they attacked the bitterly defended city. In the face of heavy enemy sniper, mortar and artillery fire, he photographed the complete action of the patrol without regard for personal safety. Upon completion of his mission, Technician Third Grade Fenberg returned alone through areas not yet cleared of the enemy and delivered his film to higher headquarters, thereby furnishing the War Department with timely and accurate information of events leading to the fall of the city. Entered military service from Detroit, Michigan.

HENRY F. GERZEN, 39 232 637, Technician Third Grade, Signal Corps, 163d Signal Photographic Company, for heroic achievement in action on 29 April 1945, in Germany. Technician Third Grade Gerzen accompanied the infantry into the infamous concentration camp at Dachau, Germany, to photograph the actual liberation of the camp. In spite of a sharp small arms fire fight in which he participated at one point, he succeeded in photographing the entire action and provided the War Department with a true and invaluable pictorial record of actual conditions. Technician Third Grade Gerzen's superior services were of great importance and were in keeping with the finest traditions of the Signal Corps. Entered military service from Hollywood, California.

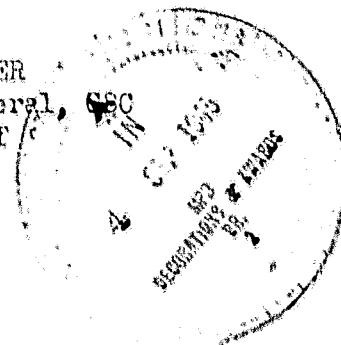

CIPOLARI, 33 452 985, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Headquarters and Service Company, 2829th Engineer Combat Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 2 May 1945, in Munich, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade Cipolari voluntarily entered a large building to assist in driving out a party of SS troopers who were sniping at American soldiers. **AWARD OF THE SOLDIER'S MEDAL**

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Soldier's Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

ARTHUR K. ARCHER, 35 342 035, Technician Fourth Grade, Signal Corps, 207th Signal Depot Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 29 May 1944, at Ain El Turck, Algeria. Two swimmers had been carried by the rough sea and strong under current of the Mediterranean into deep water and were crying for help. Technician Fourth Grade Archer, displaying personal courage and heroism, swam out into the deep, treacherous water and succeeded in bringing both men to safety. Entered military service from Fort Wayne, Indiana.

ROBERT D. GASAWAY, 14 110 395, Private First Class, Ordnance Department, 685th Ordnance Ammunition Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 15 June 1945, near Wittislingen, Germany. Private First Class Gasaway unhesitatingly went to the assistance of four severely injured comrades who lay in and near a truckload of burning and exploding ammunition. He assisted in removing them out of range of flying fragments of shrapnel. His heroic action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Jefferson, Georgia.

WILLIAM C. GAYNOR, O 322 919, Lieutenant Colonel, Medical Corps, 93d Evacuation Hospital Semimobile, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 10 July 1944, near Civitavecchia, Italy. While swimming close to shore in safe water, Colonel Gaynor heard a cry for help from a fellow officer being swept out to sea by a strong current. He unhesitatingly left his place of safety, swam to the aid of the drowning officer, and at the risk of his own life, towed the helpless swimmer a distance of three hundred yards to shore. His heroism was directly responsible for saving the officer's life. Entered military service from Southampton, New York.

RAYMOND W. HOOVER, 13 093 269, Private, Chemical Warfare Service, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 30 November 1944, near Mousse, France. When the building used as a rear CP was partially destroyed by an enemy time bomb, two men were buried in the rubble and unable to escape. Private Hoover, hearing their cries for help, voluntarily rushed into the building with complete knowledge of possible secondary explosions and collapsing walls, and aided one man to safety. He returned to rescue the more seriously injured man. With the aid of another soldier who arrived shortly

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after Private Hoover, the second injured man was carried from the building. His courage and complete disregard for his personal safety reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Northumberland, Pennsylvania.

JOHN A. SPAIN, 20 141 557, Private, Ordnance Department, 445th Ordnance Heavy Automotive Maintenance Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 9 March 1945, near Heming, France. Private Spain saved a burning French Armored Tank as well as nearby United States Government vehicles. Utilizing fire extinguishers from these vehicles, he poured carbon tetrachloride into the flaming tank from a position on top of the engine compartment, and removed flaming gasoline cans. Private Spain displayed complete disregard for personal safety to the extent that he suffered second degree burns of the face, neck and hands. His devotion to duty reflects high credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Concord, New Hampshire.

ERVIN J. STEINMAN, 35 033 036, Staff Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, Company "A", 2755th Engineer Combat Battalion, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 26 March 1945, near Lemberg, France. After witnessing a French civilian blown to death in a known minefield, and a fellow soldier suffer the loss of his leg, Sergeant Steinman entered the minefield. He administered first aid to the wounded soldier and carried him out. In willingly facing obvious danger, with utter disregard for his own personal safety, he acted in accordance with the finest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Marion, Ohio.

DILLES E. WISHON, 34 437 303, Corporal, Quartermaster Corps, 138th Quartermaster Truck Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 6 May 1945, at Stettenhofen, Germany. Corporal Wishon entered a smoke and flame filled room and carried a dazed victim to safety. Prevented by the intense heat from re-entering the room, he directed a trapped soldier to smash a window and jump a few feet to safety. He then entered an adjacent room by the window and carried another man, who was overcome by smoke, to safety. His courageous actions were in keeping with the finest ideals of the Army. Entered military service from Cabarrus County, North Carolina.

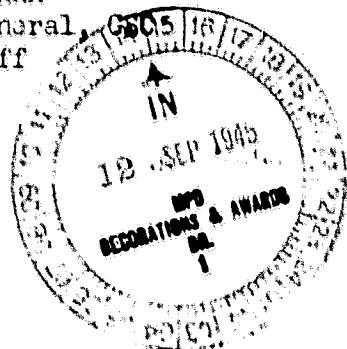

**I -- AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS.** By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

**HENRY W. BECKWITH**, 35 012 625, Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, 12th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 17 December 1944, near Echternach, Luxembourg. Sergeant Beckwith voluntarily braved heavy enemy artillery, mortar and rocket fire to deliver sorely needed weapons to an antitank platoon defending an important crossroad. He boldly joined in the fight by manning a machine gun from an exposed window of a building. An enemy rocket burst within a few yards, destroying his weapon and momentarily stunning him. With a rifle, he killed one rocket man and forced others to flee. Then, firing a wounded comrade's machine gun, he delivered devastating fire against the attackers and caused their complete rout. Sergeant Beckwith's gallant actions reflect the highest military traditions. Entered military service from Guilford, Connecticut.

**WILLIAM A. CONKLIN**, 32 250 158, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 502d Parachute Infantry, for extraordinary heroism in action on 18 and 19 September 1944, near Best, Holland. While manning a machine gun against approximately three hundred entrenched enemy soldiers, Private First Class Conklin's position was subjected to heavy enemy automatic weapons, rifle and mortar fire. Moving to a better location, he was attacked by five of the enemy. He killed three with his pistol and forced the others to withdraw. He then destroyed an enemy 20 millimeter gun with his machine gun. The next day, although wounded, Private First Class Conklin killed eight of the enemy and forced the remainder to withdraw. When wounded a second time, he refused evacuation and participated in a bayonet assault. He then destroyed a machine gun with two hand grenades and killed the crew. While charging through enemy positions, he was wounded a third time. During this action, Private First Class Conklin killed forty of the enemy and was instrumental in the capture of four hundred and seventy-five. Entered military service from New York.

**FRIDE MORTENSEN**, 12 233 126, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "B", 272d Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 6 April 1945, near Benterode, Germany. When his platoon was halted by heavy fire from dug in enemy machine gun positions, Private First Class Mortensen crawled forward under fire and threw grenades into three enemy machine gun positions, annihilating the occupants. With his grenade supply exhausted, he leaped to his

feet and charged a fourth position, and though his rifle failed to fire, his aggressiveness caused the enemy to surrender without resistance. Throughout the entire action, Private First Class Mortensen displayed extraordinary heroism and superior qualities of courage and leadership. Entered military service from Staten Island, New York.

III - AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

THOMAS L. STEVE'S, 36 15C 567, Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, 6638th Engineer Mine Clearance Company (Armored) (Provisional). Entered military service from Grand Rapids, Michigan.

CLARENCE P. STEWART, 34 663 375, Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, 6638th Engineer Mine Clearance Company (Armored) (Provisional). Entered military service from Broadway, North Carolina.

For heroic achievement in action on 1 December 1944, at Wingen, France. These men maneuvered their tank dozers forward to remove a road block which was the last barrier before the town. As mortar and artillery concentrations fell and rain obscured visibility, they opened their turrets and directed operations from exposed positions until the vital mission was completed. Their courage and ability assured the capture of the town with comparative safety.

I -- AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

WILLIAM P. EVANS, 33 146 237, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 502d Parachute Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 19 September 1944, near Best, Holland. During an enemy attack that reached within thirty feet of his position, Private First Class Evans killed three Germans, wounded one and fired on many others. Then, in an attempt to reach an enemy-held house, he charged and crawled across an open field under heavy fire and through icy water with a fixed bayonet. Nearing his objective, he observed enemy soldiers leaving the building and others firing on a comrade. Private First Class Evans opened fire, later bayoneted a German who rushed him, and forced the surrender of many. In the course of the action, he and a comrade captured ninety-three and wounded approximately thirty of the enemy. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

MITCHELL JACHIM, 36 325 980, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "B", 401st Glider Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 8 October 1944, near Opheusden, Holland. During an enemy attack, Private First Class Jachim caused a German tank to button up and withdraw by killing its commander with his BAR at a range of more than four hundred yards. Then, with hand grenades and his BAR, he assisted in halting enemy infantry and was slightly wounded by shrapnel. Later during the day, he volunteered to lead a patrol to rescue one officer and five enlisted men who were reported as prisoners in a railroad station-house nearby. Covered by a bazooka-man and one rifleman, Private First Class Jachim assaulted the building with his BAR, freed the prisoners and captured one German officer and three men. Entered military service from Chicago, Illinois.

JACK C. SCHAFFER, 36 407 927, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "A", 54th Armored Infantry Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 27 February 1945, near Steinbach, Germany. A combat team was suddenly halted by enemy machine guns and direct artillery fire. Private First Class Schaffer, disregarding a wound in his left arm, moved forward and destroyed three machine gun emplacements, enabling the remainder of his platoon to move forward and occupy the high ground. While under direct fire, he removed wounded men to a ditch and administered first aid until he collapsed from loss of blood and had to be evacuated. The courage and intrepidity he displayed

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reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Chicago, Illinois.

LOY J. MARSHALL, 34 443 025, Corporal, Chemical Warfare Service. Entered military service from Forsythe, Georgia.

WARREN D. PERRY, 13 120 791, Corporal, Chemical Warfare Service. Entered military service from Richmond, Virginia.

For heroic achievement in action on 11 April 1945, at Heilbronn, Germany. A communication wire strung along the main street from a mortar position was severed eight times by heavy artillery fire. This crew retraced and repaired the wire each time it was broken. Three of the team were wounded while skillfully accomplishing this dangerously difficult task, which enabled their platoon to successfully operate. Their unselfish devotion to duty was in keeping with the finest traditions of the Armed Forces.

I -- AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

RAYMOND E. ADAMS, 18 200 396, Staff Sergeant (then Sergeant), Infantry, Company "F", 274th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 25 February 1945, at Spichenen Heights, France. After taking strategic, high ground, Sergeant Adams' squad, occupying the platoon's forward position, was subjected to machine gun fire which supported a two-company enemy counter-attack. Sergeant Adams immediately crossed fifty yards of open terrain, firing and maneuvering as he advanced. Throwing a hand grenade into the machine gun position, he charged with fixed bayonet, killing the three-man crew. Quickly turning the captured gun on the advancing troops, he inflicted many casualties and disorganized the attack. After expending all ammunition, he destroyed the gun and led his squad against the enemy. His courageous action enabled his platoon to break the counterattack and hold its vital objective. Entered military service from Rock Springs, Texas.

JOHN G. COOK, 01 010 872, First Lieutenant, Cavalry, Company "D", 714th Tank Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 10 January 1945, near Herrlisheim, France. Lieutenant Cook was in command of a platoon of light tanks, attached to the 56th Armored Infantry Battalion, whose mission was to evacuate the wounded. Under heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire, he saw to it that the wounded were loaded on the tanks and evacuated safely to the rear. He repeatedly returned with his platoon to pick up the wounded regardless of the heavy mortar and artillery fire. During one of these trips into the town of Herrlisheim, he discovered an enemy machine gun nest had been set up covering the only bridge into the town. Warning his comrades of the danger, Lieutenant Cook proceeded alone across the bridge under the constant surveillance of the enemy machine gun crew. He fired on the enemy, killing two, rushed the position, and captured two prisoners. As a result of his heroic actions, the aid men were enabled to proceed across the bridge and evacuate the wounded, thereby saving many lives. Entered military service from Omaha, Nebraska.

FRANK P. GAROFANO, 20 115 488, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 502d Parachute Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 19 September 1944, near Bast, Holland. The enemy attacked from three sides and, supported by artillery and mortar fire, threatened to envelop his company. In spite of the heavy barrage, Private First Class Garofano fired his

sub-machine gun at the advancing enemy, killing nine and wounding three. Aware that his platoon's assault was impaired by the intense fire, he instructed a comrade to cover him while he moved to the flank in an attempt to enter an enemy-held house. Crawling forward, he reached a position ten feet from his objective. He threw a hand grenade into the house, forcing out its hostile occupants. Other forces immediately directed fire on him. Firing on the enemy with his sub-machine gun, he effected the surrender of ninety-three and wounded approximately thirty. His actions were in accord with the highest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

II - AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named members of the 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion:

HOWARD BOEKER, 32 922 130, Corporal, Chemical Warfare Service. Entered military service from Newark, New Jersey.

CLAYTON C. SHIVELY, 36 459 366, Sergeant, Chemical Warfare Service. Entered military service from Ludington, Michigan.

SAMUEL WAPNITSKY, 32 819 173, Corporal, Chemical Warfare Service. Entered military service from New York, New York.

For heroic achievement in action on 6 February 1945, near Bischwiller, France. During an enemy artillery barrage, an ammunition dump was hit and exploding white phosphorous shells were strawn over a wide area. For the platoon's safety, and at the risk of their lives, these men extinguished the burning shells while many were still exploding. Their calmness and disregard for personal safety were responsible for saving much valuable ammunition and equipment and keeping open a main supply route.

**I -- AWARD OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS.** By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 60-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

**GEORGE A. CLINE**, O2 011 794, Second Lieutenant (then Sergeant), Infantry, Company "G", 12th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action from 10 to 13 November 1944, near Hurtgen, Germany. Lieutenant Cline's company was encircled by hostile elements, and subject to violent artillery shellings. He guided a fourteen man patrol in filling a gap between his and the adjoining company, and despite severe casualties, stemmed an enemy assault. While contacting the adjacent company he routed a German patrol of fifteen, killing six. When enemy units subsequently employed tanks, and advanced to a point where they demanded surrender, Lieutenant Cline fired courageously upon accompanying infantry and eventually caused their withdrawal. His gallantry and fidelity under perilous circumstances exemplified the finest military traditions. Entered military service from Nawgatuck, West Virginia.

**JONATHAN G. MULLINAX**, 34 031 224, Sergeant, Infantry, 120th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 7 July 1944, near St. Jean De Daye, France. Sergeant Mullinax's company was halted during an attack by hostile machine gun fire. Disregarding the danger involved, he remained in position and fired a rifle grenade. His first shot failed to reach the machine gun emplacement. While preparing to launch another grenade, he was wounded twice. Despite the pain, and the fire now directed at him, Sergeant Mullinax knelt and fired another grenade which silenced the enemy weapon and allowed his company to resume its advance. Entered military service from East Flat Rock, North Carolina.

**KENNETH W. WALLACE**, O 361 171, Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, 1st Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 24 January 1945, near Osthelm, France. When the assault company of his Battalion was halted by withering machine gun and small arms fire in the center of a broad, open, moonlit expanse of snow, Colonel Wallace walked through the barrage encouraging his men and urging them forward in the attack. When the assault elements took shelter behind an embankment only twenty yards from the enemy lines, Colonel Wallace disregarded exploding grenades and enfilading tank fire to lead his men in the assault, overrunning the enemy positions and seizing the Battalion objective. Entered military service from Modesto, California.

**AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR**

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

PEARSON MENOHER, O3 805, Brigadier General, General Staff Corps, Chief of Staff, Seventh Army (then Headquarters XV Corps), for gallantry in action on 7 May 1945, in Germany. At the negotiations for the final surrender of Army Group "C", General Menoher received information from a staff officer of Lieutenant General Foertsch, representing Marshall Kesselring, that a large group of enemy forces had area control southeast of Salzburg. General Menoher proceeded on 7 May to this area, contacted enemy guards, and demanded that he be taken to the Commanding General of the Corps Group. At this meeting, General Menoher negotiated with General Bork to accept his surrender of his command, which consisted of some 70,000 troops, gave him preliminary instructions to cease all hostilities, ordered his men to start collecting material, and to obtain all information relative to road blocks and mine fields. By venturing to this enemy headquarters, which had had no news of the surrender, proceeding through territory devoid of American troops, General Menoher obtained the surrender of Corps Group Bork with its commanding general. This action, undertaken without regard for his personal safety, indicates a determination of purpose and devotion to cause over and above the normal call of duty and is in keeping with the highest military traditions, reflecting great credit upon General Menoher and the military service. Entered the United States Military Academy from Virginia.

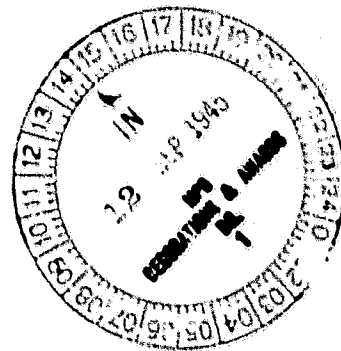

I -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

MORRIS H. BROWN, JR., 12 167 187, Corporal, Infantry, Company "D", 781st Tank Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action on 7 and 8 April 1945, in the vicinity of Untergrieshiem, Germany. While under intense enemy fire, Corporal Brown left his tank twice to rescue two wounded infantrymen. The following day he fearlessly left the comparative safety of his tank to rescue his wounded platoon sergeant from a disabled tank. As he was preparing to return, he was wounded by enemy fire. Despite his wound, he got up, ordered his men to evacuate the sergeant and started for the other injured men. Again he was hit by enemy fire, this time mortally wounded, and fell in the path of his own tank. Corporal Brown's outstanding exhibition of courage was in accordance with the Army's finest traditions. Next of Kin: Mr. Morris H. Brown, Sr., (Father), 77 Livingston Street, Lancaster, New York.

GEORGE L. PONDER, JR., 35 801 962, Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "L", 179th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 10 January 1945, near Althorn, France. Sergeant Ponder, platoon sergeant, moved in front of the riflemen to draw fire from a concealed enemy machine gun so the position could be located and the gun destroyed. When the company moved forward again, they were fired on by another machine gun. Sergeant Ponder crawled over one hundred and fifty yards of open terrain under grazing fire to within grenade range of the hostile position, raised up and threw two grenades in quick succession. Assaulting the position, he found the grenades had destroyed the gun and killed the crew of four. While returning to his platoon, Sergeant Ponder was killed by a wounded German. Next of Kin: Mrs. Lucy Ponder (Mother), Oneida, Kentucky.

GERALD E. SOPER, 37 550 610, Private First Class, Infantry, Company "F", 274th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 7 January 1945, at Ningen, France. During a daylight attack on the town, intense sniper and automatic weapons activity halted the advance of Private First Class Soper's platoon. Disregarding the danger, he voluntarily crawled to a basement window from which the enemy was firing and hurled a grenade inside. Moving away from the window he was wounded. He then crawled back and tossed another grenade

through the opening. He was firing his rifle into the basement when hit the second time and died shortly afterwards. Private First Class Soper's gallant actions and ability enabled his platoon to resume the attack and aid in the capture of the town. Next of Kin: William H. Soper (Brother), 4613 Encines Drive, La Canada, California.

II - AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named members of the 280th Engineer Combat Battalion:

MERRITT O. BURDICK, 31 417 111, Private First Class, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

GEORGE H. McLELLAN, JR., 31 430 163, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

For heroic achievement in action on 26 February 1945, near Hilfarth, Germany. These men volunteered to assist in clearing a mined and booby-trapped road which led into an enemy-held town. They proceeded to remove Holt, anti-personnel and "S" mines from the road in an efficient manner. Their careffulness, courage and sound judgment were largely responsible for driving the enemy from its stronghold.

I. -- AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 29 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named members of the 6638th Engineer Mine Clearance Company (Armored) (Provisional):

GEORGE S. BURGE, 35 723 313, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Evansville, Indiana.

CLARENCE R. HENDY, 6 665 842, Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

MICHAEL LOSQUADRO, 32 715 093, Corporal, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Nassau, New York.

WILLIAM D. MORGAN, 14 038 749, Technician Fourth Grade, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Jacksonville, Florida.

GEORGE H. OWENS, 7 006 547, Staff Sergeant, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Montgomery, Alabama.

THOMAS L. STEVENS, 36 150 567, Sergeant, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Grand Rapids, Michigan.

CLARENCE P. STEWART, 34 663 375, Sergeant, Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Broadway, North Carolina.

For gallantry in action on 27 November 1944, near Wingen, France. When an armored attack was held up by a strongly fortified road block, these courageous members of tankdozer crews volunteered to clear the obstacle. They faced artillery, mortar and direct anti-tank fire while effectively reducing the barrier. By their superior devotion to duty and heroic efforts, the road block was smashed and the attack continued. Their actions in this endeavor were in accord with the finest traditions of the armed forces.

II - BATTLE HONORS - CITATION OF UNIT. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Section IV, Circular No. 333, War Department, 1943, the following named organization is cited for outstanding performance of duty in action:

THE 4TH CAVALRY RECONNAISSANCE SQUADRON, MECHANIZED, is cited for conspicuously distinguishing itself in battle against the enemy on 20 and 21

December 1944. The Squadron's mission was to attack in its zone and secure Bogheim, Germany, and the high ground to the southeast of the town. Previous actions in the Hartgen Forest had reduced the troops to between fifty-five and seventy men each. Nevertheless, two battle groups of the 942d German Infantry Regiment, 353d Infantry Division and one company of the 6th Parachute Regiment, which then represented one of the finest fighting units of the German Army, were completely destroyed during the course of this action. On the morning of 20 December 1944, in dense fog and under heavy concentrations of enemy artillery, the Squadron forced an entry into Bogheim. Resistance was fanatical, necessitating tortuous house-to-house fighting. By 1400 hours all resistance in the town had ceased but the Troop Commanders of all troops directly committed had either been killed or seriously wounded, and five of the nine platoon leaders of the Reconnaissance Troop evacuated. Twenty-five percent of the enlisted personnel had also become casualties. Again, on the morning of the following day, still under heavy artillery saturation, at times reaching a density of several hundred rounds per hour, the remainder of the Squadron drove and fought its way to the top of the ridge to the southeast, held by vastly superior enemy forces in excellent defenses. Almost completely exhausted from the heavy, sustained fighting of the previous day, the Troops nevertheless attacked at a distance of over two hundred yards of open ground, up hill to the ridge. Only the gallantry and esprit de corps of the officers and men, above and beyond the call of duty, enabled the Squadron to reorganize again and again after losing many Troop Commanders, Platoon Leaders, and other key personnel, vital to the continued functioning of a tactical unit. The gallantry and supreme devotion to duty of the officers and men of this Squadron and the significance of their performance were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Cavalry of the United States Armed Forces.

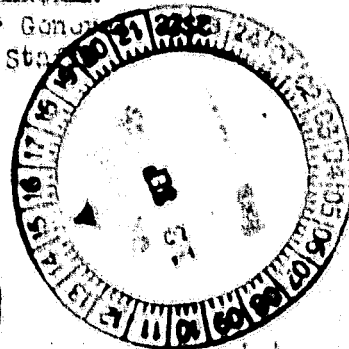
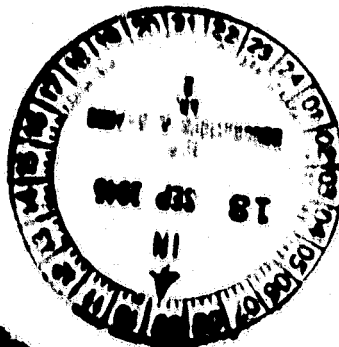

AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

MILTON S. BALCH, 37 371 004, Private First Class, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "C", 838th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion (Mobile), for heroic achievement in action on 26 March 1945, near Mannheim, Germany. Private First Class Balch coolly loaded his weapons carrier with signal equipment during an intense enemy artillery barrage and drove the vehicle with two shrapnel-flattened tires to safety. His outstanding courage and fortitude reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Kirksville, Missouri.

ARTHUR H. BROWN, JR., 36 515 697, Private First Class, Corps of Engineers, 280th Engineer Combat Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 27 February 1945 near Hilfarth, Germany. Private First Class Brown volunteered to assist in the clearance of an enemy minefield on the far shore of the Roer River. Despite heavy enemy artillery fire, he displayed outstanding initiative and courage and contributed materially to the construction of a vitally needed ponton bridge across the river. Entered military service from Michigan.

JOHN D. CHARLES, 34 607 433, Technician Fifth Grade, Transportation Corps, 829th Amphibian Truck Company, (TC), for heroic achievement in action on 27 April 1945, in Germany. By confident and skilled management of his DUKW, Technician Fifth Grade Charles succeeded in moving seriously wounded American soldiers from the enemy shore across the Danube River to a battalion aid station. His courageous and skillful action was an inspiration to all who witnessed it. Entered military service from Lexington, North Carolina.

WILLIAM C. FORD, 34 426 824, Sergeant, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "C", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 13 November 1944 at Bertrichamps, France. When an enemy artillery barrage scored a direct hit on an ammunition dump, Sergeant Ford directed his men in clearing rubble from an adjacent supply route while shells exploded nearby. He then supervised removal of ammunition and displaced his mortar so that it could continue supporting fire. His services were of great benefit to his organization. Entered military service from New Albany, Mississippi.

ROBERT B. SMITH, O 491 829, Captain, Chemical Warfare Service, Company "C", 83d Chemical Mortar Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 13 November 1944, at Bertrichamps, France. An artillery barrage, scoring a direct hit on an ammunition dump, created a large fire and scattered debris

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and shell fragments over a nearby main supply route. While shells continued to explode, Captain Smith directed his men to a safe area and assisted in the removal of the debris. He then aided in displacing four mortars. His leadership and courage enabled ambulances and supply vehicles to continue their missions and the platoon to resume its supporting fire. Entered military service from Hot Springs, New Mexico.

WILLIAM C. TERRING, 19 098 097, Technician Fifth Grade, Transportation Corps, 829th Amphibian Truck Company, (TC), for heroic achievement in action on 27 April 1945, in Germany. By his skilled and confident management of an amphibious vehicle, Technician Fifth Grade Terring facilitated the rapid transporting and unloading of seriously wounded American soldiers to a battalion aid station across the Danube River. His actions and ability were in keeping with the highest standards of the armed forces. Entered military service from Los Angeles, California.

SETH E. WAGONER, 36 485 116, Technician Fifth Grade, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "B", 838th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion (Mobile), for heroic achievement in action on 19 March 1945, near Hornback, Germany. Technician Fifth Grade Wagoner displayed unusual courage in order to bring medical aid to a wounded soldier. During a blackout, Technician Fifth Grade Wagoner volunteered to drive an aid man through an area, and over a bridge, which were subjected to intense enemy artillery fire. His courage and ability while bringing aid to a fallen comrade reflect the finest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from East St. Louis, Illinois.

I -- AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF THE DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 28 September 1943, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded, posthumously, by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

HENRY BOYER, OC O10 591, Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "B", 114th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 28 March 1945, near Weinhelm, Germany. When his platoon, acting as advance guard of an attacking force, came under intense small-arms and machine-gun fire, Lieutenant Boyer was seriously wounded while placing his men in position. Refusing medical aid, he continued to lead his platoon until he was struck a second time. Then, although critically injured, he located and directed the neutralization of an enemy flak-wagon, not allowing himself to be evacuated until the company objective was taken. Lieutenant Boyer's heroism is in accord with the highest traditions of the armed forces. Next of Kin: Mrs. Marie J. Boyer (Wife), 335 W. Third Avenue, Roselle, New Jersey.

RONDALL H. GLAZE, 44 O36 390, Private, Infantry, Company "A", 275th Infantry Regiment, for extraordinary heroism in action on 17 February 1945, near Lixing, Franco. During a company attack, murderous enemy machine gun fire halted the advance. Realizing the extreme gravity of the situation, Private Glaze voluntarily assumed the task of knocking out the hostile weapon. He crept across open terrain, while exposed to heavy enemy mortar, artillery, and rifle fire, and hurled a grenade at the machine gun crew, killing them instantly. Though fatally wounded, his courageous action enabled his company to continue its advance and gain its objective. His valiant service reflects the finest traditions of the armed forces. Next of Kin: Nezzie H. Glaze (Mother), Route 1, Cleveland, Georgia.

II - AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 28 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individual:

JAMES H. PRINKEY, 35 270 638, Private First Class, Corps of Engineers, 6638th Engineer Mine Clearance Company (Armored) (Provisional), for gallantry in action on 24 March 1945, in the vicinity of Kaiserslautern, Germany. Private First Class Prinkey, tank commander of a recovery vehicle, directed his tank into a smoke filled railroad tunnel and emerged with a railroad car ablaze with ignited ammunition. Disregarding the intense heat and poor visibility, and with complete realization of the dangers involved, he re-entered

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the tunnel repeatedly and removed five more burning railroad cars. His courageous action and unselfish devotion to duty reflect much credit upon himself and the Corps of Engineers. Entered military service from Mount Sterling, Ohio.

I -- AWARD OF THE SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Soldier's Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

BERNARD P. CROSS, 36 369 465, Staff Sergeant, Corps of Military Police, 364th Military Police Company, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy on 1 May 1945, in Heilbronn, Germany. When a prisoner unsuccessfully attempted to attack his guard, Sergeant Cross accompanied his stockade commander on an investigation of the incident. As the officer stepped into the cell, the prisoner knocked him unconscious with a chair leg. Sergeant Cross tried to protect the officer from further injury by dragging him from the cell and blocking blows with his hands. When this failed and the prisoner continued the assault, he killed the attacker with his pistol and saved the officer's life. Entered military service from Ottawa, Illinois.

HALLIE F. LEWIS, 36 723 123, Private First Class, Transportation Corps, 6826th Movement Control Group, Railway, for heroism not involving actual conflict with the enemy, on 8 May 1945, in Munich, Germany. Private First Class Lewis, ignoring the presence of fiercely flaming gasoline and exploding ammunition, repeatedly entered an area and assisted in the evacuation of forty-one wounded persons. His heroic actions saved many lives and were in accord with the finest traditions of the armed forces. Entered military service from Blufford, Illinois.

II -- AWARD OF THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

WACLAW J. CHOINSKI, 31 013 725, Technician Fourth Grade, Field Artillery, Battery "C", 935th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 12 March 1945, near Spicheren, France. When the area was under direct artillery fire of an enemy 105 millimeter self-propelled gun, Technician Fourth Grade Choinski left the safety of his dug-in position, located the enemy weapon and adjusted friendly artillery fire, which silenced the gun. His intrepid and courageous actions reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Nashua, New Hampshire.

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**R E S T R I C T E D**

**EUGENE S. GINNS**, 33 179 032, Corporal, Medical Department, Battery "A", 69th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 18 April 1945, near Meinfeld, Germany. Corporal Ginns distinguished himself by his remarkable coolness and courageous action while evacuating and administering first aid to a seriously wounded man under heavy enemy fire. His timely action, sound judgment and stern sense of duty were in keeping with the highest ideals of the armed forces. Entered military service from Linwood, Pennsylvania.

**BRUCE B. MAC DONALD**, 32 933 182, Private First Class, Coast Artillery Corps, Battery "A", 838th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion (Mobile), for heroic achievement in action on 26 March 1945, near Worms, Germany. When enemy artillery fire created a barricade on a vital road leading to the Rhine River, Private First Class MacDonald voluntarily left the safety of his foxhole to assist in clearing the debris. His outstanding courage and initiative reflect great credit upon himself and contributed materially to the success of the river crossing. Entered military service from Buffalo, New York.

**HARLAN H. SCHUTTE**, O 461 268, First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, 933d Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 1 June 1944 in Italy. Realizing the urgent need of an accurate and complete battalion survey, Lieutenant Schutte left his place of comparative safety and made his way to the survey station through a barrage of enemy artillery fire. His initiative and courageous action were an inspiration to his men and reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces. Entered military service from Marshalltown, Iowa.

**ORVILLE R. TACKETT**, 35 213 557, Private First Class, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 935th Field Artillery Battalion, for heroic achievement in action on 8 January 1945, in the vicinity of Druisenheim, France. When his observation post was partially destroyed, Private First Class Tackett, a radio operator, accompanied the observer to another post and continued their work. Although under enemy observation and small arms fire, he stood by the observer and established radio communications. His ability and courage resulted in continuance of artillery fire on enemy positions. Entered military service from Waverly, Ohio.

AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded by the Army Commander to the following named individuals:

FREDERICK M. HARRIS, O12 750, Brigadier General, United States Army, 63d Infantry Division, for gallantry in action on 25 February 1945, in the vicinity of Kleinblitteradorf, Germany. When a powerful enemy counterattack supported by artillery, mortars and two self-propelled guns succeeded in penetrating a partially organized defensive position, causing Company "I" of the 253d Infantry Regiment to withdraw in disorder, thereby exposing the flank of the regiment to enemy action, General Harris rallied retreating troops, organized and sent forward anti-tank rocket teams and anti-tank guns in order to restore the situation. Later, he personally went forward to the scene of conflict despite the danger from satchel mine fields, small arms and heavy artillery and mortar fire in order to direct operations. General Harris' presence at this critical time and in this hazardous area inspired his subordinates to greater efforts and resulted in the restoration of a most dangerous situation. The outstanding leadership and gallantry of General Harris reflect the highest credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered United States Military Academy from Rockmart, Georgia.

LOUIS B. HIBBS, O4 426, Major General, United States Army, 63d Infantry Division, for gallantry in action on 19 March 1945, in the vicinity of Ensheim, Germany. During offensive operations against the Siegfried Line, General Hibbs advanced to points of vantage in the vicinity of Ensheim, Germany, in order to reconnoiter enemy dispositions and to observe the operations of friendly forces. Despite heavy and concentrated fire from enemy artillery, mortars and rockets, he pursued this self-chosen mission until he had obtained information with which to direct the coordinated efforts of our infantry, tanks and tank destroyers. General Hibbs' presence in this hazardous area inspired his subordinates to greater efforts and resulted in the break-through of the Siegfried Line fortifications. The outstanding leadership and gallantry of General Hibbs reflect the highest credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered United States Military Academy from Washington, D. C.
