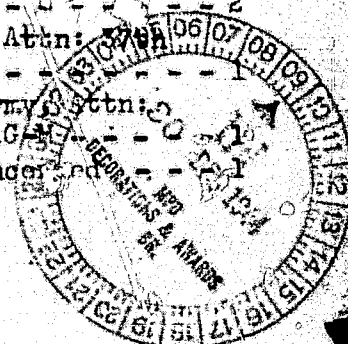

II. AWARDS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

I. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters, Fifth United States Army, 8 September, 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Technical Sergeant OTIS A GAYLORD 38130939, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 November 1944 to 5 December 1944. In charge of a machine gun platoon during this period, first as platoon sergeant and later as platoon leader, Technical Sergeant Gaylord, displaying unusual leadership and cool courage, constantly exposing himself to enemy fire, so efficiently maintained control and directed the fire of his platoon that its work was outstanding when in action. His exemplary soldierly qualities reflect credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Sergeant ROBERT L BUFFALOE 35573432, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 November 1944 to 5 December 1944. As reconnaissance sergeant for his unit during this period, Sergeant Buffaloe, through his continual patrol, frequently into enemy territory and under heavy fire, obtained firing data for his gun positions which contributed materially to the attainment of the battalion objective. The untiring efforts and faithful devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Buffaloe were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Technician Third Grade ORVAL D KEITH 37334952, 691st Field Artillery Battalion, (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 28 November 1944. When a soldier attempting to assist a seriously wounded fellow soldier in a heavily sown mine field, was himself injured by an exploding mine, Technician Third Grade Keith, disregarding his own safety, went immediately to the rescue of the injured man, administered first aid and removed him to a battalion aid station. The courageous, unselfish action displayed by Technician Third Grade Keith reflects high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kansas.

Technician Fourth Grade ANTHONY W BABB 35366245, 691st Field Artillery Battalion, (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 28 November 1944. When a soldier, attempting to assist a seriously wounded fellow soldier in a heavily sown mine field, was himself injured by an exploding mine, Technician Fourth Grade Babb, disregarding his own safety, went immediately to the rescue of the injured man, administered first aid and removed him to a battalion aid station. The courageous, unselfish action displayed by Technician Fourth Grade Babb reflects high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Indiana.

Technician Fifth Grade THOMAS E HANNAH 33530100, 125th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. When fire from an enemy machine gun was materially hindering the work of a field artillery battalion observation post, Technician Fifth Grade Hannah, with complete disregard for his own safety, made his way across open terrain, waited until dusk and when the enemy machine gun again opened fire, he fired into the position with an automatic rifle silencing the position and forcing the enemy to withdraw. By his action, artillery observers were enabled to direct fire on enemy positions which had been inflicting heavy casualties. The intrepidity, initiative and unswerving devotion to duty exhibited by Technician Fifth Grade Hannah reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Virginia.

II. AWARDS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended and Memorandum 84, Headquarters, Eighth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class CHARLES W PINE 39405017, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 5 December 1944. Entered military service from California.

Staff Sergeant ANTHONY J MESSINA 33404722, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 6 December 1944. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Corporal JOHN A HJORN 1818275, 113th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 2 December 1944. Entered military service from Illinois.

Sergeant ERNEST SALATO 37041894, 125th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 26 November 1944 to 4 December 1944. Entered military service from Iowa.

Technician Fourth Grade ARTHUR G HOLBROOK 33546831, 125th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 26 November 1944 to 4 December 1944. Entered military service from Maryland.

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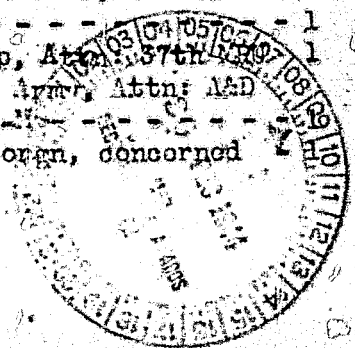

I. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 500-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters, Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Captain ELDRIDGE C DUDLEY O1292346, Infantry, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 22 - 24 November 1944. During this period, Captain Dudley, though previously wounded on 19 November 1944, led his men in an assault into enemy positions and subsequently worked tirelessly and skillfully to extricate exposed members of his unit. In addition, Captain Dudley assisted in the location of the wounded and personally supervised their evacuation. The personal courage and faithful discharge of duty displayed by Captain Dudley reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Florida.

Sergeant LEONICIO H FRAUSTO 39690209, (then Private First Class), 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 4 December 1944. When the platoon of which he was a member was engaged in an attack against enemy positions and his platoon sergeant and squad leaders had been wounded, Sergeant Frausto assumed command and directed the attack of the reorganized platoon in such a capable manner that material aid was given to the company in taking its objective. The initiative and aggressive action on the part of Sergeant Frausto reflect credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

Sergeant VINTS E SHUMATE 33218782, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 5 December 1944. During a heavy enemy artillery barrage when his platoon sergeant was wounded, Sergeant Shumate, though suffering from severe concussion which affected his eyes, reorganized the platoon and assisted the platoon leader in moving two machine guns approximately 200 yards beyond the battalion front to the aid of another platoon which was threatened by encirclement. The courage, aggressive action and capable leadership displayed by Sergeant Shumate served as an inspiration to his men and were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

Sergeant DEE HENDERSON 38357430, 800th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 30 November 1944. Observing an officer in an exposed area who had been seriously wounded in the leg by shell fragments, Sergeant Henderson carried the officer to a place of safety and applied a tourniquet. Realizing that further aid was necessary, he then left his place of comparative safety, travelled several hundred yards under enemy fire, secured medical supplies, returned and applied further first aid treatment. Under cover of darkness he later moved the officer approximately 600 yards

to a pillbox from which evacuation was effected. The bold, rapid action, faithful discharge of duty and commendable conduct displayed by Sergeant Henderson, without doubt, resulted in saving the life of the officer and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Technician Fifth Grade JOE T ALELLO 38317992, 309th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 23 November 1944. Assigned the task of removing debris from a vital underpass which had been hit by enemy fire, Technician Fifth Grade Alello, working alone for a period of more than one hour in an unarmored bulldozer under heavy artillery, mortar and sniper fire, successfully accomplished his mission which materially aided friendly tanks and vehicles in the launching of a successful attack. The dauntless action, without regard for personal safety, and faithful discharge of duty displayed by Technician Fifth Grade Alello reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Louisiana.

* Captain CHARLES W BYRD 0513268, (then First Lieutenant), Medical Corps, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 18-20 November 1944. Entered military service from Virginia.

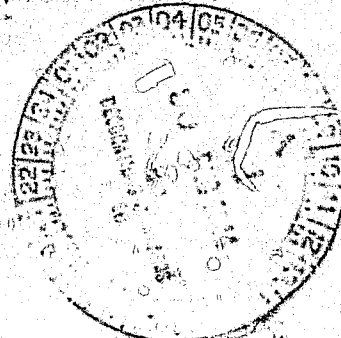

Staff Sergeant ALFONSO J COLELLA 33509974, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 1 December 1944. Staff Sergeant Colella, observing an enemy patrol of twenty men infiltrating toward his lines, ordered his men into a defensive position and dispatched a runner to inform his commanding officer. He then directed the squad to open fire, killing ten of the enemy and taking four prisoners. Although twice wounded in the encounter, Staff Sergeant Colella, under constant enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire, continued to lead his men until the attack was repulsed and the position of the company secured. The coolness, clear thinking and initiative displayed by Staff Sergeant Colella reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Sergeant ABRAHAM E HOFFNER 33622127, (then Private), 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 1 December 1944. When warned that a group of German soldiers were attempting to infiltrate into a village just occupied by his company, Sergeant Hoffner, realizing the danger to his unit, after dispatching a runner to the command post, proceeded with another soldier to a point where he could observe the action of the enemy and holding their fire until the opportune moment, succeeded in killing four of the enemy and capturing seven, thus accounting for the entire patrol. The courageous, rapid and decisive action of Sergeant Hoffner contributed to the prevention of a surprise attack and reflects high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Private First Class JAMES O TATE 34803137, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 1 December 1944. When a group of German soldiers attempted to infiltrate into a village just occupied by his company, Private First Class Tate, with the aid of another soldier, holding their fire until the opportune moment, succeeded in killing four of the enemy and capturing seven, thus accounting for the entire patrol. The courageous, rapid and decisive action of Private First Class Tate contributed to the prevention of a surprise attack and reflects credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Alabama.

Colonel CHARLES J BARRETT 014895, Field Artillery, 84th Division Artillery, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 November to 3 December 1944. As commanding officer of Division Artillery and attached field artillery battalions during the division's initial contact with the

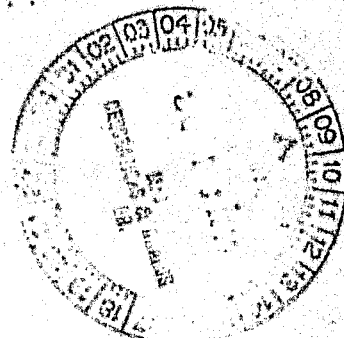

I - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters, Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

✓ Private ROBERT D NEWELL 11129428, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 21 November 1944. Disregarding his own personal safety, Private Newell, although suffering from a wound previously received from an enemy tank, crawled out of his foxhole under heavy enemy fire and gave aid to his injured comrades. The courageous action displayed by Private Newell reflects great credit on him and is in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Maine.

✓ Sergeant EUCLID G MAYFIELD 14175848 (then Private First Class), 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. When his platoon was temporarily held up by extremely accurate and effective small arms and automatic fire from an enemy strongpoint, Sergeant Mayfield, accompanied by two other men, with complete disregard for his own safety, left a relatively secure position to advance upon the strongpoint and operated so successfully that the position was taken, eleven Germans were killed and fifty-two others captured. The personal courage and initiative displayed by Sergeant Mayfield were an example for his fellow soldiers and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Alabama.

✓ Private First Class MARK A LEIVE 33421202, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 30 November to 1 December 1944. Following an advance of his platoon and the consolidation of its position, Private First Class Leive, together with five other men, was protecting the rear of the unit from infiltration. By carefully aimed fire, his group succeeded in killing a 20-man enemy patrol. On the following night, Private First Class Leive, who was protecting the platoon's rear from an enemy raiding party, was severely wounded during a fierce artillery and mortar barrage. He held his position, nevertheless, until the danger was past and relief arranged. The commendable, exemplary conduct and courage on the part of Private First Class Leive reflect credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

✓ Private GORDON F WEAVER III 32612107, 309th Medical Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 7 December 1944. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, Private Weaver entered a mine field and administered emergency first aid to several wounded men. While evacuating the wounded, Private Weaver stepped on a hidden mine and lost a leg. His devotion to duty and exemplary action are in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

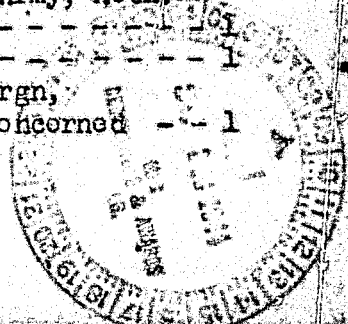

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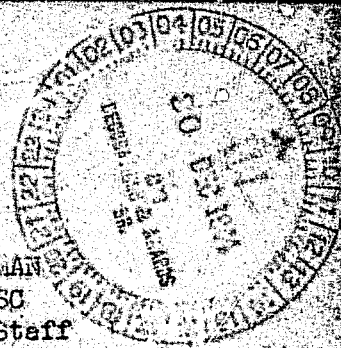

In this action he was killed. The personal bravery, unswerving devotion to duty and loyalty displayed by Sergeant Windham served as an inspiration to his men and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Louisiana.

Private First Class CHARLES A MIZZELL 34583061, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 23 November 1944. When two weapons of the machine gun platoon in which he was serving as gunner were put out of action, Private First Class Mizzell, who had been left behind in reserve, with complete disregard for his own safety, attempted to run through an intense enemy mortar barrage to replace one of the damaged weapons. In this action he was killed by a direct hit from an enemy mortar shell. The intrepidity, loyalty and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private First Class Mizzell reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Alabama.

Private First Class PEDRO PENA 38358791, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 23 November 1944. When the machine gun section in which he was serving as assistant gunner was subjected to an intense enemy mortar barrage which incapacitated one gunner, Private First Class Pena, with utter disregard for his own safety, took over the gun and during the constant barrage, kept his fire on the enemy until killed by a direct hit from a mortar shell. The intrepidity, loyalty and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private First Class Pena reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

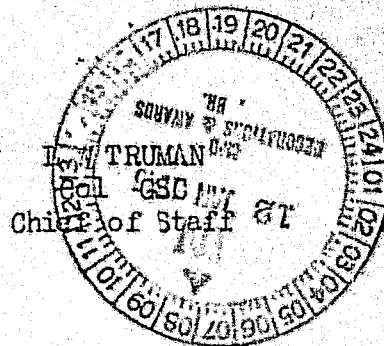
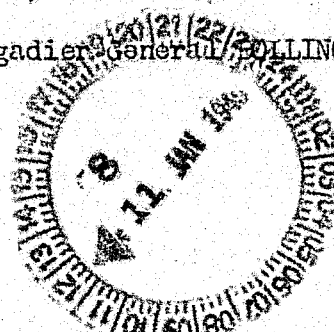

I - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 66, Headquarters First United States Army, 13 May 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

✓ Colonel TIMOTHY A. PEDLEY jr 07160, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 13 November 1944 to 3 December 1944. During this period, Colonel Pedley, displaying cool disdain to danger while under enemy fire, so inspired the troops of his command by his aggressive action, keen foresight and unswerving devotion to duty that his regiment accomplished its missions with distinction. His superior leadership, untiring efforts and military skill presented an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

✓ Lieutenant Colonel NORMAN D. CARNES 0319891, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 30 November 1944. Lieutenant Colonel Carnes was serving as battalion commander when the advance of one of his companies was temporarily checked by an intense enemy artillery and mortar barrage. With absolute disregard for his own safety, Lieutenant Colonel Carnes led his men to the north edge of the objective where he capably consolidated defensive positions to repel immediate enemy counterattacks. In addition, when the planned simultaneous advance of the unit on his right was halted by unexpected resistance, Lieutenant Colonel Carnes resourcefully organized a protecting force which he placed in the gap between his positions and the adjacent unit which enabled the remaining elements of the attack to move up without the threat of a flanking attack. I. AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 66, First United States Army, 18 May 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Staff Sergeant VINCENT J SIKORA jr 33403532, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 22 November 1944. When it became necessary for his section to establish an observation post on a hill under direct enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire, Staff Sergeant Sikora, oblivious to personal danger and in spite of mud, rain and heavy enemy fire, seized a reel of wire and laid a line in to the selected position. Three times this line was shot away and each time Staff Sergeant Sikora, in the face of terrific artillery and machine gun fire, worked his way down the hill, repaired the break and returned to the observation post. His exceptional courage and devotion to duty were instrumental in the successful support of a battalion in the capture of several enemy pillboxes and were in accordance with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Private First Class FRANK B DEYO 16122820, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 22 November 1944. While under intense artillery and small arms fire, Private First Class Deyo successfully led a mortar section to a new location, placed them in position and then laid wire from an observation post to the section. Smoke shells were then fired by the mortar section on five enemy pillboxes which enabled riflemen to take the positions. The bravery under fire and faithful performance of duty under difficult and hazardous conditions displayed by Private First Class Deyo reflect credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Illinois.

Private First Class KENNETH E MANUEL 35581740, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 11 - 14 December 1944. During this period, Private First Class Manuel, together with another soldier, made a reconnaissance some 1500 yards behind enemy lines, obtaining important information which was of material value to his unit's future operations. I - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 66, Headquarters First United States Army, 18 May 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Private GEORGE E BURKE jr 31383331, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 30 November 1944. When a medium tank, carrying a load of ammunition, was hit and set afire by an enemy rocket launcher, Private Burke, a litter bearer, together with another soldier, despite enemy heavy machine gun fire and exploding ammunition, successfully removed and evacuated one officer and three enlisted men from the burning tank. This gallant act, with complete disregard for his own safety, on the part of Private Burke, without doubt, resulted in saving the lives of the trapped men and reflects high credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Rhode Island.

Private ERNEST R COON 37534225, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 30 November 1944. While performing duty as a litter bearer, Private Coon, together with another soldier, without regard for his own safety, removed an officer from a burning medium tank containing ammunition which was exploding. He then took the officer and three wounded enlisted men to a medical aid station. The bold, rapid action and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private Coon, without doubt, saved the life of the officer and reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kansas.

Sergeant RANDALL O'DEA jr 12157167, 125th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 1 December 1944. When he observed that the area which his section was to occupy was under intense enemy fire and realizing that heavy casualties would be sustained if he moved his men into the area with no positions available, Sergeant O'Dea left his men in comparative safety, made a personal reconnaissance of the area, located suitable positions for his men and, though slightly wounded, returned and personally led small groups at a time to the selected positions. The courage, resourcefulness and initiative displayed by Sergeant O'Dea was responsible for averting numerous casualties and reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Private First Class WALTER J HENDRZAK 33473554, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 23 November 1944. Observing an officer seriously wounded in action, with utter disregard for his own safety, Private First Class Hendrzak advanced some 200 yards in open terrain through heavy enemy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire, to administer first aid and remove the officer from the line of fire. While returning to secure a litter bearer to bring the wounded officer from the field, Private First Class Hendrzak was killed. His heroic action, exceptional bravery, and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by this soldier reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Private WILLIAM J STANLEY 35659277, 325th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 22 November 1944. While performing duties as a wire and telephone operator, Private Stanley observed a wounded soldier pinned in a foxhole beneath the body of another soldier who had been killed. Knowing that his assistance was badly needed, Private Stanley, without regard for his own safety, left his place of comparative safety, crawled through a heavily bombarded area and brought the wounded soldier to safety and medical aid. His bold, rapid action and initiative, with complete disregard for his own welfare, without doubt saved the life of the wounded soldier. Private Stanley was subsequently killed in action, 3 December 1944. Entered military service from West Virginia.

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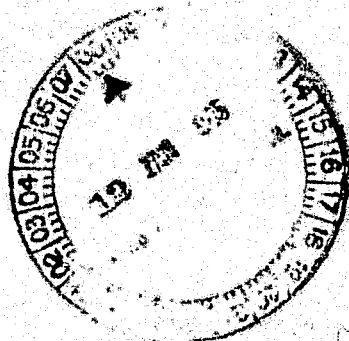

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUS): By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 66, Headquarters First United States Army, 18 May 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Private ELYNN R ORSBURN 39723286, 125th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 1 December 1944. Observing that a soldier was preparing to leave his foxhole during an intense enemy artillery mortar barrage, Private Orsburn, without regard for his own welfare, left the comparative safety of his foxhole and attempted to make his way to the excited soldier. In so doing, Private Orsburn was instantly killed by shrapnel from an exploding shell. The rare courage and unselfish action displayed by Private Orsburn is an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from California.

II - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 66, Headquarters First United States Army, 18 May 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant WILBERT W KOHRS 01292711, Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 1 December 1944. When the position of his company was threatened by an enemy attack, First Lieutenant Kohrs, ordering his subordinates to take cover and at great personal risk to himself crawled to a position in close proximity to the enemy and fired into a group of the attackers. Under constant artillery, mortar and machine gun fire, First Lieutenant Kohrs, by this and other bold, aggressive actions, finally broke up the attack and captured four of the Germans. The courage, daring and unselfish actions of this officer proved an inspiration to his men and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Private First Class ROBERT P SHECHAN 12173220, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. After receiving first aid for a head wound and told to return to the rear, Private First Class Shechan nevertheless continued firing his mortar until an officer, observing his weakness from loss of blood, ordered his evacuation. The courage, grim determination and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private First Class Shechan reflect high credit upon himself and were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Again on the night of 1 December 1944, though subjected to heavy artillery and mortar fire, Private First Class Sheridan, without regard for his own safety, voluntarily exposed himself to enemy fire to assist in establishing communications between the company command post and a rifle platoon. The courage, initiative and loyalty displayed by Private First Class Sheridan reflect high credit upon himself and were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Private First Class JOSEPH S. TERRY jr 14118627, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. While performing duty as a driver during an attack on the enemy, Private First Class Terry, without regard for his own safety and under heavy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire, frequently removed wounded men to a medical aid station. Later, he volunteered to take a message to the regimental command post across approximately 3500 yards of enemy terrain frequently under enemy machine gun fire. His mission completed, Private First Class Terry then voluntarily led a convoy carrying ammunition to the isolated battalion. The courage, loyalty and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private First Class Terry present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Mississippi.

Private NORMAN H. FRIEDMAN 32908348, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. Though performing duty as an ammunition bearer, Private Friedman volunteered to serve as a stretcher bearer and transported wounded men to a collecting point over approximately 1000 yards of open terrain under enemy artillery, machine gun and sniper fire. The courageous, unselfish action displayed by Private Friedman, without doubt, resulted in the saving of many lives and reflects high credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

III - AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL: By direction of the President, and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 66, Headquarters First United States Army, 18 May 1944, as amended, the Soldier's Medal is awarded to:

When fire from enemy mortars was causing heavy casualties, First Lieutenant Green, with complete disregard for his own safety, continually exposed himself to intense enemy fire while locating the position of the mortars. While transmitting the data to his artillery unit, First Lieutenant Green was instantly killed by an enemy shell. The dauntless spirit, unselfish action and exemplary conduct displayed by First Lieutenant Green served as an inspiration to those who witnessed them and were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Technician Fifth Grade WILLIAM E STEELE 39322620, 309th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 19 November 1944. When heavy enemy fire from a pillbox had temporarily halted the advance in one sector during a major attack, Technician Fifth Grade Steele, without regard for his own safety, crawled approximately 200 yards to place a charge of explosive on the door of the fortification while his platoon leader sergeant fired in the pillbox openings. The action resulted in the surrender of the strongpoint and 30 Germans. Technician Fifth Grade Steele was subsequently killed in action, 24 November 1944. The courage, daring and aggressive action displayed by Technician Fifth Grade Steele reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Oregon.

Private DOMINIC F PICCIOCCHI 35300067, 771st Tank Battalion (Attached 84th Infantry Division), United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 25 December 1944. While crossing an enemy-held ridge on a volunteer mission, Private Picciocchi succeeded in killing two Germans and capturing two others. Returning from his mission, Private Picciocchi then, on foot, guided his tank out of the area of fire from enemy antitank guns. Later in the day, Private Picciocchi was killed when the tank in which he was riding was hit by enemy fire. The courageous, gallant actions of Private Picciocchi, without regard for personal safety, reflect high credit upon himself and are in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

Using fragmentation and white phosphorous grenades, the enemy positions were overpowered; twenty Germans killed, fifty-three prisoners and nine machine guns captured. Major Thomte's outstanding leadership, initiative and intrepidity under extremely hazardous conditions were major factors contributing to the success of the attack and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

Captain MAX H JENNINGS O1299292 (then First Lieutenant), Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany 22 November 1944. When two attempts to establish contact with an adjacent unit had failed due to constant artillery, mortar and small arms fire, Captain Jennings, disregarding his own safety, using an unconfirmed overlay as his only guide of the location of the front line and while the enemy was making a counterattack on the nearby unit, successfully established contact. The bold, rapid action, resourcefulness and exemplary conduct displayed by Captain Jennings contributed materially to the success of the operation and reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

First Lieutenant RICHARD W MULLEN O446837, Field Artillery, 909th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 22 December 1944. While serving as a forward artillery observer during a tactical situation which was uncertain and the location of the enemy unknown, First Lieutenant Mullen, hearing three enemy tanks approaching which he was unable to locate due to poor visibility, crawled 500 yards, under constant enemy machine gun fire, and successfully directed artillery fire which repulsed the enemy tanks. The courage, initiative and skill displayed by First Lieutenant Mullen, with complete disregard for his own safety, reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 30 November 1944. When several attempts to haul vitally needed ammunition to an infantry regiment, which his unit was supporting, had failed, Second Lieutenant Silence, disregarding his own safety, under intense enemy machine gun and rocket launcher fire, successfully delivered the ammunition to the infantry unit which was thus enabled to repulse an enemy counter-attack. At one time during the trip, a rocket struck the tank destroyer in which Second Lieutenant Silence was riding, the explosion blowing his helmet off and momentarily blinding the driver. The cool courage, skill and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Second Lieutenant Silence reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Performing duty as a rifleman, Private First Class Lautz volunteered to make a reconnaissance behind enemy lines to secure information concerning the location and movement of enemy troops and vehicles. In the successful accomplishment of this mission, Private First Class Lautz had to by-pass several enemy posts, and on two occasions he was forced to swim approximately 100 yards in the icy waters of a river. In addition, the area through which he moved was illuminated by fire from burning buildings in a nearby village and was under constant machine gun and small arms fire. The intrepidity, daring, loyalty and exemplary conduct displayed by Private First Class Lautz reflect high credit upon himself and were in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Georgia.

Technician Fifth Grade WOOLROW B SANDERS 38393354, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 22 - 24 December 1944. Performing duty as a radio operator with two other enlisted men as part of a task force which was cut off and completely surrounded by the enemy, Technician Fifth Grade Sanders, disregarding his own safety under intense artillery, mortar and small arms fire, maintained constant communications with higher headquarters. Advised at the last minute that the force had been ordered to withdraw, Technician Fifth Grade Sanders, though severely wounded, mounted the last vehicle leaving the area. The bravery under fire, loyalty and faithful performance of duty under difficult and hazardous conditions displayed by Technician Fifth Grade Sanders present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

II - AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 2, Headquarters First United States Army, 4 January 1945, the Soldier's Medal is awarded to:

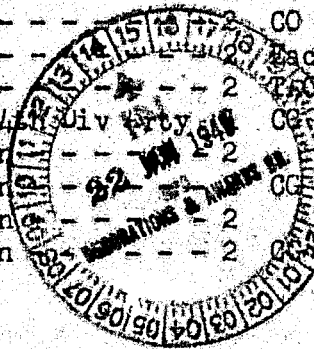

The courage, loyalty and unselfishness exhibited by this soldier, without regard for his own safety, enabled his unit to continue its advance and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. 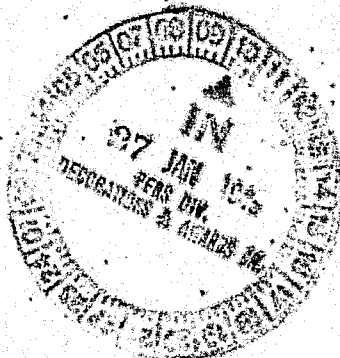

Proceeding on, Captain Pratt, hearing voices emanating from a cellar, called for the surrender of the occupants whereupon one German officer and forty-seven German enlisted men marched out and surrendered. 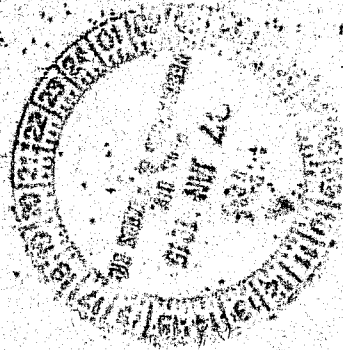

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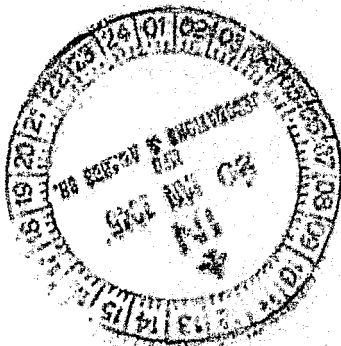

Second Lieutenant CHARLES J COAKLEY 01326154, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 24 - 25 December 1944. Having accomplished his mission of pressing through an enemy-held village and occupying the high ground immediately beyond, Second Lieutenant Coakley and his platoon were subjected to violent attacks from the rear by enemy armor and heavy patrols which at the same time prevented support platoons from coming to their aid. Refusing the opportunity to withdraw his platoon, and in spite of continued enemy armored attacks and effective sniper fire, Second Lieutenant Coakley, displaying superior leadership and great determination, held his men in position until relief was finally accomplished. Shortly before this relief arrived, Second Lieutenant Coakley, completely disregarding his own safety, was killed while attempting to ascertain the position of the enemy snipers. The high courage and inspiring leadership of Second Lieutenant Coakley contributed much to the success of his company's operation and reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

II - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 2, Headquarters First United States Army, 4 January 1945, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Staff Sergeant EDWARD T REINEKE 15400709, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 24 December 1944. During a night attack against the enemy, Staff Sergeant Reineke, exposing himself to heavy artillery and small arms fire, successfully neutralized an enemy tank by climbing on the vehicle and throwing a grenade into the open part of the turret. Later, during the same attack, Staff Sergeant Reineke, with very little support from small arms fire, approached an enemy tank operating behind friendly lines and forced its withdrawal by fire from a rocket launcher. The dauntless, daring aggressiveness and exemplary actions displayed by Staff Sergeant Reineke contributed materially to the success of the attack and reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio.

Later, on 26 December 1944, Private First Class Horton was killed in action against the enemy. The cool courage, unswerving devotion to duty and tenacious fighting spirit displayed by Private First Class Horton reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Discovering an enemy mine field, the location of which made it a dangerous threat to friendly troops, Technical Sergeant Kovach crossed a ridge swept by enemy machine gun and artillery fire and, though wounded, continued on his way to report the danger to his battalion commander. The fortitude, tenacious fighting spirit and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Technical Sergeant Kovach prevented the possible loss of life and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

First Lieutenant JOSEPH R DARRIGO 01325278 (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. When the advance of his platoon was temporarily halted due to constant fire from an enemy strong point, First Lieutenant Darrigo unhesitatingly led the unit in an assault which resulted in the reduction of the fortification, the killing of approximately 18 Germans and the capture of 52 prisoners. The courageous action and superior performance of duty displayed by First Lieutenant Darrigo present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. 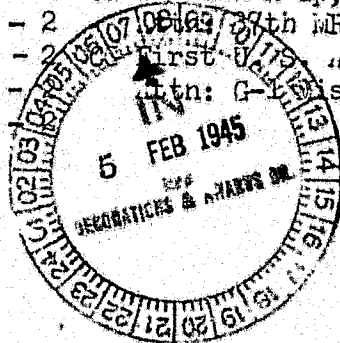

First Lieutenant NELS A NORDLAND 0466587, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 27 December 1944. When the position of his platoon was threatened by an enemy armored attack, First Lieutenant Nordland left his foxhole to direct his rocket launcher and rifle grenade teams to better firing positions. While returning to lead another group of his men forward, First Lieutenant Nordland, together with one enlisted man, killed two Germans who were attempting to force a soldier from his foxhole. His ammunition being exhausted at this point, First Lieutenant Nordland threw three grenades at enemy troops in the act of being picked up by a tank. In the performance of this act, First Lieutenant Nordland was killed by machine gun fire from an enemy armored vehicle before he could withdraw to a place of safety. The conspicuous bravery, tenacious fighting spirit and commendable conduct displayed by First Lieutenant Nordland present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Second Lieutenant ROBERT E BALABAN 01326148, Infantry, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 20 November 1944. When three platoons of his company had been cut off from all contact with their battalion by enemy tanks and infantry, Second Lieutenant Balaban, without regard for the intense enemy fire, voluntarily led a patrol through the enemy positions to successful contact with the surrounded units. In the accomplishment of this mission, seemingly impossible due to the presence of three enemy tanks and heavy small arms fire, Second Lieutenant Balaban lost his life. The gallant and courageous leadership of this officer contributed much to the success of his battalion's operation and reflects high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kansas.

Second Lieutenant HARRY C KELLY 02000475, Infantry, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 8 January 1945. Observing two wounded men lying in an area which was being subjected to intense enemy machine gun fire and on which friendly artillery fire was about to be placed, Second Lieutenant Kelly, with complete disregard for his own welfare, left his position of comparative safety and attempted to remove the wounded soldiers. In the performance of this heroic act, Second Lieutenant Kelly received wounds from which he died. The unselfish action, conspicuous courage and com-

commendable conduct displayed by Second Lieutenant Kelly reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Virginia.

Private First Class GEORGE W HOOT 38304033, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. While participating in a volunteer reconnaissance patrol which was under heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire, Private First Class Hoot, using an enemy machine gun which he had seized, covered the withdrawal of a tank crew whose vehicle had been hit by enemy artillery fire and when the advance of his battalion was threatened by a company of enemy troops, he placed such a withering fire on the enemy positions that the ballation was able to move forward and accomplish its mission. (Private First Class Hoot was subsequently killed in action 24 December 1944.) The cool courage, initiative and resourcefulness displayed by Private First Class Hoot served as an inspiration to the men of his platoon and were in accordance with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Technician Fourth Grade EARLE L SMITHBERG 19203150, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 9 January, 1945. Though slightly wounded in the leg by shrapnel from a mortar shell which he received while attempting to evacuate a wounded soldier who died before aid could be administered, Technician Fourth Grade Smithberg, a medical aid man, without regard for his own safety, crawled approximately 900 yards over difficult terrain under enemy small arms and artillery fire to administer first aid and successfully remove two wounded soldiers to a place of safety. The conspicuous courage, unswerving devotion to duty in the face of extreme difficulties and commendable conduct displayed by Technician Fourth Grade Smithberg present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from California.

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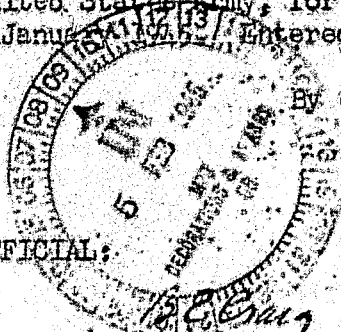

Having led his company in the seizure of a wooded area where enemy mechanized forces had been reported, Captain Prophet, before proceeding with the advance, with no knowledge of the terrain to his immediate front, disregarding his own safety, mounted a tank, reconnoitered the area for a distance of approximately 100 yards and with the information gained, successfully led his unit to the attainment of its objective. Captain Prophet was subsequently killed in action on 12 January 1945. The cool courage, superior leadership and commendable conduct displayed by Captain Prophet reflect the highest credit upon himself and were in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Kansas.

Private J H SCHARF 39919210, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 13 January 1945. When the advance of his squad was temporarily halted by machine gun fire from an enemy tank to the front and enfilade fire from a second machine gun on the left, Private Scharf, with complete disregard for his own safety, led his squad within fifteen yards of the enemy tank by crawling under the intense fire. From this point, though subjected to point blank fire from German infantry surrounding the tank, Private Scharf courageously charged the position, firing as he ran. Though he lost his life in the performance of this heroic act, the enemy became so disorganized that other members of the squad, following Private Scharf's action, were able to seize the objective. The conspicuous courage, disdain for danger and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private Scharf reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. 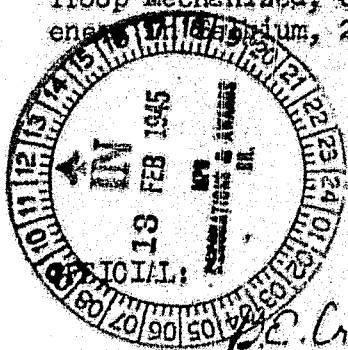

Technical Sergeant ELBERT O CONDLEY 39117270, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 12 January 1945. When the advance of his platoon was temporarily halted by enemy fire from a tank and a fortified house, Technical Sergeant Condley, after placing his men under cover and making a personal reconnaissance of the enemy positions, moved to an exposed position and fired into the house with a rocket launcher. He was then subjected to enemy artillery fire and severely wounded in the back. Despite these wounds, Technical Sergeant Condley reported to his unit's command post and volunteered to lead an attack against the enemy positions but was ordered to the rear for medical treatment. The conspicuous courage, tenacious fighting spirit and commendable conduct displayed by Technical Sergeant Condley reflect high credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from California.

Staff Sergeant CHARLEY CAMP jr 14004569 (then Private), 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 13 - 14 January 1945. As part of a small force consisting of two officers and 45 riflemen which had been assigned the mission of seizing and holding a Belgian village in conjunction with several tanks, Staff Sergeant Camp, performing duty as an automatic rifleman, led the men in the accomplishment of the mission firing his automatic weapon from the hip with amazing accuracy. On the following day during an attack on another German-held town, Staff Sergeant Camp again occupied the lead position while the unit was advancing, killing five of the enemy and assisting in the capture of 23 Germans. Spearheading the attack into the town, Staff Sergeant Camp was instrumental in the capture of an additional 69 Germans. The conspicuous courage, aggressive action and tenacious fighting spirit displayed by Staff Sergeant Camp were material factors in the attainment of his battalion's objective and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Tennessee.

Private First Class WALTER FEDORAK 13154817, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 22 - 23 November 1944. While performing duty as an assistant at a battalion medical aid station, Private First Class Fedorak, though subjected to enemy artillery, mortar, machine gun and

sniper fire, voluntarily assisted litter bearers in removing a wounded officer from the front lines to the aid station. On the following day, Private First Class Fedorak delivered urgently needed medical supplies under heavy artillery and sniper fire to a captured pillbox where, after administering aid to twenty-one casualties, he again assisted litter bearers in the evacuation of the wounded men to a medical aid station. The unswerving devotion to duty, unselfish actions and commendable conduct displayed by Private First Class Fedorak undoubtedly resulted in saving the lives of the wounded soldiers and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Private First Class SYLVAIN GOBES 33625366, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 12 January 1945. When enemy machine gun, rocket launcher and tank fire from a fortified house was inflicting heavy losses on a rifle company, Private First Class Gobes, performing duty as a radio operator for the forward observer of a mortar platoon, made his way under heavy artillery and mortar fire to a position which afforded him a view of the enemy location and directed the fire of his platoon on the enemy, setting the house on fire. Private First Class Gobes then killed two of the Germans with his carbine as they evacuated the burning house. The conspicuous courage, superior performance of duty and commendable conduct displayed by Private First Class Gobes prevented further casualties in the rifle company and present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

First Lieutenant THOMAS E NORTON 01312973, Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 6 - 7 January 1945. When a night attack by his company was temporarily halted by intense enemy automatic fire, First Lieutenant Norton, disregarding his own safety, moved to a position within fifty yards of the enemy machine gun and, using a rocket launcher, destroyed the gun killing two Germans at the same time. Later when the leader of another platoon of his company was wounded, First Lieutenant Norton supervised the successful withdrawal of the unit and its establishment of defensive positions. On the following day, he directed the withdrawal of his platoon from an area where German tanks and a large enemy force had been encountered to allow a concentration of artillery fire on the enemy. Though wounded he not only continued to direct the fire of his unit but collected other elements of his company and reorganized them in defensive positions. The conspicuous courage, tenacious fighting spirit and determined action displayed by First Lieutenant Norton reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Colorado.

Sergeant ELVIN SKAGGS 38339240 (then Private First Class), 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 24 December 1944. During a fierce attack by the enemy led by three tanks, Sergeant Skaggs, together with another soldier, though subjected to fire from the approaching tanks, destroyed the leading vehicle with rocket launcher fire and, firing on the remaining two tanks, forced their immediate withdrawal, thereby halting the advance of the enemy. The cool courage, superior performance of duty and commendable conduct displayed by Sergeant Skaggs reflect high credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

I - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUS): By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Private First Class JACK A REYNOLDS 31446707, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 15 January 1945. When two platoons entering a German-held town encountered heavy sniper fire, Private First Class Reynolds, disregarding his own safety, voluntarily manned a machine gun set up in the town's main thoroughfare to give the units supporting fire. Later when communication between these two platoons and the remainder of the company had been disrupted, Private First Class Reynolds, despite intense enemy fire, voluntarily reestablished communication. Returning from this mission, Private First Class Reynolds met his death as a result of point blank fire from an enemy tank. The tenacious, determined spirit, unselfish action and cool courage displayed by Private First Class Reynolds contributed materially to the attainment of his company's objective and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Rhode Island.

Private EUGENESZ JANICKI 36947231, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 15 January 1945. During an attack by his company, Private Janicki, after capturing five Germans whom he forced from a cellar with his automatic rifle, was wounded in the back by shrapnel from an enemy shell as he attempted to force an approaching enemy tank to close its ports with rifle fire. Despite his wounds, Private Janicki continued firing on the enemy vehicle until killed by another round of fire from the tank's gun. The disdain for danger, conspicuous courage and commendable conduct displayed by Private Janicki reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Staff Sergeant IRVIN J ROGERS 34516280, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 25 December 1944. When numerically superior enemy forces and intense fire made it necessary for his unit to withdraw to an alternate position, Staff Sergeant Rogers, with complete disregard for his own safety, voluntarily remaining in a position under direct enemy observation and fire, covered his squad's withdrawal so effectively with automatic weapon fire that only one casualty was sustained. Two Germans were killed and several wounded as a result of the action. When he attempted to make

his way to his squad, Staff Sergeant Rogers was killed by enemy machine gun fire. The courageous, unselfish action, loyalty and exemplary conduct displayed by Staff Sergeant Rogers reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from South Carolina.

Private First Class WARREN V PETERS 16057754, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 13 January 1945. When a member of the unit to which he was attached as a medical aid man had been wounded, Private First Class Peters immediately attempted to reach the injured man. Temporarily halted by enemy machine gun fire within five yards of the stricken man, Private First Class Peters made a second attempt when the machine gun ceased firing. A second burst from the enemy machine gun wounded him in the legs, and unable to reach the injured soldier, Private First Class Peters threw him a tube of morphine after which he began to crawl to the rear of his platoon. While making his way to the rear, Private First Class Peters was killed when hit in the back by enemy sniper fire. The conspicuous courage, unselfish, determined spirit and commendable conduct displayed by Private First Class Peters reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Private MURRAY W FEINGOLD 14118554, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 9 January 1945. When the advance of his company was temporarily halted by fire from two emplaced enemy tanks, Private Feingold, together with another soldier, under heavy machine gun and small arms fire, voluntarily crawled within thirty-five yards of one tank and knocked it out with a well placed shot from their rocket launcher. While maneuvering into another position, Private Feingold's companion was wounded by enemy sniper fire. With complete disregard for his own safety, Private Feingold removed the wounded soldier to a place of safety and returned to fire on the second tank. In the act of firing, Private Feingold was killed by an enemy sniper. The cool courage, unselfishness and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private Feingold reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Georgia.

II - AWARD OF SILVER STAR: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class FLOYD B ADAMS 37637828 (then Private), 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 13 January 1945. When the attack of his company through a heavily wooded area was temporarily delayed by heavy enemy small arms fire, Private First Class Adams, making his way to an advantageous position, discovered the heaviest fire to be coming from an enemy dugout. Armed with only his rifle and bayonet, Private First Class Adams, with complete disdain for the danger involved, crawled directly to the dugout and forced the surrender of five enlisted men and one German officer, thereby enabling his company to continue its attack. The courage, initiative, and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private First Class Adams reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Missouri.

While on a combat patrol with three other soldiers behind enemy lines, Staff Sergeant Emmons, observing two enemy tanks firing on his company's position, with complete disregard for his own safety, made his way to a point within fifteen yards of the vehicles and covered his companions who disabled one tank with rocket launcher fire after which the remaining enemy vehicle withdrew. Staff Sergeant Emmons was subsequently killed in action on 24 January 1945. The daring, aggressive action, conspicuous courage and commendable conduct displayed by Staff Sergeant Emmons reflect high credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from New Jersey.

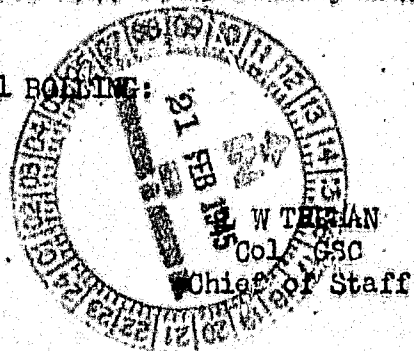

I - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

War Substantive/Corporal WILLIAM N OLLERENSHAW, Personal No. 14425142, 79 Armored Division (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 22 November 1944. As commander of a tank in a group supporting the infantry in an attack on seven pillboxes, three of which had been silenced, Corporal Ollerenshaw, disregarding his own safety, dismounted from his tank in the face of heavy enemy machine gun fire and assisted in freeing his troop commander's tank which had bogged down in heavy mud. His action enabled the attack to continue which resulted in the destruction of the remaining enemy pillboxes. The personal bravery and bold, rapid action on the part of Corporal Ollerenshaw reflect credit on himself and the military service to which he belongs.

Staff Sergeant JULIUS KARAS 36859212 (then Private First Class), 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 22 January 1945. When two Germans emerged from a machine gun position into which he had thrown a hand grenade and one of them was in the act of firing an automatic weapon at other members of his squad, Staff Sergeant Karas, after killing him with his rifle and holding the remaining German at the point of his bayonet, forced the surrender of four additional prisoners from the gun position and an enemy observation post. The initiative, aggressive fighting spirit and courageous conduct displayed by Staff Sergeant Karas reflect high credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

Sergeant WILLIAM J VINCENT Jr 39295318, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 9 January 1945. When the advance of his company was temporarily halted by fire from two emplaced enemy tanks, Sergeant Vincent, together with another soldier, under heavy machine gun and small arms fire, voluntarily crawled within thirty-five yards of one tank and knocked it out with a well placed shot from their rocket launcher. The courageous action and daring initiative displayed by Sergeant Vincent, accounting for one enemy tank and materially aiding the advance of his company, reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service of the United States. Although his aerial was shot away by enemy fire, Technician Fourth Grade Greskiewicz, displaying cool courage and disdain for danger, quickly made the needed repairs and successfully contacted the fire direction center, thereby securing artillery fire which silenced the enemy guns and enabled the platoon to resume its attack and accomplish its mission. The courage, resourcefulness and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Technician Fourth Grade Greskiewicz reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Technician Fourth Grade ROMAN A DIAZ 39262993, 309th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 18 - 19 January 1945. When the advance of his squad was checked during an attack on three enemy machine gun positions, Sergeant Owens, with complete disregard for his own safety, moved forward toward one of the gun positions and, after exhausting his supply of rifle ammunition, delivered such effective fire with an enemy automatic weapon which was nearby that a rocket launcher team was able to get into position and destroy the enemy gun emplacement. In the performance of this brave act, Sergeant Owens lost his life. The cool courage, disdain for danger and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Owens reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Iowa.

Private First Class ROBERT E YOUNG 33669273, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 10 January 1945. When the squad which he was leading in a flanking movement on a German position was subjected to enemy fire, Private First Class Young, after directing his men to cover, proceeded on a personal reconnaissance to determine the source of the enemy fire. In the performance of this act, Private First Class Young was mortally wounded. The unselfish, courageous action, unswerving devotion to duty and commendable conduct displayed by Private First Class Young were in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Technical Sergeant LUTHER J SWEAT 38304013, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 15 December 1944. After personally removing his wounded platoon and squad leaders from an unmarked mine field to an aid station, Technical Sergeant Sweat, assuming command of the disorganized unit, placed his men in defensive positions and personally directed the repulse of an enemy counterattack. Technical Sergeant Sweat was subsequently killed in action on 23 January 1945. The superior leadership, aggressiveness and cool courage displayed by Technical Sergeant Sweat present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Staff Sergeant CHARLES H STRICKLAND 34195485, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 3 January 1945.

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(General Orders 25, Section I, Hq. 84th Inf Div, 12 Feb 45, contd)

When the advance of his platoon was temporarily halted by enemy machine gun fire on the left flank, Staff Sergeant Strickland, with complete disregard for his own safety, crawled 150 yards and succeeded in killing two Germans and disabling the gun with rifle fire and hand grenades. In the performance of this brave act, Staff Sergeant Strickland lost his life. The conspicuous courage, unswerving devotion to duty and disdain for danger displayed by Staff Sergeant Strickland reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Georgia.

II - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant JOHN D CAMPBELL 0537759, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 16 January 1945. When he and several members of a patrol were wounded by point-blank fire while reconnoitering beyond the front lines, Second Lieutenant Campbell, despite the fact that both of his arms were paralyzed, after reorganizing his patrol and issuing detailed instructions, led the wounded men back to friendly lines. He then gave such accurate information concerning the location of the enemy that artillery fire was able to destroy the opposing force quickly. The courage, determined spirit and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Second Lieutenant Campbell contributed materially to the successful operation of two combat teams and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

Second Lieutenant WALTER L STARKS 02000514, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 9 - 11 January 1945. On 9 January 1945, Second Lieutenant Starks led a patrol under cover of darkness to recover the body of one of his squad leaders who had been killed in action the previous day and while so doing, obtained valuable information concerning the enemy. On the following night, Second Lieutenant Starks, despite a blinding snow storm, directed the activities of patrols which protected the operations of engineers who were clearing an enemy roadblock and at the same time secured information which was of value to his unit. Again on 11 January 1945, when a forward platoon had become disorganized, Second Lieutenant Starks moved his platoon into the area and effected the reorganization of the other unit, moving continuously from position to position to direct the action of his men. The initiative, superior performance of duty and disregard for personal safety displayed by Second Lieutenant Starks reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Staff Sergeant NARD L MOSELEY 14172231, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 12 January 1945. When the assault platoon, which he was leading in the absence of an officer, came under intense enemy machine gun and automatic weapons cross fire, Staff Sergeant Moseley skillfully withdrew his men from the trap and turned the unit over to his company commander. Enemy self-propelled weapons then began firing on the unit killing the company commander and inflicting numerous casualties. Staff Sergeant Moseley, though wounded by shrapnel and blinded in one eye, assumed command of the company, evacuated the wounded and successfully led the unit back to friendly lines. The

On 24 November 1944, when the advance of his platoon was temporarily halted by machine gun fire from an enemy pillbox, Private First Class Willey moved forward and placed such effective fire in the apertures of the fortification that his platoon was able to neutralize the position. Again on 13 January 1945, when enemy rifle fire had checked the advance of his company, Private First Class Willey, with complete disregard for his own safety, approached the enemy firing his automatic weapon so effectively that the opposing force withdrew. On both occasions, Private First Class Willey was wounded. The bold, aggressive action, determined spirit and commendable conduct displayed by Private First Class Willey reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Minnesota.

Major GORDON A BAHE 023616, Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 23 - 24 December 1944. During a strong German offensive when it was learned that an enemy heavy weapons company was approaching the town in which his battalion command post was located, Major Bahe skillfully disposed his men in position and, waiting until the opposing force had entered the town, directed such effective fire that the enemy unit was completely annihilated. On the following day, the enemy again launched an attack which was so strong that it was necessary to drive the attacking force from the streets with hand grenades and other close combat weapons. Later when orders were issued for the battalion to withdraw due to a powerfully reinforced enemy attack, Major Bahe skillfully directed the action with a minimum of casualties. The superior leadership, military skill and sound judgment displayed by Major Bahe reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from North Dakota.

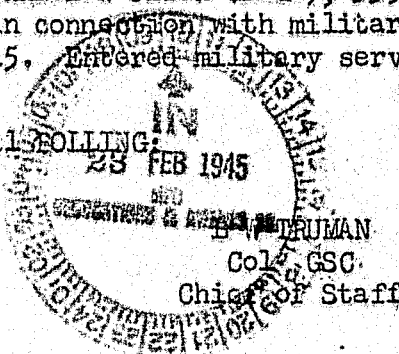
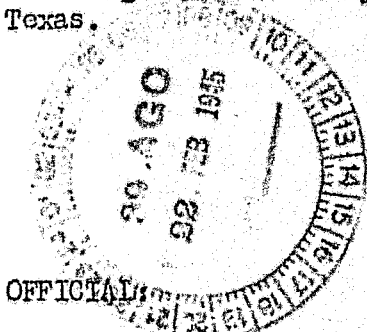

I - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

✓ War Substantive/Captain (Temporary/Major) DENNIS A J PINN, Personal No. 204153, 73 Antitank Regiment, Royal Artillery (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 - 23 November 1944. As commander of an antitank battery protecting the right flank of the division during operations, Major Pinn personally supervised the movement and emplacement of his tank destroyers under all conditions and maintained reconnaissance on the right flank with such success that every threat from that direction was known and countered in advance. His courage and devotion to duty while under heavy mortar and machine gun fire were an inspiration to his own troops and to all American troops who were associated with him.

✓ War Substantive/Lieutenant (Temporary/Captain) JOHN M M WOOD, Personal No. 210522, 86 (Hertfordshire Yeomanry) Field Regiment, Royal Artillery (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 - 23 November 1944. As forward observer for his regiment, Captain Wood was constantly in the forward combat area during which time, by his devotion to duty, he obtained and transmitted much information of value to his regiment and to the 84th Infantry Division. His outstanding judgment and his cool and collected demeanor throughout the period, including an occasion when his vehicle received a direct hit from an enemy mortar, reflect great credit upon himself and upon the military service of his country.

✓ War Substantive/Captain (Temporary/Major) JOAN D SEMKEN, Personal No. 124666, Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 November 1944. As leader of a British tank squadron, Major Semken's superior direction of these supporting elements contributed in a large measure to the success of the entire operation. The military skill and aggressive leadership displayed on this occasion by Major Semken reflect high credit upon himself and the military service of his country.

✓ War Substantive/Lieutenant (Temporary/Captain) (Acting/Major) JOSEPH K HOLMAN, Personal No. 166535, Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 19 November 1944. As leader of a British tank squadron, Major Holman's superior direction of these supporting elements contributed in a large measure to the success of the entire operation. The military skill and aggressive leadership displayed on this occasion by Major Holman reflect high credit upon himself and the military service of his country.

✓ Sergeant J MOFFETT, Personal No. 3500942, Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 - 23 November 1944. Assuming command when his troop leader was wounded during the first day of a six-day engagement with the enemy, Sergeant Moffett displayed exceptional skill and courage throughout the entire action. His troop was one of the first to go through a gap made by a breaching party and, despite enemy antitank and rocket launcher fire, he immediately advanced against enemy pillboxes which were delaying infantry troops. The disregard for personal safety and soldierly conduct of Sergeant Moffett exemplify the highest traditions of the military service of his country.

✓ Corporal W FOLLARD, Personal No. 7947929, Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 18 - 23 November 1944. As tank commander in a group supporting an infantry attack, he displayed courage and initiative of a high order throughout the entire period, personally accounting for the destruction of two Tiger tanks and always being found where the fighting was fiercest. His aggressive, dauntless spirit and exemplary leadership reflect high credit on himself and the military service of his country.

✓ War Substantive/Lieutenant (Acting/Captain) ELLIS SHAW, Personal No. 224584, 79 Armored Division (British), (Attached 84th Infantry Division). For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 20 November 1944. When an infantry combat team which his unit was supporting was temporarily checked by enemy fire from a pillbox, Lieutenant Shaw led his troop in an attack which destroyed the fortification. He then directed fire on an additional four pillboxes which were a threat to the advancing infantry, forcing the occupants to evacuate and killing a number of the enemy. The bravery, skill and aggressive action with which Lieutenant Shaw conducted the operation was of material assistance to the advance of the infantry troops and reflect credit on himself and the military service of his country.

Second Lieutenant GEORGE B BROWNING 0547366, Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 4 January 1945. When a platoon leader was wounded during a withdrawal of his company under intense enemy artillery and mortar fire, Second Lieutenant Browning assumed command and, after reorganizing the unit, led the platoon in a valiant effort to regain the lost positions. In the performance of this courageous act, Second Lieutenant Browning lost his life. The tenacious, determined spirit, unswerving devotion to duty and commendable conduct displayed by Second Lieutenant Browning reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from South Carolina.

Private First Class ARCHIE FAREWELL 39405422, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 7 January 1945. When the advance of an armored unit and an infantry company was halted by machine gun and small arms fire, Private First Class Farewell, moving forward to a position within forty yards of the enemy, successfully directed such effective fire from friendly tanks and riflemen that the enemy was routed and the company objective attained. In the performance of this brave act, Private First Class Farewell lost his life. The disdain for danger, conspicuous courage and commendable conduct displayed by Private First Class Farewell present an excellent example of those soldierly qualities which are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from California.

II - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant JAMES N PENLAND 01296574, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 12 - 15 January 1945. Reorganizing his company after it had temporarily withdrawn due to a heavy barrage of enemy artillery, mortar and machine gun fire, First Lieutenant Penland led his men in the capture of six machine gun positions after guiding eleven tanks to an area where effective fire could be placed on enemy entrenched positions. On the morning of the following day, First Lieutenant Penland led his men through heavy machine gun and small arms fire to capture a Belgian town and later that day, he led his unit while assisting another company in breaking up a road block which

was delaying a tank company. Later he led his company in assisting another infantry company in an attack on a Belgian town and was responsible for the capture of four German officers and 93 enlisted men. Entered military service from North Carolina.

Technician Fifth Grade HERMAN J SMALLING 39404788, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 25 - 30 December 1944. When an enemy force attacked the observation post in which he was operating a radio, Technician Fifth Grade Smalling destroyed his radio and then covered the withdrawal of the observation team with rifle fire. Captured by the enemy, Technician Fifth Grade Smalling escaped the following day during a bombing attack. He then remained in hostile territory for three days observing enemy activity and escaped under cover of darkness with highly important information concerning enemy positions, strength, location of supply dumps and the effectiveness of friendly artillery fire. The initiative, courage and superior performance of duty displayed by Technician Fifth Grade Smalling reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from California.

Private First Class FREDERICK E PATTERSON 36842531, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 26 - 30 December 1944. Captured by the enemy while attempting to locate a reconnaissance party, Private First Class Patterson escaped the following day during a bombing attack. Remaining in enemy territory for three days, he succeeded in making his way back to friendly lines under cover of darkness with highly important information concerning enemy positions, strength, location of supply dumps and effectiveness of friendly artillery fire. The initiative, courage and superior performance of duty displayed by Private First Class Patterson reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

Private RALPH M ROGER 12006454, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 7 January 1945. When fire from an enemy machine gun temporarily halted the advance of his company, Private Roger continued to advance to a position within twenty-five yards of the enemy gun and, though handicapped by a radio strapped to his back, placed accurate fire upon the enemy until his ammunition was exhausted. Wounded by enemy fire, Private Roger then picked up an abandoned rifle and renewed his fire upon the hostile emplacement, accounting for two, or possibly three of the enemy. When an aid man approached to administer to his severe chest and leg wounds, Private Roger, aware of the exposed and hazardous position in which he was lying, refused the proffered aid. The cool courage, daring and unselfish devotion to duty displayed by Private Roger aided materially in the success of his company's operations and are in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

Second Lieutenant LEE R FILGRIM 02000515 (then Technical Sergeant), Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. When the advance of his platoon was temporarily halted during an attack due to constant fire from an enemy strong point, Second Lieutenant Filgrim, together with two enlisted men, approached the flank of the fortification and, firing a machine gun, succeeded in taking the position, killing approximately 18 Germans and capturing 52. Following this action, Second

Lieutenant Pilgrim killed two additional Germans who were attempting to retreat in the face of his platoon's advance. The bold, aggressive action, initiative and conspicuous courage displayed by Second Lieutenant Pilgrim contributed materially to the success of his unit's operation and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from California.

Private First Class ROGER J KELLY 37572629, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. When the advance of his platoon was temporarily halted during an attack due to constant automatic weapons and small arms fire from an enemy strong point, Private First Class Kelly, together with two other soldiers, left his position of comparative safety and, by use of a machine gun, succeeded in taking the fortification, killing approximately 18 Germans and capturing 52. He then administered medical aid to one of his fellow soldiers who had been wounded in the action. The bold aggressive action, initiative and conspicuous courage displayed by Private First Class Kelly enabled his unit to continue its advance and reflect the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Minnesota.

III - AWARDS OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUS): By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 74, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Staff Sergeant ESSA L ARD 7080709, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Belgium, 12 January 1945. During an attack on a German-held town, Staff Sergeant Ard, by placing his mortar beyond the front line where he could observe the targets, gave effective support to the advancing platoons. During an attack by his battalion on two Belgian towns, Second Lieutenant Anderson, with complete disregard for enemy artillery and small arms fire, by his selection of advantageous positions for his machine guns, contributed materially to the advance of his unit. On one occasion when enemy fire had temporarily halted the movement of his section, Second Lieutenant Anderson, moving forward alone, killed two Germans and returned with sixteen others as prisoners. The initiative, courage and superior leadership displayed by Second Lieutenant Anderson reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUS): By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Private First Class LIVELY E NUNN 35690212, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 24 December 1944. During a strong enemy counterattack, Private First Class Nunn, completely disregarding his own safety, attempted to close the apertures of a hostile tank by firing his rifle at the open ports. In the performance of this brave act, Private First Class Nunn was killed by a direct hit. The conspicuous courage, tenacious fighting spirit and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Private First Class Nunn reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Kentucky.

II - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President and under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Lieutenant Colonel THOMAS W WOODYARD jr 019826, Infantry, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 19 November 1944. During an attack on a German-held town, Lieutenant Colonel Woodyard, with complete disregard for his own safety under heavy enemy artillery fire, displaying skill, courage and aggressiveness, personally led his men in the successful accomplishment of the battalion's mission with minimum casualties. Though seriously wounded by an enemy hand grenade in the action, Lieutenant Colonel Woodyard refused evacuation until he had assured himself that all casualties had been treated and his junior officers thoroughly informed of the tactical situation. The superior leadership, disdain for danger and tenacious fighting spirit exhibited by Lieutenant Colonel Woodyard reflect the highest credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Kentucky.

Captain BARRETT C MILLS 0405108, Infantry, 771st Tank Battalion (Attached 34th Infantry Division), United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany and Belgium, 2 December 1944 to 27 January 1945. On 2 December 1944, when a town in Germany had held out for two days during an attack, Captain Mills personally led his tanks ahead of the infantry in a fierce assault on the town, delivering such devastating fire that enemy positions were completely overrun, approximately 200 Germans killed and an equal number captured. Later in Belgium,

when the enemy had launched a strong offensive, Captain Mills, frequently exposing himself to enemy fire, made numerous personal reconnaissances to select advantageous tank positions from which to repel enemy attacks. The disdain for danger, superior performance of duty and aggressive action displayed by Captain Mills reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Florida.

— Second Lieutenant JEAN CHOVEL jr 0545165, Infantry, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 3 January 1945. Though seriously wounded in the head while leading his platoon in an attack, Second Lieutenant Chovel, with complete disregard for his own safety, refused medical treatment and continued to direct the attack until the objective had been attained before submitting to evacuation. The conspicuous courage, tenacious fighting spirit and unswerving devotion to duty displayed by Second Lieutenant Chovel reflect high credit upon himself and are in accordance with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

— Technical Sergeant RICHARD H BONNEY 11122348 (then Sergeant), 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 29 November 1944. After his squad of seven men had killed or wounded fifteen Germans when it was cut off from other units, Technical Sergeant Bonney, evacuating two wounded men with him, withdrew his squad to a nearby house only to find the enemy on all sides. By skillfully deploying his men, Technical Sergeant Bonney successfully directed a defense during which an additional twelve Germans were killed. He then made his way under enemy machine gun and small arms fire to a friendly unit where he secured aid for one of his men who was seriously wounded and brought relief for his men. During the encounter, Technical Sergeant Bonney, who personally killed seven of the enemy, displayed cool courage, superior leadership and unswerving devotion to duty in a manner which reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Maine.

— Sergeant DONALD S PHELPS 42023292, 333d Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 24 December 1944. Encountering an enemy armored unit as he was guiding an infantry company to a position prior to the launching of an attack, Sergeant Phelps, after inflicting casualties when he rired into the leading vehicle, secured a rocket launcher and seriously damaged the leading tank. The company then withdrew due to the size of the armored column and artillery fire was placed so effectively on the unit that its advance was halted. The bold, rapid action, aggressiveness and courage displayed by Sergeant Phelps prevented his company from being ambushed and reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.
