I - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUS): By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-47, as amended, and Circular 21, Headquarters Seventh Army, 17 June 1945, the Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Staff Sergeant CHARLES A. STREBEL 2033712, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 23 December 1944. When an enemy artillery concentration upon his company's positions threatened the safety of the unit's personnel, Staff Sergeant Strobel, disdaining the danger while exposing himself to the barrage, made his way from house to house to warn comrades to seek proper shelter. During this action, Staff Sergeant Strobel was instantly killed when struck by shell fragments. The unselfish, courageous action, initiative and superior performance of duty displayed by Staff Sergeant Strobel reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

Private First Class ADOLPH J. NEGRI 39034667, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 20 November 1944. When enemy machine gun fire delayed the advance of his company on a German town, Private First Class Negri, moving forward aggressively with his light machine gun, assaulted the enemy position alone in an effort to enable the advance to continue. He lost his life in this action when fire from several enemy positions was directed upon him. The intrepid action, initiative and bravery displayed by Private First Class Negri reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from California.

II - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-47, as amended, and Circular 21, Headquarters Seventh Army, 17 June 1945, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class ANDREW C. CUNNINGHAM 33632164, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Belgium, 20 December 1944. When his squad encountered an enemy armored force during an attack on the flank positions of his company, Private First Class Cunningham, though seriously wounded in one eye and suffering from shrapnel particles of an exploded mine in the other, maintained his position and engaged the enemy in a fire fight until the hostile force diverted its attack from the original direction. Only then did Private First Class Cunningham seek medical attention. The intrepid action,大胆 for danger and superior performance of duty displayed by Private First Class Cunningham reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

Private First Class ROBERT O. WOOD 34440923, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 20 November 1944. When an enemy armored force attacked his unit while it was in route to a bridge, Private First Class Wood, exposing himself to enemy fire, ran across the route of no. 100, shooting out the leading tanks and driving his unit into a mine field. He then occupied the lead tank and continued to drive it forward, despite the fact that the lead member of his squad was wounded. Dismounted he continued to drive the tank forward, exposing himself to enemy fire. Private First Class Wood remained at his position until the end of the battle. The intrepid action, superior performance of duty displayed by Private First Class Wood reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

First Lieutenant GLENN L VAN OCKER 01311235, Infantry, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 13 December 1944. Entered military service from Michigan.

Technical Sergeant BERNARD S FETED 6705095, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 1 March 1945. Entered military service from New York.

Staff Sergeant MICHAEL J SKIBICH 37555945, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 15 December 1944. Entered military service from Minnesota.

Staff Sergeant WILLIAM G THOMPSON 38297251, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in Germany, 19 December 1944. Entered military service from Arkansas.

When the clothing of a companion was set ablaze as the result of an accidental explosion which ignited the carburetor of a vehicle while adjustments were being made, Private First Class Rule, quickly subduing the stricken soldier, who was running aimlessly about, smothered the flames with a blanket to prevent serious burns being inflicted upon his comrade. The spontaneous, courageous action displayed by Private First Class Rule reflects high credit upon himself and the military service from Georgia.

I - AWARD OF SILVER STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUS): By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 21, Headquarters Seventh Army, 17 June 1945, the Silver Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Private First Class JOHN H HERRMANN 32994243, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 24 and 27 February 1945. On 24 February, when it was learned that an enemy armored assault was being prepared on his unit's positions, Private First Class Herrmann voluntarily made his way over routes exposed to intense mortar and artillery fire to alert the members of his platoon. On 27 February, while manning an antitank gun, Private First Class Herrmann maintained his position during a bitter engagement with enemy forces until he was fatally wounded later in the day. The courage, initiative and superior performance of duty displayed by Private First Class Herrmann reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from New York.

II - AWARDS OF SILVER STAR MEDAL: By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, and Circular 21, Headquarters Seventh Army, 17 June 1945, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant GEORGE H PROCTOR 02047115, Medical Administrative Corps, 335th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 5 April 1945. Daringly working under direct enemy fire and observation in an effort to extricate two injured men from a disabled and flaming reconnaissance vehicle, First Lieutenant Proctor, with an enlisted man, disregarded his personal safety and managed to free one of the two stricken soldiers. When a third enemy shell struck the vehicle killing the man which they were attempting to evacuate, First Lieutenant Proctor also suffered light wounds, but continued this unselfish action until, with his companion, he succeeded in removing the second wounded man and carrying him 100 yards to safety. The intrepidity, initiative and utter disdain for danger displayed by First Lieutenant Proctor reflect high credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. The intrepidity, aggressiveness and superior performance of duty displayed by First Lieutenant Gunn reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

When intense enemy fire threatened to delay a regimental assault on a German town, Lieutenant Colonel Lampkin, with complete disregard for his personal safety, made his way to a foremost vantage point from where he was able to prepare a strategy which enabled one battalion to capture its assigned objective and make possible the subsequent success of the regimental operation. The aggressiveness, courage and initiative displayed by Lieutenant Colonel Lampkin reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Illinois.

✓ First Lieutenant FRANK C PAUL 01326167, Infantry, 334th Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany, 30 November 1944. Going forward over unfamiliar terrain to reconnoiter positions used by his battalion in an attack the following morning, First Lieutenant Paul skillfully moved through three enemy outposts to accomplish his mission. 

Serving as a scout for a rifle company when fired upon by enemy snipers and machine gun positions, Private First Class Ludwig, disregarding his personal safety and directing the other members of his squad to seek cover, advanced alone upon the hostile positions. Assaulting a barn with grenades, he killed six Germans and captured as many more. He then attacked an entrenchment, capturing eight additional prisoners, after which he continued his aggressive action in clearing the area of remaining enemy personnel. The dauntless courage, bold action and outstanding performance beyond the call of duty displayed by Private First Class Ludwig reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.

When the advance of his unit was delayed by an enemy machine gun, First Lieutenant Masters, disdaining the danger about him, assaulted the hostile positions and, when he was within 15 yards of the gun, delivered accurate fire which killed the enemy gunner. This aggressive action enabled the attack of his company to continue and resulted in the subsequent capture of over 80 prisoners. The intrepidity, initiative and superior performance of duty displayed by First Lieutenant Masters reflect high credit upon himself and the military service. Entered military service from Wyoming.

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



Many times under enemy observation and at the risk of encountering hostile patrols, he serviced lines far in advance of the front lines. During periods of intense enemy artillery and mortar fire he kept communications open, notwithstanding the danger to his own personal safety. Entered the military service from Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

WILLIAM A. HUGHES, (37182906), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "K", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 5 May 1944, in ~~Russia~~. After his patrol was ambushed and the officer in charge captured, the remainder of the platoon withdrew, leaving him alone. He remained in his position throughout the night, observing enemy gun positions, and returned, under enemy observation, to his own unit the following morning with valuable information. Entered the military service from Cuba, Missouri.

WILLIAM T. HALEY, (33092847), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. When a patrol of which the above enlisted men were members was ambushed by the enemy, they assisted in the evacuation of the wounded men up 600 yards of sloping terrain which was being subjected to heavy enemy fire. Their high regard for the welfare of their wounded men is in keeping with the high traditions of the military service.

AWARD OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men:

ROBERT A. KING, (0406372), Captain, Infantry, Company "A", 328th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action during the period 11 May to 27 May 1944, in Italy. During offensive operations against the enemy Captain King led his company in an attack on an enemy held hill. Despite bitter opposition he succeeded in capturing his objective. Reorganizing his company, together with elements of adjoining companies, he continued the advance on hostile positions. Finding further advance blocked by an enemy machine gun nest he personally led an attacking party to destroy it. Despite heavy machine gun, mortar, and artillery fire, the mission was accomplished, three German soldiers being killed and seventeen being taken prisoner. Captain King's aggressive leadership was an inspiration to his command and exemplified the high traditions of the American Infantry. Entered the military service from Abbeville, South Carolina.

FRED J. THIELE, (36644877), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "P", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action during the period 11 May to 15 May 1944, in Italy. In the lead of an assault platoon at the start of an attack, Technical Sergeant, (then Private First Class), Thiele, lent valuable assistance in the reduction of an enemy pill box impeding the attacking force, personally capturing seven prisoners. Placed in charge of his platoon he personally made reconnaissances in advance of his men into territory known to have been occupied by the enemy. Advancing on a town in the face of bitter resistance his platoon was assigned the mission of clearing an entrance into the city. Through his leadership and initiative the mission was accomplished, two enemy pill boxes were knocked out, fourteen prisoners taken and further casualties inflicted, without loss to the platoon. His courage, initiative, and proven ability to lead men in combat were of invaluable assistance to his organization and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

IRVIN E. STORER, (33018682), Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "C", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Brookville, Pennsylvania.

LAWRENCE R. BOHLMER, (37273317), Technician Fourth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "C", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Good Thunder, Minnesota.

For gallantry in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. Following a successful attack on enemy positions, resulting in a hurried withdrawal by the hostile forces, the above enlisted men operated an unarmored bulldozer in clearing a by-pass through enemy minefields. Despite enemy artillery fire directed upon them and exploding mines they continued their hazardous task until the machine had been disabled and one of the men thrown to the ground by exploding mines. Their determination to accomplish their mission in the face of enemy resistance was of great value to pursuing forces and reflects the highest credit upon themselves and the military service.

*THOMAS MITCHELL, (12065473), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "E", 336th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack on an enemy held hill Private First Class Mitchell's group was halted by heavy machine gun fire from an enemy pill box. Headless of the danger to himself, Private First Class Mitchell advanced upon the enemy emplacement under heavy fire and routed the enemy squad, killing two and capturing nine German soldiers. His courageous action in engaging superior forces inspired his comrades and reflects the highest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from New York City.

WILLIAM L. HIGGIN, (35914536), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action over the period 14 May to 26 May 1944, in Italy. As radio operator at a battalion command post, Private First Class Higgin accompanied his battalion commander throughout a period of continuous and violent action. Many times they came under heavy machine gun and mortar fire and at times, when radio communication was interrupted by terrain features, he exposed himself to further enemy action in moving to higher ground so that communication would be maintained. His devotion to duty and determination to carry out his assignments at the risk of life were of material aid to his battalion and reflect the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Lakewood, Ohio.

HOWARD BAUM, (83337795), Private, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack on enemy positions Private Baum boldly and aggressively sought to engage the enemy. Despite bitter enemy opposition he succeeded in killing eight German soldiers and although at times under enemy sniper, machine gun, and mortar fire, he assisted in the capture of large numbers of prisoners. His determination to close with and destroy the enemy without regard for his own personal safety was of inestimable value to his company in the taking of the position and reflect the finest traditions of the American Soldier. Entered the military service from Downingtown, Pennsylvania.

Manning an observation post in the front of his battalion position and under direct observation and heavy fire of enemy troops, Lieutenant Pedigo maintained his position despite repeated attempts by enemy patrols to destroy it. His determination to carry out his hazardous task under intense hostile fire materially aided the advance of the troops in his sector. Entered the military service from Cleveland, North Carolina.

JAMES E. WILLIS, (01114807), Second Lieutenant, Corps of Engineers, Company "A", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 19 April 1944, in Italy. When a member of a mine detecting party, operating within 200 yards of enemy positions, was unknowingly about to set off a booby trap, Lieutenant Willis halted him, and working in the dark, guided solely by touch, succeeded in neutralizing the threat to the safety of the patrol. His action prevented possible disaster and betrayal of their presence, enabling the patrol to continue on its mission. Entered the military service from Rialto, California.

FRANCIS H. TREMPER, (32578755), Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 329th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Margaretville, New York.

CLIFFORD A CZERNIEJEWSKI, (36242084), Private First Class, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 329th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Town of Lake, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

REGINALD L. BEMIS, (20152180), Staff Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, Headquarters and Service Company, 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in support of combat operations during the period 11 May to 28 May 1944, in Italy. Staff Sergeant Bemis capably executed the duties of his intelligence officer at a time when the latter's services were unobtainable. Without regard for his own life, he performed his duties as communications sergeant to the highest expectations of his organization. Entered the military service from Bastrop, Texas.

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ERNEST V. CASPER, JR., (18030743), Staff Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. While working with a party in an enemy minefield, Staff Sergeant Casper was wounded, his officer killed, and other members injured by exploding mines. Despite his wounds he assisted in the treatment and evacuation of the wounded men and completed the mission of the party. Entered the military service from Troup, Texas.

RAYBON L. EPLEY, (35479618), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 23 May 1944, in Italy. Coming unexpectedly upon an enemy outpost consisting of approximately twenty-five soldiers, Sergeant Epley, by the use of rifle grenades, succeeded in routing them from their position and enabling his platoon to advance to firing positions. He continued firing in the face of intense enemy opposition, causing confusion and disorder in the enemy ranks and making it possible for the platoon to inflict heavy casualties on the hostile force. Entered the military service from Louisville, Kentucky.

MICHAEL T. KRAUS, (35307211), Corporal, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 910th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 9 May 1944, in Italy. When enemy artillery set fire to a trailer loaded with ammunition, Corporal Kraus risked serious injury or death to remove a vehicle within twenty feet of the exploding projectiles. JOHN P. BRAND, (37276795), Technician Third Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 328th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Wahpeton, North Dakota.

AWARD, POSTHUMOUSLY, OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to the following named enlisted men:

CECIL F. STEWARD, (37202084), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Finding two members of his company lying mortally wounded before an enemy pill box, Staff Sergeant Steward organized a volunteer group to destroy the emplacement and rescue the wounded men. Although he was killed in the unsuccessful attempt, his endeavor to aid his comrades at the cost of his own life was an inspiration to the other members of the group. His display of courage and aggressive determination to destroy the enemy reflect the finest traditions of the Armed Forces. Entered the military service from Cedarvale, Kansas. Next of kin: Mr. Rush E. Steward, (Father), Cedarvale, Kansas.

VERNON C. WILSON, (37182650), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During a night attack against strong enemy positions, Staff Sergeant Wilson and two other soldiers, without regard for their own personal safety, attacked and destroyed an enemy machine gun nest, killing three enemy soldiers. His action at the risk of his life was of material value to his company in the accomplishment of its mission. Staff Sergeant Wilson's aggressiveness and display of courage under heavy enemy fire reflect the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Stedward, Missouri. Next of kin: Mrs. Rose L. Wilson, (Mother), Essex, Missouri.

PAUL MANNING, JR., (18073928), Private First Class, Infantry, Antitank Company, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 17 April 1944, in Italy. While working with a detail engaged in clearing a path through an enemy minefield, Private First Class Manning accidentally fired the igniter while neutralizing an anti-personnel mine. Knowing full well the result of his actions, he made no attempt to take cover, but bent over the exploding mine, catching the full force of the explosion with his body. His outstanding courage and willingness to sacrifice his life to prevent injury or death to other members of the party reflect the highest traditions of the military service. (Entered the military service from Dallas Texas. Next of kin: Mrs. Paul Manning Jr., (Wife), 214 East Fifth Street, Dallas, Texas.)

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men:

EDWARD R. RICHARDS, (01302350), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "B", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. After leading his platoon to a new position under heavy enemy fire, without suffering a casualty, First Lieutenant Richards, disregarding his own personal safety, went out to an exposed position to remove a wounded soldier to safety. In the absence of an aid man, he rendered first aid and assisted in the evacuation of the man. His outstanding courage under fire and risk of life to aid the wounded reflects the finest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Atlantic City, New Jersey.

RICHARD J. CONNERS, (01310225), Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "F", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. Advancing under heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire over 300 yards of terrain known to be mined and under direct observation by the enemy, Second Lieutenant Connors, with the assistance of an enlisted man, succeeded in driving the enemy out of a house from which they had been holding up the advance with machine guns and automatic weapons. His action in the face of enemy machine gun and sniper fire gained ground vital to the safety of two companies and inspired the other members of the platoon to continue their advance. Lieutenant Connors' aggressiveness and determination to destroy the enemy without regard for his own personal safety reflect the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Marblehead, Massachusetts.

CHARLES R. WISOR, (33019777), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack on enemy positions, Technical Sergeant Wisor, although twice wounded by enemy grenade and mortar fragments, continued to maintain command of his platoon and keep it in position. His actions instilled confidence in the members of the platoon and inspired them to press on to the completion of their mission. His outstanding courage and determination to carry the attack, after being wounded, reflect the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Johnstown, Pennsylvania.

WILLARD L. HILL, (38151882), Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "A", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 23 May 1944, in Italy. During a tank attack on the enemy, Technician Fifth Grade Hill, operating an unarmored bulldozer ahead of the tanks, cleared a road under heavy machine gun and mortar fire, enabling the tanks to advance. Unable to withdraw the bulldozer due to the intense enemy fire, he drove into a protected area behind a hill and sought cover for himself until rescued by the tanks. His outstanding courage under intense enemy

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fire is in keeping with the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Oconomowoc, Wisconsin.

WILLIAM HODGE, (33266633), Corporal, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

RUSSELL CASSADY, (35641593), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Inez, Kentucky.

For gallantry in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During a night attack against strong enemy positions, Corporal Hodge and Private First Class Cassady, without regard for their own personal safety, attacked and destroyed an enemy machine gun nest, killing three enemy soldiers. Their action at the risk of their lives was of material value to their company in the successful accomplishment of its mission. The aggressiveness and display of courage under heavy enemy fire shown by these men reflect the high traditions of the military service.

While working in an enemy mine field, within 500 yards of the enemy lines, a member of the detail led by First Lieutenant Hobbs was killed and another injured. Realizing the effect of the action upon its members, he kept them organized and continued the work until he himself was killed by an exploding mine. His display of courage was an inspiration to the remainder of the group and all who witnessed the act. Entered the military service from Greenwood, Mississippi. Next of kin: Mrs. Bertha A. Hobbs, (Mother), Greenwood, Mississippi.

ARTHUR H. DAVIS, (34205376), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. With his squad pinned down by heavy enemy small arms and grenade fire, and suffering casualties, Staff Sergeant Davis, although suffering from wounds himself, continued to command his squad and to render first aid to the wounded. Through his unselfish zeal, devotion to duty, and untiring efforts, Brigadier General Gerow proved an example to all personnel of the Division and has brought deserved credit upon himself and the entire military service. PIERIS MALLETT, (08314), Brigadier General, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat. The careful planning, coordination and supervision of fire control exercised by him resulted in outstanding artillery support being given the Division. Lieutenant Colonel Brady, as Commanding Officer of the 339th Infantry, inspired his command by his ceaseless efforts to push against the enemy. As a result, his Regiment made an enviable record by its aggressive and relentless advance against the opposition. His sound tactical employment and use of his command is a credit to the military profession. Entered the United States Military Academy from New Jersey.

* HERMAN W. OHME, (018250), Lieutenant Colonel, General Staff Corps, Headquarters, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat from 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, Lieutenant Colonel Ohme made detailed plans and recommendations for both the initial tactical employment of the Division in combat and for the operations opening 11 May. By devoting himself to the development of the tactical plan without regard for hours of duty, he was able to lend most valuable assistance to the success of the operation. Entered the United States Military Academy from Georgia.

Entered the United States Military Academy from United States Army.

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✓ JOSEPH E. GUILLY, (0337910), Lieutenant Colonel, Signal Corps, Headquarters, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat from 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Division Signal Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Guill was initially called upon to provide a greatly enlarged signal service to support the tactical operations. Upon the advance of 11 May he was required to support a rapid advance over the most difficult terrain. The successful manner in which he constructed and maintained signal communications was of material assistance in the timely employment of units in the operations. Entered the military service from Greensboro, North Carolina.

✓ JOHN D. COLE, JR., (019749), Lieutenant Colonel, Corps of Engineers, Headquarters, 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat from 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Division Engineer and Commanding Officer, 310th Engineer Battalion, Lieutenant Colonel Cole supported the Division effort over the most difficult mountainous terrain. His successful reduction of enemy obstacles, and the constant and untiring supervision of the work of his Battalion on the entire front were a determining factor in the successful movement of troops and supplies. MARTIN L. ROTH, (0282925), Major, Corps of Military Police, Headquarters, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat from 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Division Provost Marshal, Major Roth was confronted with the necessity of establishing a Prisoner of War system without adequate knowledge of the probable number of prisoners. Problems of traffic control were magnified by the limited road net available. When the Division started a rapid advance and the flow of prisoners and traffic problems increased beyond expectations, Major Roth was prepared to put into execution plans to successfully support the attack. Entered the military service from Cape Girardeau, Missouri.

RICHARD L. GULLIXSON, (0452044), Captain, Infantry, Company "C", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense action against the enemy, which left his company in a precarious position, Captain Gullixson, in complete disregard for his own personal safety, succeeded in reorganizing his command, reconnoitering a route of withdrawal, and supervising a successful occupation of new positions. Although painfully wounded in the performance of his mission, he persisted in continuing until the action was completed. Entered the military service from Portland, Oregon.

JESSE C. LAWRENCE, (0461622), Captain, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. When informed that a seriously wounded soldier lay in a mine field and that three litter bearers had already been killed by mines in attempting to get to him, Captain Lawrence, without regard for his own personal safety, went out into the mine field to render first aid and direct evacuation of the wounded soldier. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

HARRY EISSLER, JR., (0456513), First Lieutenant, Corps of Engineers, Company "A", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 27 May 1944, in Italy. First Lieutenant Eisler led his platoon in the reduction of a difficult road block and in the construction of an important bridge, at both times working under heavy enemy fire. His devotion to duty in the face of enemy resistance was of material aid to the rapid advance of the Division. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

✓ CLEMENS M. HANKES, (01317785), Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "B", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack against the enemy Second Lieutenant Hankes led his platoon over exposed terrain, under heavy enemy fire, without a casualty. Then, taking temporary command of a platoon which had lost its leaders in an enemy mine field, he successfully led them in the completion of their mission. Entered the military service from Beaver Dam, Wisconsin.

✓ ALBERT J. KRASMAN, (33275261), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. When his platoon was subjected to heavy enemy artillery and machine gun fire, Technical Sergeant Krasman, without regard for his own safety, reorganized the platoon and rendered first aid to the wounded. His courage under fire was an inspiration to the platoon and kept it together during the attack. Entered the military service from Duquesne, Pennsylvania.

✓ VADRON G. STEVENS, (34275412), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. When the platoon of which he was platoon sergeant came under enemy mortar fire and was ordered to dig in, Technical Sergeant Stevens braved further enemy fire to dig a slit trench for a wounded member of the platoon before digging his own. His courage under fire in protecting the wounded soldier from further danger reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Kosciusko, Mississippi.

✓ FRANK J. KESSLER, (33231977), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. In the absence of the platoon leader and platoon sergeant, Staff Sergeant Kessler, although suffering from shock and despite an opportunity to withdraw, remained with the platoon and reorganized it under heavy artillery and machine gun fire. Entered the military service from Tower City, Pennsylvania.

✓ ROY J. NUNNERY, (34388182), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. Staff Sergeant Nunnery, a platoon guide, exposed himself to heavy enemy machine gun and artillery fire in order to restore communications lines between the platoon and the company command post during a critical period. His risk of life to insure communications was of material aid in the accomplishment of the platoon mission. Entered the military service from Great Falls, South Carolina.

✓ JOSEPH E. YANSKY, (33266787), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat on 9 May 1944, in Italy. During a period when heavy hostile fire was being directed upon the company position, Sergeant Yansky repeatedly exposed himself to enemy fire to maintain communications between his platoon and the company command post. Entered the military service from Leechburg, Pennsylvania.

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JOE K. WRIGHT, (39301718), Technician Fourth Grade, Infantry (Armored Force), Company "B", 756th Tank Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. When the tank of which he was the driver was penetrated through the turret by direct enemy fire during a river crossing, killing the loader and seriously wounding the tank commander and gunner, Technician Fourth Grade Wright, with no one left to observe and direct the movement of the tank, opened the driver's hatch and exposed himself to further anti-tank fire in order to drive the tank from the field of fire to where his wounded comrades could be evacuated. Entered the military service from Dufur, Oregon.

HARLEY ANDERSON, (39305046), Technician Fourth Grade, Infantry (Armored Force), Company "D", 756th Tank Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 16 May 1944, in Italy. When infantry and tanks began to retire from an untenable position, a disabled tank was left exposed to artillery and small arms fire in close proximity to the enemy. Although his company had been given orders to withdraw, technician Fourth Grade Anderson voluntarily went forward on foot, without regard to the danger to which he subjected himself, and retrieved the radio, preventing the compromise of Battalion communications and loss of valuable equipment. Entered the military service from Yamhill, Oregon.

KAI EGEBERG, (36338555), Corporal, Infantry, Company "D", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat on 12 May 1944, in Italy. Many times when communications were essential to the success of the attack, Corporal Egeberg, disregarding his own personal safety, went out under heavy enemy fire to repair lines which had been damaged by enemy action. Voluntarily performing duties other than those regularly assigned to him, he accomplished them in a highly successful manner, materially aiding his company in successfully completing its combat mission. Entered the military service from Maywood, Illinois.

ROBERT SLAWSON, (32340421), Corporal, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 2 May 1944, in Italy. When the forward observation post, of which he was the senior non-commissioned officer in charge, received a direct hit by an enemy artillery shell, Corporal Slawson, only after receiving permission from the Battalion Command Post to withdraw, instructed the group in how to return through mine fields to their organization. Then, despite the fact that the building received another direct hit, and without regard for his own safety, remained to dismount and collect equipment before withdrawing. Entered the military service from Sloansburg, New York.

JAMES F. BLANTON, (34591625), Private, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During a night attack against the enemy, Private Blanton, although seriously wounded himself, crawled over terrain being subjected to artillery and mortar fire to render first aid to two wounded comrades. His unselish action in seeking to assist his fellow soldiers reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Shelby, North Carolina.

✓ JOHN J. BUNDAS, (33299632), Private, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. When informed by a returning member of a squad, which had been caught by enemy artillery fire, that the squad leader had been wounded, Private Bundas proceeded under heavy enemy fire over exposed terrain to render first aid and evacuate him to safety. His disregard for his own personal safety to aid the wounded soldier reflects credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Warren, Pennsylvania.

✓ VINCENT R. PRONIO, (32929042), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 29 April 1944, in Italy. When a soldier was wounded while repairing a broken communications line under enemy artillery fire, Private Pronio, disregarding his own safety, went out to administer first aid. After an unsuccessful attempt to move him, he secured help and evacuated him to a place of safety. Entered the military service from Brunswick, New Jersey.

✓ JOSEPH MARADIN, (33267182), Sergeant, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 329th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

✓ HARRY E. FEHL, (33400504), Corporal, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 329th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Wilkensburg, Pennsylvania.

For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 26 May 1944, in Italy. As members of a two-man artillery liaison party attached to an infantry unit they consistently showed disregard for their own personal safety, and through courage, resourcefulness, and initiative, they maintained effective liaison between Artillery and Infantry, under heavy enemy shelling, mortar fire, and bombing attacks.

✓ WILBUR KIMBLE, (37201895), Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Liberal, Kansas.

✓ JOHN K. BRITTON, (38147422), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Kokomo, Indiana.

✓ BOYD A. WEST, (35741406), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Weston, West Virginia.

For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of heavy combat with the enemy in which the company to which they were attached as aid men suffered severe casualties, Technician Fifth Grade Kimble and Privates First Class Britton and West repeatedly exposed themselves to heavy artillery, machine gun, and sniper fire to render first aid to the

AWARD, POSTHUMOUSLY, OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to the following officer:

✓ STANLEY D. NASH, (01284558), Captain, Infantry, Company "L", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 5 May 1944 in Italy. Leading a support group in an effort to assist the withdrawal of an ambushed patrol, Captain Nash, despite enemy mortar and machine gun fire, advanced to the position, reorganized the patrol, and directed the evacuation of the wounded. While still under a mortar barrage, he led a group in an effort to silence the enemy weapons firing upon the patrol. In the performance of this mission he was killed by an enemy mortar shell. His courageous action in the face of heavy hostile fire is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania. Next of kin: Mrs. Frances Murray, (Mother), 836 Lancaster Avenue, Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania.

AWARD OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer and enlisted men:

✓ FELIX V. MERCADO, (0303993), Captain, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 May 1944 in ~~████████~~. In an attack upon strong enemy positions, Captain Mercado led two platoons of his company through enemy minefields and heavy hostile fire and, despite bitter opposition, took his objective, capturing 28 prisoners and killing 40. Although nearly surrounded by strong enemy forces and suffering heavy casualties, Captain Mercado reorganized the assault platoon to defend the newly won positions, and succeeded in repelling numerous heavy counter attacks over a three day period. His display of courage, leadership, and tenacity in the face of bitter enemy opposition instilled confidence in the members of his company and inspired them to their greatest efforts in the successful accomplishment of their mission. Entered the military service from Jenkintown, Pennsylvania.

✓ FLOYD E. MINOR, (0450047), Captain, Infantry, Headquarters, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action during the period 14 May to 28 May 1944 in Italy. During heavy combat operations over difficult terrain, Captain Minor made numerous reconnaissances for supply routes, going at times far in advance of friendly troops. Information obtained in this manner was of material aid to his Battalion Commander in the planning of further offensive operations. During a reconnaissance of a building in an effort to locate a site for a command post, Captain Minor encountered an enemy patrol lying on the ground. Seizing the initiative he opened fire, killing two and capturing the remaining four members of the group. His quick thinking and aggressive action, though outnumbered, prevented the possibility of an ambush for the battalion and reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Fredericktown, Maryland.

✓ DONALD D. TUSHA, (0511835), Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "I", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 12 May 1944 in Italy. When enemy machine gun and mortar fire inflicted casualties on members of his platoon, Lieutenant Tusha, without regard for his own personal safety, dug slit trenches for the protection of the wounded before digging his own. Later, when communications were knocked out by enemy artillery, he returned to higher headquarters under heavy enemy fire in order to obtain information and secure replacements, enabling his platoon to hold its position. Through his leadership, initiative and cool judgement, the platoon was successful in the accomplishment of its combat mission despite bitter enemy opposition. Entered the military service from State College, New Mexico.

TONY J. SADVER, (38132649), Technician Fifth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Strawn, Texas.

✓ OLIN L. KELSO, (33128545), Technician Fourth Grade, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Cleveland, Oklahoma.

For gallantry in action on 13 May 1944 in Italy. During a tank attack upon a town, Technician Fourth Grade Kelso and Technician Fifth Grade Sadver, operating a bulldozer ahead of the tanks with the mission of filling in a muddy stream to make a tank crossing possible, completed their task and under heavy enemy artillery fire, without regard for their own safety, assisted in the successful completion of the tank assault. Their courage and coolness under fire contributed materially to the success of the attack and reflects great credit upon themselves and the military service.

THOMAS E. GOSSAGE, (38138110), Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944 in Italy. When a member of a detail of which he was in charge was injured by an exploding mine while working in a minefield, Sergeant Gossage, notwithstanding the danger to his own personal safety, attempted to effect his rescue. In the performance of this unselfish mission Sergeant Gossage was himself killed by the explosion of another mine. His unselfish and heroic action at the cost of his own life is in keeping with the high traditions of the service. Entered the military service from Kilgore, Texas. Next of kin: Wille Gossage, (Mother), Kilgore, Texas.

ALOIS KAROTKO, (33271018), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944 in Italy. Next of kin: Mrs. Bertha Karotko, (Mother), 861 East 10th Street, Erie, Pennsylvania.

ALFRED J. GRUTZ, (37196194), Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 329th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 13 May 1944 in Italy. Technician Fifth Grade Grutz repeatedly exposed himself to enemy artillery fire and bombing attacks in order to maintain communications between units of the Battalion. While in the performance of these hazardous duties he stepped on a mine and was killed. His devotion to duty and determination to perform his assigned tasks, regardless of risk, reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Specht's Ferry, Iowa. Next of kin: Miss Velma Grutz, (Sister), 2532 Washington Street, Dubuque, Iowa.

Without regard for hours or personal comfort, his tireless energy, skilled and sound planning, and timely recommendations and decisions were of invaluable service to the Battalion and to the operations as a whole. Entered the military service from Columbus, Georgia.

His courage under fire was an inspiration to the members of his command and served to bolster the morale of troops who had suffered their first casualties due to enemy action. Entered the military service from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ZEALIN W. RUSSELL, (6287158), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During offensive operations against the enemy Technical Sergeant Russell gave valuable assistance to his Commanding Officer in contacting elements of the Company and in reorganizing its units under heavy enemy fire, risking death many times to accomplish his mission. Entered the military service from Poughkeepsie, Arkansas.

JOSSEPH R. SEEDS, JR., (33311288), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat with the enemy, Staff Sergeant Seeds, the Battalion Operations Sergeant, went to the assistance of wounded men under heavy artillery fire. He successfully guided litter bearers to the wounded and assisted in rendering first aid and in evacuating them to the rear. His willingness to risk his life in assisting his wounded comrades resulted in them receiving prompt medical attention and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

JOHN L. TUCKER, (33200261), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 11 May to 13 May 1944, in Italy. During a period when the Company was engaged in intense combat, Staff Sergeant Tucker, the Company Mess Sergeant, assisted in the carrying of supplies and ammunition to the front line troops, although under constant danger from enemy shelling and sniper fire. His courageous actions in assisting the front line soldiers contributed materially to the combat efficiency of the Company. Entered the military service from Landover, Maryland.

ANDREW J. CAMPANARO, (32139679), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of heavy combat with the enemy, when his gunner and ammunition carrier had been knocked out by enemy action, Sergeant Campanaro, acting on his own initiative, picked up his light machine gun, and in the face of heavy enemy fire, moved forward to a new position and directed effective fire upon enemy positions, supplying greatly needed support to the advancing Company. Entered the military service from Rochester, New York.

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WALTER J. NOWAK, (31211407), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "L", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 5 May 1944, in Italy. When a patrol of which he was a member was ambushed by the enemy, Sergeant Nowak assisted in the evacuation of the wounded up 600 yards of sloping terrain which was being subjected to heavy enemy fire. After leaving the wounded soldiers in a place of safety he again volunteered to go back down the slope to render further assistance. His voluntary risk of life to aid his comrades reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Springfield, Massachusetts.

WALTER K. RUTTER, (33392079), Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 28 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense and prolonged combat over mountainous terrain, Sergeant Rutter, as Battalion Wire Chief, was instrumental in maintaining almost constant communications with the Regimental Command Post. Often servicing wire under enemy fire and laboring unceasingly under the combined difficulties of unfavorable terrain and enemy action, he was of material aid in the successful completion of the Battalion's mission. Entered the military service from Swissvale, Pennsylvania.

GEORGE MORRONI, (33245015), Sergeant, Infantry, Antitank Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Smithmill, Pennsylvania.

ROBERT G. WELLS, (32541246), Technician Fifth Grade, Infantry, Antitank Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Jamaica, New York.

For heroic achievement in action on 29 April 1944, in Italy. During a night reconnaissance mission preparatory to clearing an enemy mine field, Sergeant Morroni and Technician Fifth Grade Wells left covered positions and, under heavy enemy artillery fire, assisted in the evacuation of a wounded soldier. Their consideration for the welfare of their wounded comrade at the risk of their own lives is in keeping with the high traditions of the military service.

ROBERT L. TAYLOR, (38014469), Technician Fifth Grade, Infantry, Company "C", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Portales, New Mexico.

JOHN A. BULLOCK, (38171686), Technician Fifth Grade, Infantry, Company "C", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Epps, Louisiana.

For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 13 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat with the enemy, the above named enlisted men, Company Cooks, volunteered to carry food and ammunition to front line troops through enemy artillery and sniper fire. Their voluntary risk of life to support the Company's combat mission reflects great credit upon themselves and the military service.

ROBERT J. GROFTS, (35557747), Private, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 13 May 1944 in ~~country~~. During a period of heavy combat, when numerous casualties were being suffered by our forces, Private Grofts assisted in an exemplary manner in the evacuation of many of the wounded. He was successful in maintaining contact between Battalion and forward aid stations, thus expediting the prompt treatment of the wounded at a time when close contact was vital to the saving of their lives. Entered the military service from Maumee, Ohio.

ROBERT R. WALSH, (33392077), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 3 May to 11 May 1944 in ~~country~~. As a member of a detail assigned to construct a Battalion Observation Post in hostile territory, Private First Class Walsh, although under heavy enemy machine gun, mortar, and artillery fire, persisted in the performance of his task without regard to his personal safety. On one occasion he voluntarily went further into territory under enemy fire in order to assist in the evacuation of wounded members of a friendly patrol. His untiring efforts in the successful accomplishment of his assigned tasks were of material aid to the Battalion in subsequent offensive operations. Entered the military service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

GEORGE H. DE WOLF, (33359930), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 26 May 1944, in ~~country~~. Private First Class De Wolf performed his duties as wire man during a period of intense and prolonged combat, over mountainous terrain. Numerous times laying wire and maintaining communications in the face of bitter enemy action he made a substantial contribution to the combat efficiency of the Battalion during a vital period of operations. Entered the military service from Lehigh County, Pennsylvania.

ELTON J. STRIKER, (37124941), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "D", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in ~~country~~. Advancing under heavy enemy artillery fire during a night attack, Private First Class Striker volunteered to enter an enemy mine field to remove the body of one of his comrades who had been mortally wounded. His display of courage in performing the unselfish mission under enemy fire inspired the squad to move successfully forward to accomplish its mission. Entered the military service from Ericson, Nebraska.

EDWARD J. BABBIT, JR., (32929090), Private, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Bronton, New Jersey.

ANGELO C. POMA, (32615962), Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Long Island City, New York.

FINIS G. LEMLEY, (6256969), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Cravens, Louisiana.

MATTHEW J. BAER, (13085439), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Apollo, Pennsylvania.

CARL H. FENNINGER, (33231184), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Paradise, Pennsylvania.

JAMES W. GRAHAM, (34377619), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "C", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Fairview, Tennessee.

EARL H. HAUGHT, (33398138), Private Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944 in Italy. When his squad leader and assistant squad leader were wounded by enemy artillery fire while returning from a mine field which they had cleared, Private Haught led two of the men to safety and returned under fire with medical assistance. He assisted in rendering first aid and in evacuating them to the rear. His disregard of his own personal safety to assist his wounded comrades is in keeping with the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Meadowlands, Pennsylvania.

MARTIN D'ONOFRIO, (32339398), Private, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 328th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 24 April 1944 in Italy. When enemy artillery inflicted casualties upon members of the battalion, Private D'Onofrio twice exposed himself to flying shell fragments to render first aid and assist in evacuation of the wounded. His disregard for his own personal safety to rescue his wounded comrades is in keeping with the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from New Rochelle, New York.

EDWARD F. HANRAHAN, (15354270), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Cleveland, Ohio.

JOHN L. SUNDSDMO, (36240979), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Hillsdale, Wisconsin.

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FLOYD E. RICHARDSON, (17046961), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Kansas City, Missouri.

For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 13 May 1944 in Italy. During this period the Battalion was engaged in heavy combat with strong enemy forces. Working at times under heavy enemy fire and over difficult terrain in a rapidly moving situation, the above named enlisted men laid wire and maintained communications between the Company and Battalion Command Posts. Their outstanding work without regard for their own personal safety kept communications operating with few interruptions and materially aided in the success of the attack.

HUBERT A. PAGE, (34164365), Private First Class, Quartermaster Corps, 85th Quartermaster Company, United States Army. Entered the military service from Tarrant City, Alabama.

WILLIAM R. SHULTZ, (20536099), Private, Quartermaster Corps, 85th Quartermaster Company, United States Army. Entered the military service from Louisville, Kentucky.

For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944 in Italy. The above named enlisted men, members of a Quartermaster Company, having volunteered to act as litter bearers, entered an area being swept by artillery, mortar, and machine gun fire to evacuate wounded men. Their risk of life in assisting wounded comrades is in keeping with the high traditions of the military service.

PAUL J. WIRTZ, (36825716), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 6 May 1944 in Italy. When a friendly patrol was ambushed by the enemy, suffering heavy casualties, Private First Class Wirtz, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, left a covered position and moved down the forward slope of a hill beyond the furthest outpost to render first aid. His unhesitating devotion to duty in assisting his wounded comrades reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Fond du Lac, Wisconsin.

JOSEPH F. BERTANI, (36756487), Private, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944 in Italy. When members of the company to which he was attached as aid men fell victim to enemy mines, Private Bertani, notwithstanding the fact that others had been killed in the mine field, unhesitatingly went to their aid. He succeeded in giving them medical attention and in attempting to remove another soldier of another company, who had also been injured. His devotion to duty at the risk of his life is worthy of the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Joliet, Illinois.

SECTION I

AWARD OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men:

✓ WILLIAM H. MIKKELSEN, (018844), Lieutenant Colonel, Infantry, Headquarters, Third Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 1 June 1944, in Italy. Encountering a determined enemy force estimated to be two companies and a platoon at full strength, extremely well armed with automatic weapons and entrenched in well fortified positions and houses, Lieutenant Colonel Mikkelsen, in command of the Third Battalion, successfully planned and organized a sound tactical operation for the destruction of the enemy positions. During the entire action, Lieutenant Colonel Mikkelsen, with utter disregard for his own safety, directed the coordinated attack from a forward Observation Post which was necessarily exposed and subject to enemy artillery and heavy small arms fire. His gallant leadership and determination to destroy the enemy despite bitter opposition reflects the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

✓ EDWIN C. GUTHMAN, (01301990), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 6 May 1944, in Italy. When a friendly patrol operating in front of his position suffered casualties, First Lieutenant Guthman, at great personal risk, voluntarily exposed himself to heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire to recover the wounded members of the patrol and assist in their evacuation. Taking the lead, he repeatedly returned in the face of heavy enemy fire to search the area for other fallen American soldiers. His voluntary actions at the risk of his own life aided immeasurably in the saving of many lives, reflecting great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Seattle, Washington.

✓ ROBERT M. HUNTER, (01316419), Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "B", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. During heavy offensive operations against the enemy under intense enemy fire, Second Lieutenant Hunter, although suffering from wounds, continued in command, and maintained the combat efficiency of his platoon. When medical aid finally reached the wounded members of his command, he refused attention until they were first cared for. His unselvish devotion to the members of his platoon and determination to continue the attack against the enemy reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Coshocton, Ohio.

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KENNETH R. WILLIAMS, (13170566), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "F", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. Advancing under heavy artillery and mortar fire, over 300 yards of terrain known to be mined and under direct observation by the enemy, Private First Class Williams, with the assistance of his platoon officer, succeeded in driving the enemy from a house from which they had been holding up the advance with heavy machine guns and automatic weapons. His action in the face of the enemy gained ground vital to the safety of two companies and inspired the other members of the platoon to continue their advance. Private First Class Williams' aggressiveness and determination to destroy the enemy reflects the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

MICHAEL P. CHARLES, (01101375), First Lieutenant, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

CHARLES E. CLARK, (14081862), First Sergeant, Corps of Engineers, Company "B", 310th Engineer Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from St. Petersburg, Florida.

For gallantry in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. Upon learning that a number of casualties had been suffered on an exposed stretch of tank trail known to be under direct small arms and artillery fire from the enemy approximately 500 yards distant, First Lieutenant Charles and First Sergeant Clark voluntarily went to the aid of the wounded and assisted in evacuating them under intense enemy fire. Disregarding their own safety, they succeeded in evacuating the casualties and when the officer was himself seriously wounded while performing these acts, First Sergeant Clark assisted in his evacuation to safety. Their display of courage and devotion to their wounded comrades reflects the high traditions of the military service.

1. Under the provisions of Paragraph 3, Circular Number 26, Headquarters North African Theater of Operations, 6 March 1944, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men:

MIRION N. SIGOVICH, (0366269), Captain, Infantry, Company "K", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 27 May 1944, in Italy. During a difficult withdrawal of his Company under heavy enemy mortar and machine gun fire, Captain Sigovich, in command, successfully assembled the scattered members of his command and supervised the evacuation of many casualties. Although under constant enemy fire, Captain Sigovich, without regard for his own safety, remained in the area until all the men had withdrawn. His coolness under fire was responsible for the successful withdrawal and enabled the Company to reorganize for another attack the same day. Entered the military service from Portland, Oregon.

HENRY M. SMALL, (0453746), Captain, Infantry, Company "I", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 27 May 1944, in Italy. When ordered to withdraw his company after many men were wounded and killed by heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire, Captain Small, in command, successfully assembled the scattered members of his command and supervised the evacuation of the casualties. Although under constant enemy fire, Captain Small, without regard for his own safety, remained in the area until all the men had withdrawn. His coolness under fire was responsible for the successful withdrawal of the company and enabled them to reorganize for another attack the same day. Entered the military service from Macon, Georgia.

JIMMIE FIELDS, (6366799), First Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat with the enemy when the Company Commander was injured and the company disorganized, First Sergeant Fields, under heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire, assisted the Executive Officer in the reorganization of the company. His successful accomplishment of his hazardous task enabled his unit to resume hostilities during a critical period of combat. Entered the military service from Zama, Mississippi.

DONALD D. PROSSER, (37275337), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack against enemy positions, Staff Sergeant Prosser, acting as radio operator at a forward Battalion Command Post, maintained communications over a 25 hour period of heavy enemy shelling. His devotion to duty in the face of intense hostile action was of material assistance to his Battalion Commander during a period of critical operations. Entered the military service from Minneapolis, Minnesota.

CENNARO V. MINGOIA, (32337263), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 14 May to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As pack train leader charged with the responsibility of transporting supplies for his Battalion through mountainous terrain, Staff Sergeant Mingoia discharged his duties in a highly exemplary manner. At times bringing supplies forward under enemy fire and the difficult conditions of night operations, he was successful in supplying his Battalion with food, water and ammunition, making a vital contribution to its continued combat efficiency. Entered the military service from Bronx, New York.

JAMES N. BLY, (32578194), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 3 May to 11 May 1944, in Italy. As a member of a group assigned to construct a Battalion Observation Post in hostile territory, Private First Class Bly performed his duties in a highly efficient manner, working under heavy enemy machine gun, mortar and artillery fire. During this period he voluntarily went out into hostile territory to assist in the evacuation of wounded members of a friendly patrol. His untiring efforts in the performance of his duties were of material aid to his unit in subsequent offensive operations. Entered the military service from Ticonderoga, New York.

ALEXANDER BUGOS, (36342234), Private, Infantry, Company "L", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 5 May 1944, in Italy. During an intense attack of enemy automatic weapons and mortar fire which killed three men and wounded five others in the patrol, Private Bugos, although wounded himself, assisted in silencing an enemy machine gun with mortar fire. Then, still disregarding his own wounds, he went to the aid of the wounded and assisted in their evacuation and only after the action was over did Private Bugos make known his own wounds. His voluntary risk of life to aid his wounded comrades reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

AMON G. HOLMES, (6959097), Private, Infantry, Company "I", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. Taking command of his platoon after the platoon sergeant had been seriously wounded, Private Holmes reorganized the group under heavy enemy fire, and continued to lead it against the enemy. His display of initiative and courage at a time when the platoon was threatened with complete disorganization enabled it to continue on its combat mission and was of material aid in the preservation of its fighting efficiency. Entered the military service from Marvel, Arkansas.

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer and enlisted men:

RICHARD S. SMITH, (0330937), Major, Infantry, Headquarters Third Battalion, 358th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a heavy attack against well prepared enemy positions Major Smith commanded his battalion from an advanced observation post. Despite heavy and continuing enemy artillery and small arms fire directed upon his position, he refused an opportunity to withdraw under a smokescreen, although given the opportunity to do so, but continued to supervise artillery support and direct his troops. His exemplary leadership in the face of bitter hostile action was a material factor in the successful accomplishment of the battalion's mission and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Lincoln, Nebraska.

WILLIAM S. TRIGO, (37203048), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 358th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 17 May 1944, in Italy. When a squad of his combat patrol, which was spearheading the advance of the company, was cut off by heavy enemy fire, Staff Sergeant Trigg continued to lead the squad into combat with the enemy. Although engaged against numerically superior forces, directing heavy machine gun fire against his position, and making continuous attempts to cut him off from the rear, he persisted in leading the squad in an intense fire fight against automatic weapons and sniper fire for two hours. When his situation finally became untenable he successfully led a withdrawal to join the remainder of the patrol. His courage and determination, in the face of bitter opposition, in seeking to engage superior forces is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Eureka, Kansas.

RUSSELL B. CLARK, (6959107), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "P", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action during the period 15 May to 27 May 1944, in Italy. When a machine gun section of the company was hard pressed for non-commissioned officers, Staff Sergeant Clark, the company mess sergeant, took command, led the section through mountainous terrain under heavy hostile fire, and engaged the enemy in intense and prolonged combat. During an attack in which the section accompanied the assault platoon he led the section in the silencing of an enemy machine gun nest, inflicting severe casualties upon the enemy. At the conclusion of the action he rendered valuable assistance in the evacuation of wounded from an area still under enemy fire. His courage and leadership inspired the members of the section and contributed greatly to the efficient combat operations of the platoon, reflecting deserved credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Hamden, Connecticut.

Entered military service, November 1942, in
Company C, 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry, 3rd Division.
Served as platoon leader, Company C, 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry, 3rd Division, during the Korean Conflict.
On 15 August 1950, while leading his platoon, under his machine
gun fire, Private First Class, John L. Johnson, displayed outstanding courage and initiative. With
the platoon almost out of ammunition, recognized them under intense enemy fire.
After a period of respiration of casualties, and upon disengaging, the platoon were
facing with a numerically superior and well fortified enemy force, ordered and
directed a withdrawal to a position of safety. His initiative and leadership, dis-
played at a critical time and under the most adverse conditions, saved the lives of
most of the platoon and preserved the combat efficiency of the company for a further
successful attack. Entered the military service from Ness City, Kansas.

WILLIAM LADLEY, (33267259), Master Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Chief Clerk in the office of the Chief of Staff, 85th Infantry Division, Master Sergeant Ladley worked long hours without regard for personal comfort or hours of duty in the exemplary performance of his tasks. His constant and untiring devotion to duty materially aided in the operation of the section. Entered the military service from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

FRANK VAN PELT, (R-334006), Master Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 24 May 1944, in Italy. Master Sergeant Van Pelt demonstrated superior ability and untiring devotion to duty in his supervision of the enlisted staff of the G-4 Section, 85th Infantry Division, contributing materially to the efficient operation of the section during the campaign. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 27 May 1944, in Italy. As Operations Sergeant, G-3 Section, 85th Infantry Division, Staff Sergeant Snyder was charged with the responsibility of collecting and keeping up-to-date vital information concerning tactical operations. His untiring and exemplary devotion to duty was a contributing factor in the efficient operation of the section. Entered the military service from Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

EDWARD W. FARRELL, (125000), Captain Fourth Grade, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 27 May 1944, in Italy. Technical Fourth Grade Farrell, despite the responsibility of performing difficult reports and liaison assignments, skillfully performed his duties in the field of intelligence, constantly maintaining communications, constantly showing skill in the preparation and distribution of documents, and always faithfully working with the various sections which strenuously pursued their objectives. He was constantly engaged in the supervision of combat patrols and strength figures of the assault companies. Entered the military service from New Jersey.

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MICHAEL A. DE SANTIS, (32336498), Technician Fourth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a heavy enemy artillery barrage, Technician Fourth Grade DeSantis went to the aid of two seriously wounded soldiers, lying in exposed positions, and administered first aid. Although enemy shells continued to burst in the area, slightly wounding him, he remained with the wounded men until treatment had been completed and they were evacuated to places of safety. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

HARRIS N. SUTTON, (37774728), Sergeant Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 26 May 1944, in Italy. When a commanding officer was lying wounded under heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire, Sergeant Fifth Grade Sutton, without regard for his own personal safety, crawled out to the exposed position to render first aid. After exposing himself while in the performance of his mission, he returned to the aid of the other in treatment. This contrary to the advice of his medical officer, and after being told of the danger, he volunteered to lend a litter squad to another soldier who was severely wounded. Entered the military service from Newark, New Jersey.

ANTHONY V. SORIANO, (44534142), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "C", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 12 May and 13 May 1944, in Italy. While serving as a relay holder during a period of intense combat with the enemy, Private Soriano, although acting alone, captured an enemy sentry and succeeded in bringing him back to our lines, enabling his company to secure information of great importance for future operations. Entered the military service from Providence, Rhode Island.

EDWIN R. REBER, (37274027), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "A", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, in Italy. When a member of his section was seriously wounded, Private First Class Reber crawled out under enemy machine gun and mortar fire to render first aid and to secure from him the range card for their section. His courageous action under fire made it possible for the section to move into position and direct accurate fire at pre-planned targets. Entered the military service from Pine Island, Minnesota.

ERVIN M. CONNER, (35643776), Private, Infantry, Company "W", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. When his platoon was pinned down by enemy machine gun and mortar fire, Private Conner, although under fire from an enemy machine gun, crawled a message to the company commander informing him of the situation. His courageous action materially aided in the taking of the ridge by his platoon. Entered the military service from McComas, West Virginia.

AWARD, POSTHUMOUSLY, OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to the following enlisted man:

HUBBERT J. TRIM, (38138490), Private, Infantry, Company "E", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack upon well emplaced enemy positions, Private Trim, although under intense enemy fire, succeeded in destroying two enemy strong points and capturing six prisoners. After delivering them to the rear, and then returning to his company under heavy artillery fire, he encountered a detail of litter bearers reluctant to carry wounded soldiers through an intense barrage. Taking charge of the detail, he led the group to a position of safety, exposing himself to enemy fire until the evacuation of all the wounded was completed. His courage and determination in destroying strong enemy positions and his unselfish risk of life to aid his wounded comrades reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Palestine, Texas. Next of kin: Mrs. Valeria A. Trim, (Mother), Route #5, Palestine, Texas.

AWARD, MISSING IN ACTION, OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following enlisted man, who is missing in action:

EUGENE E. HILL, (37275786), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "E", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. Displaying exceptional courage under heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire, Private First Class Hill succeeded in eliminating two enemy positions and capturing six prisoners. Upon returning to his position after delivering them to the rear, he encountered several litter bearers who were reluctant to carry wounded soldiers through an artillery barrage. Taking charge, Private First Class Hill directed the evacuation and kept the teams moving despite continued fire until all the wounded had been removed to places of safety. His outstanding courage at the risk of his life enabled his company to take its objective and aided the wounded soldiers in being evacuated to where medical care could be administered. Entered the military service from Brainerd, Minnesota. Next of kin: Mrs. Anna Hill, (Mother), 318 14th St., Brainerd, Minnesota.

AWARD OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer and enlisted men:

ARTHUR M. RESLER, (01302054), Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "F", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 20 May 1944, in Italy. When the advance of a main body of troops was blocked by heavy fire from two enemy pill boxes, Lieutenant Resler, leading an assault group to destroy them, advanced under intense fire from enemy weapons and by skilfully deploying his men succeeded in destroying the enemy emplacements, killing four and capturing fourteen German soldiers. His outstanding leadership and courageous action in leading the platoon in the successful attack enabled the troops to continue their advance and hastened the capture of the main objective. Entered the military service from Newport, Kentucky.

CARL R. BARNETT, (37203081), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Staff Sergeant Barnett led his squad during a night attack through enemy minefields and under heavy fire, destroying several enemy emplacements in order to attain his objective. Upon capturing the objective he reorganized the squad and led an attack on strong enemy forces, capturing nine and killing thirty enemy soldiers. He then returned to the position and repulsed a heavy enemy counter-attack. His exemplary leadership and bold determination to destroy the enemy reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Kingman, Kansas.

HENRY FOX, (12186940), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "G", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 14 May 1944 in Italy. When the advance of his company was held up by heavy fire from an enemy position, Staff Sergeant Fox led a platoon with the mission of destroying it. Although the platoon was pinned down several times by intense enemy fire, suffering several casualties, he supervised the evacuation of the wounded and then led the platoon forward to knock out the enemy position and enable the company to advance. Entered the military service from New York City.

RALPH LAYNE, (34493346), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Whitwell, Tennessee.

JAMES B. CUNNINGHAM, (35718915), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Madisonville, Kentucky.

For gallantry in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack, when their platoon was pinned down by fire from an enemy machine gun nest, Private First Class Layne and Cunningham, despite intense enemy action, moved to a position from where they could attack the emplacement with hand grenades.

They destroyed the strong point, killing three and taking one prisoner, enabling the platoon to successfully take the objective. Continuing the attack, they killed two enemy snipers who had been blocking the further advance of the platoon. Their bold determination to destroy the enemy is in keeping with the high traditions of the military service.

ALBERT C. ROSS, (32341029), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. When the advance of his platoon was halted and its members pinned down by machine gun fire from an enemy held house, Private First Class Ross, despite the continuing hazard of enemy fire, attacked the position with a flame thrower. When the flame thrower failed to ignite, he retired, to resume the attack with hand grenades, destroying the position. His aggressive action, without regard for his own personal safety, enabled the platoon to successfully take its objective and capture four enemy soldiers and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Cessining, New York.

CHARLES R. VAN VOLKENBURG, (16071944), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "G", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. When the advance of his platoon was halted by an enemy emplacement, covered by heavy enemy machine gun and machine pistol fire, Staff Sergeant Van Volkenburg, despite bitter hostile fire, advanced to a position from which he could destroy the enemy strong point. He succeeded in neutralizing the enemy position by throwing hand grenades into it, capturing 6 enemy soldiers and killing the remainder. His aggressive action in seeking to engage the enemy, without regard for his own personal safety, enabled the platoon to move forward and take its objective, reflecting credit upon himself and the military service. Working under heavy enemy artillery fire they accomplished the prompt treatment and evacuation of the injured men to places of safety.

JAMES R. HEWITT, (33200601), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Leonardtown, Maryland.

WILLIAM P. DENZA, (32615301), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

EDWIN D. SPRAGUE, (36862778), Private, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Bay Port, Michigan.

For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. 



As Cannon Company Commander, Captain Harkins reconnoitered for positions in advance of the combat elements making possible quick support to the attacking Infantry and greatly assisting in the rapid movement of the operation. Entered the military service from Mount Pleasant, Pennsylvania.

RICHARD C. ROLAND, (0380648), Captain, Infantry, Service Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 11 May to 5 June 1944, in Italy. As Regimental Graves Registration Officer, Captain Roland applied himself diligently, and despite the danger of minefields and the problem of combat over a wide area, succeeded in performing his duties in a superior manner. Entered the military service from Harlingen, Texas.

LILLARD E. GIBBS, (6258898), First Sergeant, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 11 May 1944 to 14 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat, First Sergeant Gibbs, although exposed to enemy observation and artillery fire, kept a constant check on communications to the forward platoons and organized carrying parties to keep front line troops supplied with rations and ammunition, contributing materially to the combat efficiency of his company. Entered the military service from Cooper, Texas.

ROBERT O. BARTH, (37123132), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Finding his men outnumbered by determined enemy forces, Technical Sergeant Barth voluntarily proceeded through intense enemy shell fire to obtain reinforcements. Upon discovering that due to the situation it was impossible to receive the assistance of supporting troops, he returned to his platoon and assisted in withdrawing it through a heavily mined field. Entered the military service from York, Nebraska.

GEORGE D. KEATHLEY, (38105361), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 30 May 1944, in Italy. When his platoon leader was wounded and out of action, Staff Sergeant Keathley took command and exposed himself many times to enemy small arms fire in order to reorganize the platoon which had suffered severe casualties upon contacting the enemy. Entered the military service from Lamesa, Texas.

HERMAN T. LEDFORD, (34514031), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "B", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. During a barrage of enemy artillery fire in which one of his comrades was wounded, Staff Sergeant Ledford, without regard for his own personal safety, administered first aid to the wounded man, later guiding him through a minefield to safety. Entered the military service from Spartanburg, South Carolina.

JOSEPH PETRINI, (12065219), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 19 May to 6 June 1944, in Italy. As platoon sergeant, Staff Sergeant Petrini led many reconnaissance patrols into enemy territory, engaging the enemy numerous times and leading the platoon in aggressive combat, often exposing himself to direct fire upon the enemy. At one time when a patrol of which he was second in command came under heavy artillery and small arms fire he successfully organized a perimeter defense until reinforcements arrived. Entered the military service from Mt. Kisco, New York.

FRED TABITA, (32336632), Staff Sergeant, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 4 June 1944, in Italy. Staff Sergeant Tabita voluntarily went out under heavy fire to organize the evacuation of wounded soldiers. When enemy action wounded several members of a patrol of which he was a member, Sergeant Sherwood, under heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire, went to the assistance of the injured men. He continued to administer first aid and take part in the evacuation until he himself was severely wounded by a mortar shell. Entered the military service from White River, South Dakota.

ADAM J. KOLLA, (33470791), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat with the enemy, when a squad of his company lost contact with adjacent units, Sergeant Kolla, despite heavy enemy fire, crawled to its position, re-established contact and prevented it from running head-on into prepared enemy positions. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Although wounded himself by enemy snipers upon reaching the tank, he successfully evacuated the wounded tank crew member to safety. Entered the military service from Girard, Ohio.

KENNETH A. WORDEN, (12073534), Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 910th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. Technician Fifth Grade Worden voluntarily entered a known minefield to administer first aid and assist in the evacuation of casualties. Later, while searching for a missing officer, he returned to the same minefield and succeeded in recovering his body. Entered the military service from Clay, New York.

When two rifle platoons, together with a light machine gun section were cut off from adjacent units by heavy enemy fire, Private First Class Tripp left his covered position, moved 150 yards to a point of vantage and gave supporting fire to riflemen advancing upon an enemy machine gun nest. DANNA B. LINTZ, (35741510), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, in Italy. Responding to a call for medical aid for wounded men lying in an area exposed to enemy fire, Private First Class Lantz, was wounded by an enemy sniper. Despite his wounds he continued to administer first aid to the other casualties and was successfully evacuated with them. Entered the military service from Clarksburg, West Virginia.

JAMES J. CHIORRA, (33482425), Private, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Upon hearing noises coming from a dugout, Private Chiorra advanced on the position and threw in a hand grenade. Then, without regard for his own safety, entered the dugout to find one dead and to take the remaining occupants prisoners. Entered the military service from Allentown, Pennsylvania.

BRUNO J. SWIECA, (013Q3571), Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "E", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 1 June 1944, in Italy. When the Second Battalion was caught under enemy fire which resulted in numerous casualties, Second Lieutenant Swieca, with gallant and courageous leadership, organized a small group of men and succeeded in breaking through the intense fire of enemy self propelled guns and automatic weapons. He led this group as a separate unit for two days without loss and enabled the Battalion to continue the attack on its objective. Entered the military service from Niagara Falls, New York.

MILTON A. MCKAY, (32293786), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "E", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. While leading his platoon in an attack, severe enemy machine gun and mortar fire inflicted casualties upon the leading squad. His own arm fractured painfully by shell fragments, Technical Sergeant McKay refused to be evacuated but took up a rocket launcher and crawled forward to a position from which he could fire into a house where an enemy machine gun was located. After successfully neutralizing the enemy position he returned to his platoon, deployed it in secure defensive positions and then sought medical attention for his wounds. His courage and unselfish loyalty in continuing the attack despite his wounds reflect the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Amsterdam, New York.

By ceaseless effort and careful check of all sources of information he was successful in insuring identification of all dead delivered for burial. Entered the military service from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

DONALD A. STACKHOUSE, JR., (0438321), Major, Field Artillery, Headquarters, 85th Infantry Division Artillery, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Division Artillery Intelligence Officer, Major Stackhouse displayed outstanding initiative in obtaining and disseminating information under the most adverse conditions. His professional knowledge enabled him to properly evaluate and make the most of information received and was of the highest value to the success of the operation. Entered the military service from Indianapolis, Indiana.

Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

HEROLD M. MACY, (37274353), Master Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 19 March to 6 June 1944, in Italy. As Regimental Wire Chief, Master Sergeant Macy was instrumental in maintaining a complex wire system throughout the operation and in many instances led his crews and laid wire under intense enemy artillery, mortar and sniper fire. Entered the military service from Nassau, Minnesota.

JAMES A. TIMMENS, (37196246), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "E", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. When a column of troops was shelled by enemy artillery which killed and wounded several men and forced the column to withdraw, Staff Sergeant Timmens remained with the injured members of the company and administered first aid. Although the area was still being subjected to enemy fire he remained with his wounded comrades until they were evacuated. Entered the military service from Madrid, Iowa.

BEN W. BERG, (37275732), Staff Sergeant, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat on 28 May 1944, in Italy. When the battalion to which he was attached was forced to withdraw temporarily, Staff Sergeant Berg remained to organize groups to assist in the evacuation of the wounded. He personally contacted the supporting collecting unit and remained with the casualties until they were evacuated. Entered the military service from Minneapolis, Minnesota.

PETE P. FIGEL, (35381028), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 6 June 1944, in Italy. When the litter squad attempting to evacuate casualties from an exposed position was driven back by enemy machine gun fire, Staff Sergeant Figel returned with one of the litter bearers and evacuated the wounded men. Entered the military service from Akron, Ohio.

WILLIAM L. SHAY, (33355352), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "E", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 24 May 1944, in Italy. Private First Class Shay voluntarily accompanied a platoon whose mission was to route the enemy from the Battalion flank. Upon reaching the position, Private First Class Shay and the platoon leader discovered the platoon was pinned down behind them by heavy enemy fire. Disregarding his own personal safety, Private First Class Shay, with the platoon leader, attacked the enemy, killing two and causing the remainder to withdraw. Entered the military service from Townshend, Pennsylvania.

JAMES R. BROWNFIELD, (37046570), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Des Moines, Iowa.

Privates First Class Brownfield and Cook, assigned to assist in the construction of a forward Observation Post, persisted in performing their duties under enemy mortar and artillery fire. His unselfish action in behalf of his injured comrades saved their lives and prevented further injury to other members of the company. Entered the military service from Laughlin-town, Pennsylvania.

DALE E. BURKHOLDER, (33241692), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. When enemy artillery fire inflicted casualties on his machine gun section, knocking out the section and squad leaders, Staff Sergeant Burkholder took charge of the four remaining men, carried the machine gun and ammunition to the objective and delivered effective fire on the enemy positions. His outstanding courage and sense of duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Carlisle, Pennsylvania.

ANTHONY T. TANSKI, (33701438), Private, Infantry, Company "E", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. When his squad was pinned down by intense enemy machine gun fire and several of the members wounded, Private Tanski secured an automatic rifle from one of the wounded and delivered effective fire on the enemy, enabling wounded members of the squad to crawl to safety. Entered the military service from Sharpsburg, Pennsylvania.

JACOB G. SEIDER, (32929236), Private, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 6 June 1944, in Italy. When the litter squad he had brought out to evacuate casualties from a bare hillside was driven back by heavy enemy machine gun fire, Private Seider returned for help and again went back into the exposed area to rescue the wounded men. Entered the military service from South Plainfield, New Jersey.

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2. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following named enlisted men:

BRADY E. BENTON, (34388296), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "F", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Goffney, South Carolina.

JOHN S. BETTEM, (35593533), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "F", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Lansing, Ohio.



AWARD OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following named officer and enlisted men:

HENRY H. DENTON, (01301964), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "B", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. When a four man patrol led by First Lieutenant Denton was fired upon by a large enemy group armed with three machine guns and a number of rifles, he led his group in a heavy fire fight with the hostile force. Although greatly outnumbered and firing from positions which offered no cover, they succeeded in killing three, wounding four, and taking 37 enemy prisoners. Entered the military service from San Francisco, California. ✓

JAMES R. ARGO, (34392894), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 18 May 1944, in Italy. Leading his squad through sniper fire in an attack on numerically stronger enemy forces, equipped with automatic weapons, Staff Sergeant Argo by skillfully employing the squad members, enabled them to kill five and capture thirty-five German soldiers. His aggressive leadership and courage under fire in seeking combat with a greater hostile force, reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Calera, Alabama. ✓

FLOYD S. LUNDAR, (37273193), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 18 May 1944, in Italy. Staff Sergeant Lundar, although suffering from a head wound, continued to advance against the enemy, driving snipers from their positions. Returning to seek medical attention, he encountered a group of wounded soldiers lying on the battlefield under heavy artillery fire. Despite his own wounds and the continuing barrage he procured an ambulance and evacuated twelve to the aid station. His courageous action in pressing home the attack, though wounded, and his unselfish devotion to his wounded comrades reflects the high traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Hawley, Minnesota. ✓

HERBERT H. BRENNAN, (33409059), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 18 May 1944, in Italy. Advancing in front of his platoon in an attack on strong enemy positions, Private First Class Brennan, an automatic rifleman, succeeded in killing many of the enemy and assisted in the capturing of many prisoners. His aggressive action in closing with the hostile forces reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from St. Marys, Pennsylvania. ✓

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JOHN U. BELL, JR., (0324477), Captain, Infantry, Service Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. Captain Bell, as Service Company Commander took an active part in directing supply and motor movements of the Regiment. His efficient supervisions of large numbers of replacements was a contributing factor in the success of the Regiment during large scale offensive operations. Entered the military service from Lancaster, South Carolina.

CLAYTON N. LITTLE, (0456152), Captain, Infantry, Headquarters, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Regimental Adjutant, Captain Little made frequent personal contact with leading elements of the Regiment, exposing himself to enemy action to secure information which accelerated the accomplishment of the Regimental Mission. Entered the military service from Bentonville, Arkansas.

~~* ROBERT R. FRIAUF, (0488287), Captain, Infantry, Headquarters, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 14 June 1944, in Italy. As Regimental Graves Registration Officer, Captain Friauf organised and controlled details for the collection and evacuation of the dead in a highly efficient manner, overcoming the difficulties of rugged terrain, frequency of minefields and the problems incident to proper identification of the dead. Entered the military service from Toledo, Ohio.~~

CLARENCE E. PRITCHETT, (01284874), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Anti-tank Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 11 May to 6 June 1944, in Italy. As Commanding Officer of a Regimental Anti-tank Company, First Lieutenant Pritchett, by diligent personal reconnaissance in the presence of the enemy in disregard of his personal safety was enabled to provide continuous protection from mechanised attack for the Regiment at a time when the rapidity of its advance made impossible the issuance of specific instructions. Entered the military service from Blue Ridge, Georgia.

FRANCIS ARMSTRONG, (01165699), First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, Headquarters, 910th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 12 May to 15 May 1944, in Italy. When his Observation Post received a direct hit from enemy artillery, First Lieutenant Armstrong, a forward observer for his Battalion, remained in his position to salvage valuable government property before withdrawing. Returning again to the Observation Post at a later date, he adjusted artillery fire until a second shell made a direct hit upon his position. Establishing another Observation Post in the vicinity he then volunteered for duty as a forward observer, accurately and efficiently directing artillery fire on enemy targets. Entered the military service from Bradenton, Florida.

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JAMES W. PURDON, (01302348), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "K", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Leading a group of twelve men, First Lieutenant Purdon, assisted in the taking and holding of a bitterly contested hill. Despite terrific artillery fire and bitter enemy attacks his group assisted in the holding of the flank position until reinforcements arrived. Entered the military service from Lisbon, North Dakota.

ARTHUR J. TESSEINE, (0461487), Captain, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Grand Rapids, Michigan.

JOHN H. GARWACKI, (01621256), Captain, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

For meritorious service in combat on 25 May 1944, in Italy. When a Battalion Aid Station was cut off from its Battalion during an attack, the above named officers, Battalion Surgeons for an adjoining unit, located their aid station in a position where casualties from the two Battalions could be treated. Although overworked and with insufficient personnel to assist them, they successfully treated the sick and wounded of both units.

2. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following named enlisted men:

DANIEL DI GENOVA, (3391), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. Although painfully wounded in both hand and chest, Sergeant Di Genova continued to lead his squad in an attack against the enemy. Later by effective use of rifle grenades, he drove the enemy from a building killing several and wounding others. Entered the military service from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

ARCHIE M. PHILLIS, (37208083), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "H", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. When a friendly patrol was pinned down by heavy enemy fire, Sergeant Phllis, with the other members of his machine gun section, exposed himself to the same fire to cover the patrol's withdrawal. His mission accomplished, he remained in position and continued the action, assisting in killing or wounding nine enemy soldiers and forcing the remainder to withdraw. Entered the military service from Canton, Kansas.

JAMES SCIAKE, (32524262), Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 328th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat with the enemy, Technician Fifth Grade Sciake, an Artillery Liaison Radio Operator, persisted in the performance of his duties after being given permission to retire to a place of safety. He remained at his post operating his radio until the fire mission was completed. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

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ROBERT C. DODGE, (33378275), Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 330th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Accompanying the platoon, to which he was attached as aid man, in an attack on strong enemy positions, Technician Fifth Grade Dodge, although constantly exposed to heavy fire, rendered first aid to the wounded and placed them in covered positions pending evacuation. Entered the military service from Baltimore, Maryland.

WILLIAM M. MURDOCK, (33271438), Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 12 May to 25 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of prolonged and intense combat with the enemy, Technician Fifth Grade Murdock, a Company aid man, persisted in administering first aid to the wounded under enemy fire and within full view of the enemy. Entered the military service from Sharon, Pennsylvania.

CONRAD D. BERGMANN, (32336186), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 3 May to 10 May 1944, in Italy. Private First Class Bergmann assisted in the construction of a Battalion Observation Post in hostile territory under heavy enemy mortar and machine gun fire. Through his devotion to duty under enemy fire he enabled the Battalion Commander to direct the attack from an advanced position. Entered the military service from Floral Park, New York.

GERALD C. GASH, (37182395), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "K", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 11 May and 12 May 1944, in Italy. Holding a section of a bitterly contested hill with only a small group to assist him, Private First Class Gash, an automatic rifleman, inflicted numerous casualties upon attacking enemy forces over a period of two days. As a result of his outstanding courage, though outnumbered by the enemy, the hill was held until reinforcements could arrive. Entered the military service from Palmyra, Missouri.

HAROLD E. BONSER, (33059591), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, in Italy. Upon learning that enemy fire had injured a member of a tank crew during a battle for a bitterly contested town, Private First Class Bonser entered the town while the battle was still raging to evacuate the wounded man to a place of safety. Entered the military service from Saylorsburg, Pennsylvania.

DANIEL DROGAN, (32541626), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat when many casualties were being suffered by the company to which he was attached as aid man, Private First Class Drogan continuously and unceasingly rendered first aid to the wounded while under artillery fire, often going out to assist injured members of the adjacent Regiment. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

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FREDERICK C. LOFGREN, (17051759), Private, Cavalry, 85th Reconnaissance Troop, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. While his platoon was engaged in intense combat with the enemy, Private Lofgren crawled 25 yards under fire to kill an enemy machine gunner who had opened fire upon the platoon at close range. Entered the military service from Duluth, Minnesota.

OWEN G. LA MOTTE, (6152579), Corporal, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, in Italy. When his company was pinned down by fire from an enemy machine gun nest, Private La Motte crawled forward under fire and destroyed the emplacement with a hand grenade, enabling the company to continue the advance and take its objective. Entered the military service from Ferrisburg, Vermont.

CHESTER A. DOMBKOWSKI, (31798760), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Grandby, Connecticut.

KILMER C. ERICKSON, (36241123), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Ettrick, Wisconsin.

For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Upon attaining the Division objective after an attack through heavy enemy fire, the above enlisted men supervised the emplacement of heavy weapons, organized a defense and, assisted by riflemen from an adjoining company, directed their squads in successfully repelling a counter attack by a large enemy force.

WORTH DUKE, (34269111), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "H", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Brooks, Georgia.

FRANK C. CAMPBELL, (13121567), Corporal, Infantry, Company "H", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Covington, Virginia.

For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. When enemy artillery started a fire in the company ammunition dump, igniting mortar shells, the above enlisted men, despite continuing shell fire and the danger of the ammunition exploding, left their emplacements and extinguished the blaze before further damage was done.

CHARLES P. GEORGE, (20151783), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Barre, Vermont.

HERBERT MANER (34572631), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Atlanta, Georgia.

LOUIS S. MAKLARI, (32173865), Private, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Tottenville, New York.

For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. Accompanying their platoon in an attack on a bitterly contested hill, the above enlisted men, together with the other members of the platoon succeeded in reaching the Division objective. Quickly putting their weapons into action, they succeeded in repulsing an enemy counterattack and held the position until ordered to withdraw.

JOHN A. DE ROSA, (32541974), Private, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Staten Island, New York.

FRANK B. HERBERT, JR, (13121587), Technician Fifth Grade, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Elkins, West Virginia.

For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. During the early stages of an attack against the enemy, Technician Fifth Grade Herbert and Private DeRosa, without direct orders, exposed themselves to a heavy concentration of enemy artillery fire to establish communication lines between Regimental and Battalion Command Posts. Their heroic action enabled the Regimental Commander to maintain constant contact with the battalions in the attack.

EARL F. CRAIG, (17046817), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Deep Water, Missouri.

LUTHER J. MARLER, (34426659), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Harperville, Mississippi.

For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. While returning to the Company Command Post with enemy prisoners, the above enlisted men, although pinned down by enemy machine gun fire, infiltrated the prisoners to a point of safety, continued to the Command Post, and returned to their platoon's position with ammunition to replenish their units depleted stock.

ELMER B. SELLS, (39322263), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Portland, Oregon.

DEAN L. BUTTERFIELD, (36688376), Private, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Chicago, Illinois.

CHARLES W. ISRAEL, (34276302), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "H", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Louisville, Mississippi.

For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May and 12 May 1944, in Italy. As Company aid man, Private First Class Brown performed his duties in an outstanding manner and without regard for his own personal safety at a time when casualties inflicted

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upon his unit were severe. His determination to render first aid at the risk of his life and in such an exemplary manner is worthy of high commendation. Entered the military service from Pearsburg, Virginia.

OSCAR MAYNARD, (35203960), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 12 May and 13 May 1944, in Italy. When all other means of communication between his Company and the Battalion Command Post had failed, Private First Class Maynard volunteered to go over terrain being subjected to enemy mortar and artillery fire in order to lead wiremen to his Company position. His courageous action was of valuable assistance to his organization in the accomplishment of its combat mission. Entered the military service from Logan, West Virginia.

WADE W. NIMON, (35235551), Private, Infantry, Company "A", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 6 June 1944, in Italy. Although severely wounded when his squad was pinned down by heavy enemy machine gun fire, Private Nimon, on observing a group of the enemy attempting to make a surprise attack, succeeded in alerting the squad which was then able to deliver effective fire and destroy the enemy. His disregard for his wound, which later made it necessary to evacuate him by litter, in order that he might continue the fight against the enemy, reflect credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Canton, Ohio.

SECTION I

AWARD OF THE SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following enlisted men:

ELLERY H. PEPMEYER, (37195898), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. When an enemy machine gun opened fire upon his platoon, halting its advance, Private First Class Pepmeyer, exposing himself to the intense hostile fire, destroyed the positions with a rifle grenade. Continuing with his platoon to take the objective he assisted in the repelling of a strong enemy counterattack, personally inflicting many casualties upon the hostile force. Later, when an enemy strong point to their rear threatened to cut off reinforcements and supplies, Private First Class Pepmeyer volunteered to assist in its destruction, securing the rear of their position. His courageous determination to engage and destroy the enemy reflect the highest traditions of the military service. Entered the military service from Burlington, Iowa.

AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following named officers and enlisted men:

ISAAC R. KING, (01165888), Captain, Field Artillery, Headquarters, 85th Infantry Division Artillery, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Personnel and Supply Officer, Division Artillery, Captain King's knowledge of supply, untiring efforts and effective contacts with those in the chain of supply made possible the smooth and efficient procurement and distribution of ammunition and replacement of materials. He also kept the Artillery Commander advised of the strength and effectiveness of his command, contributing greatly to the success of the operation. Entered the military service from Lexington, Mississippi.

FRANK L. CARTER, (01284467), Captain, Infantry, Service Company, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 10 April to 28 May 1944, in Italy. As Regimental Ammunition Officer during a period of intense combat with a retreating enemy, Captain Carter maintained frequent contact with forward units, ascertaining their needs of munitions and weapons and supervising the supply of such items to critical points under fire. By using all available means to salvage and replace battle losses he succeeded in maintaining an adequate supply of weapons for the combat units. Entered the military service from Atlanta, Georgia.

JAMES R. COLVIN, (0456193), Captain, Infantry, Headquarters, Third Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 12 May to 14 May 1944, in Italy. During the initial phases of offensive operations, Captain Colvin organized and directed movement of vitally needed replacements and supplies to the front line units of his Battalion, frequently exposing himself to intense enemy fire in order to personally contact officers in forward areas. His devotion to duty and untiring efforts contributed materially to the maintenance of the Battalion's strength and fighting efficiency. Entered the military service from Lincolnton, Georgia.

ROBERT L. HOLLEY, (0461572), Captain, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Oxford, Mississippi.

ARTHUR M. FREEMAN, JR., (0461571), Captain, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Shreveport, Louisiana.

MAX E. CYTRYN, (0368850), Captain, Medical Corps, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from New York City.

For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 5 June 1944, in Italy. During a period of heavy combat with strong enemy forces, Captains Holley, Freeman and Cytryn, Battalion Surgeons, through ceaseless effort and untiring devotion to duty under enemy fire, successfully treated and evacuated numerous casualties through their aid stations.

JAMES W. KEATING, (0452407), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "E", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a heavy attack upon well emplaced enemy positions, First Lieutenant Keating, the Company Executive Officer, organized and directed the evacuation of many wounded from an enemy minefield. Acting on his own initiative he established a communications system and a means of supply distribution that materially aided the Battalion in the successful accomplishment of its mission. Entered the military service from Nunda, New York.

LAWRENCE G. BELL (01284455), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Headquarters, Second Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 6 June 1944, in Italy. Assigned the mission of reconnoitering routes in advance of an important task force, First Lieutenant Bell successfully accomplished his mission although twice faced with enemy sniper and tank fire along the route. His determination to continue on his mission despite the opposition, materially aided the task force to accomplish its mission which was of vital importance to future operations. Entered the military service from Toledo, Ohio.

HERBERT A. SCHNEIDER, (01302206), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "F", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. When his company was in a deep ditch prior to an attack and safe from small arms fire, a friendly tank became separated from the group maneuvering to the front and headed in the direction of the company. First Lieutenant Schneider, sensing what was about to happen and knowing that if the tank did not stop short of the ditch it might kill several of the men, exposed himself to heavy enemy machine gun fire and succeeded in halting the advancing tank. Entered the military service from Brooklyn, New York.

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OTTO K. BLAUERT, (01795757), First Lieutenant, Corps of Military Police, Military Police Platoon, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 8 April to 21 May 1944, in Italy. As Traffic Section Leader, First Lieutenant Blauert was confronted with magnified traffic control problems due to limited road net availability. When the Division started a rapid advance and traffic problems increased beyond expectations, he was prepared to execute plans to successfully support the attacking troops. Entered the military service from Long Island, New York.

LAWRENCE D. POPE, (01302048), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "F", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 19 May 1944, in Italy. At a time when their Company was engaged in an intense fire fight with enemy automatic weapons, First Lieutenant Pope, leading a volunteer group, successfully attacked and destroyed an enemy machine gun nest occupied by six German soldiers. His action, in the face of heavy fire from two hostile machine guns broke up a determined enemy effort to block the advance of the Company. Entered the military service from Brunswick, Georgia.

MAURICE H. LEVY, (01284535), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat on 22 May 1944, in Italy. First Lieutenant Levy, Battalion Communications Officer, personally laid wire over difficult and almost inaccessible terrain and under enemy sniper fire, thereby insuring communications between his Battalion Commander and the Regimental Headquarters. Entered the military service from New York City.

CHARLES D. SAULTS, (01305482), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Headquarters, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 6 June 1944, in Italy. Leading a patrol to clear a route of advance for his Battalion, First Lieutenant Saults, upon encountering a well armed enemy delaying force, skilfully deployed the members of the patrol and led them in an attack upon the hostile positions, killing two of the enemy and forcing the remainder to withdraw. His aggressive action in closing with the enemy under heavy fire cleared the route of advance for the Battalion and secured the territory within its first phase line. Entered the military service from Knob Noster, Missouri.

JAMES A. ANDES, (01174210), First Lieutenant, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 910th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 5 April to 8 June 1944, in Italy. During a period of large scale offensive operations when his Battalion was engaged in attacking and pursuing strong enemy forces, First Lieutenant Andes, the Assistant Communications Officer, supervised the installation and maintenance of communications in an outstanding manner, contributing materially to the successful accomplishment of the Battalion's combat mission. Entered the military service from Bloomington, Illinois.

ROSS WHITE, (01318947), Second Lieutenant, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. During the company's attack on a strongly fortified enemy position, Second Lieutenant White led the assault platoon in such an outstanding manner that he was successful in destroying heavily fortified dugouts, facilitating the capture of the objective. Entered the military service from Weston, West Virginia.

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ANDREW C. BICHKO, (6810832), First Sergeant, Infantry, Company "P", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During a night attack on the enemy, First Sergeant Bichko, under heavy artillery and small arms fire, evacuated his Company Commander who had been wounded and unable to return unaided, approximately 400 yards to the aid station. Entered the military service from Tuxedo Park, New York.

WALTER HOMA, (32341044), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "E", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. Upon his own initiative and without awaiting orders, Technical Sergeant Homa led a squad around the right flank of his platoon sector to carry the fight to the enemy, killing four and taking two prisoners. Entered the military service from Yonkers, New York.

RAYMOND W. JUDGE, (32336815), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Third Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 12 May and 13 May 1944, in Italy. When offensive operations against the enemy required the constant presence of the Battalion Staff and Headquarters Company in forward positions, Staff Sergeant Judge voluntarily exposed himself to enemy artillery, mortar and sniper fire in supplying rations to exposed forward Observation Posts. Entered the military service from New York City.

HAROLD F. MILLER, (34123182), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "G", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Jefferson, South Carolina.

LLOYD G. WAGNER, (36241134), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "O", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Galesville, Wisconsin.

For heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, in Italy. Setting up their mortar on a forward slope of a hill within observation of approximately one hundred enemy soldiers, Sergeant Miller and Private First Class Wagner fired forty-six rounds into the enemy positions, forcing them to retreat.

FRED T. BUSH, (6272327), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "D", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 24 May 1944, in Italy. When enemy fire critically wounded an officer and left him lying in an exposed position on the crest of an enemy held hill, Sergeant Bush, disregarding hostile fire which was sweeping the area, advanced up the slope and carried him to a place of safety. Entered the military service from Franklin, Texas.

WILBUR H. STEINWAY, (32336250), Sergeant, Corps of Military Police, Military Police Platoon, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 8 April to 23 May 1944, in Italy. As Traffic Section Sergeant of the Division Military Police Platoon, Sergeant Steinway took over the duties of the Traffic Officer when he was wounded and efficiently led his men in the performance of their duties. Confronted with limited road nets and extremely hazardous conditions he rendered most valuable service in keeping main supply routes open and reconnoitering new routes for the rapid advance of the troops. Entered the military service from Mineola, New York.

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ALBERT E. MC ABEE, (34388515), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "H", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. When an enemy vehicle was seen approaching, Sergeant McAbee set up his machine gun squad across the highway, then, remaining on the alert with his sub-machine gun, killed two German officers in a command car and wounded the motorcyclist escort. Entered the military service from Spartanburg, South Carolina.

DOMINIC G. GIGLIO, (34205653), Technician Fourth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May and 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a night action against the enemy, Technician Fourth Grade Giglio, a company aid man, continued in the treatment of casualties after he himself had been wounded. He persisted in the performance of his duties until his own injuries forced him to return to the aid station. During his return he led nine wounded men through enemy mortar and artillery fire to the aid station. Entered the military service from Tampa, Florida.

DENSON T. TATE, (34330887), Technician Fourth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 16 May to 22 May 1944, in Italy. As platoon aid man, Technician Fourth Grade Tate exposed himself many times to enemy fire in order to assist the wounded members of his unit, at one time remaining with a wounded soldier after enemy action had driven the remainder of the platoon from the area. At a later date, while assisting another soldier, under enemy fire, he was seriously wounded himself by hostile machine gun fire. Entered the military service from Vermon, Alabama.

GENNARO T. DE LORENZO, (32301820), Corporal, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 15 May and 16 May 1944, in Italy. When enemy fire wounded a number of his comrades, Corporal DeLorenzo, the squad leader, administered first aid at 4, although under heavy artillery and sniper fire, remained with them to assist in their evacuation to places of safety. His unselfish action at the risk of his life enabled prompt medical assistance to save their lives. Entered the military service from Jersey City, New Jersey.

EDWARD N. DUBEY, (32525305), Corporal, Infantry, Company "H", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. When the advance of his squad was held up by intense enemy action, Corporal Dubey, although under fire from an enemy sniper, ordered two members of the squad to cover his advance while he attacked an enemy occupied house with a rocket launcher. Despite heavy fire being directed upon him he moved his weapon into a position from which he could fire on the house, forcing nine of the enemy to surrender. Entered the military service from Bronx, New York.

WILLIAM S. MC GOUIRK, (34269047), Corporal, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Lithia Springs, Georgia.

WILLIE C. MC CLUNG, (35431350), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "M", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Trout, West Virginia.

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For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. During the opening phase of offensive operations against well emplaced enemy forces, these men accompanied their platoon through heavy hostile fire to reach the Division objective. Despite continuous mortar, machine gun and artillery fire they dug in an Observation Post and remained in their position until ordered to withdraw.

RUPERT G. HARRIS, (34513984), Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 13 May 1944, in Italy. During a prolonged attack on enemy positions, which resulted in severe casualties to his organization, Technician Fifth Grade Harris, a Company aid man, exposed himself many times to hostile fire to assist the wounded. When adjoining units lost their aid men he unhesitatingly assisted in the treatment of their casualties. His devotion to duty in the performance of his assignment is worthy of high commendation. Entered the military service from Spartanburg, South Carolina.

EARNEST J. BREEDEN, (34282944), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Knoxville, Tennessee.

JOHN W. DENNIE, (34374583), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Somerville, Tennessee.

QUITMAN E. WILEY, (34374796), Private First Class, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Memphis, Tennessee.

CECIL L. STACY, (38004346), Private, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Mesa, Arizona.

For heroic achievement in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. When enemy artillery shelled a column of troops advancing along a road, wounding two of them seriously and forcing the remainder to take cover, the above enlisted men voluntarily entered the area while shells were still bursting and evacuated the wounded to places of safety.

JOHN L. SOVINSKI, (36338580), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "H", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of heavy combat with well emplaced enemy forces, Private First Class Sovinski, although suffering from a temperature of 101 degrees, refused to be evacuated. He persisted in the performance of his duties as a machine gunner, maintaining heavy fire on the enemy positions and covering the advance of the company until the objective was taken. Entered the military service from Kenosha, Illinois.

ROBERT B. MORRIS, JR., (34388326), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "K", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 12 May 1944, in Italy. When enemy fire directed upon his company position wounded his Commanding Officer, Private First Class Morris, despite heavy machine gun, mortar and artillery fire, remained by his side administering first aid. He then went in search of litter bearers and led them back under the continuing barrage to evacuate his wounded officer. Entered the military service from Rock Hill, South Carolina.

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WARREN E. MAIDEN, (33443900), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 24 May 1944, in Italy. When the advance of his platoon was halted by fire from an enemy machine gun nest emplaced upon a mountain, Private First Class Maiden, in the face of heavy hostile machine gun and rifle fire, climbed up the slope and succeeded in pinning down the crew of the enemy emplacement, neutralising the position and enabling the platoon to continue the advance. Entered the military service from Weyers Cave, Virginia.

HUGH V. LIPPS, (34283171), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "G", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 2 June 1944, in Italy. Upon encountering an enemy light tank moving through a cut in the highway, Private First Class Lipps, armed with only an automatic rifle, opened fire. Believing himself to be engaged with a superior force, the tank driver, together with the driver of a following enemy vehicle, surrendered. Entered the military service from Riceville, Tennessee.

JOSEPH J. OLCHOWSKI, (33388057), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "E", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 26 May 1944, in Italy. When his squad leader was wounded in action against well emplaced enemy forces, Private First Class Olchowski crawled forward to where he lay and, despite intense fire from enemy machine guns, dragged him to a place of safety. Entered the military service from Baltimore, Maryland.

JOHN E. KONOPKA, (31211438), Private First Class, Corps of Military Police, Military Police Platoon, 85th Infantry Division, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 8 April to 21 May 1944, in Italy. As driver for the Traffic Section Leader, Private First Class Konopka was called upon for continuous service without rest and on many occasions under heavy artillery fire. Always ready and willing to assist in clearing difficult traffic situations, Private First Class Konopka rendered valuable service in supporting the rapid advance of the Division. Entered the military service from Indian Orchard, Massachusetts.

JAMES P. MANCINI, (32628844), Private First Class, Infantry, Anti-tank Company, 389th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 10 May 1944, in Italy. Under enemy artillery fire which had seriously wounded his platoon leader, Private First Class Mancini carried the profusely bleeding officer to the Aid Station. With disregard for personal safety from fire and exploding ammunition, he returned through the threatened area to his vehicle and drove it to safety. Entered the military service from Mamaroneck, New York.

HARRY T. MONDAY, (35610758), Private, Infantry, Company "B", 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense enemy action when his Company was forced to temporarily withdraw, Private Monday voluntarily went forward to retrieve a light machine gun. His unselfish action materially aided the Company as the gun was later used to repel a strong enemy counterattack. Entered the military service from Nevada, Ohio.

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HARRY W. DAVIS, (33437561), Private, Infantry, Company "K", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For meritorious service in combat during the period 12 May and 13 May 1944, in Italy. During a period of intense combat, when enemy artillery had pinned down a supply train, Private Davis, without regard for his own safety, made numerous trips under heavy fire to secure supplies for his Company. Entered the military service from Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania.

ALLEN J. STONE, (35732048), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Dycusburg, Kentucky.

ROBERT E. BELLES, (35705396), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from New Albany, Indiana.

For heroic achievement in action on 14 May 1944, in Italy. Upon learning that eight soldiers were lying wounded in an enemy minefield, the above enlisted men, although knowing the field was uncharted, voluntarily entered the area and evacuated them to the aid station.

SECTION I

AWARD OF SILVER STAR

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following officer and enlisted men:

JAMES H. DOWNEY, (01284180), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Cannon Company, 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 3 June 1944, in Italy. In the face of strong enemy fire, First Lieutenant Downey quickly re-organized his unit, leading to the capturing of 58 and killing of 11 of the enemy. His aggressive action enabled the Company to secure its position and destroy an enemy strongpoint in addition to the clearing of enemy snipers along the road on which our troops were advancing. Entered the military service from New Castle, Indiana.

RUFUS M. CANTERBERRY, (18030790), Technical Sergeant, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 15 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack upon enemy held hills, Technical Sergeant Canterbury led his platoon in aggressively seeking combat with the hostile forces, killing five German soldiers and though pinned down by heavy enemy fire, directed mortar fire upon enemy positions. Entered the military service from Palestine, Texas.

WOODROW W. SHEDY, (34205443), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 15 and 16 May 1944, in Italy. During heavy action against the enemy, Private First Class Shedy efficiently operated his automatic rifle under enemy sniper fire, killing many of the enemy and causing others to surrender. Later, in another attack, he set up his automatic rifle out in front of the squad and continued to lay down effective fire on enemy positions while the rest of the squad was pinned down. Entered the military service from Jacksonville, Florida.

SECTION II

AWARD, POSTHUMOUSLY, OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

The Bronze Star Medal awarded to Technician Fourth Grade JOE K. WRIGHT, (39301718), Company "B", 706th Tank Battalion, United States Army, in Section V, General Orders Number 18, this Headquarters, 8 June 1944, is awarded posthumously. Next of kin: Mr. Jim E. Wright, (Father), c/o General Delivery, Dufer, Oregon.

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1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to the following enlisted man:

ALBERT E. KEMBLE, (35572004), Private First Class, Infantry, Company "I", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 16 May 1944, in Italy. As a platoon runner, Private First Class Kemble exposed himself continuously to heavy enemy fire during an intense battle with determined hostile forces. Despite the hazards presented by the bitterness of the engagement, he provided his Company Commander with information enabling him to more effectively deploy his troops. While on a mission that took him to the front of his platoon's position, Private First Class Kemble was killed by enemy fire. Entered the military service from Hammond, Indiana. Next of kin: Mrs. Elizabeth Kemble, (Mother), Rowen, Illinois.

SECTION III

AWARD OF OAK LEAF CLUSTER TO THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, an Oak Leaf Cluster to the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following enlisted men:

WILLIAM J. GOFF, (32287628), Technician Fifth Grade, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 910th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Cazenovia, New York.

WALTER L. FORD, (33337710), Private, Field Artillery, Headquarters Battery, 910th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. Entered the military service from Coatesville, Pennsylvania.

For meritorious service in combat during the period 5 April to 15 May 1944, in Italy. The above enlisted men repeatedly exposed themselves to enemy small arms and artillery fire to maintain communications between forward Observation Posts and their Battalion forward switchboard, enabling their Battalion to deliver prompt and effective fire in support of the advancing Infantrymen.

SECTION IV

AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following officers and enlisted men:

WARREN G. COBB, (0315584), Captain, Infantry, Headquarters, First Battalion, 339th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 25 May 1944, in Italy. As Battalion Operations Officer during a period of intense combat, Captain Cobb, under mortar and machine gun fire, re-established contact with a forward rifle Company and successfully coordinated an attack by two Battalions, exposing himself to constant enemy action in going among the Companies of the Battalion to assist and direct them in their combat mission. Entered the military service from Charlotte, North Carolina.

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DELOS L. COOK, (01304345), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Headquarters, Third Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ROBERT E. HOPPE, (01305430), First Lieutenant, Infantry, Headquarters, Third Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Kasson, Minnesota.

For meritorious service in combat during the period 11 May to 14 May 1944, in Italy. Faced with the problem of keeping their Battalion supplied with ammunition during a period of intense combat, First Lieutenants Cook and Hoppe, by reconnoitering supply routes in hostile territory and by frequent personal contact with Companies in forward areas, succeeded in keeping a constant flow of ammunition to the front line troops.

RICHARD FENT, (38151700), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "C", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 16 May 1944, in Italy. When his platoon leader and platoon sergeant were wounded by intense enemy fire, Staff Sergeant Fent took command of the platoon and continued to engage the enemy. Finding an enemy machine gun nest located in a dug-out, he attacked it with a rocket launcher and destroyed it. He then led the platoon upon a reconnaissance patrol to insure flank security for the Company. Entered the military service from Mulhall, Oklahoma.

FRANCIS A. HAMPTON, (37128039), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "H", 337th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 2 June 1944, in Italy. While under direct fire from an enemy tank and snipers, Staff Sergeant Hampton, disregarding his own safety, personally evacuated twelve casualties to safety. His coolness under fire and unhesitating devotion to the safety of his comrades reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. Entered the military service from Yreka, California.

CLARE W. MADSEN, (37280886), Sergeant, Infantry, Company "M", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. Upon learning that a machine gun platoon and two rifle companies had been cut off from communication with the Battalion Commander, Sergeant Madsen volunteered to re-establish communications with them. Although the route over which the wire was to be laid was exposed to direct enemy fire, he accomplished his mission, enabling the units to maintain contact during a critical period of operations. Entered the military service from Arlington, South Dakota.

NIEWIND E. HUBER, (36241017), Technician Fifth Grade, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Second Battalion, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action during the period 11 May to 4 June 1944, in Italy. As driver for his Battalion Commander, Technician Fifth Grade Huber displayed exceptional determination and personal bravery in making numerous reconnaissances under heavy enemy mortar and artillery fire. His loyalty and complete devotion to duty were of invaluable assistance to his Commanding Officer during the campaign. Entered the military service from Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

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WALTER E. EDWARDS, (36756334), Private First Class, Medical Department, Medical Detachment, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 13 May 1944, in Italy. During an attack upon an enemy held hill, when a member of the platoon to which he was attached as aid man, lay wounded in the line of fire of an enemy machine gun, Private First Class Edwards disregarding the enemy fire which was sweeping the area, advanced to the wounded soldier and rendered first aid until ordered to withdraw. Entered the military service from Windsor Sholby, Illinois.

DONALD R. SMITH, (31387099), Private, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 19 May and 20 May 1944, in Italy. When fire from an enemy emplacement wounded the automatic rifleman of his group, Private Smith, the assistant automatic rifleman, seized the weapon, advanced under fire towards the enemy, and routed them from their position, wounding one before his weapon jammed. Entered the military service from Kent County, Rhode Island.

WALTER J. MICHALEK, JR., (35380623), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Canton, Ohio.

EDMUND H. CARTER, (36617568), Private, Infantry, Company "A", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Delaware, Ohio.

For heroic achievement in action on 11 May 1944, in Italy. When their platoon lost contact with the Company during a period of intense combat, Staff Sergeant Michalek and Private Carter volunteered to attempt to locate the Company Command Post. Exposing themselves to heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire during the most violent phase of the engagement, they searched an area exposed to the enemy. Their determined effort to complete their mission served to instill confidence in the other members of the platoon and inspired them to move on to take the objective.

2. Under the provisions of AR 600-15, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following enlisted men:

HERBERT REULE, (37276745), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "H", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Mc Clusky, North Dakota.

WILLIAM B. WALSH, (32341130), Staff Sergeant, Infantry, Company "H", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Peekskill, New York.

LESTER D. FOULKE, (33231210), Corporal, Infantry, Company "H", 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

ERNEST J. SWEIGERT, (36518887), Technician Fifth Grade, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 338th Infantry Regiment, United States Army. Entered the military service from Cleveland, Ohio.
